Northwestern States Devastated By Disastrous Drouth



STARK TRAGEDY STALKS THE FARMS OF THE WEST IN WIDESPREAD DROUGHT. Leafless trees, relentless waves of dust that gradually engulf outbuildings and the very homestead itself, mark one of the nation's worst droughts. It is estimated that from 3,000,000 to 5,000,000 persons in nine states are direct sufferers from the record-breaking heat wave that centers over North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Montana and Wyoming, where temperatures have for nearly two weeks ranged above 100 degrees. Cattle in huge droves are being driven from areas where all grazing has been burned to a crisp, leaving only a surface baked and cracked with the heat.

FARMERS TO SHORT COURSE

DELEGATES FROM COUNTY AGRICULTURAL ASSN. LEAVE FOR A. & M. COLLEGE ON SATURDAY

At a meeting of the Ochiltree County Agricultural Association at the court house, Tuesday morning, delegates to the Farmers Short Course at A. & M. College which begins Monday at College Station and ends Friday, received instruction. Delegates named are W. M. Truax, F. L. Hamilton and A. C. Emberson, with Robert Lawrence and Earl Waide as alternates. It is thought that Mr. Waide will serve as alternate for Mr. Emberson. The delegates with the president of the local association, W. M. Deck who will attend as delegate at large for the state, will leave Saturday for College Station.

The delegates were instructed to attend all lectures on Pasture Improvement, Reseeding of Pastures, Cactus Control and all lectures pertaining to wind erosion and moisture conservation. In livestock division they will attend the silo and silage storage demonstrations and lectures on contagious abortion; vaccines and serums for livestock; feeding and fitting of calves for show and creep feeding of calves for pasture. They will also be present at the meat killing, curing and storing demonstration, and will hear lectures on culling, feeding, etc., of poultry. At least one of the delegates will endeavor to attend the Institute for Cooperatives, held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, where they will be told of the advantages of cooperative marketing and buying.

THOMPSON POW-WOW JULY 23RD

REAL OLD FASHIONED POLITICAL RALLY TO HONOR PANHANDLE TEXAS RAIL COMMISSIONER

Amarillo, July 15.—A real old fashioned political rally with "all the trimmings" of music, ice water and impromptu speakers from the crowd is being arranged here for Thursday night, July 23, as a homecoming celebration for Ernest O. Thompson and to let the rest of the state know that the Panhandle is "stronger than ever" for the red-headed fighter from the Plains who is chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission.

The rally will be out doors on the lawn of the Municipal Auditorium where loud-speakers will be set up to insure everyone of hearing the program.

The program will begin at 7:30 o'clock, with a concert furnished by the 142nd Infantry band, a musical organization widely known throughout the state and which has asked for permission to participate in the rally as an honor to Thompson who recently was made a full colonel in the Texas National Guard.

Colonel Thompson will bring his campaign to a close with the all-Panhandle rally. His speech, to begin at 9 o'clock, will be broadcast over the Amarillo station and a state-wide hook-up. Speakers from numerous cities of the Panhandle will speak briefly.

TIME GRANTED ON SCHOOL TAX

INTEREST-PENALTY REMITTED BEGINNING JULY 15TH AND ENDING THE FIRST OF OCTOBER

A decision was reached this week by the board of trustees of the Perryton Independent School District to remit all interest and penalty on delinquent taxes, beginning July 15 and ending Oct. 1.

The saving to the tax payer, who owes delinquent taxes will be great, Mr. Luther Wade, tax collector stated. It is thought that many tax payers will take advantage of the saving.

While tax payments have been about on par with last year it was pointed out that if delinquent taxes could be collected it would be of great assistance in financing the schools.

By direct mail, in an advertisement in this paper and by personal contact tax payers will be urged to pay back taxes if at all possible.

WPA WILL PAY HIGHER WAGES

NEW RATES RANGE FROM THIRTY CENTS TO \$1.00 AN HOUR; MAXIMUM RECEIVED IS UNCHANGED

An increase in pay for WPA workers has been authorized, according to Herbert Shindler, WPA supervisor. The new scale for skilled workers is \$1.00 per hour, for semi-skilled, 50c and for common labor 30c. While the hour rate is considerably more than paid heretofore, workers will continue to draw the same amount per month as in the past but will be required to work a shorter period.

The maximum for skilled workers for one month is \$40, for semi-skilled \$35 and common labor \$29. Under the old plan it was necessary to work 140 hours for the maximum payments, while now the hours of work will range from 40 to 97.

At the present only 25 men are employed on the swimming pool which is the only WPA project in operation. One other project, a water system at Parnsworth has been completed while two others, farm to market roads, have been suspended. Normally from 70 to 110 men are employed on WPA work but with the beginning of the harvest season the number decreased sharply.

