Hornets Sting Steers --

## Sudan Takes District 3-A Championship

The Sudan Hornets withstood a fourth quarter rally by the Farwell Steers to capture the district 3-A championship and the right to play the Ralls Jackrabbits for bi-district in Lubbock tonight. The Steers came back from a 24-3 third period deficit to within 6 points of the Hornets, but time was on Sudan's side and the game ended before the Steers could

get on the scoreboard again. Al Phillips led the Steer offense with 90 yards and 10 points. Dean Stovall racked up 83 yards on six pass receptions and scored the remainder of the Steer points.

Sudan won the toss of the coin and elected to receive. The opening kickoff went to Larry Hanna on the ten-yard line and the action started from there. The first break went to the

Steers as Kyle Sheets recovered a second down fumble on the Sudan 20. The Blue and White could not move in for the score but settled for the next best thing as Al Phillips booted a field goal from 25 yards out to give Farwell a 3-0 edge with 10:29 remaining in the first period of play.

Sudan took the kick and moved to their 48 before the Steer defense cut them off and forced a punt. A case of opening period jitters caused Dean Stovall to fumble the kick and Mickey Gilbert recovered for the Hornets. The Hornets were unable to capitalize as the Steer defense thwarted Steve Martin's passing attack to regain possession on their own 23. Neither offensive unit could keep the ball and Farwell was left with possession on their own one following the exchange of punts. The Steers were again forced to punt to Jerry Bellar who almost went all the way before being brought down on the Farwell 22 by Robby Mahaney. Sudan was again unable to score as a tough defense came through for Farwell. Punts were exchanged again and the Steers went into the second period owning the ball on their 26-yard line. They moved nearly to midfield before a Hargrove fumble was recovered by Tim Nix for the Hornets.

Sudan then moved 45 yards in seven plays with Jerry Bellar going in from seven yards out. Hanna carried for the extra points and Sudan led with 6:22 remaining in the first half.

The kick was fumbled with Bellar recovering for Sudan. The Hornets could not penetrate the Steer defense but Jerry Bellar booted a 20-yard field goal to give the Hornets an 11-3 lead with 4:19 remaining in the half.

### Billy Billingsley Services Held

Funeral services were held last Friday at Charles V. Steed Memorial Chapel for Billy Frank Billingsley, 46, brother of Mayor Howard Billingsley of Texico and son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Billingsley of Farwell. Mr. Billingsley, a former resident of the Texico-Farwell and Oklahoma Lane communities, passed away in a Big Spring hospital on Wednesday following an extended illness. He had suffered with diabetes for years but his condition did not become critical until only a few days before his death.

Mr. Billingsley had been a resident of Big Spring since 1961 and had lived in this area most of his life until moving to the Texas city. He operated the Alamo Motel in Big Spring from 1961 until 1967 when it was converted into the community house for the Texas State Hospital. He continued to run the community house for the state.

He was a member of the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church. Officiating at last rites was Rev. Lee Butler, state hospital chaplain. Burial was at Mission Garden of Memories, directed by Steed-Todd Funeral Home. Survivors include his widow, Billie Ruth; three sons, Darwin, Clovis, Terry Lee and Gary D., both of Big Spring; the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Billingsley, Farwell; and brothers, Howard of Texico and Leon of Farwell.

## Organize Football Boosters Club

Recently, an organization known as Texico Booster Club was organized. Express purpose of the group is the bringing of football to Texico School and the community. In recent years much discussion of having football in the school has been held, but it was not until recently when a group of interested citizens took the matter in hand, sent out letters to area residents, and called a meeting, that anything concrete was done about the matter.

At the meeting, with some 30 persons in attendance and another 15 expressing their desire to be present but had former engagements, the group agreed to try and raise funds to field a football team in 1969-70. The school is in agreement that they will go along with the program, if the necessary funds are raised to finance the program.

