SAN ANTONIO MEN MADE HIGHWAY TOUR

Messrs. Furlong and Birdsong of San Antonio spent Friday night in Junction on their return from El Paso. Mr. Birdsong is the old Franklin dealer of the Alamo City and a good roads enthusiast and the trip was made in one of his cars, which is the latest model Franklin. Mr. Furlong is head of the Highway and Travel Department of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce.

These gentlemen made the trip from San Antonio to El Paso for two specific reasons, viz: To get acquainted with the people out that way, especially the El Paso Automobile Club, and get first hand information as to road conditions on both the routes over which tourists may travel from San Antonio to the gateway City.

The trip followed the Highway thru Fredericksburg, Mason, Brady, San Angelo and Big Springs and from there on to El Paso over the Bankhead Highway. The return trip was made over the Old Spanish Trail.

The El Paso Automobile Club, which directs most of the tourist travel from that city east, has had very meager information as to road conditions along the Old Spanish Trail and as a consequence many reports have reached Junction, as well as the San Antonio Highway Dept., that they could not possibly negotiate the road from Fort Stockton to Junction, and have been advised by the secretary of this Club to take other routes much longer and in most cases no better than the O. S. T. Some travelers from North Texas were recently in Junction and while talking with local people stated that the El Paso Automobile Club had advised that the O. S. T. route was impassable and that in order to reach San Antonio from El Paso they would have to go by Dallas.

This advise, taking them nearly three times the distance necessary to reach San Antonio, was of course out of all reason, and had they been bound for points east of Texas, they would have naturally passed up the city of San Antonio, when as a matter of fact these tourists disregarded the information given and on arriving at Junction stated that they found the roads in fair condition. As good, in fact, as they had found much of the road over which they had been directed, as they had previously been over it.

Other tourists have come thru here that have stated that in El Paso they were directed to follow the Bankhead Highway to Big Spring and then take the route mentioned above, over which Messrs. Furlong and Birdsong made the trip to Big Spring.

While these gentlemen are not out to favor any town against another, but merely to get the facts so that the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce will have first hand information to give west bound tourists. Mr. Furlong stated that he found the O. S. T. a fair road all the way and in most places in fine condition. The "90 mile stretch" between Junction and Ozona, which has been represented to hundreds of travelers as impassable, was in such condition that they made better than 25 miles per hour in a heavy car. TWO WATER GAUGES TO BE CONSTRUCTED

The State Board of Water Engineers, in co-operation with the United States Geological Survey, are making arrangements to construct two new automatic water gauges near Junction at an early date.

One will be located on the North Llano about four miles above town and the other on the main Llano about three miles below town, near the present one. The one on the Main Llano will be a rather expensive one, as a concrete via Fredericksburg, Brady, etc. there was about the same amount of roadway as between here and Ozona that was in practically the same condition as this Junction-Ozona road, and the distance is about 100 miles farther.

The San Antonio Chamber of Commerce does not "direct" travel in the accepted use of the word. They merely furnish information as to possible routes to reach any desired place and let the travelers take their choice after getting the facts.

From the information these gentlemen gathered while on this trip, there will undoubtedly be an increased number of east and west tourists passing thru Junction as a result of information furnished them first hand by Mr. Furlong's department. Their visit to El Paso was also profitable as they had first hand information to give the El Paso Automobile Club which will doubtless be utilized, as they have not been in position to get reliable information as to road conditions thru this Hill Country and naturally gave the traveling public the advantage of the only information they had.

Mr. Furlong thinks this country has wonderful tourist possibilities and states that requests for information about the Llano River country are gradually increasing in his office.

FAIR COMMITTEE CHANGE

The Executive Committee and a number of other committee members met on the Court House Lawn Saturday and discussed plans for the coming fair.

Hardeman and Miss house, 4 by 5 feet and about thirty feet high will be used to protect the automatic instruments used for gauging the river levels each day. The one on North Llano will be what is known as a pipe gauge and while it, too, will be an automatic device, it will not be so expensive as the other.

The machine is operated by a clock and at regular intervals some member of the Water Board force will visit the gauges and take the readings and look after the mechanism of the instrument.

J. L. Saunders and an assistant, who are in the employ of the State Board of Water Engineers and the Geological Survey, are here and will remain until the work is completed which will probably be about the first of August.

YOU'VE COME AGAIN

INCREASE IN EMPLOYEES

The Ford organization is now employing more than 141,000 persons in the United States, according to the latest employment figures. This is a record for the industry.

The largest increase has come, as might be expected, in the Detroit area where the Ford Motor Company's big manufacturing plants are located. Here close to 14,500 have been added to the employment list since March 1.

The big majority of work-ers are employed, of course, at the Highland Park and River Rouge plants. The River Rouge now has 12,500 on its payroll, a record for that plant. Highland Park still leads all plants with 55,000 employees though this number is considerably lower than the peak employment record of 1923 which was before the transfer of several thousand men to River Rouge when the motor assembly and truck shaft departments were moved there.

Along with the steady increase in employment in Detroit due to greater production, automobile makers have been corresponding increases in Detroit assembly plants until the employment rolls for those now show close to 44,000 employees.

A school teacher is to be tried in Tennessee to test a recently enacted law that prohibits the teaching of the theory of evolution in the schools of that state. The teacher will be tried following a sensational fight of one of his closest friends, merely to test the constitutionality of the new law.

William Jennings Bryan will assist in the prosecution while Clarence Darrow, noted criminal lawyer of Chicago, will assist the defense. Both volunteered their services.

