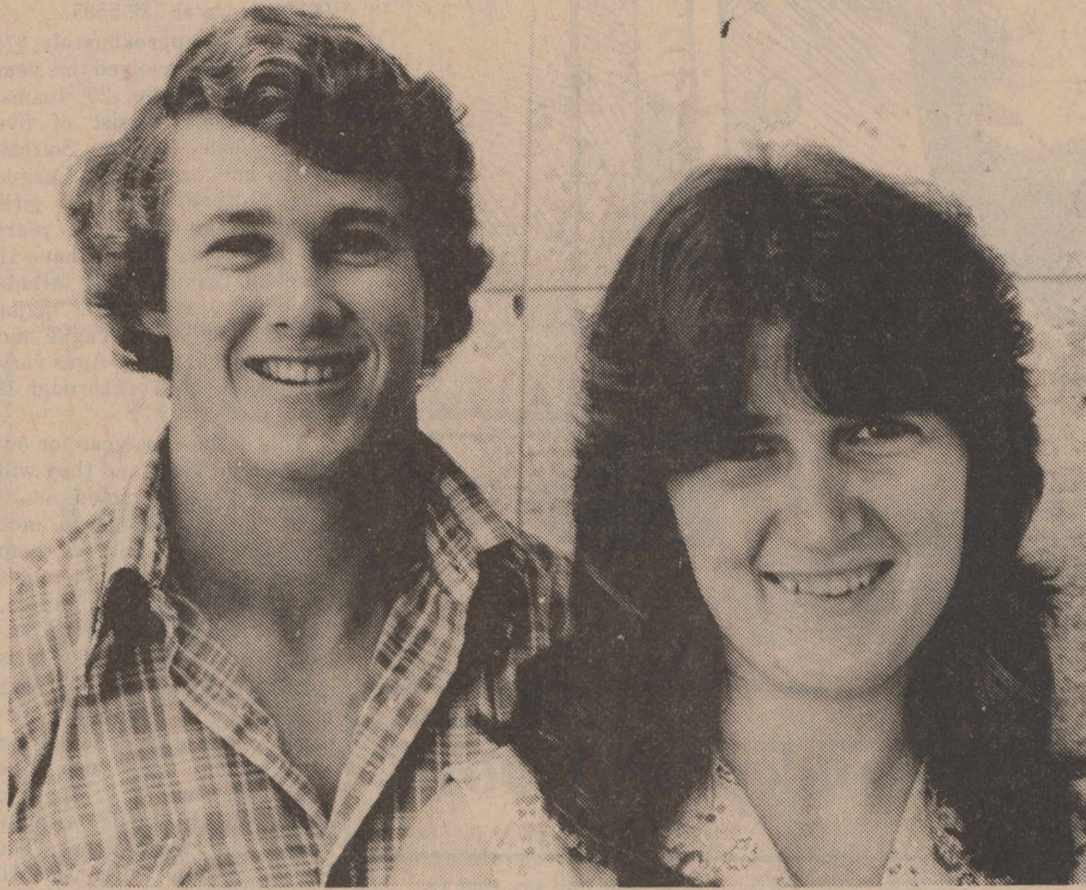

Dietze, Fake Top Senior Class For 1977

John Fredrick Dietze and Deborah Lynn Fake have been named the Valedictorian and Salutatorian, respectively of the class of 107 Rockport-Fulton High School graduates who will receive diplomas May 27 in special ceremonies in Pirate Stadium beginning at 8 p.m.

Dietze, who posted a four year honor point average of 96.43, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lynwood Bland of 1890 Bayshore, Rockport. In addition to his scholastic honors, he was a star varsity athlete in both football and baseball for Rockport. In his senior year, he was named to the 15-3A football All-District first team, and was the leading scorer in 15-3A from his halfback position. He served this year as president of the Lettermen's Association, and is a member of the National Honor Society.

Deborah Fake, who posted a four year average of 95.29, is the daughter of the Reverend Charles and Mrs. Fake of 705 Pine Street. She is also a

member of the National Honor Society, and this year served as a student director for both the Drama Department's University Interscholastic League one-act play entry, "The Crucible," and for the High School

Fighting Pirate Band. She also had a leading role in the Drama Department's first musical production in several years, "George Ml."

Election Contest Hearing May 20

156th District Judge Rachael Littlejohn set May 20 at 1:30 p.m. as the date and time for a final hearing on the contest of the April 2 City election. She further set May 9 as a deadline for filing of briefs by Rockport Attorney Lola Bonner, counsel for contestant Charles Garrett, and May 16 as a deadline for filing by Rockport Attorney William Walston, attorney for the contestee, Joe "Pepe" Zambrano.

A preliminary hearing on the case concluded Wednesday, May 4 after more than six hours

of testimony by some 20 witnesses, including many of the nine voters whose qualifications are the basis of the Garrett contest.

Bonner has alleged that eight voters in the April 2 Ward One election either lived in Ward Two or outside the city limits of Rockport, and were therefore ineligible to vote in the Ward One race. She further alleges that a ninth voter, a convicted felon, was also ineligible under state and federal law.

Valuations Questioned; Court Suit Threatened

Former Rockport Mayor Chester Johnson told the Aransas County Independent School District Board of Trustees that he and a group of unnamed County and District property owners would go to District Court to enjoin the School District and County from collecting taxes unless property valuations were equalized.

Johnson, who has served on area Boards of Equalization nine times, said most of the problems stem from the 1974 valuation of County property which cost county and school taxpayers more than \$100,000. That valuation was, in Johnson's words, "the sloppiest, worst, no accountant" job he had ever seen. He said the firm and officials responsible were either "negligent or had their hands in the till."

As a member of the Board of Equalization in 1975, Johnson said he signed the approval of valuations under protest with the understanding that the values would be reworked and reconsidered in 1976. He said that this was not done, and that he and the people he represented had given fair warning to the ACISD and the County and were now ready to take legal action to force an equalization of values.

He pointed out to the Board parcels of property he said were grossly inequitable, and said that the problem was not only with district property but county-wide.

The effect of a suit proposed by Johnson would be to force a total county re-evaluation, since the School District and County are currently operating from a Central Appraisal office in the county courthouse.

ERROR

Last week's Pilot article on "Local Man Charged in Bar Shooting" listed the assailant as Clarence Jones of 1201 West Terrace. This was incorrect. The Clarence Jones charged in the shooting is a Rockport resident, but resided elsewhere in the city until his arrest and incarceration.

Appraisal Office could possibly have solved the problems but that it was not given sufficient support from the County or the Board. He said his son, Al, had been an appraiser in the office, but had not been given the funding from County officials necessary to conduct a thorough review of inequities—despite what he termed frequent pleas for help.

Board members noted that the Board of Equalization's valuations can be protested and appealed by any taxpayer whose property values are

raised. Superintendent E.J. Randow also noted that the School District had not participated in the 1974 revaluation, but had purchased the completed County rolls which covered District property.

Appointed the auditing firm of McCarty, Millikin and Green of Beeville to perform the annual audit beginning Aug. 31. The firm is the same one used by the School for the past three years.

City Conquers Long Agenda

City Council waded through another long agenda in regular session Monday night, May 9. Houston Oil and Minerals Corporation, the Rockport Ski Basin and the Aransas County Little League Association led the way in a sometimes stormy session which lasted more than four hours.

Houston Oil and Minerals, after a two-month delay because of legal technicalities, told Council Monday that Houston Natural Gas and Aransas

Natural Gas had signed a contract which would mean a steady supply of natural gas for the Rockport area through 1986. The gas will come from HO&M wells in Aransas Bay, where the company has two producers and plans more drilling.

HO&M received two more permits to drill under the city from bay locations on State Tract 169 approximately one-half mile from shore. The (Continued on Page 14)

County, City Nix Housing Funds

The Aransas County Commissioners' Court decided Wednesday, May 4 not to apply for \$136,200 in federal grants allotted to the county for low and middle income housing.

As described to the court by housing expert Fredrick Johnson, the project would be tax exempt, with residents paying only a small portion of the real estate value in lieu of county or city assessment. The project, which would have been administered by an independent five member housing authority

board appointed by the county, would have had the right of eminent domain, and would have put further strain on an already critical county and city sewage situation.

