

Allied Troops In New Italy Gains

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Naples, May 13 (AP)—Allied troops, on the offensive in Italy, smashed deeper tonight into the heavily-fortified Gustav Line, increasing the gains of two miles or more that they had recorded during the day but encountering grim resistance from the Germans in strong mountain positions.

Exact locations of the gains could not be disclosed pending tomorrow's daily communique, but already the Allies hold at least five villages and seven strategic hills and were going ahead after the close of the second day of their big push aimed at destroying the Germans in Italy.

Russian Planes Are Reported Striking Latvia

LONDON, May 13 (AP)—The Soviet high command announced tonight Russian bombers attacking German military trains and stores at Daugavpils (Dvinsk) in Latvia and Tartu in Estonia had touched off violent explosions and fires Friday night in a possible prelude to a fresh Red army northern offensive.

The German high command also indicated that Russian troops in force had smashed across the Moldava river, 60 miles inside Romania, when it told of fighting between Romanian soldiers and a full Soviet rifle division on the west bank of that river.

Neither the Germans nor the Russians mentioned the lower Dniester river section near Tiraspol, where Berlin had declared that a Russian bridgehead had been erased and where Moscow said German counterattacks had failed.

No essential changes occurred on the long land front, Moscow said.

In all sectors during Friday's fighting Russian forces wrecked 40 enemy tanks and 28 planes, the communique said.

Pouncing on a Norway-bound German convoy in the Barents sea last Thursday Russian planes of the far northern command sank eight ships—two convoys totaling 12,000 tons, four escort vessels, a minesweeper and a coastguard cutter, the supplement said. Six German aircraft also were declared shot down.

Big Spring Seeks Seven-Unit Bids

Moving to start work at the earliest possible moment in the development of a supplemental water supply, the City of Big Spring advertised today for bids on the first of a seven-unit contract for this purpose.

Bids were asked for development of eight wells in northeastern Glasscock county, near the Sterling county line. These will be opened at 8 p. m. on May 29 and work is due to start by June 6. Efforts to expedite the project, for which the city has voted \$400,000 in bonds and the Federal Works Agency has advanced \$410,000, were redoubled Saturday after it was disclosed that efforts to develop a quick temporary supply in the "Morgan area," spotted by geologists as a possible additional source of water, resulted in three very light producers. The territory is three miles southeast of the city's heaviest wells in section 33.

To ease the pressure on the current well supply, the city has cleaned out a trio of wells in section 18, which have not produced in several years. They are located on the pipeline and will return 30 gallons a minute and upwards.

63 Nazi Planes Fall In Raid

Major Targets In Germany Are Goals Of Allies

LONDON, Sunday, May 14 (AP)—Two thousand U. S. bombers and American Allied fighters hammered three major targets in northern Germany yesterday and shot down 63 Nazi planes in sky duels which cost the invading Americans 12 bombers and 10 fighters.

Up to 750 Flying Fortresses and Liberators, escorted inland by nearly 1,000 U. S. Lightnings, Mustangs and Thunderbolts, and covered in their withdrawal by hundreds of RAF Mustangs, attacked a Focke-Wulf plant at Tutow, rail yards and locomotive repair shops at Osnabruck, a synthetic oil refinery in the Stettin area and other targets.

The formation was part of a total of approximately 5,000 American and British planes which hurled 8,000 tons of explosives on occupied Europe in two-way attacks from Britain and Italy during the day.

The bag of 63 German planes, 54 by the fighters and nine by bomber gunners, made a two-day total of 213 aircraft shot down over Germany.

No enemy opposition was met over Osnabruck, the German pilots instead ganged up on the formations which flew deep into northeastern Germany. "Many enemy fighters were driven off or destroyed by our escort before they could reach our bombers," the communique said.

The major blows in the day-long attacks began around midnight when British night bombers lashed out from home bases at targets in France, Belgium and Germany and from Italian bases at rail junctions in northeastern Italy.

As the onslaught roared through its 29th day, it closed a week in which there was hardly a single hour when Allied bombs were not exploding on Nazi-held soil. So many targets were hit in the past seven days that to record an accurate total was almost impossible.

The Luftwaffe, which lost 150 planes Friday, again sent up swarms of fighters to challenge bombers raiding Tutow and other long distance objectives from the west today, but many refused battle and Americans hitting Osnabruck met scarcely any opposition.

Hundreds of light Allied bombers shuttled back and forth over northern France and Belgium, ripping airfields and rail yards feeding the Nazi Atlantic wall.

Although Berlin told of terrific battles over Germany, the first American airmen back from the attack on Osnabruck said Nazi fighter resistance was negligible after Friday's duels in which 150 German planes were shot down at a cost of 42 American bombers and 10 fighters.

Osnabruck is a highly important rail center in the Ruhr, a junction of four main lines. Tutow, 105 miles north of Berlin and 35 miles east of the Baltic sea port of Rostock, was the second of several targets attacked in northeastern Germany.

It was the 16th operation in 13 days for the American heavy bombers, and they left their British bases just a few hours after about 750 RAF night bombers had dumped 3,000 tons of bombs on rail targets at Louvain, and other targets in northwest Germany and France at a cost of 14 planes.

Army Youths To Get Air Training

DALLAS, May 13 (AP)—Members of the army air forces enlisted reserve who will be 17 years nine months of age or less on June 1 are being accepted for college training under the army specialized training reserve program, before being called to active duty after their 18th birthdays. Eighth Service Command headquarters said today.

Applications for the training must be made before May 20 to the army specialized training division of the Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Those who accept the opportunity to study at government expense will not lose their status as army air force enlisted reservists, and the date of their call to active duty with the army air forces will not be affected.

Reservists who have graduated from high school are assured under the program of at least one term (three months) of college study, and six or nine months if they have entered their 17th year only recently. When called to active duty, they will be assigned to an AAF basic training center.

Allied Bombers Hit Jap Bases In New Guinea

Mokmer Airdrome On Biak Island Is Hit Twice By Liberators

ADVANCE ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, New Guinea, Sunday, May 14 (AP)—Allied bombers have heavily bombed Japanese bases and troop concentrations in northern New Guinea, Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today.

Mokmer airdrome on Biak Island, 260 miles north of captured Hollandia in Dutch New Guinea, was hit twice by Liberators Friday. Biak is in the Schouten group.

One of the attacking Liberators was downed by enemy anti-aircraft fire.

Other planes from MacArthur's air forces, ranging out to the west of New Guinea, hit Timor and Boeroe airdromes.

Wewak, by-passed Japanese base in British New Guinea, also was attacked.

Ground troops, mopping up in the Hollandia-Aitape area, which was invaded April 22, have killed 101 additional Japanese and increased their unprecedented bag of prisoners by 30.

This brings the total of enemy dead in the area to 1,716 and the number of captured to 354. These enemy troops fled inland at the time of the invasion.

The Biak raid by Liberators brought up no Japanese interceptors at night and other heavy bombers came back with fighter escort the following day but still the enemy did not attempt to send up fighters.

Australian troops, working their way to the New Guinea coast from Alexandria toward the Hollandia-Aitape area, pressed five miles past Cape Croisilles. They reached Meigai plantation, 30 miles from Madang.

Yesterday's communique told of an aerial foray into the area of the Palau Islands, Japan's naval base on the southeast approach to the Philippines.

Plans Made For Nazi Surrender

LONDON, May 13 (AP)—American-British-Russian plans for acceptance of Germany's surrender are nearly completed, and call for complete destruction of the Prussian-built army, a reliable informant disclosed tonight.

This war's terms for Germany are said to differ from the last war's in that they are "surrender" terms rather than "armistice" proposals.

The European advisory commission has nearly finished drafting these surrender terms and will turn the completed proposal back to the governments of the big three.

Premier Stalin is then to give a directive to the Red army commander-in-chief for negotiating with the Germans when the time comes, and the combined chiefs of staff then would forward the agreed plan to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as a directive in any negotiations he might undertake.

The new terms, it is understood, provide that the German army must surrender completely, lay down its arms where it is fighting and await disposal by the Allied authorities.

Among the final details now being worked out are those dealing with exactly what German territory would come under control of the American and British and Soviet armies. Final determination naturally would be much influenced by where the armies are when the fighting ends.

City Judge Attends Safety Convention

City Judge Tracy T. Smith said Saturday on his return from Dallas, where he attended the Texas Safety association annual convention, that he anticipated the city traffic court would adopt several suggestions made at the meeting.

