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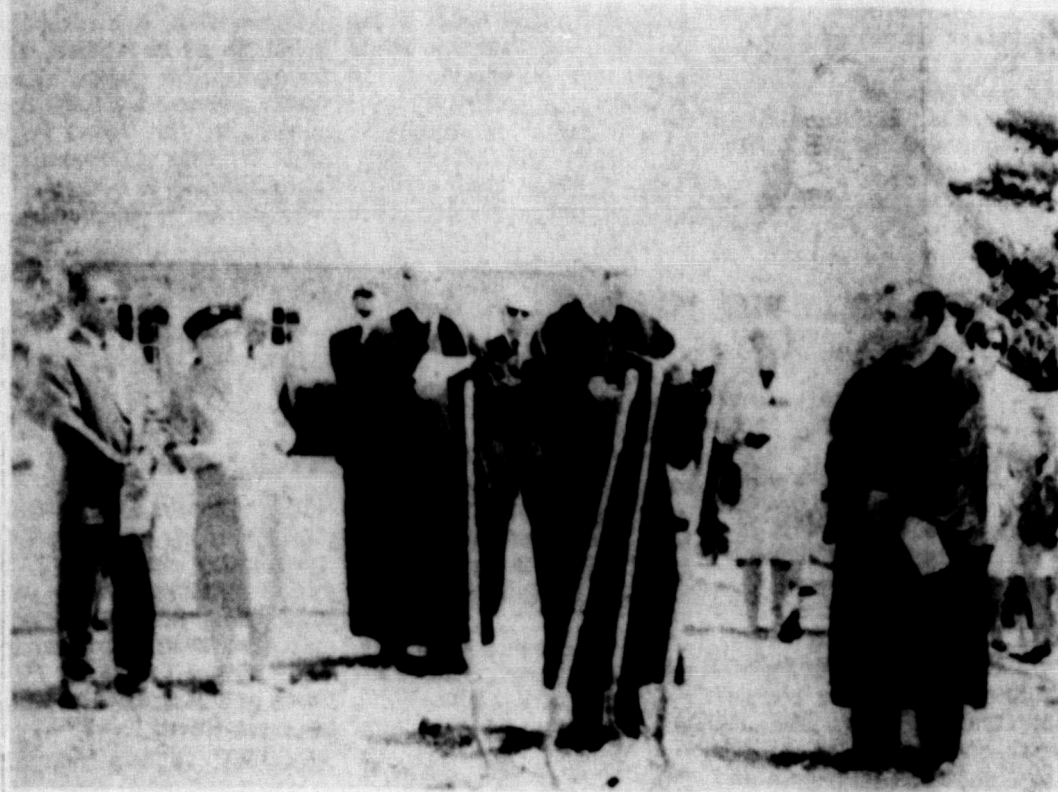

1/2 cup sour cream  
1 teas. salt  
2 teas. sugar  
2 tbs. vinegar  
1 cup canned crushed pineapple, drained  
1 teas. caraway seeds  
Dash paprika  
2 cups green cabbage, finely shredded and crisped in ice water.  
Blend cream, salt, sugar, vinegar, pineapple, caraway seeds and paprika. Chill at least an hour. Drain cabbage well and mix with dressing.

1 head cabbage finely shredded and crisped in ice water:  
1 cup diced pineapple  
1/2 cup green grapes, cut in half and seeded  
1 cup dairy sour cream  
1 cup mayonnaise  
3 tbs. sugar  
1 tbs. lemon juice  
1 teas. grated orange rind  
Shredded toasted blanched almonds  
Combine the chilled cabbage with the pineapple and grapes. Mix the sour cream, mayonnaise, sugar, lemon juice, and orange rind. Toss the cabbage lightly but thoroughly with the dressing and mound on a platter. Sprinkle with almonds. Chill before serving.

