Catfish On Wall Street

Finance Journal Spotlights C-City

The nation's most prestigious financial and business newspaper has put Colorado City catfish in its news spotlight.

Reporting on rapid growth of the new catfish industry, the Wall Street Journal news article contained information on catfish farming in the midwest, Texas and south.

Douglas Martin, staff reporter for the financial newspaper, was the writer.

Specifically mentioned by Martin was Colorado City's James Kelley, who is commercially marketing his "Kilowatt Catfish" raised in Lake Colorado City.

Kelley has a lease agreement with Texas Electric Service Company for growing the fish in special cages in the company's canal at Lake Colorado City.

The Wall Street Journal reported, in the article, that nationwide output is expected to reach 84,000 tons by 1975--up from an estimated 37,500 tons this year. Production was only a mere 13,500 tons in 1968.

In addition to emphasizing the

tremendous growth industry wide for the catfish business, the newspaper reported on "pioneer" in the business, including Colorado City's Kelley.

"Using cages, another farmer, James Kelley of Colorado City Texas," the Wall Street Journal states on page 1, "originator of kilowatt catfish" (the only shocking thing is the

Annex Furniture

City Okays \$1,475 Purchase

The city is purchasing \$1,475 in new furniture for the Police & Municipal Court building next to City Hall.

Renovation of the building into the municipal annex has been slowed the last two weeks because of rain.

However, the building is expected to be completed within the next few weeks.

City Council authorized purchase of the furniture for the lobby, police chief's office, municipal judge's chamber and po-

Included are 3 desks, a table, 20 chairs, 3 swivel chairs, modular seating for the lobby and corner table.

The furniture will be basically steel.

price)," the Journal report continues. "Mr. Kelley claims to be able to produce 35 pounds of catfish in a cubic foot of cage space every four months.

"His operation is considered so unusual that a group of Japanese fish farmers recently came to examine it."

Key observers believe the county has about 30,000 acres of cotton left--maybe as much as 34,000 or 35,000--from its original 60,000 acre allotment. Loraine and China Grove areas especially have bright prospects.

The county could easily make over 20,000 bales, said one observer. Another, who was predicted 3,000 less bales than the county produced last year, said with good luck the crop now could hit 25,000.

(CATTLE: The culling and selling off of herds came to an abrupt halt after almost half of Mitchell cattle had been sold.

Repetition of the rain plus the cloud cover has provided exceptional soaking of the ground. Fall and winter grass is just about assured.

Stock tanks, except in a few isolated spots, are full. Some running around, overflowing.

Grass is growing now, but experts urge caution and are urging deferment of grazing, where possible, to allow a seed crop from the late growth.

There will be a demand for stocker calves, but some cattlemen told the Record they will not be stocking again soon.

GRAINS: Rains have brought ideal planting conditions for wheat, oats, barley and rye. The job will begin as soon as equipment can be taken into fields.

Farmers and ranchers will take advantage of small grains for forage. Evidence from Texas A&M Extension Service is that rye is superior in this Rolling Plains area for grazing.

Crop conditions are enhanced by the fact that the moisture had penetrated extraordinarily deep for August rain, thus improving soil seasoning.

Three weeks ago the cotton outlook was bleak with drought suffering plants having no deep moisture to draw on.

Cotton Crop Goes Up With Moisture

Include a late frost date with unprecedented August rains and Mitchell County's 1971 crop year suddenly has a frightening glow.

Not a bumper crop. Far from that, but an upturn that substantially increases the pocketbook prospects for farmers, ranchers and business.

Revised cotton crop predictions for Mitchell County now are pointing to a harvest of more than 20,000 bales. Some as high as 25,000 bales.

Repeat rains with cooling, hang-around clouds has changed the crop situation as well as for cattle, sheep and small grains.

Moisture measuring as much as an entire foot in some areas of the county has reversed the drought trend. J. W. Bennett in Loraine has measured 11.1 inches of rain on his gauge since July 24. Here in Colorado City the official U.S. Weather Bureau gauge at the city sewage disposal plant on South Side, the measurement is 5.85 inches since Aug. 1 - plus more Saturday.

Here is a check list of conditions since the soaking rains:

COTTON: All areas looking up except those locations, especially in the county's western section, that was "given up" earlier.

