

Knowland Again Asks Break With Kremlin

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) renewed today his call for a diplomatic break with Russia, saying the action would impose a "moral sanction" against any further expansion of Communist influence.

Vet Land Sale Frauds Probed

AUSTIN (U)—Possible law violations in the sale of land to former GIs under the veterans land program are under investigation by several state agencies.

The state auditors office, the Department of Public Safety, and the staff of the attorney general have been looking into some of the sales, particularly in South Texas and the so-called "Winter Garden" area of the state.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd confirmed reports of such investigations yesterday. Shepperd said, "Any criminal action will have to originate with local prosecuting officials."

He said County Atty. Wiley Cheatham of Cuero was cooperating with his office.

Shepperd added that the attorney general's office could not indicate "at this time" how many veterans or how much money may be involved.

State Land Commissioner Beacom Giles, whose office administers the program, had little comment.

Under the program, a state project, veterans of World War II and the Korean War have been able to secure 40-year loans from the state to buy farms costing no more than \$7,500.

Giles said he would be glad "to stand behind the appraisals in their entirety." He referred to the appraisals made from his office and said they would be found to average "all they should be."

Two Chicago Girls Attacked By Pack Of Gang Members

CHICAGO (U)—Two teen-age girls walking to a drug store for a soda were set upon and beaten last night by what police described as a "wolf pack" of six bluejean-clad girls.

The victims—Judith Gramm, 13, and Belva Stadt, 15, told police their cigarette-smoking assailants threatened to "burn our eyes out."

They said the attack was unprovoked.

Belva was treated for cuts and bruises but Judith was held in a hospital for treatment of a possible pelvic fracture. Juvenile Officer Robert Murphy said Judith apparently was kicked as she lay on the sidewalk.

Murphy said the victims' descriptions indicated the six assailants were members of a girls' gang known as the Blue Jeans which has been involved in other assaults and acts of hoodlumism on Chicago's South Side.

Boss, Employees Take Vacation

RICHMOND, Va. (U)—A Richmond pharmaceutical manufacturer closed down his plant at 5 p.m. yesterday. Four hours later he boarded a train headed for Miami, Fla.

But E. Claiborne Robins wasn't alone. Exactly 99 of his employees thought the trip was a good idea and took the train with the boss for a four-day vacation in Miami Beach. Robins will foot the bills.

"Everybody ought to take time off and have a little fun now and then," he explained.

Three special coaches were chartered to take the party South. The group will stay at two swanky hotels at Robins' expense. The boss gave each employee \$100 for spending money.

This is Robins' third all-expense-paid vacation for his employees. He took them to New York City in 1949 and 1951.

Lead Toward Vaccine For Measles Claimed

WASHINGTON (U)—A possible lead toward developing a preventive vaccine against measles has been reported by Dr. John F. Enders, of Harvard Medical School, who won a Nobel prize for his polio research.

He announced last night "very suggestive" evidence of the long-sought isolation of the elusive measles virus—and of possible means for its laboratory growth.

The method described uses a "culture" method like that which paved the way for development of the Salk vaccine for polio.

Counts Dropped In Ship Scandal

WASHINGTON (U)—The government today dropped an indictment accusing Brig. Gen. Julius C. Holmes, a State Department career officer, and E. Stanley Klein of conspiring to violate the Shipping Act in connection with post-war tanker deals.

U. S. Dist. Judge William Morris dismissed the indictment against Holmes and Klein, a New York financier, at the request of Allen J. Krauser, a special assistant to the attorney general.

The action marked the conclusion of one of two big postwar shipping cases here.

Holmes' attorney, Hazard Gillespie of New York, told Judge Morris that Holmes had never asked the government to drop the indictment against him but had urged a speedy trial of the case on its merits.

Holmes is a former U. S. Minister to London who has been on leave from the State Department pending disposition of the case. He has denied any guilt, Gillespie said.

Four corporations named in the indictment paid fines of \$5,000 each. Including Holmes and Klein, charges have now been dismissed against all 11 individual defendants.

Former Rep. Eugene Casey (D-Mass.) was a defendant in both tanker cases, but charges against him were dismissed by U.S. Dist. Judge Luther W. Youngdahl on Sept. 9.

Benson Sees Bright Agricultural Future

CHICAGO (U)—Prospects of farmers in 1955, says Secretary of Agriculture Benson, are "very good" and he expects prices to remain stable at about present levels.

He also predicted last night "an expanding and prosperous agricultural economy" will accompany the growth of the nation's population in the future.

He said by 1970 the population will have increased to 200 million and this means "we will have to increase our total agricultural production by about one-fourth."

That means, he said, "We must obtain this expanded production from roughly the same acreage in cultivation now."

He reported that the United States to support at any future German peace conference the compromise arrangements made in Paris last month. Under these the Saar would be "Europeanized" but still be economically tied to France.

POCATELLO, Idaho (U)—A 38-year-old Negro farm laborer was in custody today on a charge of abducting and attempting to rape a teen-age girl after reportedly chasing her father and uncle away at knifepoint.

Leroy Harris was arrested here last night. Police Sgt. O. P. Bennett said Harris had orally admitted driving off with 16-year-old Janice Laney and attempting to assault her. Harris denied making threats with a knife.

The father, Clarence Laney, a farm laborer, said he had come to Rupert only a few weeks ago from Iowa, Mich., with his brother Louis and his daughter. He told police that the family had driven into the country with Harris on the promise that he would find them work.

Police found Janice walking along a country road early yesterday. She said the man had tried to rape her, then forced her to perform an indecent act upon him.

She was treated and released from a Rupert hospital, where doctors said she had been molested, but not raped.

Shivers, Johnson Are Mum On Tale

WASHINGTON (U)—Gov. Shivers and Sen. Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.) have nothing to say publicly on a Texas editorial story that Shivers proposed Johnson as a compromise Democratic presidential candidate in 1956.

Sam Wood, managing editor of the Waco News-Tribune and Times-Herald, reported Saturday that Shivers made the proposal in a talk with Gov. James Byrne of South Carolina at Boca Raton, Fla., after the Southern Governors Conference.

Mendes-France In U. S. For Parleys

WASHINGTON (U)—Visiting French Premier Mendes-France takes a world-girdling list of 20 problems—and his reputation as a shrewd bargainer—to his opening discussions with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles today.

When he flew into Washington last night, the stocky, energetic French leader said he came "in a spirit of optimism." He said he was confident that "France, in concert with your great country and the other allies, can assure the safety and development of our common civilization."

The future of the Saar, rich industrial borderland between France and Germany, may put Mendes-France's diplomatic powers to the stiffest test of all the 20 questions he plans to discuss here.

He reportedly wants the United States to support at any future German peace conference the compromise arrangements made in Paris last month. Under these the Saar would be "Europeanized" but still be economically tied to France.

German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer is having trouble getting his countrymen to accept the arrangement.

Topics proposed for top-level discussion, besides the Saar, include U.S. plans for helping finance the French expeditionary force in non-Communist Indochina and for continuing purchases of military equipment in France for the foreign aid program.

They also cover virtually the whole field of current diplomacy, including relations with the Soviet bloc, the French Premier's plan for an arms pool among the countries in the proposed Western European peace treaty, the outlook in North Africa, where Nationalists are retreating before French rule, and long-range plans for economic betterment of Southeast Asia.

Solon Asks Red Rap In Censure

Would Forestall McCarthy Move

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) today asked that the Senate add to the McCarthy censure resolution a new section condemning the Communist party in this country and urging continued investigation of it.

Johnson made this move as Senate leaders consulted on whether to continue sessions while Sen. McCarthy is absent and in a hospital.

The Senate convened at 11 a.m. Republican Leader Knowland (Calif.) told reporters the censure debate would continue at least temporarily.

Johnson is a member of the special six-man committee which recommended censure of McCarthy.

His new proposal was seen as an effort to counter the arguments by McCarthy and his supporters that censure would be a victory for Communists and their supporters.

Johnson said he had planned to make a speech today in favor of the censure report and his proposed addition but had been told by Sen. Bridges (R-N.H.) that Sen. McCarthy "is quite ill."

For this reason, Johnson said he would delay his statement until McCarthy would be able to hear it.

Republican leaders were holding numerous conferences on and off the Senate floor apparently in an effort to decide whether to continue sessions or take a recess.

Edward B. Williams, McCarthy's attorney, declined to see reporters or answer any inquiries about McCarthy's attitude toward continued sessions in the Wisconsin senator's absence.

Advices from Bethesda Naval Hospital, where McCarthy was entered as a patient yesterday, were that the senator's injured elbow was improving but that he might be there several more days.

Knowland said the debate and possible voting would continue "only in the event it is agreeable to the various parties."

He said he had not talked to Sen. McCarthy but planned to contact him later.

Knowland said he would consult with McCarthy and those aiding him in the Senate, spokesmen for the Watkins committee which unanimously recommended censure, and the Democratic leaders.

Democratic Leader Johnson of Texas said any decision about continuing or delaying Senate action was up to Knowland as majority leader.

Knowland said he was sure that if McCarthy requested a delay in the proceedings, the Senate would grant it.

Tabbed for the first Senate speech of the day was Sen. Brown (R-Nev.). He has opposed censure of McCarthy on the count involving McCarthy's conduct toward an Elections subcommittee in 1953.

Knowland said he understood Sen. Dirksen (R-Ill.), who has urged that some compromise be worked out on the censure issue, planned to speak later in the day.

Matters were shaping up toward a possible preliminary vote tomorrow on the censure issue.

Also in the works was a McCarthy camp move, expected either tomorrow or Saturday, to quash

the censure charges. This move, subject to an immediate vote, was expected to fail.

A six-man committee headed by Sen. Watkins (R-Utah) has recommended that McCarthy be rebuked on grounds that he (A) treated contemptuously a Senate elections subcommittee which investigated his finances in 1951-52 and (B) repeatedly abused Brig. Gen. Ralph W. Zwicker, a witness before him.

Dirksen reserved time in today's debate to explain changes he said he will propose in the special committee's resolution. Sen. Bennett (R-Utah) said any compromise "inevitably" would call for the sort of public apology that McCarthy thus far has refused to make.

Sen. Welker (R-Idaho), who held the Senate floor all day yesterday in McCarthy's defense, said it was "absurd" to censure McCarthy for his treatment of the elections subcommittee.

At one point he invited the Senate to censure him if it wished to, because he had complained that the absence of all but about a dozen senators when he was speaking showed "total disrespect for the man...who faces censure."

