## 4-H'ers Win In Wichita Beef Show

Several Knox County 4-H members placed in the recent Wichita Falls Junior Steer Show, according to Tommy Antilley, County Extension Agent.

In the Lightweight Hereford class, Angie Partridge placed second and Janet Zeissel placed fourth. In the Heavyweight Hereford class, Julie Partridge placed seventh and Melissa Zeissel placed eighth. In the Lightweight crossbred class, Shannon Ryder placed ninth.

In the Medium Lightweight crosses, Shannon Ryder placed twelfth and in the Mediumweight class, Tammy Carver placed fifth. In the Heavy Medium class of crosses, Mary Zeissel placed seventh with Doug Brown placing sixth and sixteenth, Shari Brown placing thirteenth, Julie Partridge placing fifth and Dave Partridge placing seventh and fifteenth in the Heavyweight crossbred class. In the Heavy Heavyweight class of crosses, Melissa Zeissel placed fifth and Shari Brown placed eleventh.

These exhibitors placed very well against strong competition from 26 counties of Texas and Oklahoma, Antilley stated. Six of the above steers qualified for the premium sale.

## Area Farmers At Stamford Ag Day

A number of area persons were among several hundred farmers who attended American Agriculture Day in Stamford last Friday and heard Mrs. Elizabeth Ann 'Bitsy' Hill, wife of the attorney general and Democratic candidate for governor, tell the group that a bigger share of the farm dollar must go to farmers.

Due to extremely cold weather, the meeting was held in the Grand Theatre on the south side of the square.

Mrs. Hill, who had addressed Hamlin farmers several weeks ago, said that difficulties facing farmers are "not just the problems of farmers and ranchers." She explained, "With Texas being the third largest agricultural state, we can't ignore the effects on urban economies."

The Stamford farmers presented a memorial plaque to Judy Tankersley, widow of Knox City farmer Bobby Tankersley, who was killed in an automobile accident Feb. 2 while returning home from an American Agriculture meeting in Dallas.

## Farmers Hear Morrow

Approximately 200 persons were on hand Monday night in the Knox City school cafeteria to hear American Agriculture speaker Monte Morrow of Carnegie, Oklahoma, warn farmers, "Since we're only four per cent of the nation's population, if we don't stand up for our rights, no one else is going to!"

Morrow, who has spoken at a number of area AAM meetings, agreed to come to Knox City as speaker after Bob Price of Guthrie, Oklahoma, was snowed in and unable to get here.

For those who were attending their first meeting, Morrow explained the five demands AAM backers are asking for including:

1. One hundred per cent of parity for all domestically used or consumed agricultural produce.
2. One hundred per cent of parity for all foreign exports of agricultural produce.
3. All agricultural products produced for national and international food reserve shall be contracted by any or all governments at 100% parity.

Mrs. King, 85, died Wednesday, February 8, at 6:00 a.m. in the Knox City Hospital after a lengthy illness.

4. Creation of an entity or structure with inputs from farmers to handle marketing or American agricultural products at 100% of parity.

5. Meat and livestock imports must be stopped until parity prices are reached.

Farmers and ranchers were asked to talk to their neighbors, get involved, and stick together in the efforts to get a fair price for their commodities. "We do not want subsidies, and are not asking for handouts," Morrow explained.

He went on to say, "Although we are not in the news everyday now, we're still making progress. Bills, as a direct result of the AAM

effort, are being written and studied in an effort to help the farmers and ranchers. Although some of the bills are a one-year temporary relief type, at least legislation is being introduced for consideration."

Other speakers included Rick Perry and Ken Lane, both of Haskell, who reported on other legislation and various experiences in their recent trip to Washington.

Clifford Cornett gave the invocation and David Albus eulogized the late Bobby Tankersley for his untiring efforts in promoting the American Agriculture Movement.

Herbert Bellinghausen told the group that he would be going to McAllen for several days to help in the movement there and asked for any volunteers to go.

Wives of the participating farmers served coffee and doughnuts to the crowd following the program.

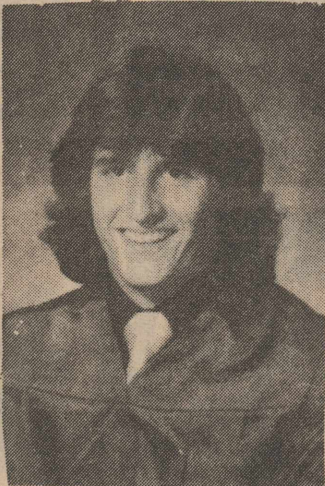
## HOUNDETTES NEWS

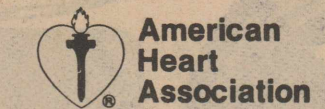
MIKE HOWELL
