

Senate Votes A Restriction On Teen-Age Draft

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24. (AP)—The senate passed the teen age draft bill tonight but hedged it with restrictions which were highly unacceptable to the president and the military authorities and which appeared likely to delay its final enactment.

In voting to lower the draft age from 20 to 18 years, the senate stipulated that selectees in that age group should not be sent to combat overseas before they had undergone a full year's training. This amendment, by Senator O'Daniel (D-Tex.), was adopted 39 to 31.

Another amendment provided for the deferment of men of any age "regularly engaged in an agricultural occupation or endeavor essential to the war effort," so long as they remain in that work and until satisfactory replacements can be obtained. This rider, by Senator Tydings (D-Md.), carried 62 to 6.

Cotton Issue Carried To Washington

FORT WORTH, Oct. 24. (AP)—State Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe arrived in Fort Worth tonight and will leave tomorrow for Washington as a special representative of the West Texas chamber of commerce in the interest of the cotton industry of West Texas.

He will try to convince the department of agriculture that there should be no further reduction in cotton acreage. He said the WTCC has been advised that a reduction, which would further penalize West Texas, is being considered.

J. A. Rix of Fort Worth, assistant manager of the WTCC, said that there was a report, which WTCC officials attributed to College Station, to the effect that 84 per cent of the cotton in government loans was West Texas cotton, called unusable because of poor grade and staple.

Senator Moffett will also seek to refute that report, said Rix. He explained that the regional chamber had gathered data to show that the grade and fibre of West Texas cotton had improved materially in the last two years.

Senator Moffett also will tell Washington officials, Rix said, of a rubber substitute made from cotton seed which can be produced more cheaply than any other synthetic rubber, and that need for the seed for this product, called furtural, will be another argument against further acreage reduction.

Allies Open Offensive In Egypt

Milan Hit In First Daylight Raid By RAF

Vichy Charges Britons Machine-Gunned Town In France

LONDON, Sunday, Oct. 24. (AP)—A large force of RAF Lancaster bombers made the first British daylight attack on military objectives in Milan, Italy, yesterday. It was authoritatively stated here early today, several hours after the Vichy news agency charged that British bombers had machine-gunned a town in the unoccupied zone of France.

The RAF in its newest assault, a 1,200-mile round trip affair, thus was carrying on without intermission its new campaign against the traffic and industrial centers of northern Italy. On the last two nights the British have heavily bombed Genoa, Turin, and Sanova.

Milan, the latest Italian city to feel the weight of the terrific load of death and destruction carried by the four-motored Lancasters, is the home of the Caproni bombers and other industrial works. It was the fifth raid on Milan since the war began, but the others have been at night. The city was attacked December, 1940.

The path of the huge bombers across Europe was traced during the afternoon by a series of alerts in unoccupied France and Switzerland.

Reporting the first plane attack upon the unoccupied zone of France, the Vichy news agency Saturday night broadcast the claim that one of 60 four-motored British bombers sighted over the unoccupied zone in daylight had swooped low and machine-gunned a barracks and railway station at Montlucon, 20 miles northwest of Vichy, causing three casualties.

(A dispatch from Vichy reported that foreign planes attacked the railroad station at Montlucon and wounded two firemen and an engineer on a locomotive. This dispatch, however, did not state the nationality of the planes.)

The Vichy news report said three railway men were reported struck by machine-gun fire.

No Trace Found Of Rickenbacker

HONOLULU, Oct. 24. (AP)—Three days of intensive search by all available army and navy sky and sea forces failed to uncover a trace tonight of Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, American war ace of World War I, and the crew of a big army plane that disappeared over Hawaiian waters.

Searchers hung their hopes on finding Captain Rickenbacker and his crew of perhaps nine men, floating on life rafts that the plane carried. This type of aircraft sinks quickly. But visitors in the Pacific have been picked up from similar rafts weeks after their planes have gone down.

Cold Wave Due In Area Today

What was indicated as winter's first real thrust was in the making for this section of West Texas today.

A "cold wave" was forecast for the Big Spring area, along with a general West Texas prediction of a severe temperature drop accompanied by snow squalls. The severe weather was due to reach the Panhandle by late Saturday night, and extend deeper into West Texas during the day.

The indicated cold wave was severe enough for the weather bureau to advise livestock precaution.

Eight Of Tokyo Raiders May Be Held As Prisoners Of Japanese

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24. (AP)—As many as eight of the men who bombed Tokyo may be in Japanese hands, it appeared today on the basis of an enemy listing which, checked at the war department against its records, seemed to correspond with names of fliers the army lists as missing.

The Berlin radio broadcast a Tokyo dispatch listing the names of "an additional four" it said "were taken prisoner in the air raid on Japan, April 18."

Earlier this week, after this Japanese had announced a first list of four captives, Secretary of War Stimson said these names corresponded to records and explained that some of the planes which bombed Japan might have been forced down in occupied China.

Soldier Sentenced To Hang For Death Of Young Girl

BASTROP, Oct. 24. (AP)—A general court martial at Camp Swift today sentenced Pvt. George S. Knapp to hang for the murder of Lucy Rivers Maynard.

Brig. Gen. Robert S. Spragins, court president, read the sentence to the impassive draftee from St. Paul, Minn. exactly 59 minutes after the court closed to decide upon its verdict.

Knapp's comment was the question: "When will the hanging take place?"

Gen. Spragins informed him that the court could not decide upon the time of execution.

Jap Ship At Rabaul Hit

GEN. MACARTHUR'S HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Sunday, Oct. 25. (AP)—A large Jap seaplane tender was believed destroyed at Rabaul, New Britain, by allied bombers, the high command announced today.

