City To Build New Civic House

Civic House Here To Be Sold For Industrial Expansion

The Colorado City Civic House, owned and operated for some 20 years by the Colorado City Jaycees, has been sold to the Colorado City Industrial Team, Inc.

The Industrial Team, after signing papers to purchase the building in cooperation with the City National Bank, will lease the building to the Colorado City Manufacturing Co., Inc.

Izzy Freudenrich of Dallas, owner of Colorado City Manufacturing, is to be in Colorado City today (Thursday) to sign papers to lease the building to expand his sewing plant.

The Industrial Team has been

working with Freudenrich for some six months to help him make plans for expansion that he has been wanting to make. Freudenrich said the additional space will enable the sewing plant to add about 25 workers.

Upon completion of the sale, the Jaycees, represented in signing ceremonies by President Bob Mitchell and Secretary-Treasurer S. L. (Sonny) Pawkett Jr., announced that the purchase price of the building will be turned over to the City of Colorado City to help in building a new civic house.

The City Council of Colorado City has passed a resolution pledging the city to build a new civic house within a year after final papers have been signed on the sell of the existing civic center.

The Chamber of Commerce offices will continue to be located in the Civic House under arrangements made with Colorado City Manufacturing.

Civic Clubs who have been using the Civic House for the past two decades will be meeting at the Baker Hotel Restaurant until a new Civic Center is built.

A site for the new Civic Center has not yet been selected but two locations are being seriously considered.

City Manager J.A. Sadler Jr., has estimated that it will cost the City between \$50,000 and \$75,000 to build the new Civic Center. The new civic center,

when completed will be owned and operated by the City of Colorado City.

Financing of the new Civic Center can be done without a tax increase and with funds that will become available during the next few years, Sadler told the council before they passed a resolution to pledge the city to build the new facility. (See resolution in accompanying story).

Colorado City Manufacturing, makers of women's apparel bearing the "Jeanne" label, is now in its fourth year of operations here.

The sewing factory was the first industry attracted to Colorado City and Mitchell County in a campaign to attract industry here.

The sewing plant first began operations in the old national guard armory on First Street and was later expanded to include part of the civic house which the Industrial Team purchased two years ago and leased to the sewing factory.

Operations at the plant now includes all facets of garment making from cutting the material to the finished product.

The fabric is sent here from the firm's headquarters in Dallas. It is cut into desired patterns and then workers sew the material into a vast array of garments, ranging from slacks to dresses to hot pants.

Mrs. Wayne Denson of Hermleigh is manager for the local

operation with the help of supervisors Jessie Mae Merket, Billie Sewell and Leona Cupp.

As many as 98 employees have been working at the plant in recent months. There is an average of 80 employees at the plant with an average weekly payroll of \$7,000.

The sale of the civic house, the pledge by the city to build a newer, more modern facility and the expansion of the manufacturing concern was hailed by civic leaders as a big step forward in Mitchell County's march for progress.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, it is the considered opinion of the City Council of the City of Colorado City, Texas that a Civic Center is for the use and benefit of all the people and,

WHEREAS, the citizens of Colorado City and Mitchell County have enjoyed said use and benefits of a Civic Center for some twenty years, and

WHEREAS, there is a possibility of these citizens being deprived of said usage due to the sale of the present facility for industrial expansion:

Now, Therefore, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Colorado City, Texas, that said City shall and will, within one year from date of title transfer of said facility, construct and build a new Civic Center at a suitable location within the limits of Colorado City, Texas.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED BY SAID CITY COUNCIL, that title to said structure, land and equipment shall be vested with the City of Colorado City and said City shall herein after operate the Civic Center for the benefit of all the people.

Absentee Voting Underway

Absentee voting is underway in Colorado City for upcoming elections for city council members and school board trustees.

Absentee voting in the city council race will continue until March 30 with the election to be held Tuesday April 3. The voting, absentee and on election day, is to be done at City Hall.

Absentee voting in the school board race is being held at the tax assessor-collector's office on Walnut and will continue through April 3 with the election to be held Saturday, April 7.

Under the new voter registration set-up, if you registered any time last year and have not moved, you are still a registered voter. It is no longer necessary to register every year.

This is the first time in three years that there is a contested election in the city council race and the first time in many years that there have been this many candidates. There are nine candidates vying for four positions.

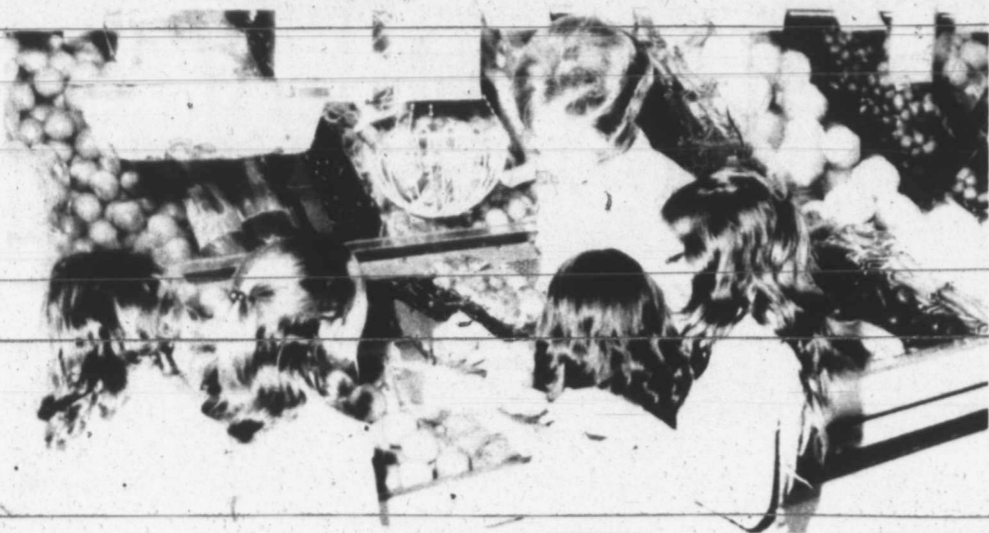
