HOME TOWN Talk

Ben Shoemaker, student in Winters High School, joined the thin ranks of the hole-in-one golfers Saturday at the Winters Country Club. Hitting from the tee box on top of the cliff of Bluff Creek, across to No. 6—a distance of 135 yards—Ben watched his ball hit the green and plop into the hole for an ace.

Up-to-the-hour tv and radio weather forecasts have taken a lot of the anticipation out of weather-watching, while at the same time probably doubling the misery brought on by bad weather. When adverse weather conditions hit, we already have been through an hours-long—and sometimes days—period of conditioning on what to expect. Unconsciously, even before the weather change becomes apparent, we begin quaking at what is to come—so when it does arrive (forecasts SOMETIMES are right) we are already in a miserable mood, which makes any kind of weather worse than it really is. A cold spell is colder, a warm spell is warmer, winds are higher, etc., etc.

Take for instance, forecasts Wednesday of this week—and a day or two before. The "word" had gone out that we should expect high winds and a sand storm of great magnitude. The wind did get up considerably Wednesday, but as of the middle of the afternoon, the sand had not started to drift through the air to any great extent. (Whether the sand did or didn't blow Wednesday we all know by now.) But everywhere one went all Wednesday morning, people had begun to look to the north and west; the misery-meter started to rise; people started getting out of sorts. They were "conditioning" themselves for what they had been warned was coming.

Now back in the days before tv and radio got so popular, all the forecasts were long-range affairs—from the Farmer's Almanac or some other publication (which were pretty close to correct). People were not warned every hour on the hour that a sand storm was coming; they could perhaps look toward the horizon from which the storm probably would come and see that something was on the way, but they took it in stride; the "conditioning" process had been unheard of.

We remember one instance a good many years ago when the lack of late weather forecasts was instrumental in adding an experience which was, when added to all other happenings, one of those which serve to fill out a lifetime. We were, one spring Sunday afternoon, in a rough-country section in the vicinity of Southwest Dickens County, when a sudden high wind began to bend the cedars, and stinging sand shuttled like sea-waves through the knee-high shinnery. It was miserable—as remembered in this faraway day—red, watering eyes, dry and cracking lips, lost straw hats. But, along with several other boys, we would not have traded places with the King of Swat, for we were watching in awe as a team of archaeologists uncovered some of the secrets of thousands of years past. With great pains, working in the high wind, they used camel-hair brushes to excavate the skull and tusks of a pre-historic mastodon, which they later covered with plaster of paris for transport to some university museum. Even though we returned home caked with dirt, half sick from exposure to hot wind-blown sand, we were for many days the center of attraction of the younger set—because we were there when it happened! If we had been warned by tv or radio that the sand storm was on its way, probably none of us would have gone on that little trip—and the scientists would have holed up in some nice motel to wait out the storm.

As "educational" as tv and radio have become, how much "education" are they preventing!

Our red-dirt-farming-friend out on Bluff Creek finally admits he's stumped! He's been reading about the low-cost housing which is planned for only those making \$2700 or less per year; and then he sees in the papers where a group of government advisors has said that everyone should be guaranteed at least \$3000 per year! For the life of him, he can't make the two ideas dovetail.

C. of C. Enters "Operation Sparkle", Workers Listed

Harvey Dale Jones, president of the Winters Chamber of Commerce, at a regular meeting of the board of directors Monday evening, presented a full program of activities for the Chamber for 1966, for study by the board and possible action.

A list of all the standing committees also was released at the Monday night meeting. Some of the most important projects suggested by the Chamber of Commerce president included entry in "Operation Sparkle," a project of beautification sponsored by the tourist development committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce; support of development of highways in and around Winters; promotion of development of recreational sites; cooperation with existing industry and working toward encouraging further industrial development for future; study of possibility of extended area telephone service.

OPERATION SPARKLE
The board of directors voted to enter the "Operation Sparkle" project, and will shortly make plans to get the project started in Winters. A public "town hall" meeting will be called within the next 60 days at which the project will be discussed and further plans made.