McCarthy went unannounced to the hospital yesterday for treatment of his right elbow. Alides said it was painfully bruised when banged against a glass table top last Saturday when he was shaking hands at a testimonial dinner in Milwaukee. Hospital officials said treatment might require "several days."

Sen. Knowland of California, the GOP leader, said he expects to learn later in the day whether McCarthy plans a formal speech before any vote is taken and when he can return to the Senate sessions.

Sen. Case (R-SD) said a question of "propriety" was involved in possible Senate action while McCarthy was absent, and Sen. Jenner (R-Ind.) said that perhaps

Hearing Set On Enlarging 11th Place District

The Planning and Zoning Commission will hold a public hearing on Monday, Nov. 29, to determine whether or not to further enlarge the Eleventh Place shopping district.

The commission last Monday approved an enlargement of the district to the west so that Furr Food Stores, Inc., could construct a super market.

In order that the store could be built, the entire block between Young and Donley Streets which is bordered on the north and south by Eleventh Place and Twelfth

was approved as a business district. This approval must yet be okayed by the city commission.

Property owners on the north side of Twelfth Street between Donley and Settles indicated at last Monday's hearing that they wish their land to be changed to a business zone also. It is this request that will be considered in public hearing.

In Furr's case, half of the block which faced Eleventh Place was already in the business district. The half facing Twelfth Street was the only part changed.

Not all property owners on the north side of Twelfth Street between Donley and Settles streets requested that their land be changed to a business district, and it is expected that a number will protest the change in a public hearing.

The Eleventh Place shopping district now extends from Young Street on the west to Washington Place entrance on the east. The proposed change to be considered in public hearing will include the north side of Twelfth Street for the same distance (Young to Settles).

The Furr change was for the south half of block 25, Cole and Strayhorn Addition. The change to be considered will be for the south half of blocks 26 and 27.

Democrats Shape Program That President Won't Like

WASHINGTON (U)—Democratic leaders are shaping up a legislative program almost certain to create friction with President Eisenhower in the new Congress.

As outlined yesterday by Rep. Rayburn (D-Tex.), it includes, in the controversial area, new farm legislation, pay raises for federal employees and tax revision.

Rayburn, who is in line to become speaker of the House when Democrats take over Congress Jan. 3, and Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.) discussed the program after informal buddies with other Democratic leaders here for yesterday's White House foreign policy meeting. McCormack is slated to be House majority leader.

The program currently does not involve foreign policy. In that field, Rayburn told newsmen, Democrats hope for a bipartisan approach and

for cooperation. What they want, he said, is "a strong foreign policy and a strong national defense."

One of the first things the new Congress will consider, Rayburn said, is a general pay raise for all federal workers, including postal employees.

Rayburn said he is opposed to increasing first-class letter rates to 4 cents, as the administration asked to help offset any pay boosts. He did not rule out proposed hikes in other rates.

While some Senate Democrats have said they favor a trial period of at least a year for the new farm price support system, Rayburn asserted he is for "90 per cent parity." Parity is a legal standard for farm prices said to be fair to farmers in relation to their costs.

Rayburn predicted that the House Ways and Means Committee will review the entire tax structure.

Lake Water May Be Infused Into City System Today

Lake water may be infused in the city's system sometime today, Roy Heister, city water production superintendent, said that the new filter plant seemingly had the bugs out of it and was ready to go on stream.

The clear well, a 500,000-gallon underground reservoir at the plant, was flushed and given a heavy chlorine shot for sterilization. This afternoon around 3:30 or 4 o'clock it should be back up to permit pumping into the city mains.

Water, now coming from Powell Creek Lake, will be mixed with that from the Marble County well field. In about a month, a switch is due to be made to Lake Thomas water, from which Big Spring will eventually draw practically all its supply.

County Expenditures Totaled For October

County revenues in October amounted to \$173,129.73, but \$157,605 of the total represented tax payments made in October for the 1955 fiscal year.

Only \$15,524.03 was collected for application on expenses of the current year.

Meanwhile, expenditures amounted to \$139,554 and the county's current balance shrunk to an aggregate of \$275,120.12. Balances at the beginning of the month had totaled \$399,150.69, according to the report of Lee Porter, county auditor.

The total of all balances Oct. 31, including the \$157,129.73 for the 1955 fiscal year, was \$432,725.82.

General fund receipts included \$40,220.99 in current taxes (for 1955) and \$2,376.52 in delinquent collections, beer and wine permit fees, etc. The fund had a balance of \$21,174.78 at the beginning of the month and \$16,158.54 at the close, not including the 1955 tax collections.

Expenditures included \$2,304.26 for maintenance costs, \$1,961.43 for charities, and \$1,184.52 for the agriculture department (county agent's office). Listed with charities was the county's \$728.75 share of the cost of operating the city-county health unit.

The road and bridge fund received \$5,106.90 for application on the current budget and \$48,243.12 in 1955 taxes. Disbursements amounted to \$23,694.78 and the current balance fell from \$83,205.88 to \$64,618 during the month.

Revenues for the officers salary fund totaled \$7,408.07 and disbursements amounted to \$9,930.39 as the balance shrunk from \$24,675.12 to \$22,152.80.

The expenditures included \$2,310.54 for the tax department, \$1,392.64 for the county clerk's office, \$784.25 for the district clerk's office, \$3,187.99 for the sheriff's department, \$492.60 for the county judge's office, \$890.27 for the county attorney's office, \$351.85 for the county treasurer's office, and the balance to constables and peace justices.

The jury fund received \$133.50 for the current budget and \$9,645.46 for 1955. Expenditures totaled \$689.45 and the balance in that fund dropped from \$7,466.72 to \$6,910.77 during October.

Received for the permanent improvement fund was \$9,645.46 for 1955 and \$50.46 for the current budget. Expenditures were at \$1,338.99 and the balance there fell from \$6,394.96 to \$5,106.43.

The library fund received \$59—all in book fines. Disbursed was \$979.83 and the balance dropped from \$6,223.01 to \$5,302.18.

The law library fund received \$160 and spent \$325.86 as its \$131.52 beginning balance was turned into a \$34.34 overdraft at the end of the month.

The courthouse and jail building fund had no revenues. Disbursed from it was \$4,450.60 and the \$16,389.43 balance declined to \$11,938.83. Net included, of course, is the \$100,000 invested in government securities.

The sinking fund for the courthouse and jail received \$30,543.98.

for 1955 and \$151.64 for the current budget. It expended nothing so the current fund increased from \$18,129.21 to \$18,280.85.

The 1945 road bond fund received \$77.94 and spent \$75.19 as the balance on the current side of the ledger climbed from \$379.66 to \$382.41. In addition, the fund received \$5,636.52 for 1955.

The 1954 road bond fund received \$13,680.17, all for 1955. It had no beginning balance and no expenditures.

Road Bond Fund Shows Decline

The \$325,000 in road bond funds voted for the county last spring is down to \$124,303.65, monthly report of County Auditor Lee Porter shows.

Expenditures from the fund during October amounted to \$80,676.75, for purchase of U. S. 80 freeway right-of-way east of Big Spring.

The bonds were voted for the purchase of freeway and other right-of-way in the county. Since then, commissioners have secured the land for the freeway from Big Spring to the Martin County line and much of the way from Big Spring east to the Mitchell line.

The auditor said it appears the remaining funds will be just about sufficient for acquisition of the additional right-of-way.

Chinese Reds Again Bomb Chiang Islands

TAIPEH, Formosa (U)—Chinese Communist bombers reopened the vest pocket war today with a raid on Pei Yu Island north of the Tachen group, the Nationalist Defense Ministry announced.

The ministry said four bombers, escorted by six fighter planes, dropped more than 20 bombs on the Nationalist outpost, inflicting several casualties.

The communists said Nationalist antiaircraft batteries drove off the Reds with intense fire.

Senators' Mail Has Pro-McCarthy Line

WASHINGTON (U)—By letter, telegram and postcard, senators are being advised how to vote on the bitterly contested issue of whether to censure Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

A check with a number of senators on both sides of the controversy, as well as with others who have not announced a stand, brought reports that their mail has been running heavily against censure. There were some exceptions, however.

Some senators reported an unusually heavy volume of mail, but others said they have been getting far less than they expected.

In the absence of McCarthy, who went to a hospital yesterday with an injured elbow, his secretary said she was not authorized to report on his mail.

An aide of Sen. Watkins (R-Utah), chairman of the special bipartisan committee that recommended McCarthy be censured, said Watkins has been receiving

as many as 750 to 1,000 letters and telegrams a day.

In the first week of debate, he said, this mail was about 8-1 for McCarthy, but that at the start of this week the pro-McCarthy ratio had dropped to 4-1 or 5-1.

Sen. Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.), vice chairman of the special censure committee, said his mail is running "heavily" in favor of McCarthy "but I don't attach significance to that."

"The people who are critical of McCarthy feel that they have already won their fight, that he has been censured by the committee," Johnson said.

Sen. Ervin (D-NC), another committee member, said he had been receiving "unusually heavy mail for me." He said it came from Massachusetts to California and that most of the mail he received was against McCarthy.

Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.), a McCarthy critic, said he is receiving only about a dozen letters a day on the censure issue, and that they are running about 3-1 in support of McCarthy.

Other reports on mail: Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.): preponderantly pro-McCarthy. Sen. Holland (D-Fla.): about 60-40 for McCarthy now.

Sen. Byrd (D-Va.): about even, maybe a little on the McCarthy side.

Sen. Schoeppel (R-Kan.): "overwhelmingly in favor of McCarthy." Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.): about even.

Sen. Thye (R-Minn.): "very decidedly pro-McCarthy."

Sen. Saltonstall (R-Mass.): "great bulk" for McCarthy.

Sen. Pastore (D-R.I.): preponderantly pro-McCarthy.

Sen. Welker (R-Idaho): "heavily pro-McCarthy."

Foreign Operations Agency Might Not Die As Scheduled

WASHINGTON (U)—The Foreign Operations Administration may—or may not—go out of business by next June 30 as Congress has ruled it should.

Officials of the foreign aid agency, headed by Harold E. Stassen, disclosed last night they are working on budget plans for the fiscal year starting next July 1.

Such advance programming is required by law, they said, and besides the new 84th Congress could repeal the 83rd Congress' rare (for Washington) death verdict on a federal agency. It will be up to President Eisenhower to decide whether to ask for an FOA life extension.

In any event, the foreign aid pipeline is not expected to be snapped shut. Programs would be split up among other agencies if FOA is disbanded.