Commissioners, led by Raymond Owens, opposed the project's tax exempt status, and Mayor Walter Falk, claiming that a majority of the Rockport City Council, would concur, was against the project because of the pressure it would put on Rockport sanitary sewer system. (Continued on Page 14)

Harbor Board Funds Patrol

Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 Commissioners May 3 approved the purchase, manning and outfitting of a Ski Basin patrol boat after a discussion with three local citizens about the hazards of increased boating traffic in the summer months and on long holidays.

The board will be looking for an 18-foot outboard which will be outfitted with sirens, lights and bullhorn for water patrol. The Board also has tentative plans to ask the Aransas County Hospital Volunteers, Incorporated, to outfit the boat with basic medical equipment so that in the event of a water injury Paramedic Bill Aston or a member of his staff can render immediate aid.

The boat will be housed in a cyclone security fence built near the boat ramp pier in the Ski Basin, and will be manned on weekends and holidays by the regular lifeguards hired by the Navigation District. The \$900 fence will be financed by donations from interested citizens.

The plans presented by Joe Hugenberg at the May 3 meeting call for the city, county, or other interested or responsible organizations to supplement or match the regular lifeguard salaries on weekends and holidays when the personnel are serving as both patrolmen and lifeguards.

A committee composed of Hugenberg, Shaw and Commissioners Jimmy Anders and Hal McKnight was appointed by the board to formulate rules and regulations for users of the Ski Basin.

The patrolmen manning the boat will serve warnings to violators, and, after a series of violations, call in local police to arrest or beach the violators.

The other major agenda items at the Board's regular monthly meeting was the continuing changes at Cove Harbor, located south of Rockport off Highway 35.

Commissioner Anders reported to the board that the patching of the Cove Harbor roads had been completed by County Road and Bridge crewmen at no cost to the District.

Black-topping of the roads is expected to begin in June.

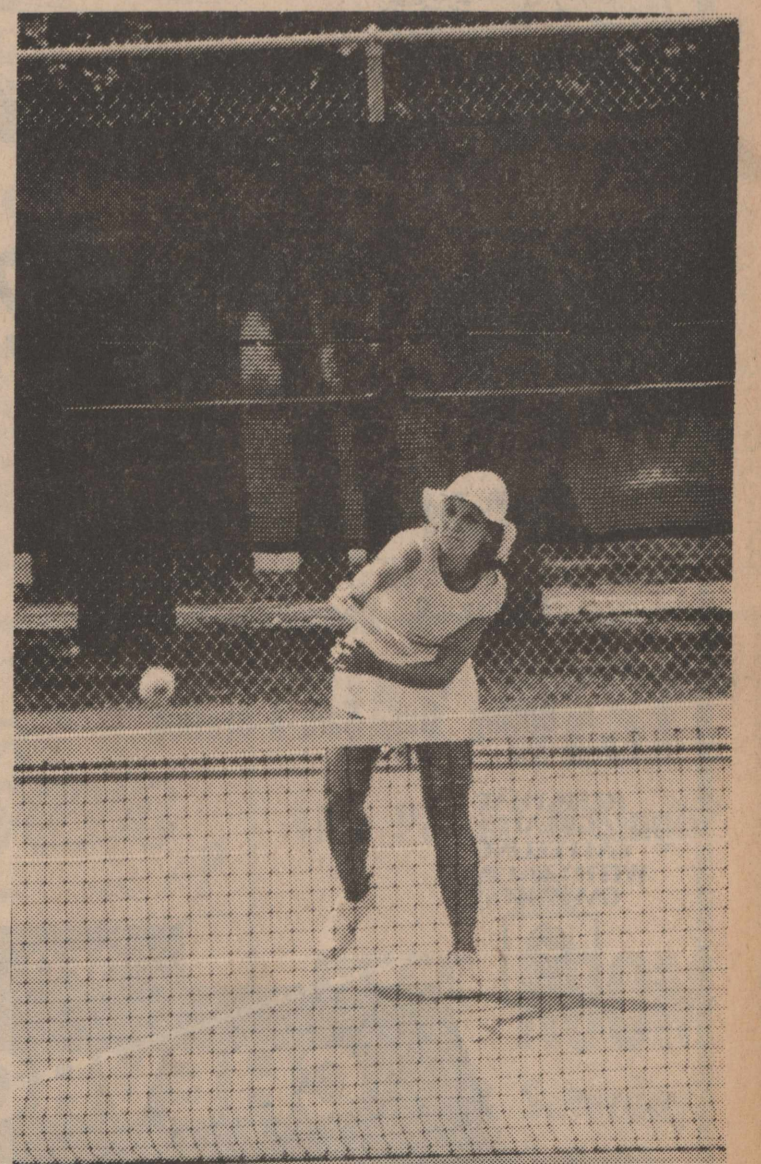
Anders also noted that many areas in the Harbor have been silted in and need to be dredged. The Board voted to obtain hourly cost estimates from local operators and seek disposal sites for dredging operations in the near future.

If carried through, the Cove dredging operation will fall in line behind Army Corps of Engineer operations scheduled in Rockport and Fulton Harbors in September and October of this year.

Turn It Off

Texas House of Representatives Bill 1122, proposed by Representative Bob Bush would prohibit any public utility from passing on to its customers the cost of "legislative advocacy and advertising." In addition, it would empower the Railroad Commission of the Texas Public Utilities Commission to delete from rate bases expenditures for "business gifts and entertainment, and institutional consumption-inducing and other advertising or public relations expenses" which they deem not in the public interest.

The Texas Public Utility Regulatory Act of 1975, which would be amended by HB 1122, has many glaring holes and omissions. This bill would fill one of the most glaring and prohibit, not advertising, but the passing along of such costs to consumers who know very well that the utility is there and providing services.

Such advertising is in many cases directed at softening opposition to one thing—rate increases—by picturing the utility as the hero of its own life story, to quote John Barth.

Utilities as monopolies in many cases are news in themselves, and their purposes of information dissemination are better served in news stories than advertising. They are not simply another business out to make a sale, they are a service.

Better the money be spent for solar energy research.

In behalf of the Aransas County Little League Association, I would like to thank all of the Officers, Managers, Coaches, Umpires, Concession Stand Workers, Parents, City Councilmen, Mayor, City Secretary and sponsors for helping in making this one of the best years yet for this league. We have approximately 375 young people involved this year which makes up 25 teams. These teams consist of five girls' Little League Softball teams and one Senior League Girls Softball Team. The girls range in age from nine years old to 15 years old. We have 19 hardball teams which include six minor league, eight major league, four senior league and one big league team. Ages vary from eight years old through 17 years old.

This is the first year for our Big League Team and they will play all of their games out of town because we do not presently have a field for them to play on. They will play teams from Aransas Pass, Ingleside, Taft, Sinton and Gregory-Portland. Our little league girls start their games at 4 p.m. each day, which is a problem, because of lack of fields to play on at this time. They also have games starting at 12 noon to comply with Little League rules and regulations. The Senior League Girls softball Team is competing with teams from Aransas Pass and Ingleside. They will be able to play some of their home games at Memorial Park.

During our baseball season, our young people who play this game, do so competitively and to the very best of their ability. And I believe that we tend to forget that these young people are not professionals, but basically children playing baseball having fun. Our managers and coaches also do their best to teach baseball the best way they know how but again they are not professionals. This is a volunteer organization.

Without our umpires, we do not have a ball game and they call it to the very best of their ability. Most of us can sit and watch a game on TV and make the right call and be an expert on any sport. This is the way it is sitting in the stands calling the game but the situation changes once you are on the field.

INSURING FAKE FURS

The standard limitation for theft of personal property in the homeowners policy is 50% of the insured value of the home. However, for a certain class of valuables - furs, jewelry, precious stones, etc., the aggregate limit is normally set at \$500. Naturally, it is prudent to insure these items separately for their full value to avoid monetary loss.

To be classified as fur it has to come off the back of an animal. Any animal will do - from mink to moose. It then falls under this \$500 limitation.

