This Week's Farmer, David Nelson, is sometimes kidded about being a cafe farmer. But those who razz him can be assured Nelson is a busy man when they consider he farms 1,600 acres.

The Hart farmer contributes much of his success to his hired help, Mateo Villarreal and Adam Gonzales. "They're good hands with top ability, and both are trustworthy," said Nelson.

Besides a quarter of a section of his own, Nelson farms two sections of Rodney Smith's land and a quarter of a section of land belonging to Mrs. T. U. Smith.

A breakdown of crops show 850 acres of milo, 260 in wheat and 225 planted in cotton.

place four-and-a-half miles southeast of Hart.

Nelson has been a farmer all his life, growing up in Childress County on his father's dry-land farm. "I worked on the farm as a boy, and we used horses until 1939. As far back as I can remember, my people were farmers."

The Hart man said there was about five weeks this spring when he wished he hadn't been a farmer. "It's a definite gamble," he added; "It takes a huge investment, and you never know until it's all over if you come out ahead."

He added that weather and insects are unpredictable and that the only fairly certain thing is steady support prices for farm crops.

"If weather or insects get you, you're gone," Nelson said. He said his biggest expense was labor and that in August alone he paid out more than \$8,000.

Nelson told that his grain was not weighing out like he had supposed, and he believed a fungus caused by the damp weather had cut down on production. He thinks it will average perhaps 6,000 pounds an acre.

Silverton Owls Next Hart Foe

Owls have a reputation for striking swiftly and fiercely in the night. And there's a gang of Silverton Owls who are living up to characteristics of that talloned bird.

Silverton will meet the Hart Longhorns here Friday night in what should be a battle-royal. The Owls have a 3-1 record, being beaten only by Claude in the season opener.

Last year Silverton jumped on the Longhorns and rode them down, 36-28. This year finds both teams improved, and Friday's game could well be the Longhorns toughest of the season.

The non-district tilt gets underway at 8 p.m. in Longhorn Stadium.

Fans can be assured of seeing some of the finest backs in class "A" and "B". For example on the 4-A Owl lineup are Fred Stafford and Montie Smith, a halfback and a fullback. Both of these boys have struck with lightning speed on touchdown runs.

Stafford turned in touchdown gallops of 76 and 50 yards against Happy in a 34-0 rout. Smith blasted over for a couple of shorter tallies. Stafford is also a fine passer.

Silverton's quarterback, Greg Towe has proved to be an excellent passer, teaming up with star end Dennis Tomlin.

Max Garrison, another back, ran for two touchdowns in the Owl's 44-14 tromping of Kress and sprinted for another against Happy. He also has connected

for several touchdowns by passing.

Stafford and Tomlin teamed up in the Kress game with Tomlin catching three touchdowns passes, two of them for 30 yards.

The Owl's only loss came at the hands of Claude, a real powerhouse this season. In the 14-0 game, the Owls were plagued by pre-game injuries, and several of their best boys sat out the contest.

Hart also has its share of fine backs and ends, not to mention a good defensive forward wall.

Thus far Billy Farris and Joe Rubalcaba have been the most consistent ground gainers. Not far behind is Gary Heller.

Hart ends, Kenneth Fincher, and Carl Ward, have sparked several games with their timely pass receptions.

Hart has scored 103 points to its opponents 49. Last week the Longhorns stampeded to a 25-0 win over Anton.

After the Silverton game, district contest will get underway with Bovina, followed by an open date, Happy, Lazbuddie and Vega.

Coaches Dub Cleveland and Eddie Nicholson had nothing but praise for the fine showing last week of the 'horns. The coaches said it was tough to pick one outstanding boy, since almost everyone played a top brand of football.

A favorite recipe of Mrs. Wade Mills is submitted this week. It is strawberry dessert and is similar to an ice cream sandwich.

The strawberry dessert recipe calls for:

1/2 lb. vanilla wafers crushed, using 2/3 wafers for bottom 1/3 wafers used for top 2 eggs beaten until light and fluffy

Add:
1/3 cup melted butter
1 cup powdered sugar
Beat until paste is formed and add:

1 cup strawberries or more
Whip 1 cup cream and add 1/4 cup sugar

Add to fruit and pour over wafers

Top with remaining 1/3 wafers and freeze.