Germany Plans Nuclear Reactor

LONDON (U)—Although barred under the Paris accords from making atomic weapons, West Germany plans to build its first nuclear reactor within the next two years.

The Bonn government's schedule for an atomic energy program devoted to civilian purposes was outlined by Chancellor Konrad Adenauer in a recent letter to the Allied Powers. Details were reported to the House of Commons yesterday by Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden.

Adenauer promised that West Germany's annual production and import of nuclear fuels will be held down to 3,500 grams (about 7 1/4 pounds). Bonn regards this amount as necessary for an adequate civilian program.

British Queen Mother Sails For Home Today

NEW YORK (U)—Queen Mother Elizabeth of England sails today for home after a 22-day visit to the United States and Canada.

She came to New York by plane from Ottawa yesterday and went immediately to the liner Queen Mary.

The Queen Mother, who spent five days touring Canada, was greeted by a throng of admirers both at La Guardia Field and at the ship's pier.

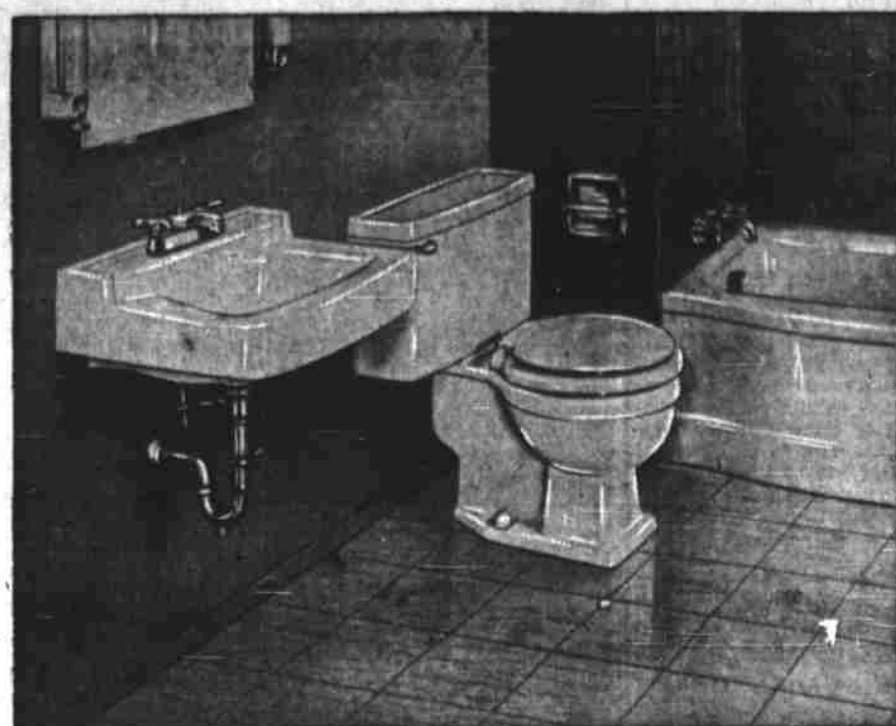

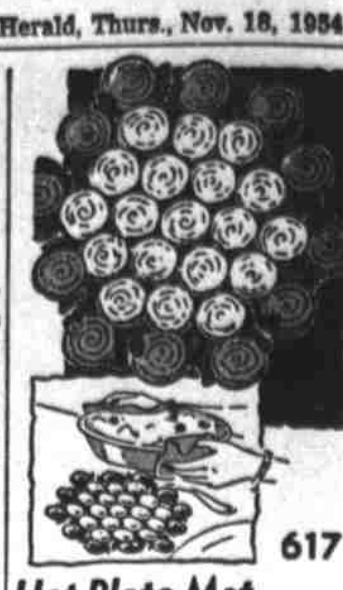

Jury Is Unable To Agree In Trial Of Film Star's Son

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UP)—Unable to agree in the robbery trial of Edward G. Robinson Jr., a jury has been discharged. The son of the movie actor will appear Feb. 14 for retrial.

The 21-year-old defendant was accused of robbing two taxi drivers of \$58. They identified him as the man who took their money in separate holdups, but Robinson claimed it was a case of mistaken

identity. Jury foreman John Bresnick, reporting to Superior Judge Allen T. Lynch that "we are hopelessly deadlocked," said the balloting remained at 11-1. Judge Lynch warned him against disclosing whether the preponderance was for or against Robinson. The jury deliberated six hours and was discharged last night. Robinson remains at liberty on \$10,000 bond.

Prosecutor Simon Rose, summarizing the testimony, told the jury: "Perhaps the boy should have been allowed to go out and earn his own living as thousands of other young Americans have had to do."

Jerry Geisler, noted criminal lawyer who defended Robinson, argued that the taxi drivers could have been mistaken in their identification and pointed out that they did not detect a scar on the defendant's face nor a large ring which was a gift from his father. Young Robinson maintained he was with his wife when one taxi driver was robbed and with friends

on the other occasion. He produced witnesses to substantiate his claims.

Cab driver Harry Chernack pointed out young Robinson in court Tuesday as the man who pointed a gun at his head and took \$11 from him last July 1. Driver Michael Plascik identified him as the passenger who robbed him of \$27 June 25.

Detective's Trial On Narcotics Count Nearing Its Close

HOUSTON (UP)—Closing arguments were due today in the federal narcotics trial of former Houston police detective Sidney Smith, charged with conspiring to obtain drugs.

Federal Judge Allen B. Hamay overruled a defense motion for acquittal yesterday and also denied several motions in which defense Atty. Bernard Golding sought to throw out parts of the testimony.

Smith's conspiracy charge involves two police characters which the government contends he conspired with to procure 836 tablets of dilaudid, an opium derivative. The two men are Carl E. Lawder, now serving a mail fraud sentence in Leavenworth, and former convict Charles Aaron. The trial has been marked by a long train of convicts, ex-convicts and even county jail prisoners brought in to testify against the former policeman.

The witnesses for the government have included two attractive women addicts who said they had affairs with the handsome Smith in order to obtain dope.

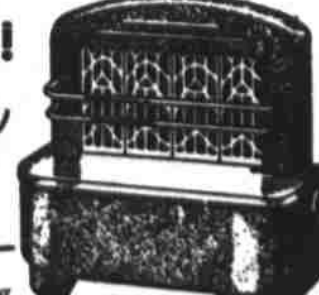

Noted In Oldsmobiles For '55

Oldsmobile for 1955 presents a new and more advanced concept of two-tone body color, important engineering improvements and a completely restyled appearance. The new models will be shown Friday, and are on display locally at Shroyer Motor Co., 424 E. 3rd.

Both the '98' series and the Super '88' series are powered by a more efficient 202-hp. "Rocket" engine with 8.5 to 1 compression ratio.

Oldsmobile's low silhouette and wide vision panoramic windshield are enhanced by the flying colors styling that Oldsmobile designers have incorporated in the 1955 models. Oldsmobile again presents three series of cars with a total of 10 body types. There are three Fisher body styles in the luxury '98' series—four-door sedan, deluxe Holiday coupe and Starfire (convertible). The flashing Super '88' series has four body types—four-door sedan, two-door sedan, Holiday coupe and convertible coupe, and two-door sedan.

Distinguishing the front end appearance of the 1955 Oldsmobile are the recessed headlights, with chrome-lined caps which extend two inches beyond the lens at the top, the name Oldsmobile spelled out in chrome block letters across the upper bumper bar and a more rugged bumper that curves gracefully into the fender contours at each end of the grille opening. The familiar Oldsmobile world emblem on the hood has an aluminum background for the plastic ornament. The rocket ornament atop the hood is wider and two wind splits extend the length of the hood, merging with the base of the ornament.

Improvement of "Rocket" engine power, torque and performance has been achieved through newly designed combustion chambers, higher lift camshaft and valves, larger exhaust valves, cooling

operating sparkplugs and full chrome top piston rings. Horsepower is raised to 202-hp. in the '98' and Super '88' and to 185-hp. in the '88' Series, with compression ratio at 8.5 to 1 in all series.

A new feature in 1955 is the offering of the 202-hp. "Rocket" engine as optional equipment at extra cost on the '88' Series. Standard equipment on the '88' Series is the 185-hp. "Rocket" engine, which this year is equipped with a new dual Rochester carburetor.

Riding qualities of the 1955 Oldsmobile have been further improved through incorporating direct-acting shock absorbers that are mounted vertically within the springs and attached directly to the frame and the lower control arm. Tubeless tires will be standard on the 1955 Oldsmobiles. These tires have an improved safety factor, with greater resistance to punctures and blowouts. Steering effort has been reduced appreciably through use of new needle bearings on the steering pitman arm shaft.

A major styling change is the adoption of sweep-cut front fenders on the Super '88' and '88' Series. These fenders were introduced last year on the '98' Series and add a distinctive flair to exterior appearance.

Two-tone color styling, which has proved so popular with the motoring public since its introduction by Oldsmobile in 1954, again plays an important part in Oldsmobile's appearance. The stainless steel side moulding that extends nearly the length of the cars in all body types is used for the color separation. This flying colors treatment of two-tone hues is achieved by a graceful sweep of the moulding from the belt line rearward to a point near the rear wheel opening, where it connects with a horizontal moulding that extends near-

The best yet definition of a dry-land farmer turned up in a Sweet-water courtroom a few days ago. A lawyer asked a prospective juror about his occupation.

"I'm a dryland farmer," the man replied. "That is I'm a farmer who works in town."

The supervisors of the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District have elected Doris Blizard of Lomax as their chairman for the coming year.

Other officers include J. T. Flowers of Midland, vice chairman, and Edgar Phillips of Big Spring, secretary-treasurer. Ollie Robinson of Tarzan, is a fourth member of the five-member board.

Bence O. Brown of Vincent, the fifth member, resigned at the meeting in the courthouse at Stanton at which the new officers were elected. Brown, whose resignation was accepted with reluctance by the board, had been a member from Zone 3 of the district for a number of years. Well known as a conservation farmer he had also served as chairman in the past.

A meeting of landowners in Zone 3 will be called at some early date for the purpose of electing Brown's successor.

The supervisors usually hold their meetings in Stanton since it is the most central point for all of them.

Also discussed at this meeting were plans for the Fort Worth Press Conservation Awards dinner which will be held in Big Spring on May 6, 1955. This meet-

ing will be attended by persons from over a wide area, and is being jointly sponsored by the Martin-Howard SCD supervisors, the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce and the Fort Worth newspaper.