Traffic courts were made a part of the state association he said, pointing to the necessity of increased enforcement and education to thwart an impending post-war jump in traffic deaths. Such a program must be extended into the smaller communities or fail, he said.

Judge Smith was sent to the party by the city commission. While in Dallas, he saw Mrs. Delia K. Agnell, delegate for the Big Spring Safety Council.

New Offensive Is Staged In Burma

SOUTHEAST ASIA HEADQUARTERS, Kandy, Ceylon, May 13 (AP)—A new Allied offensive has been launched against the North Burma bases at Kamaing, Mogauing and Myitkyina by Chinese forces, which stormed a two-mile front with tank, dive-bomber and artillery support, Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's headquarters announced today.

In the early stages of the assault, several Japanese anti-tank guns were knocked out, and an official announcement said Stilwell's advance columns were holding Manipin, east of the Mogauing river and only 10 miles above the Japanese base at Kamaing.

Simultaneously, Allied fighters and dive bombers in close cooperation kept up a continuous daylight air offensive against the Kohima front, while on the Imphal sector, heavy fighting raged as the Japanese battered unsuccessfully toward the Palei mountain pass.

In the Kamaing drive, Stilwell's announcement said, advance columns have repulsed an enemy attack on their position after inflicting casualties, among them two enemy commanders.

Driving on Myitkyina from the north, another Stilwell force was reported to have penetrated the perimeter of the Japanese defenses around Tiansup, strong outpost about 40 miles above Myitkyina.

On the Imphal front, fierce fighting continued against grim Japanese resistance which held up the British south of Bishnupur. Strategic and tactical air forces smashed the Ningshokhiong fortified area and struck at similar strong points slightly southward in the village of Potsangbam and Moirang. The Japanese were putting aircraft into the oPisangbam defenses. Fighters and bombers strafed British gun positions, but lost two and probably three more, with several others reported hit.

On the Kohima front, where a push to clear the Japanese from ridges overlooking the city, 60 miles north of Imphal, was "mainly successful," the communique said, a steady air offensive progressed. Mustangs, making a third daily USAAF fighter sweep over Meiktila and Heho air fields, encountered more than 25 enemy planes, destroying eight and probably two more and damaging six, without loss to themselves.

Greek partisans meanwhile were reported harassing four German divisions in their country. A Yugoslav communique two days ago said large areas of Serbia had been restored to control of the partisans.

Contagious Disease Case Totals Are Still At High Level, Reports Show

One case of scarlet fever has been reported through the Big Spring-Howard county division of the Midland-Ector-Howard county health unit, mumps are on the increase and measles still have a high rate of incidence here.

This was the contagious disease picture as the week ended, and V. A. Cross, sanitarian, warned that warm weather apparently was lessening the caution parents are exercising to what frequently seems as a simple cold.

In the case of measles and scarlet fever, he urged parents not to let their children out or engage in strenuous activities until they have been dismissed by the family physician. Complications, he pointed out, can be far more serious than the infection.

Bulk of the mumps cases have been on the north side of town, but the measles are well distributed.

The sanitarian said that the county had just cause to be proud of its grade A milk producers. Every producer marketing through one creamery last week had remarkably low bacteria counts, said Cross, one turning up with a raw milk test of 3,000—one tenth of the count allowed for pasteurized milk.

The bacteria counts, and thus the quality of grade A (the only raw milk the city recognizes) milk today is so far better than it was last summer that there is hardly a basis for comparison, observed the sanitarian. He lauded producers for their "conscientious efforts" and creameries for their interest.

Another Member Of A&M Staff Is Dismissed

COLLEGE STATION, May 13 (AP)—The board of Texas A&M College decided in executive session here today to dispense with the services of Miss Mildred Horton, vice director of the college extension service and state home demonstration agent, the board announced.

The board unanimously voted that Miss Maureen Hearn be elected vice director for women and state home demonstration agent, effective at once, with the same salary as Miss Horton had received.

The directors abolished unanimously the title of president emeritus which had been voted to Dr. T. O. Walton, former president of the college, last fall.

Upon recommendation of Miss Hearn and with the approval of John D. Prewitt, acting director of the extension service, the board unanimously voted that the services of Miss Onah Kacks, state girls club agent of the extension service and Miss Minnie Mae Grubbs, district home demonstration agent, be dispensed with immediately.

In the case of Miss Horton, Miss Kacks and Miss Grubbs, the directors voted that each be paid an extra month's salary, if such payments can legally be made.

The announcement, made by T. W. Dunlap, secretary of the board, through the college's department of information, stated that "the board is still working toward a selection of a president of the college and hopes to be able to announce his name in the not too far distant future."

The statement said the board voted unanimously that "the recommendation of Prewitt be approved that inasmuch as the time of Mr. C. Hohn is fully occupied in state farm labor work that he be relieved of his duties and title as assistant state agent and be given the title of state farm labor supervisor at an unchanged salary."

"The board has been working for 10 months regarding certain changes in the extension service and their work is completed in that particular," the statement said.

The directors stated that "the status of E. R. Eudaly as the nominee of the board as director of the extension service last fall remains unchanged and the board hopes that his nomination will eventually be confirmed by National Extension Service officials in Washington."

Earlier, the board advised a student group which presented grievances regarding student regulations to ask the faculty executive and disciplinary committees for a decision on their problems.

F. M. Law of Houston, board president, told the group the directors had no jurisdiction in the matter and suggested they take their case to Acting President F. C. Bolton.

The hearing by the board stemmed from recent student demonstrations at the college following suspension of an upperclassman.

The faculty executive and disciplinary committees heard two student groups present their cases yesterday, reinstated the upperclassman and advised they would make a decision regarding the desired student regulations Monday.

Police, investigating the mishap, said the child apparently had hidden from playmates by getting in front of the cab as it pulled up to a curb. 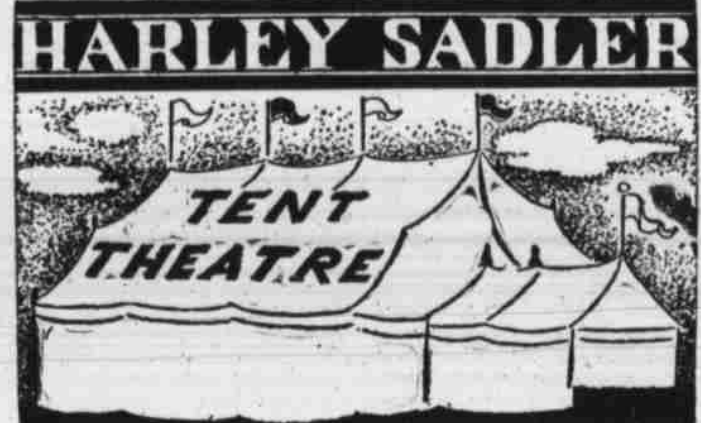

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Ward Ellenburger Topped High, Andrews Test Hits

By JOHN B. BREWER

SAN ANGELO, May 13—Assurance of production by southeastern Crane county and southern Andrews county wildcats on early natural swabbing tests highlighted West Texas oil developments this week.

A high Ellenburger top was credited to a northeastern Ward county wildcat and locations were staked for a slated Ellenburger wildcat in Pecos county, a proposed Delaware wildcat in Pecos county and a scheduled deep Permian lime wildcat each in Gaines, Garza and Upton counties.

The Texas Co. No. 1 Chas. W. Hobbs estate of San Angelo in Crane swabbed and flowed a daily average of 62.75 barrels of oil the first four days of natural testing through 200 perforations in 7-inch casing from 5,300-50 feet. It was to be acidized. The oil bearing formation is believed to be the Devonian, in which event the well is Texas' first producer from that time. It is in the C N N 46-35-H&T.C.

Stanolind No. 1-F Midland Farms, the Andrews county strike, C SE NW 1-43-24-G&M&A, swabbed a peak of 200 barrels of oil in 24 hours from the lower Grayburg and upper San Andres sections of the Permian, bottomed at 4,888 feet. It continued testing and likely will

be acidized. Location is eight miles northeast of the Emma pool and nine miles west of the Mabey field.

Gulf No. 1-B John H. Edwards estate, Ward county wildcat C NW 25-28-18-pal, was credited unofficially with topping the Ellenburger at 9,358 feet, 6,739 feet below sea level. This, according to one correlation, was 507 feet higher than in Shell No. 1 Sealy-Smith Foundation, opener of the Monahan Ellenburger field 6 1-2 miles north and slightly west.