The seaplane tender was one of the targets picked out by a flight of heavy bombers which again struck at the harbor of Rabaul where Jap ships have concentrated, presumably for an impending assault on American-held Guadalcanal in the Solomon Islands to the southeast. An assault of the type previously resulted in the sinking or damaging of 10 Jap ships, including a cruiser and a destroyer.

Today's communiqué said the second assault, made at night, resulted in a hit amidships with a 500-pound bomb of a seaplane tender of the Moshin Maru class of 17,000 tons. Flames and black smoke enveloped the ship which was believed "to be completely destroyed."

The communiqué also reported the destruction of at least two and probably four Jap bombers in a raid on Lae, vital Jap base on the north coast of New Guinea, and a raid by 12 Jap planes on Darwin, northern Australian port, which caused "only slight damage."

Nazis Fail In Attack With Fresh Forces

MOSCOW, Sunday, Oct. 25. (AP)—The Germans threw two freshly reinforced infantry divisions, mighty tanks and "large" air forces against Russian positions in Stalingrad yesterday, the Soviet midnight communiqué said today, but after bitter hand-to-hand fighting the nazis were thrown back with heavy losses.

The new attack, launched after fresh troops were brought in to replace nearly 10,000 which the Russians said they had killed in two days, was directed at the factory district in the northern part of the battle-torn city.

In this area alone, the communiqué said, more than 1,500 Germans were killed yesterday and 17 tanks destroyed.

The heaviest enemy losses, however, were in a southern sector of the Stalingrad front where one Soviet formation was said to have killed 7,000 men, destroyed 87 tanks, 100 guns and 26 planes. The Russians also captured 150 German tanks which had been disabled in previous engagements and were being used as firing positions.

Heavy fighting was continuing both northwest of Stalingrad and south of the city.

Farther south in the Caucasus, the Russians were on the defensive both in the Moxdok area and along the Black Sea.

The communiqué said, however, that all attacks were repulsed and the positions remained unchanged.

Clerk Of Supreme Court Succumbs

AUSTIN, Oct. 24. (AP)—S. A. Philquist, 57, chief clerk of the state supreme court, died tonight as a result of a stroke.

Philquist suffered a stroke last June but recovered partially and had worked in his capital office until recently. He had lived in Travis county most of his life. Philquist is survived by his widow, four children and two brothers.

Youth Found Dead In Plane Wreckage

CORPUS CHRISTI, Oct. 24. (AP)—Missing since Wednesday, Aviation Cadet Martin Ferrick, 19, committee clerk for the 47th session of the Texas legislature, was found dead yesterday in wreckage of his training plane near the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station.

Air, Naval Units Join Land Forces In All Out Push

CAIRO, Egypt, Oct. 24. (AP)—The British Eighth Army cracked through German Marshal Erwin Rommel's Alamein line before dawn today, front line dispatches said tonight, after opening the long-expected allied offensive with the aid at sea of a roaring fleet of new type American-made light warships and American airmen in the thick of the desert battle.

What is likely to be the decisive battle for the Mediterranean was joined with the axis forces of Marshal Rommel last night in the light of a full moon when Gen. Sir Harold Alexander's allied army moved forward along the front a few miles west of Alexandria.

Advices from advanced air bases tonight said allied airmen already appeared to have clear-cut superiority in the air of what doubtless will be a tough, bloody struggle.

Joining with the army and the air forces to make the attack a three-element, all-out offensive, naval forces of Britain's powerful Mediterranean fleet timed a slashing bombardment of Rommel's advanced seaside base at Matruh, 90 miles to his rear, with the forward surge of guns and tanks.

Reports from Alexandria, British naval base, described these as sleek, speedy "Mediterranean groundhogs" which dashed close inshore—so close they could see planes over the inland landing fields—and poured round after round of shells into axis installations.

Catching the enemy unawares, the seacraft met with no response from shore batteries and escaped a three-hour aerial bombardment later without casualties and with only minor damage to one boat, it was announced.

The British were chary about giving details of the first day and night of an action in which it was their obvious objective to shove Rommel back from the Nile doorstep.

To observers it seemed that a larger, secret objective might be to open the way on North Africa's sands, already bloodied by the battles of several advances and retreats, for a blow at the axis in the European stronghold by clearing 1,000 miles of the southern shoreline of the Mediterranean.

The official communiqué said only that fierce fighting developed immediately and was continuing.

Edward Kennedy, Associated Press correspondent at an advanced Allied air base, said pilots returning at dawn from an all-night blasting of the enemy's air bases and concentrations saw the British forces already pouring through a gap they had made in the German and Italian lines.

It was evident, however, that the heavy fighting between tanks and anti-tank guns had not yet been joined, for Rommel's tanks were seen rushing up to meet the attack.

The eighth army, bigger and better equipped than ever before, blazed the way for the advance today and gave to Vice Admiral William F. Halsey, Jr., the task of directing the developing battle to hold American positions there against the Japanese bid to recapture them.

The change—the third South Pacific command shakeup of the war—came after a campaign which had cost the navy three cruisers, five destroyers and five other vessels, and at a moment when the enemy was massing his forces for a powerful attack.

Gormley's removal was announced without official comment, except that he would be assigned to other duties, the nature of which would be reported later. Making it known that Halsey would take command, however, the navy noted that he had "conducted carrier operations in the South Pacific area last spring with distinguished success," and pointed out that he received the Distinguished Service Medal last February for his role in the Japanese-held Gilbert and Marshall Islands.

The Gilbert Islands, it developing today, were the scene of another American raid recently in which an enemy destroyer and merchant ship were damaged and two small enemy patrol boats were sunk, all by gunfire. The American raiders also struck at the nearby Ellice Islands with unannounced results except that no strong enemy forces were encountered.