SUMMER SCHOOL STARTS CANYON

SECOND SIX WEEKS TERM OF SUMMER SCHOOL STARTED JULY 14 AT WEST TEXAS SCHOOL

Canyon, Texas, July 7.—West Texas State Teachers College announces the opening of the second six-weeks term of summer school on July 14. 1250 people have received instruction at Canyon College during the first six weeks of the summer session. The administration of the College followed a unique program this summer in bringing to the campus a number of special attractions.

The First Annual West Texas Coaching School was one of these attractions. 110 coaches of the Panhandle-Plains region gathered to hear nine of the outstanding coaches of the United States speak on various sports.

The Palo Duro School of Arts was originated. The body of students and artists camped in Palo Duro State Park and worked with well known artists and critics of the Southwest.

The Special Lectures Series featured successful and well known men in the fields of law, medicine, government, business, art, education, Social Science, agriculture, natural science, and physical science.

Construction has kept pace with other new features of the College. The \$50,000 annex to Cousins Hall, dormitory for girls, was opened for occupancy for the first time this year.

CANDIDATE FOR REPRESENTATIVE MAY CLOSE HIS CAMPAIGN WITH SPEECH IN PERRYTON

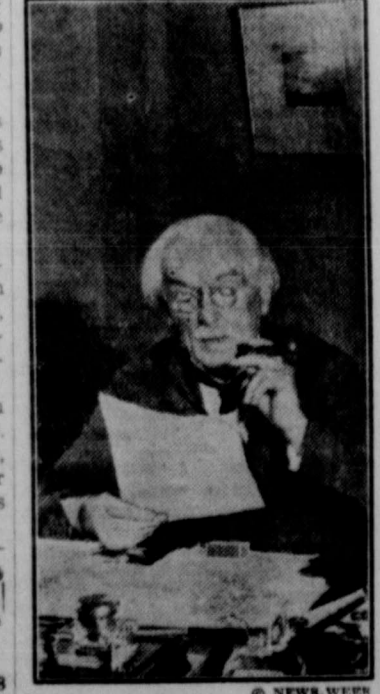

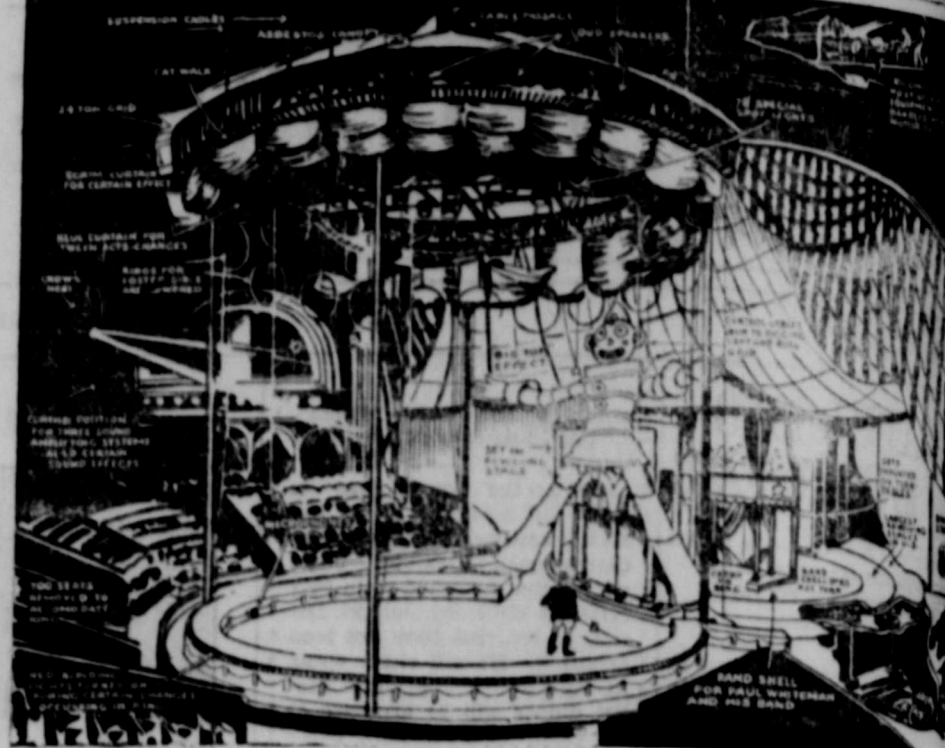

DIAMONDS REGAINING VALUE

Amsterdam, Holland—No luxury has its price so carefully "pegged" as diamonds. By carefully releasing each year a supply just sufficient to meet the demand, the Diamond Syndicate can always regulate the price per carat within a narrow margin. A good stone of one carat was worth \$750 in 1927. At the depth of the depression it never fell below \$500, and has now climbed back to \$650. Three fourths of the world crop goes to the United States which will this year invest about \$30,000,000 in diamonds for adornment and industrial uses.

