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Mrs. Jessie Tompkins to celebrate 100th birthday

On Sunday, August 18, 1985, the children and grandchildren of Mrs. Jessie Tompkins will be hosting a one-hundredth birthday celebration in her honor.

The festivities will begin at 1:00 p.m. in the Home Demonstration Club Room in Spearman, Texas.

Aunt Jessie, as she is known to many, Mama Jessie, Grandma, and Mother to others, was born in Young County, Texas to Jake and Amanda Mathews. She has experienced many changes throughout the years - covered wagons, trains, automobiles, airplanes, and space flights including the walk on the moon; tents and half dug-outs for homes; no bathrooms, running water, electricity, or gas; sparsely settled communities to thickly populated areas and cities.

In the fall of 1901, Jessie's father, Jake, made a business trip to the Panhandle. He was so impressed with this new land that he was determined to make it his home. He bought a farm that already has some improvements on it, including a small one house and half dug-out. He had a well dug, so water would be available when he returned with his family.

On his return to Young County, Jake sold his thriving business and comfortable home and made ready to embark on the journey to a new home to help pioneer a new land.

In June of 1901, everything was in readiness. Jake and his wife Amanda, their son Frank, his wife Maude, and their baby son Dewey, and two of their daughters Cora and Jessie, packed all their belongings, loaded

them on covered wagons, and with extra horses and a cow, they were ready to begin their journey. Jake and Amanda traveled in an old buggy. The others drove the wagons.

The other members of the family didn't share Jake's enthusiasm. They missed their comfortable home. Jessie states that she hasn't liked "camping out" since, even though there were some enjoyable times.

Many unusual and interesting experiences were encountered along the way.

When they arrived at the Brazos River, they found it so swollen from heavy rains that crossing seemed impossible. But Jake, not being a very patient man, decided that they could "make it". The river was so deep that only the horses' heads could be seen above water. It was a very frightening experience, but the crossing was safely made with not one wagon capsizing.

The storms were terrifying. They had never seen a dirt storm nor encountered such high winds. The thunderstorms, with lightning such as they had never seen before, was an experience they never forgot.

Fortunately, the Indian problem had already been solved.

After thirteen days on the road, they arrived at their "new home" in Hutchinson County, Texas - a small one room rock house.

It was late when they arrived and there was no wood to build a fire, so much to the astonishment and discomfort of the female members of

the family, cow chips were burned. They had never heard of such a thing.

A cow had fallen in the well that had been prepared, so water had to be hauled for several miles until another one could be dug.

On October 21, 1906, Jessie married Raine Tompkins in a double wedding ceremony with Raine's sister Ara and Edgar Womble. The wedding was performed at Old Hansford.

Ara lived only a few years after the marriage, and Edgar later married Bessie McGuiney.

Jessie and Raine established their home in Hutchinson County in what was known as the Lieb Community.. Their neighbors included the Liebs, the Wombles, the Jarvis family, and the Harbours. It was a memorable time in their lives. They had two daughters, Alda and Eileen.

The years were happy ones, even through the ups and downs, and the hardships of life. In 1927, they moved to Spearman, Texas.

Raine died March 10, 1933, and Jessie had to pick up the pieces of her shattered life and begin anew. This she did with grace and dignity.

Jessie made her home in Spearman until 1982, when she moved to Amarillo with her daughter, Eileen. She still leads a very active life, and especially enjoys traveling. One of her favorite places to go is Las Vegas, where she likes to play the "slot machines".

Her family is so grateful for all the happy years and hopes that friends and family, from far and near, will come and share this happy time with her.

Some items will go rather quickly while others may take some time, so please study the areas you have questions or concerns on and be ready to act accordingly. I will relate below my comments and/or recommendations where necessary to provide you with some direction or thoughts on the subject(s).
- VI. Communications
 - a. letter from T. E. A. concerning library media standards (Exhibit F)
As I have mentioned previously, the libraries should be in excellent shape and surpass any expectations of accreditation.
 - b. letter from T. E. A. regarding "duty-free lunch" for teachers. (Exhibit G)
This will be a scheduling nightmare for the principals. They will do the best they can and we will move forward.
 - c. letter from T. E. A. concerning school district paperwork (Exhibit H)
With much skepticism and disbelief due to their previous record, I present this letter.
 - d. letter from T. E. A. concerning school district annual performance report (Exhibit I)
See what I mean! Another report! Spearman I. S. D. is doing this to a degree, but this becomes more detailed and encompassing.
- VII. New business
 - a. amend 1984-85 budget
This must be done in accordance with school law. Mr. Latham will answer any questions you might have.

- b. adoption of 1985-86 budget
Based on our previous discussions and work I recommend the adoption of the budget as finalized according to expenditures and revenues.
- c. consideration of bids on milk and bread items
I recommend the acceptance of the low bid in both instances.
- d. consideration of resurfacing track--accept or reject bids
Hopefully, the bid(s) will come in at the earlier stated figure. If so, I recommend to you this firm and the bid.
- e. establish tax rate for 1985-86 (providing all information is available)
In conjunction with the budget adoption, the tax rate needs to be discussed and set pending the arrival of all pertinent information from the state.
- f. consideration of tax hearing dates if needed
This all depends on the information we receive from the state relating to state funds and effective tax rate losses.
- g. Board action on TASH policy development proposal (Exhibit K)
Providing ample state funds will be received and the budget can absorb this amount without escalating the tax rate, I firmly believe this venture will be of vital importance to the district. If not, we must do this by another school year.
- h. high school student handbook
The printer has assured us that the handbook will be ready. If so, we will preview the document and present it to you at the meeting.

Superintendent's report

- a. Administrative Procedures (Exhibit L)
This is only in example of what I mentioned to you on the 29th. Procedures such as this tend to clear the air where problems can and do occur. I plan to begin development of these procedures during the fall term.

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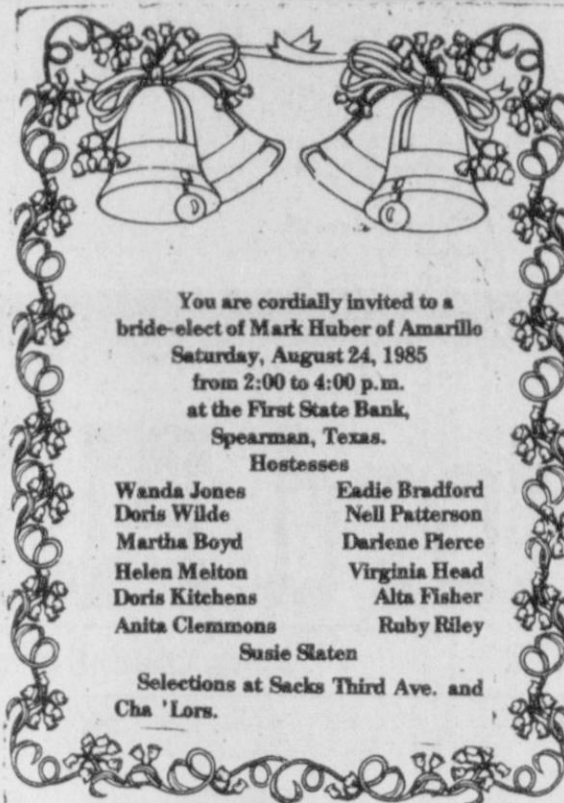