"Operation Sparkle in '68" is a broad two year program of community improvement, aimed at attracting visitors and influencing them to stop and visit and stay longer. All cities in the 132 counties served by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be included in the program. Idea is "to make our communities literally 'sparkle' by 1968 when Texas will have the greatest inflow of visitors in its history." Texas, in 1968, will benefit from an inflow of visitors to the HemisFair in San Antonio, and the Olympics which will be staged in Mexico City. Lions International convention also is scheduled to be held in Texas, Dallas, in 1968, and bids are being made for both the Democratic and Republican national conventions in that year.

It has been pointed out that all of Texas will benefit from tourists and visitors during that year.

School Calendar For 1966 - 1967 Adopted By Board
The board of trustees of Winters Independent School District, at a recent meeting, adopted the calendar for the 1966-67 school year.

The calendar lists the dates for beginning of the school year and sets aside several days for holidays and special functions. The first day of school will be Wednesday, August 31, with general faculty meeting scheduled for August 29-30. Among the official holidays will be Labor Day, Sept. 5; Thanksgiving, November 24-25; Christmas holidays beginning December 21, with classes to resume January 3; Easter holidays, Good Friday and Monday, March 24 and 27. Graduation exercises will be conducted on May 26, which will be the last day of regular school. A total of 177 school days has been scheduled for the new school year.

One Candidate Withdraws From Council Race

State Capital Highlights—

Voter Registration Scheduled For March 3rd Through 17th

Texans who failed to pay their poll tax have another chance to register for a vote in the 1966 elections. This time it's "for free".

Registration period extends from March 3 through March 17. Any citizen eligible to vote can sign up with his county tax assessor-collector and his name will be placed on the poll list at no charge.

So reads the "emergency" provision in the new voter registration act just passed by the Legislature and signed into law by Gov. John Connally.

Hereafter, free registration will take place from October through January each year. There is one possible hitch: Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr fears that names of those who sign up during March won't be available on bond issues, local option liquor questions, etc. He asked the three federal judges who banned the poll tax to put off their order until March 26.

Estimates of the number of Texans who will take advantage of the free right to vote vary widely—from 50,000 to 1,000,000. Any figure approaching the latter could make a substantial difference in the outcome of many local and some statewide elections. Indications are that the number of new voters will be nowhere near that high, however.

All who paid poll taxes by January 31 will be entitled to vote as usual, without re-registering.

PECOS SULPHUR BOOM

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler compares reaction to the recent Pecos County sulphur discovery with California's Gold Rush days of 1849.

He said "operators are moving in both day and night attempting to locate and file claims on state-owned land. . . to mine sulphur."

Sadler declined to accept 50 cents an acre per year for sulphur leases when, he stated, leading sulphur operators paid up to \$2,000 an acre bonus for five-year leases in a recent federal sale off the coast of Texas.

State School Land Board rejected a rash of filings under an 1895 claim law. Board set a sulphur lease sale, along with oil and gas bidding, for May 3.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Governor Connally appointed Hill County Attorney Steve Latham of Hillsboro to succeed Sam Johnson, resigned, as judge of the 66th District Court of Hill County. Latham formerly practiced law in Wichita Falls.

Governor chose former District Attorney Dan Walton of Houston as judge of Harris county's Criminal District Court No. 4, succeeding the late Judge A. H. Krichamoor.

Connally's appointees to the new Texas Air Control Board are Clinton Howard of Irving, Henry J. LeBlanc Sr. of Port Arthur, Herbert Whitney of Corpus Christi and Dr. Wendell Hamrick, John Files and Dr. Herbert McKee, all of Houston.

Bob Cheatham of Texarkana and Clifford Hensley of El Campo were named by the Governor to the Texas Real Estate Commission.

WATER DEBATE RE-HEARD

Supreme Court of Texas has taken under advisement a long-standing dispute between city of San Antonio and cities in the Guadalupe River basin.

San Antonio is appealing a 1957 Texas Water Commission decision. Ruling denied the Alamo City's application for 100,000-acre feet of water a year from Canyon Dam near New Braunfels and awarded 50,000-acre feet from the reservoir to Guadalupe-Blanco River authority for municipal use downstream.

