WHAT WILL WE DO WITH 1919 FEED CROP?

With rains all over the Southwest and an immense feed crop almost assured, it is now the time for our farmers to give serious consideration to the marketing of their 1919 grain crop. The past two years we were fortunate enough to make good feed crops while the rest of the West has been terribly drouth stricken; we have therefore been able to get a good price for our feed and have taken full advantage of this condition. The coming season it looks as if there will be no drought belt to whom we can sell this feed. We do not mean to discourage the planting of feed, for this country is adapted better to feed crops than to any other; but we believe it is going to be necessary to feed more of these crops on our own farms than we have been doing, in order to get a satisfactory price for it.

Mr. Edwin Houston, Extension Swine Husbandman, U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry, has been in the county for the past two days and has started hog feeding demonstrations in several sections of the county, so that we will know exactly what profit can be made from marketing our feed thru the pork route. He believes that at the present price of feed and the price of hogs a fifty per cent profit is a conservative estimate of what could be made in feeding the grain to hogs rather than by selling it to other feeders in other parts of the State and letting them make the profit in making it into pork.

This estimate is based on the fact that five pounds of feed to a pound of pork, and the price of feeding pigs at about 12¢ a pound and the price of finished hogs at about 16¢. It looks like six months from today that there will be even a much greater profit in the feeding of pigs, but it also looks like the pigs will be very hard indeed to get, and our guess would be that every dollar spent now for breeding hogs, to start the restocking of the county, will be worth ten dollars next fall in making the pigs for feeding available.

Mr. P. O. Bennett, our County Agricultural Agent, will have the active management of these feeding demonstrations, and he will be able to give us some accurate figures that will be of vital interest a little later on. He is insisting that every expense in the cost of feeding these hogs be listed and the actual value of the feed they eat be given. We believe that when these figures are put beside the amount of money these hogs are going to sell for, they will be very interesting to say the least.

VILLAGE LIFE FOR CITY DWELLERS

"Social Unit" Experiment in Cincinnati Has Been So Successful That It May Be Generally Adopted.

CAN THE advantages of village life be restored in the city? Can city dwellers have the friendly and neighborly feeling which marks the relations between men and women in the small town, where no one can be ill, or out of work, without receiving neighborly assistance? Can we find for the cities something to take the place of the town meeting, where all the population gathers together to discuss common problems and government is interpreted in terms of community service, instead of being housed in some remote city hall?

The "Social Unit," newest experiment in applied democracy, believes that these advantages can be restored to cities, and in a section of Cincinnati is attempting to prove that they can. So successful has this experiment been, in the few months during which it has been tried, that people all over the country are beginning to watch it, and to talk about it, and industrial men and women are even saying that the "Social Unit" has the biggest reconstruction program to offer America which has yet been formulated. The little Cincinnati district, which is trying to re-establish the sort of neighborliness which exists in small towns, has the most distinguished of visitors, men on reconstruction missions from the European countries, medical organizers and social service workers. For instance, Dr. Rene Sand of the University of Brussels was recently sent to this country to study methods for rehabilitating and reorganizing Belgium. He visited Cincinnati and said of the Social Unit: "I shall carry back to my people no more constructive suggestions than those which I have gotten from the Social Unit."

This Social Unit district of Cincinnati, has acquired fame because the people are trying to be helpful each to the other and have gone to work to effect an organization which would make it possible for every one to be of service. Neighborliness in the Village.

In the small village it is impossible for anyone to be sick or bereaved or out of employment without the folks of the village knowing about it and wanting to do something about it. A death or a contagious disease affects the entire village and the only people who go unbenefited are those who rebuff kindness or who wear it out. But in the crowded city people get away from this neighborliness, and seem to care nothing about the folks around them. Babies die because the mothers do not know how to care for them. Many people who have consumption and other diseases live with small children around them, exposing them to sickness. Many invalids spend months at home, alone and unbenefited. All this is not because the people of the city are not as kind hearted and as willing to be helpful, but because the city is too large for every one to know every one else, and many people live near each other for years without knowing even each other's names.