Warren Petroleum Co. No. 1 M. W. Fowler, first Coke county test to explore the Ellenburger, was acidized with 10,000 gallons into water and abandoned after swabbing four to five barrels of pipeline oil hourly, bottomed at 6,412 feet, plugged back from 6,425. It was in the C NW 27-1A-H&T.C.

Phillips Petroleum Co. announced it will build a natural gasoline plant in the Fullerton field and Shell Oil Co. Inc., that it will erect one in the Union pool nearby in northwestern Andrews county.

Stanolind was reported to have purchased from the San Andres Production Co. of Dallas three leases on the north side of the Slaughter field in Hockley county with eight wells having total May allowables of 6,559 barrels.

British American Producing Co. started No. 1 Cella McRea 660 feet out of the southeast corner of the west half of section 1-A-48-pal, three-quarters of a mile south and one-half mile west of Anderson-Prichard No. 1 McRea. The latter, a one-mile southwest extension to the Fullerton field in Andrews county, was testing after retreating with 10,000 gallons of acid, bottomed at 7,004 feet.

Stanolind staked location for a slated Ellenburger wildcat on the southwestern Andrews county block of 4,026 acres for which it paid the University of Texas a cash bonus of \$900,000. The testing will be No. 1-D University C SE SW 8-11-U, six miles northwest of the Embar Ellenburger field.

Bay Petroleum Corp. will drill

No. 1 B. Cox and others, proposed 7,600-foot wildcat in west central Gaines county near the C SE SE 468-G-CCSR&RGNG, 18 miles west of Seminole. Honolulu and Devonian spotted No. 1 B. R. Payton, proposed 6,000-foot wildcat in northwestern Garza county C SW SE 1421-TTTR.

Amerada No. 3 Mrs. Mary C. Johnson of Paris, Tex., was completed as the twenty-ninth producer in the Barnhart Ellenburger field in southeastern Reagan county that has had only one failure, at the southwest corner. It rated 5,361 barrels of 44.8 gravity oil daily, bottomed at 9,220 feet. Location is 555 from the south, 4,630 feet from the west line of H&W T Ry. Co. survey 5.

Rep. Short Demands That Military Heads At Pearl Harbor Be Tried

WASHINGTON, May 13 (P)—Rep. Dewey Short (R-Mo.) said Friday that he will seek impeachment of top ranking cabinet officers if the men in command of the army and navy at Pearl Harbor during the Japanese attack, are not brought to trial before Dec. 7, 1944, for alleged dereliction of duty.

Short has drafted a resolution to extend for another six months beyond June 7, next, the statute of limitations under which Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short and Rear Admiral Husband E. Kimmel could be brought before courts martial. Congress extended it once—until June 7.

Now, Rep. Short disclosed to reporters Friday, he proposes to "direct" that the trials be held definitely within the next six months period.

"When this story comes out, it will shock the nation," he said. The Missourian contended the trials should be held to determine, for one thing, whether any blame for the success of the Japanese attack could be attached to the secretaries of state, war and navy, or the president, himself.

One of the armed forces' objections to immediate action has

been that many officers and men who would be needed as witnesses are now fighting on distant battle fronts.

Howard Farmers Seek Army Trucks

A recommendation requesting that an order be reinstated granting essential farm operators, as designated by the Office of Defense Transportation, the right to purchase commercial vehicles declared inserviceable for the army, was presented to ODT representatives by the Howard county farm transportation committee Friday morning.

The committee met with ODT representatives in the AAA office. Necessity that farmers and ranches shortage is to be averted was discussed.

A former government order gave farmers privilege of directly purchasing vehicles declared inserviceable for the army, but a later order required that such vehicles be reconditioned by dealers and purchased only from dealers. The county committee is

seeking re-establishment of the former status.

PEA SHELTER DOES WORK OF 16 INDIVIDUALS

BRYAN, May 13 (AP) — Tests conducted here promise that a "home made" mechanical pea sheller will relieve patrons of small community canning centers from that most tedious of canning operations—shelling peas.

Specialists in food conservation who saw the machine in operation claim that it can do the work of 16 individuals. They said that many farm people who have been reluctant to can peas because of the tremendous amount of drudgery involved will now re-organize their canning budgets to include this valuable food.

According to R. D. Rawls, Austin, and M. V. Stuteville, College Station, both on the administrative staff in vocational agriculture and co-designers of the pea sheller, plans for constructing similar machines will be sent to all teachers of vocational agriculture in order that each of the 500 canning centers in Texas high schools may have one of these devices ready for its victory gardeners when the canning season opens.

Estimates of specialists who attended the demonstration in Bryan revealed that an individual of average skill could shell a bushel of peas in about three or four hours. The tests of the Rawls and Stuteville sheller indicated that a bushel of peas could be shelled in about 15 minutes or less using this machine.

Glancing at a page of pictures in Tuesday's Herald, Lt. Pat Wilkinson was attracted by a name—then a picture. He recognized Chaplain Tilford Jenkins, Birmingham, Ala., shown baptizing Co. Norman Burhalter of Glendale, Calif. into the Baptist church in the fountain at Castera Castle in Italy, as a college mate of his. The two had been in Mississippi Baptist College together studying for the ministry.

Lt. Warren Lockhart recently visited here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. L. (Roy) Lockhart. He has been with the ferrying command for a year and a half and in that time flew from Africa to India frequently. He learned about real sandstorms in Africa and is not concerned with the tender brand West Texas has to offer. He was the first pilot to take a ship off the new important field at Cairo. Relatives mailed a package to Capt. Robert Currie in 1942. He left the states before it caught up with him and eventually was based in India. After a record of more than 350 combat hours, he returned to the states. Recently, after following him around the world, the package finally caught up with him after a trip of perhaps 38,000 miles.

Texans Still Don't Like Daylight Savings, Want Standard Time

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP) — There are a lot of Texans who want daylight savings time abolished, and the sooner the better, judging by letters received by Rep. Cannon (D-Mo.) and inserted into the Congressional Record.

Preachers say it makes Sunday night services so late it keeps a lot of people away from church. Mothers complain their nerves are frayed trying to coax youngsters to bed before their dark. Farmers observe you can't fool the livestock. Nobody seems to see where there's a savings of electricity.

These are the views expressed in more than a score of letters from Texans that came to the Missouri legislator, who is sort of unofficial leader of a congressional move for repeal of war time.

Here are some excerpts: The Rev. R. G. Van Royen, Corpus Christi, member Baptist general convention in Texas—"I have been in evangelistic work, and much of it has been in the country, and I know what a hardship that it is working on the farmers. Many of the places that I have been to dinner in the country have two clocks—one to run the radio by and another to work by."

"Primarily I am interested in the work of the churches. I can definitely say that it is a hindrance to the work of the churches, since it forces them to have their evening services so early in the day that the folks do not come. People going to church are like chickens going to roost—they just don't do it until dark; and if you set the time at dark, then it runs the service too late for those who have to get up so early in the morning."

American Legion, H. G. Briggs, adjutant, Tulsa—"We have never been able to see just why such a scheme was ever inaugurated. Do what you can to put this bunk in the ashcan."

Charles T. Rowland, Fort Worth—"In my humble opinion this change of time has only added confusion, demoralization, derangement, disarray, jumble, commotion, agitation, tumult, turmoil, bewilderment, and embarrassment, together with any other synonyms that may be known."

Cecil O. Guyton, Moody—"Our National slogan is 'Save and

Conserve.' Fast time forces us to get up one hour earlier in the coldest part of the day, thus using an hour more of artificial light and an hour more of fuel. It is inconsistent with the idea of saving and conserving."

H. L. Thammell, Sany Point—"The average farmer can't produce as much with the new time. I have quit farming and don't expect to have another animal-harassed until the common-sense hours are restored."

D. J. Stanphill, Clarksville—"This new time has cost the people millions of dollars more for fuel and light bills. This new time has hindered the war effort instead of helping. Do away with this unnecessary waste."

Texas State House of Representatives, Committee on Municipal and Private Corporations, Jeff D. Tinson, Dallas, chairman—"I believe I can conservatively say that 90 per cent of our people would like to go back to standard time."