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RAF Bomber's Crew Escape From Nazis Told In Ritz Film, 'Desperate Journey'

Today's new picture at the Ritz theatre is "Desperate Journey," starring Errol Flynn and Ronald Reagan in a story that fully lives up to its exciting title. The thriller-packed film tells about the extraordinary adventures of five members of a British Hudson bomber who are shot down while on a bombing mission over Germany.

Other members of the crew who find themselves prisoners of the Nazis along with Flynn and Reagan are Alan Hale, Arthur Kennedy and Ronald Sinclair. Questioned in detail by a Nazi intelligence officer, played by Raymond Massey, the five fugitive Englishmen escape from the prison camp, after Ronald Reagan puts Massey to sleep with a hard right to the jaw.

Slowly, and travelling only by night, they make their desperate journey across Germany toward the Holland border. They get a break by overpowering some Nazi guards and taking their uniforms. Now, disguised as German soldiers, they stand a good chance of being set as spies, but they have also increased their possibilities of escape.

Luck still with them, they manage to board a hospital train bound for Berlin, only to be kicked off as the train entered the suburbs by some officer who was later severely reprimanded for allowing the English to get away. By this time, all Germany was on the lookout for them. It was a mass man-hunt.

One night, shortly after leaving the train, Flynn leads the men on a desperate mission. They enter and set fire to a factory that manufactures incendiary bombs. While leaving the inferno, Ronald Sinclair is shot and seriously wounded. Flynn, whose

knowledge of German already has gotten them out of many tight places, meets a young German girl, played by Nancy Coleman, who takes them to a doctor, and tells them that she is strongly anti-Nazi and will do anything to help defeat Hitlerism. At the doctor's, a woman patient suspects them and calls the Gestapo. Sinclair dies as the secret police surround the place, but the others manage to get away.

After leading the Gestapo a merry chase across the rest of Germany and a good part of Holland, they steal a reconditioned British bomber which the Germans were going to use in a sneak raid on London. It is a desperate fight against overwhelming odds but the intrepid Britishers are successful and make their getaway.

After they are safe over the Channel, Flynn radios to squadron headquarters that they are coming in, mission completed!

Market Holds To Upward Trend

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 (AP)—The stock market today finished a general recovery week with selectively higher tendencies.

While many leaders were handicapped by light profit selling, assorted blue chips, steels, utilities, rails and specialties retained advances of fractions to a point or so. A number of new peaks for the year or lower were in evidence.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 1 of a point at 40.1, duplicating the best level for this barometer since Nov. 6 last year. It was up .6 net on the week. Chartists were a trifle wary because the composite had recorded the 40.1 figure on Oct. 13, 20 and 22 and backed away in each succeeding session. This led some to suggest the market was acting "toppy" and might indicate considerable distribution had been going on.

Texas To Have Enough Gas For Essential Driving

Nov. 12-13-14 To Be Registration Days

FORT WORTH, Oct. 24 (AP)—Texas passenger car owners will register Nov. 12, 13 and 14 for the basic gasoline allowances they will receive when mileage rationing goes into effect Nov. 23, State OPA Director Mark McGee has announced.

The dates, a change from those previously set, were announced after McGee had received assurance from Washington that supplies will be in the hands of county war price and rationing boards by Nov. 7. The registration previously had been set for Nov. 9, 10 and 11.

The registration of passenger cars and motorcycles will take place at schoolhouses throughout the state. Jack Bonds, acting state OPA organization officer, asked cooperation of the office of L. A. Woods, state superintendent, in conducting his registration.

The state superintendent's office was asked to get in touch with county school superintendents throughout Texas and ask them to assist in arrangements for school teachers to act as registrars.

Letters also were being forwarded to chairman of county war price and rationing boards, asking them to seek the cooperation of local school superintendents and principals.

Turkey Day To Be Repeated; Birds Freed On November 19

People of Big Spring and the surrounding country will have an opportunity to chase turkeys again this year.

A chamber of commerce committee headed by V. A. Merrick, in a meeting Friday afternoon, decided to repeat the novel "Turkey Day" good-will promotion this year, and turkeys will be released on Thursday, November 19, one week before Thanksgiving.

The plan will follow the highly successful event last year, when thousands of people swarmed the streets to grab for the 50 or more birds which were released from the rooftops. It is expected that many more merchants will participate in the event this year, and Merrick suggested that business men begin arranging now to purchase turkeys from whatever source they desire.

The time of the release will be 3:45 p. m., to be signaled by the city fire siren. The birds will be released simultaneously with ensuing excitement.

The chamber of commerce is sponsoring the "Turkey Day" program as a trades-builder, and also to stimulate interest in turkey raising in this area.

San Antonio Buys Utility Properties

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 24 (AP)—Mayor C. K. Quinn today announced the purchase of the San Antonio Public Service company properties by the city of San Antonio, a transaction involving participation of the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority.

Bonds for the purchase of the utility, totaling \$33,950,000, were delivered to A. C. Allyn and Company of New York a few hours before the noon deadline today.

Meanwhile, in New Braunfels, Mayor Walter Sittel and City Attorney Raymond Bartram announced the city of New Braunfels today purchased the local electric distribution system, which had previously been owned by the San Antonio Public Service company, from the city of San Antonio for a reported price of \$250,000.

The city of San Antonio today took full possession of the APSC properties, comprising with the Guadalupe-Blanco Authority by giving it a 30-year operating lease on the Comal power plant at New Braunfels.

Rural Areas' Needs To Be Recognized

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24—Leon Henderson, price control administrator, has advised Congress that he may assure all Texans that the nationwide mileage rationing program will provide whatever amount of gasoline is necessary for essential driving, regardless of distance.

"The needs of people living in rural areas will be adequately provided for in the nationwide program," Henderson said in his communication to Thompson. "Preferred mileage (that is, occupational mileage in excess of 470 miles per month) will be available to farmers for the operation of a passenger automobile to transport farm products and necessary farm supplies between farm and market, shipping point, or point of delivery, or between one farm establishment and another.

