## Muleshoe, Floydada meeting at crucial crossroads

Coming off probably the toughest loss of the season against Friona last week (9-6), the Muleshoe Mules take the field Friday night against Floydada knowing they still have a shot at the playoffs but a win is imperative against the Whirlwinds for that to happen.

"This is going to be a real character check," said Muleshoe head coach Randy

Adair. "After the wipeout to Littlefield two weeks ago and the heartbreaker last week to Friona, it's going to be a real challenge for the kids to reveal their level of commitment."

Muleshoe (2-5, 0-2 in District 2-3A) face a Floydada team that similarly stands at 2-5. The Whirlwinds have wins over Lockney (8-7) and Lubbock Roosevelt (36-34),

but enter the game on the heels of a 32-6 loss to Littlefield.

"Floydada has struggled with the win-loss record like us," Adair said. "We know we've lost a couple of games we should've won. We could be 5-2 real easy instead of 2-5, but that's not to make excuses. It just shows that the program has come a long way."

Floydada brings a running program has come a long way."

Floydada brings a running attack that primarily features quarterback Sammy Rodriguez.

"Their best player is their quarterback (Rodriguez)," Adair said. "He does a real good job running the option and putting pressure on the defense."

"The key defensively for us will be to stop number 12 (Rodriguez) as a runner and thrower."

Helping the Mules cause will be the return of defensive back Robert Jaime. Jaime has been out for two weeks, but will be on the field Friday night.

"He's been our strongest practice player all year,"

## Giant muleshoe pays tribute to town, history

**I**t is a symbol of history and a special tribute to the city of Muleshoe.

In what may be a world record, a giant muleshoe erected at the Heritage Complex was formally dedicated on Saturday. The muleshoe measures 22 by 16 feet and weighs about 5,000 lbs.

It all started with a dream many years ago by R. A. Bradley of Muleshoe, who envisioned the giant muleshoe in tribute to the only city in the United States who pays tribute to the mule. The dream was fulfilled Saturday, thanks to the ingenuity and hard work of a local Boy Scout, 15-year-old Kermit Price.

When Kermit learned of

Bradley's dream, he set out to make it a reality. Last spring, Kermit was looking for a community service project to take on in order to earn an Eagle Scout Badge, the highest honor a Boy Scout can receive. Bradley told him about his dream and Kermit began work on the project immediately.

During the dedication ceremony Saturday evening, Kermit dedicated the 5,000 lb.

## Shooting death of Muleshoe man being investigated

As of Tuesday, the Lamb County Sheriff's Department was still investigating the death of a Muleshoe man who died of a single gun shot wound

to the head Friday at about 1 p.m.

According to reports, Johnny Cisneros Jr., 21, was found dead in an automobile outside of Sudan.

While a spokesperson at the Sheriff's Department said the incident is still under investi-

gation, it is being investigated primarily as a possible suicide. However, a ruling will not be made until the investigation is completed.

Officials declined on Monday to disclose if a suicide note

was found but did say there was a shotgun found at the scene.

Funeral services for Cisneros were held on Monday in Muleshoe.

## Landowner's Rights Week being observed October 16-22

In recognition of the importance of private property rights in Texas, the Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA) of Muleshoe commemorates all landowners during this year's annual Landowner's Rights Week as designated by the Texas Legislature.

The Association is one of

many organizations observing the week of October 16-22 as Landowner's Rights Week. In accordance with the state resolution passed during the last legislative session, and in light of recent events across the state on property rights, the association salutes the farmers and ranchers who provide the

food, shelter and fiber of this nation.

As agriculture lenders, the objective is to improve the income and well-being of American farmers and ranchers," said association president Bill Liles.

"We support the rights of property owners to be able to

produce and make a living on their land. Laws such as the Endangered Species Act and Clean Water Act are lowering land values, impacting tax bases and creative compulsory land use situations which are not in the best interest of our stockholders or the rural communities in which they live."

"These detrimental laws and regulations in turn affect financial institutions' ability to serve the credit needs of agriculture," he added. "If these issues are not addressed properly and fairly, the very fabric and economy of this community and nation will suffer."

steel muleshoe to Bradley. Muleshoe Mayor Robert Montgomery, who was also present at the dedication, said, "We hope this (giant) muleshoe will help bring more visitors to our city. On an average day, 1,600 cars pass through Muleshoe."

Montgomery added, "We are proud of you Kermit for making the world's largest muleshoe."

If Kermit has his way, his muleshoe will get the recognition it deserves. Kermit has contacted the Guinness World Book of Records.

His project is already receiving nationwide recognition though. Several area newspapers have had stories on his project and an interview with Kermit by Magann Rennels from Channel 6 TV in Muleshoe will air on the CBS show "Sunday Morning" in November.

Jack Wilson, manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture said, "Kermit has given this city something to be proud of."

