Sexual assault charges top police report

Charges of sexual assault and indecency with a child were filed against a 25 year-old Winters

man, according to Winters Police Chief Tim Dexter. Free on bonds totaling \$60,000 is

Johnny Fines, of Winters.

Investigating police officer Russell Johnson said that the incidents leading to the arrest allegedly involved a 14 year-old female and that the investigation revealed that the alleged contacts occurred over a four-year period.

The charges against Fines will be referred to the next session of the Grand Jury.

Chief Dexter also said that officers also investigated, in non-related cases, two incidents of injury to a child. He said that although no charges were filed in one of the cases, the complaint and investigation resulted in the revocation of the state license held by a child-care facility.

The chief said that a total of 109 calls were handled by his department during November. The calls ranged from false burglar or intrusion alarms, to assisting citizens, to assisting other agencies. Also officers were busy with traffic enforcement and with alcohol-related incidents and domestic disturbances.

Booze raids net officers total of 13 arrests

Winters Police officers began a crack-down on alcohol consumption by minors this past week end and made 12 arrests for minors in possession of alcoholic beverage and charged one adult with making alcoholic beverages available to a minor.

Police officer Russell Johnson said that the misdemeanor charge of making available was filed against Crystal May Mullins, 29, of Winters. The maximum fine allowed, \$216, was assessed by Municipal J. C. Hodnett on the charge.

Johnson said that each of the 12 minors were issued citations on the misdemeanor possession charges and were fined \$113.50 each.

Officers said that over three and one-half cases of beer was confiscated in the raids along with one bottle of whiskey and several wine bottles.

The police department spokesman said that, "due to complaints received by the

police department and members of the Winters City Council, local parking lots would be heavily patrolled."

The police activity was spurred, initially, by a concerned citizens group that sought this type enforcement.

Have unpaid traffic tickets? you can pay up, or else

One of the steps being taken by Winters' reorganized Police Department is to clear the record books of unpaid citations.

Chief Tim Dexter said that officers have been checking the docket books to determine which citations have been paid and which have not.

He said that tickets which have not been paid will have arrest warrants issued and that officers will be making arrests to clear up the old cases.

By late Tuesday, about 30 arrest warrants had been issued by the municipal court and that officers are continuing their search of the docket and that a large number of warrants will be

issued and served by the time the program is ended.

Dexter said that, in cases where a ticket is not paid, additional charges of "Failure to Appear" will also be filed and that those charges will carry additional fines.

The chief said that in some of the cases found already, the persons who received the tickets had received at least one or more letters informing them of their outstanding traffic ticket.

Chief Dexter said that those who had received tickets and letters "had no excuse for not taking care of the tickets," and that the warrants would be issued and served.

Winters EMS Association to sell emergency house lights

Members of the Winters Emergency Medical Services Association and new EMT students will be offering, for sale, the "911 Emergency Flash-Lite".

Many times the response of an emergency vehicle is delayed when drivers have difficulty locating homes, particularly at night when house number are impossible to see or directions to the house are unclear.

The "911 Emergency Flash-Lite" creates a beacon which signals approaching emergency vehicles, helping the driver find the home more quickly.

It can alert neighbors to a need for help or if you call an emergency service, such as fire, police, or ambulance, it identifies to them which house they are to

respond to.

People can get emergency equipment to the right house faster by notifying an emergency agency when you call for help that you have a "911 Emergency Flash-Lite" and simply go to the house where the light is flashing.

The "911 Emergency Flash-Lite" can be obtained by contacting any Winters EMT or student in the current Winters EMS Association/TSTI class or by contacting North Runnels Emergency Service at 1102 North Concho or calling 754-5775. The price is only \$12.95.

Poe's corner

The J. B. Guys Celebrate 50th Milestone

Sunrise and sunset, sunrise and sunset, how quickly the years have flown. It seems only yesterday, but it was 48 years ago, that George hired a young married man to plow for him and it terminated into a lasting friendship.

"At my age a 32 year old man seemed old, but George thought young," said J. B. Guy.

J. B., son of Mr. and Mrs. Buford Guy of Wingate and Margaret Ramille (Doll), daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. L. Barron, eloped December 9, 1938 and were married at a Methodist preacher's house in Ballinger.

Caddo was the first home of the newly weds, but it lasted only four weeks. J. B. borrowed \$5 to move and grubbed mesquites for a man who had a contract to clear land for the government. Doll cried every night from homesickness and J. B. said he borrowed \$10 to come home on. They lived at Wingate for a time. In 1940 the couple moved to Winters and J. B. began driving a tractor for George.

