SUPREME COURT KILLS ENTIRE RAIL ACT

Retirement Law Is
Declared Unconstitutional

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The entire railroad retirement act, affecting more than a million employees, was held unconstitutional today by the Supreme Court.

The decision, read by Justice Roberts, upheld the lower court ruling which declared the act invalid. The court's ruling was directed especially at the section of the act which made it apply to all employees of interstate carriers, including employees not directly engaged in interstate commerce.

Justice Roberts said the invalid features of the act could not be separated and it was necessary to declare the whole act invalid. He said the law, in addition, was not regulation of interstate commerce and was invalid also for that reason.

Baby Is Unhurt After Lost Two Days in Woods

MAUSTON, Wis., May 6.—A babe in the woods, tired and hungry but presumably unhurt, 21-months-old Thelma Ann Wilke was found yesterday playing in the scrub oak clumps about three miles north of the farm home from which she toddled away late Friday.

The report came from Mrs. William Goetz, telephone operator at Necedah, whose husband had been participating in the search by 300 CCC Camp youths, sheriff's deputies and farm folk through a wide circle about the farm home where the father is bedridden.

Morgan Rider Jr., son of the Juneau County sheriff, told the Associated Press his father had reported to his office here that the baby was playing, apparently making no effort to try to find the way to her home, when the searchers who had been pounding through the area two days and two nights came upon her.

Nine Injured When Transport Dives Into Field

ATLANTA, Mo., May 6.—United States Senator Bronson M. Cutting, New Mexico, and three other persons were killed before dawn today in the crash of a twin-motored Transcontinental Western Air plane.

The dead: Senator Cutting, Harvey Bolton, the pilot, Kenneth Greeson, co-pilot, and an unidentified woman. Nine injured were taken to the Samaritan Hospital at Macon, 15 miles from the scene of the crash.

The plane was east bound on a non-stop flight from Albuquerque, found the Kansas City airport wrapped in fog and smoke. After circling vainly for 20 minutes, Bolton was ordered to reach the emergency landing field at Kirksville, Mo. The fuel was exhausted 15 miles from the field and the ship crashed on a farm near Atlanta.

The dead woman is believed to be Miss Jeanne Anne Hillias, 20, of Kansas City.

The injured: Richard Wallace, prominent picture director, Hollywood; Mr. and Mrs. William Kaplan, Hollywood—Kaplan is an assistant producer in a film company—Paul Wing, Hollywood, father of the film actress Toby Wing; C. B. Drew, Hollywood; Henry Sharpe, Hollywood; Mrs. Dora Metzger and baby, bound from Los Angeles to Newark; Mrs. D. I. Meeker, Kansas City, wife of a TWA pilot.

Those from Hollywood were members of a motion picture production unit east bound to make a film at Annapolis.

All were injured seriously except Kaplan.

In Washington, the Senate adjourned out of respect to Cutting.

Former Plainview Banker Arrested

TYLER, May 6.—Dan M. Royall, former president of the City National Bank in Plainview, was arrested in Malakoff, Henderson County, yesterday on a fugitive warrant charging violation of the national banking laws.

Deputy U. S. Marshal Harry Bothwell of Tyler made the arrest.

Royall was released under \$5,000 bond, which was set by U. S. Commissioner Paul Kern.

The federal officers said Royall was charged at Lubbock March 1, 1934, with making false entries in books of the Plainview bank.

The bond calls for his appearance in Lubbock federal court for trial May 20.

Royall now is an auto dealer at Malakoff.

KEEP YOUR EYES OPEN FOR 'CORNER'

WE have been watching so long for that famous "corner" which must be turned before we pass from depression to prosperity, that our eyes may be getting a little glassy. It is entirely possible that we may get 'way past it before we even see it.

All of which is just another way of saying that a business revival could easily steal upon us unawares. It cannot come overnight; there will be no abrupt transition from depression to boom. Instead, the pick-up must begin a little bit here and a little bit there. Then, one day, we might look around and make the pleasing discovery that things were a lot better than we had thought.

Bearing all that in mind, it is worth glancing at a size-up of the situation just made by the National Industrial Conference Board. This presents a picture which, while somewhat spotty, is preponderantly bright.

The auto industry, for instance, continues to expand. Auto production for the first quarter of 1935 reached a higher level than any in the last eight years with the exception of 1929.

Steel production, on the other hand, slipped nearly 5 per cent from February to March, although it remained 6.5 per cent above the 1934 level. Bookings of fabricated structural steel, meanwhile, rose 34 per cent from February to March, and machine tool orders jumped sharply, giving the first quarter an average 18 per cent above that for 1934.

Another encouraging factor is to be found in the fact that building and engineering contract awards rose in March by more than the usual seasonal amount. Residential contracts, in particular, made a gratifying gain.

Electric power production in March declined slightly from February, but the decline was somewhat less than seasonal and the March output remained 4 per cent above that for March, 1934. Bituminous coal production was up in March—possibly because of fear of a strike—and department store sales rose.

On the other hand, textile production in March fell off by more than the usual seasonal amount, security prices sagged, and wholesale commodity prices dropped slightly—although these latter remained 7.6 per cent above the level recorded a year ago.

It is hard to add all this together and get anything very definite. In the main, however, it may be said that the picture is encouraging.

The WINGED HORSE of the MUSES



URUGUAY, Italy, Spain, and other countries display in stamps their regard for the most famous horse of Greek fable, the winged Pegasus. Said to have sprung from the trunk of the Gorgon Medusa, when her head was cut off by Perseus, Pegasus was caught by Bellerophon, but threw his rider on his flight to heaven. In heaven, Pegasus served Zeus, fetching thunder, and lightning for the god of power.

Pegasus, therefore, is considered a symbol of the thundercloud, and also as a curse-horse, representing the speed at which curses were fulfilled. But more recent stories make Pegasus the horse of the Muses and symbol of poetry.

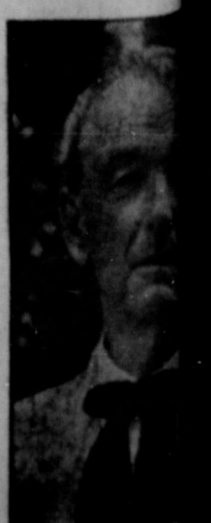