CURBING STOCK GAMBLING

New York City—When, last April, brokers' loans approached \$1,000,000,000 indicating heavy speculation, the Federal Reserve Board substituted a flat 55-point margin for the previous sliding scale ranging from 25 to 55 per cent. Trading on the New York Stock Exchange dropped from 51,000,000 shares in March, to 40,000,000 in April, then nosedived to 21,000,000 in May and June. A survey conducted by the Exchange indicated that the new requirements were reducing trading; many firms put their staffs on part-time. Federal Reserve authorities are studying the survey; may reduce margin requirements to 50 points flat.

BARTER IN MUNITIONS

Athens, Greece—By a round about system of barter which even involved British market, Germany built up \$13,500,000 "frozen" credit among Greek merchants which they could translate only into goods of Reich manufacture. Then, while munition manufacturers of all nations peddled their wares to the Greek Government, Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, Reich Economics Minister, snatched the whole order for guns and shells from under their noses by swapping German munitions for the existing Reich debt to Greek industry. With the munitions go German experts—perhaps to prepare for another Balkan war.

Agricultural Adjustment

Commodity Exchange Law

This legislation sponsored by Mr. Jones for a number of years, provides for orderly marketing on the wheat and cotton exchanges and the prevention of speculation and gambling thereon.

Crop and Feed Loans

Under the provisions of this act, Ochiltree farmers and stockmen who could not obtain from any other source were able to obtain to plant their crops and feed their livestock. Jones was the author of this bill and the man responsible for its passage.

Farm Credit Administration

This legislation was written by Marvin Jones. It was through his efforts that the law was setting up for the first time in the history of the United States, a separate credit structure for agriculture. Farmers in Ochiltree county have to refinance mortgages at lower interest rates than have ever prevailed before. Debts have been scaled down.

New Soil Conservation

Marvin Jones is the author of the new Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act by which in Ochiltree county and throughout the nation receive payment for cooperating in conservation of the soil. This act contains a clause for the expansion of foreign and domestic markets for agricultural products.

Congressman Marvin Jones supported guaranteeing bank deposits to the small farmer. From 1921 to 1932, an average of 901 banks failed each year. Since the banking holiday of 1933, eight national banks have closed, 5 of which were insured during 1934 and 1935 when deposits of the depositor were insured. None of these failures in 1933 has been in Texas.

Marvin Jones' record in Congress is a service to his district and the nation as a whole. It has strengthened the influence of Marvin Jones in the service in Congress by an expression of confidence in him to the end that the people have far made in pulling out of the depression interrupted, but continued.

Citizens of Ochiltree county who do not vote for Congressman Marvin Jones can justly be charged with the rankest kind of ingratitude to a man who has steadfastly stood by his constituents. Marvin Jones is the man, who as chairman of the agricultural committee of the National House of Representatives, has framed and steered through to passage, the legislation of the AAA, thus making available the funds without which Ochiltree county and all other counties in this great drouth stricken Southwest could not have existed. It has been called to our attention that those who favor the Townsend plan are going to vote for Marvin Jones' opponent. We have been told that the Townsend plan advocates are going to vote for Miller in a block. This we cannot believe and we do not think to be the case. Many of the so-called Townsendites are people capable of good, clear, intelligent thinking. They are people we have known for years and we cannot believe that they are going to turn down a good friend like Marvin Jones for a "tin horn boom oil town lawyer" who would no doubt gladly adopt or subscribe to any kind of a platform if he thought it would get him a few votes. We ask you to give a calm, unbiased comparison to the record of the two men. Marvin Jones' record is open and above-board. Every citizen of this section knows the great service he has rendered as our representative; they know his unselfish and meritorious service in securing a New Deal for American farmers. Now check Mr. Miller's record of public service. If Miller's activities as a politician in Borger and Hutchinson county have been of service except to himself and the clique he represents, we fail to find any record of it. "Don't bite the hand that's feeding you." Vote for Marvin Jones. Let Ochiltree county show their appreciation of what he has done for us. Don't let it be said that we are a bunch of ingrates.