On the 4th day of July, J. B. wanted to attend the Barron

family picnic at State Park. His salary was \$1.75 a day, but he offered to pay a boy \$5 plow for him. George observed the young man was plowing up his cotton. He told J. B. he would plow for him while he took the boy home, pay him \$5 to finish the work and then take him to State Park and we all enjoyed the outing.

"We lived all over Winters," said Doll, who got her name when she was baby, brother, Pat, wanted to pick her up. His mother said, "No, she's like a little doll, you'll hurt her." The name stuck.

The Guy's first home was west of Sonny's Grocery and Market on Dale Street. They lived in the Rock Hotel for a time, but were in a red brick apartment on West Parsonage for the longest stay.

The war was on and rather than be drafted, J. B. joined the Sea-Bee's. He spent 33 months in the South Pacific from October of 1942 to November of 1945. The United States was in a hurry to build air strips for the Naval Air Force and sent the boys over in a converted Danish freighter that had its own crew.

They arrived at Guadalcanal in 45 days, but spent two weeks in harbor before they could land.

The ship's galley was below deck, hot and smelly. The daily menu was oatmeal for breakfast; an apple for lunch; dried beef, gravy and bread for supper. J. B. and a friend went ashore and got two sea bags full of spam from the Marines. They lived on spam and an occasional piece of bread for two weeks, and never went to the galley again. J. B. has been unable to eat spam since then until just recently.

In the ten months J. B. was on Guadalcanal his crew withstood 198 airraids from the Japanese. They were trying to get their island back from the Americans. "We had to get up and repair Henderson Airfield, an old metal strip landing, when it was bombed, sometimes in the middle of the night. Tokyo Rose warned us on the radio when there was to be a raid, which was every night. We could tell by the sound that one plane came each time. We named it 'Washing Machine Charlie'."

The Sea-Bees moved on to the Admiralty Islands where they stayed one year and built the B-29 airstrip for the Navy. It was here that J. B. learned how to handle heavy equipment such as the roadgrader, bulldozer, shovel, drag lines and motorgrader. He came out of the war as Machinist Mate, 1st Class. He received three bronze stars and a presidential citation.

While J. B. was serving his country, George and I tried to

help Doll with the children, J. B. Junior and Margaret, born while her daddy was overseas. George took junior to get his first haircut and bought him a baseball—how he could throw that ball.

The Guys moved to Dr. Barron's farm south of town in 1946—there was a big hail storm in May. It hailed again in August of 1958, when J. B. was on the tractor, and wiped them out. He quit farming and went to work in the oil patch.

The Guys went with us on several vacation trips to Ruidoso. George told J. B. he had discovered how he could make Doll happy; Keep a car in the driveway for her to use, a sack of potatoes under the sink and some plums in her hand.

Once when J. B. was down in his back; he could stand or lie down, but not sit, George put a cot and mattress in the back of his station wagon and carried J. B. with him.

J. B. was always accommodating and helped me when George didn't think my ideas would work. When I wanted to add a wooden valance to my drapes to make them long enough for my new home in Winters, George said it couldn't be done. All we had to do was drive a single nail slant wise through the top of the board into the wall at each end and the job was finished. George sat and watched us, still saying, "I didn't think it could be done."

The Guys moved to Abilene in 1961 and J. B. worked for Thornton's laying carpet for five years. He then sold Great Southwest Life Insurance until 1973, and they returned to Winters. He was then employed by E. J. Bishop and Sons Dirt Contractors until retirement in 1987. He says he is now employed by his son, Junior, who has the same type business in Winters. They have three daughters: Margaret DeMarco of Hobbs, New Mexico, Mary Paske and Elizabeth Stewart, both of Ballinger. There are 16 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

The Guys have made one concession to retirement. J. B. bought the Sun Ray, a platoon type boat, for fishing trips back in 1985, but he has been unable to persuade Doll to ride in it.

Students urged to apply for private, grants, scholarships

Graduate, Undergraduate, and College-bound students in need of supplemental funding for college are urged to write to the Scholarship Bank for information on private scholarship sources.

The Scholarship Bank is a non-profit foundation which works with private foundations, the U.S. Department of Education, and financial aid offices to assure the high school and college students already attending college receive information on private aid sources. Funds are normally awarded on such basis as academic standing, major, financial need, and even on a students willingness to consider a special research project.

It is estimated that over 500 million dollars in private aid money will be distributed next year, or roughly one-fourth of all

available aid. Funds for Undergraduate students range from \$1,000 to \$20,000 per student, with most scholarships renewable yearly. Graduate level grants are also available with values up to \$25,000.