On the other hand, fake furs, although they could cost even more than the real McCoy, are not furs. They are made of fabrics woven to resemble furs, and in some cases it takes an expert to distinguish them from real fur. Fake furs, therefore, do not come under this limitation and would be covered to the same extent as your other personal property. I guess this is the insurance industry's way of unknowingly protecting our animal kingdom.

Four Recent Thefts Under Investigation

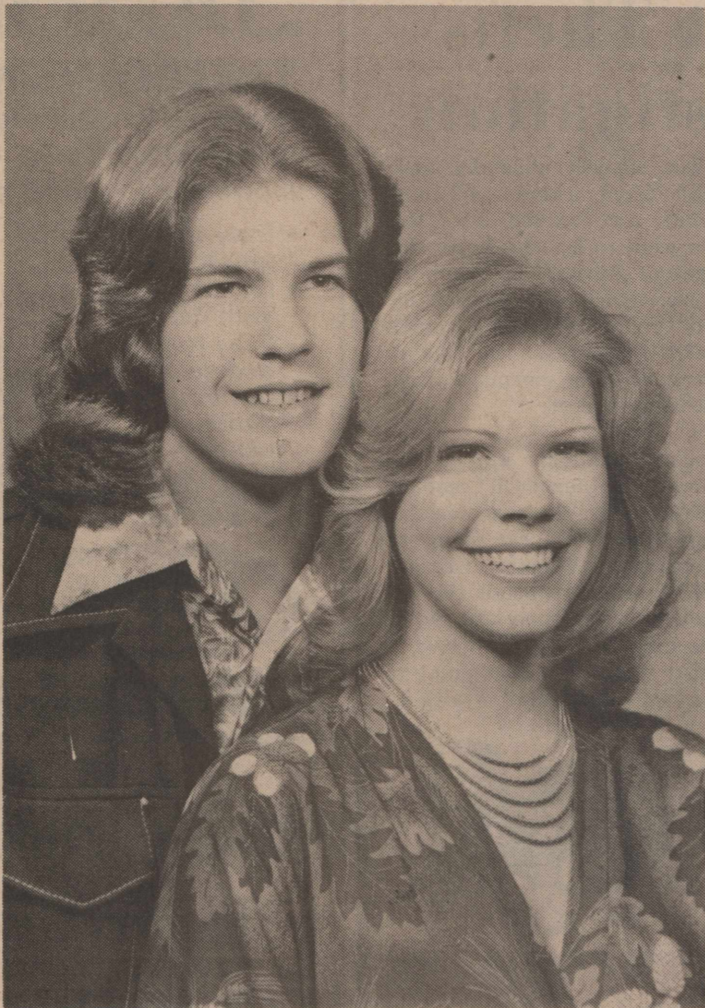

Mr. and Mrs. Pete Nemeec at 1038 James have been awarded the Yard of the Month for May by the Rockport Home and Garden Club. The well-groomed yard is filled with a variety of trees, bushes and flowers. The Nemeecs do their own yard work, with Mrs. Nemeec doing the most of it.

A ligustrum hedge lines the front yard with a natal plum hedge along the front walk. In the left front yard is a large magnolia tree with hanging baskets and planters nearby of

Swedish ivy, airplane plant, cactus and geranium. A large thornless cactus stands by the birdbath. There are numerous trees including a large cedar, chinaberry, Chinese tallow, Japanese yew, red bud, crepe myrtle and an olive tree. A Dutchman's pipe vine grows on a trellis, and a yellow jasmine covers a tree stump. There is a firecracker bush, large bottle brush, oleanders, tomato plants and a poinsettia. A flower bed of shrimp plants runs the length of the house with an azalea in the corner.

A box of verbena is in the left side yard along with pineapple guava, large lilies, cannas and fern around a water trough. A potato vine grows over and around a large tree stump. There is a red orchid plant, bottle brush, clusters of cannas, pansy box, long horn bush from Mexico, hibiscus, two peach trees, flowering poppies and a pine tree. A confederate jasmine grows on the fence with a four o'clock bush, cactus and cannas in front of the fence. Along the side of the house is a bed of hydrangeas, cannas, carnation bush and a mass of foxgloves.

In the right front yard is a mock-mulberry, large cottonwood, mountain laurel, white crepe myrtle and an olive tree. A gladiolus bed, a phlox planter and a pansy circle adorn the front yard amid the trees. Oleanders line the side and back yard. A large star outlined with a cement edge filled with snapdragons and a cluster of gladiolus in the center is very striking in the back yard. Bougainvillea, fern, yellow plum tree, miniature rose bush, large cedar tree, mimosa, hibiscus, purple sage, shrimp plants, tallow tree, avocado tree, purple bottle brush and several althea trees cover the back and side yards.

By the back gate is a large bed of day lilies, a pomegranate tree and honeysuckle on the gate. A miniature Mexican grapefruit-orange tree, crab apple tree, Mexican honeysuckle, cottonwood, tangerine, pine and Japanese pine trees are also in the backyard. There is a large lily and poppy bed and many clusters of large lilies that compliment the yard. This yard reflects the many, many hours of work and care the Nemeecs give their yard.

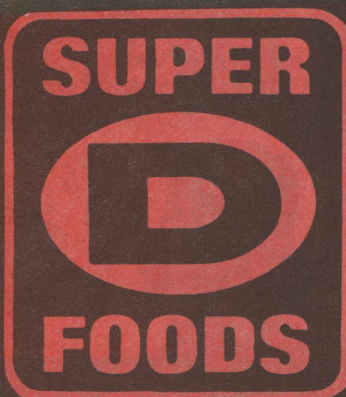

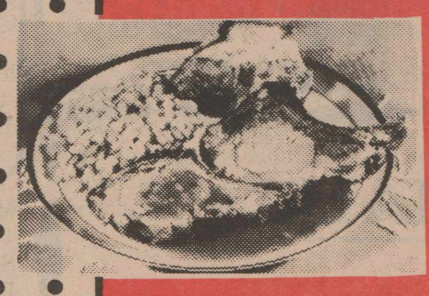

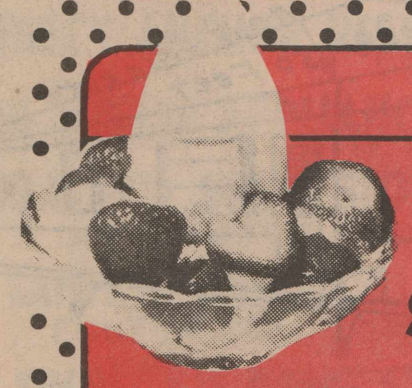

The class members wish to thank the citizens who have ordered projects or provided

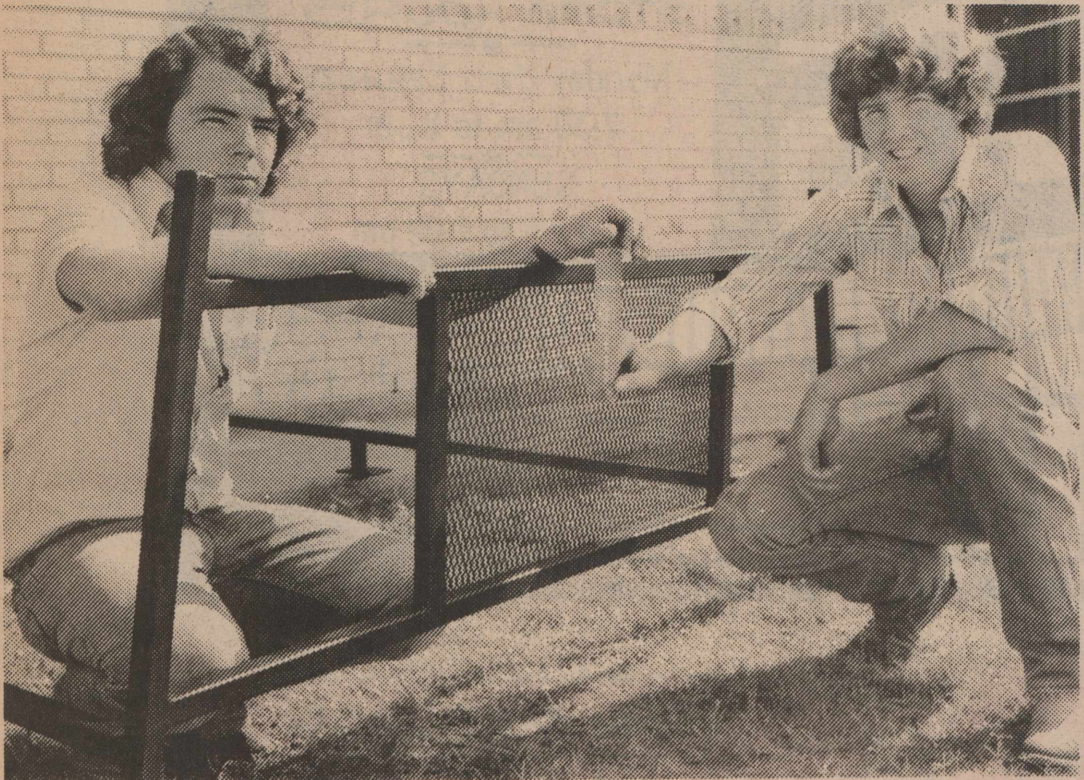
objects for repair. The students consider the first hand experience invaluable, and say their motto is "If it's made of metal, we can make it or fix it."

