Accident Alley Chalks Up One More Wreck

"Accident Alley," the killer intersection of U. S. Highway 87 and Farm Highway 54, three miles north of Abernathy, chalked up another wreck early Monday afternoon, but was cheated out of its lust for death.

A pickup truck driven by Max Cox, 21, Rt. 2, Plainview, overturned two or three times after colliding with an automobile driven by Judson W. Jones, Route M, Lockney. The crash occurred in the east lanes of the divided Highway 87.

Cox, who suffered a badly lacerated leg, was taken to a Plainview hospital by Chambers ambulance. There was no injury report on Jones.

"Accident Alley" earlier this month claimed the life of a Clarendon man and critically injured a Plainview woman.

The community, represented by several local organizations, has opened a campaign to get an overpass at that intersection. The Young Farmer Chapter had started on this project in one of its meetings prior to the death of the Clarendon man at 54-87.

M. B. Patton, 83, Fatally Injured In Auto Accident

An 83-year-old Abernathy man was fatally injured and his brother, also of Abernathy, sustained broken bones and bruises at 2:30 p. m. Friday when the car in which they were riding struck a culvert on the highway one mile west of Benjamin in Knox County.

They were taken to the Knox City hospital where M. B. Patton, 83, of 707 15th St., Abernathy, died on the operating table. J. B. Patton, 73, of 603 North Drive, Abernathy, sustained broken ribs, collarbone and bruises and abrasions. In a call to the Knox City hospital Monday, The Review was informed that J. B. Patton would return to his home here Tuesday of this week.

The Patton brothers were en route to Stephenville to visit a sister when the accident happened. According to reports, J. B. Patton, driver of the car, apparently blacked out and the vehicle swerved into the culvert.

J. B. Patton is a longtime resident of this area. He moved to town about three years ago after selling his farm southwest of Abernathy. M. B. Patton had resided here several years.

Mrs. Dean attended Abernathy schools, and was graduated from Texas Tech. She was a member of Abernathy First Methodist Church, and of Abernathy Chapter No. 877, Order of the Eastern Star.

Sanderson Takes Hale County Attorney Office; Local Men Ask Help On 54-87 Overpass

The Hale County Commissioner's Court accepted Steve Hurt's resignation as County Attorney last week and officially appointed Ray Sanderson, Abernathy attorney, to fill out the unexpired term until Jan. 1.

Sanderson, an Abernathy attorney since 1961, was elected Hale County Attorney without opposition this year. Hurt ran unsuccessfully for the District Attorney post in the first Democratic primary.

Sanderson will take office as the officially elected County Attorney Jan. 1.

Hurt has indicated he will remain in Plainview and go into a law practice partnership with Joe L. Cox.

A delegation of five men from Abernathy appeared before the court requesting assistance in eliminating a traffic hazard at the intersection of Highway 87 and Farm Road 54 at Abernathy.

They were Delton Stone, president of Abernathy Young Farmer Chapter; Roy Jones, mayor; Dan Z. Ward, city alderman; Charles Norwood, city manager, and Robert Barnes, Abernathy Chamber of Commerce Manager.

Dan Ward, spokesman for the group, said that during the past year at that one intersection, there had been nine accidents, 15 injuries, and one fatality.

He suggested the construction of an overpass on the East and West Farm Road, but assured the court that Abernathy was willing to accept any measure to cut down on traffic accidents.

County Judge C. L. Abernethy said that when the original plans for the roadway were presented in the fall of 1961, the resident engineer in Plainview said that a traffic interchange, or overpass, would be included.

"Even then, that intersection had been judged a death trap," Judge Abernethy said.

He continued, "But somewhere along the line, the state or federal government must have changed the plans because the road was constructed without an overpass."

Judge Abernethy said that many times, engineers plans appear perfect on paper, but are

dangerous when in actual use. He cited the case at Slaton when engineers repeated that there was nothing wrong with the intersection, even though people were being killed "whole-sale" in accidents.

"They even put up signal lights there," he said, "and it's still confusing and dangerous."

The court pledged complete support to the delegation in its drive to eliminate traffic accidents and instructed them to take their case to O. L. Crane, district engineer in Lubbock.

Ward expressed hope that something could be done quickly because of the number of trucks and heavy traffic traveling Highway 87. "Cotton season hasn't even started," he said, "And we have a greater threat for accidents when cotton vehicles start using the intersection."

The delegation said it was prepared to carry their request for safety measures to Austin and the State Highway Department if Crane and local engineers weren't able to help them.

On a financial side, the court approved the transfer of \$3,500

to the Social Security fund so that it could be mailed to Austin covering county employees until Jan. 1.

