## MIDNIGHT FIRE DESTROYS HOME

A small home on Tenth Street, the title to which changed hands Thursday night about midnight, together with the contents.

The place was occupied by C. W. Post, who moved into it about two weeks ago, and who was to vacate on September 1st to give possession to J. C. McNally, who purchased the house from Judge J. W. Powell this week, the transfer being made the day before the fire.

Judge Powell sold the property to Mr. McNally for \$550 consideration, Mr. McNally paying \$150 cash, and executing notes for \$400. Judge Powell had the property insured for \$400, and the insurance was transferred to McNally Thursday. Mr. Post had \$500 insurance on his household goods, but he failed to have the insurance transferred when he recently moved from a place owned by W. B. Currie to the house which was destroyed by fire. It is not known what effect this will have in making settlement.

Mr. McNally has been living in the country and did not know anything about the fire until he came to town Friday morning, and when he called on Judge Powell to see what could be done about the matter, Judge Powell stated that he would refund the man his \$150 and collect the \$400 insurance.

The house was practically destroyed when the fire company reached the scene. Mr. Post was asleep on the porch and said that he did not know how the fire originated. Post is an ex-service man, was gassed in the war, and has been drawing a stipend from the government.

## WINTERS GETS FIRST BALE

WINTERS, Aug. 15.—The first bale of 1924 cotton was marketed here yesterday morning. It was raised several miles Southwest of Winters by George Houston. 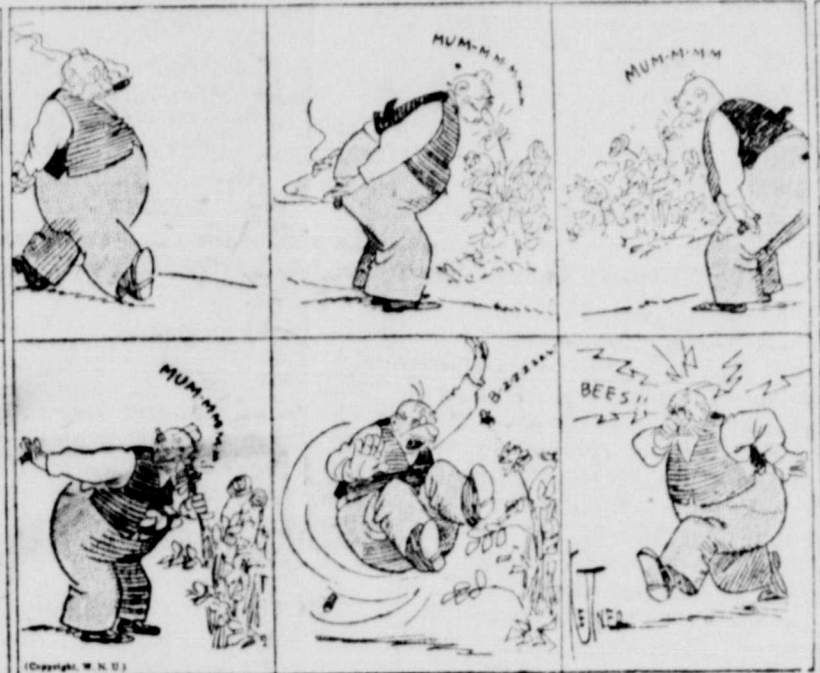
## COOLIDGE OFF ON VACATION

## AMERICAN HOSPITAL AIDED BY JAPANESE RED CROSS

TOKIO, Aug. 15.—St. Luke's International Hospital in Tokio, conducted by the American Episcopal Mission Board and headed by Dr. R. B. Teusler, has received a donation of \$75,000 from the Japan Red Cross thru the Department of Home Affairs. The donation is in recognition of the hospital's work for Japanese charity patients after the great earthquake and fire of last September.

Dr. Teusler is now in America raising funds for the reconstruction of the institution, which was burned in the September conflagration.