There will be 33 soil conservation districts represented at the Area 2 meeting here during which suitable awards will be presented outstanding conservationists.

The outstanding conservation farmers in the Martin-Howard District the past three years have been Walter Kelly of Stanton; Willis Winters of Vincent and Sam Buchanan of Big Spring. These men have already been presented awards by the Lions Club of Stanton.

The supervisors have also authorized the purchase of a Crown Graphic press-type camera for use in Martin, Midland, Howard, and parts of Sterling, Glasscock and Borden counties in making photographic records of conservation work. They have also purchased a screen on which color slides made by SCS technicians and others can be shown.

W. S. Goodlett of Big Spring, area conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, which renders technical assistance when requested to the Soil Conservation Districts, has announced the loss of the Mitchell SCD and the Colorado City unit of the SCS from his area.

However, Goodlett's area gains Hockley County and the SCS unit at Levelland.

The Mitchell SCD has been transferred to the area with its

headquarters office at San Angelo which will be in temporary charge of C. A. Rechenhain, nationally known range conservation specialist.

Members of the Colorado City SCS staff are H. V. Stephenson, Charles Murphy and Elmer Martin.

Members of the Levelland SCS unit, which comes into this area, are Victor A. Childers, Donald L. Webb, Forrest Keith, William E. Crabtree and Albert Polk.

This rearrangement of SCS units and areas has come about as an economy move which eliminates two of the state's 25 area offices. The abolished area stations are those at Abilene and Huntsville.

James F. Dornay, who has been area conservationist at Abilene, will remain there but has now been designated as work unit conservationist for the Abilene unit.

J. W. Williams, teacher of mathematics in the Wichita Falls High School and a native of Abilene, has Texas history as an avocation. A graduate of Hardin-Simmons, where he also took his master's degree, he is presently at work on a book scheduled to appear under the title of "The Big Ranch Country."

It is a non-fiction description of Texas ranch life. In gathering his material Williams has spent seven years visiting big ranches and talking with old cowboys.

Articles he has written have appeared in the Southwestern Historical Quarterly and in the yearbooks of the West Texas Historical Association, an organization he has twice served as president.

Just when and where the book will be published has not been announced.

\$150 Drunkenness
Fine Is Assessed
In Martin Court

STANTON, (SC) — A Big Spring man was fined \$150 and costs on a drunkenness charge here Wednesday in the court of Martin Gibson, justice of the peace.

He was arrested by Sheriff Dan Saunders late Tuesday afternoon after the sheriff received a call from Big Spring police to be on the alert for a drunken driver, who some motorists claimed had run them off Highway 80 between here and Big Spring.

The sheriff said he did not know whether or not the man was the driver of the car complained about, but that he was not driving when he was arrested.

Officials say this is one of the heaviest fines they can recall being assessed on such a charge here.

LETTER TO EDITOR

Impartiality In Enforcing
Traffic Laws Requested

To The Editor:

It has come to my attention that in the past some of the officials—city, county and state—have appealed to the general public for reasonable suggestions on how to reduce the automotive accidents. Here is mine:

We all know that an attempt to reduce the speed is not reasonable,

for that is the principal idea for the automobile in the first place, and it will respond instantly and energetically to the slightest pressure that is applied to its nerve center—the accelerator and steering wheel. Nor does the machine abide by many other laws than that which can be applied directly to its nerve centers. Therefore, let's enforce the laws now in existence which have been enacted for restriction measurements, and enforce them without partiality irrespective to what the violator's name may be or what his family background is.

1. Regardless of a person's social, financial or political position a man or woman, when booked for a traffic violation—his name and address should be published in the local newspaper (the county where the booking is made), listing the offense and penalty.

2. When a person is apprehended for DWI, his or her driver's permit should be: first offense, suspended for a minimum period of six months; 2nd offense, for one year; 3rd offense, permit revoked and application for renewal rejected for a period of at least five years; and for the fourth offense, denial for the remainder of his or her life. These would be in addition to the fine or jail sentence imposed.

3. If anyone is apprehended for speeding or reckless driving, the sentence should be the same to all, five days retention in the local house of correction, in addition to the fine imposed.

Remove political shackles that hamper the patrolmen so that he would not be hesitant to enforce the law as is his sworn obligation to the public. No matter what a person's political affiliation may be should not mean that he or she are immune to laws passed to safeguard the lives of others.

4. When person whose driver's permit has been suspended or revoked is apprehended the automobile he or she is operating should be impounded for a period as the presiding judge may direct.

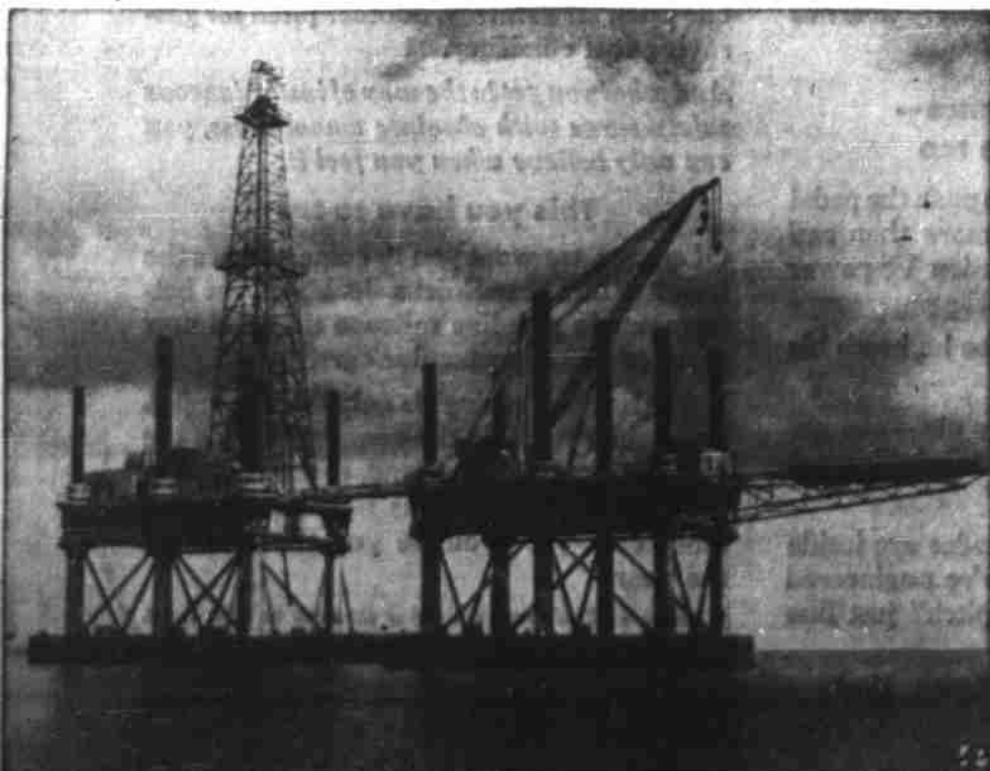

The Special, along with the Super and the Roadmaster, all "sleeked up" for 1955, will be unveiled Friday, with local showing at McEwen Motor Co., 403 Scurry. The Special's V-8 power plant has been increased to 188 hp, which, with Buick's new Variable Pitch Dynaflo transmission, gives top performance and maneuverability. New style trend is noted in the front end design.

New Variable Pitch Dynaflo Among Features Of '55 Buick

Buick Friday presents a complete new line of cars, featuring high style design and more powerful V8 engines, plus a revolutionary new variable pitch Dynaflo transmission that increases performance.

The 1955 models will be on display at McEwen Motor Co., 403 Scurry.

Style-wise the new Buicks feature a new front end with a new wide-screen grille, new rear fenders that give the trunk compartment a longer, lower silhouette, new tail lights patterned after those on the experimental Wildcat II, and new interiors in many color combinations of nylon, leather and cordaveen.

Many bright exterior colors have been developed for 1955 and will be offered in attractive two-tone and three-tone combinations. For the first time Buick is offering a two-tone combination under the sweeppear moulding. On two and four-door sedans the customer will have a choice of one color underneath the sweeppear, another above and a third color for the top.

Horsepower has been increased to 238 in the Roadmaster, Super and Century Series and 188 in the Special.

The panoramic windshield, pioneered by Buick last year, has been retained for 1955 along with

the sloping doorbelt line and full door models.

New tubeless tires, which offer greater protection from blowouts, are standard on all models except those equipped with wire wheels.

Power brakes, offered as optional equipment on all models, have been redesigned for smoother operation. A new air suspension principle gives fully adequate braking under all conditions.

Improved power steering is standard equipment on the Roadmaster and Super, and optional on all other models. Previously power steering was standard on the Roadmaster only.

Buick's distinctive front end styling for 1955 consists of a new, wide-screen grille with honeycomb design, visored headlights and a new and larger bumper. The hood has been lowered for greater visibility.

Ventiports, the Buick "trademark," have been restyled with four on the Roadmaster, Super and Century Series, which are powered

by the 236 horsepower engine, and three on the Special. Previously four ventiports were reserved for the Roadmaster only.

The improved performance of the 1955 Buicks is attributed to the combination of the new variable pitch Dynaflo transmission and the more powerful V8 engines with their higher compression ratios.

The new Dynaflo offers the driver greater cruising economy plus additional performance when he desires it. This is accomplished by the two different settings of the Dynaflo stator vanes. One angle is for maximum economy while cruising. The other is for performance.

For all normal driving variable pitch Dynaflo operates on the same principle as last year's transmission. When additional performance is desired, the driver merely presses the accelerator all the way to the floor. This changes the angle of the blades in the Dynaflo stator, permitting the engine to operate in its peak performance range.

Senior Officers Back Lieutenant At Trial

AUGUSTA, Ga. (U)—A young Army lieutenant on military trial for maltreatment of enlisted men has been described by two senior officers at Camp Gordon as an outstanding officer who "shaped up" a previously shoddy company of trainees.

Their testimony came yesterday after three privates took the stand to tell of incidents that occurred when 2nd Lt. Charles G. Anderson was assigned to Company A following his graduation from officer candidate school at Ft. Benning.

Pvt. James M. Blount, New York City, told the court-martial that Anderson ordered him to shovel dirt on Pvt. Rodney R. Steele while the company was on bivouac. Blount said he covered Steele with dirt but that the lieutenant, noting Steele's face uncovered except for pinneedles, ordered that dirt be thrown over his face.

Anderson also has been accused of having one trainee strung up by his ankles, of having another scrubbed with sand in a wet rag, and of having two others climb a tree and shout an obscene and self-abusive phrase.