The Social Unit organization has divided the district of 15,000 people in which it is working into thirty-one small blocks of about 500 people each. The plan is to make each of these blocks a tiny village where folks will come to know one another and to be interested in having their neighbors happy and contented. In a country village there is usually some one woman who is a sort of village mother to whom folks go in times of trouble, who knows every one and is always busy getting people to help those in need. Taking her as an example, the Social Unit organization has found in each tiny block village a woman who serves as a "block worker," who knows when anyone needs help of any kind and sees that help is given by the right agency. This worker is chosen by the people of her block and is paid enough so that she will be enabled to employ someone to do part of her housework during the times that she is "mothering" her block. The thirty-one block workers, together, form what is called the Citizens' Council. The work of this Citizens' Council is to learn what the needs of every part of the district are and to see that plans are worked out for meeting these needs. In doing this it uses the knowledge of the different skilled groups in the community.

Use People With Expert Knowledge. In every community there are certain groups, each of which knows more about one particular thing than any other group. For example, the doctors know more about the prevention of disease than anyone else, the teachers know more about educating children, the plumbers more about plumbing, the business men about business, and so on.

The Social Unit has organized people with special skill for the good of the community as a whole. The doctors are the board of health of the district; the employers and trade unionists are the industrial experts; the social workers are the department of public welfare; the teachers the board of education, and so on. When the Citizens' Council, or the "block representatives" discover a health need in the district it puts the problem up to the doctor group. From that time on the doctors are responsible for finding a solution for the problem and for submitting the plan they devise to the Citizens' Council. If

the block workers in the Citizens' Council should find that there are many men out of work in the various blocks, the business and labor groups would be held responsible for the working out of some plan to meet the problem. In this way, everyone in the Social Unit district is enabled to work for the whole community at the same time that he is working for himself. Everyone is a part of the big force for good in the community. Slowly, one by one, each occupation is being organized and will have an executive in charge. The committee made up of the executives of all the occupational groups is called the Occupational Council of the Social Unit. The Occupational Council and the Citizens' Council acting together are the means by which the community governs itself.

Children Given Medical Attention.

When the doctors and nurses of the Social Unit district were organized they found that there were many babies dying every year quite unnecessarily, either because little diseases which they contracted were not taken in time, or because their mothers were not properly educated in caring for them. The doctors asked the Citizens' Council to go into their blocks and find out how many children under six years of age there were. They found that there were 1,179. The doctors decided to give each of these children a complete medical examination, and the "block work-

ers" went back to their blocks and told the mothers and fathers that the district physicians would examine their children and tell them if there was anything wrong and how it could be remedied. One thousand and forty-three of the children were brought to the district health station. Hundreds of defects were discovered and remedied. Classes were organized for the mothers; the district nurses went into the homes to follow up the children who had been examined and see that the parents were giving them the right care.

When the epidemic of influenza broke out, everyone knew that somewhere in his or her block, within calling distance, was a woman who would exert the utmost effort to see that those who were ill got help. The doctors and nurses were mobilized through the district headquarters, so that cases could be cared for in the shortest possible time. There was hardly a case in the district which was not reported, and when the epidemic was over it was found that the death rate in this district had been a third over that in the rest of the city.

Census Is Taken.

A little while ago the people of this district decided that they could not work out their problems as they should unless they knew more about each other, so they decided to take a census of themselves and find out who they were and where they lived and what countries they came from, how many rooms they lived in and what they did for a living. "Uplift" organizations have taken census of this kind before, but probably never before has a district voted through its block representatives and its skilled groups to make a study of its own life and present and study to the world. The people were willing to make it, because they were doing it themselves, and because they knew that if they found housing conditions bad they had an organization which could remedy them. If they found children and young people without opportunities for healthful, happy play they could see that such a condition did not continue.

Secret of a Successful Community.

The men and women who are backing the Social Unit experiment—for the Cincinnati district is really a laboratory for social experimentation, and hundreds of men and women of vision are interested in it—believe that the secret of a successful community organization lies in making everyone feel that he is important. It is hard to feel that you are important, and that what you do counts for good or ill, in a city of half a million or more. But in a city block, which is really a little village, with its own council, its own "block worker," its own program of health, recreation and civic endeavor, every man, woman and child is important. If they fail to do their part they can see immediately the effect upon the life of their little community. If they work in the interests of their little community they can see the good effects as well. And this, after all, is the advantage which the village has over the city. People don't get lost in the village as they do in the city. And no one can "get lost" in the Social Unit.