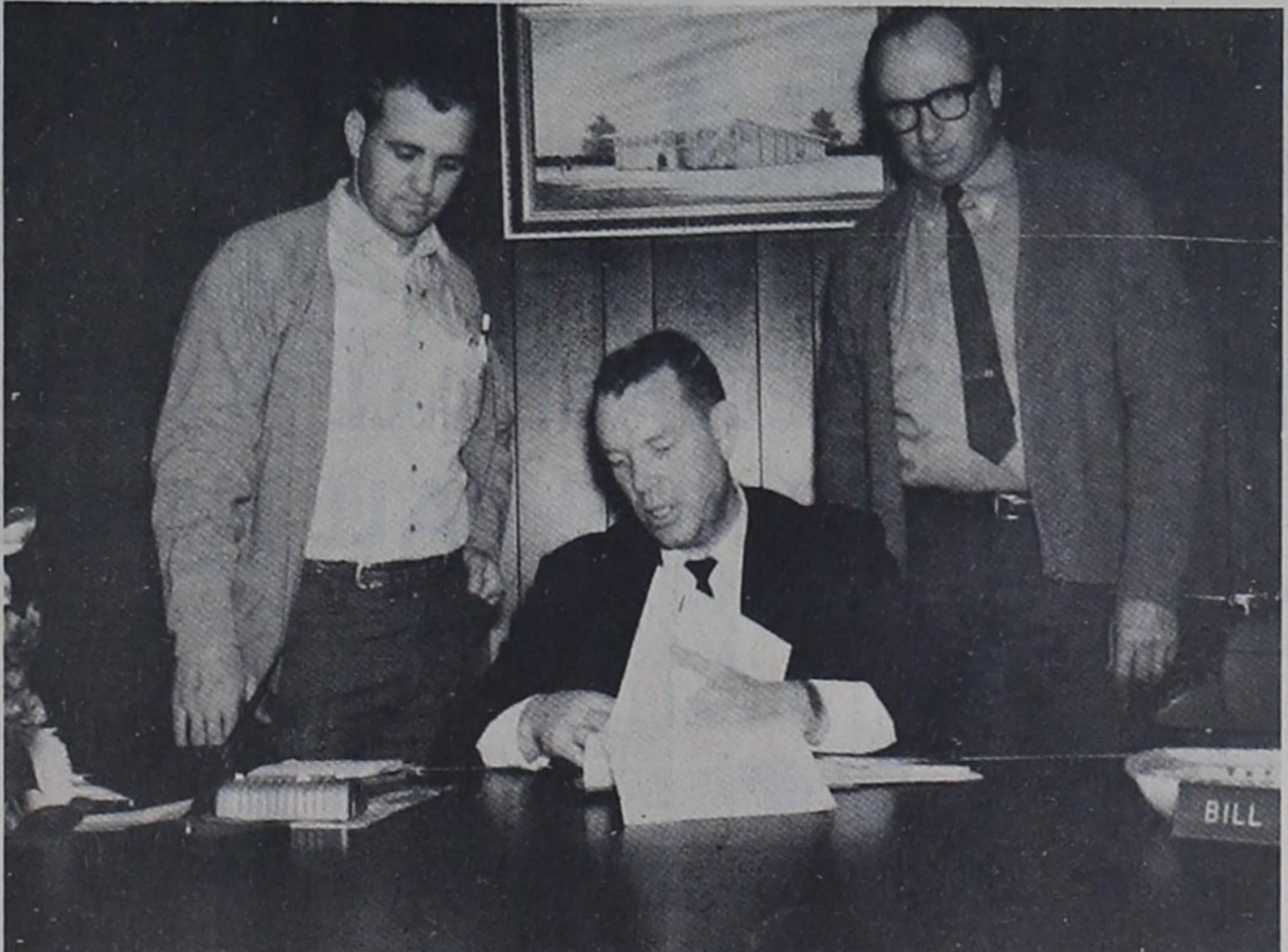
Officers for the group were elected and a fund raising drive begun. Chairman of the group is Melvin Burns. Other officers include Bill Christian, treasurer and finance chairman, and Roy Snodgrass, secretary.

A minimum figure of \$10,000 was set for the group to raise and within less than two weeks well over one third the necessary amount is in hand and an additional several hundred dollars has been pledged to the fund. Finance chairman Christian indicated that the amount set as a goal is not concrete and can be lowered or raised as the need arises; (some equipment is expected to cost less than had been predicted) and much of the construction of the field can and will be done with

