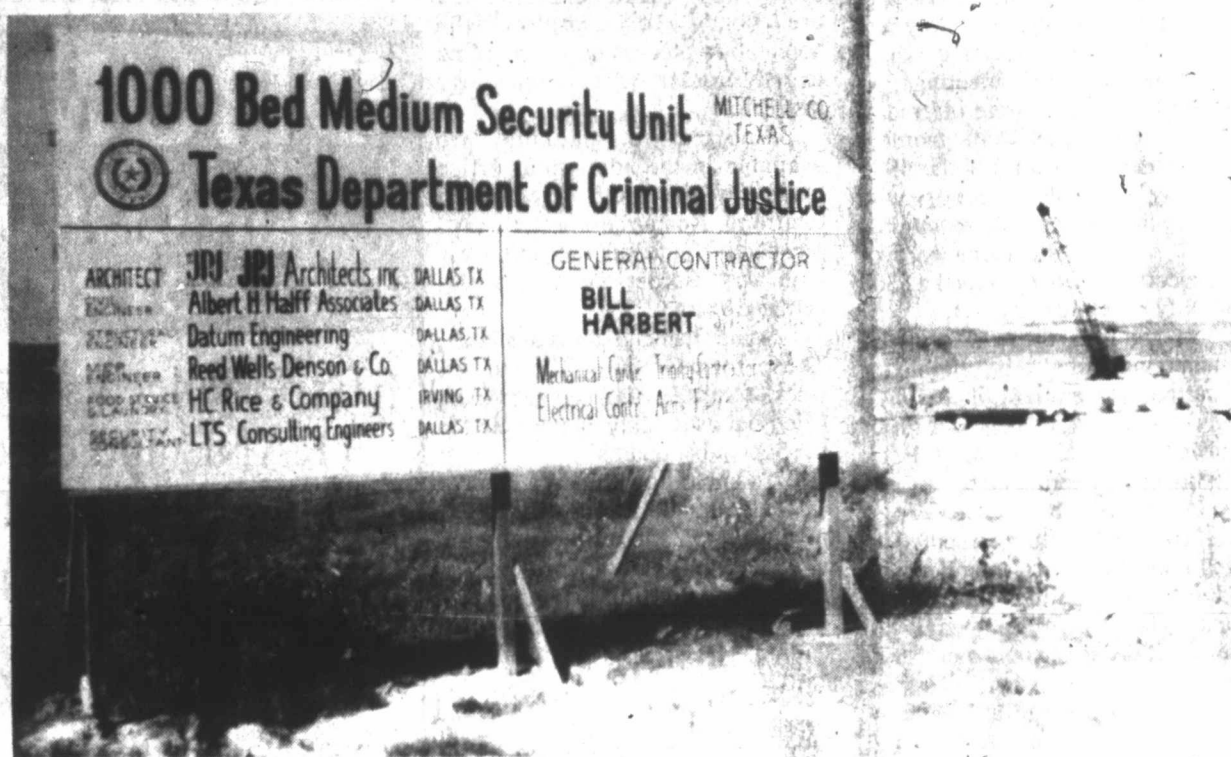

Chief warns of fireworks in city

"Shooting off fireworks within the city limits is against city ordinances," said Police Chief David Montgomery. "If we see someone popping them in town, we will confiscate them and issue a citation."

Montgomery also said they will respond to all calls from citizens reporting fireworks being set off.

A drier than normal summer has left fields extremely flammable and people who set fireworks off in these areas are urged to be extremely cautious to prevent grass fires.

Montgomery also warned of buying "bootleg fireworks" that are much more powerful than what the law allows.

"They are extremely dangerous because of their power and unpredictability," said Montgomery.

Under current federal regulations, any firecracker containing more than 50 milligrams of explosives material is banned, although aerial devices still may contain up to 130 milligrams of powder.

Montgomery said that two-thirds of injuries caused by fireworks involve "legal" products

such as sparklers, firecrackers and bottle rockets. Sparklers cause approximately 20 percent of these injuries as the temperature at the tip of a sparkler can reach as high as 1000 degrees F.

Nationwide, fireworks caused more than 12,446 injuries severe enough to cause hospitalization or emergency room treatment last year with more than half of them children.