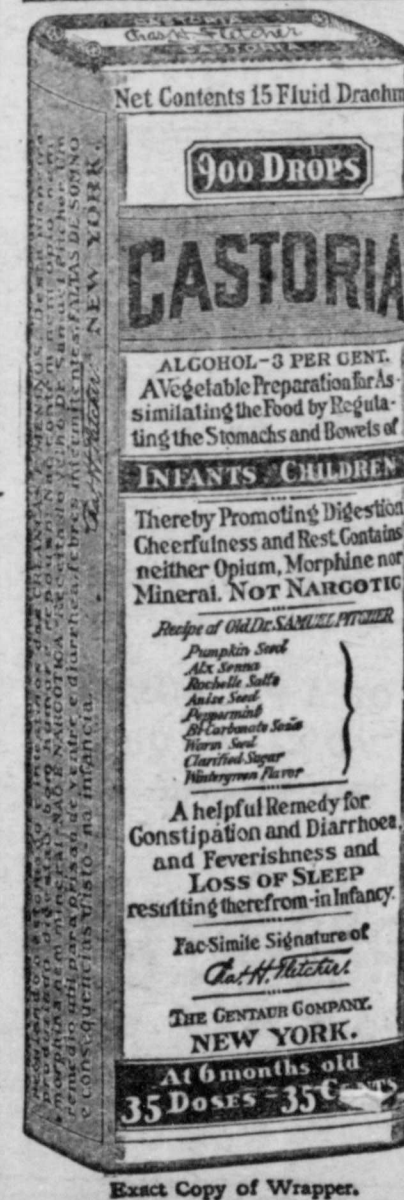

OFFICIAL GRAIN GRADE IS GIVEN

All That Is Necessary Is to Submit Sample of Required Volume in Prescribed Form.

WHEAT AND CORN STANDARDS

Principal Benefit to Farmer Is That He Gets Correct Grading by Disinterested Inspector as Basis for Prices.

The farmer, the country buyer, the miller, or anyone else may have samples of wheat or shelled corn inspected and graded by grain inspectors licensed by the secretary of agriculture. All that is necessary is to send a sample of the required volume in the prescribed form and to pay the inspection fee.

No such service was ever rendered until within the last few months. So far official standards have been established for wheat and shelled corn only. Proposed grades have been published for oats, and it is probable that official standards will be established for the 1919 crop.

Grading by inspectors. The federal grain supervision bureau, of agriculture. The officers of federal grain supervision, bureau of markets, do not inspect and grade wheat or shelled corn except when an appeal has been entertained on a grade assigned by a licensed inspector, or where a dispute as to unspectated grain has been referred to the secretary of agriculture.

The offices of the federal grain supervision, however, may furnish the names of the nearest inspectors with advice as to taking and forwarding samples, to persons who desire to have samples inspected. There is no prescribed fee for grading samples, but the secretary has specified that fees shall be reasonable. This information can be obtained from the nearest federal grain inspector. The list of offices is given in the accompanying box.

When grade is assigned on samples submitted, the inspection certificate covers only the sample, it being specifically set out that such grading does not apply to the entire lot from which the sample was taken. Unless the inspector himself or an official sampler takes the sample from the lot of grain, he is not permitted to certify further than as to the sample submitted. In most cases of contemplated purchase however, it probably happens that the interested parties agree that the sample is representative and that the grade given shall apply to the entire lot of wheat or shelled corn.

Size of Samples. The size of the sample submitted and the manner of forwarding it are important factors in enabling the inspectors to determine the correct grade. The sample should be representative of the entire lot of grain. It should be at least two quarts in volume, one and an eighth pints of which should be placed in an air-tight container and the balance enclosed in a clean cloth sack. Samples sent in paper bags, cigar boxes or other makeshift containers cannot be properly graded.

The principal benefit to the farmer is that he has a correct grading by a disinterested inspector as a basis for prices. The same advantage accrues to the miller or dealer, with the additional feature of the check upon his own grading if he has sought to establish the grade in accordance with federal standards.

Laws Benefit Agriculture. "The last five years," says the annual report of the secretary of agriculture, "have been especially fruitful of legislation and of its practical application for the betterment of agriculture."

"Special provision was made for the solution of problems in behalf of agriculture, embracing marketing and rural finance. The bureau of markets, unique of its kind and excelling in range of activities and in financial support any other similar existing organization was created and is rendering effective service in a great number of directions. Standards for staple agricultural products were provided for and have been announced and applied under the terms of the cotton futures and grain standards acts. Authority to license bonded warehouses which handle certain agricultural products was given to the department, and the indications are that, with the return of normal conditions, the operation of the act will result in the better storing of farm products, the stabilization of marketing processes, and the issuance of more easily negotiable warehouse receipts.