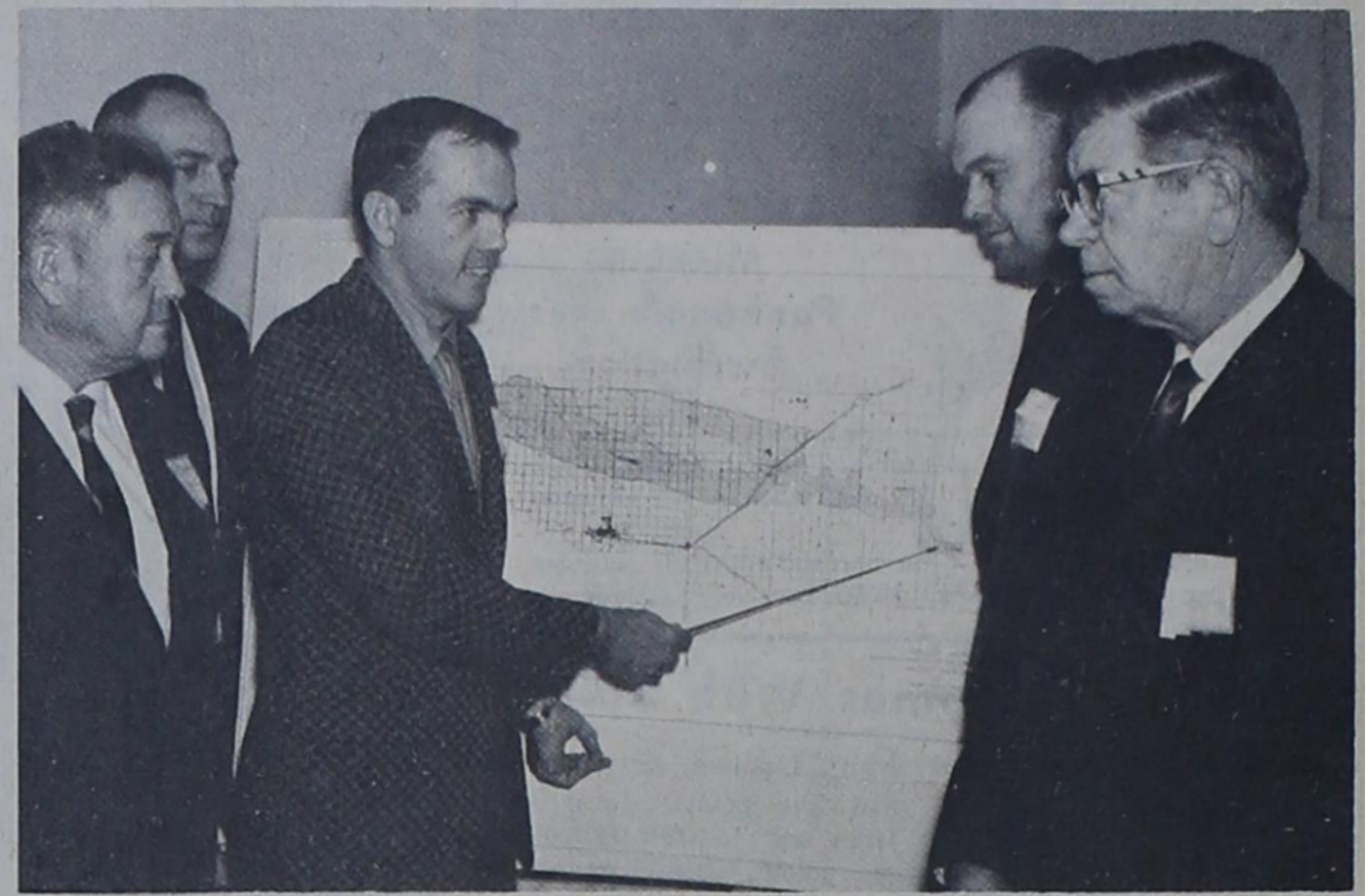
volunteer labor, thus eliminating an additional part of the fund.

Chairman Burns has appointed committees to head finances, activities for raising needed funds, and for construction of the playing field and also a practice field. Heading the various committees are Bill Christian, A. D. McDonald, construction, and Jim Pierce, activity.

Next meeting for the group, and all persons who are interested in seeing football become a part of the curriculum at Texico school, has been set for 8 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 3, at the high school cafeteria in Texico. If you want football in Texico school, be sure to be on hand for this important meeting, says Melvin Burns.

## Watershed Project One Step Closer

Running Water Draw Watershed Project came one step closer to reality last week when representatives held an important meeting in Clovis. Local sponsors of the project are from Parmer County in Texas and Curry County in New Mexico. The sponsors met to study a work plan, prepared by the Soil Conservation Service, and paid for by the sponsors, who include Parmer County Commissioners Court and Parmer County and Soil and Water Conservation District.

Interested local, state and federal agencies were present to review and comment on the recently completed watershed work plan. After their review,

the local sponsors from Parmer and Curry Counties approved and signed the work plan.