Such mileage will also be available for the transportation of farm workers between their residences or lodgings and their places of employment or between places of employment.

The OPA has been ordered by Rubber Czar William Jefferson to institute a nation wide mileage rationing program through gasoline control to conserve rubber-borne transportation in accordance with the recommendations of the President's special rubber survey committee. Henderson's office is now engaged in studying the problems involved in such a program and in formulating a plan.

The OPA director told the Texas congressmen that special regulations will be available to farmers, under certain conditions, to make it possible for them to secure necessary medical attention and to get necessary food and supplies.

The program, he said, will also provide whatever amount of gasoline is needed to operate farm machinery or equipment, stoves, and other household appliances.

"Under the nationwide program," declared Henderson, "people who have occupational need for gasoline will be eligible for supplemental rations for their occupational purposes. It will also be possible to issue tires for their cars in view of the fact that the mileage rationing program will provide a strict control over the operation of the cars. This control will include the 25-mile speed limit, and a compulsory periodic tire inspection as well as the mileage rationing.

"A car owner will be issued a basic ration book providing 240 miles of travel per month, calculated on the basis of 15 miles per gallon, and will also be eligible to receive supplemental rations to the extent presently provided by STV B ration book."

"To qualify for supplemental rations, the applicant will be required to show that he is sharing his car with at least three other people or that it is impossible to do so and that alternate means of transportation are not available.

"The maximum mileage provided by the B book amounts to 320 miles per month. This, in addition to the mileage provided by the basic ration, will make available a maximum of 560 miles per month for all occupational purposes not included in the pre-

Driver's license renewals seemed to hit a snag the end of the week with only 80 issued up to 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the highway patrol office.

There were 70 issued on Friday and 81 on Thursday, however, and officials believed that the others would be piling in next week. Deadline on the renewals is November 1st. After that date, old licenses will not be eligible for renewal and holders will have to take regular driver's examinations.

"Concerning the necessity for nationwide mileage rationing," Henderson asserted, "the Baruch committee has reported that the existing rubber supply situation is so dangerous that unless corrective measures are taken immediately, this country will face both a military and civilian collapse.

This committee also informed us that gasoline rationing is the only way of conserving our present rubber supply. The committee explored every means of avoiding this method, but it was found to be inescapable.

How Will Small Towns Fare Under Gasoline Rationing? Views Differ

What will gas rationing bring to hundreds of small Texas towns and villages . . . hard times or prosperity?

Will it kill . . . or save?

"The effects will be stimulating and worthwhile," says A. B. Jolley, Dallas county agent.

"We'll be paralyzed and so will every other little Texas town," M. H. Milliken, mayor and treasurer of Lewisville, exclaims.

Jolley looks for "a financial and social rebirth . . . a rediscovery of the joys of self-sufficiency."

Milliken thinks farmers will stay on the farm.

"That will hurt Lewisville," he predicts.

Roy Gravelly, owner of a hardware store in Carrollton, Tex., is optimistic.

"When folks stop going to the cities to buy," he explains, "I'll do better."

Jack Lewis, publisher of the Lewisville Enterprise, doesn't believe small-town merchants will benefit from rationing.

"Big city stores will set up huge mail-order businesses," he says. "But that isn't all. Little dealers are already being discriminated against. You can't sell stuff when you can't get it."

"A quarter of a century ago, Texas towns were the center of everything in their areas," Luther M. Nunley of the Dalworth district soil conservation unit says. "I am certain rationing will restore their former importance."

"Texas towns took the last war in their stride, since transportation then was no problem," Mrs. Jack M. Little, president of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, points out. "In this war they will undoubtedly feel the effects of gas rationing."

"But I think the towns will be glad to make the sacrifice. I

don't believe any of us will mind doing without gasoline if it will help to bring our boys back."

"We'll learn to budget our automobiles just as we do our finances. Many of us will find walking is fun. I look for a genuine emancipation of legs."

Restricted highway travel has already taken a big bite out of many small businesses.

"We've been rolling up the sidewalks here at Sundown," one man said. "When gas rationing comes in we'll just leave them rolled up."

"I sure get tired of looking at my next door neighbor these days," another commented. "I think I'll start carrying a mirror so I'll have another face to look at."

Max McCullough, administrator of the southwest region of the Office of Price Administration, was more cheerful.

"I do not think small towns will assume their former importance," he said, "but they should profit from the change of pace in transportation."

"Mileage rationing will restrict unnecessary traveling from village to city, but essential transportation within the village as well as within the city will be kept rolling."

"Rationing will be tough on me, but those West Texans are the folks I really feel sorry for," Roy Harper, Lake Dallas, Tex., grocer said.

"You can go ninety miles out there without meeting anything more human than a cow or goat. Why, I hear those people get so lonesome they try to make friends of their own shadows."

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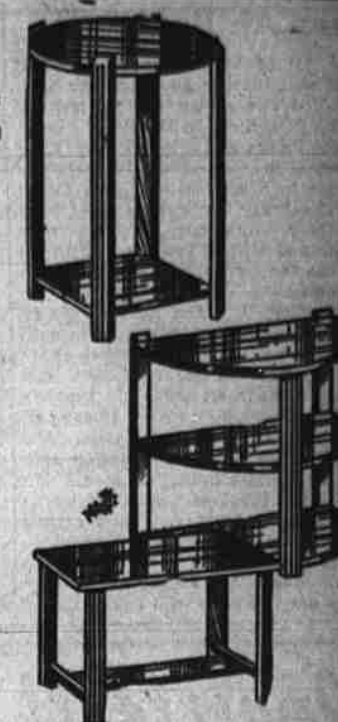