Seventy percent of all fireworks-related injuries occur to the hand, head and eyes. One-third of all the eye injuries caused by fireworks result in permanent blindness. Approximately 120 amputations of the hand and fingers are performed annually because of fireworks-related injuries.

These safety tips are recommended if you intend to use

The hearing with Westbrook ISD and the Mitchell County CED scheduled for Friday, July 2 has been postponed until August 25 according to the Texas Education Agency.

It has been postponed at the request of both parties according to the TEA.

Council selects firm for feasibility study

R. W. Beck Co., whose home office is in Denver, was selected by the City Council Thursday evening to conduct the feasibility study for a recycling facility here.

The study is being funded by a grant of \$95,000 from the Texas Water Commission and will be administered by the city.

City Manager Buddy Foster told the council that the firm had extensive knowledge and experience in all phases of recycling.

Erv Salmon, of the Texas Water Commission, stated that Beck was one of the leaders nationwide and that the TWC had worked with them on two other projects.

"They are very reliable, very competent," said Salmon.

Foster emphasized that the study might show that the project was not even feasible but "that is what we are working to find out."

He said a lot of options would be explored including the possible ownership of a recycling plant by the city.

One proposal is that TDCJ

prisoners separate the recyclable items from trash brought into the plant and then items such as "plastic wood" would be manufactured.

"A lot of eyes will be watching us on this project," said Foster because of the uniqueness of the project and the far-reaching effects it might have.

Two items were tabled by the council which had members Walt Staats, Brian Bassham, Gary Redwine, Bob Reily and Allen Pharis in attendance including the opening of one part of the landfill and the closing of another part and re-plating of the cemetery.

Foster also reported to the council that a member of the Governor's "disaster team" was in town Thursday looking over the low-water crossing at Ruddick Park. The city hopes to receive funding from the state to repair the present bridge that is closed due to its deteriorating condition.

"This is in the very preliminary stages," he added.

Gramm's office presents flag to Scouts

Boy Scout Troop 100 in Colorado City celebrated the nation's 217th anniversary of Independence Day during a Friday, July 2, ceremony that included the presentation of a United States flag by a representative of U.S. Senator Phil Gramm's office.

The ceremony was held on the steps of the Mitchell County Courthouse.

Jennifer Crabtree, regional director of Sen. Gramm's office in Lubbock, delivered remarks regarding the significance of Independence Day before presenting Troop Leader Fred Morris with a U.S. flag.

"I salute the members of Troop 100 for your patriotism and reflection upon the assured rights guaranteed to our citizens, life and liberty.

"Freedom is very precious and highly valued in our world. We should all be thankful to live in a land that allows us the freedom to dream and to pursue those dreams," Gramm said.

The American flag has the distinction of being the only flag that has had a national anthem written about it. Its title is "The Star Spangled Banner." Francis Scott Key, the composer, was inspired to write the song when he saw our flag amid bombs and flames during our second war with Britain on September 14, 1814.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the flag received official recognition by Congress in an Act on June 22, 1942. However, the pledge was first published in 1892 in the Youth's Companion magazine in Boston, Massachusetts to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America.

Each part of the flag and each color has special meaning. The stars, of course, represent each state of the Union. They are set in a blue background like the stars in heaven. The red stripes, which represent England, are separated by bands of white. The number of stripes has

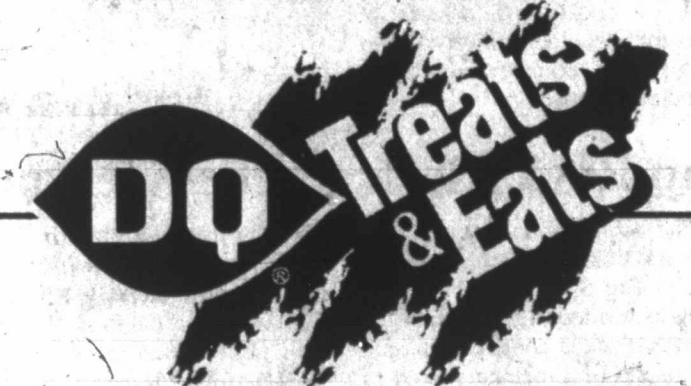

progress during the past year. Also on the agenda will be the election of directors.  
 Four of Cap Rock's 12 directorships are due for election at the 1993 Annual Meeting. Incumbents are Roger Lang, District #1; Sammie Buchanan, District #2; Alfred Schwartz, District #7; and Rob Holman, District #11.

