## Bobbitt Is Charged In Conspiracy

### MOODY ASKED TO INQUIRE INTO AFFAIRS

### MAYOR CHAMBERS OF SAN ANTONIO HAS STATEMENT TODAY

(By Associated Press) SAN ANTONIO, June 25.—Mayor C. M. Chambers today charged that Attorney General R. L. Bobbitt had "entered into a conspiracy" with the Citizens League in return for its votes and challenged Governor Dan Moody to send an investigator to Bobbitt's home county to investigate conditions there.

Mayor Chambers was prompted by a statement made by Bobbitt yesterday that a representative of the political ring here had offered to support him if he would refrain from filing ouster proceedings against two Bexar county officials.

Old Spanish Custom "It has been an old Spanish custom in Webb county for years to violate election laws and even while Bobbitt was district attorney there," the mayor added, saying: "If the governor of this state or any newspaper would send a fair investigator to Webb county it would be an easy matter to ascertain whether the facts I have stated are true or not."

"I further charge that Bobbitt entered into a conspiracy with the Citizens League of San Antonio and is expecting in return its votes for attorney general," Mayor Chambers said.

The mayor characterized as "false and untrue" Bobbitt's charge that the ring here had endeavored to make a trade with him over the ouster suits.

## PLANE NEARS THIRD WEEK

### "CITY OF CHICAGO" HAS 332 HOURS AT NOON TODAY

#### PHYSICIANS TO APPEAL TO GOVERNOR FOR EXPERIMENT

(By Associated Press) SANTA FE, N. M., June 25.—Woo Dak San, a Chinese, condemned to electrocution in New Mexico for murder, may be given the alternative of death or offering himself as a human experiment in the efforts of science to combat trachoma.

Dr. Polk Richards, of the United States Indian service at Albuquerque, and Dr. E. J. Proctor, noted oculist of Boston, and now of Santa Fe, have discussed the possibilities of experimenting with Woo Dak. It was learned yesterday after the state supreme court denied a rehearing on San's appeal.

The court remanded San's case to the district judge Carl Dunlap at Silver City to have the method of death changed from hanging to electrocution to conform to the new state law and to have the date of execution set.

Dr. Richards today said he and Dr. Proctor had talked with Attorney General M. A. Otero over the possibility of obtaining the man's consent for such an experiment and that it was suggested that they request Governor R. C. Dillon for permission to talk to the Chinese on the subject.

Santa Fe lawyers considered that even though the Chinese would consent that he might gain only a stay of execution during the term of experiment, or that he might win a commutation or a pardon for his contribution to science if the experiment is successful.

Specialists believe they have isolated the trachoma germ. Dr. Richards said, and while experiments have been made on monkeys, science needs a human specimen to obtain positive proof of whether inoculation with the germ discovered will produce trachoma.

## MERCURY IS ON UP TREND AGAIN TODAY

### TEMPERATURE IS 103 AT 2 TODAY; STATE HAS HOT SPOTS

Threatening to exceed the maximum peaks of Monday and Tuesday, the mercury reached 103 degrees at the State experiment farm, three miles east of this city, at 2 o'clock this afternoon, while at the same hour thermometers in the city unofficially recorded as high as 105 degrees.

Temperature at the experiment station had equalled the maximum of yesterday at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and with clear skies prevailing, a record mark for the season is expected today.

Temperature in the City of Lubbock was unofficially recorded at 106 degrees yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

FORT STOCKTON IS HOTTEST POINT DALLAS, June 25. (AP)—Fort Stockton, in the Big Bend Country, maintained its summer-time maximum temperature yesterday with 108 degrees officially reported, according to the United States weather bureau's compilation for the 24 hours ending this morning.

Spur was second with a maximum of 106 degrees. There was a flock of 104's, as follows: Childress, Clarendon, Crosbyton, Lamesa, Midland, Memphis and Quanah. Amarillo, Pecos and Lubbock reported 102 degrees.

## NEW MEXICO EXTENSIONS ARE STUDIED

### GALLAHER DENIES ANY DEFINITE ACTION FOR NEW LINE

The Santa Fe Railway company is watchful of the oil development in Eastern New Mexico and has been considering extensions into that area, but no definite conclusion has been reached. T. B. Gallaher, of Amarillo, general freight and passenger agent, said today in a long distance telephonic interview with the Daily Journal.

