U. S. DEMONSTRATION CAR.**Improved Method of Cooling Dressed Poultry to Be Shown.**

Through the efforts of H. P. Roddie, the government has placed a demonstration car on the local tracks for the purpose of showing improved methods of cooling dressed poultry. Mr. Greenlee, who will have charge of the demonstration, arrived yesterday and the car is expected to arrive from Texarkana today.

Heretofore Texas poultry has not infrequently gone on the market with a greasy appearance that has proven an objectionable feature in the selling, and it is the purpose of the government to attempt to overcome this feature by giving demonstrations of improved methods of cooling and handling.

The car will be maintained at government expense in Brady until December 1st. It will be located at the east end of the freight depot, where demonstrations in the cooling of turkeys now being dressed by H. P. Roddie & Co. will be made daily. Mr. Roddie will place his car alongside the government demonstration car, and as fast as the dry picked turkeys are cooled they will be loaded onto the former car for carload shipment to the Eastern markets.

Every turkey raiser and every citizen interested in improved methods of handling dressed poultry is invited to visit the car and see the cooling process being demonstrated.

H. P. Roddie & Co. expect to handle 500 d. p. turkeys a day as long as the butchering season is on.

KILLING DUCKS IS LAWFUL. 10 CENT "CASCARETS" IS YOUR LAXATIVE.

Hon. James L. Slayden Corrects Misleading Statement.

Hon. James L. Slayden, the popular U. S. Representative from this district, corrects the statement reprinted in The Standard recently from another paper to the effect that killing ducks in Texas was unlawful, and believing his letter will be of interest to sportsmen and citizens alike, we take the liberty of publishing same in full:

"In a recent issue of your paper there was printed an article copied from a neighboring paper relating to the Federal game law recently enacted by Congress, wherein it was stated:

"Hereafter it will be a crime to kill a wild duck anywhere in the United States. Wild ducks are not classified as migratory birds in the law just enacted."

"Evidently the writer of this article had not read the law, and for fear that the publication may mislead some of our friends who like to shoot a duck now and then, I beg to correct the misleading statement.

"Herewith I beg to hand you a copy of the law, together with the regulations for the protection of migratory birds approved by the president.

"Under Regulation 1, page 8, you will find that wild ducks are classified as migratory game birds.

"Under Regulation 9, page 10, you will find that wild ducks may be killed in Texas between November 1st and January 31st, both dates inclusive.

"It is provided, however, that migratory game birds shall not be killed at night, that is between sunset and sunrise."

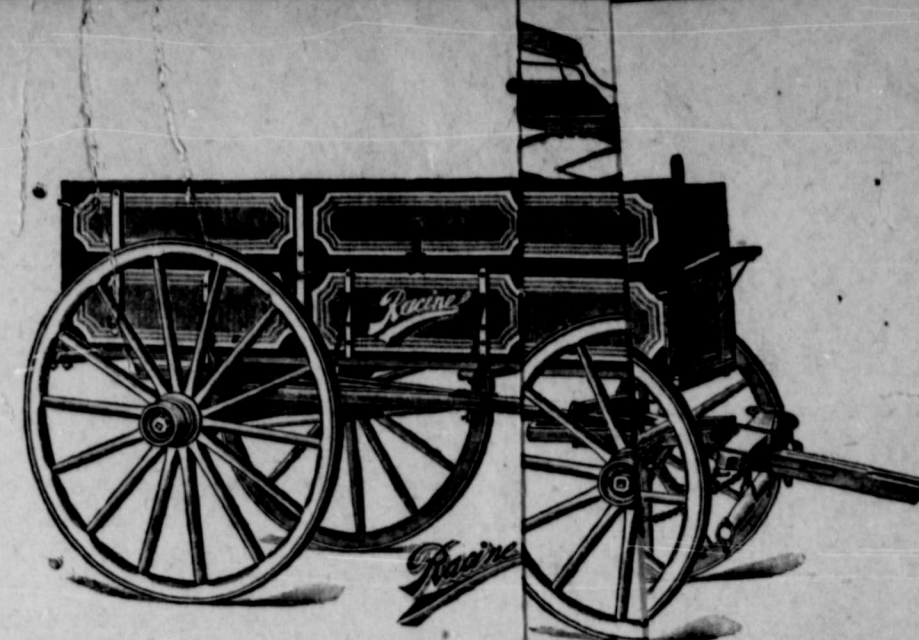

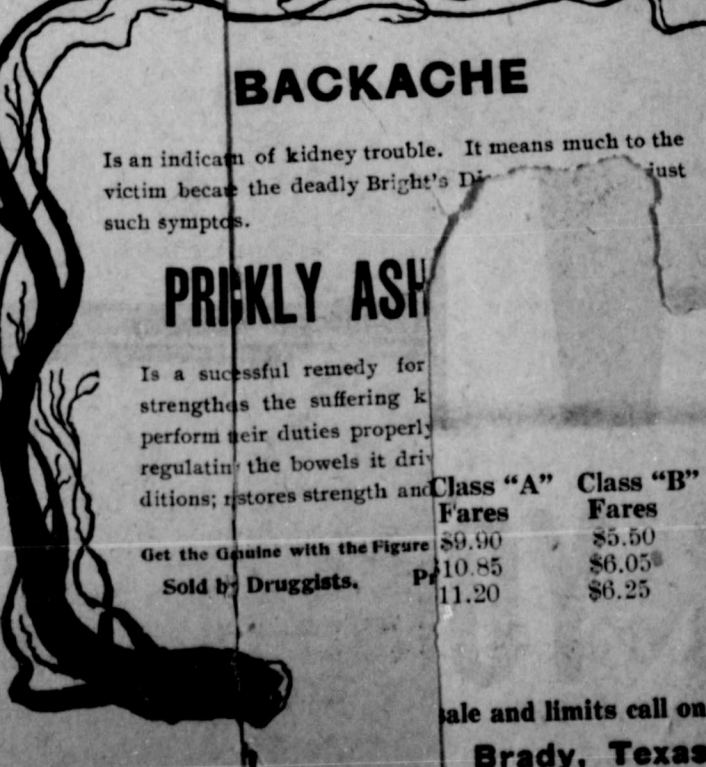
