The Sensible Way

Championing the cause of cotton and cottonseed products, the National Cotton Council has set up a new section on trade barriers and penalties.

The principal activity of this new section will be to increase the use of cottonseed oil, with major emphasis being placed upon efforts to free margarine from its present unjust burden of taxes and restrictions.

Margarine manufacturers in 1938 consumed 170,000,000 pounds of cottonseed oil. Reliable estimates indicate that use of cotton seed oil in margarine would rise as much as 33 1-3 per cent if state restrictions were lifted. If federal taxes were removed, it is estimated that margarine sales would treble.

The Cotton Council is going about this battle against trade barriers in the only sensible way. While successfully combatting 29 legislative attempts to further restrict margarine sales during the past year, it has laid a groundwork of economic research on the subject of margarine. Now it has established a new department headed by a widely known authority on the margarine problem.

An educational campaign is to be launched, telling of the true virtues of this wholesome, nutritious food product. The story will be brought home to the consumer.

The injustice of the present scheme of prohibitive restrictions and trade barriers will be shown to the people and their law-makers.

It will be a long campaign and a hard one. But only through such a program as the Council outlines can we hope to broaden and to hold this valuable market for American cottonseed. It is too valuable to risk through slipshod methods and hurried schemes.

Please Pass The Biscuit

Since the last gubernatorial campaign the plea, "Pass the Biscuit" has become a famous utterance, and if it is placed in practice in affairs of government, local, state and national, it is due to become as popular as, "Be Sure You Are Right and Go Ahead", expressed more than a century ago by that Son of the Alamo, David Crockett.

There is far more to the phrase or request than mere humor.

Just look about at public affairs generally and you will observe from year to year, the same old pie-eaters at the political counter. Elected once or employed today, the rule seems to be that the lucky ones appear to get into their blood and bones the idea that no one else has a right to aspire to their place and as time passes on, they even get to where they act like they think the offices and jobs belong solely to them and that the poor taxpayer has no rights whatsoever.

More happiness would accrue to the greatest number and even a higher degree of efficiency would be observed in the conduct of public business if the biscuit were passed around regularly.

There are men and women under the capitol dome at Austin who have been there year in and year out, almost since the dome was first built. Some of them act like they owned the capitol itself.

And the humorous part of their actions is in that they seem to believe that none can be found who can do as well as they can with the job.

It is interesting also to observe how many of these old political pie-eaters now on the payrolls, try to convince their boss that they supported him ardently in the last election; that if it had not been for them, his election would have been in doubt, and yet they pledge not to play politics to hold their jobs.

I Give You Texas

More tidings from California, the "Through-the-looking-glass" land:

In Los Angeles you drop a penny in a slot and out comes one cigar. When you buy a whole package, the salesman places the pack in a machine, pulls a lever and hands them back to you, with the corner neatly torn to enable you to remove the smokes.

Newsboys aren't numerous; you help yourself to a paper and drop the money in a container.

"Don't write the folks back home; send them a record of your voice—only 25 cents," says a sign. And you can hand the home folks even more of a thrill by spending a quarter and having any headline you want set up and printed at the top of what looks like a front page of a Hollywood newspaper, some such "streamer" as "Joe Zilch"—that's you—"Elopes With Greta Garbo."

Romance? Here's a sign, "I make violins."

Reality? A few blocks away, another sign, "We sell bullet-proof glass."

Attention, Fort Worth: Los Angeles has a Casita Manana (Little House of Tomorrow.)

There are theaters that show nothing but news-reels—(What no Mickey Mouse?)—and other theaters that stay open all night. (When do they sweep out and find the lost gloves?) And most of the theaters show double features, the titles sometimes producing surprising results as "Our Leading Citizen", "The Man They Couldn't Hang."

And, in between features, the lights come on and, apparently from the sky, voices boom, giving the latest news flashes. Also audiences applaud a particularly good bit of action or singing on the screen.

More queer names of California brands of gasoline: Vitro, Silver Gull and P.D.Q.