tion their "most important projects, according to Martinez, but will be accepting projects again in September when school cranks up again.

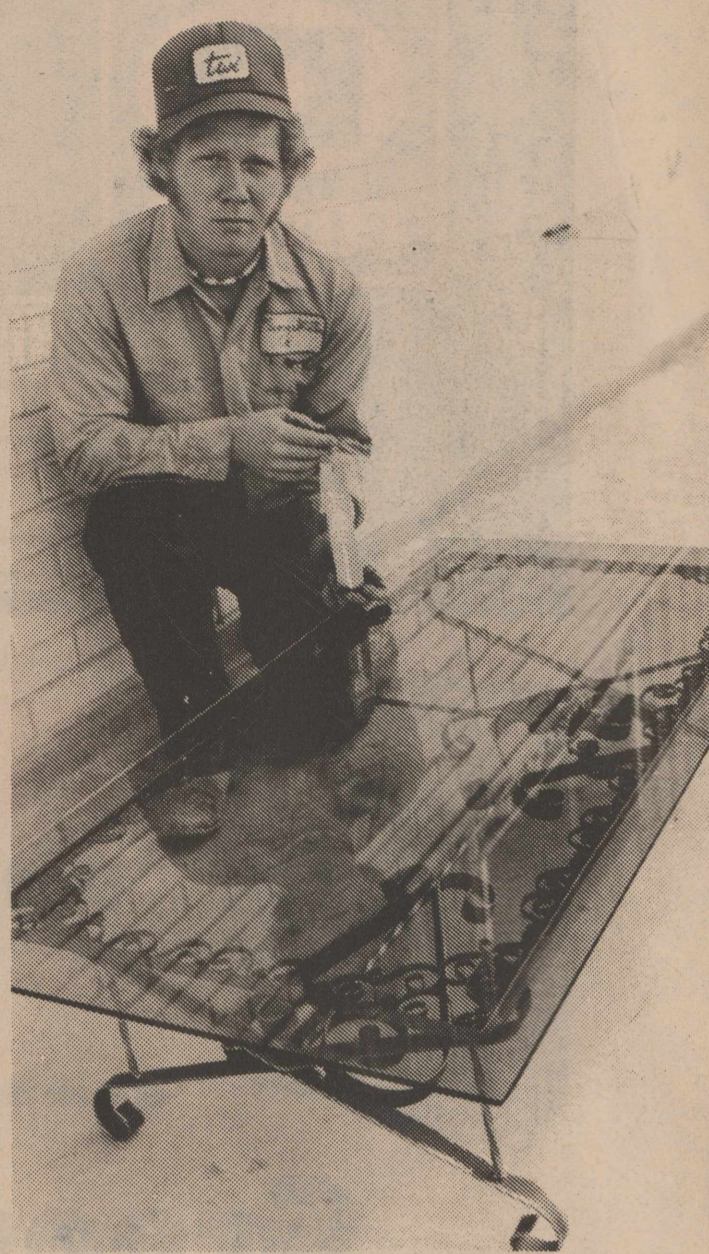

As Natural Gas Supplies Grow Shorter, CPL Continues Moves to Other Fuels.

Events of the severe winter just past have confirmed, in unmistakable terms, three of the more distressing facts of our time:

The natural gas shortage is here now. It is a nationwide problem. The days of inexpensive natural gas are gone.

The Texas Railroad Commission recognized the shortage two years ago and ruled that deliveries of natural gas used for making electricity must be reduced—10 percent by 1981, and 25 percent by 1985.

Further evidence that the gas shortage is real is the extensive building program now being conducted by Central Power and Light Company. In order to continue reliable service, CPL began its planning seven years ago to turn to fuels other than gas for production of electricity. By the mid-1980's, 40% of our electricity will come from coal-fired and nuclear plants.

Coletto Creek Power Station, our first coal-fired unit, is being built now

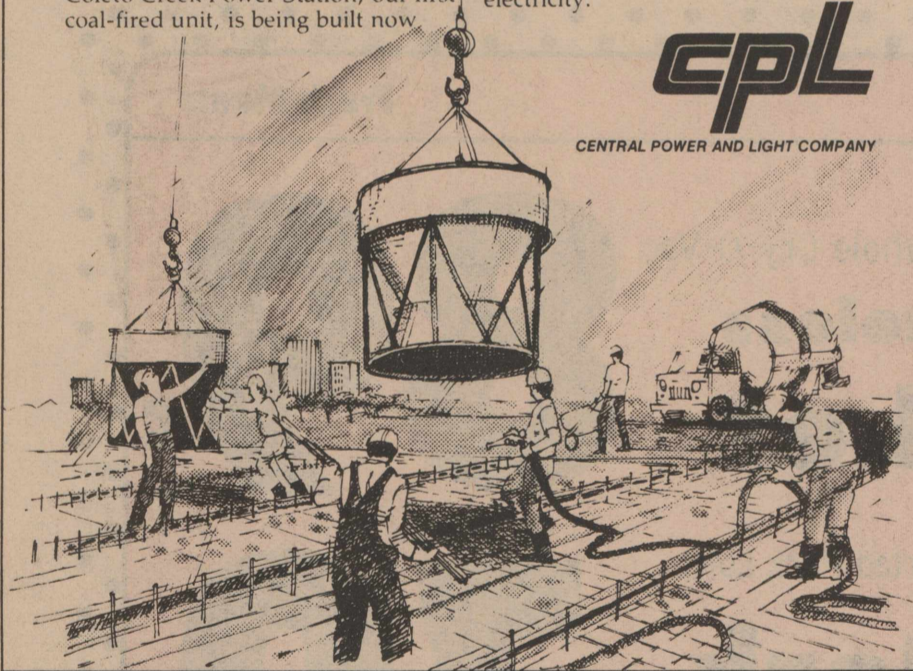
and will begin supplying power by late 1979.

Also under construction: the South Texas Project, a nuclear plant in which CPL has a 25.2 percent share. The first unit is scheduled for operation by late 1980, the second in 1982.

For the present, CPL has diminished its dependence on natural gas by modifying existing generating units to burn fuel oil when natural gas supplies are curtailed. Conversion of these units was finished this spring.

To take advantage of additional fuel supply economies and larger generating plants, CPL is involved with other companies in an effort to interconnect with systems in neighboring states.

The natural gas shortage is both real and immediate. Because it is, CPL is involved in several research projects to explore still other methods of producing power to assure its customers of a continued, dependable supply of electricity.

-Saturday morning, Father James Hamilton was out to give Holy Communion to Catholic residents.