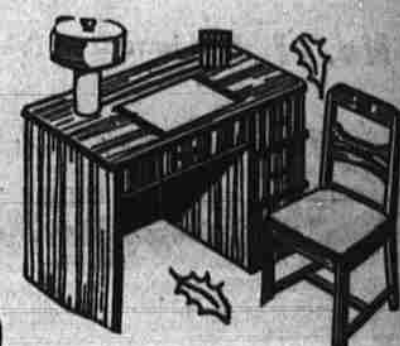

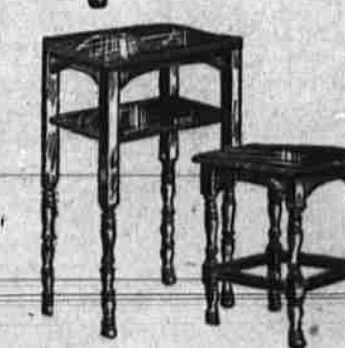
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Chatter About The Bombardiers Picked Up Among The BSAAFBS Squadrons

Cotton Harvest Reaches Halfway Mark, Picker Shortage Feared

The 1942 Howard county cotton harvest poked along past the halfway mark here during the week, but the last half may be definitely the hardest.

While the situation as a whole was favorable here, signs of picker shortages were beginning to appear. One man with a 1,000-acre field had no hands. A few others with large patches needed pickers, but mostly the small field operators were the ones suffering from lack of labor.

Saturday evening the five Big Spring gins had turned out 6,941 bales, which was the basis for estimating that ginnings now were right at 14,000 bales over the county. The gain for the week was about 2,500 bales. At the rate the harvest was going, it was almost certain that there would still be some ginning activity after Christmas.

After a slow start at the first of the week when effects of a rain and heavy morning dews kept pick-

ers out of fields, the movement was steady. Grade and staple were holding up well with better offerings bringing 15.60 Saturday. Seed were held to no advance for the first time this season, maintaining the base of \$50.70 per ton.

There was practically no trafficking in feed, and what few quotations were heard placed much prices around \$10 on the ton. Most farmers, due to lack of hands, were taking a chance on waiting until the cotton was in to attempt to harvest the feed crop.

Most of the counties in this district are doing fairly well on cotton pickers—although none has as many as needed. However, Dawson county is suffering for lack of harvest help. O. R. Rodden, district United States Employment Service manager, said Saturday. He said that some more crews were in sight for this week and hoped the situation would be relieved.

Rice scored as the climax of a drive with Don Stephens doing most of the work in the line and Dick Dwelle pitching passes all over the lot. From the Texas eight-yard line, Dwelle threw one for the goal line that Schwartz deflected into Windell Williams' hands for a touchdown. Lindsay Bowen converted.

Statistically Texas showed 16 first downs to seven for the Owls and gained 315 yards rushing and passing compared to 108 for Rice.

But the last quarter was all Rice as Stephens, the leading ground-gainer for the day with 60 yards, smashed the Longhorn line to bits. The Rice punting was sensational, especially that by Cain who averaged 51 yards in three boots. The Rice team's average—with Skip Dickson doing the rest of the work—was 46.5.

Irish Defeat Illinois 21-14

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Oct. 24 (AP)—For the second straight week the fighting Irish of Notre Dame have removed a team from the nation's unbeaten ranks. Nix Paces Frogs To 21-0 Victory Over Pensacola

PENSACOLA, Fla., Oct. 24. (AP)—Quarterback Emery Nix, 175-pound football dynamo, passed for two touchdowns and scored one himself today to lead the unbeaten, untied Texas Christian Horned Frogs to a 21 to 0 victory over the Pensacola Naval Air Station before a crowd of 5,000.

The Frogs also received plenty of aid and comfort from 154-pound Dean Bagley, reserve quarterback, whose 34-yard punt return preceded the second touchdown drive and was a constant threat to the Navy the entire time he was on the field.

The initial Texas Christian touchdown came with startling suddenness. On the first offensive play for TUC early in the first period Nix faded back from his own 47-yard line and tossed a deliberate pass to Fullback Ralph Porter who raced across the goal line untouched.

The Frogs struck again early in the second quarter when Bagley's punt return took the ball to the Navy 40. Nix and Halfback Sam Weatherford made a first down. Weatherford made nine at left end and took a pass from Nix for eight more. Nix then tossed a ten-yard pass to End Drummond Slover for the touchdown.

A fumble by Sal Lococo of the Navy gave Texas Christian its next chance. Dee Ezell recovered on the Navy 33. Passes from Bagley to Slover and from Nix to Bruce Alford, plus a six-yard run by Bagley, took the ball to the Navy 16 and a roughing penalty pushed the Goings back to their one. Nix took it over in two tries.

Guard Clifton Patton place-kicked the extra point after the first two touchdowns and Tackle J. C. O'Neill booted the third one.

The Navy marched to the TCU 39 in the third quarter, and to the 24 and the three in the final period but couldn't keep its plays clicking in pay territory.

Jim Blumstock, former Fordham star, was the spearhead of the Navy offense but couldn't shake loose for a touchdown.

Despite the score, the Navy was very much in the game most of the way. The Goings made only seven first downs to 11 for TCU but held the advantage in gains by rushing, 100 yards to 81, the Frogs gained 129 yards by passing to 72 for the Navy.

EVANSTON, Ill., Oct. 24 (AP)—Ohio State's dream of a football empire blazed brighter than ever today as the undefeated, untied Buckeyes plastered Northwestern, 20 to 6, to achieve their fifth straight victory of the season.

The nation's No. 1 ranking eleven, with sharp, superior striking power, crashed over a touchdown in the second period and scored twice on brilliant running in the fourth to prove their gridiron supremacy over the domesticated Wildcats in a thrill-packed game witnessed by a dad's day crowd of 41,000.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24. (AP)—Illinois, North Carolina, Washington and Brown fell off football's undefeated list today as Ohio State's Buckeyes, the nation's No. 1 ranking team, continued their victorious sweep along with most of the other leading gridiron favorites.