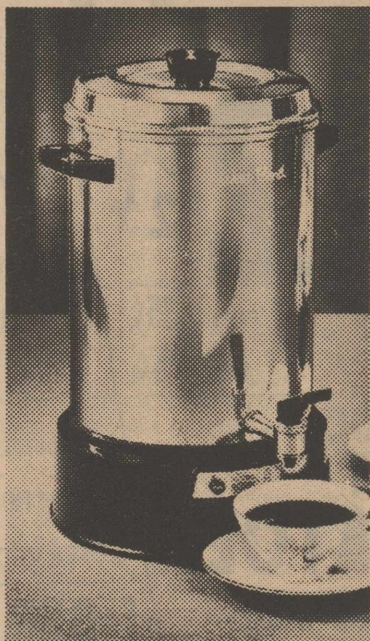

A county-wide meeting of natural gas users is set for Tuesday, Oct. 22, at 7:30 p.m. in the Dimmitt grade school cafeteria.

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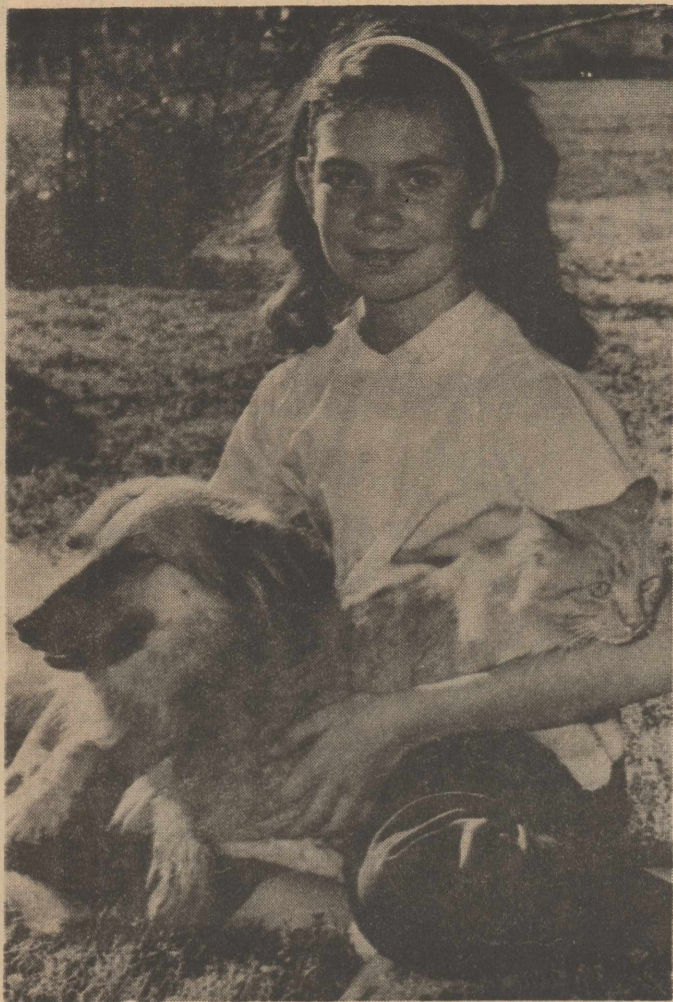

Longhorn Co-Captain Undergoing Treatment

Dennis McLain, co-captain of the Hart Longhorns, is undergoing treatment by a Lubbock physician for deep contusion of the muscle in his left thigh.

A pre-season football injury resulted in hemorrhage and formation of a blood clot within the muscle.

McLain's injury was first diagnosed as "charliehorses", but when intensive treatment did not improve the condition, Coach Dub Cleveland sought the services of the Tech trainer, Don Sparks.

Sparks recommended the Tech team doctor, who is treating McLain with whirlpool therapy and injections into the center of the muscle. Treatment is designed to dissolve the clot.

McLain did not participate in practice this week, and will not suit out for the tilt against Silverton here Friday night.

The captain said football is his first love, and that it's hard not to be wearing Longhorn colors.

Last year McLain and Billy Farris were the team's top scorers and ground gainers.

McLain said the Longhorns have a great ball club and believes they will have an enviable record for the season.

Longhorns Trample Bulldogs, 25-0, In Last Quarter Rally

Hart's Longhorns were held to a lone touchdown for three quarters Friday by Anton then came alive in the last frame to score three times and smother the Bulldogs, 25-0.

Hart now has three wins, one loss and a tie.