The Running Water Draw Watershed Project covers 356 square miles in Parmer County and Curry County.

Primary purpose of the project is watershed protection and flood prevention. The plan calls for two dams on Running Water Draw and one on Catfish Draw. One dam will be located eight miles north of Clovis, one north of Bovina, and one northeast of Lazbuddie.

Following the meeting, the Work Plan was presented to the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Board who in turn will recommend it to the Governor

of Texas. The Plan will then be sent to Washington, D.C., for presentation to Congress where it is hoped that it will be accepted and appropriations made available.

Attending the meeting from Parmer County were County Commissioners Raymond Tredler, Jr., Charley Jefferson, Tom Lewellen and Guy Cox; and Soil and Water District Directors Leon Grissom, Alton Morris, Dick Rockey, A. L. Black and Vernon Estes; and representatives from the Friona Soil Conservation office.

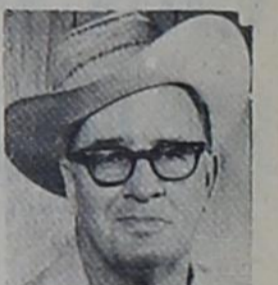
In the weekly contest Skippy Magness called ten games correctly and missed the tiebreaker score by only nine points to take top weekly prize. Danny

Linda Suttle again took scoring honors for the freshmen

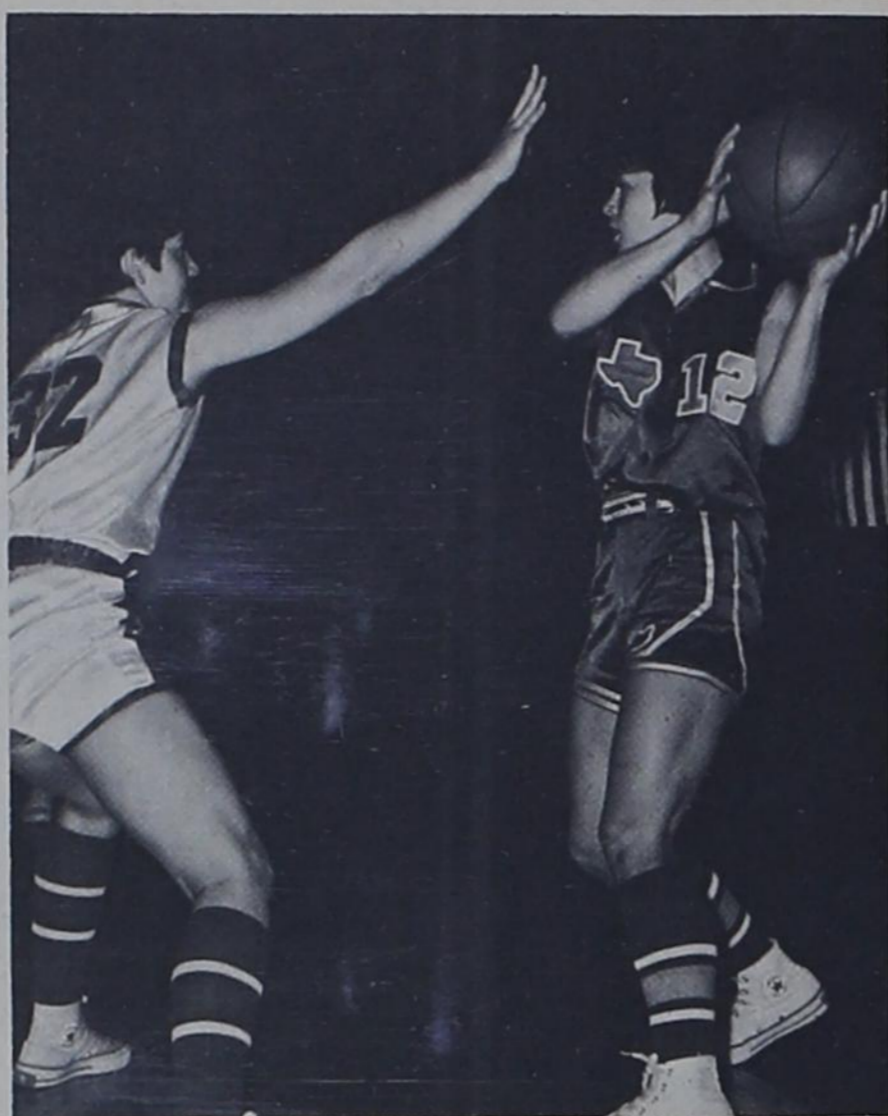
with 34 points. Kristy Taylor had five points; Jana Bass, four; and Jo Dell Goldsmith, two points. Guards were Coffman, Foster and White.

