LILLY SERVICE STATION OPENS

GIVE AWAY OIL WITH GASOLINE PURCHASED ON OPENING DAY, SATURDAY

The finishing touches are being applied to the new Lilly Service station this week in anticipation of a grand opening which is to be held all day Saturday, January 28. Stucco work and all interior finishing work will be completed this week and preparations are going ahead for the big day. W. B. Lilly, owner and manager of the new station, will give away a half gallon of Texaco motor oil with every five more gallons of gasoline at the station.

Two Texaco gasoline pumps have already been installed and the place has been made ready for the third pump which has not, as yet, arrived. In addition to oil and gasoline, Mr. Lilly will do tube repair work. Free water and the best of service are also promised.

As soon as the weather warms, Mr. Lilly is going to start work on grading the concrete for a tourist stage camp to surround the station. Places have been laid out for fifty-two of the cottages, but only ten or ten will be constructed this spring, Mr. Lilly stated.

The cottages are also to be of the stucco. They will consist of a room and garage. The cottages will be equipped with table, bed and gas stove. Mr. Lilly has built very comfortable quarters for himself and family. The station is equipped with a stock of accessories and a complete set of lunch groceries will be sold to the station.

In conjunction with the grand opening, an oil demonstration will be conducted at the station by a Texaco representative.

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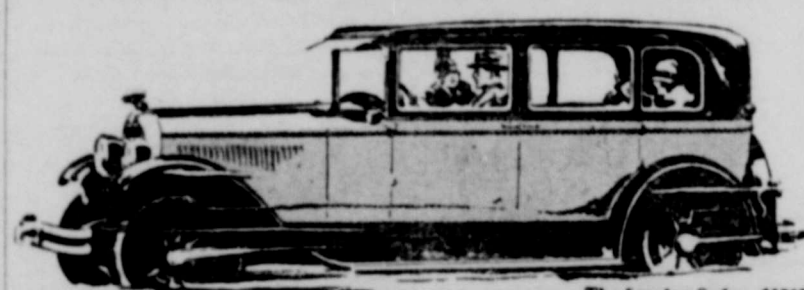

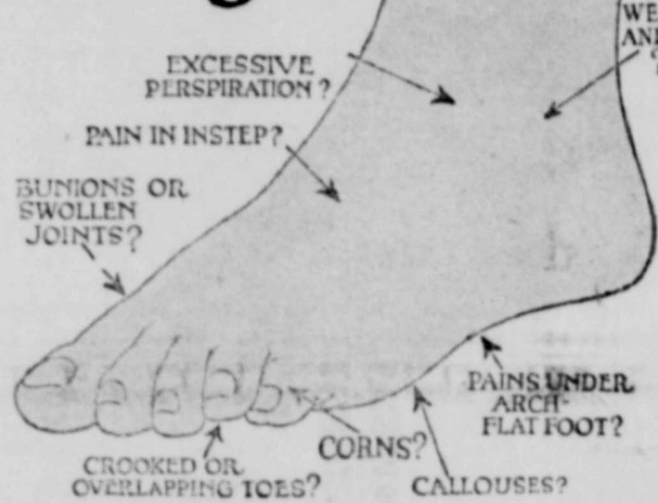

International Sunday School Lesson

The Growing Fame of Jesus
Text: Mk. 3:7-12; 6:53-56

Following the healing of the man with the withered hand, the Pharisees had gone forth and straightway "taken counsel with the Herodians" (3:6). They must find some way to rid the country of this Preacher and Healer who spoke with such authority.

It is a remarkable fact that the Herodians, the political party, had no use ordinarily for Pharisees, the self-styled leaders of orthodoxy. If they chose to associate with any religious party, it would be with the Sadducees, the Liberalists of the day. The Pharisees could not tolerate either Herodians or Sadducees, yet we find them joining hands with both of these parties in order to oppose Jesus.

We may find plenty of parallels in our own time. When the Scopes trial, backed by Atheistic money and lawyers, was under way in Dayton, Tenn., it was noticeable that some men wearing the garb of ministers of Christ rubbed shoulders with the Atheistic group. They saw an opportunity to oppose Fundamentalism, which had been championed by William Jennings Bryan. But what befell them!

In spite of all the plotting, the growing multitudes followed after Jesus. Wherever He went, the crowds "from Galilee and from Judea and from Jerusalem and from Idumea and from beyond Jordan" trailed after Him.

His Gospel is still the world's greatest drawing power. The Spirit-filled preaching of the World never lacks for a hearing. Any novelty may win a transient crowd, but the Gospel has an enduring influence. The Christian congregations of the world are a marvelous spectacle. Think of the number of people throughout the world who are found assembled in places of worship on the Lord's Day, to say nothing of unnumbered thousands who lift their hearts in adoration of Him and the study of His Word, in other places. The Gospel has this effect because it deals with fundamental issues of life.

There were many attracted to Jesus because "they had heard what great things He did" (v. 8). There were some mere curiosity-seekers, but there were others who longed to experience some of those "great things." The testimonies of those whose lives have been transformed by Him, still constitute sufficient reason why every man should seek unto Him and desire His touch of forgiveness and healing.

So great became the crowds that Jesus "spoke to His disciples that a small ship should wait on Him, lest they should throng Him" (v. 9). Those desiring healing of body pressed upon Him and those possessed of demons at the very sight of Him "fell down and cried out, Thou art the Son of God" (v. 11).

