PRIEST IS KILLED IN MEXICAN BATTLE

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, Jan. 15.—Nine rebels were killed in a sharp battle with federal forces at El Sauz Hill, in the state of Jalisco, according to a report from the federal commander.
The communique also claims one of those killed was a Catholic priest, wearing a cassock.
Federal casualties were placed at three killed, and three wounded.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 15.—Special dispatches from Tapachula, which is 27 miles from the Guatemalan border, says Bishop Diaz of Tabasco, left that place last night for Guatemala and will embark for New Orleans.

TRICKY MEMORY COSTS CONGRESSMAN A LAUGH

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, January 15.—Official Washington is unofficially chuckling over an incident in which the geographical bump of a member of congress played traitor and left him high and dry for an explanation.
The story centered about a verbal tilt between this legislator who had attacked the Cuban administration, and a prominent Cuban patriot.

The incident took place at a large official dinner held in Washington in honor of a ranking governmental official. The dinner was attended by cabinet officers, senators, diplomats, and many well known figures in the capital.

The two principals of the story were seated at the table not far from one another, but neither knew the other's identity. The legislator directed a broadside of table talk against the island republic. Overhearing it, the Cuban, introduced himself and asked the legislator why he did not care for Cuba.

"Cuba is in a bad shape," was the reply. "The finances are badly in need of rehabilitation. Why, only the other day Cuba floated a loan for a number of millions of dollars in the United States, which only added to its already staggering debt."

"You are quite sure of that?" asked the Cuban.

"Absolutely, the loan was made but a short time ago."

"Possibly, sir, you might have confused Cuba with another country. Perhaps, it might have been"—(naming a republic to the South).

"Well—erh—ah."
Another person who had been listening to the talk, confirmed the Cuban in his statement.

"Come to think of it, I believe that you are right," admitted the legislator amid a polite ripple of laughter about the table.

In parting, the Cuban asked his new acquaintance if he might call some day to give an accurate account of his island home.

MOTLEY NAMED FAIR DIRECTOR

SWINDLER OF NORFLEET GETS PARDON TODAY

AUSTIN, Jan. 15.—Governor Ferguson has signed a proclamation granting a full pardon to W. B. Spencer, sentenced to serve eight years from Tarrant county, in connection with the swindling of J. Frank Norfleet of Hale Center, by a group of confidence men.
Spencer was pardoned partly because of his chronic rheumatic trouble, it was learned.

AUSTIN, Jan. 15.—Under the condition that he remain with James E. Ferguson for six years, Benjamin Holdings, convicted and sentenced from Van Zandt county for 99 years in the penitentiary, has been pardoned by Governor Ferguson.

Hollings, under terms of the proclamation, is to be given his board, clothes and \$15 per month for a period of six years and at the end of that time he will be free.

Secretarial jobs are kept within other families. Adolphe Menjou has a brother, Henry, who handles the star's mail and occasionally performs in his pictures. Richard Dix's sister, Josephine, for some time was a feminine buffer between her brother and his admirers. Greta Nissen's brother, Eric, has become her secretary, while a similar role is filled for Mae Marsh, by her sister, Frances.

Charles Hines directs his illustrious brother, Johnny. Sid Chaplin, before becoming a comedian in his own right, was his brother Charlie's manager. Director Malcolm St. Clair has a brother, Erik, who is his gag man and assistant. Director Allan Dwan's brother, Dr. Leo Dwan, is his business manager, and D. W. NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—Injunction suits will be filed against the Mexican government by all American oil companies operating in that country should President Calles cancel their drilling permits, issued since the beginning of the year, it was learned here today.

Encaustic Painting is Revived for Murals
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 15.—One of the first large modern wall paintings by the encaustic method, originated by the ancient Greeks has been completed by Professor Ray Boynton of the University of California art department. It is in the dining room of the new Mark Hopkins Hotel here.

Encaustic painting is applied on a coat of gum which protects it from dampness and which forms a permanent union with the material of the wall.

Professor Boynton hopes to see a revival of the encaustic method, he says, "because it leads to a stronger and more spirited handling of subjects, and to the development of a technique that is impossible to attain by painting on a canvass or in a studio and later fastening the work into the place."

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 15.—The Tennessee Supreme Court upheld the state's anti-evolution law today in an opinion on the John Scopes case.

The opinion was delivered by Chief Justice Green while affirming the constitutionality of the anti-evolution law.

In the lower courts the verdict was reversed on the grounds that a judge cannot assess a fine of more than \$50, that being the duty of a jury.