There was no boogie whatever at the UCLA-California game. That was news; all the papers made special mention of the fact.

Traffic in Los Angeles is fast—even faster than in Austin where they make—even if they do not observe—the laws.

The pedestrian is always right, though sometimes dead—in which case, he is dead-right.

Traffic signals at the most important corners are a bell, lights and a semaphore—all three. It's like the man who wore suspenders and a belt, too—he wasn't taking any chances.

It's quite a thrill to ride on top

of a bus. You climb an unbelievably narrow and twisting stair, then make your way on the swaying top to a seat. The rush of air and the gleam of the sun-shine and the view of trees, buildings and sky are worth the extra effort and the risk of a sprained ankle—especially if there are no seats below.

The transportation system is highly complicated; like Gaul it is divided in three parts—inturbans, buses and street cars.

Interurban fares depend on distance. Street car fares are 7 cents and bus fares a dime, except I've found one street car which charges a dime and one bus which charges 7 cents. Nobody knows when you can get a transfer and when you can't. You just ask the conductor. But even if he issues one, it is quite likely that the next conductor won't accept it. It is all delightfully informal.

Swinging back to Texas topics: The State Land Commissioner is asking bids for oil leases on submerged land belonging to the State school fund. He is asking a flat price of a certain number of dollars per acre and the lease then goes to the company that offers the most royalty. Royalty is not cash; royalty is paid out of the oil—"if" and "when" found.

And the Commissioner isn't even requiring the company that gets the lease to drill at all. What good is high royalty if a well isn't drilled?

But suppose that the company is kind enough to drill and the well turns out to be a dry hole, what good is high royalty in a duster? Three-eighths or five-eighths or eight-eighths of nothing is still nothing. And the taxpayers are the losers.

On one tract, for example, the Land Commissioner is asking \$100 an acre in cash and if a fellow comes in and offers \$1,000 an acre in cash, the Commissioner will not accept it. Does that make sense?

Under the circumstances wouldn't it be better to lease the land to the company offering the most cash on the barrel-head for the State School Fund?

Otherwise, isn't the Commissioner "gambling" with the taxpayers' land?

Gossett Announces West Point Nominations

Congressman Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls, Texas, has announced that he submitted his nominations for principal and first and second alternates for appointment to fill a vacancy at West Point to the War Department. Gossett named J. L. Mikeworth, Jr., Bellevue, Texas, as principal, Harry C. Farmer, Wichita Falls, as first alternate, and James P. Bass, Gainesville, Texas, as second alternate.

The West Point entrance examination is to be held beginning on March 5, 1940. The successful candidate must demonstrate that

he measures up to certain physical and educational standards. His physical fitness is determined by examination; his educational qualifications may be shown by regular mental examination or by the submission of certain prescribed certificates with validating examination. The successful candidate will report to the Academy the first day in July 1940.

The United States Military Academy is an institution established by the government for the practical and theoretical training of young men for the military service. However, its cadets are given a comprehensive and general education of collegiate grade. Each cadet is paid at the rate of \$1,053.75 per annum during the time he remains a cadet.

Thompson Still Urges Oil Tax

A report from the Comptroller's office on gasoline tax collections for the past fiscal year was made the vehicle for a statement by Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson to again urge an oil tax. Thompson said, in part:

"I notice by the report of the

Comptroller, recently issued, that Texas was able to tax only sixteen per cent of the eight billions of gallons of gasoline produced in this state during the last fiscal year. Texas' production of gasoline of 5,155,949,121 gallons went into interstate commerce; 1 1/2 billion gallons in export—practically 84 per cent thus escaping taxation, having gone into interstate and foreign commerce.

"If we would put a 5 cent a barrel tax on oil, all of the gasoline that went into interstate and foreign commerce would bear its fair share of the severance tax and Texans would pay only 14 per cent of this tax. In other words, here is up-to-date proof that all of our social security needs could be met by a 5 cent a barrel tax on oil and it would be paid 84 per cent by people outside of Texas."

