Bryan Irons Wins Opening Contest In Hart Beat Guessing Game

School Board Okays Budget

Hart Board of Education approved a budget of \$686,349.00 as presented by Superintendent Ted Averitt for the 1974-75 school year. This budget is an increase of

\$27,631.00 from the 1973-74 school year with most of this increase going for increased salaries for school personnel.

The board approved the lease of a new pick-up for \$900 a year for Vocational Agriculture teacher Lanny Tucker.

In final action, the board approved the employment of a custodian under the Emergency Employment Act with the school paying 12 percent of the salary and the Federal Government paying 88 percent.

The following enrollment report as of Monday, Sept. 9, was given to the board.

Kindergarten - 50; 1st, 48; 2nd, 58; 3rd - 59; 4th, 69; 5th - 68; 6th, 53 make a total of 405 Elementary students; 7th - 65; 8th - 32; 9th, 50; 10 - 44; 11 - 22; 12 - 38 make a total of 251 Jr. High and High School students. Total number of students, enrolled in Hart I.S.D. is 656.

The Halloween Carnival was set for October 31 in the elementary gymnasium from 7 to 10 p.m.

Fans Lauded For Support

"Anton has a much better team than the score indicates," head coach Lonnie Phillips said this week of the Longhorns 70 to 13 drudging of the Bulldogs.

Horns Chew Bulldogs, 70-13

The Hart Longhorns opened their 1974 season with an impressive 70-13 victory over the visiting Anton Bulldogs. Friday night Hart's new defense rose to every occasion to completely shut out the Anton ground attack, while the powerful Maroon offensive machine ground out score after score.

The Bulldogs successful in scoring only once on the ground also scored once through the air. Ronnie Peacock caught a 28 yard pass from quarterback Zane Butler, and Donald Willis scored from one yard out for the Bulldogs.

Hart's offensive line proved itself by constantly knocking holes in the Anton defense, and allowed Terry Hill and Donald Robinson to score three times each. Lester Aven, Danny

George, Barry George, and Kerry George all tallied scores for the Horns.

Hart took the opening kickoff at its own 18 and Barry George romped to the Anton 46 before being dragged down by several Bulldog defenders. Behind the powerful running of George, and Hill, Hart drove to its first touchdown with ease. Terry Hill powered in from six yards out, and Danny George hit

brother Barry in the endzone for two. With 10:38 left in the first period Hart led 8-0.

Anton opened its first drive from the 35 but the constant pressure of the Longhorn defense stopped the initial drive of the Bulldogs and the Maroon Gang held on a fourth and short yardage situation to retake possession of the ball. Terry Hill lost the handle on the pigskin on third down and the Bulldogs recovered on the Hart 31.

Three plays later, Anton's Zane Butler threw to Ronnie Peacock for 28 yards and Anton's only touchdown of the first half. Lon Timms added the extra point and with just over seven minutes left in the period the score stood at 8-7.

The Longhorns took control of the game at that point as Hart drove from its own 26

yard line to paydirt in 11 plays
behind the running of George,
Hill and Lester Aven. Hill
carried the final four yards for
the score and following a
missed extra point attempt the
Horns led 14-7.
Anton ran into trouble on its
next possession as the Maroon
Gang carried the fight to the
Bulldogs and Danny Carson
recovered a Bulldog fumble on
the Anton 20.
Two plays later Terry Hill
tore down the middle behind
fine blocking and went twelve
yards for Hart's third score. A
two point conversion attempt
was successful and Hart led
22-7 with 10 minutes left in the
first half.
Anton took the kickoff on its

12 and moved to the 29 before
the Longhorn defense forced
another fumble. Dean Hill
recovered for the Horns and
four plays later, Lester Aven
broke away and raced 14 yards
for Hart's fourth tally. The
extras failed and with eight
minutes remaining in the half
the Horns led 28-7.
Anton began a drive from its
30 on its next possession and
moved to the Hart 34, aided by
a 25 yard run by Paul
Coronado. The Maroon Gang
rose to stop the Bulldogs for no
gain on four successive plays
however and took over the ball.
The Longhorns mounted a 67
yard drive behind the running
of Donald Robinson and Terry
Hill and Robinson capped the
drive with a one yard scoring
plunge with just over two
minutes left in the half. The
Horns succeeded on a two point

conversion and led 36-7.
If the Bulldogs were hoping
for miracle before the half they
didn't get it as the hard hitting
Horns forced a fumble at the
Anton 21 and recovered.
Donald Robinson covered the
distance in one play to score
and Danny George booted the
extra point with 2:19 remaining
to make it 43-7.
The Bulldogs drove to their
own 32 and stalled again. Hart
drove 32 yards in two plays,
scoring on a 15 yard pass from
Danny George to brother
Kerry, and Danny George
booted the extras to make the
score 51-7 as the half ended.
The Bulldogs took the second
half kickoff on their own 30 but
were forced back to their 24.
Jimmy Kennedy then recover-
ed a Bulldog fumble for Hart at
the 22 and it took Hart only two
plays to draw fresh blood.