W. I. Stump, Georgetown—"This law is one of the worst blunders our representatives in Washington have made. If you will trace just how and where this idea started, you will find it was some of our large plants where the office personnel and the golf players wanted more time in the evening for sport."

Mrs. H. Ahlens—"I am writing to present the difficulties of mothers and school children, particularly. 'With two boys in grade schools, consider my plight. Especially the 9-year-old son. He needs 10 hours sleep each night. So every night it is a struggle with frayed tempers, resulting to make him come in from play with lots of pleasant daylight playtime left and command him to go to bed. Next morning, he has to be awakened while it is still dark to reach school on time."

An appeal of the case of C. H. McDaniel, Jr. versus W. E. Evans was filed by Evans Saturday in county court. Texan Correspondent Returns From German Internment Camp

Editor's Note: Native of Palestine, graduate of Texas University and West Point, Taylor Henry returned to Texas this week after internment in Germany following the break be-

tween Washington and the Vichy government which resulted in American correspondents being sent to Germany under armed guard. Henry will return to Europe after his Texas visit.

Texas' fried chicken, turnip

greens and corn bread tastes just as good as it ever did—perhaps even better after 13 months internment by the nazis inside Germany.

And the Texas climate is just as pleasant and the Texas people as friendly as they always have been.

The one sad thing is that many of my old friends are not here. Some of them are gone for the duration; others are gone forever. It is a strange thing perhaps for someone who has been imprisoned by the Gestapo for more than a year, but the knowledge that those friends are gone has really brought the meaning of the war home to me.

It has brought the real facts of the struggle to me more acutely than even the facts which I was able to observe inside Germany, facts which show that we still have a long, hard struggle ahead of us.

The first and perhaps the most important thing is that German morale is good. It is good primarily because living conditions inside Germany today are still good. They are good perhaps even better today than they were in 1939 at the beginning of the war.

They are good because Germany is living off the rest of Europe. It is an essential point for us to remember that Germany has conquered and still holds three-fourths of the European continent.

It will be a hard task to convince the German people that they are beaten, that it is no longer possible for them to continue the fight, so long as they continue to dominate such a large proportion of the continent.

Equally important from the point of view of morale is the continuing respect which the mass of the German people feel for Hitler. Eleven years of insidious nazi propaganda has so impregnated the younger generations that there is virtually no one in Germany today younger than 26 or 27 years who can conceive of any other regime for Germany than Hitlerite nazism.

Secondly it is explained by the memory of the older generations of the lean years of the 1920's, the years of unemployment, the years of starvation. They contrast that pre-Hitler period with that of today and even after four years of war they draw a comparison favorable to Hitler's Germany.

German morale has not been broken. Only a miracle will produce an internal German collapse. The German army is still a fighting army. We have got to get it out of our heads that we can win the war through a German internal collapse such as came in 1918. It means that we have got to win by force of arms.

During 13 months internment in the reich I had an unusual amount of freedom under the circumstances. We were allowed to take long walks in the Black Forest, to go on all-day picnics, where we stopped at little inns and were able to come in contact with the people.

We were allowed to go into the town of Baden-Baden on shopping expeditions, to the barber shop, to the dentist, to the doctor, to the church. While there was always one Gestapo guard with us, it was impossible for the guard to prevent our overhearing conversations, to even talk with people ourselves.

It was certainly impossible to prevent us from observing the life of the people, their clothes, their food, the articles offered for sale in the shops.

In addition we were allowed some seven German newspapers daily as well as two published in France and one in Belgium. You will realize that a close analysis of such publications covering both national and regional press can give a reasonably good insight into conditions.

Sometimes we were able to obtain more or less confidential information.

By all of these means we were able to put together a composite picture of Germany today.

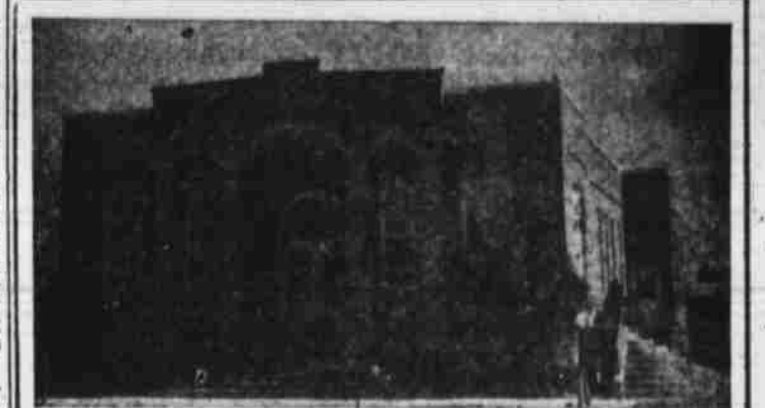

ODESSA, May 13 (AP)—Pvt. Jimmie Gaunt of Dallas, defending champion, shot a 32 on the last nine holes and picked up five strokes to tie Raymond Gafford, Ridgeles Country club pro from Fort Worth, for the championship of the Texas PGA here today.

Belmont Crowd Tops Bet Total

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)—A new one-day betting record of \$3,389,385 was set at Belmont Park today by a crowd of 39,293 as Mrs. Payne Whitney's favored Devil Diver won the \$10,000 Metropolitan Handicap and Mrs. Albert Sabath's Alsab pulled up lame in his first 1944 start.

The new watering mark, including a world record of \$235,253 on the steeplechase event, was hung up for eight races. This compares with the previous record of \$3,176,553 bet by 41,412 on seven races at Jamaica on April 22.

Devil Diver ran the mile course in 1:35 4-5, only one second under Count Fleet's record, to finish a length and a half in front of A. C. Ernst's Alquist. Tommy Heard's Boyss was third with Walt a Bit, the early leader, Porter's Cap, Pops Pick and Four Freedoms, running as an entry with Devil Diver, finishing in the order named.

Unbeaten this year, the St. Germans five-year-old previously had

under par for the 72 holes. The title will be decided as the two play in the Texas Cup match here Sunday.

Gaunt was three down at the halfway mark with a 213, lost two more strokes on the next nine and came through with a brilliant game on the home stretch for his tie. He squared the match with Gafford, who had consistently led the field, on No. 13 with a beautiful 20-foot putt for a birdie 3.

He went one-up on No. 17 when he pitched dead to the pin for another birdie from 160 yards and gained his third point on the 18 to tie the match by sinking a six-foot putt after Gafford had ringed the cup.

Playing with Gaunt and Gafford was Sam Schneider of Corpus Christi, third-pro in the match with a 290.

Harry Todd of Dallas, was low amateur with 287 and Sgt. Lloyd Watkins, Midland Army Air Field, was next with 290, which took also top honors in the special service division.

The hottest round of the morning rounds was shot by Gene Root, Amarillo pro, who came in with a 71, but whose 155 yesterday left him still trailing.

TEXAS COPS SOUTHWEST TRACK TITLE IN SETTING NEW RECORD

AUSTIN, May 13 (AP)—The University of Texas scored the largest total in Southwest conference track and field history today to win the thirteenth annual meet with 89 3-14 points to 58 3-14 for Texas A&M, 25-4-7 for Rice and 3 for Southern Methodist.

Tall Ralph Ellsworth sang his swan-song as a Longhorn athlete by victories in the 100 and 220-yard dashes and laps on two victorious relay teams, finishing as high point man of the day with 12 1-2.

Lanky Bob Umasattd was, the only other double winner as Texas took ten first places and tied for another. Texas A&M had four firsts and one tie and Rice had one win and one tie.

The smashing total rolled up by the Longhorns today bettered the record of 78 scored by Oklahoma in winning the 1919 meet.

Steve King of A&M was second high point man with 11 4-7.

No conference records were broken other than the scoring mark.

Young Texas, Cadel Bush M. Jackson Jr. of Corpus Christi.