Illinois, after hanging up four successive triumphs for its new head coach, Ray Eliot, finally came from behind twice to earn a 21-14 decision before a crowd of 42,000. Geared for Angelo Bertelli's passes, Illinois led itself outplayed along the ground with Bertelli, Jerry Cowling and Corwin Clatt all going over for touchdowns.

North Carolina caught Tulane on the rebound from the Georgia debacle of a week ago and the Green Wave pounded out a 29-14 victory engineered principally by the veteran Tulane back, Lou Thomas.

Brown was victim of Princeton's surprising Tigers who simply don't know when they are beaten. The Tigers, who had beaten Navy and held powerful Penn to a draw, removed Brown from the unbeaten ranks in summary fashion, 32-13.

Washington was soundly beaten by California's three-beaten Bears, 19-6, as Jim Jurkovich returned to duty in the Bears' backfield. But there was no stopping Ohio State. Paul Brown's Buckeyes, led by Paul Sarringhaus and Gene Fekete as usual, trounced Northwestern 20-6 to gain undisputed possession of first place in the Big Ten. Michigan, picked by many to challenge Ohio State most seriously for conference honors, was rudely upset by Minnesota's reviving Gophers, 18-14 in a bitter duel fought before 25,000.

Rounding out a brilliant program in the Midwest, Iowa's Hawkeyes tripped Indiana, 14-13 after a great individual duel between Tommy Farmer of Iowa and Billy Hillenbrand of Indiana; Wisconsin maintained its undefeated status in a 13-0 conquest of Purdue and Michigan State chalked up an upset triumph over Great Lakes, 14-0.

Rolling along unbeaten along with Ohio State and Wisconsin were Army, Boston College, Syracuse and Penn. State in the east; Georgia, Georgia Tech and Alabama in the south, and Texas Christian in the southwest.

Army, working under wraps, handled Harvard easily, 14-0, and Boston College, held well in check for the first half, took to the air lanes to swamp Wake Forest, 27-0. Syracuse used a short passing game to good advantage in a 12-7 defeat of Cornell, while Penn State also found the air ways for the winning touchdown against Colgate, 13-10.

Georgia Tech, led by Clint Castleberry, took Navy over the hurdles, 21-0 as Castleberry ran 92 yards for one touchdown. Georgia ran up a 35-13 count on Cincinnati as Frank Sinkwich scored three touchdowns and passed to Lamar Davis for two more. Alabama found Kentucky a tough foe for one half but then pushed over two touchdowns to win, 14-0. Texas Christian easily beat Pensacola's Fliers, 21-0.

Duke continued its mop-up of eastern opposition, walloping Pitt 28-0, but the east got this one back with interest as Holy Cross upset North Carolina State, 20-0, and Lafayette outscored Virginia, 19-13.

Yale's Bulldogs suddenly found the winning combination and buried Dartmouth under a 17-7 count, marking the first time since 1939 that the Elis have won two games in the same season. Penn rolled over Columbia, despite Paul Gervani's valiant efforts, 42-12, while Manhattan upset favored Duquesne, 10-7, on a fourth period goal by Jim Worst. Lehigh surprised Rutgers in the first of the "middle three" games, 28-10.

In the Big Six, Missouri and Nebraska each earned conference victories along with Kansas. Missouri trounced Iowa, State, 45-6, while Nebraska earned a 7-0 decision over Oklahoma. Kansas beat Kansas State, 19-7. In the southwest, Texas stopped a strong closing rally by Rice and won, 12-7. Baylor nosed out Texas A. and M., 6-0. Southern Methodist surprised by beating Corpus Christi Naval, 21-6.

Mississippi State, playing well up to form, whipped Florida, 26-12, in a Southeastern conference engagement as Tennessee walloped Furman, 52-7, in a non-conference warm-up.

William & Mary continued unbeaten in a 51-0 rout of George Washington and definitely will be a factor in the Southern conference race on the basis of returns to date.

Santa Clara's Broncos suffered their first defeat of the season as U.C.L.A.'s surprising Bruins scored a 14-6 decision before 40,000 at Los Angeles. A pass interception in the last two minutes led to U.C.L.A.'s second touchdown and sewed up the game.

Ohio Oil Stakes Sterling Wildcat, Dawson Test Plugs

Wildcat highlight of the week in this area was Ohio Oil Co.'s staking of a proposed Ordovician test in southeastern Sterling county on the ranch of L. T. Clark of Clark and son, L. C. (Cris) Clark of Water Valley. J. Fred Postelle of Odessa was awarded an 8,500-foot contract and was moving in rotary rig materials.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and west lines of section 6-A-GC&SF, nine miles west of Water Valley and nine miles southeast of Gulf No. 1-C W. L. Foster, first Sterling county test to explore the Ordovician. Gulf quit in May at 8,117 feet after encountering flowing sulphur water in the Ellenburger, lower Ordovician, which was topped at 8,080 feet, 5,782 feet below sea level.

Ohio has had much of the Clark ranch under lease for about 15 years and recently core drilled it. Its deep project will be near three tests drilled in 1926-27 by J. P. Williams of San Angelo slightly below 1,100 feet, one of which was completed for 20 barrels of oil daily, the other two for three barrels each. None was shot or acidized and commercial production was not developed.

Ray Albaugh of Lamesa filed application to plug and abandon his No. 1 Higginbotham, Dawson county wildcat at 5,204 feet, four feet past contract depth. The test was in the C SW SW 4-3-EL&RR, 8 1-2 miles northeast of the Welch pool. Humble No. 1 Newman, scheduled Ordovician wildcat in Scurry county, in section 358-97-H&TC, had passed 7,108 feet in black shale streaked with lime.