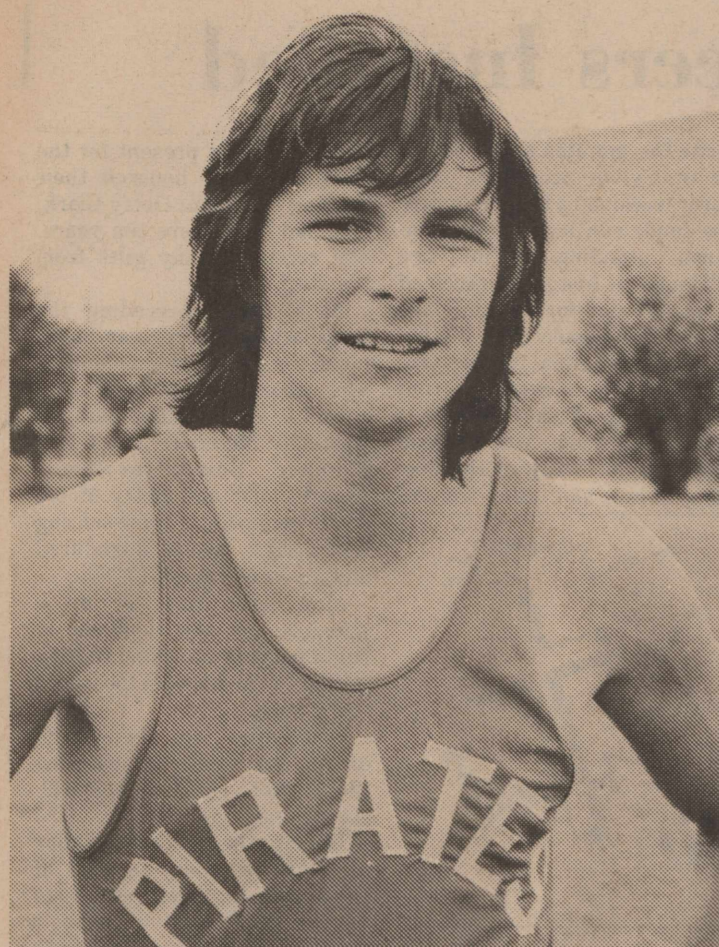

Foster Parents Must Register

Manuel A. Arrendondo, State Welfare Regional Administrator, has expressed a concern about child care in this region. Most persons who care for children other than their own in their own homes are not aware that they may be subject to registration.

The registration process is relatively simple. It is basically a do-it-yourself process. The intent of the law is to insure a safe environment for the chil-

dren being cared for by persons other than their parents. Grandparents and aunts are excluded from registration if caring for their grandchildren and nieces and nephews. If you have children being cared for by a provider, you should ask if they have been licensed or registered by the State Welfare Department.

Arrendondo added that DPW Day Care Licensing staff will be happy to assist those persons

who need to register in order to comply with the law. Four considerations in determining if you need to register are the following:

1. You will be caring for six (6) or fewer children in addition to your own children and brothers and sisters of the other children who will require your care during after-school hours. However, you will not be caring for more than 12 children at one time;

2. the children are under 14 years old;

For more information call the State Welfare Office in Edinburg, Harlingen, Laredo, Victoria, Corpus Christi or Cuero and ask for a State Day Care Licensing Representative. The telephone numbers for the above offices are as follows: Laredo — 512/722-0571; Victoria — 512/575-8261; Corpus Christi — 512/855-2451; and Cuero — 512/275-6128.