Lt. Col. Morris B. Montgomery testified that Anderson and Lt. Robert Penland of the same company were "the two most outstanding officers I had in my command" who were not already company commanders. Montgomery is commanding officer of the 1st Infantry Training Regiment at Camp Gordon.

Col. James O. Wade said Company A was "less responsive than any other during my regime" before Anderson was assigned to it. He said that under Anderson and

Penland the trainees soon "looked like a seasoned outfit."

Wade has been removed as commanding officer of the replacement training center at Camp Gordon. The Army said the action was taken because of his failure to act quickly on charges against Anderson.

In a statement earlier, Anderson said he tried to make certain that trainees under his command were prepared for combat.

Actor John Agar Draws \$200 Fine

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (U)—Actor John Agar was fined \$200 yesterday on a charge of intoxication and driving a car without a license in his possession.

The 31-year-old former husband of actress Shirley Temple was arrested last January. He pleaded guilty to the intoxication charge but denied drunk driving and driving while his license was suspended. The case was continued periodically until yesterday, when he pleaded guilty to driving while he did not have a license in his possession. He was granted two years' probation.

The charges of drunk driving and driving while his license was suspended were dismissed.

Wildcat.

Most members of the wildcat family live in woods or forests. Usually they prey on furry animals, including foxes, but there are some which go fishing.

The best fishermen among the wildcats are the fishing cats which live in the wilds of southeastern Asia. Their food is made up chiefly of fish and snails. They capture snails which are outside their shells. Fishing cats hunt game in marshes, as well as in small rivers. In some western parts of North America wildcats do a little fishing. They seem to like salmon best. Some persons call these wildcats by the special name of "fisher cats."

Among the wildcats are some known as lynxes. They live in North America, from Alaska to Nova Scotia, but the United States has few of them.

Lynxes are excellent swimmers but they spend little time looking for fish. Their food is made up mainly of rabbits, mice and other warm-blooded animals. They attack fawns at times, also young sheep.

Mr. Charles Sheldon, a hunter, described a fight which he observed between a two-year-old ram and a lynx. The conflict took place in a ravine during winter. The ram was near death when the hunter

shot the lynx. Later, as an act of mercy, he shot the dying ram. Living much farther south than the lynx is the ocelot (pronounced Off-eh-lot or OSS-eh-lot, as you choose). This animal has spots on its fur, and some call it the spotted cat or the tiger cat. Another name for it is leopard cat. Actually it is small as compared to a tiger, and falls a good deal short of the leopard in weight. An adult ocelot is likely to weigh from 30 to 35 pounds.

A good-sized ocelot is likely to have a length of from 42 to 50 inches, counting the tail. The tail usually is from 12 to 15 inches long.

MacFadden Told To Pay Wife's Support

NEW YORK (U)—Bernard MacFadden, 86, has been ordered to pay \$600 a month to his estranged wife, Jonnie Lee MacFadden, whom he married six years ago.

Mrs. MacFadden, 47, won a separation from the physical culturist last Feb. 10 on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment, nonsupport and abandonment.

State Supreme Court Justice Henry Clay Greenberg yesterday also ordered MacFadden to pay \$5,000 in attorney fees for his wife and \$500 in back alimony.

When the two were married, MacFadden announced he hoped to have children. This hope was not fulfilled.

'Conelrad' Plan Gets New Test

WASHINGTON (U)—Hundreds of commercial radio stations Wednesday joined military and civil defense authorities in testing a plan to inform the public during an enemy attack without aiding hostile bombers.

Results of the nationwide test may not be known for a month or more — until scores of reports are received and evaluated.

Communications officials estimated in advance that 1,300 of the nation's 2,000 radio stations would take part in the fourth annual test of the "Conelrad" system, from 3:30 to 4:30 a.m. local time.

Many stations remained on the air longer than usual to participate in the "pool" broadcasts, designed to keep the public informed in an air attack without permitting enemy bombers to ride a radio beam to a particular station.

Air Force planes ranged across the country and off the coasts during the drill, checking whether the broadcasts could be used as a navigational aid.

All stations in an area used the same wavelength and the same program, with each transmitting the program on a rotation plan designed to keep no single station on the air for more than 10 to 30 seconds at a time. None of the stations identified themselves.

GOP Handling Of Postal System Is Rapped By Rogers

WASHINGTON (U)—Rep. Walter Rogers of the Texas Panhandle says the Republicans are fouling up the postal system.

The Texas Democrat minced no words in criticizing changes the Eisenhower administration has made in the Post Office Department.

"They've done a great injustice to thousands of farm and ranch families in what they labeled economy," Rogers said in an interview.

"They claimed at first they were going to save a million dollars a day through reorganization of the department. Actually, during this Republican-controlled 83rd Congress we appropriated a total of \$5,587,127.100 as compared with \$5,114,600,000 during the preceding two-year 82nd Congress. That's an increase of nearly a half billion dollars, more than a million dollars a day."

Abolishing hundreds of fourth-class post offices over the country brought great inconveniences and added expenses, Rogers asserted.

"Out in the Panhandle, for instance," he continued, "there are many, many cases where a rancher now has to drive 20 to 30 miles or more to get to the nearest post office. Formerly they would have to drive only two or three miles to a fourth class office."

"And another thing," he added, "I expect some of these changes they have made calling for transportation of mails by bus and truck rather than by train are likely to cause confusion and delays during this coming Christmas rush."

Poster Girl Named For March Of Dimes

NEW YORK (U)—The vivacious, blue-eyed girl to be pictured on posters for the 1955 March of Dimes is little Mary Kosloski of Collierville, Tenn.

Mary, now 5, was stricken with polio when she was 5 months old. Doctors thought she would never walk, but she now gets around with the aid of a special corset, leg braces and crutches.

She was picked for next year's poster girl by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Mary, who has two older sisters and a younger brother, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Paul Kosloski.

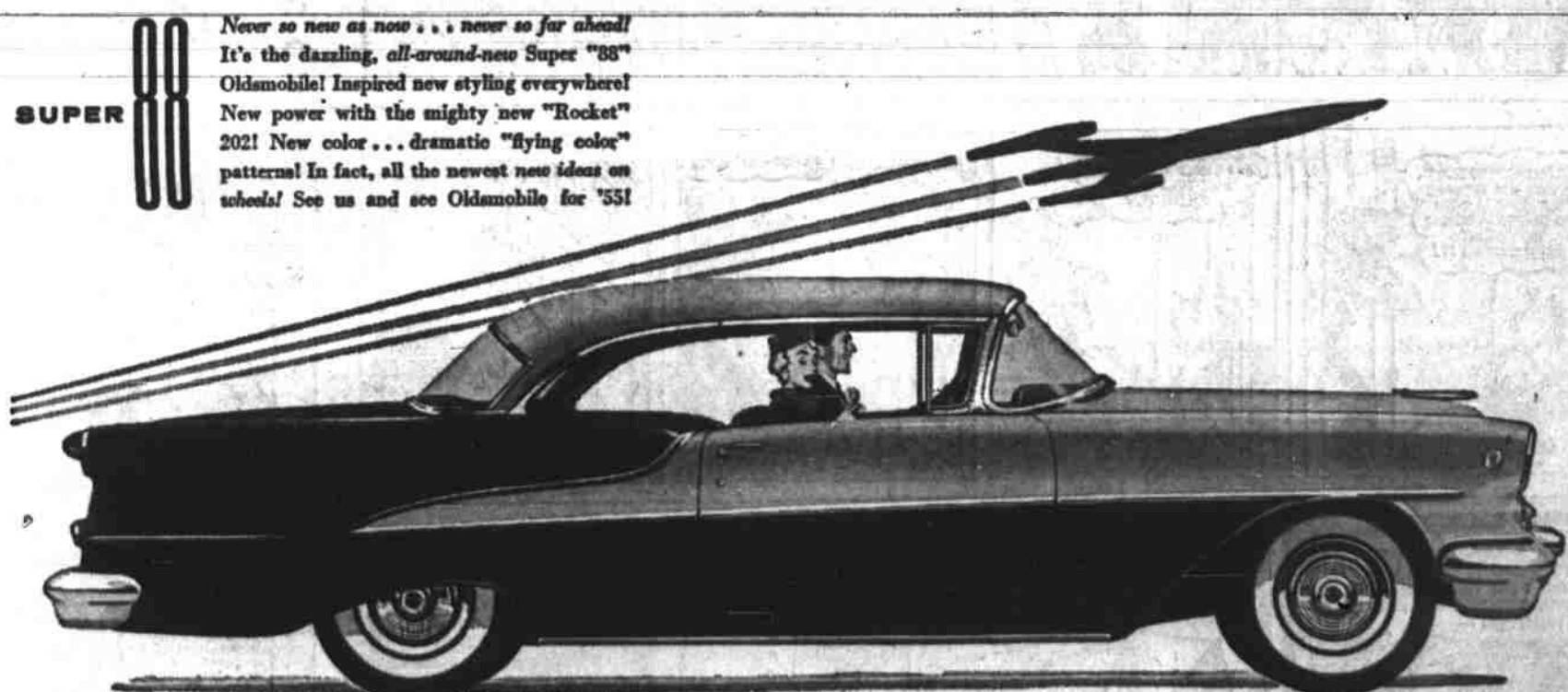

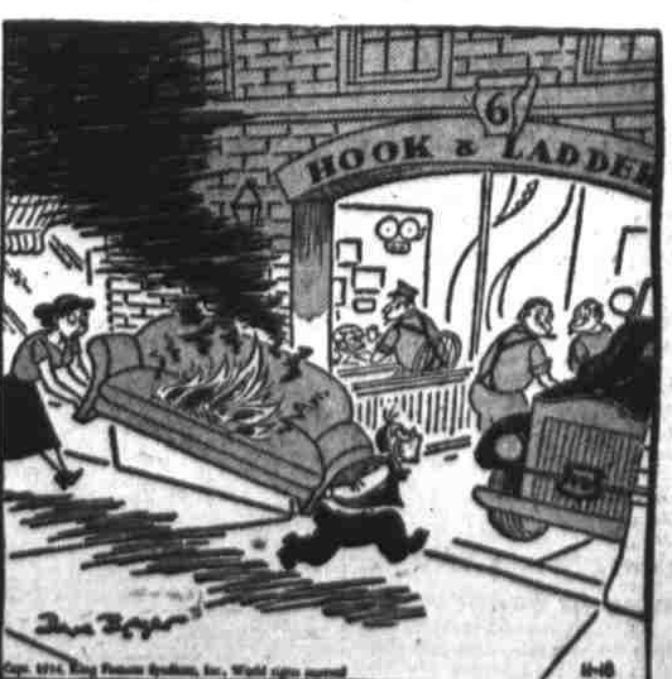

Prizes Totaling \$117,200 Go To Winners In Mexican Race

MEXICO CITY (U)—Tense excitement gripped the over-crowded little jungle town of Tuxtla Gutierrez as the world's top automobile drivers made final preparations for Friday's Pan American road race.