Friday's game was a toss-up until the fourth quarter as Anton's beefy line played an inspired brand of football. Five of the Bulldogs weighed 180-pounds or more. Hart's heaviest man is a 166 pounder.

The Longhorns threatened twice early in the first quarter but were stopped both times, once from the Anton 20, and again from the Bulldog's five.

The first drive came when Joe Rubalcaba intercepted a Bulldog pass on the 'dog's 30-yard line and ran it back to the 27. Anton was in possession of the ball on two plays when the interception was made.

Billy Farris, who played his usual outstanding game, hit for two to the 25. An incomplete pass used up the second down, then Kenneth Fincher found short running room to near the 20. On a fourth down mix up Farris was trapped for a five-yard loss and Anton took over.

Three running plays by the Bulldogs Willie Bell, Danny Lambert and Billy Eaton accounted for only nine yards and the visitors punted.

The ball rolled out-of-bounds on Hart's 25-yard line. Fincher, running from the fullback position, broke up the middle for a long first down to his own 41. Gary Heller kept the ball on a roll-out to his 48.

From that point, Farris, reeled off a gallop that moved the ball to Anton's 21. Several times Farris was hit but each time regained his balance.

Joe Rubalcaba took over from the 21, powering up the middle to the Anton nine. Heller kept to the 6 on a first down try and Farris found the middle jammed, getting a scant yard to the five. Rubalcaba carried, and he too was banged down on the five. A fourth-down pass fell incomplete and Anton took over.

The Bulldogs looked as if they had found the right combination when Bell sparked two first down gains out to the Bulldog 30. The attack bogged however on the Anton 35 and the 'dogs were forced to punt.

Farris wormed through the big Anton line and blocked the attempt and Hart tackle Roger Lancaster recovered the ball on the visitors 33.

Heller lost no time in moving up the middle to the 24 and Rubalcaba found a hole to the 16. Farris was knocked down at the line of scrimmage on the next play, but on the second down Heller kept to Anton's 9-yard-line. Farris blasted to the four and another first down, and Heller squirmed to the three on a keeper.

With 9:46 still showing in the first half, Farris churned over his right guard and tackle into the end zone for a Longhorn touchdown. Fincher kicked the extra point and Hart was out front, 7-0.

Anton tired to get back into the game, opening up with passes and reverses, but their plans were foiled each time. Faced with a fourth down from the Hart 43, a bad snap from center sailed through the hands

of the kicker, and he was wrapped up on his 41.

On the first running play, Hart sent Farris around his right end on a reverse, but the speedy back was trapped back to the 50. Heller fumbled and recovered on Anton's 49 and a pass to Fincher fell incomplete. Fincher punted on fourth down to the Anton 28.

The Bulldogs couldn't move the ball and punted out to Hart's 28. Farris narrowly missed blocking the punt.

Hart moved the ball back to their 41, and on fourth down had to punt. Paul Swanson, a Bulldog trackle broke through to block the attempt, and he recovered the ball on Hart's 24. Big Bob Conkin blasted to the Longhorn 18, then Hart's Mark Martin threw Bell for a two yard loss to the 20. An incomplete pass and on more unsuccessful running play and Hart took over.

The Longhorns ran the ball out to the 35, and the half ended. Anton threatened again early in the third quarter, but a fumble on Hart's 30-yard line ended the threat. Larry McKay came up with the ball, but Hart couldn't move and punted.

The Bulldogs kept the ball three downs and punted from their 41. Farris partially blocked the punt and Carl Ward fielded it on his own 40. Farris moved to the 46. Rubalcaba got two more to the 48, and then Fincher rambled to Anton's 45.

On second down, Heller threw long to Ward, who finally was pulled down on Anton's 9-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, Heller fumbled and a Bulldog recovered.

The 'dogs punched the ball out to the 14 and had to punt. Farris once again missed blocking the punt only by inches. The ball rolled dead on the Hart 40, and the Longhorns were forced to punt three plays later.

A break came for the 'horns shortly after the opening of the fourth quarter. Anton had moved the ball from deep in their end of the field out to the 30. At that point Rubalcaba fell on a Bulldog fumble, and the 'horns came alive. Farris wheeled to Anton's 23, and Fincher broke loose down to the 11. Rubalcaba rambled behind good blocking to the two-yard-line. Heller carried over with 11:02 remaining in the game. Fincher's point-after-attempt was off to the right, and the Longhorns led 13-0.