That old saying, "People who live in glass houses should never throw stones," should be remembered by Senator Clint Small's opponent for re-election to the Texas senate. Tottering Tom Hunter, Wichita Falls, twice defeated candidate for Governor of Texas, has just issued a blast of "free publicity," directed to the newspaper editors of the state in which he attacks Julian Capers Jr., author of the column, "Nobody's Business." Hunter charges that the column is subsidized by Jimmie Allred and that the Governor's propaganda is carried in the column. Thanks, Tom, for the tip as to the "under-cover" purport of Julian's column. Now for a tip from a country newspaper publisher to a big "oil-man politician," you might write a book for distribution to newspaper men as to just how far a newspaper can go without arousing the ire of a politician to where he suffers such great damage that he has to seek recourse through libel lawsuit.

Senator Morris Sheppard, dean of the legislative halls of the United States, delivered campaign speeches at Pampa and Amarillo this week. It was the privilege of the Herald editor to hear the Senator talk at Pampa. Panhandle and particularly Ochiltree county should give Senator Sheppard an overwhelming vote. Representatives of this county who have had occasion to visit Washington regarding development of the Ochiltree State Park have received

eration from the Senator. Although a life time foe of liquor and the author of the 18th Amendment, Senator Sheppard will return to the United States Senate with the vote of the anti-prohibitionists as well as the ardent dries. Senator Sheppard is a prohibitionist from the heart out and political policies have no part in his handling of this great debatable question.

We are indebted to J. B. Derden, Austin, Texas for a resolution recently passed by the Austin Typographical Union, commending Representative B. L. Rogers of this district for his efforts to obtain more work for the Allied Printing Trades by introducing a bill in the legislature providing for the printing of all Texas school text books in Texas printing plants. The slogan of the Texas printers is "What Texas Makes, Makes Texas." This slogan can well be adopted by communities, both large and small, just the same as a state.

Jimmie Allred is being lambasted from one end of Texas to the other by his opponents for re-election as governor and one would think, after hearing "Tottering Tom," "Big Fish" and some of the others orate, that the Governor was actually against the Texas Old Age Assistance law.

Allred was the first Texas governor to recommend old age pension legislation to the legislature and his record stands forth as one of leadership in an honest, sincere effort to secure for the old people of this state, an adequate protection against need and want during their declining years.

Allred has a record of trying to do something for the old people. His opponents have a record of nothing but talk, and you know it is always easier to talk than to do. It is easier to make plans than to execute them.

ADAIR SEEKING TREASURY POST

PROMINENT LEGIONNAIRE HAS NO APOLOGY TO MAKE FOR HIS LONG RECORD OF PUBLIC SERVICE

Austin, July 12—"The glory of Texas lies as much in the future as in the past," spoke Gariand Adair, recently, candidate for State Treasurer and chairman of the historical committee of the American Legion.

Adair, prominent Legionnaire and veteran newspaperman, originated the Centennial Commemorative half-dollars being sold at twice their face value for the construction of the Texas Memorial Museum to be erected in the Centennial year on the campus of the University of Texas.

"It is from the heroic past that we Texans should look for much guidance from our state," Adair said. "But it is to the future that we must look for our accomplishments."

Adair remarked further that the government of Texas could do well to set her house in order during the Centennial year.

"In this day of great financial trial," he declared, "Texas, for the sake of her future, should look for honest and capable guidance in public offices. It is more than a promise that I can furnish this sort of guidance in the office of State Treasurer if elected. I refer you to my record."

Adair launched the drive for the sale of 1,500,000 coins minted with the permission of Congress. His slogan was, "A Coin in Every Texas Home."

Virtually single-handed, the records show, he distributed over 40,000 coins in a relatively short period without using any of the income derived therefrom for the expense of the sale. Upon his recommendation the coin campaign was later placed in the hands of the Board of Regents of the University, trustees of the Museum, inasmuch as it would be in charge of the funds.

Adair then continued to furnish guidance for the continuation of the campaign.

Already Adair's opponents have endeavored to reflect upon his work by calling him a coin peddler. Said Adair to this:

"It is not surprising that some will always try to discourage the honest endeavor of men seeking to build public spirit. May I state that I appreciate being called a coin peddler and not a pocketeer."

He further remarked that if elected, no member of his staff would be required to return part of their salary from the State to his pockets, nor will anyone be embarrassed because of any connection with this office.