girls have played four practice games this year. Miss Nicholas invites all parents to back the basketball teams by encour-

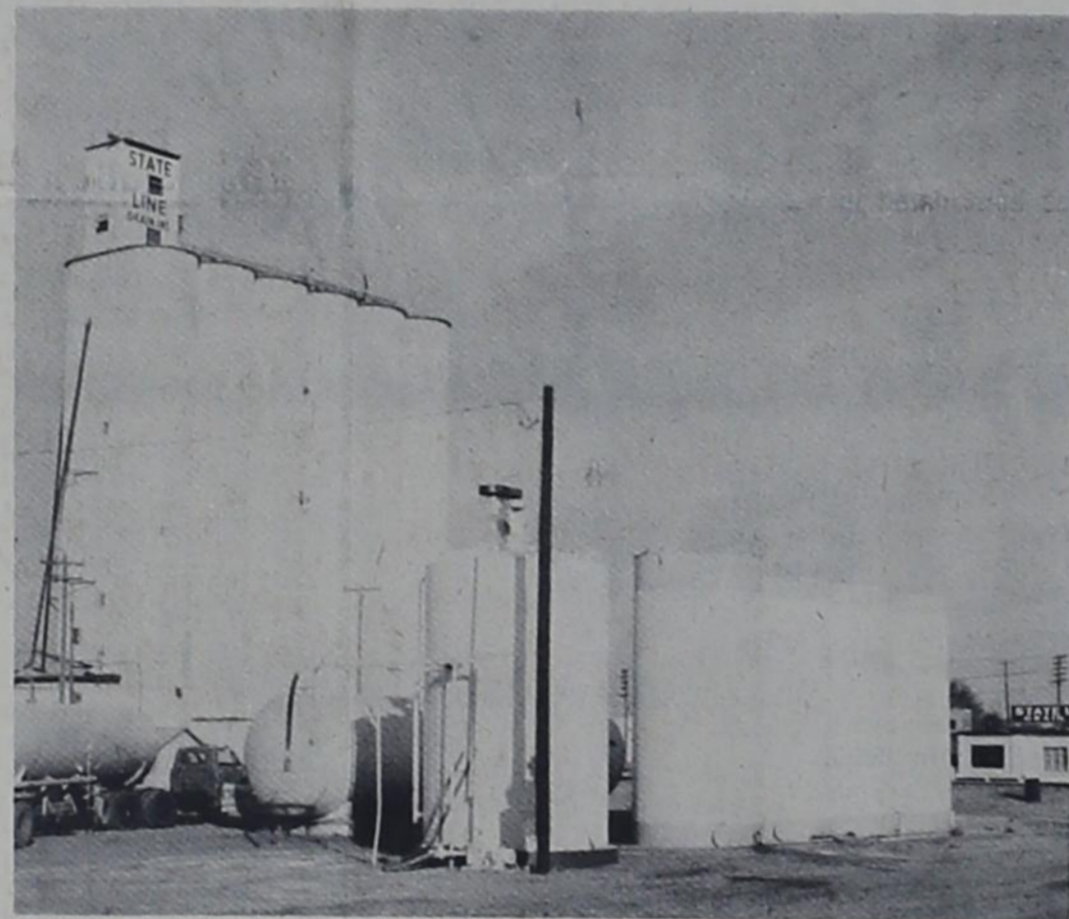
aging their daughters to participate and to attend all games. "They need your support," she stressed.

One of the better known and without a doubt, "best loved," persons in Texico-Farwell is Mrs. Nannie Hines, who has called the Twin Cities area home since the middle 1920's. Her late husband, Bob Hines, was a trucker in the area for many years.

Mrs. Hines is mother of seven children, four of whom were children of both Mr. Hines and herself by former marriages. "I never think of the children as anything but my own," said Mrs. Hines, when she explained about the family, who all call her "mom". She is also grandmother to 18 children and great-grandmother of an additional 19 children.

"The Lord has been good to me," stated Mrs. Hines as she told how each of her days is filled to capacity with doing for and sharing with others. One of the greatest joys she has is baking goodies for her children and grandchildren and making

clothing for them. She does little handwork now, but in former years much of her time was spent in making beautiful pieces of handwork.