2 tbs. chopped onion  
1 tbs. butter  
1 can cream of mushroom

soup  
1/2 cup water  
1 cup shredded sharp cheese  
1 tbs. sherry (optional)

2 tbs. chopped pimiento  
1 tbs. chopped parsley  
In saucepan, brown ham and onion in the butter until onion is tender. Blend in soup, water and cheese, along with the sherry if desired. Cook over low heat till cheese melts, stirring often. **Amistad Producing Good Size Bass**

Del Rio — With Amistad Lake at 23,000 of its eventual 67,000 acres, fishing is steadily improving and producing several sizes of bass. Large numbers of bass in the 5 to 6 pound class are being caught as well as others weighing from 1 1/2 pounds to 2 pounds. The smaller fish are probably made up of river fish, fish from Devil's Lake, Lake Walk, and the 2,503,400 bass stocked by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department since 1965.

The lake is presently at an estimated one-fourth the acre-feet of anticipated water.

Bass spawning has begun with some females already spent and others with eggs ready to spawn.

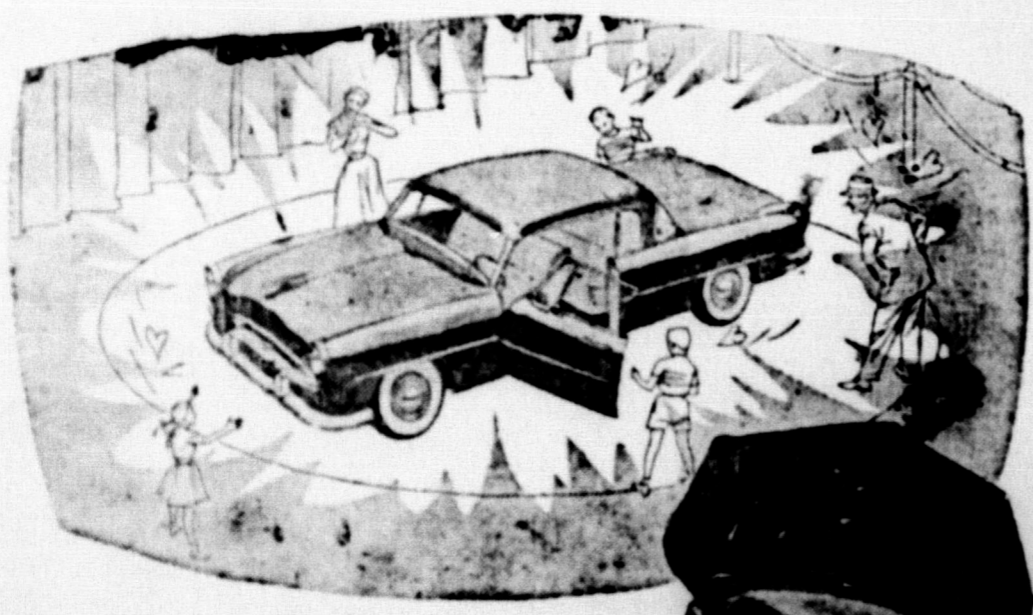

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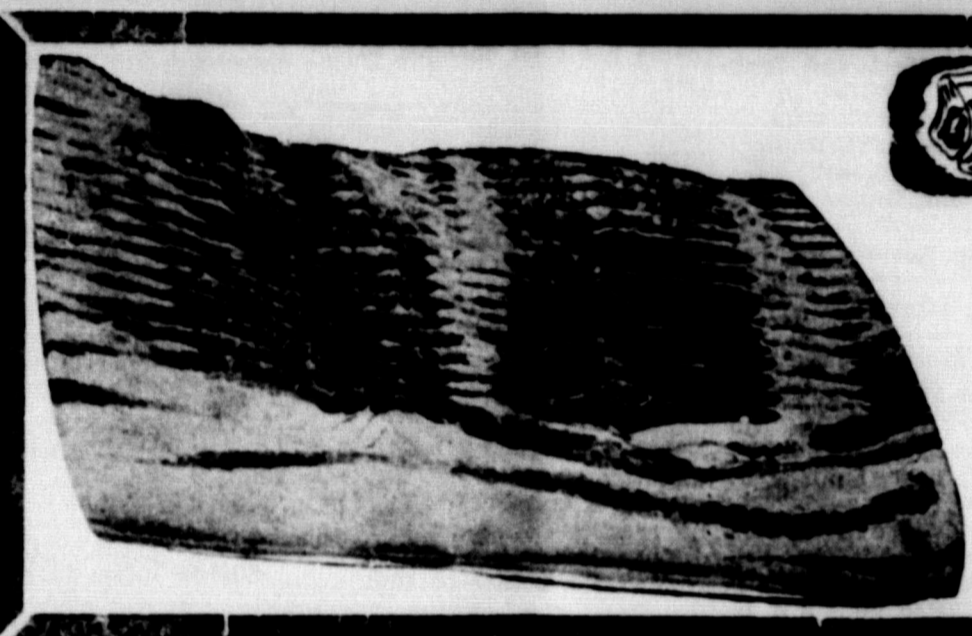

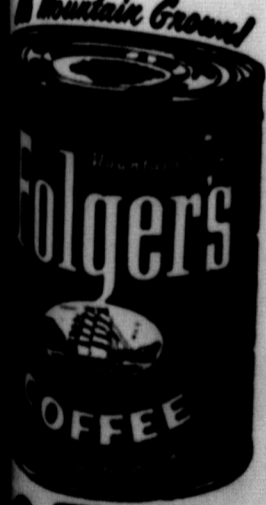

I. P. (Canyon) opener. It is the No. 1-40 Harvick.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 467 feet from the south and 990 feet from the west lines of 40-A-TCRR. Estimated elevation is 2,150 feet.

The proposed opener of the V. I. P. field, The Rodman Corp., Midland, No. 1-47 Harvick, was finalized Dec. 8, 1967, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.8 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 33,292-1, through perforations at 5,446-6,140 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 100,000 gallons and 150,000 pounds of sand.

### UIL Awards Rule Forbids Athletes To Accept Gifts

As the 1968-69 school term draws to a close and high school athletes prepare for various summer sports, it seems timely to remind officials, parents, and athletes of the Awards Rule, Article XVI, Section I, of the Constitution and Contest Rules of the University Interscholastic League.

Each year numerous boys forfeit their eligibility and some high schools face penalties because of violation of the Awards Rule.