"The agricultural extension machinery, the greatest educational system ever devised for men and women engaged in their daily tasks, had very large and striking development. The federal aid road act, approved shortly before this country entered the war, resulted in legislation for more satisfactory central highway agencies in many states and the systematic planning of good-roads systems throughout the Union. Today each state has a highway authority with the requisite power and with adequate funds to meet the requirements of the federal measure.

"The federal reserve act, which has benefited every citizen through its influence on banking throughout the Union, included provisions especially designed to assist the farming population. It authorized national banks to lend money on farm mortgages, and recognized the peculiar needs of the farmer by giving his paper a maturity period of six months.

"This was followed by the federal farm loan act, which created a banking system reaching intimately into the rural districts and operating on terms suited to the farm owners' needs. This system began operations under the troubled conditions of the world war, and its activities were impeded by the vast changes incident to the entry of this country into the conflict. But, in spite of these difficulties, it has made remarkable headway, and there is little doubt that after the return of peace, its development will be rapid and will more than fill the expectations of the people."

A BEAUTIFUL TRIBUTE TO WESLEY ADAMSON BY CAPTAIN SIMPSON

The following letter, written by Captain E. A. Simpson, with the A. E. F. in France, has been given us for publication:

January 22nd, 1919.
Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Adamson,
Hedley, Texas.

My Dear Friends:

Your sad letter of Dec. 1st has just reached me and I hasten to reply to same. Existing regulations prevented me from writing you direct of the death of your son, and my friend and comrade, Wesley, until you were notified by the U. S. War Dept.

I am only too sorry that it is true. Wesley died a hero's death on October 8th at St. Etienne, France. H Company was in the assault and Wesley was among the first to go over the top. He went forward like the brave man he was, until an overhead shrapnel burst near him and he was wounded. Too brave to quit, he went dealing death to the Hun, and finally ran into the face of the fire from a machine gun, and he was killed instantly.

Your son was as brave and clean as a lad as was in the entire A. E. F. He was a soldier, every inch. You cannot be too proud of him. He and I were more than Captain and Private. He was my friend. It was my pleasure to make easier the way for him many times over here, and right royally did he repay me with love and devotion to duty, and when the final test of all men came, Wesley assayed all pure gold and was a man among men. He has died such a death as is given to only a few. He gave his life freely, willingly, that Freedom and Right might prevail, and Heaven is only the brighter and better that he has gone on a little earlier to be there to welcome you and his other friends when they shall come.

For three days Wesley lay near me under a perfect hell of fire, and never lost his cheerfulness and courage, and on that fatal morning when it became my privilege and duty to say "Come on, men, let's go over the top," he was one of the first to step out. He had fought and then fought like a lion, and his name will forever be esteemed and honored among the men of H Company. I myself got four bullets in my body and was covered in gas, but the Great Commander saw fit to let me live and take Wesley. I loved him as my son, and I shall hold his memory as one of the sweetest of my life.

Wesley is buried with military honors on the battlefield of St. Etienne, in the province of Haut marne, in the Champagne district of France. His grave is fully marked and registered by the Graves Registration Bureau,

and his name in metal letters placed on same. In due time the U. S. Government will return to you, or to the National Cemetery in America, the body of your son.

He was instantly killed, so did not have the long lingering death that comes to some. I have been with him, and I know that he gladly gave his life for the cause.

It was not my influence that brought him over here, but his own high sense of patriotism and his keen sense of duty and his courage that made him follow where the dictates of his conscience led, even when that sense led him into the valley of the shadow. Rest assured that your son's body will soon be returned without cost to you, and you will be notified and allowed to direct the place where he shall sleep his last. Until then, rest assured he is sleeping quietly, contentedly, wrapped in the folds of the flag he loved, on the quiet sunlit plains of France, and over him nod the lilies of that France which he came to save, so as to preserve you, his Country and his home from harm and Hun, and also to repay a long standing debt to France, who saved the Country he loved when it was an infant among the Nations of earth.

I give you all my sympathy—the sympathy of one who knows and understands; of one who has labored long, faced death, suffered much, but whose reward is full and complete in the knowledge that I was permitted to lead and command, to love and labor with such men as your son showed himself to be, and whose greatest joy is that on more than one occasion Wesley, as well as the other boys of the Company, have taken me by the hand and said, as one strong man to another: "Thank you, Captain, I appreciate what you have done for me."

