FAYE LANDERS EARNs HIGH GOV'T HONOR

Signal honors have been achieved by Miss Faye Landers, well known Robert Lee young woman, in recognition of her outstanding ability as a governmental employee in Washington, D. C.

The presentation in the accompanying photo took place before an audience of 1,000 persons in the Pentagon. Out of some 10,000 civilians who work for the Air Force in the Washington area, there were only 15 who received outstanding ratings last year.

A memorandum to Miss Landers announcing the award said: "It is a sincere pleasure to advise you that the Headquarters USAF Performance Rating Committee has approved a recommendation by your superior that you be awarded a Performance Rating of 'Outstanding' as of May 15, 1953. This rating will be made a part of your official personnel records. You may well be proud of the distinction of being adjudged a truly 'Outstanding' employee."

"The file in connection with your recommendation for an 'Outstanding' Rating has been forwarded to the Headquarters Committee on Civilian Awards for consideration for possible additional appropriate recognition of your service to the Air Force."

Miss Landers began her civil service career at Goodfellow AFB in San Angelo. For more than eight years she has been with the Air Force in Washington, D. C.

SCHOOL BOND VOTE DEC. 19

A special election has been called for Dec. 19 when a bond issue not to exceed \$295,000 for a new Robert Lee school building will be submitted to the voters.

The election was called at a trustee meeting Wednesday night. A petition bearing the signatures of 57 qualified voters had been filed requesting that the bond issue be voted upon. It is estimated there are 300 qualified voters in the Robert Lee Independent District.

In order to qualify for a bond election a person must have property assessed on the tax rolls and have a 1953 poll tax receipt.

EXPECT 100 FOR ANNUAL BCD BANQUET

BIG OIL PLAY IN NORTHWEST COKE COUNTY

Tremendous oil drilling activity is under way in northwestern Coke County, outside the Sun block to the west and southwest of Silver. Fifteen rotary rigs are running on the other side of the river.

Main operators are F. Kirk Johnson, Perkins-Prothro and W. M. and A. P. Fuller. Most of the drilling is being done on the W. C. Blanks Estate and Lou E. Johnson Estate.

F. Kirk Johnson this week started two new houses for his pumpers in the new field, and Perkins-Prothro are planning to build a camp for their employees. County officials indicate they will build a new road into the area to connect with the Millican field west of Edith.

McDonald Lumber Co. is the contractor on Johnson's houses, with E. F. Henry as construction foreman.

Johnson has just completed his B-4 Blanks and No. 3 Blanks. Basin Drilling Co. moved its rotary to Johnson D-4 Blanks, and B-H & H-B moved to Johnson 4 Blanks.

Johnson C-1 Blanks early this week was coring at 6,193 feet. Another Basin rig is on the location.

Johnson is also drilling a wildcat to the southeast on W. R. Davis. It was below 7,000 feet Sunday and expected to pick up the reef soon. Markham is the contractor.

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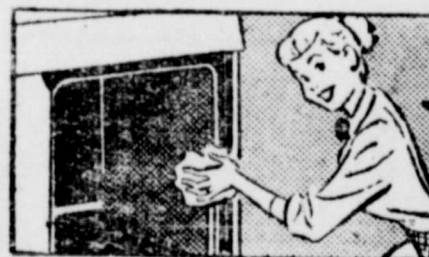
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MORE WILDCATS STAKED IN COKE

Dudley T. Daughtery of Beeville has filed application to drill a 6,500-foot rotary wildcat in Coke County, 10 miles southeast of Robert Lee. It will be drilled as the No. 1 A. S. Willick.

Operations on the project will begin Nov. 30. Elevation is 2,293 feet.

Location, on a 640-acre tract, is 589.3 feet from the north and west lines of 10-John Gibson survey.

The prospector is 1 5/8 miles northeast of Humble 1 Schuch, wildcat failure abandoned Dec. 11, 1950, at 6,685 feet.

It is also two miles southeast of Seaboard & Southern Minerals 1 Reed, wildcat failure abandoned Aug. 5, 1948, at 6,680 feet.

NEAR TENNYSON

Hancock Oil Co. of Midland has filed application to drill a 6,500-foot rotary wildcat in Coke County, one mile west of Tennyson. It will be drilled as the No. 1 George Baumgart.