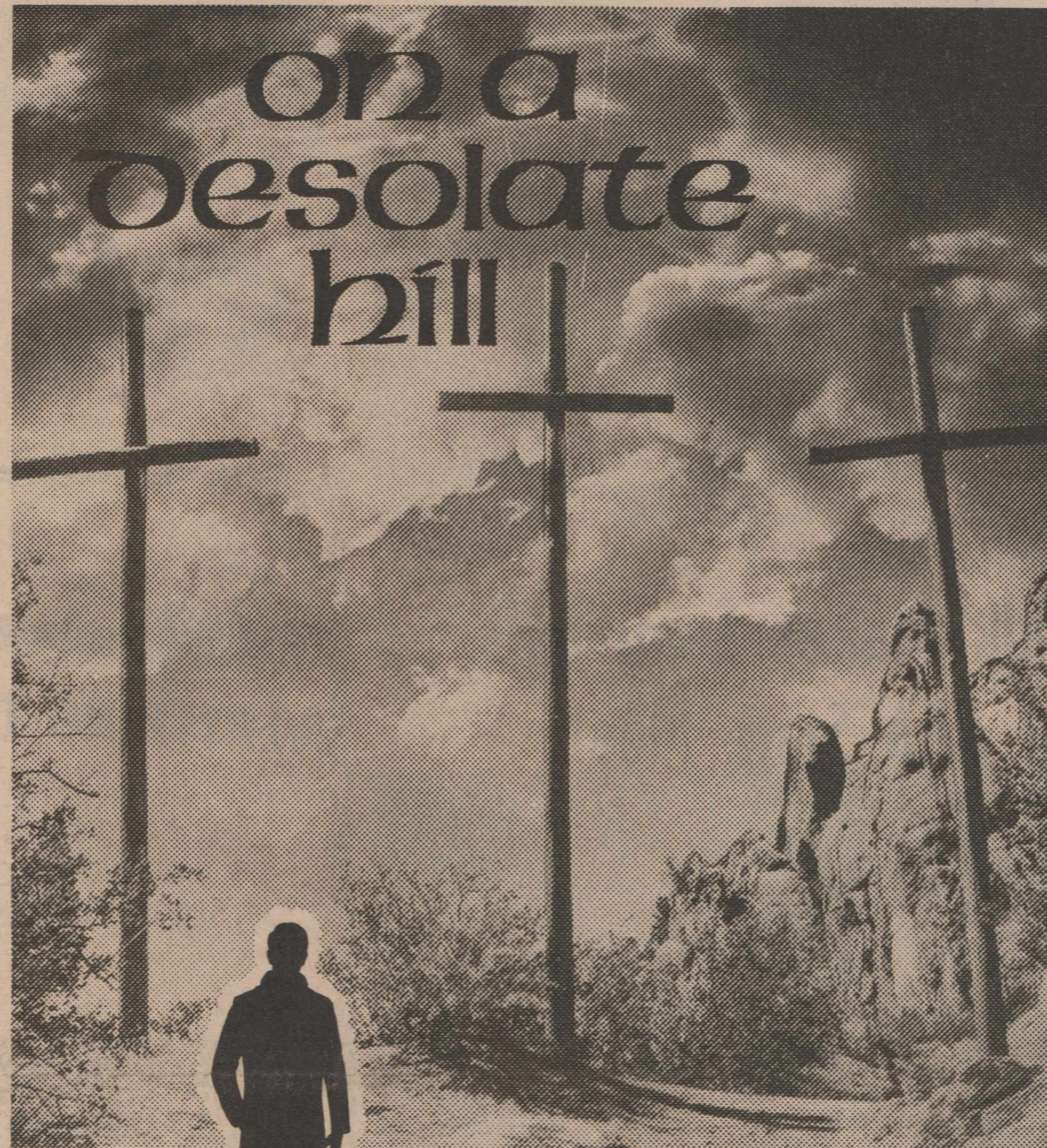

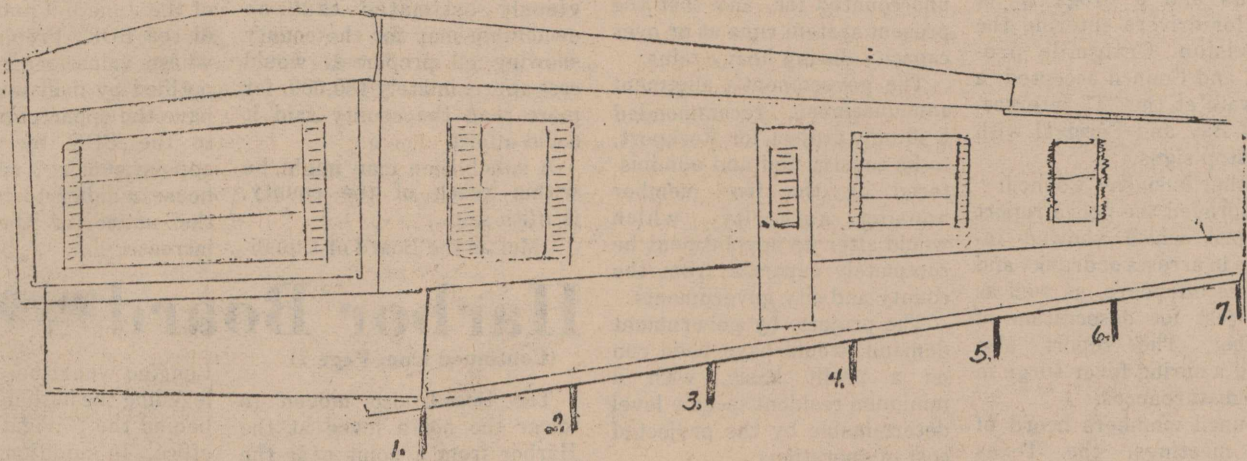

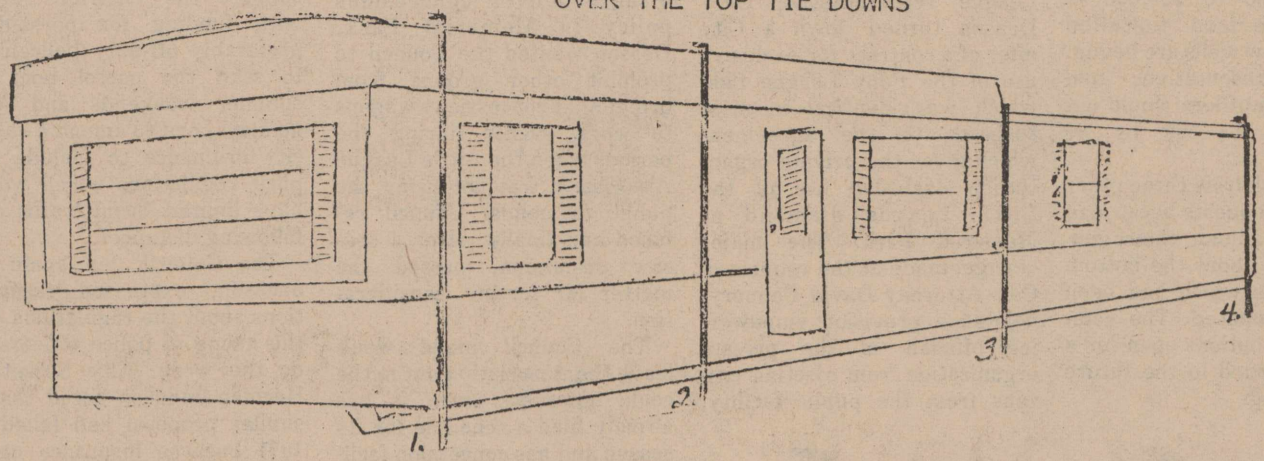
Mobile Home Tie Down Plans For City /County

County Needs Foster Parents

An appeal for more Aransas County couples to volunteer as foster parents was made by DeLula Cook, public welfare worker with the Texas Department of Public Welfare, at a luncheon meeting of Rotary Club May 4 at the Sandollar Restaurant. She operates in Aransas County and four adjacent counties.

Mrs. Cook pointed out that need for foster parents arises from cases of child abuse. She added that child abuse in Aransas County is on the upswing, having doubled since 1975. Although child abuse often is difficult to detect and frequently is not reported, 60,000 state-wide cases were reported in 1976 compared with 34,000 the previous year.

She explained that child abuse generally was classified as physical, emotional or sexual. Physical abuse might include broken bones, bruises, cigarette burns or even death. At least 70 Texas children died as a result of abuse in 1975. Emotional abuse, which often is difficult to detect, includes belittling the child, disparaging his appearance or degrading him by such devices as compelling him to sleep in a garage.

Mrs. Cook said sexual abuse usually involves adolescent children, either male or female, often by relatives of the child. Many are reluctant to report this type of abuse, she added.

It was pointed out that failure to report child abuse is a misdemeanor under state law although it is seldom enforced. Child abuse occurs at all levels of society, she added.

The pressing need for more foster parents was emphasized by the fact that there are now four foster children for every foster home available. It was explained that the foster parent program is almost always a temporary arrangement with most children staying from three to six months. Mrs. Cook said the program was not a part of any adoption program but merely a device to provide temporary homes for abused children until more permanent arrangements can be made, including possible stabilization of their own home situation.

Mrs. Cook said there were no age limits for foster parents, but the home situation must be conducive to helping the child recover from abuse. She urged that anyone interested telephone her office in Aransas Pass at 758-5359 or the welfare office in Rockport at 729-5784. Four dollars a day is paid for each child in a foster home. Clothing and medical care is supplied, she explained.

Charlotte Farley, wife of Rotarian Pat Farley, supplemented comments by Mrs. Cook throughout the talk. Mrs. Farley is Public Welfare worker for five nearby counties.

An Open Letter On MH Tie Downs

Dear Mobile Home Owner:

On April 25, 1977 the City Council passed Ordinance No. 418 entitled Master Flood Hazard Prevention Ordinance. The passage of this ordinance was required by the federal agency H.U.D., in order for the city to qualify for federal subsidized flood insurance. As you are a mobile home owner the ordinance requires that you tie down your mobile home as outlined under the tie down requirements.

You will have a period of 45 days from the date of this letter to comply. If you do not comply within this allotted period you will be in violation of this ordinance.

TIE DOWN REQUIREMENTS

1. Over the top ties at each of the four corners of the mobile home, with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than fifty (50) feet long requiring one additional tie per side.
2. Frame ties at each corner of the home with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than fifty (50) feet long requires four additional ties per side.
3. All components of the anchoring system be capable of carrying a force of 4800 lbs.
4. Any additions to the mobile home be similarly anchored.
5. All materials used for the tie down system shall be metal.

If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me at any time. Please advise this office when tie down requirements have been completed, in order that we may make inspection.

Rotary Hears Bell Manager

Starting his talk before Rotary Club's luncheon meeting at Sandollar Restaurant April 27 with a bit of philosophy, Ron Maples, district manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. with headquarters in Corpus Christi, said:

"The world is changing and our point of view is changing. Society is evolving new and different ways of doing things, but we should never forget how we got where we are both socially and economically."

He went on to describe the changes in the telephone business resulting from creation of the Texas Utility Commission which began operations last September. It is now necessary to prove to the commission that you need more money and how much you need to stay in business, all of which must be supported with detailed figures.

Maples said it costs Southwestern Bell an average of \$16 a month to operate a phone in Texas. Other income, including telephone directory advertising, private line income and income from long distance calls, makes current monthly rates possible, he said.

He explained that concentration of long distance calls between heavily populated centers makes it possible to supply telephone service at relatively low rates between sparsely populated communities. However, availability of telephone service in rural and small volume areas is essential to obtain complete coverage, he added.

Referring to operator-assisted calls, for which there is no charge at present, Maples said such service costs Southwestern Bell \$37 million a year, a cost which now must be divided among all subscribers although only a small percentage of them

use this service. He compared this with the once-upon-a-time practice of asking the operator for the correct time.

Maples said inflation has been a difficult problem for Southwestern Bell as it has for everyone, but efforts to reduce its effects on operating costs were continuous. He said that in 1960 nationwide an average of 95 telephone employees were required for each 10,000 phones in service. He cited direct calling and other mechanization of operations as some of the ways used to hold operating costs down. As a result of economy efforts it now requires an average of 61 people for 10,000 phones, and he said the goal is now about 50 employees per 10,000 phones. However, he added, total employment overall has not been reduced because of continuing increase of telephones in operation.

Flood Ordinance Relief In Store

Mobile home owners and trailer park operators in much of Aransas County are off the hook of regulations in the recently passed Flood Hazard Control ordinance.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development, after an inquiry by Aransas County Judge John Wendell, has ruled that only those mobile homes and residences in the flood plain areas of the county are subject to the tie down and building code restrictions laid out in the ordinance.

Homeowners, builders and mobile home owners can find out if their residence falls within the flood plain by consulting the Aransas County maps on file with the County Clerk at the County Courthouse

drilling will be done with the rig presently in the bay. That rig, however, will have an additional \$10,000 to \$20,000 in muffling devices installed before the new wells are begun. HO&M representatives told Council the mufflers would cut noise from the rig by 80 percent.