Keeps Clear Record

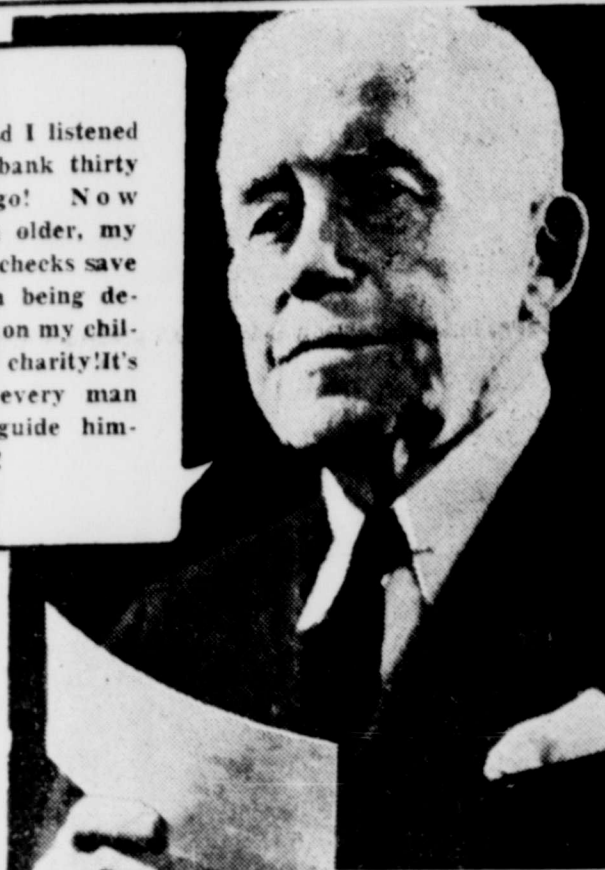
Not a single traffic fatality

The value of music in keeping your child out of prison. By John Hendricks, conductor of San Quentin prison band. "Where there is Music, there can't be Mischieff!"

"What," might question the one who knows nothing of the subject, has music to do with discipline? To those who may have gone through the discipline of musical study, or have experienced rehabilitation through the influence of great music, the answer is very clear. The effect

of hearing and really knowing music, on the human character, is intangible, but none the less profound. "It is a significant fact that a surprisingly small number of inmates have had former musical training, especially in their young years. Why is this? It is unquestionably because those who had this discipline in their youth did not go wrong. Music helped them in two ways, discipline and character-building. Why doesn't the traditional Little Willie want to study music? Every parent knows that Little Willie would rather do almost anything else. Is it because Little Willie isn't musical? Not at all. Little Willie doesn't like anything that requires concentrated and disciplined effort day in and day out over a period of years. Something which means hourly practice or more before or after the regular school day. If Little Willie, in spite of the distaste for discipline, natural in any healthy growing boy, succeeds in sticking with a musical instrument until it is mastered, he will rarely go wrong. He has had a training in self-mastery, represented by hours of work daily, over a long period of time. He has also had the influence of being on intimate terms with musical masterpieces. That is the reason that we practically have no inmates who had a vigorous early musical training. Such students almost never become inmates. (Mr. Woodall.)

VOICE-TEXAS

By Pierce Brooks

T. H. McKee of Vernon, former state official, has proposed that Texas collect \$25,000,000 a year for old age pensions and social security by converting liquor sales to the state monopoly plan, whereby the state will receive the profit on all liquor that is sold. The states now getting all the profit from liquor sales, he says, are Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire, Ohio, Virginia, Michigan, Alabama, Iowa, Utah, Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

According to the state treasury department, the total state deficit in the state general fund, on November 6, 1939, was \$23,578,086.88. At this time last year it was \$18,523,586.52.

Prospects for a double-barrelled Thanksgiving Day celebration in Texas have caused the turkey raisers of the state to clap their hands in glee and increase their holiday dinners 17 per cent, according to Dr. F. A. Buechel, assistant director of the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas.