Hart held after the kickoff then was forced to punt right back. Anton moved once more to Hart's 29 before fumbling. Tommy Morrison grabbed the ball for the Longhorns.

From there Rubalcaba, Fincher, Farris and Heller alternated carrying down the field until Farris was knocked loose from the pigskin at Anton's 21.

Hart's third touchdown came after taking over the ball on a disputed fumble which was ruled a Longhorn recovery on Anton's 35.

Rubalcaba picked up two to the 37. Fincher got two more to the 35 and Heller found running room to the 22 and a first down.

Heller then was trapped behind the line of scrimmage but managed to pitch back to Farris

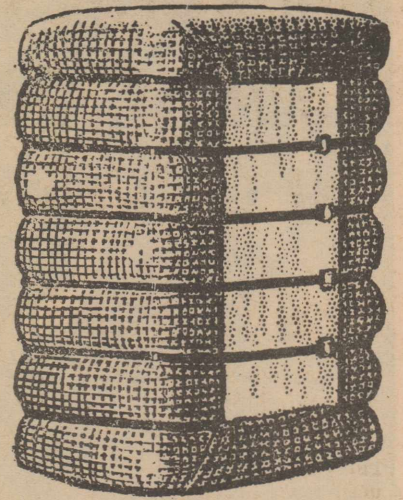

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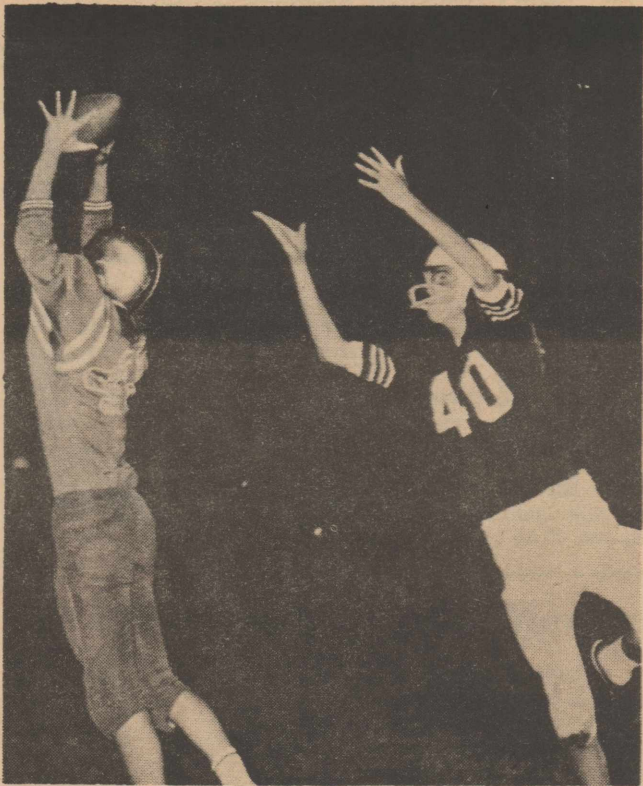

trailing the play, and Farris knifed on down to the 12.

Rubalcaba, on a bull-like rush over the left side of his line, went over standing up from the 12. A fake kick resulted in a fumble on the extra point and the ball carrier was smothered. With 2:53 remaining to play, Hart had taken a 19-0 lead.

The Longhorns kicked off and Morrison raced downfield to drop the ballcarrier on the Anton 11. Billy Eaton lost two yards back to the 9, but a completed pass pushed the ball out to the Bulldog's 19. Farris broke through to drop the ballcarrier on the 16 for a three yard loss, bringing up fourth down.

This time Farris broke straight through the middle of the defensive line, which he had consistently done, and blocked the punt. Ward was Johnny-on-the-spot as he picked the ball up and ran over for a Longhorn touchdown. The PAT was no good. With 1:41 remaining to play, Hart had pushed its advantage to 25-0.

With 44 seconds remaining Anton tried a desperation pass which David Gardner picked off at the Bulldog 40 and raced untouched into the endzone. Hart was offside and the touchdown play was called back.

The Longhorns had 337 yards rushing to 147 for the Bulldogs, and Hart wound up with 17 first downs to Anton's four.

Hart coaches pointed out Lancaster, Farris, Mitchell and Morrison as outstanding defensive figures.