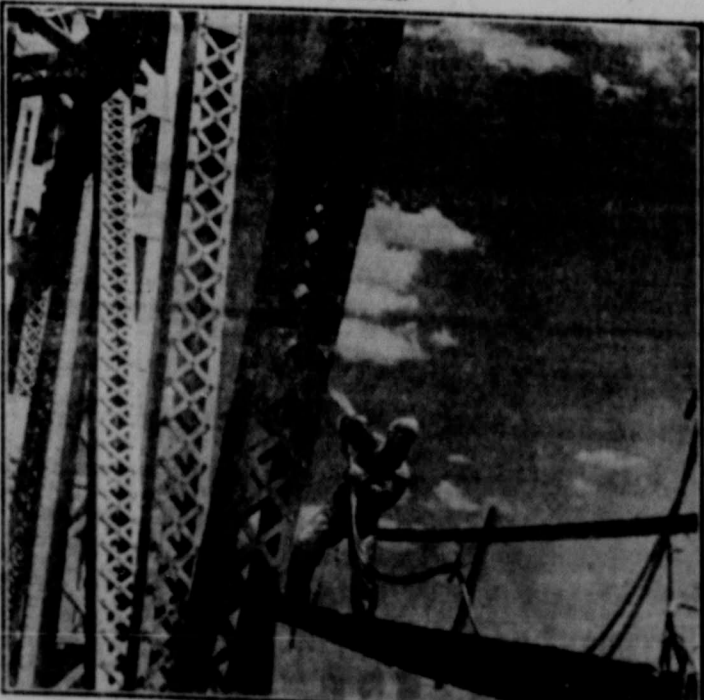

NEWS of the WEEK

BILLION A WEEK INCOME
Washington, D. C.—Final figures released by the Commerce Department place the 1935 national income at \$2,595,000,000. This compares with the peak of \$3,034,000,000 in 1929, and a low of \$2,345,000,000 in 1932. The increase over 1934 was four and a half billions, and the pay rose 7 per cent. Of all income, 97 per cent went to labor.

STRIKERS RETURN TO WORK
Perryton, O.—Ending 52 days of idleness, 5,500 employees of the Wheeling Steel Corporation returned to work this week. The union gained full recognition and an agreement to arbitrate wages and hours of labor within two weeks.

UNION: SAM REDUCES INTEREST
Washington, D. C.—Following a reduction in the interest charged by the Treasury Department on loans to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, the latter has reduced its interest rates to banks and re-evaluated its loans from 4 to 3 per cent, with corresponding reductions in other classes of loans to industry.

FAR WEST GETS RELIEF
Chicago, Ill.—After losses running into millions of dollars and nearly a thousand deaths, ten days of record-breaking heat ended when cool winds and rain swept Eastward from the Rocky Mountains and dropped temperatures in the drought-belt from the 100's to the 40's. While huge crops have been burned, cattle raisers hope to save most of their herds.

RAILROAD PENSIONERS PAID
Washington, D. C.—Initial checks sent out by the Railroad Retirement Board ranged from \$13.55 to \$91.04, representing the first payment ever made to other than government employees under Federal-regulated old-age pensions. Four thousand railroad workers are eligible at once for monthly payments for life, and 20,000 more have filed applications for same.

BRYAN'S DAUGHTER WEDS
New Hyde Park, N. J.—In the presence of President Roosevelt, Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, daughter of William Jennings Bryan and now U. S. Minister to Denmark, was married to Capt. Boerge Rohde, of Copenhagen, gentleman-in-waiting to the King of Denmark. Because she once before lost her American citizenship through marriage to a foreigner and had to re-naturalize, Mrs. Rohde, while a member of Congress, sponsored a law making it possible for American women to retain their citizenship when marrying foreigners.

PATENT OFFICE CENTENARY
Washington, D. C.—This week marks the 100th anniversary of the existing United States Patent Laws. Patent No. 1 was granted to Senator John Ruggles of Maine, July 13th, 1836, for a cog device designed to permit locomotive operation on steep grades. Since then 2,046,000 patents have been issued.

UP TO HIS EYES IN DEBT
San Jose, Cal.—WPA workers have unearthed the world's heaviest debtor. Thirty-nine years ago he borrowed \$100 with interest at 10 per cent per month, compounded monthly. He owes to date \$304,840,332, or 16, or more money than there is in the world. He has repaid \$19.36.

OLYMPIC CASH POURS IN
New York City—Aroused by the announcement that the U. S. Olympic Fund was shy \$149,924 of the \$20,000 needed to finance a full American representation at the Berlin games next month, athletes and sportsmen have been pouring contributions upon the committee. A former mortgagee his Virginia estate, a field hockey player sold his car; a girl runner pawned her engagement ring. Cities are sending teams to finance favorite entrants. "If this country can't raise \$350,000

to send the pick of its younger athletes into Olympic competition," cried the veteran sports-writer Grantland Rice, "then there must be something badly decayed in our national spirit."

Explaining her determination Miss Janis says, "I intend to keep nothing for myself. . . I want to help poor children and the poor. . . this is a divine inspiration from God."

TUSKEGEE TO TEACH COOKS
Tuskegee, Ala.—In order that the art and traditions of true southern cooking may be preserved, Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute will next term add a course in cooking, for which fifteen enrollees have already been made. The suggestion was made by two hotel men in order that a supply of competent negro cooks would be assured.