Commenting on the effect of this trial the San Antonio Standard says:

"Whatever way the Scotch trial is decided, the battle will have been about the most fitting thing in the world. It may determine that Tennessee was wrong in attempting to legislate on the school curriculum. It may determine that the teaching of evolution is a fact contrary to the principles of religious liberty in the Constitution. If the law is upheld, how may expect to see similar laws introduced in many other states as well as legislation compelling the teaching of the Bible."

"But as for stopping the modern-fundamentalist, what chance has the Tennessee statute? It is decided there'll be no end to it. It will continue as large as well as in church schools. There is no continuing a man against his will. The old saying is true of the same reason will. The trial focusing attention on evolution will create a stir temporarily with probabilities of either side playing little in controversy."

Eventually the people rule. It is always safe to return to that point as a base. They are rising now. When this kind of rule comes to be to their taste, they will substitute another. The people are not politicians, they are not even political economists; they are pragmatists—that is, they believe that if a thing works well it cannot be very far wrong. The whole situation which faces the rulers of the world today—the parties, the politicians, the preachers—may be stated in four words. It does not work. The complaint of the people is never against form or method, but always against failure to function.—*Learnmore Independent.*

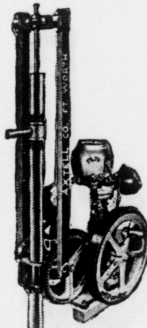

SELLING A TOWN

"The best thing a newspaper can do is to sell its community to the outside world. It thus develops both advertisers and readers. We associate different localities with certain products, as when we think of Pittsburgh we think of steel; when we think of flour we think of Minneapolis, and when we think of Chicago we think of the stockyards, because these communities have emphasized these features of their industries."

The above from an address by Wilbur Nesbit of the Medill School of Journalism of Northwestern University. Nesbit, star reporter, editorial writer, nationally known poet, paragrapher and lecturer, who stepped out of the limelight to become an advertising man; that is to operate the limelight for the benefit of others. But he couldn't hide himself. Readers remember him as poet and wit, and no gathering of representative advertising men in America is complete without him. By learning all branches of his business he has acquired a double measure of fame.

There is a big idea in the words quoted. The town that is not distinguished for something has not sold itself to the outside world. Its publicity mediums have overlooked the function for which they were created and by which they alone can grow. It seems to us that every town, large or small, has something by which it can be distinguished; something properly advertised, that will sell it to a world, maybe not the entire world, but a world existing beyond the corporate limits of the town.

If a town has a good newspaper, that alone is a distinction. A good newspaper is quoted. People from afar, reading quotations, get the name of the town fixed in mind, so that when it is mentioned they recall it as the place where the News, the Bugle, the Clairion, the Voice or even the Bazoo is printed. Good publicity for both town and newspaper and trade for the town. Since the newspaper is the town's principal medium of publicity, the most legitimate appeal the publisher can make to the town's citizens is for sufficient support to enable him to turn out a good newspaper. He must sell that idea to them if he expects to succeed. They must buy the idea if they expect to have a prosperous town, because no town amounts to much that hasn't got a worthwhile newspaper. No newspaper will ever amount to much unless it sells its town to the outside world. — Publisher's Auxiliary.

LASSEN VOLCANIC NATIONAL PARK

Mount Lassen, which geologists are pleased to term "a dying volcano," is located in the southeastern part of Shasta county in northern California.

Lassen, standing between the ends of two mountain ranges noted far and wide for the beauty of their scenery—the Sierra Nevada and the Cascades—rises to a height of 10,600 feet, and has the distinction of being the only volcano located within the confines of our United States that may be regarded as being at all active.

Although there were outward indications of the fact that tremendous internal heat continued to prevail, with the exception of the escape of some smoke or steam at somewhat irregular as well as infrequent periods, no serious eruption had occurred for so long (about two centuries) that the present generation of the world at large has practically forgotten that there was such a peak as Lassen, let alone the fact that it had volcanic tendencies. Consequently, in 1915, when Mount Lassen, with surprising suddenness, broke out in a series of violent explosions and eruptions which attracted the attention of the nations of the world to its doing, there was a rush for histories and geographies to post up on this mountain.

Although students of volcanic action contend that recent eruptions were feeble in violence as compared with those of long ago, nearby residents declare that these latest ones were terrifying to the nth degree.

Tremendous, broad spreading columns of dense smoke were forcibly expelled from the crater; small stones were thrown a mile or more, many boulders not so far, and lava dust rained down on the surrounding country over a radius of two miles. A blast of heated gas escaped, swept down a creek valley, melted the snow and created a torrent.

The only possible sight of the kind in the United States, following out its policy of preserving the most distinguished of our scenic possibilities—"For the Benefit and Enjoyment of the People," congress, in 1916, created the park and the volcanic and lava fields, lakes, springs, and canyons which surround it, in all 124 square miles, as a national park.

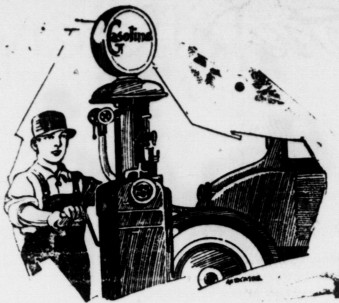

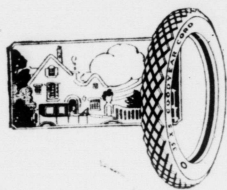

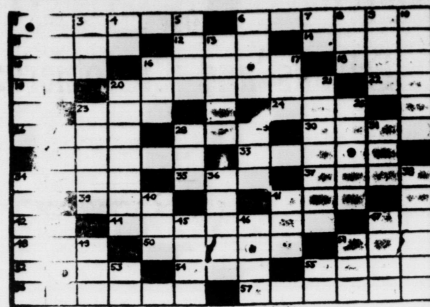