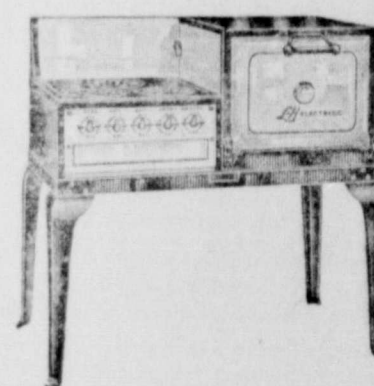

## KILLING FROGS OR TOADS

IT IS a superstition common in this and many other countries, and one remaining from ancient times, that if you kill a frog, or a toad, your cows will go dry, or at least give bloody milk. Frogs and toads are of the same family; one is the farmer brother and the other the sailor.

In the ancient cults it is the frog which is generally spoken of, though, from some of the archaic representations and some of the myths, it is evident that the distinction between the frog and the toad was not always definitely drawn. For general purposes of superstition the two batrachians may be taken as one. The frog was a sacred creature among the old Egyptians; in some places it was embalmed after death and it was honored with sculptures on the tombs of Thebes. A volume might be written on the frog in Egyptian mythology. The Romans got their veneration of the frog from the Egyptians and the modern Italians regard the figure of a frog as a powerful amulet against the evil eye. Naturally it brings back luck to kill the sacred creature.

As to why the killing of a frog or a toad should have a particular effect upon cows, it may be said that, while the frog was in general the symbol of Pith, the god of the reproductive forces not solar, it was, in some places and in certain connections, used as the symbol of Isis.

"It is said that the Egyptian Isis was born at Argos and that she is identified with the cow-shaped lo, who was the same as Hera, and both are represented in Egypt, as well as in Greece, with cow's horns."

## HILDEGARDE

HILDEGARDE is very popular in this country, though her origin is almost lost to sight in Norse mythology. The name means "battle maid protector," and links its bearers with the warrior maidens of the wild North.

Hildegard's direct predecessor was Nidur, chief among the Valkyries. In England there was a Danish princess, Hildur, who became the holy abbess of Whitby, succeeding St. Begga.

The mother of Rolf Gangr, progenitress of English royalty, who vainly besought Harald Harfagre not to banish her sons from Norway, was named Hildr. Hildeidris is a popular Anglo-Saxon name.

Hildegard was first bestowed upon an abbess in the Palatina who was noted for her sanctity and who died as late as 1004. In honor of the holy woman, Hildegard is still very popular and in common use among German ladies. In Denmark, the same name has been corrupted Oligard.

The Gothic queens of Spain bore a name almost identical, Hilduara, meaning battle prudence.

Amber is Hildegard's talisman stone. It is said to protect her from danger and disease, and to strengthen the health of her mind and body. It is particularly lucky for singers, preserving and clarifying the voice, according to old superstition. Friday is her lucky day and 7 her lucky number.

MOTHER FINDS LOST  
SON AFTER TWENTY-  
FIVE YEAR ABSENCE

MANILA, Aug. 15.—A letter from a mother in Danville, Ky., to the Manila police department has been the means of locating a long lost son. Twenty-five years ago Frank Sapp enlisted in the army and came to the Philippines where he served during the insurrection. At the end of his enlistment he remained here, engaging in various occupations.

In her letter to the police department Mrs. Sapp wrote that her son had never written home since he enlisted in a volunteer regiment, but that she heard indirectly that he was in the Philippines in the lumber business.

The coast guard steamer, Pathfinder, which recently returned from an inspection trip to the Babuyan Islands, brought news that Frank Sapp, an American, operated a sawmill on the Island of Comiguin in the Babuyan group and that he had constructed a number of rafts on which he transported the 77 natives from Babuyan Island who were stricken by the active volcano there to Camiguin Island for safety. Sapp gave employment to the natives in his sawmill.

On the next trip of the Pathfinder to the Babuyans mail from Sapp's mother will be sent to him. Meanwhile a letter from the police department is on its way to Mrs. Sapp, telling her that her son has been located.

LULLINGTON, England, Aug. 15.—A clock in a church tower here has neither face nor hands, but has given the parishioners accurate time for nearly four centuries by striking the hours on the church bell.