Canyon Eleven Wins By 27-7

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Oct. 24. (AP)—Leroy Reeves, high-stepping freshman halfback, broke away for two touchdown sprints today to lead West Texas State to a 27 to 7, Border conference victory over the Arizona State Teachers College Lumberjacks.

Reeves went wide around end from the Lumberjack 35 for his first score in the second period and a few minutes later repeated on a beautiful broken field run from the losers' 20. Halfback Don Anderson place kicked both conversions.

In the last quarter Doyle Ford, Buffalo back, heaved an aerial to End Johnny Bradford who made it to the Flagstaff eight before he was stopped. Ford flipped another pass to End Willard Flowers, who scored. A tackle, Johnny Thomas, kicked the goal.

Just before the gun barked, Reeves faded back to midfield and hurried a 40 yarder to Bill Curb, Buffalo end, who scampered the last ten to pay dirt.

The Lumberjack touchdown came in the third period when Fullback Clyde Overton, standing on the midfield stripe, passed to Chesley, end, who took the ball on the Texans' 6 and lateraled to Halfback Bob Kelly. Kelly caught the Buffalo secondary flatfooted and went over standing up. Tackle Floyd Stone booted the goal.

Abilene Christian Whips Southwest Teachers 26-0

ABILENE, Oct. 24. (AP)—Abilene Christian College's lightweight Wildcats clawed the Southwest Texas State Bobcats 26 to 0 here today.

Behind near-flawless blocking in the line, the Wildcats counted early in the first period when Jim Bob Jarrell passed 20 yards to Red Qualls in the end zone. J. E. Mullins' kick from placement was good. The Christians added another touchdowns a moment later on Bert Brewer's 18-yard end run.

Midway in the final quarter, ACC struck twice again for touchdowns. Elwood Turner powered over the one-foot line with Mullins converting, and Sonny Back went eight yards over left tackle for the final tally.

Gophers Hand Michigan A Whipping

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 24. (AP)—Minnesota's Golden Gophers, twice beaten this year, started back toward the grid pinnacle they held as national champions the last two years by defeating favored Michigan today, 16 to 14, for their first Western conference victory of the season.

It was Minnesota's ninth consecutive win over the Wolverines. The game looked like an easy Michigan victory in the first period, when the Wolverines marched 65 yards to score. But in the second the Minnesota line took over.

Outrushing the Wolverine forwards, Minnesota's line opened huge holes and Bill Daley broke loose on a 44-yard touchdown run to tie the score.

The Gophers went ahead minutes later when Bill Gagnas dropkicked a field goal. A pass intercepted on Michigan's 43-yard line started Minnesota's second touchdown march. It ended with Frickey carrying across from the 4.

Steuber Adds More Points As Missouri Beats Iowa State

COLUMBIA, Mo., Oct. 24. (AP)—Bob Steuber, Missouri halfback and the nation's leading scorer, added 20 points to his season total today as Missouri swamped Iowa State, 45 to 6, in a Big Six conference football game played before a crowd of 8,000.

The 195-pound speedster raced 57 yards for a third period touchdown, crashed over the Iowa State goal from the 16 and two-yard line in the first half, and booted a pair of extra points. In 15 tries with the ball Steuber averaged 9.1 yards, and completed one of his three passes for a touchdown in the second half.

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Editorial —

Texans Should Demand Re-Districting Action

Generally commendable is the West Texas chamber of commerce outlined program of work for 1942-43, a program which, as customary, is designed to bring greater security and prosperity to the territory the organization represents. This "platform" will be adopted formally early next month, by the novel procedure of tabulating results from a "mail-order" convention which has replaced the orthodox type of meeting because of wartime restrictions.

Some of the WTCC's working goals are long-range, others immediate.

And in the latter class we place the matter of state legislative redistricting, which point the Big Spring committee has emphasized as the one on the preferred list.

In other words, something ought to be done about it — and at the next session of the legislature.

Here is a governmental corrective move that can be accomplished without interfering in any way with what program the legislature has before it in cooperation with the war effort. It should be completed without bringing forth any

bitter political contests, and disrupting disputes.

The plain fact in the case is that our lawmakers at Austin have ignored the mandates of the constitution, and should be required, by force of public opinion, to take positive action.

Redistricting should have been done after the census of 1930; it should have been done immediately after the census of 1940. West Texas is primarily interested, because the shifts in population are such that this section will be entitled to more representation; but until redistricting is accomplished as the constitution meant for it to be, this section may as well reconcile itself to failure in many appeals on other legislative items. In other words, redistricting is basic.

Some half-hearted attempts at revising the legislative representation have been made. The senators and the house members in other sections where population losses are shown are not interested. The shame of it is that even some West Texas lawmakers have not been greatly interested, either, for fear that in the shift of districts they will lose some counties that have represented their strongest support.

Political selfishness and nothing else, has kept this important state task submerged. It is time for all the people to make themselves heard in a demand that political selfishness give way to some of the proper functions of representative government.

There's Nothing To Fear At U. S. Recruit Offices

(Second in a series on enlisting in the fighting forces.)

By JACK STINNETT

WASHINGTON — Where does a man enlist?

That's easy. At his local (or in the case of small towns and country districts, his nearest) recruiting station.

There are, however, several things in connection with visiting the recruiting station that every potential enlistee should memorize.

For example, recruiting stations are no chambers of horrors. You are absolutely under no obligations when you walk into one and ask for all the dope they have on any branch of the services you are interested in, and they have plenty. They are the information bureaus of the armed forces.

I could fill a dozen columns with facts and figures about how you can make \$165-a-month plus as a petty officer in the Navy; how to get a commission in the Army by qualifying for the Officers' Training School or the Officers' Candidate School; what route you take to become a combat pilot and what other routes you take to get into the Army, Navy, Marine and Coast Guard air forces; how to get in the Navy if you are only 17; and what branches of the other services are open to 18- and 19-year-olds.