HO&M withdrew three other well permit requests because of uncertainty among their geological crews about the bottom hole locations which had been originally proposed. The company left its options open for a return to council in the future for permitting.

The Little League Association, which began play May 2 with 375 children of all ages participating, was next up. League representative Gary Deason turned down a City offer of a contract for exclusive use of the Pony League field which was identical in most respects to the agreement which gives the private organization exclusive use of the Little League diamond at Memorial Park. The major change, made at the request of City Attorney David Connery, deleted a provision empowering officials of the private organization from ejecting citizens from the public facility.

something Connery should not have done in the original agreement.

The Council and Deason also disagreed over concessions policy in Memorial Park. Deason wanted the Council to prohibit other groups from bringing in concessions wagons to work events during the periods when the Little League Association was not using the public diamonds. Council refused and finally, after a see-saw discussion, passed the matter for further consideration.

The Council move won't leave the Association out in the cold, however, since it has already filed a schedule for its season and has concession facilities of its own at the Little League diamond.

In other ball related matters, Council approved the fence length on the third Memorial Park diamond currently under construction. Little League representatives had questioned the 210' length, saying it was not up to League standards and would prohibit use by all but small girls softball groups. A check of the engineering handbook showed that legal (but not League) requirements were 200'.

Council, in a final ball park move, approved purchase of bases for the new field.

After approving payments of \$5500 for Glass Avenue street repairs, the Council heard from Joe Hugenberg and Chairman David Maguglin, Vice-Chairman Hal McKnight and member Jimmy Anders of the Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 on the possible deepening of the Ski Basin and boating safety during the summer in the Basin.

Hugenberg asked the city originally to file a permit for dredging to a depth of five feet with the Army Corps of Engineers, but settled for a letter of recommendation for a Navigation District permit request after Councilman Norvell Jackson, Sr., a former District Commissioner, prevailed in his arguments that the District was the creator and owner of the basin and had all responsibility for proposed improvements to the facility.

The Board representatives and Hugenberg agreed to the compromise, noting that the original reasoning had been that continuing problems with environmentalists and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department at Cove Harbor and other District projects had led them to believe that another public body would have greater success obtaining permits and a high priority for completion from the Corps.

After obtaining a Council approval for a letter of recommendation for the dredging permit, Hugenberg proposed a Ski Basin Patrol to the Council which would have amended existing City ordinances and created Basin boating rules and an enforcement system including the use of off duty city police officers as personnel.

Hugenberg had earlier secured Navigation District approval for the purchase of a boat, motor, equipment and

personnel and private funding for a fenced area to secure the boat round the clock.

He asked city fathers to support the District's move with funding for personnel, preferably off-duty policemen, to staff the patrol boat on summer weekends and long holidays, and to amend a vague city ordinance to include explicit regulations which would have limited Basin traffic and following distances.

The Council, led again by Jackson, expressed reservations about the regulations and the hiring of police officers to do the work. City Secretary Herman Johnson noted that a similar proposal had failed in 1971 because insurance could not be obtained for city personnel serving in an enforcement capacity.

Council finally shelved the proposal until a May 17 workshop and instructed City Attorney Connery to come up with workable ordinances. Council did vote unanimous support for the idea, and stressed that its reservations were entirely legal and procedural.

Booming Rockport was the next major item. Developer Alan Ziedel of the Federal Building and Management Corporation plans a 50-unit garden apartment complex and a shopping center on an 11 acre tract north of Harbor Oaks at Highway 35 North and Traylor Avenue if his company can be assured of city sewer connections at the site. The city, already committed near its present limits, could offer no encouragement on sewer facilities or possible annexation, lacking the two sides necessary for legal attachment of the tract. The Council approved consultations between City Engineer Gene Urban and attorneys for Federal on possible solutions to the sewer and annexation roadblocks.

Urban had offered an earlier out for the sewer problems by suggesting connection at developer's expense to the present Harbor Oaks Unit 3 lift station, where proposed condominium construction is being replatted for a 46 unit single family unit network which places a smaller strain on the existing sewer system.

Revenue sharing was the next major topic before the Council. The City stands to receive \$21,859 for the entitlement period Jan. 1, 1977 through Sept. 30, 1977, and must decide how to budget the amount. Council seemed to lead the direction of combining its 8th and 9th period allotments and purchasing a \$55,000 pumper car for the Rockport Volunteer Fire Department. The budgeting proposal, to be discussed with other topics at the workshop May 17, will be subject to two public hearings, one after the original budgeting proposal to allow for citizen input and possible changes or revisions, and a second in conjunction with the regular city budget hearings later this year.

Little Bay Shores property owners along Percival Street got a helping hand from City Police Chief Jim Craigmile,

who revised a proposal by homeowner Joe Hugenberg to prevent speeding along the street, a popular crossing for students and a dragstrip at times for drivers entering the subdivision. Craigmile proposed, and Council accepted, a crosswalk at the "T" intersection of Bay and Percival with three stop signs.

In other business, Council: --Approved the police report for April which showed increases in arrests of drunks and narcotics offenders, as well as one arrest for desecration of the flag. The report also showed a spring fever surge in family disturbances.

--Council members heard of three meetings: the Texas Municipal League Region 11 meeting May 19 in Victoria, where the City's suit against Central Power and Light will be a main topic; the May 13 District Hurricane Watch meeting in Corpus Christi; and the annual Oil Spill Drill in Corpus Christi the morning of May 13.

--Reviewed the financial statement as of April 30, 1977. City Secretary Herman Johnson said the city was "in good shape," and would be able to pay off loans to the garbage collection fund from other city budget funds within the year.

--Approved the fencing of the western boundary of Bay Street intersecting the eastern right-of-way boundary of Ann Street at the request of property owners. A spokesman said thieves had been encouraged by the existing unlighted, unused street and had committed 20 minor thefts at the Taylor Oaks Trailer Park and area residences in the last few months.

tem. He noted that with the city's current commitments, less than 30 connections remain unaccounted for, and that the present system runs at or over capacity during heavy rains.

The government's allotment announcement recommended a 40 unit project for Rockport, to be constructed and administered by the five member housing authority, which would after its appointment be completely separate from the county and city governments.

The project, by government demand, would have been run on a profit basis, with a minimum resident income level determinable by the projected cost of operations.

It would not be under any circumstances be used as a center for low-income families only.

The 40 units included 10 three bedroom family units, 14 regular one-bedroom units and 16 units for the handicapped.

The deadline announced for application under the fund allotment was May 23, giving Commissioners less than 24 hours to begin work on preparations which would have included a public hearing and the appointment of a Housing Board.

Johnson noted as he left that the county and city, which recently announced its intention to apply for federal funds to double the capacity of its present 1,000,000 gallon sewer system, would have to begin looking at their housing situation in the near future despite their Wednesday decision. "HUD looks at the efforts made in the area of housing when it goes over other grant requests. And I would suggest that the city and county need to look at cleaning up their situation for low and moderate income housing. Otherwise, you may have some problems getting funds for things you've mentioned like sewer systems."

In other business, Commissioners: --Agreed to a request from Buddy McLester, Constable Precinct 3 to move the tentative boundary line from Precinct 3 back to include his residence on Mesquite Street. The line proposed in the ongoing redistricting would have cut McLester out of the precinct he was elected to serve for a four-year term in November.

--Approved a proposal from Aransas County Municipal Water District No. 1 Engineer Clem Williams to share two and one half acres on the Lamar Peninsula. The County had access agreements which allowed it to use the land as a sanitary fill site. The District will take title to the land shortly, and plans to use its half as a sanitary treatment site.

--Refused a variance request from John Bailey, developer of the 66 unit Candlestick Mobile Home Subdivision which would have allowed him to install above ground utility lines. As the County has required in the past, the lines will now be buried.

--Discussed but took no action on a recommendation by County Surveyor or T.E. Griffith that a new county map showing recent subdivisions be contracted for. The county's most recent map is dated 1962, and does not include Key Allegro, Harbor Oaks, or other recent subdivisions which

make up some \$20,000,000 to \$30,000,000 of the county's valuations.