She tells how she has always worked, either in the field alongside the children, helping her husband in his business, or baby sitting. This has been an enjoyable and also profitable part of Mrs. Hines' life. She said, "some of the kids with whom I baby sit now are children of some of the first children I sat with!" She is a member of the local Methodist Church and keeps its nursery each Sunday morning. "I just try to be a good neighbor and give help where it is needed most," said this lady who has been a member of the Methodist church for over half a century.

Each year she cans fruits and vegetables for her own pantry and that of her children and grandchildren, and also of-

1 cup quick oatmeal  
1 cup coconut

Nuts may be added if desired. Drop by spoonful on waxed paper and allow to cool before storing.

### COLE SLAW DRESSING

2 eggs beaten  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup vinegar  
1 teaspoon dry mustard  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Mix ingredients and place on stove, allow to cook until thick. Remove, pour into container for storing and place in refrigerator. Thin with milk if mixture is too thick when ready for use.

### LEMON POUND CAKE

1 1/2 cups granulated sugar  
2 cups flour  
2 sticks oleomargarine  
5 eggs  
2 lids (teaspoons) lemon extract.  
Melt oleo, add sugar and eggs beating well; now add flour and extract, beat until well blended and pour into well greased and floured tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees until toothpick inserted in cake comes out clean. Remove from oven, turn from pan and allow to cool before serving.

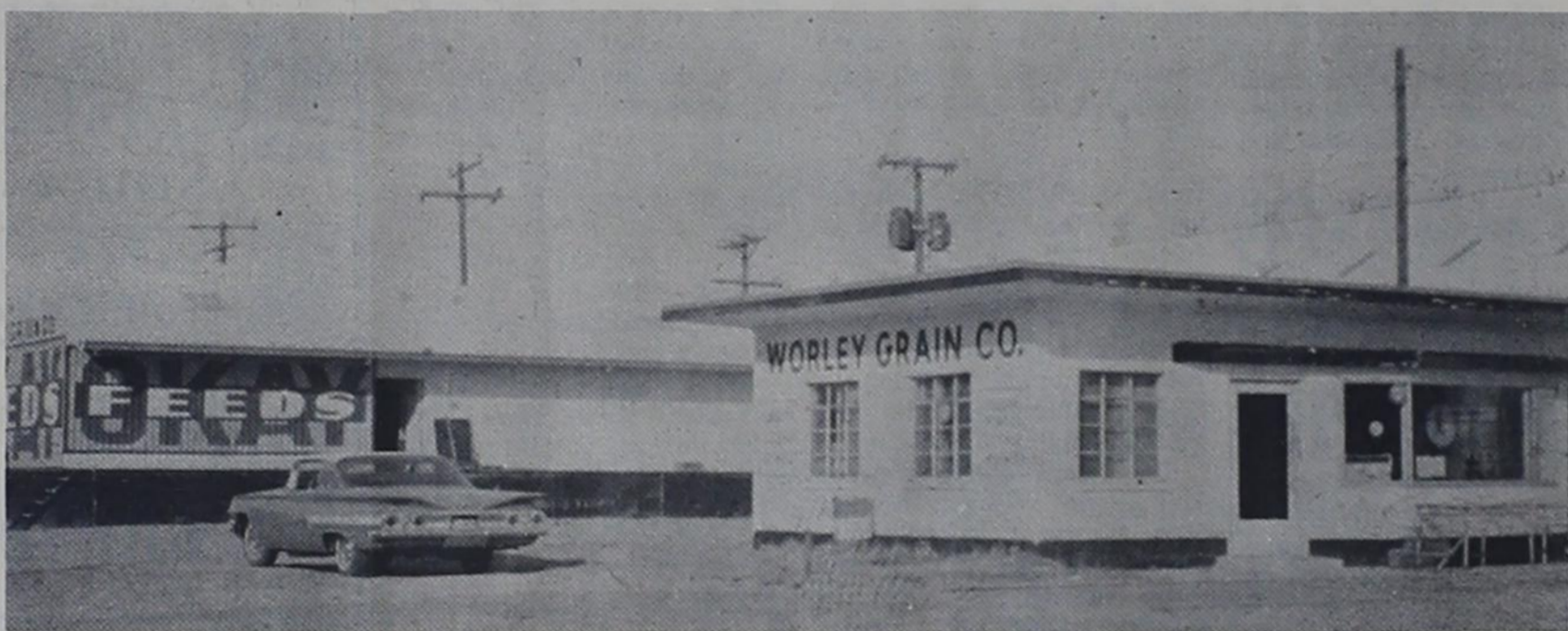

# NURSERY NEWS

By Alvin Woodburn  
Garden Center Nursery

"How many shade trees can you put into an empty yard?" "Only one; after the first one, the yard is no longer empty."