Drilling on a 480-acre tract will begin Nov. 29.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 2,010 feet from the west lines of 1-Tyler Tap.

The prospector is 2 1/2 miles southeast of Roden & Associates of Midland and Norwood Drilling Co., Odessa, 1 Arrott, wildcat failure abandoned Sept. 5, 1953 at 6,515 feet in the Ellenburger lime, top unreported.

It is also 2 1/8 miles northwest of Honolulu 1 Webb, wildcat failure abandoned June 23, 1953 at 6,050 feet.

JOHNSON OFFSET

W. M. & A. P. Fuller of Midland have filed application to drill a 1/2-mile northwest offset to their No. 1 Mrs. Lou E. Johnson estate, opener and lone producer in the newly-designated Fuller-Coke (Strawn) field of Coke County 20 miles northwest of Robert Lee. It will be the No. 3 Mrs. Lou E. Johnson estate.

Rotary drilling to 7,000 feet will begin at once. Estimated elevation is 2,100 feet, ground level.

Location, on a 320-acre tract, is 467 feet from the north and west lines of the northeast quarter of 67-2-H&TC.

The discovery was finalized Oct. 22 for a daily flowing potential of 247 barrels of 42.5 corrected gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,111-1. Production was from between 6,654-6,784 feet on derrick floor elevation of 2,218 feet.

Sun 12 J. B. Walker, south of the river at Silver, 3,819 feet, shale and sand.

Mild Epidemic Of Measles Is Reaching Texas

Measles in Texas is reaching a mild epidemic stage at present, with outbreaks following closely the main lines of travel across the State, according to information made public today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The number of cases reported to the State Health Department last week are much above the average.

"The peculiar pattern of this spread of measles re-emphasizes the fact that it is a contagious disease, passed on from one person to another," Dr. Cox said. "Guard against exposure by avoiding contact with measles patients."

Dr. Cox said that measles alone is not necessarily a dangerous disease, but dangerous complications, such as streptococcal infections, mastoiditis, and pneumonia which may follow, make it a disease to be carefully nursed, with close attention from a

doctor.

"Unskilled treatment of a plain case of measles can result in dangerous complications," Dr. Cox warned, "and it is not to be regarded lightly as simply another childhood disease."

Dr. Cox urged parents to carefully watch children exposed, and at the first sign of temperature, flushed face, sniffles, or watering eyes, advised that the child be put to bed immediately and placed under a doctor's care.