I shall be delighted to see you when we come. Orders now indicate that our Division will sail for the U. S. A. on March 2nd. I give you my regards and ask you to convey the same to all my friends there.

Owning a home is the inherent desire of every head of a family. But it is doubtful if the pride of ownership is as strong in the husband as in the wife and the other members of the household. The latter spend a much greater part of their time in the home than does the man, whose days are devoted to business. Consequently it is the wife and daughters who have the greatest interest in the planning of a home.

There will be much building of small homes this year. The government has removed the restrictions that were imposed on building as a war measure and plans that were temporarily abandoned can now be brought to fruition. In both country and city building activity will be greatly in evidence as soon as spring comes.

In the meantime those who contemplate building will have the pleasure of spending the winter evenings planning the home. That is one of

Thus it will be seen that although this would be termed a five-room house, it really is much larger.

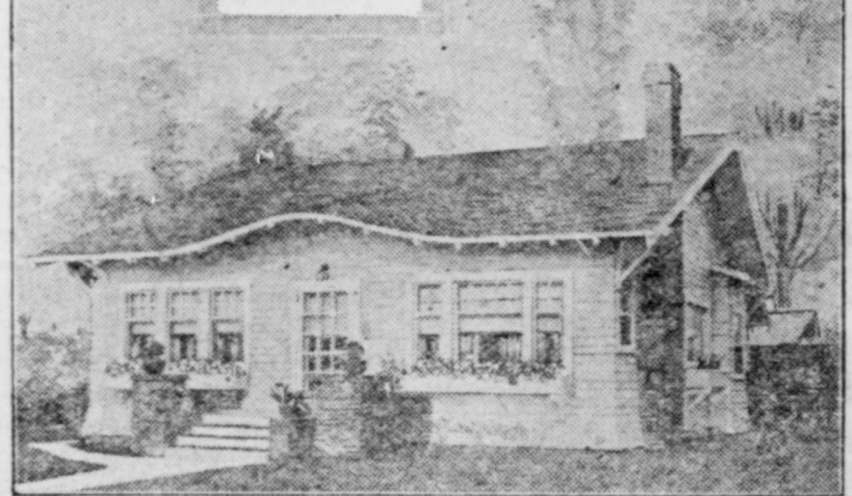
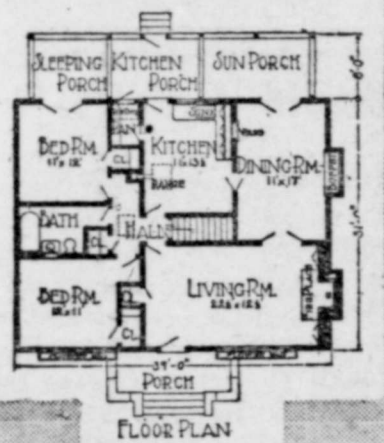
The graceful lines of this house, with the opportunity afforded for window boxes and flower beds and shrubs surrounding it, make it particularly attractive from the outside.

This advance in bungalow design embodies the ideas of a number of architects, who have devoted much study to designing small homes. This type of home is engaging the attention of the leading members of the architectural profession more and more, as those who build homes nowadays have learned that a little money spent for advice from experienced and capable architects is worth while.

Compact Arrangement.

The design and floor plan are recommended for study to those who intend to build. The more they are studied the more it will be found that here is an excellent design for the family that will build a home of moderate size. It is compact in arrangement, has all of what is generally termed "the modern conveniences" and leaves little to be desired in appearance.

Just one word about the desirability of building this year. The cessation of the war has released many thousands of men skilled in the building trades. It also has released quantities of materials that have been used in war work. Both materials and labor now are available in abundance, and when the things that are



the greatest joys of building—planning just how the home will be after it is finished.

Undoubtedly the type of home that has the greatest appeal to the suburban and small city dweller is the bungalow. Great Advance Shown.

Since the beginning of this popularity, however, there has been a great advance in bungalow designing. One of the best of these latter designs is shown in the illustration accompanying this article. It might be called the Dutch colonial type, and, in its balanced simplicity and grace of roof line, will be to the middle West what the two-story Dutch colonial house is to the East.

