Red Cross Lifesaving By Bodzin

Mitchell County Red Cross has announced that its summer program for lifesaver training will begin Monday, with Milton Bodzin of Abilene as instructor.

Bodzin said that on Monday, he would meet with those interested at 10 a.m. and at 5 p.m. at Ruddick Park here. After Monday, trainees will meet once daily, with the time to be determined by the largest group appearing at the two designated times, Monday.

Bodzin, a qualified water-safety instructor, said that training would be for a minimum of 16 hours. He is a former science teacher in Colorado City, now teaching in Abilene.

Those interested must be at least 12 years old or in the 7th grade, and must be able to swim at least 220 yards, using crawl, side stroke and breast stroke. The trainee must tread water 1 minute, and be able to float one minute, among other things, Bodzin said.

CHS Teacher Roy Johnson Gets Grant

Roy R. Johnson, chemistry teacher at Colorado High School has been selected to participate in the Summer Institute for High School Teachers of Science and Math at the University of Missouri at Rolla, Mo.

The Institute, sponsored by the National Science Foundation, carries with it a stipend of \$600, a dependency allowance of \$450 and travel allowance of \$68. The eight week session will begin Monday, June 13, and end Saturday, August 6.

Johnson will be enrolled in courses in advanced inorganic chemistry for secondary teachers and in intermediate general physics or calculus with analytical geometry (Math 8).

Official Protest Seen In Train Discontinuance

Groups Joining To Stop Move

Colorado City is expected to join other towns between Fort Worth and El Paso in filing an official protest over the proposed discontinuance of passenger train service along the route.

Plans are now underway by Texas and Pacific and Missouri and Pacific to file an application with the Texas Railroad Commission to stop all passenger trains between Ft. Worth and El Paso.

Cities along the route are presently planning to make a joint effort of protest in blocking the move. The official protest, which will be filed with the Railroad Commission, is being worked out among the cities at this time and should be completed in the near future.

E. E. Spencer, the railroad's passenger traffic manager from St. Louis, Mo., is currently conducting a series of talks with city, county and chamber of commerce officials along the route prior to the filing of a formal application with the Railroad Commission. These meetings began June 2 and will end Friday.

Local officials attended one such meeting in Sweetwater Wednesday to hear the railroad's reasons for seeking to discontinue the passenger service.

Attending were City Manager Ford Merritt, County Judge Elmer Martin, Chamber manager Mrs. Don Guitler, Jimmy Kelley, Dr. Ralph Graham and Farris Lipps.

The two trains in question are Nos. 26 and 27 which are the only two remaining on the route.

Spencer cited the loss of post office contracts for carrying the mail as one of the prime reasons behind the move to stop the passenger trains.

The railroad official cited various methods used by his company to encourage passenger travel.

Among these were railroad credit cards, a credit plan of "go now, pay later," serving of "tasty and thrifty" meals on dining cars, serving of free coffee twice a day, honoring of coach fare tickets on sleeper cars, group plans for reduced fares and a plan for more economical travel by family groups.

During the question and answer period at Sweetwater, it was brought out by some present that these measures were not well-advertised. Spencer said the railroad budgeted \$250,000 per year for advertising for the past ten years.

Sweetwater City Manager Buster Fuller said the T&P train was currently making a breakfast stop at Colorado City where passengers were taken to a note where they were charged more than the price of the normal menu.

In a talk with Jack Richardson, manager of the Baker Hotel, Saturday morning, he explained that the prices for train passengers were higher than the regular menu called for because it was necessary for the hotel to put on extra help to handle the passengers.

In addition Richardson explained that since only 22 minutes was allotted for the stop it was necessary to prepare the food in advance. He said any leftover food was the hotel's liability.

Asked if the railroad knew of the higher prices for their passengers, Richardson said the hotel and the railroad had a "verbal agreement" on the matter.

"We don't have any sort of contract with the railroad" the manager said.

Richardson said the current policy on train passengers was in operation when he assumed management of the hotel.

City Manager Ford Merritt said the protest matter would be taken up at Monday night's meeting of the City Council. "I'm sure the city will join in with the unified protest," he added.

County Judge Martin said the matter would also be discussed at the Commissioners' Court meeting Monday. "In my opinion the county will join in the protest," Martin said.

In addition to the loss of mail contracts, Spencer cited the dwindling number of passengers that were patronizing the trains along the route.

On local boardings Spencer had company figures showing that one passenger every 17 days boarded train 27 and went to Big Spring or some point west of Big Spring.

One passenger every four and one fourth days detrained at C-City from train 27.

One every other day boarded train 26, principally headed for Fort Worth or beyond. One every nine days came to C-City on train 26 from Big Spring or some point west.

Rev. Gene Greer of Loraine Methodist is moving to Union Methodist in Snyder and will be replaced by Rev. Ray Copeland of Coahoma Methodist.

Rev. S. M. Bean of Westbrook is retiring and will serve as retired minister at Luaders. His successor will be named later.

At Buford Rev. Jesse Dea continues on the Snyder Circuit for the second year and will also serve at Dunn.

Rev. Egger, has served at First Methodist for the past 12 years after coming here from Dimmitt. He served as president of the Mitchell County Ministerial Alliance and is on the Chamber of Commerce civic improvement committee.

In addition he is a Lions Club member.

Rev. and Mrs. Egger are the parents of two sons, Charles, a CHS junior, and Darris Jr. who is serving in the United States Navy.