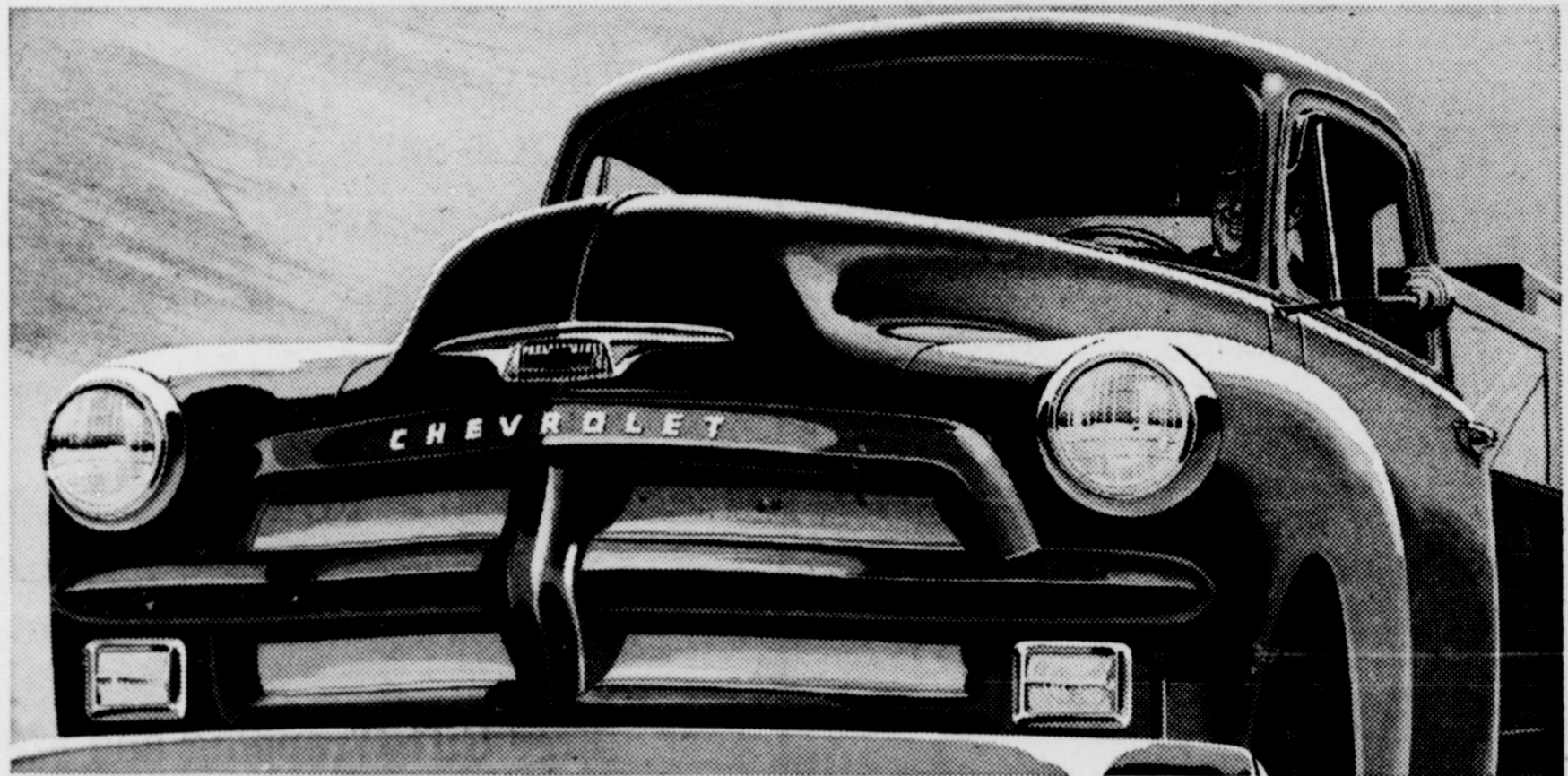

It's The Law— Chance Governs Call For Jury Duty

Have you ever had to postpone or cancel a hunting or fishing trip or some important business matter to answer a call for jury service? Many people are finding themselves in that position nowadays.

Some may wonder just how that jury summons always seems to arrive at the most inopportune time. There's no secret involved. It is largely a matter of chance.

Under Texas laws jury panels for District Courts are selected by one of two methods — the Jury Wheel or the Jury Commission. The jury wheel is a hollow metal wheel or container, so erected that it will freely revolve on its axle.

In counties using a jury wheel, a list of all qualified jurors is prepared from the official tax lists in August of each year. Taking part in the ceremony are the County Tax Assessor, the District Clerk, the County Sheriff, and the County Clerk. Each prospective juror's name is written on a card of uniform size and placed in the metal container.

Then the wheel is locked with two separate locks, the key to one lock being kept by the District Clerk and the other key being kept by the Sheriff. As jurors are needed, the wheel is revolved to mix the names and the required number drawn for preparation of jury lists.

Three persons must be present when the wheel is unlocked and the names drawn therefrom — the Sheriff (or one of his deputies), and the District Judge. Upon completion of currently required jury lists, all names are returned to the container, which is again double locked.

Later, when the time comes around to prepare a new set of lists, some of the same names will very likely be drawn again. Others may never be drawn.

In counties not operating under the jury wheel system, the District Judge at each term of his court appoints three to five persons from different sections of the county to act as Jury Commissioners.

Using the county tax assessment roll, these men follow the Judge's instructions as to the number of jurors to be selected for various weeks of the court term. The lists of names prepared by them are sealed in separate envelopes and delivered to the Judge. He, in turn, turns them over to the District Clerk or one of his deputies in open court, who immediately files the envelopes away in a safe place in the Clerk's office.

Although ordinary inconveniences are not usually sufficient to gain an excuse from jury duty, emergency or hardship is a different matter. If you face such extreme circumstances in your business or personal affairs that your mind cannot freely reflect and meditate upon the important issues to be tried, call this to the attention of the judge.

Courts try to be reasonable in granting excuses. The judge will consider your situation carefully and thoughtfully, and may determine that your service should be deferred.
