## GROOM BANK IS ROBBED

**AMARILLO, June 8.**—The State National Bank at Groom, 40 miles east of Amarillo, was robbed of \$1,200 this morning and the arrival of the night watchman at the bank saved a greater loss, according to reports received here from that place.

The bank was entered through a window which had been raised after a screen had been cut.

A crowbar and a pick, stolen from the tool house of the railroad section gang were the only tools used in the work.

The robbers escaped while the night watchman was seeking aid. The number of robbers was not learned.

**BERLIN, June 8.**—Germany's veteran president and field marshal, Paul Von Hindenburg, received Clarence Chamberlin and Charles Levine at the executive mansion today, congratulating them on their achievement in spanning the Atlantic Ocean by air from New York to Germany.

The interview lasted eighteen minutes. The president handed each of his visitors a fine autographed portrait of himself.

After questioning the Americans as to details of their flight, he expressed the hope that it would contribute to bringing the American and German people in closer communion.

The Stars and Stripes were displayed all about the business section of Berlin, often in clusters with the German national colors and the Prussian state flag.

## CONGRESS TO MEET IN OCTOBER

## JNO. WEEKS ON STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY



John A. Weeks, pioneer druggist of Ballinger, is again a member of the State Board of Pharmacy, being appointed several weeks ago by Gov. Moody, and whose appointment with three other members of the board, was confirmed by the state senate Tuesday.

Other members of the board are: Ed Russell, of Laredo; Erwin Joseph, of Austin; and Paul Carroll, of Texarkana. Willford Harrison, of Wichita Falls, a Moody appointee, was not confirmed. Mr. Harrison had been appointed previously by Gov. M. A. Ferguson, and later by Gov. Moody, but the Senate failed to confirm the appointment.

Mr. Weeks was one of the first to serve on this board, which was created in 1907. He served continuously on the board until 1922 when Gov. Pat Neff named his successor. Mr. Weeks served for a number of years as president of the board, and also as treasurer. Gov. Campbell in 1907 first appointed Mr. Weeks on the board. Erwin Joseph, of Austin, is the only man on the present board who was appointed and served under the Ferguson administration. Mr. Harrison served under the Neff and Ferguson administrations.

### MOVIE CAREER CAUSES 3 GIRLS TO LEAVE HOME

Their desire to get to Hollywood and join the motion picture colony caused Valera Avery, 13; Mayree Curby, 14; and Franky Watson, 16, Winters girls, to start afoot to the West Coast last Saturday night.

The girls had visions of becoming great film actresses, equal to Clara Bow, Bebe Daniels, Corinne Griffith, Gloria Swanson and other stars of the screen, and longed to get away from home to join the large crowd that daily awaits parts as extras on locations in California.

However, they have been apprehended and at a place a long distance from their home town. Sheriff R. E. McWilliams had officers stop the three would-be actresses at Fort Sumner, Guadalupe county, New Mexico.

The fathers of the three girls tried in vain to locate them and finally with all hope gone, came to Ballinger and furnished Sheriff McWilliams with expense money. The sheriff wired officers at cities along three routes to California, and Tuesday afternoon received an answering telegram from Fort Sumner officers that they had the girls.

Walking, and riding with tourists, the girls had made their way more than 400 miles from their home. A few more days and the girls would have no doubt been at their destination, probably only to meet disappointment and disillusionment.

The fathers of the girls left Winters early Wednesday morning for Fort Sumner to bring the wanderers back home.

## SPECIAL MEET HAS CLOSED

**AUSTIN, June 8.**—The fate of appropriations totalling more than \$47,000,000 under Governor Moody's blue pencil, commanded the center of interest today after the special session of the legislature adjourned last night.

About \$44,000,000 of the sum is to come out of the general revenue, however the finance committee of the House and Senate express the belief that the ad valorem tax rate of about thirty cents will produce the necessary revenue even if the governor vetoes none of the appropriations.

(By Associated Press)

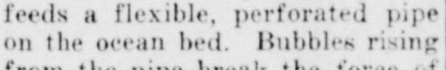

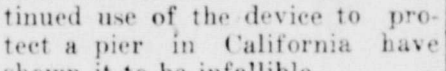

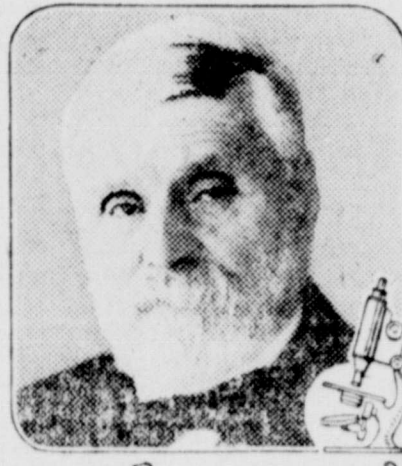

**HOUSTON YOUTHS HOLD WALL-SCALING RECORD**

HOUSTON, June 7.—Eight Houston youths can run 25 feet to a board wall, 9 1/2 feet high, scale it without mechanical aid and run 25 feet beyond faster than any other group of lads in America. "We expect to get into Los Angeles in about two weeks," Layman asserted. "We have the word 'Kentucky' printed on our haversacks. Sometimes we blow ourselves to a big cafe dinner but usually we both eat and sleep out in the open."
