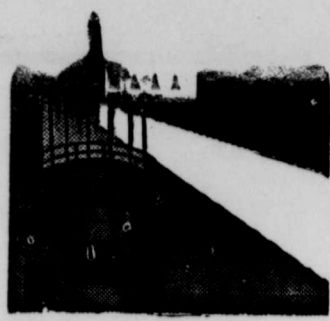




On The BEAM

George Parks in his column "Pickins" in the Roscoe Times last week commented on the closing of the depot in Loraine and included a warning to Roscoe people that the same thing might happen there.

He also went on to say that small town businesses including those in Roscoe are coming to the same fate as the railroad depots unless local citizens buy more of their needs in the town where they live.

His warning also hit the note unless small town businesses are maintained by local people the school will have to bow to the inevitable and consolidate into a county-wide district.

George is exactly right. If local people continue to go to larger towns to buy everything they need local business people will be forced to close their business and move to larger town if they can. When the large percent of the business is gone from the town the school will have to take the step that nobody wants it to take—that is, consolidate into a county-wide district.

People who live in and around small towns should think about these things before they go to another town to trade. They ought to know that when the local town is gone their property either in town or surrounding it will lose value in a hurry.

Newspapers in small towns are having a difficult time making enough money to keep going on. Small town business men do not seem to realize that costs for the newspaper have gone up and up and their revenue has not kept pace. A case in mind is a business institution in a town where this editor once was in business that has grown four or five times bigger than it was then but it is still running the same size ad in the local paper it was when we were there. Business men in a town ought to realize that the newspaper published in the town is worth as much or more than any other business to the town. A newspaper can do a good job for a town only so long as local business people patronize it with advertising that will enable it to be a prosperous business.

ITED Tests Are Given To Sophomores and Seniors In School

The Iowa Tests of Educational Development are being administered to all Seniors and Sophomores this week and next week to check on their educational growth and development. These students have grown educationally as well as physically since they entered school. The Iowa Tests of Educational Development (ITED) are designed to measure their educational growth. Teachers and counselors determine through these tests whether or not satisfactory progress and development are being made by individual students. With this information, they know better how to advise them regarding their educational plans and problems, and how best to help them with their school work. This information should enable each student to make his own educational plans more intelligently.

Each year when students in high school become Sophomores (10th Grade) or Seniors (12th Grade), the ITED tests are given to these students.

The scores or profiles on the ITED tests give a much better picture of what the student really knows or is able to do than his grades usually do. There are several reasons why the test scores or profiles are a more accurate measure of his educational growth.

1) The scores on the ITED tests compare the student with tens of thousands of students throughout the country as well as with the students in his own school. His school grades usually indicate only how well he compares with students in his own classes. For this reason, grades do not always have the same meaning in different schools. Even in the same school a "B" in one subject may mean more than an "A" in another.

2) The ITED tests measure the same fundamental skills or abilities for all students. Grades show only how well the student is doing in the particular subjects he is taking at the time. Furthermore, his classmate may be taking different courses than he is taking. The ITED tests measure general abilities that are important for all students all of the time.

3) The ITED tests show how much the student is improving in these abilities from year to year. Grades cannot do this. For example, one cannot tell, by comparing his grades in ninth algebra and in tenth year plane geometry, how much he has improved in general abilities every year, so that he can see his improvement each year in each ability.

4) The student's scores are completely objective that is they do not depend in the slightest degree upon anyone's personal opinion of the individual student.

5) Most of the ITED tests measure general abilities that are developed outside the classroom as well as in it. How many names, dates, and facts the student may have memorized in a particular subject will not be important in determining his showing on these tests. His true educational development depends on how well he can use not only what he has learned from school courses, but also what he has learned from school books and magazines, trips, conversations at home, and in many other ways.

For all these reasons, then, his school is giving him the ITED tests. By studying the ITED tests, he will receive after the tests have been scored, he, the teachers, and counselor can get a fair and accurate picture of his present educational development.

Each student who is taking the ITED tests will receive a profile, by the close of school this year, of the nine tests which are being given in four half-day sessions. A record of the profile is placed in each student's Cumulative Record Folder which is used by the teachers, administrators, and counselors to more effectively guide the individual student.