An estimated 160 cars will roar across the starting line at dawn to start the 1,500-mile, five-day contest which will pay winners \$117,200 in prizes.

They come from Europe, South America, Central and North America to participate in the longest and most dangerous automobile race in the world.

Nine were killed last year. Two have died in trial run accidents this year even before the race started.

Tuxtla Gutierrez, in tropical Tehuantepec peninsula not far from the Guatemala border, was a scene of confusion Wednesday. In addition to the drivers and their many mechanics, reporters, race and government officials poured into the overcrowded village.

Hotels were jammed. Accommodations of all types were over-taxed. Communications were highly inadequate.

There was one bright prospect: The Weather bureau said the weather would be good for Friday's first leg, a 329.3 mile dash from Tuxtla Gutierrez to Oaxaca.

Hot, humid, but clear.

There are five categories en-

tered in the race which ends Nov. 23 at Ciudad Juarez on the Texas border: Big sports cars (about 17), small sports cars (9), large standard makes (25), small standards (70), and European standards (19).

They range from the expensive, powerful and specially-built Ferrari, Jaguar, Austin Healey and Pegaso to the tiny Porsche, Osa and Borgward.

Aside from the big sports-car class, which undoubtedly will set the pace for others, interest is centered in the big standard class which Lincoln has dominated in the past.

Lincoln are again entered in force, but Buick is giving special emphasis to this year's entries. Cadillacs and Packards are also in the race.

JIMMY CARTER REGAINS TITLE FROM DEMARCO

SAN FRANCISCO (U)—The world lightweight boxing championship was back in familiar surroundings today—in the possession of Jimmy Carter of New York.

The 30-year-old kingpin from Harlem regained the title last night when he battered Paddy Demarco of Brooklyn into a mess and submission in the 15th and final round of a bruising, savagely fought battle in the vast Cow Palace.

Referee Ray Flores halted the massacre.

Paddy, 26, making the first defense of the championship he captured from Jimmy in New York last March 5, was out on his feet, his left eye swollen and all but shut and his cheek rapidly assuming a deep blue shade.

Carter now stands as the only lightweight king to win the crown three times. He won it originally from the Williams in 1951, lost it to Lauro Salas in 1952, regained it six months later and then surrendered the honor to his rival from Brooklyn.

Twice Carter had his man on the deck—from a whistling left hook to the chin in the ninth for a four-count, and with a barrage of punches just as the bell ended the 14th.

The knockdown in the ninth, the second in Paddy's career of some 33 fights, signaled the outcome. The battering in the 14th spelled out the finish and actually the technical knockout in the 15th was anticlimactic.

Carter called his victory the biggest thrill since he started boxing in 1946.

His manager Willie Ketchum said he has no immediate plans for Jimmy but he is definitely inter-

ested in a title match with one of the nation's newest television attractions, California's Cisco Andrade.

Shivers Calls On Conservatives To Fill Needs, Stop Centralism

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Texas Gov. Shivers—generally considered a conservative Democrat—declared last night, "timid, weak-spined, apologetic conservatism will never hold the trust of the American people."

Shivers, who led Texas' bolt to Republican Dwight Eisenhower in 1952 and is considered a leader of the South's conservative Democratic forces, made the remarks in a speech calling for southern states to respond quickly to the needs of their people—before the federal government steps in.

If southern states fail in their responsibilities to the people, he added, "an answer will, inevitably, be forced upon us from Washington."

"It is imperative that our state governments in the South be energetic in their response to the needs of all the people, without regard to their station in life, their background or their color," Shivers declared.

"The cause of conservatism has suffered its greatest decline in prestige because too many conservative leaders have argued that a balanced budget and a niggardly budget are one and the same," Shivers declared.

"A balanced budget is the only honest basis for the conduct of governmental affairs. But it is important to remember that a budget is not balanced until it properly provides for the needs of the people."

In the long run "the most economical course" is to meet problems at home without defaulting to Washington, Shivers added.

The Texas chief executive did not mention segregation directly but he declared "states rights" has become a misunderstood term.

"Basically, our greatest problem is the fact that many of our fellow Americans do not understand what we are talking about when we talk about 'states rights,'" he said.

"States rights are regarded as old-fashioned and out-of-date. They are regarded by some as the direct opposite of 'human rights.' As an enemy—rather than a friend—of compassion for the legitimate needs and wants of the individual. . . ."

Shivers called these conceptions "wholly false."

Nordyke spent several days making a detailed study of the project which serves Big Spring, Snyder and Odessa. In addition to a tour of the project, he also

spent considerable time in research on the background.

The story gives some interesting insight to the encouragement provided by J. B. Thomas, Texas Electric Service president, who first conceived the idea of a multi-city attack on the common problem of domestic water supply. In token of this, the CRMWD board named the system's big reservoir Lake J. B. Thomas.

"Nearly every place in Texas has a water shortage," wrote Nordyke. "The problem is so big—and costly—that it is controversial."

He then traced the avenues through which the district explored feasibility of its project and finally concluded that it could do it faster, better and more economically than any other agency.

As a consequence, the CRMWD member cities today have a lake with something like 90,000 acre feet of water ready to be delivered to the cities and to other users such as the SACROC repressuring project.

The story chronicles the long engineering studies and the many obstacles such as discovery of oil right in the middle of the lake basin. This produced the condition which Nordyke describes in the opening of his article, the serving of oil wells with a sea-going barge.

"The district is still young, but the three cities have no water worries," commented Nordyke. "I found that the district has been popular with the people of the three cities because (1) put water in the pipes. All this has been done without levying ad valorem taxes, and this also is popular. . . . Through all the pioneering of this extensive waterworks by the three cities, there has been no word of dissension among the directors of the municipalities."

Checking Fire Damage Proves To Be Costly

NEW YORK (AP)—Firemen had to chop through walls on all 22 floors of the Biltmore Hotel yesterday to make sure an incinerator flue fire was out.

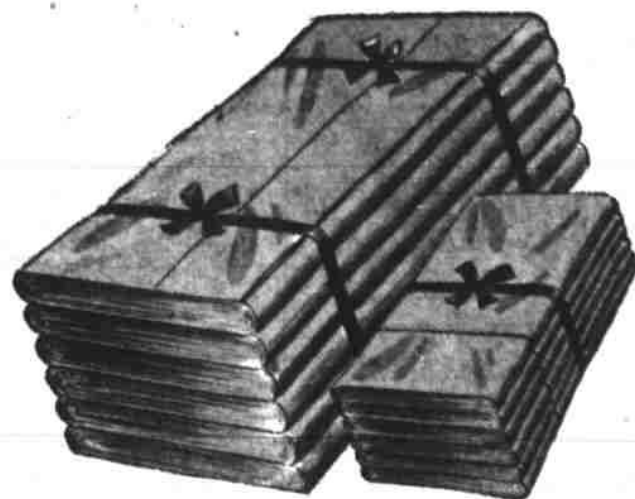
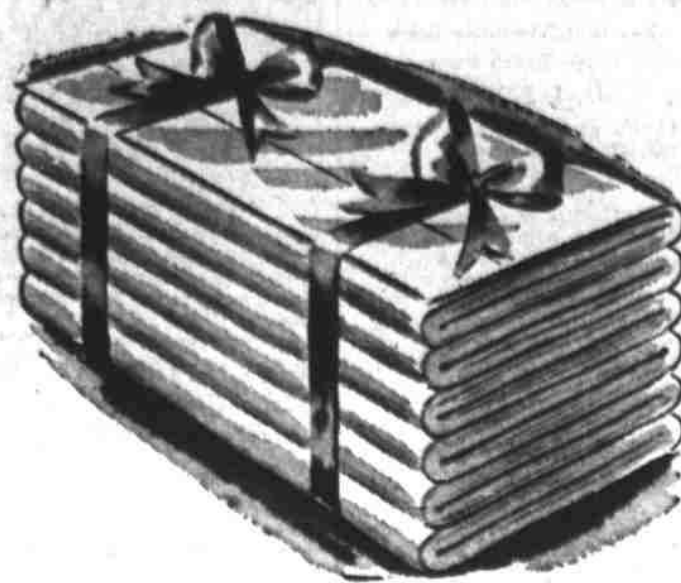

Heavy Fog Covers Much Of Britain

LONDON (AP)—A heavy fog blanketed the southern half of the British Isles today. Authorities said the vapor has not yet reached the lethal mixture of the 1952 smogs, which doctors claimed contributed to the deaths of tens of thousands of persons.

The fog belt extended roughly south and east of a line running from the Yorkshire resort of Scarborough to Swansea in Wales. Road and rail traffic was slowed. Airplane flights in and out of the capital were cut completely. In some places, the fog reduced visibility to only five yards.

The heavy blanket raised fears that the country might be in for another siege of deadly smogs. To be lethal, however, the fog must persist for several days, becoming mixed with smoke and industrial fumes.

Nurse's Compassion Aids Korean Helpless

TAEGU, Korea (AP)—The compassion of an American nurse has brought 1,500 pounds of warm clothing to the orphans and widows of war-torn Korea.

Capt. Anna M. Swope of the Korea Civil Assistance Command, touched deeply by the bitter poverty she found here, told of the nation's plight in a letter to her home in Fredericksburg, Pa.

The tiny community of 800 gathered bundles of clothing. Capt. Swope toured orphanages, refugee camps, widow's homes and homes for the maimed and distributed the gifts.

Investigation Ordered Into Death Of Girl, 11

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—An investigation has begun to determine the exact cause of the death yesterday of Joan C. Miller, 11. Donald Miller, the girl's father, said she had been suffering from shock and hysteria since learning of her grandfather's death.

Joan's grandfather, Barney A. Miller, 60, of Jessup, Md., was killed last Monday by a tractor-trailer. The girl was extremely devoted to him, her parents said.

BECKLEY, W.Va. (AP)—Raleigh County Sheriff John C. Ward called for volunteers today to resume a search for Irene Agee, 4, and her sister Mary, 6, who have been missing since shortly after school Nov. 1.