Mr. Gallaher's announcement was in reply to rumors circulated here last night. According to the unofficial reports, negotiations are pending between several major oil companies in Lea county, New Mexico, and other interested parties of that section and representatives of the Santa Fe for an extension into the Hobbs and Lovington areas.

Two Routes Considered Two routes for extensions are now under consideration, according to prevailing rumors. One south from Portales to Hobbs, via Lovington and the other the same as a former application from Hobbs, which would extend to Lovington. The latter proposal would not connect with Hobbs, unless altered.

It is thought highly probably that all former opposition in Lea County against the Santa Fe will now join in asking the Interstate Commerce Commission to grant the certificate of necessity and convenience.

"We are awaiting developments in the New Mexico territory before arriving at a conclusion," said Mr. Gallaher today. "We have considered several routes, and when we have arrived at a decision for definite action we will be glad to make an announcement."

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## FLIERS BRING SHIP DOWN AT HARBOR GRACE

### FOG IS CONQUERED BY GROUP AFTER HOP OVER ATLANTIC

(By Associated Press) The airplane Southern Cross conquered the Atlantic today, just as two years ago she conquered the Pacific ocean, but fell short of her goal, New York, in a flight across the ocean from Ireland.

Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and his three companions became lost in a dense fog when their compass failed east of Cape Race, Newfoundland, during the night, and when finally they regained their position had lost so much time it was necessary to seek a nearer landing place.

Turning from their course they headed northeastward toward St. John's and Harbor Grace, Newfoundland. After hovering in the

NEW YORK, June 25.—A telegram from Capt. Kingsford-Smith to the Vacuum Oil company, co-sponsor of the Ireland-New York flight of the Southern Cross, indicated today that the Captain plans to start from Harbor Grace late today, arriving in New York early tomorrow.

Fog over Harbor Grace for several minutes they came down on a landing field there at 5:57 a. m. e. t. Previously Captain Kingsford-Smith had said he would re-fuel and proceed on his flight.

Second Crossing The flight was the second westward crossing of the north Atlantic, the German fliers, Captain Herman Koehl and Baron Von Huenfeldt, accompanied by Colonel James E. Maurice, having completed the first in the Bremen in the spring of 1928.

Had Bad Fog A message from the plane at 3:58 a. m. e. t. said: "Very bad fog all night and trouble with compass has held us up quite a bit. Afraid will have to land at Newfoundland or Nova Scotia."

## REVERSALS IN CASES GIVEN

### LEAH BAILEY WINS IN APPEAL; WILSON'S CASE REVERSED

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, June 25.—The Court of Criminal Appeals today reversed and remanded the case of Leah Bailey, sentenced to served 90 years by a jury in Midland county on the charge of murdering Dan Horn, Ward county peace officer. The appeals court reversed the judgment and remanded the case because of misconduct of the jury.

The woman was tried originally in Ward county but the court of appeals reversed and remanded the case for trial to Midland county.

Shot In Defense It was alleged by the defense at the trial that Horn was shot while he was searching a rooming house occupied by the woman. It was claimed the shooting was done in self-defense after Horn had threatened to strike the defendant.

At the first trial, a sentence of 90 years was assessed. The court held the jury was guilty of misconduct because it discussed the sentence that had been assessed when the case was tried originally, although no evidence of the sentence was adduced at the second trial. Horn was shot March 25, 1928.

Wilson Case Reversed The court also reversed and remanded the case of Loyd Wilson.

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# JUDGE WILSON TO MAKE TALK TO FARMERS

## FARM RELIEF PROGRAM TO BE SUBJECT OF TALK ON SATURDAY

The Government's Farm Relief program will be subject of an address by Judge James C. Wilson, of Fort Worth, United States district judge, at a mass meeting of farmers and business men of Lubbock and the South Plains at the court house Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

"From the fact that I have seen more newspaper articles pertaining to the government's farm relief program, the Agricultural Marketing Act, the Federal Farm Board and cooperative marketing movements in your Lubbock papers than in any other city I have been throughout the southwest," says Judge Wilson, "I gather that there is more interest in these subjects among the people of this South Plains country than there exists in other sections."