These awards usually consist of gifts to athletes of articles which have a cash value and are usually given by booster clubs or other organizations of well wishers.

The State Executive Committee has ruled that Article XVI applies to awards given by the school, or awards received by a pupil from any source whatsoever for participating in interschool athletics. Awards, rewards, gifts or other valuable consideration received for participation in athletic contests other than interschool events are covered by the Amateur Rule, which will be explained in the next edition of the paper.

This rule shall not be interpreted to prohibit the acceptance of certificates, provided they are printed on paper, do not exceed 9"x12" in size, and are not framed or laminated, and are given by the school or by the district executive committee. The penalty for violating this rule may be suspension.

Every administrator, parent and coach should be familiar with these rules as well as the athletes. They should also know the acceptance of medals, trophies and cups in addition to the maximum established under the Awards Rule is prohibited unless they are won through participating in a meet or tournament.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR3)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding one dollar (\$1) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows:

"Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law.

(b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto.

(c) Traid bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b.

(d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.

(e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR5)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purpose of providing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the State shall be subject to the provisions of the Constitution of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized by its legal purpose; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the religious society, which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

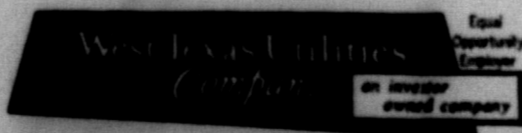
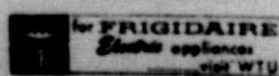