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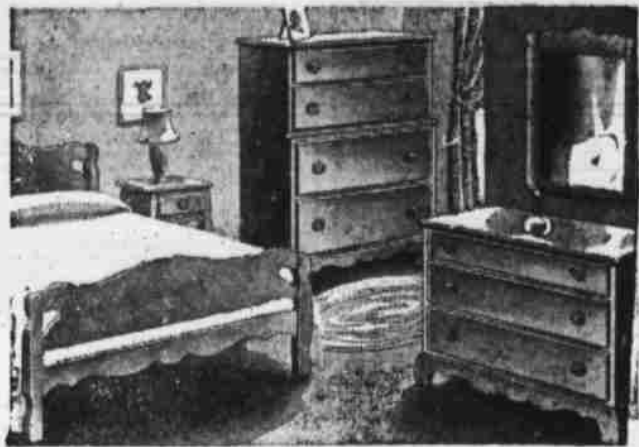

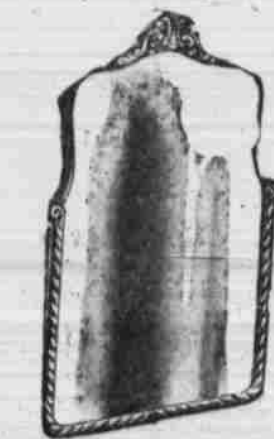

Germans Declare We're Hysterical

LISBON, May 13 (AP) — In an apparent attempt to bolster German morale on the eve of the Allied invasion of western Europe, Nazi propagandists are filling German newspapers with dispatches picturing both Britain and the United States as suffering from hysterical tension bordering on panic.

Swedish correspondents in London are quoted by the German press as saying that the English public is terrorized by the prospect of the "terrific gamble" involved in the invasion.

These dispatches assert that people in England are turning to religion, mysticism, spiritualism or quick fortune tellers for comfort, and that some are seeking forgetfulness in heavy drinking or are trying to steady their nerves with patent medicines advertised in newspapers.

Hysteria and panic of only slightly smaller proportions are reported in the United States, where the public is said to have been whipped up to a frenzy of nervous expectation by many months of second front propaganda.

"The American people are finally realizing that for them the war will really begin with the invasion of Europe," one Nazi paper asserted.

The Munich Neuester Nachrichten summed up the situation in an editorial which concluded with the consoling thought that the British and American peoples know they have everything to lose if the invasion fails, but they have no assurance of what they will win if it succeeds. The Germans are better off, the editorial said, because "we have everything to win and nothing left to lose but our lives."

War Production threatened by drive to Unionize Management

The Automotive Council for War Production representing 550 established companies employing 1,200,000 workers and delivering 20% of the nation's war production has authorized its president, Alvan Macauley, to make the following public statement and send it to the President, other government officials and all members of Congress.

At this most critical moment in history, on the eve of the great invasion of Europe which may settle the issue of human freedom for years to come, the public is entitled to know of a situation which threatens the success of that great effort.

The council has given careful consideration to the adverse effect on war production of the strike of foremen in twelve plants of major war producers in the Detroit area and the still greater threat inherent in the organized drive to unionize management, beginning with foremen.

This is a long step toward putting industrial management in the hands of union leaders.

Successful business undertakings and great achievements depend on an organization responsive to the decision of those in charge. The commanding officers of production, like those of the army, must have their captains and lieutenants, their sergeants and corporals. Foremen, supervisors and managers are officers in the production army.

The division of their obligations and responsibilities between management and any outside organization will be just as disastrous to our war production front as outside organization of the army's officers to bargain and debate with their superiors would be at the battlefield. "No man can serve two masters."

The issue now is:

Can union leaders unionize management and take over control of war production?

Are their organizing drives for this purpose to be allowed to interfere with the efficiency and effectiveness of this production? Will they be allowed to disrupt American mass-pro-

duction industry, one of the greatest assets of our country in both war and peace, by using it to experiment with a new and untried form of union-controlled management?

What kind of collective bargaining is it when union leaders sit on both sides of the table?

If management is to be unionized, where is union control to stop?

This issue results directly from the fact that the federal law and their administration are vague and confused in respect to the status of management.

In the interest of the war effort, we urge congress to make it clear that it does not intend to permit labor leaders to take over the management of our war production plants. This can and should be done immediately by clarifying and amending the necessary laws, particularly the War Labor Disputes Act.

The Automotive industry is not only producing a large part of our national armament output, but is also the largest manufacturing industry in peacetime; thus the nation is relying upon its prompt reconversion to provide jobs after victory.

The council was created by the industry immediately after Pearl Harbor to expedite in every possible way the industry's war production efforts. This included exchange of production equipment, knowledge of production methods, and efficient use of scarce materials and manpower. This industry has done an outstanding war production job.

The council has never intervened in the collective bargaining problems of employer-employee relations, and there is no intention to depart from this practice.

Unless Congress acts, this crisis will further obstruct an all-out war production effort.

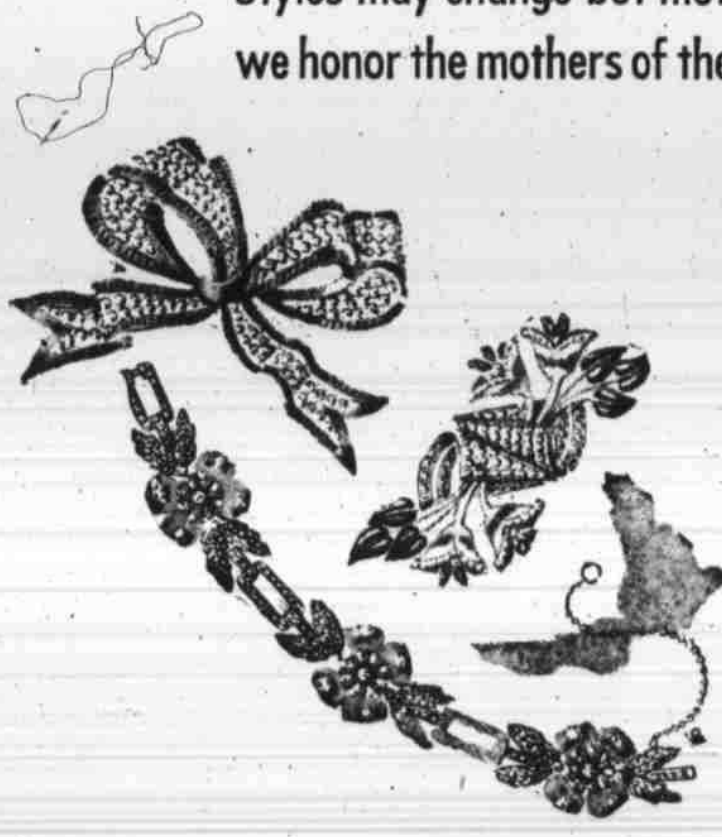

Inaccurate Advice Is Keeping Many From Security Benefits

Inaccurate advice from well-meaning but inadequately informed friends may be costing some retired workers money in the form of old-age and survivors insurance benefits. J. Hasler Strickland, manager of the Big Spring office of the social security board, said today. The same kind of advice also may be keeping benefit checks from widows, children and parents of workers who die, Mr. Strickland said.

He advised that each worker who is 65 or over and has been working in covered employment should get in touch with the nearest office of the social security board as soon as he quits his job. If he is qualified for benefits, the board will assist him in filing a claim.

Similarly when a worker dies, the widow or other relative should immediately contact the social security board field office where complete assistance will be given in filing a claim for survivors' benefits, Mr. Strickland said. Contacts may be made by personal visit, by letter or by telephone.

We hear so much about our water difficulties, and they are right bothersome now, that we forget about a sizeable construction job in our sewer plant expansion. It is better than 40 per cent complete now and may be ready for use after June 15. The project is a substantial one, costing more than \$100,000.

A representative of the National Housing Agency tells us that hope for federal aid in relieving our housing situation is remote. The government recognizes only civilian war workers in its housing plans, and so long as military personnel is housed in Ellis homes, the government contends there is no housing shortage. Just where else these soldiers and their families could go has not exactly been made clear... and it's not apt to be.

Some of the more irksome complaints handled by members of the police department have to do with alleged violations of the water rationing ordinance. Alas, who would have ever thought that the department would have to play nursemaid to a drouth?

Medicine's Golden Decade—

Blood Plasma Lessons Come From Vegetables

By SCHUYLER ALLMAN AP Features Writer

In a St. Louis laboratory, a scientist surrounded by paraphernalia was methodically drying vegetables.

The year was 1909. The scientist was Dr. L. F. Shackell of the Washington University School of Medicine. The paraphernalia was a freezing unit and a vacuum.

part remaining after red cells are removed, could be used instead of whole blood in some transfusions.

The reason plasma was used was that some saving soul, knowing that his citrated blood in the beakers was about to spoil, drew off the plasma and tried it out. Experiment showed it could be given to anyone regardless of blood type—patients can receive whole blood only from donors with a suitable type—and it would keep much longer than citrated blood.