"And, why not? You have what is considered by many to be the greatest agricultural empire of all the southwest here on these Plains.

"Agriculture constitutes the chief basis of wealth and prosperity and the future of this city, he declared. "And the chief need of this nation today is to organize the farmer, because in no other way can the problems of agriculture be solved."

Plays Middleman  
How many can insist that "our greatest industry," agriculture, should remain in complete disorganization, Judge Wilson says he can not understand. Here he touched upon efforts of organized middlemen to defeat the purpose of the government's program and to spreading of propaganda to aid them in buying the farmer's products cheaply.

"The farmer is robbed from year to year and plundered out of his profits, to which no other, but he can ever be entitled. The only chance to raise money is from half a failure," he says, "when production is far below expectations. When the farmer makes a big crop, organized propaganda, particularly that which is paid for by the wheat speculators, is started from the four corners of the world. The best is about over-production. They keep pounding this into the minds of the farmer until he believes it and passively accepts the low price to which his wheat has been manipulated."

Speculation Starts  
"And just as soon as the crop gets out of the hands of the farmer, the speculators start the drive to price the price up again.

"Parasites and combinations of parasites are sucking the blood out of the farmer today."

Judge Wilson continued with statements that the consumer is never benefited by low prices paid to farmers. He cited wheat prices falling at 65 cents, yet the price of bread remained as it has for many years.

Speaking of the government's program for aid he says: "This is the first time in Ameri-

# ALL-INDIA PLAN GIVEN

## SIR JOHN SIMON HAS SOLUTION REPORT ON SITUATION

(By Associated Press)  
LONDON, June 25.—An All-India federation which would travel a long road toward eventual self-government under the British crown was recommended to the British and Indian peoples today by the parliamentary commission headed by Sir John Simon as the most effective solution of Indian empire problems.

The recommendation was contained in the second half of the commission's report, covering its own history that our government has aligned itself and has entered into league with any one class of their United States. The government has said: "There is one class of people we are going to organize. If there is a favored class, it should be the farmer class."

"Every man should favor and advocate this thing. It is a mark toward the solution of the greater economic problem in America. There will be lots of talking, but every man interested in the future of Lubbock and the South Plains should throw shoulders to the wheel and get behind our government in bringing to our farmers on equal opportunity with other industries."

Prominent in the commission's scheme for a federated India is the plan to join both the states of the Indian provinces—always with their consent—and the provinces of British India in the union scheme. Each would be autonomous according to capacity for self-government. Both princely states and provinces would increase in autonomy gradually as their capacity for self-government increased.

Observers commented that the general recommendation fell short of demands of the Indian nationalist group of which the Mahatma Gandhi, has been leader; these nationalists, or swarajists as they call themselves, have pronounced for complete and immediate independence. While some have believed they would accept immediate dominion status as a compromise it was not expected that the eventual dominion status to which they might aspire under the Simon recommendations would be satisfactory to them.

