The wool market at Chicago.—Light shrinkage; good condition. Twelve months' clip, as reported by Lucas & Wynn, of Chicago: Fine, 19 to 20cts; fine medium, 20 to 21 cts; medium, 20 to 21 cts; low medium, 18 to 19 cts; coarse, 15 to 16 cts; inferior wool, one to three cents off.

Grand Jury's Report. To the Honorable District Judge of Callahan County: We, the grand jurors of Callahan county, beg leave to submit the financial reports herewith attached, of the Financial Grand Jury appointed by your court, with the following recommendations:

We find that ex-Treasurer McDonald has not yet made a settlement with the present treasurer, and that he is indebted to the county in the sum of \$907.73. We recommend that the county attorney at once take such legal steps as will secure the collection of the same.

And, further, we find that several of the Justices of the Peace have failed to make their proper reports, and are indebted to this county in various amounts. We recommend that the county attorney take the proper steps to insure collection, and prompt reports in the future.

And, further, we recommend the discontinuance of the practice of remitting fines in trivial or other cases, as heretofore practiced by the Commissioners' Court.

We, as a body, have visited and examined the condition of the jail, and find the same in perfect order, and no dissatisfaction among the prisoners.

TERRIBLE WINDSTORMS and flood visited eastern Texas last Tuesday and Wednesday and spread death and destruction in their wake. At Gainesville the storm was unusually severe. Fresh Butter.