A test of 1940's election swing is foreseen in the East Texan Senatorial District when a successor is chosen to Senator Clay Cotton, who recently resigned to become state gas utilities director.

The Value of Cotton Stalks

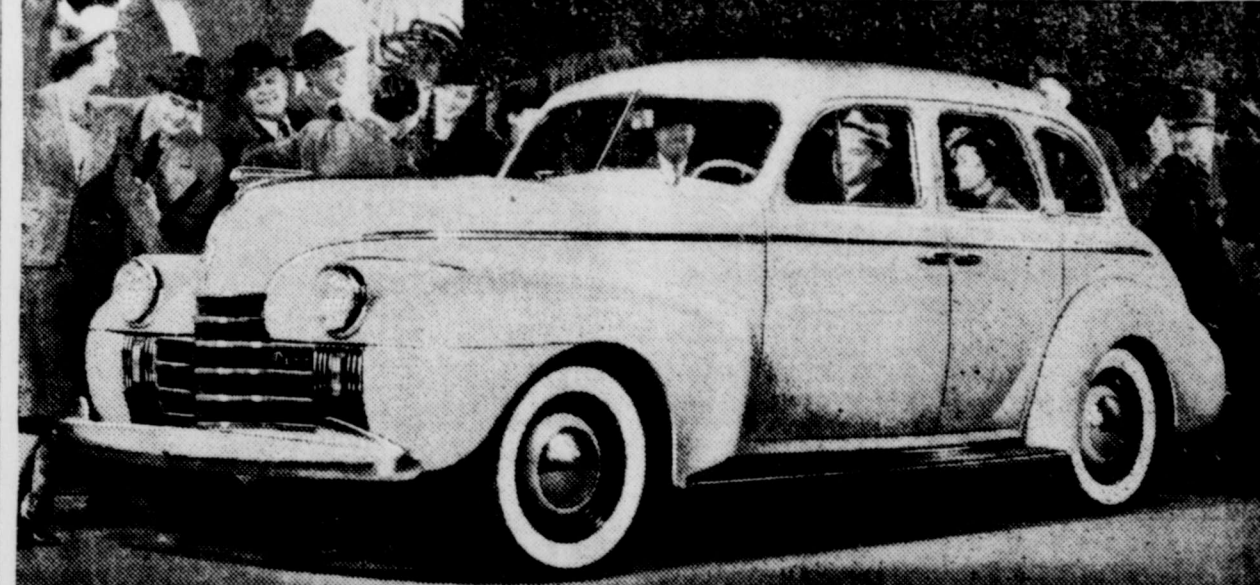
1. An acre of average cotton in Texas has about 2,400 pounds of stalks and leaves.
2. This many pounds contains 40 pounds of nitrogen which is worth \$4 per ton.
3. If the farmer burns these stalks and leaves this nitrogen is entirely lost to the soil.
4. There is also seven pounds of phosphorus and 33 pounds of potash worth \$2 per acre as fertilizer in cotton stalks. These may not be lost by burning but they are left in such a state as to be readily lost by leaching.
5. Cotton produced on land where stalks have been turned under will average ten pounds of lint more per acre than cotton grown on land where cotton stalks have been burned. Experiments have proven this.
6. The 2,400 pounds of cotton stalks and leaves per acre are capable of forming 800 pounds of humus as it decomposes. Most soils need humus.
7. Turned under cotton stalks help to hold the soil. They prevent washing. Stalks should be chopped up with a stalk cutter while the stalks are still green, so they will rot.
8. Not a single acre of cotton stalks should be burned this fall and winter, because if they are burned you burn up \$6 worth of fertilizer per acre, you destroy 800 pounds of humus which is badly needed, you decrease the water-holding capacity of your soil, you help to wash away your land, and you destroy ten pounds of lint cotton per acre. Mr. Landowner, think this over before making any plans to burn your cotton stalks this fall.