But if I filled a dozen columns, I still couldn't give you the information that the recruiting stations pour out in reams of pamphlets, mimeographed orders, and printed explanations on every subject under the military sun.

However, remember this: If you wait to be drafted, you'll go into the Army. The only way to get in the Army, Navy, Coast Guard and Marine Corps is to enlist.

The Coast Guard and Marines are the Navy, although in many cities they have their own recruiting stations.

If you can make the grade, they offer faster advancement in pay and ratings (particularly in the case of the Army). Out of the wartime complement of a modern battleship, there are less than 100 "non-rated men"—that is men of a grade lower than third class petty officer.

If a man wants to enlist, yet wants to earn more than minimum base pay, he should play his own personnel officer — examines all of his abilities in the light of demands from all branches of the service and then hit the recruiting stations for all the information along these lines.

If he can't find it in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard, there are also the SeaBees (construction battalion of the Navy) and the Army Specialist Corps who don't quite have to measure up to the physical standards for fighting men.

Man About Manhattan—

Major Diamond Market Found In N. Y. Bowery

NEW YORK — The Bowery is the last street in town where you'd expect to find the center of New York's thriving diamond and jewelry market, yet that's where the larger exchanges are operated.

Since the war knocked out the Amsterdam market, New York's market has taken on much greater proportions. Prices shot up so rapidly that diamond merchants came to work in the morning tens of thousands of dollars richer than they had been the night before, without lifting a finger.

The market is a most unglamorous place, not seeming at all out of place in the Bowery. The most important exchange has the dimensions of a large cafeteria and is a great deal like a department store, with individual show-cases not more than six or eight feet long huddled against each other all around the walls and in the center. Behind each showcase stands the lord and vendor of his stock, his name appearing on a stereotyped glass sign.

Some specialize in diamond jewelry, others in uncut diamonds, still others in gold jewelry, antique jewelry, watch cases, silverware and repairing for the trade.

Be sure that the million dollar stock is well protected by private and public burglar systems. Each safe is wired to a central office, and not even the proprietors themselves can open their strongboxes between regular closing and opening hours. Plain-clothesmen and uniformed watchmen prowling around the marble floor watching for suspicious movements. At a signal from any merchant, exit doors lock automatically, gongs ring and officers from main police headquarters two blocks away arrive on the double, and the place gets like a well-disorganized boiler factory.

A couple of weeks ago the alarm went off, and while the cops were dashing around with sawed-off machine guns, a building attendant found the guilty party—a pet cat which had tripped the basement alarm.

While multi-thousand dollar deals are taking place over the counters, another unofficial exchange takes place outside. Here a strong curb market operates in some of the cheaper items, usually picked up at auctions of unclaimed loan pledges.

These exchanges are wholesale markets, to which come most of the city's retail jewelry merchants. No sale is too small, but don't think that you can get it wholesale!

Saturday is the busy day, for it's still payday to millions of New Yorkers. More diamond-conscious than people in most cities, they often buy stones purely for investment. June and December are good months, because of weddings and Christmas, but summer months are brutal. Many merchants shut down during July and August and have themselves a time somewhere. Winter of summer, the Bowery is no pleasure resort.

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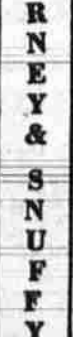

Martin Co. School Has Fine Record On Scrap Collection

STANTON, Oct. 24 — Flower Grove school students this week turned in a fine account of their efforts in the scrap metal drive. The school started the drive two weeks ago and up to Friday the students had collected 77,367 pounds, an average of 604 pounds

Five Constitutional Amendments Before Texas Voters November 3

By DAVE CHEAVES

AUSTIN, Oct. 24. (AP) — When Texas voters go to the polls a week from Tuesday, their ballot on five constitutional amendments will lift the general election above the familiar routine rubber-stamping of democratic hominess.

While both the republican and the new-born people's unity parties have candidates for United States

senator in opposition to the democratic nominee, W. Lee O'Daniel, his election may be regarded as a certainty.

The same holds true for the governorship, with only apathetic republican opposition to Nominee Coke Stevenson. Statewide interest as a result has focused on the constitutional amendments, at least one of which aroused some con-

trover.

As summarized on the ballot, this amendment would require "appropriation bills passed by the legislature to be presented to and certified by the comptroller of public accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for is-

suance of bonds to pay off state obligations outstanding Sept. 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the legislature and the comptroller of public accounts with reference thereto."

Proponents of this amendment have advocated it on the basis that it provides a method for reducing the huge general fund deficit, and that it was designed to prevent legislative appropriations under funds are available or in sight. Opponents have criticized it partly because, they claim the wording of the amendment, providing that appropriation in excess of cash or anticipated revenues may be made "in case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each house" could possibly defeat the avowed purpose of the proposal.

The state democratic convention in September passed a resolution frowning on this amendment. Rep. W. O. Reed, author of the resolution, submitting the amendment, said he was mystified as to "where the opposition came from."

Most major appropriations bills usually pass by heavy majorities.

Also attracting considerable attention is the amendment which would authorize construction of a state office building or buildings to cost no more than \$2,000,000. Many state offices now rent space in Austin, and advocates of the building claim the cost of such structure could be retired by money now spent in rentals.

The amendments, as they appear on the ballot:

For (or against): "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

For (or against): "The constitutional amendment permitting the accounting officers of this state to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States army or navy who are assigned to duties in state institutions of higher education."

For (or against): "The amendment to the constitution, providing that the legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or current jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

For (or against): "The amendment to the constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) of the permanent school fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a state office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the permanent school fund."

Listed in third place among the amendments on the ballot is the one relating to appropriations, the substance of which has been given.