With the weather as cool as it is and having had our first snow of the season, we have been asked if now is really the time to plant shade trees. We think that now is a very good time to do more than just plan where the shade pattern should be; we can now plant some of the better adapted trees which will give us that pattern during next year's summer.

Looking at a tree on a still day, a person will notice there is enough movement of the air to stir the leaves. This is brought about by a thermal reaction of the hot air. Being lighter, hot air will rise and the shade of the tree, cooling a spot, will draw the cooler air to the person under the tree, cooling a spot, will draw tree. That, in effect, creates not only a spot protected from the sun, but also a cooler spot due to thermal action of the air movement.

The number of trees that a person should plant depends on several things, such as their growth habit, the desired effect, amount of available plant food and water, and numerous other things. The choice of trees is more or less personal. That is, a person can express his own desire; that he likes this tree or does not like another. Probably the fastest growing one is not always the most desirable tree to plant. Characteristics of each tree should be studied and allowances made for normal growth and then a person can create the effect that he wants.

Some of the most popular trees for this area include the fruitless mulberry, the three or four varieties of ash, sycamore, poplars, mimosa, gladiators or honey locust, a number of variations of the black locust, tulip tree, hawthorn, hackberry, Russian olive, walnut, maple, redbud, golden rain tree, Kentucky coffee tree, as well as most varieties of fruit trees and, of course, the elm.

Next week, we will try to point out some of the good and bad points of some of these. We do have a large variety of trees that are readily adapted to this area where nature provided us with none.

The award is based on the company's safety performance from July 1967 through June 1968. During this period, the firm's drivers operated approximately 2,000,000 miles and had 3.97 accidents per 1,000,000 miles of operation. The record of 3.97 accidents per 1,000,000 miles of operation represents a reduction in frequency of accidents of nearly 50% and is much lower than

the national average for competing fleets of 12.83 accidents per 1,000,000 miles.

Jerry Hays of Plainview is the division safety and personnel supervisor responsible for the training programs which contributed to the award.