When World War II broke, research in all countries was racing after an easy way to get plasma to battlefields, for it could be preserved only at regulated temperatures and took up a lot of precious shipping space.

The laboratories remembered Dr. Shackell and his dried vegetables. They also remembered he

vegetables while we skip a few years to World War I.

American surgeons, brandishing flags of human blood in a solution of sodium citrate, descended on the battlefields of France saving thousands of lives with a new transfusion technique.

The approved but cumbersome and difficult method was transfusion direct from donor to patient, because no one knew how to store blood without clotting. Sodium citrate did it.

Medical experimenters found in 1938 that blood plasma, the

had dried some blood serum.

So they borrowed his dehydrating methods, took liquid plasma, froze it, put it in a high vacuum and drew off the moisture.

The dried product took less shipping space, needed no regulated temperature, and when mixed with sterile water is ready to use, on the battlefield if necessary.

Invaluable in treating wounds, plasma also has been mixed with sulfanilamide to cure severe burns rapidly.

Implications of widespread use of plasma are enormous. Red blood cells left after plasma is extracted, for example, have produced promising results in treating anemia.

Medicine has indeed traveled far since the seventeenth century, when court physicians still were solemnly prescribing bleeding in treatment of battlefield wounds.

Fifth War Loan Quota In Texas 464 Millions

DALLAS, May 13—Texas' quota for the Fifth War Loan—the biggest of them all—will be \$464,000,000, State Chairman Nathan Adams of the War Finance Committee of Texas announced Saturday.

"It's going to be the toughest, the most intensive, and the most important money raising undertaking of the war," Adams said of the drive which will run from June 12 to July 8.

Texas individuals alone will be called upon to marshal \$236,000,000 fighting bond money—their share of the \$18,000,000,000 investment in America being offered. Of this amount \$125,000,000 is expected to come from the thirty patriotic who are storing away tidy sums for the future in the "little people's E bonds." Quotas are going now to each county.

Texas answered the Fourth War Loan call for \$395,000,000 with a lusty \$479,000,000.

"This is it—the zero hour, the Victory Drive," Adams emphasized. "It will be a big and vital effort, and it will not be easy. All of the nearly seven million people of Texas may as well face the hard facts at the outset of this crusade. Success of the drive is entirely up to the individual. Think of the invasion and then think of not buying extra bonds in the Fifth War Loan."

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13 (UP)—Gaunt - faced, undernourished, some so weak they had to be carried on stretchers, a large number of men, women and children freed from Japanese captivity on Dutch New Guinea has arrived at an Australian port, Aneta, the Netherlands news agency reported today.

The dispatch, written at the port of debarkation, said:

"Many were stretcher cases. They were taken to American hospitals for treatment. Arrival was one of the most pathetic scenes yet witnessed at an Australian wharf. Victims of Japanese ill treatment were dressed in motley garments, mainly clothes that liberating forces had given them."