The court's ruling suggested that the case against Scopes, who was convicted in the district court at Dayton, Tennessee, in July, 1925, be nolle prossed.

Ship Pillow Slips Used for Shoe Bags

(By Associated Press)
SOUTHAMPTON, Jan. 14.—Where do pillow-slips go from a liner after a voyage, is a question often asked by pursers and steamship company officials because of the constant replacement necessary.

Lord Incheape, chairman of the P. & O. Company, knows where some of them go. He told shareholders at the annual meeting that at the end of a voyage pillow-slips are frequently utilized by women when packing to make shoe bags.

"I mentioned this to a lady the other evening who frequently travels by the steamers," he added, "and the reply I got was: 'What an excellent idea, I never thought of it.' I was sorry I had spoken."

COURT ROOM, Austin, Jan. 15.—Dexter E. Chipps, Fort Worth lumberman, lost his life in the office of Dr. J. Frank Norris at Fort Worth last July because he threatened to kill Norris, L. H. Nutt, an eye-witness, testified in district court here today.

Nutt said he was conferring with Norris as Chipps entered the door about 5:00 o'clock on the afternoon of July 17th.

Chipps warned the pastor to cease attacks on his friends, Mayor Meacham, W. E. Austin, and a M. Roach, of Fort Worth, or he would kill him, the witness testified.

Nutt said Chipps made a move toward his hip pocket in a threatening manner and said, "let's go to it." Norris then shot three times and Chipps took a few steps and dropped to the floor, Nutt said.

Nutt, a trustee in the Norris church, stood before the jury, and acted out the tragedy, moving his hand toward his hip as he said Chipps had done.

He said Chipps twice made the threat that he would kill Norris.

Norris showed some emotion during the story, holding his handkerchief to his face.

Nutt said he went to the pastor's study about 4:30 o'clock on the afternoon of the slaying.

The first words spoken after he (Nutt) arrived at Norris' office, came from Norris when he said, "Do you know Chipps?"
"I replied that I thought Chipps did business at our bank. Shortly after this Chipps entered the door of the office where Norris was seated at his desk," Nutt testified.

"Did he knock?" Defense Attorney Marvin Simpson asked.

"No, the first I saw of him, he was in the room," Nutt answered.

Nutt then told of the words that passed between the Baptist evangelist and Chipps which soon ended in the fatal shooting.

"The impression on me was that Chipps would kill Norris unless he was prevented," Nutt declared.

The witness said Norris was calm and did not use any abusive language. Nutt had previously testified that Norris had told Chipps that he did not want to have any trouble with him.

H. M. Williams, Fort Worth city salesman for the Moore Rubber Company, was introduced by the defense as the first witness of the day to refute the testimony given yesterday by H. H. Rains.

Rains said he heard Norris remark "I have killed me a man." Williams said that some time after the killing he asked Rains what he knew about the case.

"I don't know a thing, Bill," the witness quoted Rains as saying.

Williams said he understood

that Rains disliked Norris. The state rested its case late yesterday afternoon after introducing six witnesses.

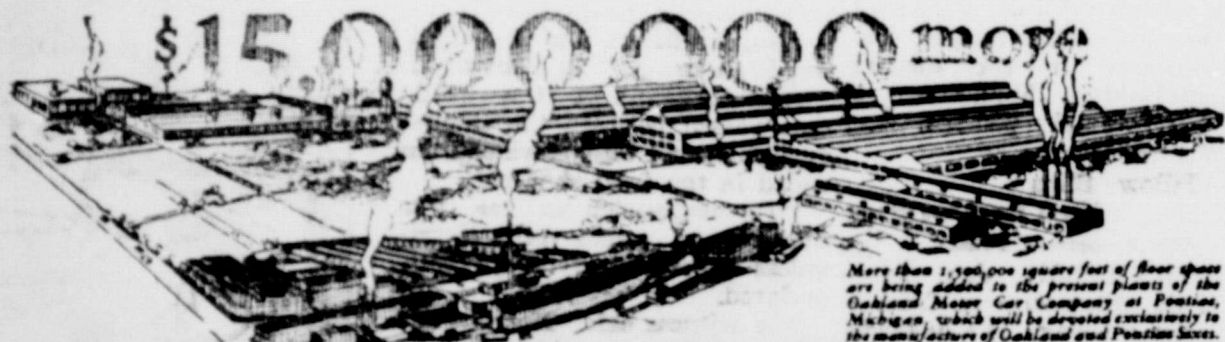