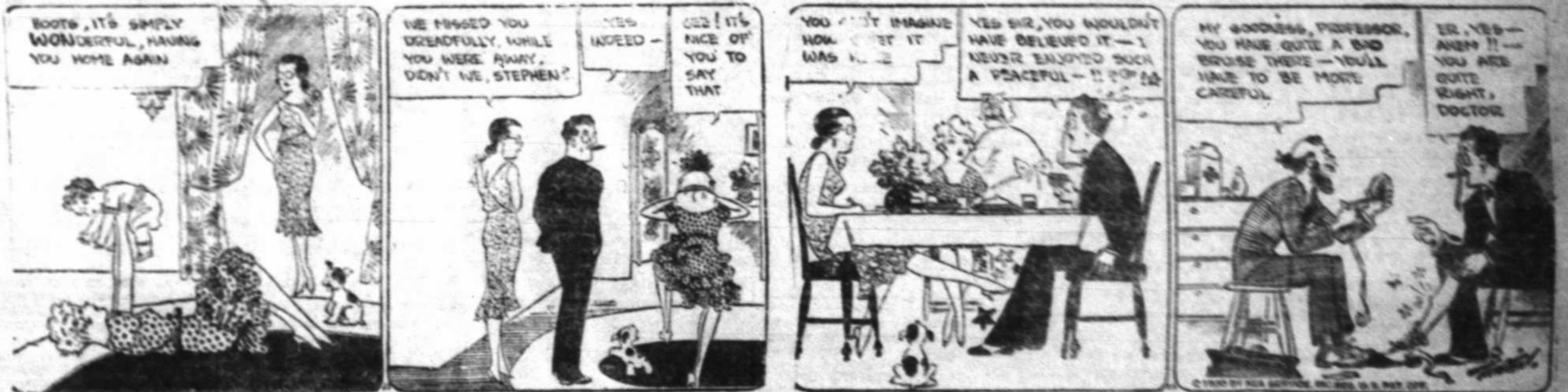

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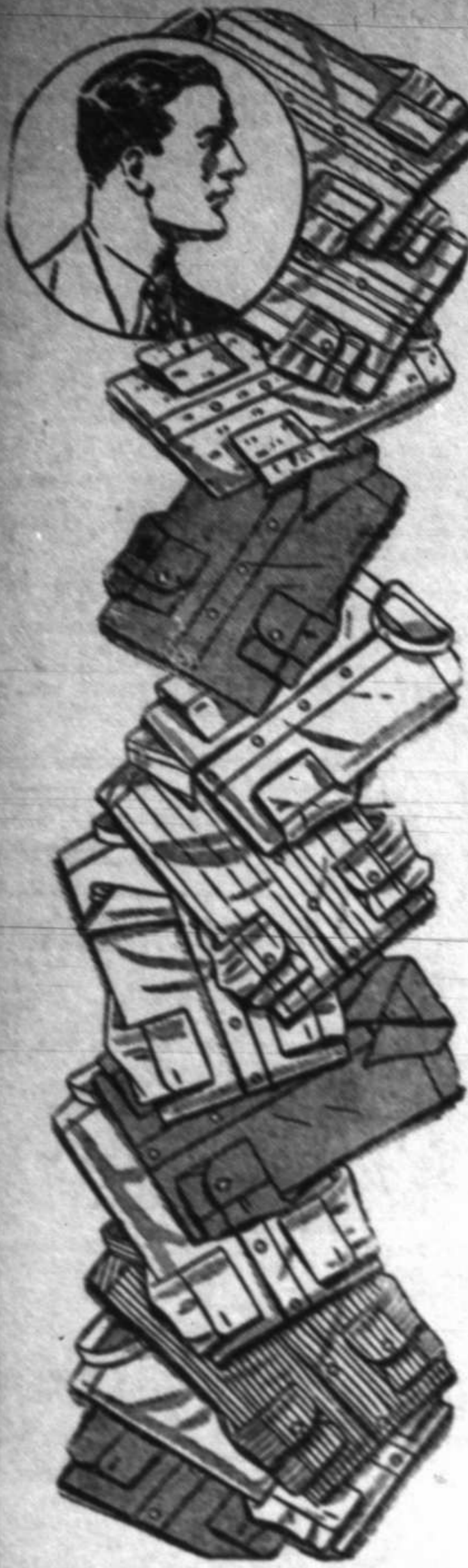

### SPAIN MAY BE CHANGED INTO NEW MONARCH

#### COUNTRY LIKELY TO BE MODELLED AFTER OTHER NATIONS

(By Associated Press)  
PARIS, June 25.—Spanish circles here today debated probable results of a conversation between King Alfonso and Santiago Alba, former liberal premier who has been exiled since the beginning of the Primo De Rivera regime in Spain.

The king, known to be dissatisfied with the condition of his realm, was understood to have listened intently yesterday while the commoner, Santiago Alba, suggested a remodeling of Spanish royal privileges along the lines of the Belgian and British monarchies.

The interview has been the subject of considerable rumor and speculation for weeks, during which time it was said that King Alfonso, en route to England, would stop off in Paris expressly to hear what the former premier might say, and to listen to any suggestions he might make.

Some have considered that important events in Spain await the outcome of the meeting of the monarch and the statesman, and that there was even possibility of resignation of the Berenguer government, to be replaced by a liberal ministry headed by Alba, or by a liberal coalition ministry.

After the interview, Alba issued a communique, which he said had been approved by the king, saying:

"I am glad to have been able to see the king, and to have had the opportunity of expressing to him my views on the present situation of Spain."
