## Eagles Drop Regional Final To Aspermont by 3 Points

Coach Fred McDonald's Sterling City Eagles boys basketball team advanced to the regional finals last Saturday in Odessa and then dropped the final to Aspermont by only three points. The lucky Aspermont five copped the game 56 to 53 with John Ray Godfrey's help. That junior of the opposition is practically a team by himself, and was an all-state selection even last year as a sophomore. He got or accounted for 33 of their 53 points in the final.

Aspermont goes to the state tournament this week for the finals.

Sterling City held a one-point lead in the first quarter and lost at intermission as Aspermont took a 30-29 lead. In the third period the Eagles were outscored 11-12 and in the final stanza Aspermont was able to further widen the gap to 3 vital points.

Bill Coleman paced Sterling City with 14 points and David Durham was second with 12.

Both Sterling and Aspermont placed two men each on the regional all-tournament team.

Jerry Payne and David Durham of Sterling made the mythical team, as Godfrey and Dicky Hill of Aspermont got nods for berths. Rounding out the all-regional selections was Mike Gallegos of Canutillo.

In the morning games, Sterling City raced past the Fort Davis team in the second quarter and maintained that lead the rest of the way. Tied 10-all at the end of the first period, the Eagles swept to 10 more in the second stanza while holding Fort Davis to 3 and left the court at half-time with a 20-13 margin.

Jerry Payne scored 11 for Sterling while David Durham and Leroy Churchill notched 10 each. Armando Granado of Fort Davis tossed in 14 to pace the Indians.

### A Check to Sterling County

State Highway Department Participates in Land Costs

Austin, Texas—Feb. 21, —A check for \$11,931.50 for right of way payment was sent to Sterling County today by the Texas Highway Department.

The sum forwarded is partial payment for the state's share of the cost of the land needed on U.S. 87, between west city limits of Sterling City and 7.0 miles northwest. The check will be transmitted by District Engineer J. A. Snell of San Angelo to the Sterling County Commissioners Court.

While county and state share the cost of the right of way, the Texas Highway Department bears the cost of title insurance and pays the entire cost of appraisal work ordered by the Department. Checks for these items have already been forwarded from the Texas Highway Department to the parties concerned.

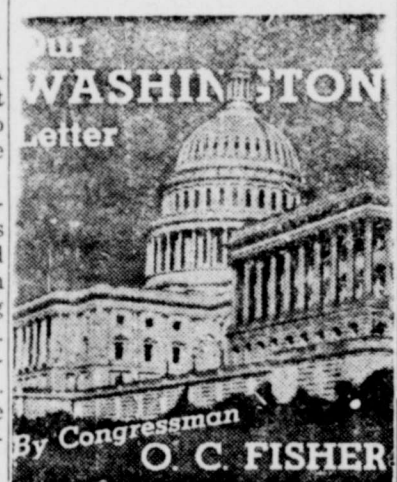
### Epsilon Zeta Club Met Last Week

By a decisive majority of 114 votes the House last week put the quietus on the controversial Presidential move to create a new Department of Urban Affairs. I joined with 18 other Texans in voting against the proposal. Two Texans—Albert Thomas of Houston and Henry Gonzales of San Antonio voted for it.

Many valid objections were raised to the new agency. Designed to accelerate the flow of federal funds to the cities to be used in solving their housing, transportation, welfare and other local problems, its approval would undoubtedly been a tough break for the American taxpayers.

A new questionnaire, covering a variety of current issues, is being sent to all residents of the 21st Congressional district. Twenty-four questions are included, ranging from foreign aid to unemployment benefits. Based upon prior experience, it is believed the results of this test will provide a fairly accurate barometer of public opinion in our district, on the issues covered. Your cooperation is earnestly solicited.

The questionnaire technique for finding out what the people are thinking is now employed by many Congressmen and Senators. I initiated the practice in the House several years ago, and others picked it up. The results provide a valuable source of information regarding public interest and public reaction to legis-

### Lions Hear Talk by Fire Marshal

R. P. Brown, Sterling City Fire Marshal, talked to the Lions Club Wednesday noon at the regular weekly luncheon. Brown said the fire department had donated \$1,000 toward the building of the new fire house now under construction just south of the court house on the square. He said some tires had been bought for \$299 which took the rest of the money in the fire department. (It is understood that some tires were ruined in February at a grass fire run over rough country.) Brown had on hand three donations or checks from people for the fire department; being \$50 from Mrs. George McEntire, \$50 from Currie Cattle Co and \$100 from Mrs. Lelah Belle Bird.

The fire marshal reported a 15c reduction in the key rate on fire insurance for Sterling City. He said he hoped for another reduction soon as the department improved along.

### MONTOYA WILDCAT YIELDS OIL HERE

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 3-B W. N. Reed, section 151, block 29, W&NW survey, multipay prospect one mile southwest of the shallow Howard-Glasscock pool in northwestern Sterling County, swabbed and flowed 105 barrels of 48 gravity, new oil and 72 barrels of water in 32 hours from the Montoya through perforations at 9,248 to 9,254 feet.

Testing continued in pay, previously washed with 500 gallons of mud acid and treated with 5,000 gallons of regular acid.

The operation also indicated production from the Fusselman, a drillstem test at 9,152 to 9,169 feet having returned oil while the wildcat was being drilled.

lation pending before Congress. And the tests generate many useful and interesting comments.

It costs me, out of my own pocket, close to \$1,000 to send the questionnaires out. But I feel it is worth every cent of it and then some, to thus encourage public interest and participation in the affairs of government, with the resulting benefits.