fireworks over the Fourth of July weekend:

1. Do not allow younger children to play with fireworks under any circumstances.
2. Closely supervise older children who are permitted to use fireworks.
3. Read and follow all warning instructions printed on the label.
4. Keep a bucket of water nearby in case of fire.
5. Never try to handle or relight malfunctioning fireworks. Soak them with water and throw them away.
6. Be sure bystanders are out of range before lighting fireworks.
7. Never ignite fireworks in a container, especially of glass or metal.
8. Store fireworks in a dry, cool place.
9. Don't handle fireworks if you have been drinking alcoholic beverages.
10. Be aware of the potential for grass fires. If it is dry, then you may not be able to use fireworks or you may need to use them on concrete or asphalt surfaces to minimize the risk of fire.

Guests came from Colorado City, Loraine, Tyler, Lubbock, Olton, Plainview, Snyder, Coahoma and San Angelo.

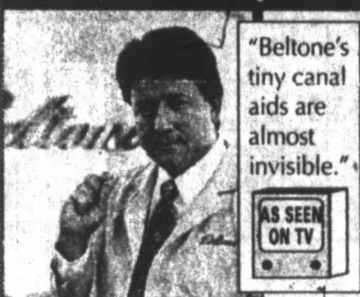
### Story time to be held at library

## COUNTY OIL & GAS NEWS

Parker and Parsley Development Co. of Midland has revealed plans to drill a 3,400-ft. developmental well in Mitchell County's Iatan East Howard Field. The operator has 3,840 acres leased, with drillsite in the T&PRR Co. Survey. It has designated the venture as the No. 289 Mary Foster "W." Drillsite is nine miles southwest of Westbrook.

A new producer has been brought on line in Mitchell County's Westbrook Field, with Meridian Oil Inc. of Houston as the operator.

Located six miles west of Westbrook, the well is in a 2,768-acre lease in the T&PRR Co. Survey A-1540. It is designated as the No. 427 Southwest Westbrook Unit.

The well pumped 22 barrels of oil per day, plus 82 barrels of water.

It bottomed at 3,350 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Clear Fork Formation, 2,982 to 3,136 feet into the hole.

Parker and Parsley Development Co. of Midland has conducted a plugback for extended pay at the No. 218 Mary Foster in Midland County's Iatan Field, nine miles southwest of Westbrook.

The operator perforated for new production in the San Andres Formation, 1,838 to 1,985 feet into the hole. It pumped 13 barrels of oil per day plus 297 barrels of water.

Original pay was from the San Angelo Formation, 2,452 to 2,626 feet into the hole. It pumped nine barrels of oil per day plus 260 barrels of water from San Angelo perforations at 2,452 to 2,626 feet into the hole. The operator plugged the well back to 2,270 feet from the original 3,400-ft. bottom.

Location is in a 3,840-acre lease in the T&PRR Co. Survey A-654.

## Governor approves House Bill allowing inmates to work

Governor Richards signed into law House Bill 864 which will allow incarcerated inmates in county jails waiting to be transferred to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) to volunteer for county inmate work programs. Current law only allows persons who are in jail awaiting trial, or who have been convicted of a misdemeanor to participate in such programs.

"Implementing meaningful work, rehabilitation and educational programs continue to be major issues that face today's criminal justice system. Encouraging a positive work ethic is a vital component to the mission of TDCJ," said Governor Richards.

"I commend Rep. Johnson on sponsoring this bill and local sheriffs for supporting it. The state needs more of these productive work programs for inmates."

Rep. Johnson echoed the Governor's sentiments, "The general public wants inmates to work. Most inmates would rather work than sit in a cell all day, and our local communities can benefit from inmate work programs."

Rep. Johnson worked closely with East Texas sheriffs in formulating the bill and credits them with the idea. "They were instrumental in developing the idea," he added.