La Paz, Bolivia.—"All citizens must aid in the post-war reconstruction of our country." This simple edict ended unemployment in this South American republic, because here are more jobs than workers, and it sent every male from 18 to 60 to work on government projects. The blow fell most heavily on several thousand veterans of the Chaco War, who have retired on fat pensions.

PRESIDENT TAKES TO SEA
Rockland, Mo.—Arriving here after dedicating the new \$60,000,000 Tri-Borough Bridge in New York, President Roosevelt boarded the choicer yacht Sewanna for a fortnight's cruise along the North Atlantic seaboard. He will continue his vacation for about three weeks.

THE CAPITOL WEEK
Washington, D. C.—The White House has cautioned all department and bureau heads "to set up substantial reserves" in order to effect savings and also prepare for unforeseen emergencies during the new fiscal year. . . National Resources Committee has reported to the President that 175,000 separate Federal State and local governmental bodies function throughout the nation, causing enormous waste and inefficiency. It is urged that plans be made for coordinating their duties and eliminate conflict and duplication. . . The Treasury Department reports an increase in internal revenue receipts for the fiscal year of 1936 of \$673,000,000. Total collections from corporations were \$738,672,854; from individuals \$674,248,346. Not included in the above totals were agricultural processing taxes of \$71,333,614. . . The State Department extended for another year the tariff reductions provided in a reciprocal trade agreement with Russia, on the latter's promise to buy \$30,000,000 worth of American goods.

"In making brine for onions, dairy salt is used," stated Miss Marie Ludwick, home demonstration agent at the meeting of the Ochiltree club in the home of Mrs. Jim Dodson on Wednesday, July 15, at two o'clock.

"The water for brine if hard should be boiled and allowed to cool. Vinegar may be added to soften the water. Use two pounds of salt to a gallon of water and test brine with a salinometer. For onions the test should be 80 degrees and 40 degrees for cucumbers. A fresh egg may also be used to test the brine. For five gallons of cucumbers it takes two and one half gallons of brine." These were other points brought out by Miss Ludwick in her discussion.

Three hundred actors, a hundred head of horses, Longhorns, burros, oxen and mustang ponies figure in this great Cavalcade of Texas, the biggest show at the Exposition. Above, eight of the men who portray outstanding Texans sign their names above genuine signatures of heroes of the Republic.

TEACHERS PROTEST QUERIES

Portland, Ore.—Nearly 10,000 teachers gathered for the 74th Annual Convention of the National Education Association, were confronted with huge signs: "Do you believe in God?" "Do you believe in any of the doctrines of communism?" "Have you ever been in Russia?" They were sponsored by communist-baiting Representative Thomas L. Blanton, of Texas, and aroused a furore among the delegates. Speeches roundly scored teachers' oaths, condemned compulsory military training in schools and colleges and the underpayment of women teachers.

TWO UNIVERSITIES CELEBRATE

London, Eng.—London University is celebrating its 200th anniversary, with 67 schools and 14,000 students. This Autumn many of them will use for the first time the new buildings erected with the assistance of a gift of \$2,000,000 from the Rockefeller Foundation, New York. Much older, Germany's Heidelberg University is celebrating its 550th anniversary. To the latter celebration only 24 American Universities sent representatives, and six Americans received honorary degrees.

SALT HALTS PROSTRATIONS

Detroit, Mich.—Local physicians basking arthritis sufferers in a 150-degree temperature discovered that salt water reduced the number of heat prostrations under the treatment. On hot days from 300 to 400

workers at the Ford Motor plants would report for first aid because of heat exhaustion. Now near all drinking fountains in the works are salt tablet dispensers. The tablets look like 5 grain aspirin pills, are taken with plenty of water, on a recent day with the outside temperature at 104 only four men sought hospital treatment.

DROUGHT DAMAGE \$250,000,000

Washington, D. C.—All Government agencies are rushing plans for relieving distress caused by the drought throughout the South, Midwest and Northwest. Damage is already estimated at a quarter of a billion and \$5,000,000 has been allocated at once to move cattle from parched areas. Secretary of Agriculture Wallace states that the "situation today looks as bad as it did in 1934."

WHOLESALE HANDSHAKING

Oklahoma City, Okla.—The Chamber of Commerce is considering Roscoe E. Dickson's recipe for increased civic pride. He suggests that once a day, at an unannounced hour, all the city's fire sirens would go off at once. Thereupon every citizen would turn to the person next to him, shake hands vigorously and exclaim "We're living in the finest city in the United States!"