Dan Auld of Kerrville has made a valuable contribution to Congressional hearings on a bill to prohibit the killing of the golden eagle. In a letter to Secretary of Interior Udall, a copy of which I had inserted in the printed hearings on the bill, Auld provided expert and convincing argument why it is in the public interest to destroy, rather than preserve, this predatory bird.

A known killer of new-born lambs, kids and fawns, the Kerrville authority described the eagle, and he based his views upon years of actual experience and observation as a hunter and practical ranchman. I joined with Auld in urging the defeat of the proposal.

The 29th annual San Angelo Fat Stock Show opens next Wednesday, March 7, and continues through Sunday, March 11. First performance of the rodeo is Thursday night with other performances Friday afternoon and night, Saturday afternoon.

All livestock must be in place by 8:00 A.M. Wednesday morning. Weighing, classifying and sifting of fat stock will start at that time. In addition, the Quarterhorse show will get underway at 8:00 A.M. Judging in the adult Rambouillet and Delaine sheep departments get underway at 1:00 P.M. Wednesday; the adult Suffolk breeding sheep show will start at 3:00 P.M., and sifted livestock will be sold at 4:00 P.M.

Thursday's program includes the cutting horse contest starting at 8:00 A.M., fat lamb judging beginning at 8:30 A.M., the junior Rambouillet show and junior Hereford show at 1:00 P.M., the junior Angus show at 1:30, and the adult Hereford show at 3:00. Friday's program includes the downtown parade at 10:00, the steer show at 10:00, the completion of the junior Rambouillet show at 1:00. Grass judging and livestock judging contests get underway at 8:00 Saturday morning and the sale of livestock starts at 10:00.

Fifteen Sterling County 4-H Club members have entered a total of 24 fat lambs, 6 Rambouillets, and 3 Angora goats in the San Angelo Show. Exhibitors and their stock are: Diana Lou Cole, 3 Angora doe kids; Betty Jo Barrett, 3 Rambouillet rams; James Morgan 2 crossbred lambs; Rosanne Foster, 2 crossbred lambs, 2 finewool lambs; David Foster, 1 crossbred lamb, 2 finewool lambs; Reynolds L. L.F. and Clinton Hodges will have their Rambouillets in competition in the adult division of that show. William and J.Q. Foster will have their Suffolks in the adult Suffolk show.

March 3-10 has been designated as National 4-H Club Week by the president of the United States and also by the governor in Texas. Inaugurated

in 1914, the 4-H Clubs have now spread to 50 foreign countries. In those countries, the club is known by various names but those signify the four principles the club was originally based on in the United States: Health, Heart, Head and Hand. Since the end of World War II, clubs have been organized in Japan, Korea, Germany, and many, many other European, Asiatic, and Latin American countries.

It is fitting that 4-H club members in this section of Texas will be taking part in the San Angelo Fat Stock Show during this week. They will be showing the results of their work to the public. While this is only a part of the work, many other club members at home will be carrying on their demonstrations at home which do not involve livestock. Electricity, safety, homemaking, range management, and many other phases of club work are rarely seen by the public such as is the livestock but they are a vital part of club work.

The adult leaders, the parents, and many others who support the club members and their work are being saluted during the week along with the club members. Without all this cooperation, it would be impossible to carry on club work.

Larry Stewart and Jack Clark will take part in the calf scramble at the San Angelo Rodeo on Friday afternoon. Twenty boys and ten calves are turned in the arena. The boy's job is to get his rope halter on a calf and get it back across the finish line. Boys receive certificates to purchase livestock.

Dr. E. T. York, administrator of the Federal Extension Service, made the presentation during the congress.



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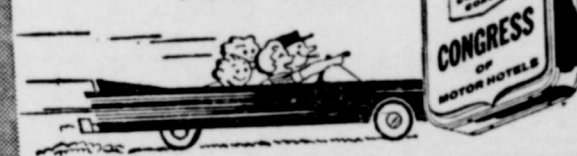

### Navy Now Accepting Three Year Enlistments

The Navy will accept volunteers for the first year term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program. Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel announced today.

The experimental program has been placed in operation, Admiral Smedberg said, to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the Nation. It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program, eligible personnel who have been

released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advanced leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment.

The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current stay in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school.

### OLD AGE BENEFITS ARE CHANGED

One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act is important to all persons who work between the ages of 62 and 72, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo social security office. "This change concerns the 'earnings test' the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said.

"Earned income of \$1200 or less in a year has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of that amount," he continued.

"This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both of retirement age, he

can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age insurance. Where there are three or more beneficiaries in one worker's family, it is possible for him to earn as much as \$4,000 and receive some family payments for the same year.

After age 72, there is no retirement test. Mr. Ellington believes that there are many workers in the District between age 62 and 72 who should apply for the benefits to avoid any possible loss. Claims may be filed with the Social Security Administration office at San Angelo, Texas.

Dorsey B. Hardeman of San

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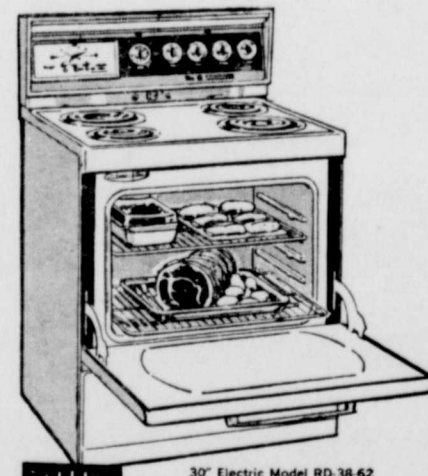