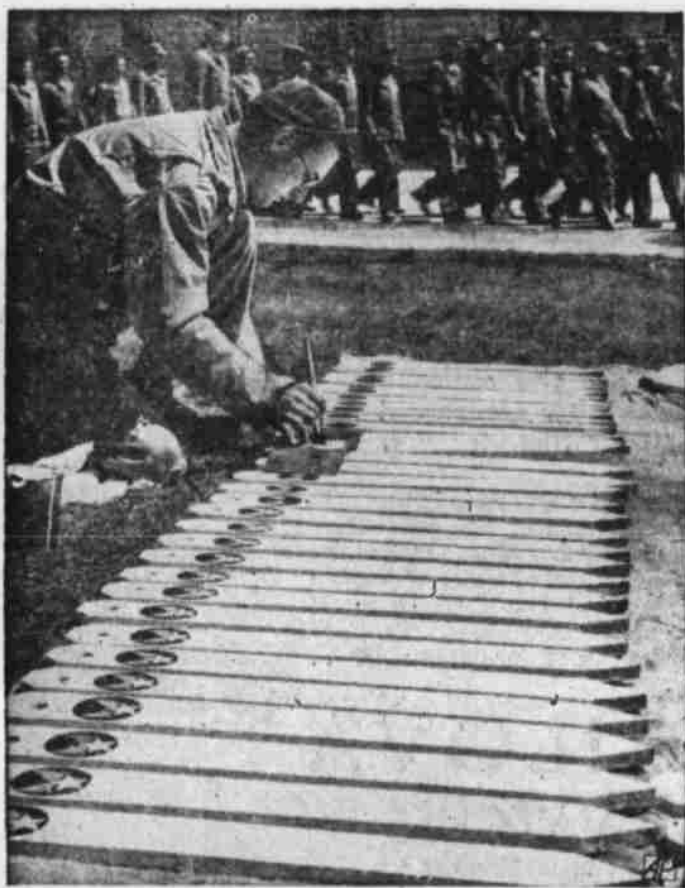

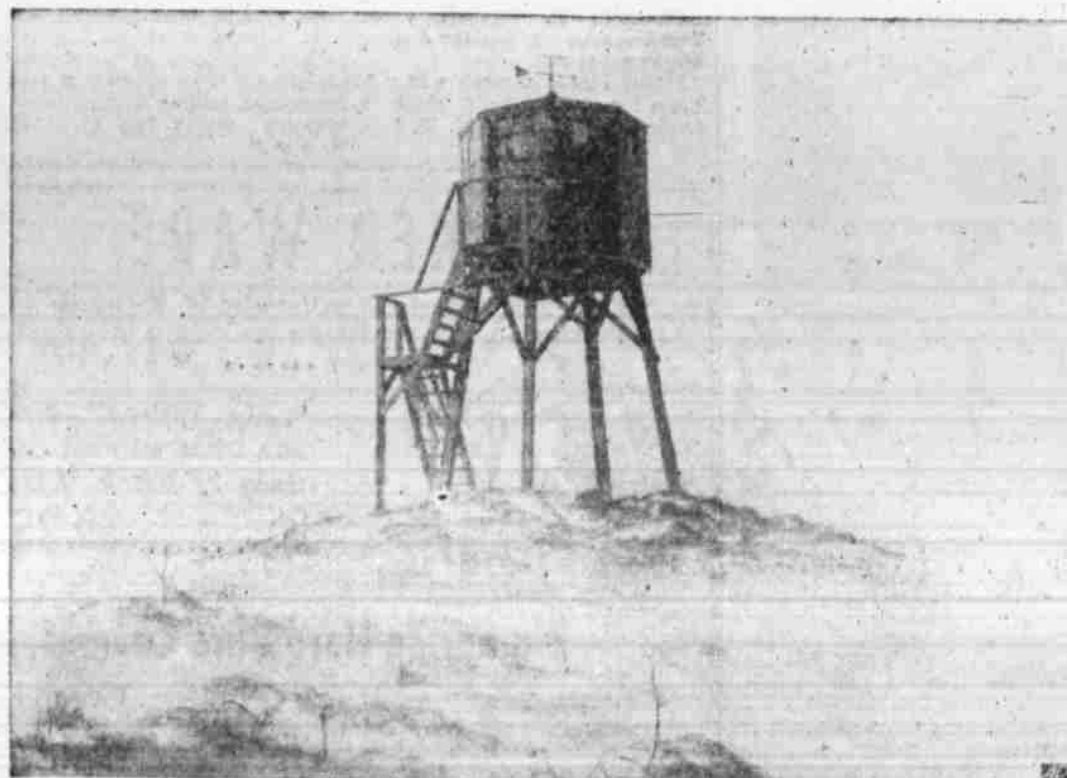

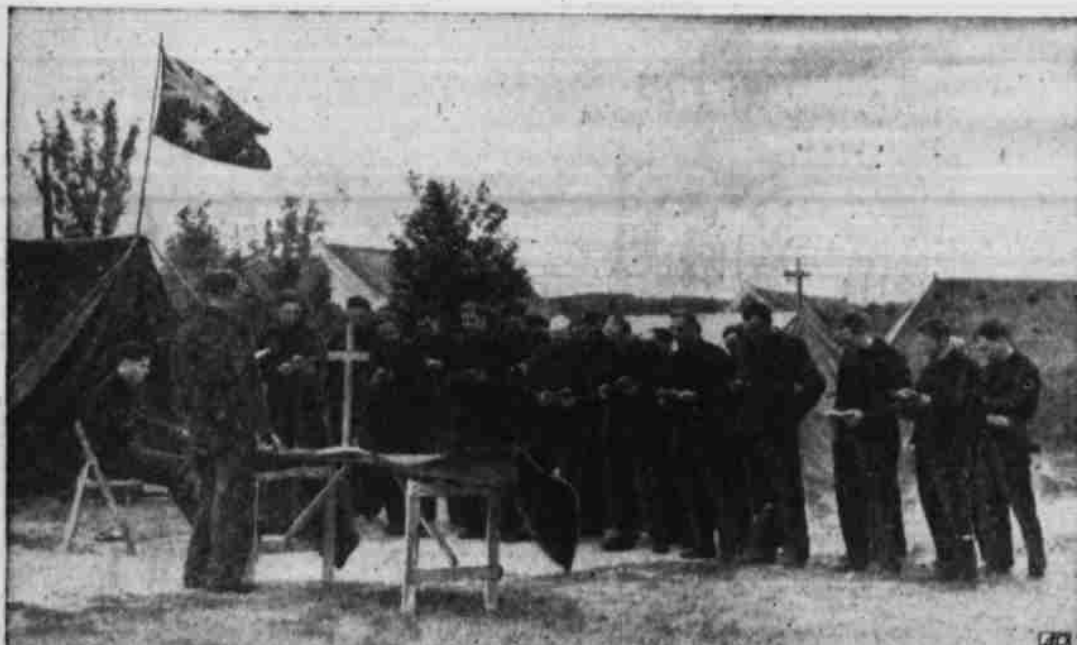

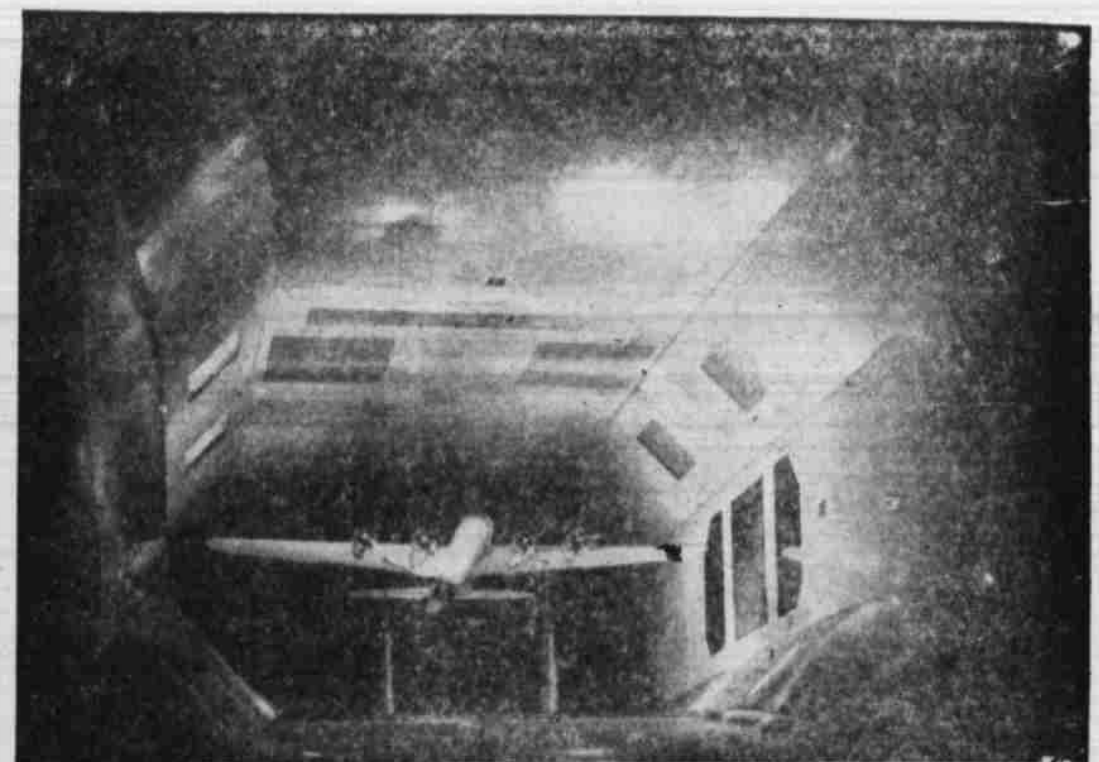

All Time High Hit In Oil Industry

AUSTIN, May 13 (AP)—Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson said today Texas has hit an all time high both in the number of wells and actual production of oil.

The present number of oil wells is 101,022, which last week produced 2,126,300 barrels of oil each day, said Thompson, adding:

"Texas has met every call for oil and has increased her ability to produce all the while."

"We are apparently going to have plenty of oil."

"So far this year there have been 2,412 regular drilling applications, an increase of 1,021 over last year; and 1,189 completions as against 690 for 1943. There have been 68 wildcat discoveries as against 20 last year."

Strike Continues Despite Assurance

DETROIT, May 13 (AP)—Telegraphic assurances that they would not be discriminated against if they returned to work failed tonight to end a strike of more than 3,300 foremen in war plants of six Detroit manufacturing concerns.

Robert H. Keys, national president of the Foreman's Association of America (independent) said a telegram from Chairman William H. Davis of the War Labor Board would not be answered until the union's officials hold an executive session at 10 a. m. Monday.

Davis said assurances against discrimination had been received from five of the six Detroit concerns involved. Those replying to a WLB inquiry, he said, were Briggs Manufacturing Co., Hudson Motor Car Co., Gar Wood Industries, Inc., Murray Corporation of America, and Packard Motor Car Co.

Because of the strike of foremen, Packard has closed its plants, making more than 30,000 workers idle. Production in other plants has been reported cut by as much as 50 per cent.

El Salvador Is Nearer Normal

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—The Central American republic of El Salvador was reported tonight to be approaching normal again after being disrupted the past six weeks by a bloody abortive revolt and a general strike which led to resignation of President Maximiliano Hernandez Martinez.

The strike was called off follow-

ing the departure of Hernandez Martinez from the country and a pledge by his successor, Gen. Andres Blandino Henandez, that amnesty would be granted all those participating in the April 2 revolt. The new president also promised freedom of speech and the press and said that elections would be called soon for a constitutional assembly.

Only those who have seen her maintain ceaseless vigil beside the bed of her stricken child, or seen her worriedly watch her youngster toddle across streets on his way to school, or fretted about his care when he left for his first "camping trip"—only these who have been near mothers and felt the pulsations of their hearts know how war-time separations have wrenched their very souls.

Some mothers have been set apart into a nobility of sacrifice, for somehow their boys were not meant to come home. Some have been destined for another cross, for their sons will return with battle scars. But most will be spared all but the torture of uncertainty—the incessant burden of not knowing.

All the anxieties of the years have been rolled together in Mother's prayers for her son today—wherever he may be. Somehow and somewhere these petitions must be felt by men fighting from foxholes, flying through the sky, and doing battle by sea.

Certainly none of the love and devotion is wasted, for it is returned today an hundred fold. The sobering influence of facing eternity in coming to grips with the enemy has given a legion of young men pause to think, to reflect, to appreciate. And when the tempest of battle has past, many a letter back home speaks lovingly of "all that you have done for me."

Although the tides of fatalism have robbed us of many of our moral values, it has not yet touched or tarnished the infinitely high regard that American men have for their mothers. Thank God for that, for if we salvage nothing but this out of our war wreckage, we still will have the best foundation of all from which to build anew.

ON THE FIFTH ARMY'S GARIGLIANO FRONT, Italy, May 7 (Delayed) (AP)—Today's conducted tour, folks, is over six miles of what is humorously called a road, the rough and rocky trail up to Minturno and the front lines.

No Hope Of Relief From Oil Ration

By JACK STINNETT

WASHINGTON—Although the source must remain anonymous, I can assure you there is none better in Washington for this: There isn't the remotest possibility of general relief soon from the gasoline and fuel oil rationing program.

It isn't any secret that the Army and Navy are building up tremendous reserves of fuel for the engines of war. If you know your Army and Navy in wartime, it's a natural conclusion that these reserves will continue to be greater than ever will be needed. Military forces can't operate on a narrow margin of reserves. They must have enough for any emergency, whether it's food, arms, ammunition, gasoline or men.