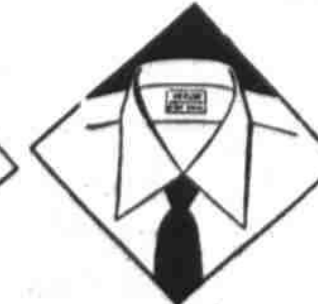

Used Houses Staging Comeback On Nation's Real Estate Market

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—The used house is making a comeback in the real estate market.

Stronger demand for old houses, shown in new figures from the Federal Housing Administration (FHA), firmed today with industry reports that the price decline on older dwellings has begun to level off.

The Housing Act of 1954, which had as one major objective the preservation of the existing supply of homes, brought FHA's terms for mortgage insurance on used dwellings closer to equality with those for new houses.

Now with the law only three months old, FHA reported this development: In August, three out of every five home buyers who applied to FHA wanted new dwellings, but by October, the call for old houses had pulled up virtually even.

Last month's applications, arriving in greater volume than in any previous October, totaled 29,325 for new houses, 29,124 for old. Housing officials said the Veterans Administration (VA) was having about the same experience with GI financing.

Real estate men, who rely on old rather than new dwellings for the bulk of their business, had brightened up noticeably at the convention of the National Assn. of Real Estate Boards (NAREB) in Cleveland during the past week.

The delegates were told by James C. Downs Jr., president of the Real Estate Research Corp., Chicago, that the price decline has ended and that, at present levels, used housing is a high grade investment.

One official who attended reported that "the comeback of the used house was the big news of the meeting."

NAREB has made no market survey of used houses since last April, when it found sales and declining prices in most cities, especially in the higher price brackets. Three out of four cities at that time reported price declines in the \$12,000-and-higher class.

Another of the speakers at Cleveland — John C. Tysen, president of Previews, Inc., whose New York firm specializes in better-grade used homes — estimated that prices in the upper value class had dropped as much as 5 per cent from the 1953 level in some areas.

But the present signs are, Tysen reported, that 1955 demand not only will absorb the higher value new homes but will "take up any price slack that had existed in connection with higher priced used houses."

A spokesman for the National Assn. of Home Builders here also reported improving demand for older houses as well as for the new residences, in which builders are primarily interested.

The builders' spokesman said the new law has provided "a shot in the arm" for the real estate industry—and for builders too, since the liberalized FHA terms make it easier for families that have outgrown their houses to sell them and buy larger and more modern homes.

The major reason why used houses languished on the market and brought lower prices this year, in the view of housing officials here, was the availability of attractive new houses being erected in near-record numbers.

But a large percentage of buyers prefer larger rooms, basements and porches, which older houses provide. And now these buyers can obtain easier FHA terms not only for their purchase but for home-improvement loans to bring old kitchens, bathrooms and closet space up to modern standards.

The new Housing Act permits a down payment of as low as 10 per cent on used houses, instead of the 20 per cent formerly required, and authorizes mortgages running up to 30 years instead of 20. Under these terms banks and other private lenders appear to be as ready to lend money on FHA-insured or VA-guaranteed mortgages for used houses as for new, an FHA spokesman said. There is natural reluctance to lend if the

house is too old to be a good risk, it was conceded, but the FHA valuation is designed to reflect the age and condition of the dwelling. Many complaints have poured in on FHA for its recent slowness in handling applications. The deluge of requests for mortgage insurance since passage of the law, coupled with new regulations designed by Congress to protect home buyers, resulted in formidable backlogs of

work accumulating in the agency's 75 field offices.

The backlog by now has been whittled down to a month or so in most offices, the FHA spokesman said, and will soon be eliminated by the hiring of new employees for inspections and appraisals, overtime work, and the use of outside appraisers.

Officials said the applications are being handled in the order of their filing, without discrimination as between new and old houses.

Average Thanksgiving Dinner To Cost About \$10 This Year

Local grocers admit that the price of a Thanksgiving dinner will vary to a large extent with the size of the family's pocketbook, but they estimate that commodities for the average household feast will cost near \$10 this year.

Quite a few families will spend more than the \$10, however, and a good number will not spend so much.

The type of meal to be served and the number who will eat are the deciding factors in the cost, and local grocers expect the average family to have both quality and quantity come Thanksgiving.

Large gatherings will be the rule rather than the exception, grocers say. These large gatherings will probably mean fewer meals served here as a number of family branches will double up for the day.

Fancy meals are forecast for these large gatherings. In many instances turkey and all the trimmings.

Although few markets have turkeys in stock now, meat retailers

expect the fowl to sell for between 55 and 60 cents per pound. As it would take between six and eight pounds to feed around 10 people, turkey cost alone would run between \$3.30 and \$4.80.

Larger turkeys will probably be purchased in many instances, and sandwiches can be made out of what is left. In fact most grocers here point out that Thanksgiving dinner preparations usually last for several meals.

Ham will be an expensive item on the Thanksgiving dinner also. Costs range between \$3 and 70

cents per pound and a serving for eight to 10 would cost between \$3.15 and \$5.60.

Many people in recent years have started using large hens instead of turkeys. This is ideal for the cost is much less. Hens, around 40 cents per pound, can be purchased to feed from eight to ten for around \$2.40 to \$3.20.

The cost of the "trimmings" will actually determine the cost of the meal, however. Housewives can get just as elaborate as they desire here, with few conventions to follow.

Most dealers claim that a Thanksgiving dinner should have cranberry sauce, a starch vegetable, a green vegetable, dressing, giblet gravy, and pumpkin pie. Salads, olives, fruit cakes, bread selections, and a number of other incidentals are also common.

A lettuce and tomato salad could probably be prepared for 10 at a cost of about \$1.25, one dealer pointed out. Fruit cake ingredients could run anywhere between \$2 and \$3.

Air Parcels Still Can Reach Soldiers Overseas By Christmas

What are you sending your soldier overseas for Christmas—homemade cookies or cold cash? If you are still pondering the question, although the mailing deadline is past, here are suggestions based on an Associated Press survey of men stationed in Europe and the Far East.

The air parcel post mailing deadline is Nov. 25.
GIs in Europe want: Cash, clothes, auto accessories, phonograph records, best seller books, letters, snapshots and subscriptions to their hometown newspapers.

Cookies and cakes get stale. Cameras, toilet articles, pen and pencil sets, watches and leather goods are available overseas, often cheaper than at home.
"And we don't need food packages," says Sgt. Dave Vrooman of (820 N. Pickering Ave.) Whittier, Calif. "That would be all right in wartime when food is scarce, but not now."

Soldiers say money as presents help solve their travel problems. "For \$30," explains Cpl. Orland Branner of Cleburne, Tex., who is stationed in Germany, "a soldier can go to Austria, France, Switzerland and Holland. I don't know of a Christmas gift that would be more appreciated."

Cpl. Henry Hanson of Leland, Ill., puts it this way: "After 21 months overseas I find I have enough of everything but money." The U. S. Army's postmaster in Europe, Lt. Col. H. E. Alphin of Buchanan, W. Va., says that those in the United States who want to send money overseas should use money orders or some other form of non-negotiable instrument, and

not send currency—which is illegal as well as risky.
Several soldiers stationed at La Rochelle, France, ask for clothing.

"I would like some slacks, a sports coat, sport shirts or shoes that are not Early American," comments Pvt. John Q. Wilson of Portland, Ore.

Pfc. Bill Williams of Hyattsville, Md., voices the preference of many GIs. "Every soldier in Europe should have a radio," he says. "The American Forces Network keeps soldiers supplied with good programs, but we've got to have radios to tune in on them."

"Gifts are fine," adds Pfc. James Clayton of Springfield, Ohio, "but there's nothing like a letter."
Clayton, a mail clerk, says: "It's no fable that mail is essential to high morale. When a man doesn't get a letter for several days, and I tell him once again there's no mail for him, I see a change come into his eyes. If his parents and friends could see that look just once—they'd write him every day."

In the Far East where Americans are stationed, Christmas giving will be a two-way street—with perhaps most of the traffic moving toward the United States.
More than 64 million dollars in gift merchandise is going to be made available to soldier shoppers in post exchanges in Korea, Japan,

Okina and the Philippines. And if past seasons are any indication, most of that will be grabbed up.

Servicemen will have a chance to buy over the counter at the post exchanges and through an elaborate mail order system set up by the Army. Catalogs and mail order kits have been distributed to units in outlying areas.

In Korea some 3,500 Christmas trees will be placed on sale for GIs, plus the usual lights and decorations.
The Far Eastern GI also will be able to buy many lavish gifts for himself—at a considerable reduction from prices at home. So the Army advises relatives and friends not to bother sending cameras, watches and radios. Chances are, the Far East serviceman has two or three already.

The home folks can't give the overseas serviceman the present he wants most—a one-way trip to the United States. But personal items like slippers, robes, sporting equipment, sports shirts, comfortable loafers and good pipes are always in demand, especially in Korea.

And don't forget: Packages must be on their way from the United States by Nov. 25 if they are to reach their destination by Christmas. Air parcels must not exceed two pounds and a total of 30 inches length and girth—about the size of a shoe box.

Magnolia Granted Stay In FPC Case

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Magnolia Petroleum Co. has been granted a temporary stay of the Federal Power Commission's controversial order 174-A.

Federal circuit court Judge Wayne Borah said Tuesday he granted the stay "to preserve the status quo" of the case pending litigation.
Federal Dist. Judge Ben Connally of Houston on Monday had declined jurisdiction in Magnolia's injunction suit challenging the legality of an FPC order freezing natural gas prices at the wellhead.

FPC posted its price freeze order on July 16.

Under order 174-A, issued Aug. 6, the FPC assumed jurisdiction over independent producers and gatherers of natural gas which moves in interstate commerce. The order stemmed from the U.S. Supreme Court's historic decision in the Phillips Petroleum Case, June 7, in which the high court said FPC had authority to regulate such producers and gatherers.

Judge Borah's action was believed here the first such applying to order 174-A.

'Paris In The Raw' Seen At Nudist Pool, But Day's Dull

PARIS, Nov. 18 (U)—If you're looking for Paris in the raw, you'll find it at the nudist swimming pools.

If it's sin you're after, however, you'll be disappointed. After the first few minutes the proceedings seem about as spine-tingling as a church supper.

I went down and tried one of the three Paris swimming pools that cater to nudists—or naturists, as they prefer to be called in France. It was a chilly evening and I spent the best part of two hours sitting on a damp towel, shivering, and paging through an American magazine someone had discarded, waiting for more business to show up.

