D-C-D DELEGATES WILL BE HERE MONDAY

The delegates of the fourth annual convention of the D-C-D highway will be in Perryton next Monday for lunch. There will be at least twenty cars in this delegation, there being representatives from all the towns as far west as Denver. Arrangements are being made by the committee from the Chamber of Commerce for the meeting of this delegation at the state line and escorting them into town, also for their entertainment and refreshments while they are in our city. L. S. Hobbs, R. T. Correll and Van W. Stewart are the members of this committee and it is their wish that as many cars as possible from here turn out for the trip to the state line and to act as an escort for these visitors into our city. Let all of our business houses put on gala attire and extend to these good roads boosters a royal welcome to our state and city.

It is not known just how many cars will go from here to the convention which will be held at Elk City, Oklahoma. It is planned to send at least five cars. The Governors of the states through which the highway passes have appointed delegates from all the larger towns. Attorney Walter Allen is Governor Neff's appointee to represent Perryton. The program for the trip to Elk City calls for arrival at Canadian Monday evening where a banquet will be served the visitors at the Main Cafe. Rooms will be reserved for all at the Moody Hotel. Party is to leave Canadian at seven o'clock Tuesday morning, have picnic lunch on road and arrive Elk City about one o'clock. Make your plans to go to Elk City.

BOND ELECTION NOT LEGAL

Improvement Bonds To Be Re-Voted

City Attorney, R. T. Correll, submitted to the Attorney General the following questions:

"I herewith inclose to you a printed copy of the notice of bond election, for the purpose stated therein, of the City of Perryton, which is incorporated under the general laws of the State. Since the passage of this order and the issuance of the notice, a published copy of which is herein inclosed, I have been appointed city attorney for said city; upon investigation of this notice of election, it is my judgement that it is insufficient because it fails to state the time said bonds shall become payable."

To Which the Attorney General replied:

"I have your letter of the 19th instant, and in reply thereto beg to say that the proposed \$7,000 issue of City of Perryton Street Improvement Bonds cannot be approved, for the reason that the election notice does not show when the bonds shall become due and payable."

From the above it will appear that we have it all to do over, which means a new election on the proposition which will take some time. It is fortunate that the error was found at this time, as if the matter had dragged until the record was made up and presented it would mean a lot of useless expense and needless delay. As the matter went before, it is merely regrettable on account of time, as there is no doubt that the people will go as strong again as before.