Special recognition was also given on Saturday to Robert Orozco, Bennie Torrez and Santiago Gonzales, who built the muleshoe at Pivot Products; and to the Texas Tech School of Engineering in Lubbock, who also assisted with the construction.

In the process of his project, Kermit has fulfilled another dream by R. A. Bradley. Along with his dream of a giant muleshoe, Bradley also envisioned a large "M" with a flower garden around it.

Along with his giant muleshoe project - to help raise funds - Kermit also sold little muleshoes in which people could have their names inscribed. The muleshoe were then inlaid on a concrete "M" which was made and placed next to the muleshoe at the Heritage Complex.

The "M" has a flower garden landscaped around it and also has approximately 412 little muleshoes on it. Kermit's father, Arnold Price, said that they are still selling muleshoes which can be placed on the "M". He said it will be an on-going project.

The FLBA of Muleshoe is a part of the Tenth Farm Credit District serving more than 52,000 member/borrowers in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico and Texas, with total loans outstanding of \$3.6 billion. District borrowers have pledged nearly 20 million acres of private property as collateral.

"Property rights and the protection of those rights are paramount to our member/stockholders, board of directors and management," he added.

Recent events in Texas and across the nation have focused the debate over the impact of government regulations and their effects on the use of private property.

Farmers, ranchers, landowners and others have complained that strict federal environmental rules are stripping them of the use and value

of the land.

Liles said, "While we certainly support maintaining a healthy environment, we are greatly concerned that government regulations intended to protect the environment are in effect, reducing the productive capacity of land decreasing the value of the property, which in turn, reduced the value of the financial assets collateralized by the property."

"When control over someone's property is transferred by regulation or law to the government, then ability of the property to value and wealth is also transferred to the government," Liles said.

"Protecting and preserving private property rights is a major concern of the FLBA of Muleshoe. It not only insures the production of food, shelter and fiber, but the environmental health and financial

wealth of our state and nation," Liles said.

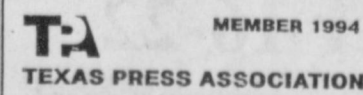

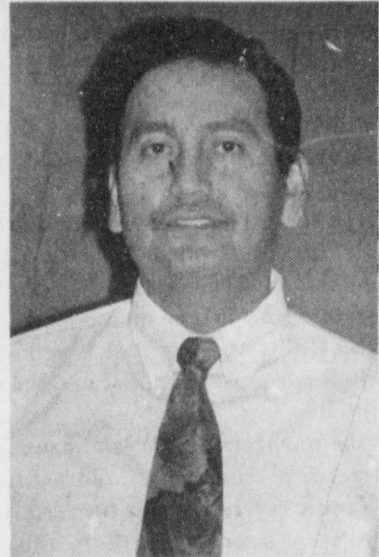

Sid Felan has been chosen as the *Muleshoe Journal's* Amigo of the week. Sid is the Chief Juvenile Probation Officer for Bailey County and surrounding areas. Sid works very closely with youth and does not consider his position a job, but a mission.

"I feel my mission in this life is in the welfare of others," Sid said. "Those people with broken families and broken homes, who seem to be lost in hopelessness. I try to find ways to give them hope and encouragement."

This is not always an easy task for Felan, who has lived in Bailey County since 1990. He is on call 24 hours a day, 354 days a year, working with the sheriff's departments, police departments, lawyers and parents in Muleshoe, Bovina, Friona, Lazbuddie, Three Way and Farwell.

Sid works with the courts and his duties include supervising juvenile law offenders, to make sure they comply with conditions of their probation and to provide counseling.

"A lot of times I work with real strenuous cases that deeply concern me. However, I have had to learn that I need to keep a perspective and cannot become personally involved."

Felan earned a bachelor's degree in sociology from Wayland Baptist University. His wife Alice is a first grade teacher and his daughter Nicole Suzanne is a fifth grade student.

He has been on the Muleshoe Association to Serve the Hungry (MASH) Board of Directors for two years and enjoys golf and basketball.

Sid said, "My personal belief is that every person is composed of a spirit, soul and body and these three elements of every human must be nourished and fulfilled. In working with young people for 18 years, I find the lack of nourishment in one or two areas of their lives. I try to keep a prospective in finding something positive and work with the strength within them."

In closing, Sid said, "I would like to encourage parents to spend quality time with their children, because those important memories will someday help their children find their way back home."

## Brooks receives national award for nursing research

Debbe Lee Brooks received the Mary Opal Wolanin Award for Excellence in Clinical Nursing Research on Sept. 23 during the 22nd annual Nursing Research Conference and National Conference on Instrumentation in Nursing at the University of Arizona in Tucson.

Brooks is a graduate of Texas Tech School of Nursing in Lubbock and is a doctoral student at the University of Arizona College of Nursing.