The heaviest rainfall for Colorado City fell Aug. 1 when 3.17 inches was recorded at the city sewage treatment plant. On Aug. 2, .05 was recorded, one-tenth was recorded Aug. 8 and only a trace fell Monday, Tuesday, .57 was recorded, .31 fell Wednesday, 1.17 was recorded Thursday and .08 fell Friday. Four-tenths was recorded Saturday.

Farmers will be able to make the most of their cotton crop by spot harvesting. Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service is telling producers to "sit tight . . . wait and see how their individual crops turn out . . . then they can better determine their harvest methods."

County Agent Bobby Lemons, who figures the county now could "easily make over 20,000 bales" if good conditions continue, urges farmers to be

especially alert now to cotton insect infestation.

The moisture is expected to increase this threat, which could be costly.

Cotton generally is behind schedule about 3 weeks in setting fruit, according to Lemons. That is why it is important that the crop gets the benefit of a late frost and doesn't suffer from insect build up.

We've had bollworms go

through one-time and it hurt," the county agent said. "We expect the second generation to begin laying eggs this week and next . . . especially with these showers and cloudy weather.

Bollweevil population is generally lower across the county than at the same time last year," according to Lemons. Not as many weevils made it through the winter. But with new conditions farmers should be especially alert."

Lake Back To Pre Drouth Level

Colorado City has received an official rainfall since Aug. 1 of 5.85 inches. However, the rainfall has been much heavier in other areas as the rain was spotted at times.

In Loraine, J. W. Bennett reports he has recorded 11.1 inches since the rain started July 24, including a total rainfall for last week of 1.3 inches.

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Last week's rains raised the elevation of Lake Colorado City to 2,058.15, an increase of 1.45 feet since Wednesday. Water was still flowing into both lakes at the beginning of the weekend.

Record Sale To Earn Funds

Colorado High Band members, only 2 days after starting their pre-school rehearsals, will begin knocking on doors for their major fund-raising campaign.

It will be the band's annual sale of Colorado City Record 1-year subscriptions: with commissions and bonuses going into the band's fund for special projects and equipment.

Band Director Dwight Tomb has called for the first band rehearsal for Monday morning, 8 o'clock.

Then, Wednesday the band begins the annual subscription drive which has earned the band and its students members almost \$9,000 cash in the last 10 years.

Each 12-month subscription the band members sell will earn a commission for the band that will go into the organization's fund for educational trips, musical projects and purchase of equipment.

In addition, the Record offers special bonuses from day to day that offer opportunity to increase the band's earnings with volume sales.

The band's subscription campaign will be for only 3 days, beginning Wednesday and concluding Friday. There will be no extension.

Prices in the band campaign will be the regular Record subscription prices -- \$5.50 for each 12-month subscription delivered inside Mitchell County

and \$6.90 for each 12-month subscription delivered outside of Mitchell County. A special \$4.50 college student subscription will be sold by the band for a 9-month college term.

The 12-month subscription of \$5.50 saves the buyer \$5.94 when compared to the newsstand price of 10 cents plus 1-cent sales tax for each of the 104 editions in a year.

Band members are eagerly awaiting their first appearance this fall in their just-arrived new red and black uniforms. But the pre-school rehearsals and more classes and drills after the start of school are due before the uniforms debut.

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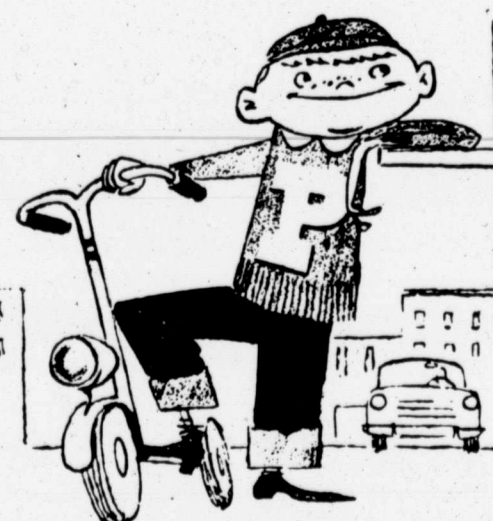

Mrs. Don Stewart was first runner-up in women's tennis.