TAGGING THE LOBBYISTS

Baton Rouge, La.—Some estimate of the State Legislature's respect for lobbyists is contained in a bill now pending therein. If passed, it would require all representatives of special interests to give \$1,000 to a special Legislative entertainment fund, contribute thereto half of all over \$10 a day they earned and identify themselves by wearing green skull caps and gaudy plaid trousers.

DIRIGIBLE BREAKS RECORD

Frankfort, Germany.—The Zeppelin Hindenberg completed her fourth round trip to the U. S. with a record homeward journey of 45 hours, about 2 hours better than her previous mark.

"The first thing to do in brining is to get all equipment ready," stated Miss Marie Ludwick, county home demonstration agent to the Missouri Avenue club which met in the home of Mrs. J. D. Copeland, Wednesday, July 8th, at 2:30 p. m.

Stone jars are the best containers for small quantities of pickles as they contain no objectionable odors," continued Miss Ludwick. Kegs or urrels are best for larger quantities, they should first be charred or ashed with lye solution to remove lye or flavors. After using lye be sure that it is all soaked out. A vinegar rinse is very helpful to remove lye.

Use silver skinned onions that have dried out for about two weeks in pickling. Dip in hot water to slip in peeling. Then let stand for hours in cold water before brining. Use an 80 per cent solution or about two pounds of coarse salt to a gallon of water for onions. A salinometer and scales assure accuracy measurements. Distilled vinegar is preferable for onions.

Mars Outdistanced

WORSE THAN WAR

WARS under 300,000
AUTOS almost 400,000

In many respects the problem of automobile accidents is worse than war. During the last 15 years the number of deaths from automobile accidents in this country has approximated 400,000. But during the 15 years constituting the total length of time of all the wars in which this country as a nation has been engaged, the number killed and who died of wounds received in action has been less than 200,000. The total war dead is exceeded by 55 per cent by the record of deaths on streets and highways in the last 15 years.

In the last 10 years, according to the Travelers Insurance Company, deaths from automobile accidents increased from 21,628 in 1925 to more than 36,000 for 1935—a gain of 67 per cent. During this same period, the number of cars on the road increased only 31 per cent, and the population of the country increased only 11 per cent. Deaths gained twice as much as the number of cars in use and six times as much as the increase in population.

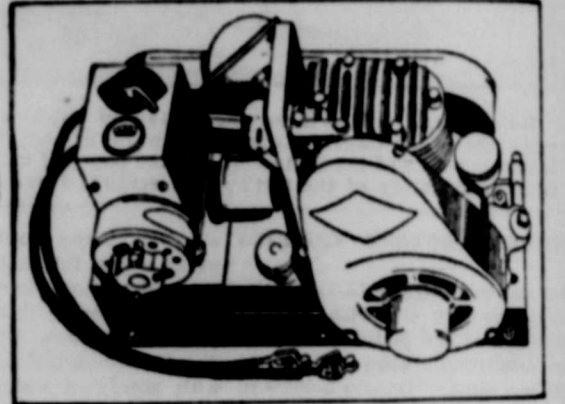

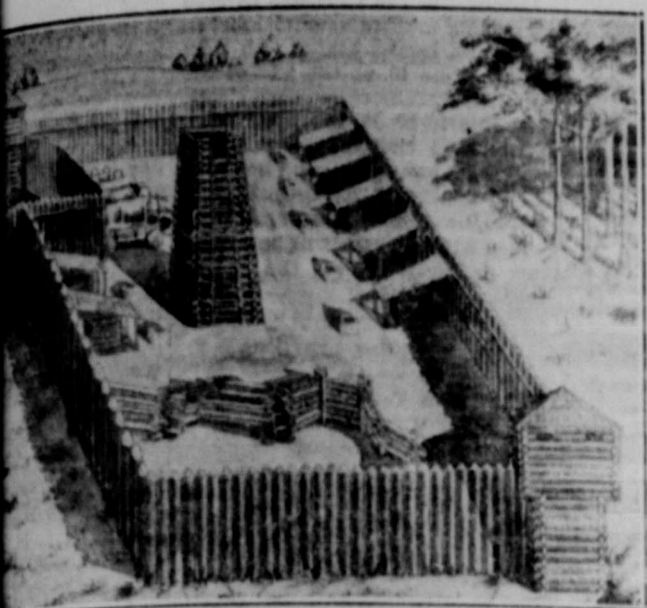

ALLRED GAINS PRIMARY NEARS

RISE OF TIDE OF CONVICTION IS SWEEPING STATE THAT HE WILL BE ELECTED FIRST PRIMARY

Austin—(SPL)—Consistently holding his campaign on the plane of "issues rather than personalities," where he set it in his own opening speech, Governor James V. Allred continued his campaign for a second term in office through West Texas this week.