The Mary Opal Wolanin Award for Excellence in Clinical Nursing Research with vulnerable populations was awarded based on papers submitted to this conference.

The selected paper is based on an accepted abstract. Mary Opal Wolanin was one of the first gerontological nurses in America. She is best known for her research and writing on confusional states in elderly which stimulated awareness by healthcare providers nationally and internationally.

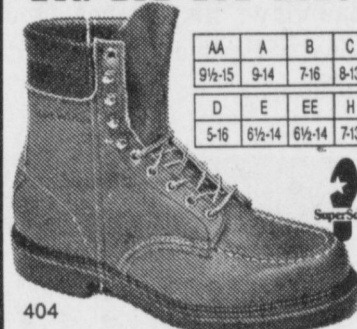

## NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST RELATING TO IRRIGATION INTERRUPTION CREDIT AND RECOVERY OF POWER COSTS

Notice is hereby given that Bailey County Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service by implementing an irrigation interruption credit applicable to irrigation customers who agree by contract that their service may be interrupted and by revising the Utility's power cost recovery factor ("PCRF"), effective November 15, 1994, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. The proposed changes are not expected to have any effect on the revenues of the Utility. The changes are applicable to all electric utility service, all areas served by the Utility, all customer classes, and all customers.

Copies of the proposed revised tariffs, schedules, and supporting testimony and other pertinent data may be inspected in the office of the Utility located at 305 East Avenue B, Muleshoe, Texas 79347, and at the office of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Inquiries should be directed to Mr. Duane Lloyd, (806) 272-4504.

The Utility's wholesale power supplier currently allows a credit on the Utility's Wholesale power bills in exchange for the ability to interrupt a portion of the Utility's irrigation load. The Utility's existing retail rates, which were established before the wholesale interruption credit became available, apply the interruption credit to all customers of the Utility regardless of whether such customers have agreed that their service may be interrupted. This occurs because the Utility's power cost is reduced by the amount of the irrigation interruption credit from the Utility's wholesale power supplier and the reduced level of power cost is flowed through to all consumers through the PCRF.

The rate revisions are proposed for the purposes of: (1) establishing a tariff authorizing payment of an interruptible credit to irrigators who agree by contract to allow their service to be interrupted, and (2) allocating the irrigation interruption credit received from the Utility's wholesale power supplier to the irrigation customers who have agreed to allow interruption of their load in the event the Utility's wholesale power supplier required the Utility to shed load. Irrigation customers who agree to have their service interrupted should receive the benefit of the interruptible credit from the Utility's wholesale power supplier. The proposed changes will not increase or decrease the revenues of the Utility, however, the proposed changes are expected to increase the revenues derived from all customer classes other than irrigation.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Further information may also be obtained by calling the Public Utility Commission's Public Information Office at (512) 458-0256, or (512) 458-0221 for text telephone. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the Commission.

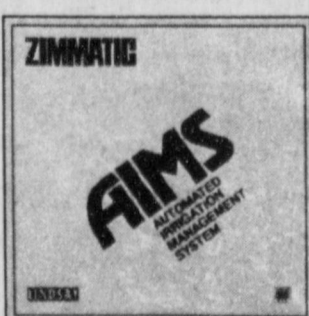

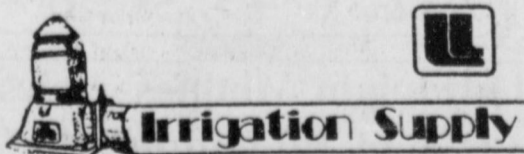

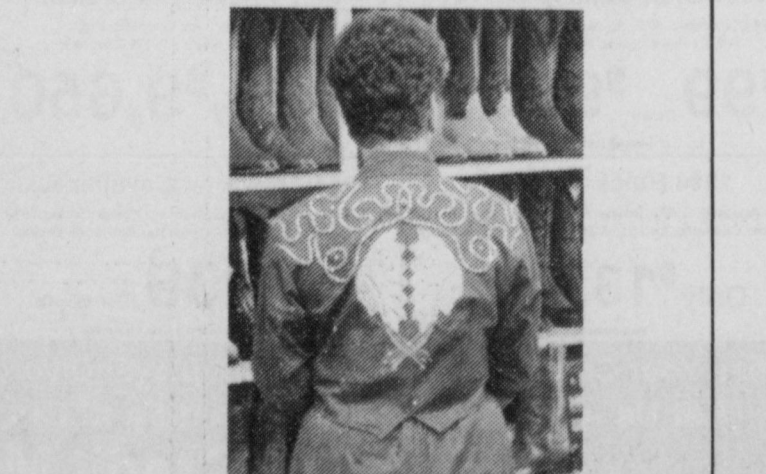

practices each week.


"It's 100 percent better. The kids come each day with a smile on their face and they work hard," Adair continued.