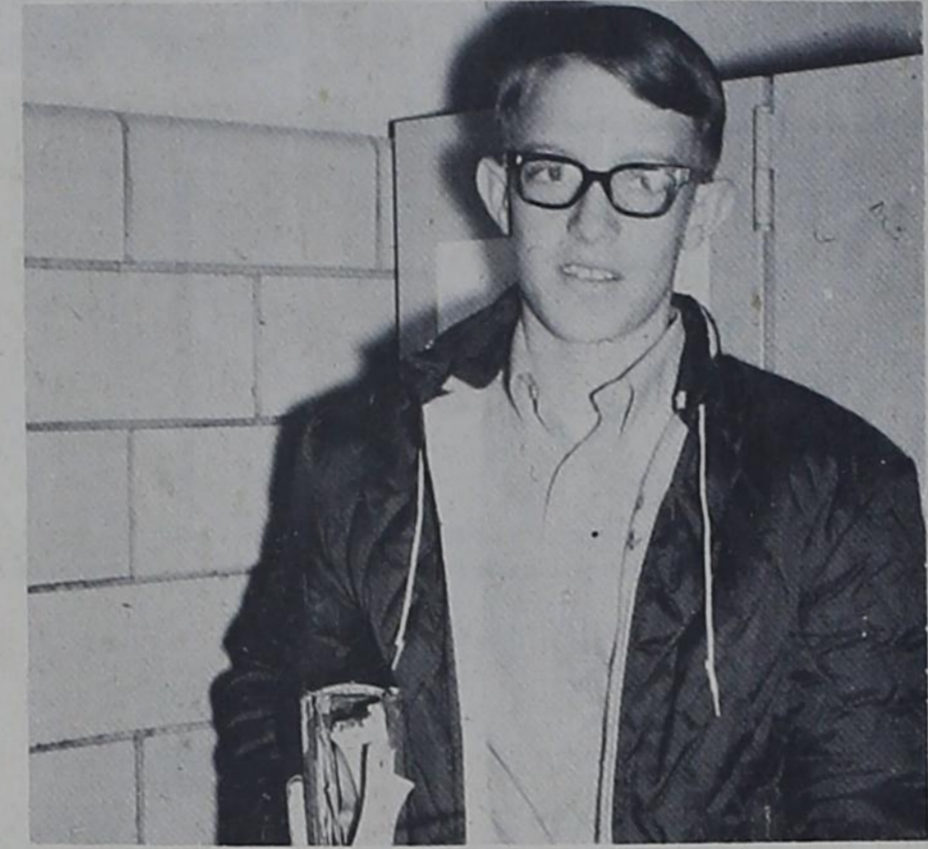

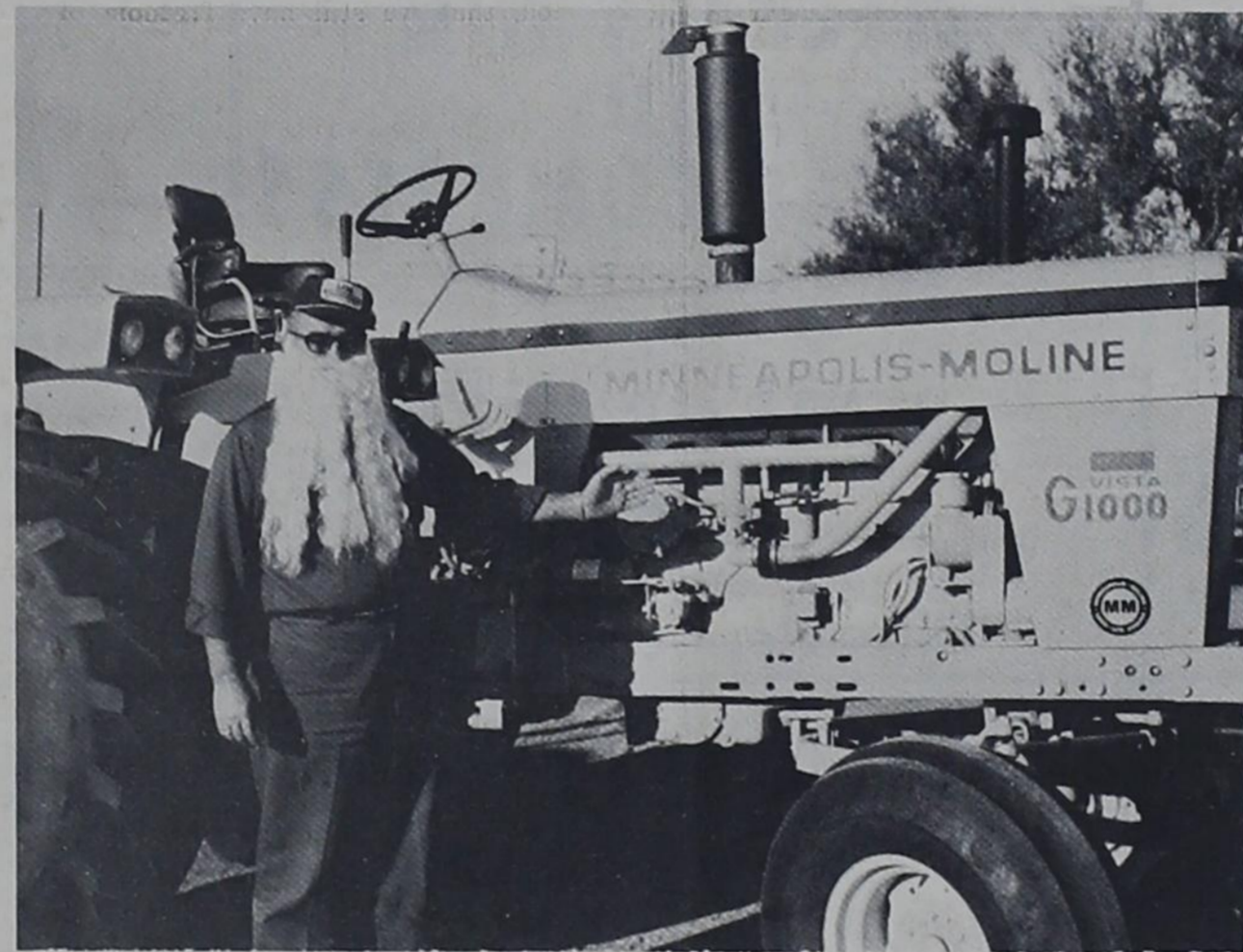