"The result of passage of H.B. 864 is a win-win situation. Many people have felt that these prisoners should be utilized in a productive manner. County projects and a cut down in disciplinary problems are only a few of the benefits from this program," stated Sen. Haley (D-Center).

H.B. 864 clarifies existing law and permits local sheriffs to institute work programs and have all qualified inmates participate voluntarily. Studies show that skills the majority of the inmates claim to have do not prove to be valid.

Provisions in H.B. 864 also allow for inmates who voluntarily participate in these programs to be awarded good conduct time. It is the responsibility of the local sheriff to certify any good conduct time earned. The disposition of the good conduct time will be used by the director of TDCJ.

Sponsors of H.B. 864 are Rep. Jerry Johnson (D-Nacogdoches) and Sen. Bill Haley (D-Center). The bill will become effective on August 30, 1993.

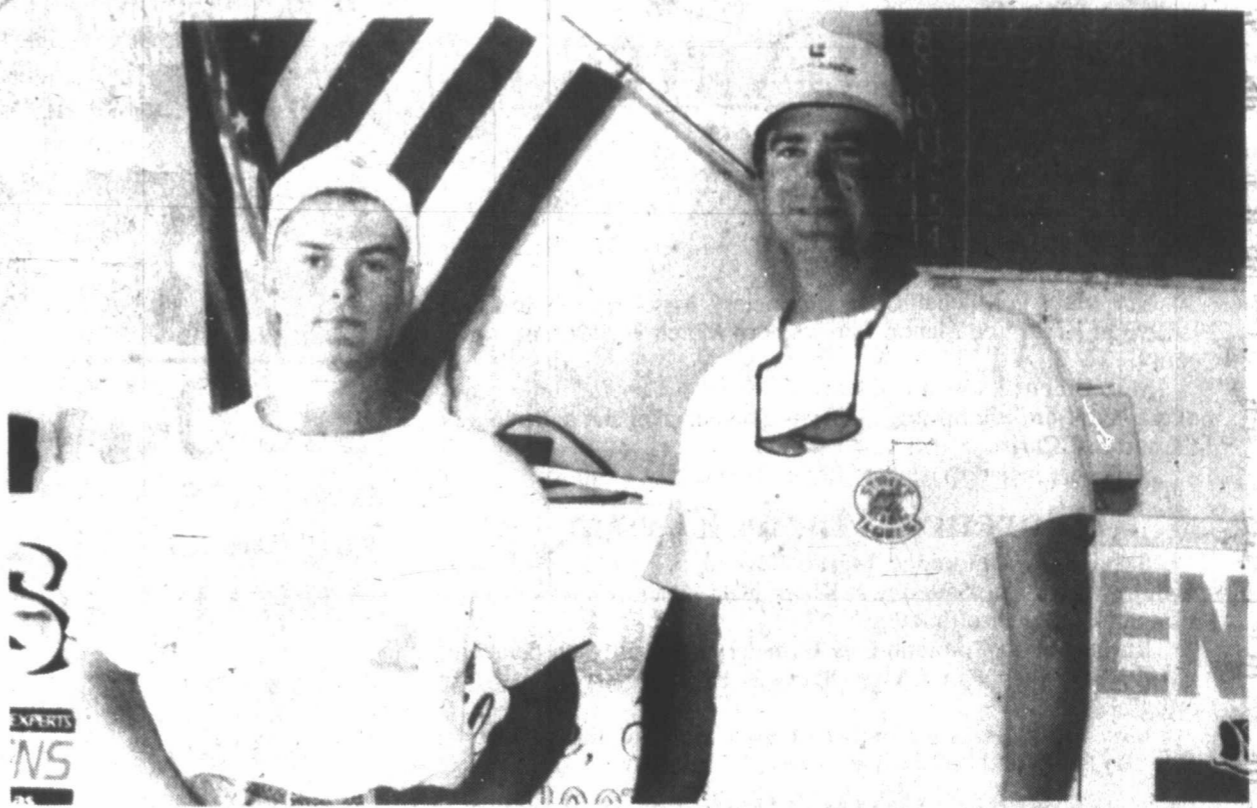