The bungalow is 30 feet wide and 31 feet deep, while the sun porch, sleeping porch and kitchen porch, which are ranged along the back, extend eight feet farther.

The floor plan was designed with the idea of saving the steps of the housekeeper. The living room is typical of a bungalow and has that spaciousness which makes this type of home so popular. It is 22½ feet long and 12½ feet wide. One of its attractions is a large open fireplace, with bookcases on either side. Opening off the living room toward the rear of the house is the dining room, which is large also, its dimensions being 11 by 17 feet. Built into the wall between the two windows is the buffet.

SLANG TERM OF OLD ORIGIN

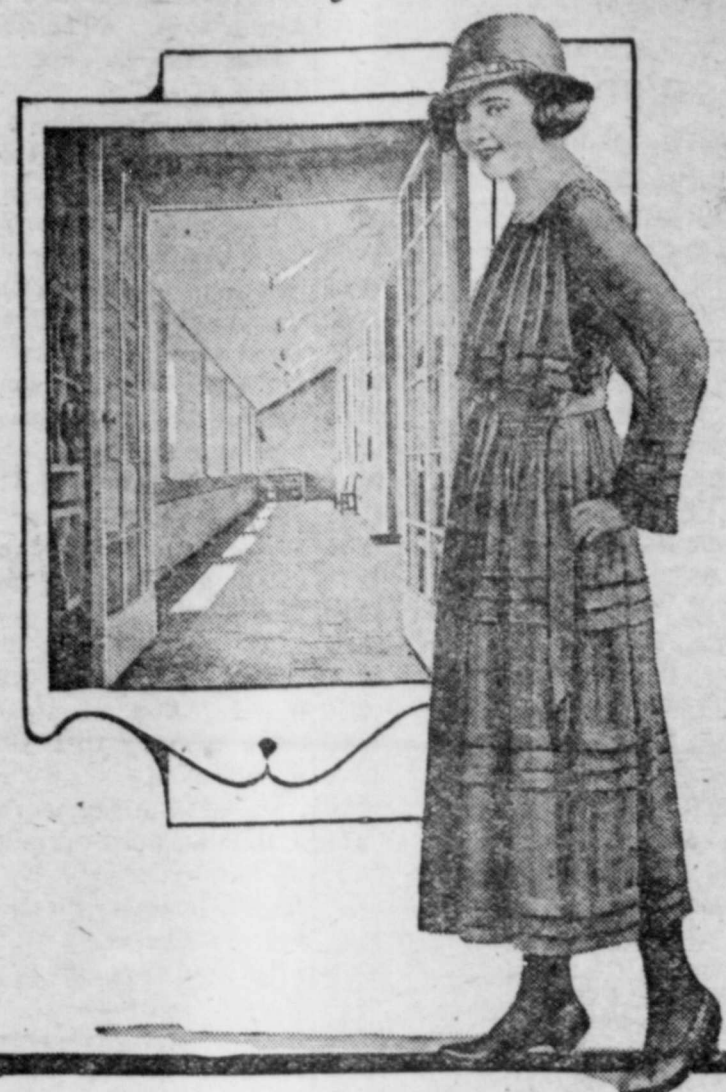
Appellation "Deadhead" First Came Into Use When Dead City of Pompeii Was Flourishing.

Did you ever stop and think why, if you are so fortunate as to acquire a free ticket to something you should be called a deadhead? The reason for this bit of slang dates way back to the days of the ancients. In the national museum in Naples there is a case of old theater tickets that the Pompeians didn't get a chance to use before their theater season was brought to such an abrupt close by the eruption of Vesuvius. They are made in various shapes, each shape showing which part of that particular ticket will admit you. You could get into the peanut gallery only when you presented the little pigeons, and to this day that gallery is called the pigeon loft in Italy. Then there were little skulls modeled of ivory, and these were used only by those who were to be admitted free. Hence "deadhead."

Weird Sun Legend of Stonehenge.

In times of peace there was always an excursion to Stonehenge on June 20 to see the sun rise on the following morning, for on the 21st old Sol's first rays are supposed to strike the great altar-stone, on "Frier's Heel." This, tradition tells us, used to be the signal for the sacrifice of human victims in the days that are long gone by, and it is easy, when there, to imagine the early Druids, in their white robes, oak-crowned and wearing the mystic symbols round their necks, gathering to make their offerings to Bel, as they called the sun, and to the serpent, the Beltine fires, glowing over the great plain the while.