The only way to reach those goals is to over-buy and over-draft. To fail to meet minimum requirements on any front could be and probably would be fatal.

That's why you hear stories that the military forces are dumping certain articles on the civilian market. In most instances, these are semi-perishables which can no longer be held in the reserve stocks. That's why you hear the storage tanks along the seaboard are filled to overflowing with gasoline and oil. That may very well be true.

It is true, though barely mentioned, that we haven't yet been able to build our oil tanker strength to the point where fuel can be moved as fast as we would like.

How Party Nominations Started

The delegates to the national conventions for nominating presidential and vice presidential candidates receive no salary or compensation of any kind for their services.

They must pay all their own expenses. At one time the democratic and republican parties in Oregon and Minnesota provided pay for their delegates, but the practice was abandoned.

The general expenses of a national nominating convention are paid out of the party treasury, which obtains its funds as campaign contributions.

It has long been customary for businessmen and various organizations to donate large sums of money to a party to induce it to hold its national convention in their city.

Such conventions have no recognition in law and are purely the product of party custom and convenience.

In the years immediately following the adoption of the federal constitution there were no organized political parties in America and men were not formally nominated for the presidency and vice presidency.

George Washington, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson were never nominated by a party for the office of president.

They were the most talked about men for the job and the electors made their choice accordingly. Until the constitution was amended in 1801 the electors each voted for two men for president. The one that got the most votes became president and the one that got the second largest number became vice president.

After Jefferson announced his refusal to accept a third term it became customary for the Jefferson

like. Merely because reserves pile up at the ports or in nearby storage tanks doesn't mean that the day of plenty in gasoline and oil is approaching.

The greatest chance for relief now lies in wiping out the black market. Experts here estimated that 2,500,000 gallons of gasoline daily are being moved through black markets. If this could be stopped or materially reduced, it would mean relief for essential drivers. OPA has recognized the fact that many B-card holders don't get enough gasoline to do their essential driving. If any "extra" gas can be found, it will go to them first.

Some progress has been made in curtailing the black market, but not much. Steps are being taken to eliminate the counterfeiting of ration coupons. Enforcement authorities are working on black market rings all over the country. All this helps, but just as in Prohibition, no great strides can be made without the complete cooperation of the public.

I am assured that there is no plan whatever now for giving relief to holders of A-cards. However, the greatest latitude possible will be given them in using their small quotas as they see fit. There will be no ban on pleasure driving this summer as there was last, and if A-card holders wish to "save-up" for a little recreational junket, they are welcome to do so.

son Republicans and the federalists to make their nominations in caucuses composed of the members of congress of the respective parties.

James Madison and James Monroe were both nominated by that system.

This system, however, broke down during the "era of good feeling" and in 1824 there were four leading candidates in the field. They represented no particular parties.

John Quincy Adams was elected in 1824 and Andrew Jackson in 1828.

The first national nominating convention was held in 1832 by the National Republicans, a new party organized by Henry Clay, who was nominated to run against Jackson.

Although his renomination was a foregone conclusion, the democrats also held a convention that year and renominated Jackson.

Since then all nominations for the presidency have been made by conventions.

Today And Tomorrow

Tragedy Of A Farce

By WALTER LIPPMANN

It may be that the Montgomery Ward affair raises great constitutional issues. If so, learned judges and lawyers will have to separate them from the farce which the leading actors in the affair bumbled and stumbled into.

When the representatives of the government entered Mr. Avery's office, they had with them a copy of the Presidential order directing the Secretary of Commerce to take over the operation of the company. Mr. Avery refused to obey it. Thereupon, the government officials had to decide either to go to court to prove their authority or to enforce the Presidential order with the authority which they believed they had. They decided, wrongly so, it would seem, to enforce the order before going to court.

Having made this decision, it was then a question of how to enforce their order. They proceeded to confront Mr. Avery with nine Federal marshals. Mr. Avery would not yield peacefully to this civilian police power. On the other hand, the government officials did not tell the marshals to remove Mr. Avery. For some reason nine armed marshals seemed to them an inadequate force to deal with the aging Mr. Avery and so they called upon the United States Army to replace the marshals.

Presumably, they hoped to overawe Mr. Avery. Whether or not he was temporarily overawed by the three army trucks and the forty-four soldiers is not clear, and may, alas, never be known to the conscientious historians. What is known is that the Army arrived shortly after 6 o'clock and that almost immediately thereafter Mr. Avery remembered that it was time to go home, and perhaps to fortify himself with a drink, his dinner, and some advice. Anyway he left peacefully, walking on his own feet. Thus Montgomery Ward had been evacuated and the United States government and the Army were in physical possession.

Then the most absurd part of the affair took place. Mr. Avery was gone. Mr. Chatfield Taylor and Mr. Biddle were inside. The troops were there. The next morning Mr. Avery returned, without opposition, apparently by a back door because the government had posted its men only at the front door. Then for the second time Messrs. Chatfield Taylor and Biddle had the problem of disposing of Mr. Avery.

One thing to have done was to have given him a comfortable chair to sit in until later in the day he again felt the need to

go home for dinner, and then, when he had departed, to have seen to it that he did not come back the next morning. The physical presence of Mr. Avery in the building was not such a danger to the security of the nation but that a powerful and courageous government might have taken the risk.

It seems, however, that in their not very deeply considered judgment, Mr. Avery had to be removed at once from the premises. At this point they again had a choice. They might have ordered the marshals in civilian clothes to escort Mr. Avery to the door.

Nine marshals, with forty-four soldiers in reserve, could have done this without heavy exertion or severe exaltation, and the action would have been spared the indignity of seeing a photograph of troops, armed as for the invasion of Europe, carrying a somewhat eccentric old gentleman into the streets of Chicago.

For it was the manner in which the troops were used, far more than the legal issues involved, which has made the affair so notorious.

Not having studied the legal issues, I do not venture an opinion on them. But it seems to me that the incident which is summed up in the photograph is probably more important than the exceedingly narrow legal question of how the statute is to be construed. And the incident is important because it reminds us that we are tending to forget the distinction, which is fundamental in a republic, between the civil and the military power.

The use of the military in civil disputes should never be resorted to, unless the civil power is plainly inadequate to maintain law and order. That is why, assuming that the government had the right to remove Mr. Avery from the building, and assuming that it was wise to exercise the right, the removal should have been done by the marshals and not by the troops.

To employ troops before the civilian marshals had made any show of force was exceedingly bad practice. In this case it merely produced a silly spectacle. But the Army of the United States should not be treated so carelessly that it becomes implicated in silly spectacles.

This episode is one illustration of a general slovenliness, which we need to check, on the whole question of how the civilian and the military powers are related. One of the worst examples of it is the sentimental and rhetorical

use of the term "commander in chief" to imply that the President governs by a kind of vague and inclusive martial law. The true conception of the commander in chief is, I venture to think, quite the opposite: it is that because this is a republic, the President, who is a civilian and because he is a civilian is always supreme over the military power. To talk as if he were a kind of generalissimo is a total reversal of the meaning of commander in chief.

The supremacy of the civil power is the essence of a constitutional republic. Here was the basic objection to nominating General MacArthur while he was still an active soldier. Here is the objection to making him Secretary of War, to making, as some suggest, Admiral Leahy the Secretary of the Navy. For in a republic, no matter how deeply we trust the military and wish to defer to it in time of war, the supremacy of the civil power ought to be zealously preserved. That truth is one of the basic principles for which we stand.

USES Places 348 Workers In Jobs

A total 348 placements in the Big Spring area, including 257 to essential employers, was made by the United States Employment Service area office here during April, data announced Saturday showed.

All of the placements had been verified. They included 126 women, 31 negroes, 77 Latin Americans, 23 veterans and 18 persons physically handicapped.

During the month, 633 persons were referred on local orders, the percentage of placements to referrals thus being 55 per cent.

Stabilization activities included filing of 48 applications for statements of availability, of which 16 were granted, 15 denied and 17 either canceled or projected to other areas for determination.

In addition, 114 employers or workers were given information on the stabilization plan.

Current local orders are for the following in essential activities: laborers, linemen, cable-tool drillers, truck drivers, roustabouts, power-plant operator, bulldozer operator, stockkeeper, automobile mechanic helper, power-shovel operator, messengers, automobile mechanic, shoe salesman, stenographer, hospital workers, laundry workers and various railroad openings.