National Organizations are funding women 25 and older who are returning to school to continue their education. Older female awards range from \$500 to \$20,000.

Prussic acid poisoning in livestock

Grazing of certain frost-damaged pastures and forages can lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock, said Allen Turner, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt, said Mr. Turner. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within ten days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as the actual poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes, Mr. Turner said.

Symptoms of prussic acid poisoning may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

Here are some steps to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock:

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.
2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.
3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows

any signs of poisoning.

4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians.

5. Have suspect plant material checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories at College Station or Amarillo. Local veterinarians will be happy to submit samples for you.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed, said Mr. Turner.

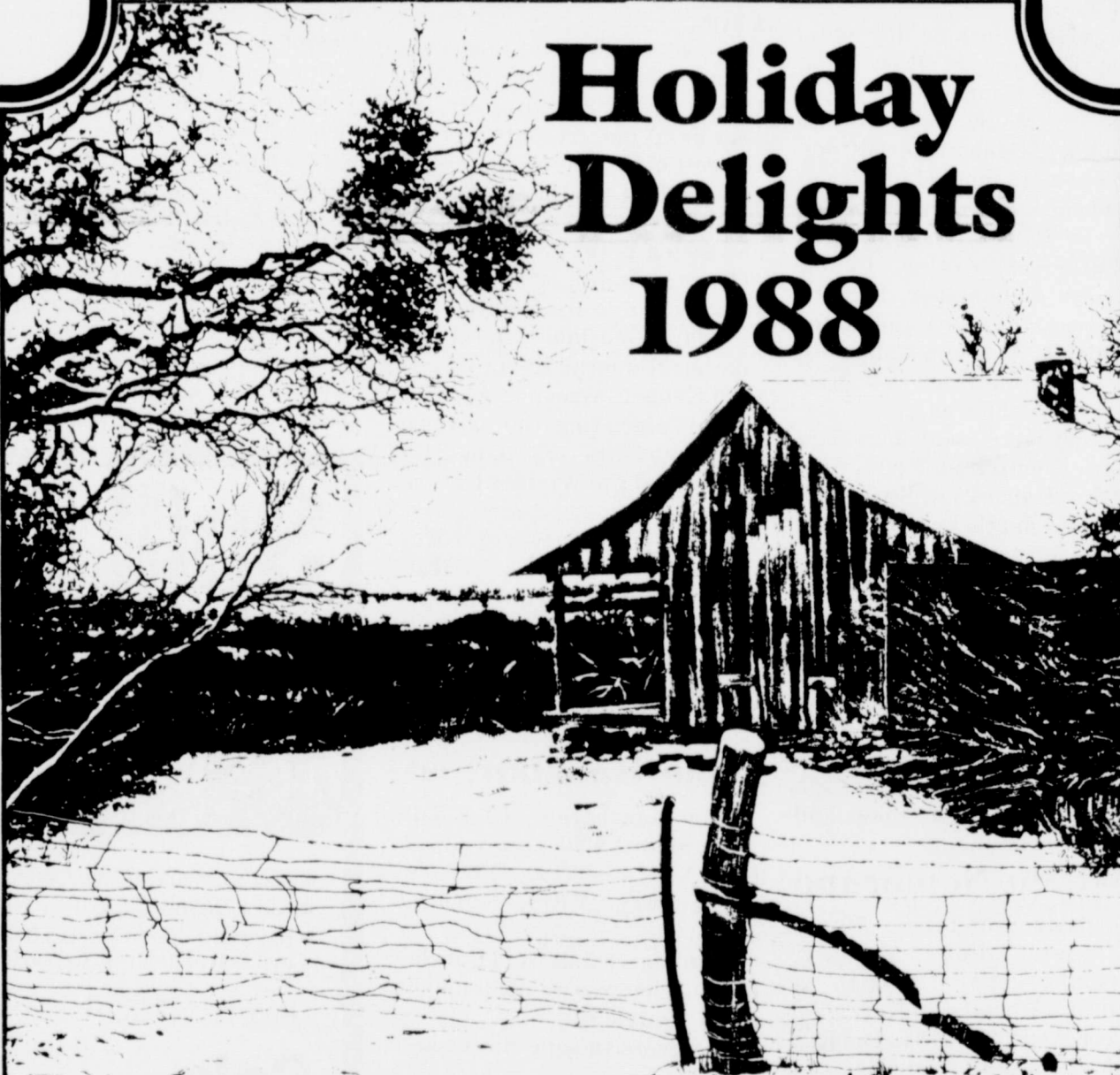
Comments regarding the parade have been excellent and it was so good because of the efforts of a lot of people.