Donald Robinson charged 21
yards for Hart's eighth
touchdown of the night and
George connected once more
for the extra point as Hart took
a 58-7 lead with nine minutes
left in the third period.
Anton drove to the Hart 41
on its next possession with the
aid of a 24 yard pass to Ronnie
Peacock but the Horns killed
the threat when Pat Steiert
forced Zane Butler to fumble.
Danny George recovered for
the Horns.
Hart failed to sustain a drive
and the Bulldogs started their
only other scoring drive from
their own 26. Aided by
penalties the Bulldogs drove to
the Hart five, but it took the
Bulldogs four plays to punch
the score across against a
rugged Hart defense. Donald
Willis went the final yard with
one minute left in the third
period and the two point
conversion attempt failed to
make the score 58-13.
The Horns took possession at
their own 48 following the
kickoff and in two plays the
Horns drove 52 yards to score
with slashing runs by Lester
Aven. He gained eleven yards
on his first carry, then raced
forty one yards to score with
nine seconds left in the third
period. The extra point failed
and Hart held a 64-13 lead.
Hart forced another fumble
on Anton's next possession and
Dean Hill recovered for the
Horns. The Longhorns closed
out their scoring for the night
with a brother-to-brother
combination. Kerry George
connected with brother Danny
with a pass which covered 20
yards. The try for extras failed
and with six minutes left in the
game the score was 70-13.
The Longhorns drove to the
Anton 12 on their next
possession before the clock
expired.
Hart's entire defensive unit
turned in a sparkling perfor-
mance with hard-hitting, ag-
gressive play. The offensive
line also played an excellent
game, clearing gaping holes for
the runners. The backfield
showed an excellent balance of
speed and determination.
Hart will travel to Shallo-
water Friday to take on the
Mustangs. Kickoff time is set
for 8 p.m. as the Longhorns
seek their second win of the
season.

SUPERIOR CHOCOLATE FUDGE

This keeps well if stored in cool place.

4 c. sugar
1 (14½ oz.) can evaporated milk
1 c. butter or margarine
1 (12 oz.) pkg. chocolate chips
1 (7 oz.) jar marshmallow creme (about 2 c.)
1 t. vanilla

1 c. broken walnuts or pecans
Combine sugar, evaporated milk and butter in saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring frequently, to the soft ball stage. Remove from heat; add chocolate chips, marshmallow creme, vanilla and nuts. Beat until chocolate melts and blends into mixture. Pour into greased 9" pan. Cut when cool and firm. Makes about 4 pounds.

BARBECUED LIMAS AND HAM

1½ c. dried large lima beans
1 t. salt

5 c. water
1 c. cubed cooled ham
1 med. onion, sliced
½ c. catsup
1 T. Worcestershire sauce
1 t. salt
¼ t. chili powder
dash tabasco

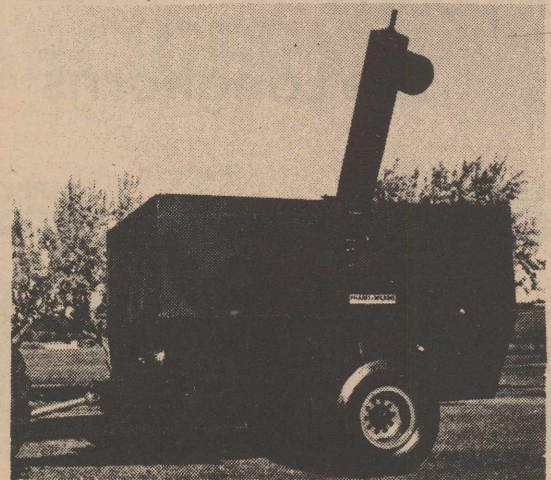
Heat beans, salt, and water to boiling. Cover and simmer for one hour. Drain, reserving ½ c. liquid. Heat oven to 350°.

Layer beans, ham and onion in ungreased 2 quart bean pot or casserole. Stir together remaining ingredients and the reserved liquid; pour over beans. Cover; bake one hour or until beans are tender.