Tobin Map Company previously estimated that an ownership map for the county showing all properties would cost approximately \$80,000, far more than the county said it could afford.

A subdivision map might be within reach of the county, Griffith said.

--Met as the Board of Equal-

ization (BOE) with the County Tax Assessor-Collector Alena Jones and staff to go over the County tax rolls in anticipation of the June 6-9 public meeting of the BOE. Property owners whose valuations rise will be notified by mail soon, and will have the opportunity to appeal to the BOE by making an appointment at a special courthouse number to be noted on the notice of the valuation increase.

The Board also moved to lower the north levee at the Harbor from a point near the present Houston Oil and Minerals Corporation site toward Highway 35. The levelling is intended to make the area more attractive to prospective lessors, and will not pose a safety hazard.

In other business, the Board: --Agreed to the incorporation of Stall #27 on the Harbor Light Cafe property into the Cafe building in the event that the building is purchased by Tom Aiken from Mr. V.G. Smith, Jr.

--Tabled for receipt of a detailed plan a proposal by Dr. J. Martin Shaw that the salt water swimming pool on Navigation District property be converted to a boat basin. Shaw asked the Board if they would be receptive to leasing the area to a local sailing club which would erect finger piers and a cedar building to accommodate their membership.

--Paid \$7,595 in revenue bonds which had come due.

--Heard an announcement by Commissioner McKnight that County Commissioner Ray

Longino would be grading and levelling the bathing beach area behind the Navigation District office. In addition, additional pathways will be cut from the beach cabanas to the water. Commissioner Jimmy Anders said the entire beach would not be graded because past experience showed that beach erosion proved uncontrollable when the sand was left exposed to tidal action.

--Granted permission to Mrs. Rose Heavey and Jeff Little to operate a beach concession stand from May 15 to September 15 for \$50 for the season.

--Approved a request by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to erect an artificial reef south of the bathing beach and east of the Navigation District breakwater.

--Gave permission to Robert Stroot to sub-lease Cove Harbor lots 121 and 122 if all covenants of the present lease are abided by.

eight voters whose eligibility is questioned were "permanent" residents of Ward One and were residing in temporary homes outside the ward at the time of the election.

If the court accepts the contentions and proof of Garrett and attorney Bonner, the election results could be reversed by voiding of the nine votes. A partial rejection could cut Zambrano's margin but leave him in the office, or force a runoff in the event of a tie.

Judge Littlejohn could also void the entire election and require that another be held. The first day of testimony was highlighted by an admission by Rockport City Secretary Herman Johnson that the North Street boundary between Wards One and Two, long recognized by the City and in effect April 2, was not supported by existing legal records and arose out of oral reports of a 1905 City Council meeting in which an ordinance was passed reducing the number of wards from four to two.

April 2 Presiding Judge Genevieve Hunt, in first day testimony, also noted that she was under the impression during the election voting that a 90 day residency requirement for voter eligibility was in effect, but later found out it was not.

Those factors put the legality and accuracy of the election in question, but may not be sufficient cause to void the results. The County Commissioners' Court is in the process of redistricting county voting precincts, a process which shows intent to comply with regulations and would establish a new legal border between Wards One and Two-Laurel Street.

Hunt's admission will have to be considered in light of its potential effect on the outcome, and on the number of illegal votes it may have resulted in.

Regardless of the ruling of the court, the results could be subject to appeal by either party.





The Palm Harbor Property Owners Association has applied for a permit to construct two spur jetties from an existing bulkhead 20 feet into the channel to divert the grass that accumulates in the Palm Harbor boat channels.

Plans may be seen at the addresses above. Comments are due on or before June 2, 1977.

**Bentsen Pushes
Approval Of 10
Judgeships**

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Friday said he will push for quick Senate approval of legislation that creates 10 new Federal District Judgeships in Texas and creates a new 11th Circuit Court to include Texas and Louisiana.

The bill has been approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

"Justice delayed is, too often, justice denied and the situation in our federal courts in Texas -- the heavy caseloads and the backlog of cases--results in far too much delay for participants in civil and criminal trials," Bentsen said.

The legislation voted out by the Senate Judiciary Committee will take off some of the pressure by providing our state with additional judges to help shoulder the burden."

The Committee bill would add five new district judges in the Southern District of Texas, three new judges in the Northern District and one each in the Western and Eastern Districts.

An average of 488 cases were filed before each district judge in Texas last year, compared to the standard of 400 cases per year set by the U.S. Judicial Conference.

Although the number of cases filed is not the only gauge for assessing the workload of a judge, the judicial conference and the Senate Committee are in agreement on using it as the measurement.

"This is not the final solution to the problem of overcrowding and backlogs of cases in our federal court system. A thorough overhaul is needed and we will continue to work toward that goal under the speedy trial act, which I co-sponsored," Bentsen said.

"But for the interim, these additional judges will help to insure the constitutional guarantee to a speedy trial," Senator Bentsen said.

**County, City
Drink Tax
Rebate \$1944**

Comptroller Bob Bullock May 4 mailed checks totalling \$3.6 million to cities and counties as their portion of \$12.5 million in mixed drink tax receipts for the first three months of 1977.

Aransas County, with total tax revenues of \$11,794.67, received \$1,769.30. The City of Rockport, with revenues of \$1,166.98, received \$175.05.

Total tax collections for the first three months of 1976, according to Bullock, totalled \$10.1 million.

The tax-collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission represented one percent of all gross receipts from the sale of mixed drinks.

Under the law, the Comptroller's Office remits to counties and cities 15 percent of the total mixed drink tax collected within their boundaries and the balance goes to the state General Revenue Fund.

The tax is collected and rebated to the cities and counties quarterly, Bullock said.

**Bray Named
Dep. Director
Of Agency**

President Jimmy Carter has appointed Charles W. Bray III to be Deputy Director of the U.S. Information Agency.

Mr. Bray is the son-in-law of the Reverend and Mrs. George Mauze of Rockport.

Mr. Bray and his wife, the former Elanor Mauze, have three children: Charles W. Bray IV, David C. Bray and Katherine M. Bray.

The U.S. Information Service, with an annual budget of more than \$260,000,000, is an agency of the Executive Branch with headquarters in Washington, D.C. and 188 posts in 114 countries world-wide. Its purpose is to explain U.S. policies and the reasons for them, and to advise the U.S. Government on the implications of foreign opinion for the formulation and execution of U.S. foreign policy.

Its projects and forums include the Voice of America radio network, yearly production of more than 300 videotape and film programs, press releases mailed to a world-wide network, magazines on America in foreign languages for audiences in the USSR and other countries, exhibitions and student exchanges.

Mr. Bray, Bethesda, Maryland, is currently deputy assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs.

Now 44, he is a Princeton graduate and a Fulbright scholar with military experience. He joined the Foreign Service in 1958 and in 1965 received the AID Meritorious Honor Award for his work on economic assistance in the Central African Republic.

After his return to Washington, D.C. in 1965, he held several State Department positions, concentrating in African affairs. In 1971, he became director of the State Department Office of Press Relations. In 1974 he was promoted to deputy assistant secretary for public affairs, and in 1976 was made deputy assistant secretary for inter-American affairs.

**Motorcycle
Safety Week
Announced**

Road compatibility between motorcycles and larger vehicles is an absolute must, reports Governor Dolph Briscoe. "In times of the need for more economical travel and an expanding transportation picture, we are finding an increased number of motorcycles on our streets and highways. With this increase comes an increase of the possibility of traffic accidents. We must, as drivers of cars or trucks, be totally aware of the motorcyclist.

"In 1975, 205 motorcyclists were killed. During 1976, 192 were killed. While this is a slight reduction, the number of motorcycle registrations has begun to increase. Preliminary sales reports from dealers and statistics in Texas reveal a significant increase in the two-wheelers registered.

"Frequently at the accident site of a car-motorcycle crash, the automobile driver says he simply failed to see the motorcycle. This can best be remedied by careful observation and awareness of motorcyclists on rural roads, freeways and street intersections.