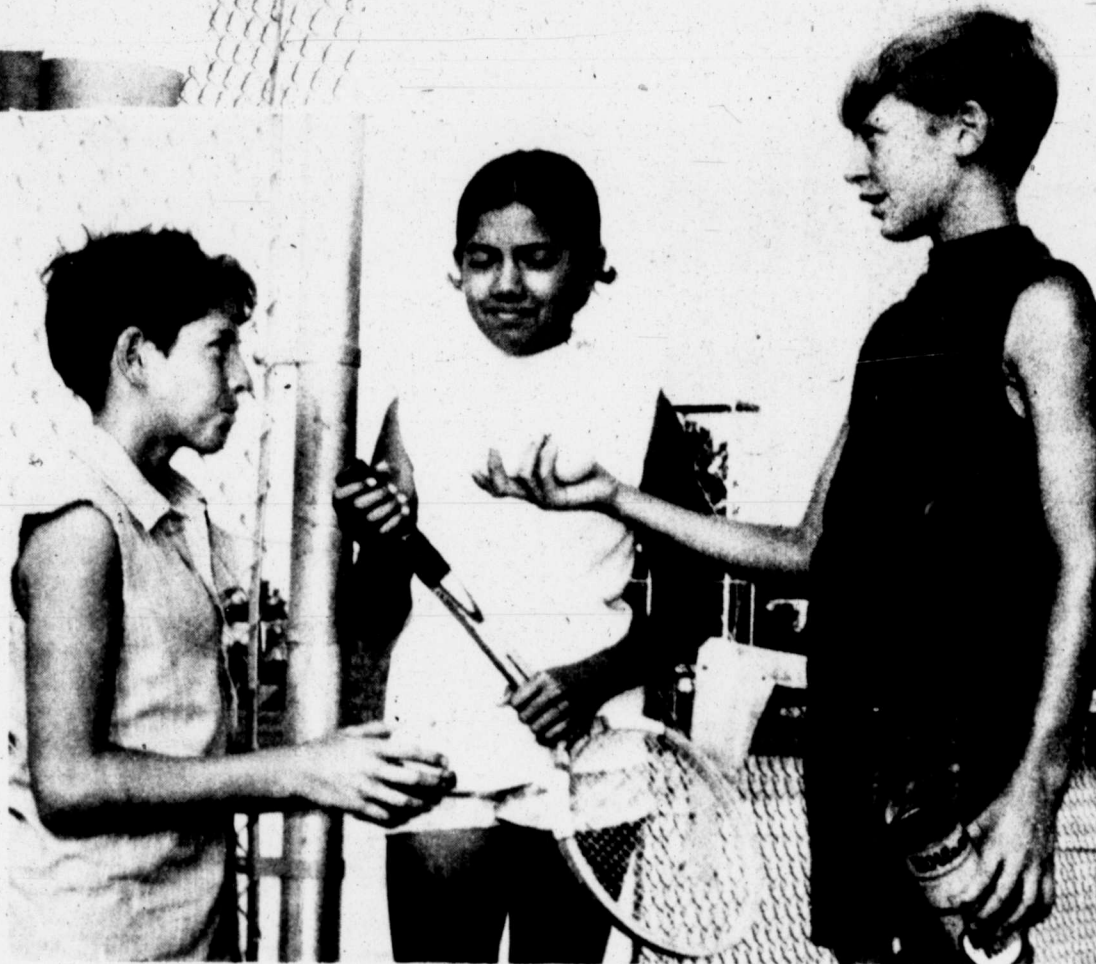

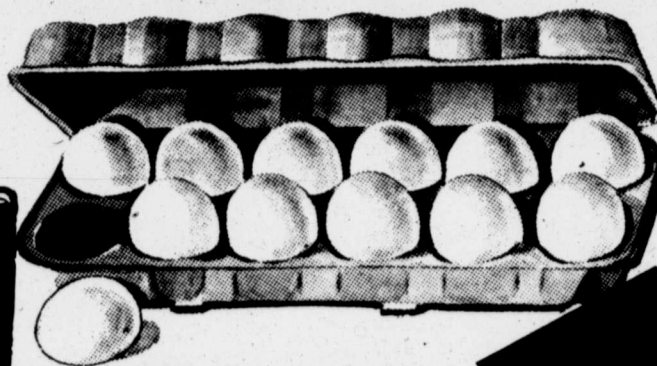