There was nothing I'd rather

have seen than a nice woolly bathrobe.

The Piscine de l'Etoile, about 200 yards from the Arch of Triumph, is rented to nudist clubs three nights a week. To get in you should have a card issued by the French Federation of Naturists, but that isn't expected of a foreigner. Admission: 100 francs (about 30 cents).

Of course, I had to take off my own clothes too.

Except for the lack of bathing suits, the Piscine de l'Etoile looked pretty much like any other indoor swimming pool, which is just what it is on other nights of the week.

Guy Thevenot, president of the "Sport and Nature Club," explained that most of the members were away on vacations. France

has about 85 open-air nudist camps. The score of members and non-members who showed up were mostly friends of his.

The nudists spent the evening doing what most people do at swimming pools. They went in and took a shower. There were showers labeled "men" and "women" but to the nudists it didn't make any difference. Men and women went in to either one. After swimming, they sat on the tiles at the edge of the pool and dangled their feet in the



Special Well Near Unit Lease Opposed

AUSTIN (U)—A charge that a special drilling permit sought by the father of a railroad commissioner would drain oil from an adjoining unitized field in Coleman County was laid before the commission here Wednesday.

The permit was sought by W.J. Murray Sr., father of Commissioner W. J. Murray Jr., and W. M. Smith.

Opposition came from the North Glen Cove Operating Committee, whose chairman, W. D. Frazell, said he also represented various royalty owners and operators in and around Glen Cove.

Testimony was taken before Commissioner Examiner W. J. Bassett. The state's three commissioners do not customarily attend such hearings in person and were not present.

No commission action is expected for at least several weeks.

Murray told the examiner he wants a permit to drill a third well within acreage assigned under the area's regular spacing rule to one well. An exception to the spacing rule was granted to Murray previously for the drilling of his second well. Both the first two wells are producers.

He said he believed there is oil on the south end of his tract that would not be recoverable except by another well.

H. W. Woodward, Coleman attorney, told the examiner:

"Based on scientific engineering facts, we think Mr. Murray is draining the unit at the present time. Another well will produce more drainage."

Frazell said he protested the special permit sought by Murray

"with all the power" at his command.

"If the commission allows this operator to bunch his wells together along the unit lease line in a small proven area, he will enjoy all the fruits of the secondary recovery operation without any of its costs and at the same time defeat the pressure maintenance project by unduly draining the area," he said.

"The granting of this exceptional location would lead the owners of certain leases all over the state to stay out of secondary recovery units in hopes of drilling excep-

unequitable large amount of oil at the expense of the unit operators," he added.

Such action, he said, would prevent formation of many secondary recovery units resulting in tremendous waste of the state's underground reserves.

Murray had refused to join the unitized area when it was formed last year. He told the examiner his refusal resulted from the unit operators' refusal to give him "a fair deal."

The recipe that Mrs. Maulden shares with us is one for Foamy Cranberry Sauce that she says is ideal with turkey, chicken, wild game or ham.

Besides cooking Mrs. Maulden enjoys her two and one-half year-old son, Blair. Interior decorating, her bridge club, people, gardening, and work with the Woman's Forum, Wednesday Review Club and Philathea Sunday School Class of First Methodist Church.

Here's her Thanksgiving cranberry sauce recipe:

FOAMY CRANBERRY SAUCE
Ingredients:
1 cup confectioners' sugar
1 cup sweetened cranberry juice
4 tablespoons butter
1 egg separated
Grated rind of 1/4 orange
Method:
Cream butter and sugar together. Add beaten egg yolk, cranberry juice and orange rind. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites just before serving. Yields 1 1/2 cups sauce.

Our First Lady knows good food. We have just tried her recipe for Pumpkin Chiffon Pie and are happy to report that our tasters, finishing their last mouthfuls with blissful satisfaction, declared it the best of its kind.

The secret of the pie? About a quarter cup more pumpkin than most other recipes of this sort call for, an extra egg and subtle spicing. Other versions of Pumpkin Chiffon Pie call for cinnamon, nutmeg and ginger. This presidential delight has a good quota of cinnamon, the perfect amount of nutmeg and no ginger. The result is utterly delectable flavor — not overpowering but not too delicate, either.

We found this recipe, with "Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the White House," printed under it, in The Mare Island Centennial Cook Book. The cook book contains "Favorite Recipes of the Families of the United States Naval Base Mare Island, Vallejo, Benicia, Napa, California and Far-off Places," and has directions for lots of wonderful dishes. It was compiled by women volunteers of the Navy Relief Society Auxiliary. Any Thanksgiving dinner will benefit from the presence of this Pumpkin Chiffon Pie. But be sure to give the recipe its due and use a really flaky pastry for the crust. We are giving you the exact amounts of the filling ingredients as they came from the White House. The method is a new one we used because it is quick and easy: the unflavored gelatin, brown sugar, salt, spices, liquid, egg yolks and pumpkin are heated together in the top of a double boiler long enough for the gelatin to dissolve. After that the mixture is chilled,

and folded into the egg whites, which must be beaten very stiff so that the air they capture will combine with the gelatin to give the pie real chiffon texture. Then the fluffy pumpkin filling is turned into the baked pastry shell. Chilled until firm, wreathed with whipped cream, here's a pie to be proud of!

MRS. EISENHOWER'S PUMPKIN CHIFFON PIE

Ingredients:
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup water
3 eggs (separated)
1 1/2 cups cooked pumpkin
1/4 cup granulated sugar
Baked 9-inch pie shell
Whipped cream

Method:
Mix gelatin, brown sugar, salt, thoroughly in the top of a double boiler. Stir in milk and water. Beat in egg yolks with a fork or a whisk, then the pumpkin. Place over boiling water and cook stirring often — especially a round sides of pan — until mixture is heated through, about 10 minutes. Remove from heat; chill until mixture begins to set — a spoonful of it dropped back will hold its shape well in a mound. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry; gradually beat in granulated sugar until very stiff. Fold gelatin mixture into egg whites. Turn into pie shell; chill until firm. Garnish with whipped cream.

Food Editor's Note:
Canned pumpkin is fine for this filling. 1/4 cup milk may be used instead of the 1/2 cup milk and 1/2 cup water called for. This pie may be made a few days ahead of the time it is to be served and frozen (without the whipped cream garnish); so thaw, allow to stand at room temperature for three hours.

Brazil Nut Stuffing New Touch To Turkey

If you want to give your Thanksgiving turkey a new touch, we recommend filling your bird with our Quick Brazil Nut Stuffing. Even firm advocates of using the same good-old holiday recipes around our house agree that this stuffing was an innovation that might well start a new tradition.

You'll need about 1/4 cup of this stuffing for each pound of dressed turkey. And to estimate the quantity of turkey to buy, allow about 1/4 pound of turkey, dressed-weight per serving. Dressed weight means that the head and feet are on; feathers removed, but the bird is not drawn. Or allow a little more than 1/4 pound per serving of ready-to-cook turkey that has been

drawn and cleaned ready for the oven — either fresh or frozen. The drawn weight averages about one-fifth less than dressed weight; so a 15-pound dressed turkey, or a 12-pound ready-to-cook one, would give 20 generous servings.

QUICK BRAZIL NUT STUFFING

Ingredients:
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup chopped Brazil nuts
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped celery and leaves
1 cup stock or water
1 8-ounce package herb-seasoned ready-to-use stuffing

Method:
Melt butter in large skillet; add Brazil nuts, onion and celery. Cook until onion is tender, but not brown. Add stock or water. Stir in prepared stuffing; toss lightly. Makes 6 cups stuffing, enough for an 8-pound turkey, use an additional 1/4 cup stuffing for each pound dressed weight.

A big Pumpkin Pie and some Mince-meat Tarts will round off your Thanksgiving dinner. To make the tarts, use a package of condensed mince-meat, prepared according to package directions. It will make enough filling for 4 to 6 tarts — depending upon their size. If you want to top the tarts with pastry pumpkins, cut a pumpkin shape out of cardboard, making it just a little smaller than the top of the tarts, and use it for a pattern. Place one of the pastry pumpkins on each mince-meat-filled pastry shell before baking. Shape cheese pumpkins out of soft yellow cheese, using the back of a knife to mark grooves. Then put a whole clove in the top of each cheese pumpkin for a stem, and serve with the tarts.

Party Baked Apples Ideal For Holidays

Be on the lookout for some good Rome Beauty apples in your local store, for these are the finest baking apples. This recipe for party baked apples can be topped with either whipped cream or sour cream. If whipped cream is used, you might sprinkle in a little bit of peanut brittle for an extra interesting flavor.

PARTY BAKED APPLES

1/2 cup dark corn syrup
1/2 cup water
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
2 tablespoons sugar
4 tart apples, unpared
Whipped cream or 1 cup sour cream

Combine syrup, water, cinnamon, lemon rind, butter or margarine and sugar. Bring to boiling temperature over low heat, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Wash and core apples. Pare the top third of each apple. Place apples in shallow baking dish. Pour hot syrup mixture over apples. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 to 40 minutes or until apples are tender, basting frequently with the syrup mixture. Serve hot or cold topped with cream. Makes 4 servings.

Grapes Deluxe

Remove seedless grapes from stems and pile in a glass serving bowl. Top with sweetened whipped cream sprinkled with freshly-grated nutmeg or curls of unsweetened chocolate. To make the chocolate curls use a swivel-blade vegetable peeler and have the chocolate slightly soft.

Rice Makes Another Tasty Stuffing For Ye Olde Bird

Toasted grains of rice have a delicious nutty flavor that's just right with turkey. This stuffing is so good and easy to make, you'll use it with chicken, too.

TOASTED RICE STUFFING

Ingredients:
1 cup uncooked white rice
2 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Method:
Spread rice in a shallow pan and place in a 400 degree F. oven. When the grains turn slightly yellow, stir well. Continue to toast, stirring occasionally, until rice grains are a light golden color. This takes 15 to 20 minutes. Put the toasted rice in a saucepan. Add the water and salt. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid and leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove from heat, but leave lid on 10 minutes.

While the rice is cooking, melt the butter or margarine in a saucepan. Add the onion and celery. Cook until tender, stirring occasionally. Add onion and celery mixture to the rice and mix in the bread crumbs, egg, salt, poultry seasoning, pepper and broth or water. Stuff lightly into the bird. Do not pack as the stuffing expands during the cooking. Stuff the bird just before it is placed in the oven. Do not stuff and refrigerate.