Currently, he is serving as conference missionary secretary and has been director for three tours of missions in Mexico, Hawaii and Europe. He served on the district board of church location and on the district ministerial qualifications committee.

Earl Guitar said the gin plant would be completely overhauled with some new machinery added to increase the ginning capacity and to give better turnouts and grades.

Marcus Vest, longtime manager of the plant under previous owners, will continue in the same position for the Guitar company. Vest said his policy would continue to be that of giving the maximum in ginning service for the lowest possible charges.

Plans are indefinite at the present time as to the disposition of the Concrete Gin plant that has been owned and operated for many years by the Guitar firm. The company did say, however, that the Concrete Gin would not be operated during the coming season.

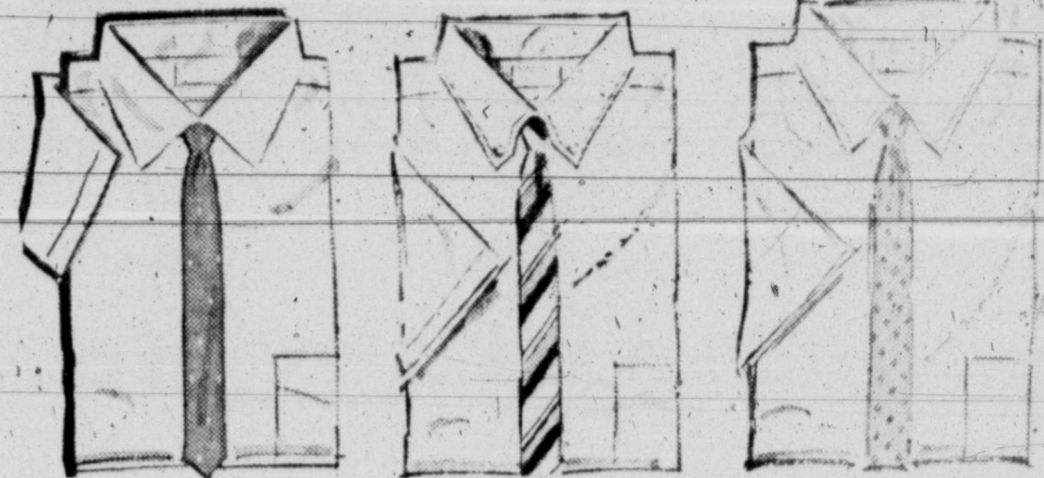

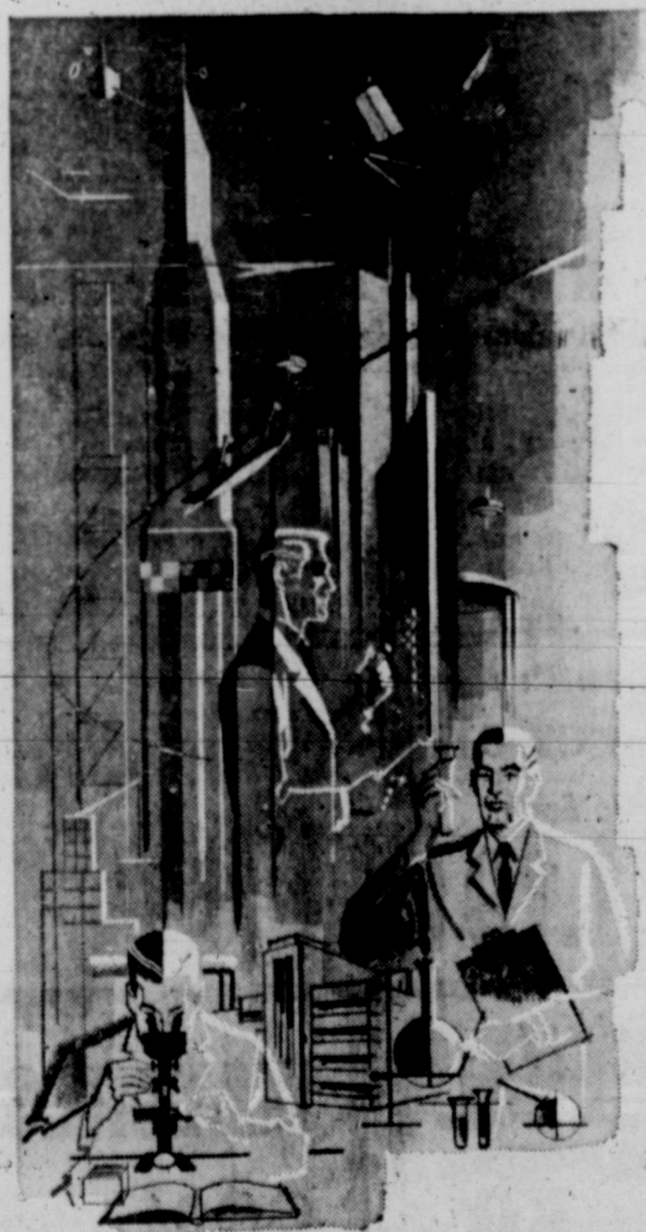

I never COULD get used to.

NEVER could get used to having a man around the house growing a beard of any length, shape, or distinction. Never could in this world stop being amazed — but not amused at the sight of young men singers (the term is used lightly) with shoulder-length hair. And has it ever struck you that nearly every one of them show crooked teeth when they howl? Forgive me, children. Know you love 'em.