A request was also made by Larry Peckham, county auditor, to advance \$950, and ask the city of Plainview to advance a matching amount, to the Airport for payment of bills. He said that this \$1,900 would hold the Airport at a steady financial pace until it received its Land Grant in January.

The request was approved. November 3 was the date set for opening of bids for construction on the new Hale County Agricultural Center.

Architect John Kerr told the court he would have specifications and plans ready for the advertising of bids on Oct. 15 and Oct. 22. This, he said, would allow construction companies plenty of time to check all blueprints before submitting bids.

At an earlier session, Kerr said that construction on the exhibition building would begin approximately 10 days after a bid was let. According to the bid specifications, contractors must agree to have the building completed by March, 1965.

In other action, the commissioners:

—Approved a request by County Agent Ollie Liner to purchase a new pickup for the county agricultural department.

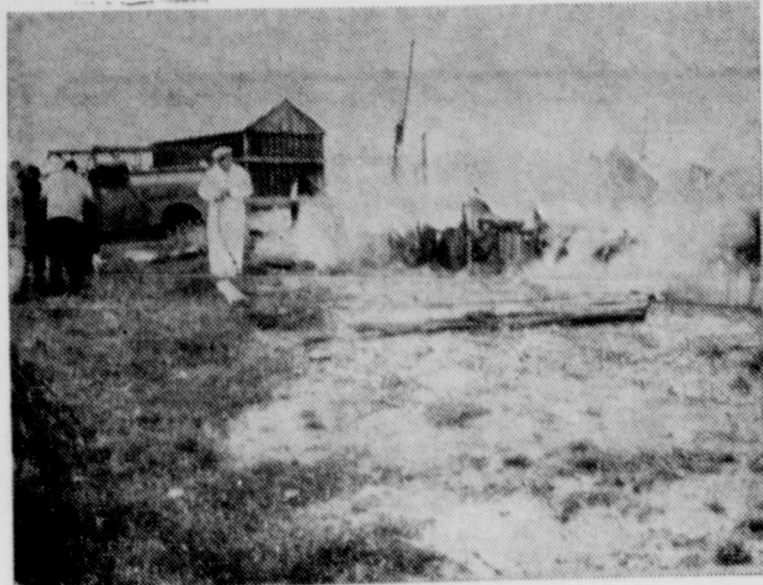

Dear Mr. Congressman:

This letter is concerned with issues which are vital to our particular section of the country. I have some very definite convictions about certain matters, and I would welcome the opportunity of discussing these issues face to face if your schedule could be arranged to do so.

In my opinion the economic growth of West Texas has been retarded by the foreign investments of our federal government. Through the Oil Compact, Texas has been forced to absorb a great percentage of foreign oil, while our own wells have been allowed to produce on the maximum of only 10 days a month. In my opinion, this is not fair to our area.

I believe that the cattlemen in our district have a just complaint over the importation of foreign beef, and that the farmers of our area have been denied support and encouragement to raise sugar beets and other crops because of foreign imports.

I am concerned that our district has lagged behind in the development of Interstate Highways, and in industrial development until this political year.

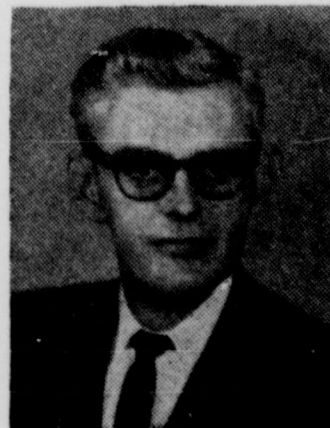

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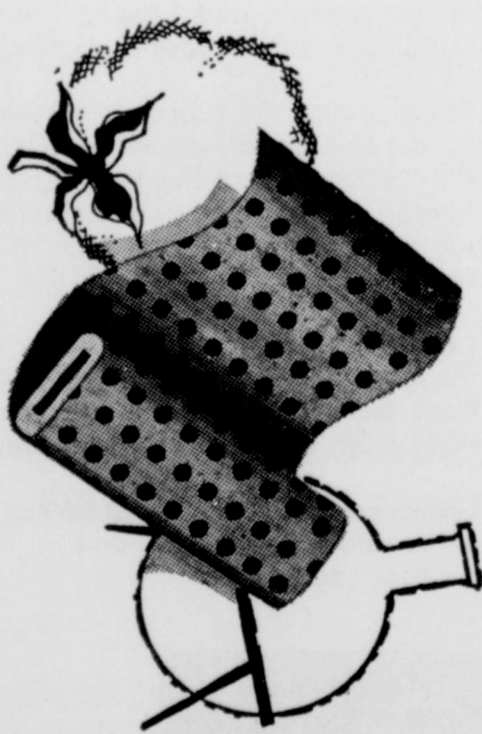
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