Some of the earliest confessions of His Sonship came from those in-

dwelt by foreign spirits. They recognized that they were in the presence of the divine Son of God when His own disciples had not awakened to it. It is a peculiar spectacle to see the deity of Christ argued down today by some professing Christians, while confessions of it has been so often wrung from sinful men, who yet refuse to submit to His touch.

The word "plagues" in verse 10 is interesting. The original word means "corrections or chastisements." We cannot doubt that sickness is often designed to that end. It is to make men smart for sin. Some sinners do not get sorry until they smart. But for such warnings, many would have continued their rush toward perdition unchecked. Let us not miss the point that those who were under such scourging "came to Jesus."

That man is wise who lets his sickness send him to the Savior. All sickness, whether in saved or unsaved, should quicken men to inquire after Him. He is "the great physician" and while it may not be His purpose to heal instantly all who come to Him, as in the day when miracles were the necessary credentials by which the Messiah was to be recognized, He will be to every surrendered child of His, the source of grace whereby "thorns in the flesh," may be borne for God's glory.

Another point worthy of note in this brief passage, is that Jesus sought no applause for Himself for those "great things" which He did. "He straitly charged them that they should not make Him known" (v. 12). Were His earthly ministry among us today, we would find no flashing advertisements in the newspapers. Nor would He employ the radio to broadcast the news of His healing power.

Back of this we may see not only His desire to have working space but a wise safeguard against the feeding of the pride of those who had been highly favored in being cured. Here is man touched by Jesus, who in the sight of a great crowd, throws away his crutches. Inexperienced in the Christian life, he rushes before great crowds with his story. How easy for the story to grow! He begins to take great

credit to himself.

How many times the demon of unbelief has been driven out of a man; he has rejoiced in healing of body in answer to prayer—and then the demon of spiritual pride has come in. He begins to disparage the faith of all, however godly, who languish on beds of sickness. He begins to pass judgement upon them and to say that their sickness is due to sin. He has placed himself upon a pedestal and "pride goeth before a fall." More than one who has taken this course has been carted off to the hospital to die of the very affliction from which he was apparently healed—and those who lack spiritual discernment are unable to reconcile it with the teachings concerning Christ as the Great Physician.

The lesson committee carry us now to the sixth chapter, verses 53-56, to notice again the eagerness of the people to get to Jesus with their afflicted ones. He had sent His disciples across the lake to Bethsaida, that He might be for a time alone in the mountain for prayer (6:45-46).

What perfect balance we find in His life! We must balance our Christian activities with spiritual contemplation and prayer. But for this, we would read of no healing ministry of Jesus. Let us be energetic and practical, but let us not fail to remember that no amount of loving ministry to others can be a substitute for devotion to Him.

The disciples found themselves in a frail bark toiling against contrary winds. There in the midst of the lake, there was a connection between them and their Master on the distant mountain. "He saw them" (v. 48) and He went unto them "walking upon the sea." The disciples could not believe their own eyes. His voice they could not mistake. "It is I: be not afraid" (v. 50).

How sure and sweet is the revelation of Jesus to the believer in the time of storm! Though we sail in to the unknown darkness of the very sea of death, we have no reason to be afraid, for we may say "Thou art with me." Even then shall we hear Him say: "Be not afraid: it is I."

It was after this experience on the waters that Jesus and His disciples again found themselves surrounded with crowds on the shores of Gennesaret. "Straightway they knew Him" (v. 54). They had probably heard also that He was not accustomed to remain long in a

place. No wonder "they ran through the whole region round about" and began to bring in the sick.

Are we as concerned to improve our opportunity of getting to Him while it is still "the day of salvation"? Seek the Lord while he may be found; call ye upon Him while He is near.

Go where He would, Jesus was crowded with patients, yet He never gave anyone a "treatment." In villages and cities, they laid the beds of the sick in the streets to be in His pathway and begged leave for them to "touch if it were but the border of His garment." What a complete and universal Healer He was!

The sad part of the story is that so few were as anxious to be healed by Him as they were to be healed. If God had chosen to give His devoted ministers in this age, the power to heal the bodies of people as Jesus did, what crowds would attend our churches! He well knows how much more concerned most men are about their bodies than they are their souls.

PITH AND POINT
Opposition to Christ sometimes makes strange bedfellows (3:6). Consideration of the great things Christ has done for others should engage us to come to Him (v. 8). Wise preachers, so far as possible, decline a crowd (v. 9).

'Tis sad that irresponsible men should own the divine Sonship of Christ while some prominent ministers deny it (v. 11).

"When we do that which is praiseworthy," says Matthew Henry, "and yet covet not to be praised of men, then the same mind is in us which was in Christ Jesus."

As soon as we learn that "without Him we can do nothing," He will be with us again (6:50).

Every storm of life will be glorified when we recognize the presence of Jesus in it (6:51).

GOLDEN TEXT ILLUSTRATION
The common people heard Him gladly. (Mk. 12:37).

When Bishop Simpson preached years ago in Memorial Hall, London, he preached quietly and with very little gesticulation, but with such power that the whole assembly, as if moved by an irresistible impulse, arose at the climax of his message, then after a second or two, sank into the seats. A professor of elocution was there. A friend who knew that he had come to criticize, asked him, after the service, how he liked the bishop's elocution. "Elocution!" said he. "That man doesn't need elocution. He's got the Holy Ghost." That was the secret back of the attracting power of Jesus Christ, and it tells the story of every great preacher whom God has used in the drawing of souls to Himself.