His record as governor is the basis of his request for re-election. Allred has told audiences already in North, East and West Texas. That same record will be cited by him to Central Texas audiences during the remainder of this week.

"The Allred record" includes: Inauguration of the first comprehensive social security program in the history of Texas, including, of course, old age assistance payments which began July 1 to more than 40,000 of the state's aged needy; an actual ad valorem tax reduction of 15 cents on the \$100 valuation that cut \$4,787,400 from the tax bill of Texas taxpayers during 1935; advocacy of a natural resources tax increase, but limited so as not to handicap Texas products in the world market; establishment of a "clemency-by-merit-only" policy and the voluntary parole board system as forward steps in convict rehabilitation work; highest appropriation for schools and rural aid in the history of the state.

In addition to citing the record of his past performances Governor Allred also has pledged in speeches delivered during the last ten days that the social security program will be broadened to include unemployment insurance and other phases of social welfare, as well as old age assistance.

In his speech at Atlanta he assured Texas farmers that they will get their share of Federal agricultural benefit funds through a coordination of this state's agricultural program with that laid out in the Federal Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act.

Although a rising tide of conviction that Governor Allred will be renominated in the first primary apparently is sweeping the state, that question of course will not be definitely answered before July 25.

HOLD MOISTURE WHEN IT FALLS

SOIL CONSERVATION OFFICIALS SAY "STOP FLOODS AT THE GRASS ROOTS" AND RAISE CROPS

Flood control begins at the grass roots, say soil conservation men in the United States Department of Agriculture. What they mean is that run-off should be controlled for an entire watershed; from the crest of the hills right down to the mouth of the rivers.

In the uplands, at the headwaters of all streams, nature, if undisturbed, retards run-off by throwing across practically every foot of land under forest or grass cover—a maze of "slow," "stop," and "detour" signs, an interlacing system of tiny dams. A dead leaf, a blade of grass, or a root tangle stops a raindrop from running—changes its direction again and again, makes it creep away. Floods are made up of rain drops infinitely multiplied and brought together in a hurry.

Farmers are adapting nature's method of flood control when they keep their fields rough and plant soil holding water-impeding crops. In contour farming each furrow, each tiny narrow scratch, becomes a small dam or terrace—doubly effective when reinforced by grass cover.

Department conservationists do not offer "flood control at the grass roots" as a substitute for dams and spillways farther down the valleys. They offer it as a reinforcement, because it makes water creep away and in so doing stores most of it in that greatest of all reservoirs, the soil.

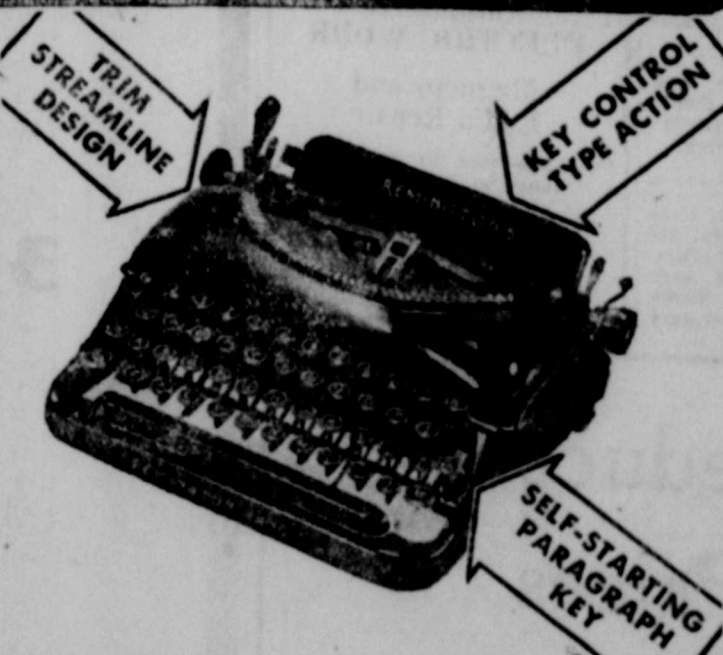

for Region Six goes further in aiding in flood control by a system of level terraces with closed ends and by contour farming. This system of farming with terraces holds all the rainfall, allowing none of it to go into the streams.

Since moisture is a limiting factor in the high plains, it is necessary to conserve all the rain that falls for crop and pasture production.

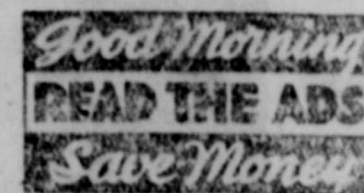