Attorneys for San Antonio claimed the city must import 138,000-acre feet for its needs by 1980. Meanwhile, Guadalupe basin will have a surplus over necessities of 180,000-acre feet.

GBRA attorney denied any surplus is in sight. He said some cities, including Seguin and Port Lavaca, already have suffered from serious shortages.

Major legal point involved is whether the Commission can delegate to GBRA rights to release water to unspecified municipal users, while denying San Antonio's application to pipeline water from another basin for high priority city and domestic needs.

AG RULES

Attorney General has ruled that Texas Highway Department may grant the owner and operator of overweight mobile equipment, which transports a frac oil in oil well servicing, a permit for the movement of the equipment.

In other actions he ruled that: A county attorney isn't authorized to bring ouster proceedings against a city attorney of a city

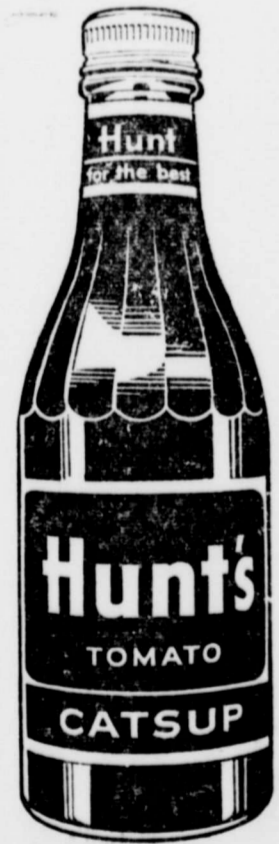

Six Runnels County young men have received orders from Texas Local Board No. 21, serving Coleman and Runnels Counties to report for induction or examination.

Runnels County men ordered for induction are Ramire A. Rocha Jr., of Winters, and Stacy A. Granzin, of Miles.

Men ordered for examination are James D. Bureson and Robert Salazar, both of Winters, and Rodney E. Gordon of Miles and James G. Medrano of Ballinger.

Six men have been ordered to report for induction into the Armed Forces on March 14 from the two counties.

State draft boards are scheduled to forward 5,515 men for preinduction and mental physical examinations in March. Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director has announced. This compared with a scheduled 8,640 being forwarded in February.

The March induction quota, 1,570 previously announced, is the biggest monthly draft quota received for the armed forces in Texas since June 1953.

Men as young as 18 years and 11 months may be ordered to fill the March call for examination. No man can be ordered for induction unless he has reached his 19th birthday, except as a volunteer. The March quota for induction will be filled with single and childless married men 19 through 25 years old. No married man with a child, or an expected child, will be selected to fill the March call, if information about the children, or unborn child, has been furnished the draft board. The Selective Service regulation demand that an unborn child be certified by a physician.

3,000 Texans Are Eligible For Social Security Benefits

Some 3,000 Texans who may be eligible for disability benefits under the new Social Security provisions have not yet applied for them, according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office.

Under recent liberalizations of the law, persons with nonpermanent disability may now qualify for benefits. Ellington said that under the previous law a person was eligible only if he had a severe disability that was expected to last a long and indefinite time. Now benefits can be paid if the severe disability has lasted or is expected by his doctors to last as long as 12 months. There are also more liberal requirements for certain persons who are blind.

These liberalizations make necessary a revised State-Federal agreement under which the Texas Education Agency will continue to make disability determinations for all Texas residents who apply for benefits under the Social Security Disability Program. Signing ceremonies were held this week in the office of Dr. J. W. Edgar, State Commissioner of Education. Also present for the ceremony were Paul E. Webb, Director of the Division of State Operations, Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland; Wayman Register, Regional Assistant Commissioner of the Social Security Administration; Burke Johnson, Regional Representative of the Bureau of Disability Insurance, Social Security Administration; C. G. Fairchild, Assistant Commissioner of Education; and Charles O. Blalock, Director of the Division of Disability Determination.

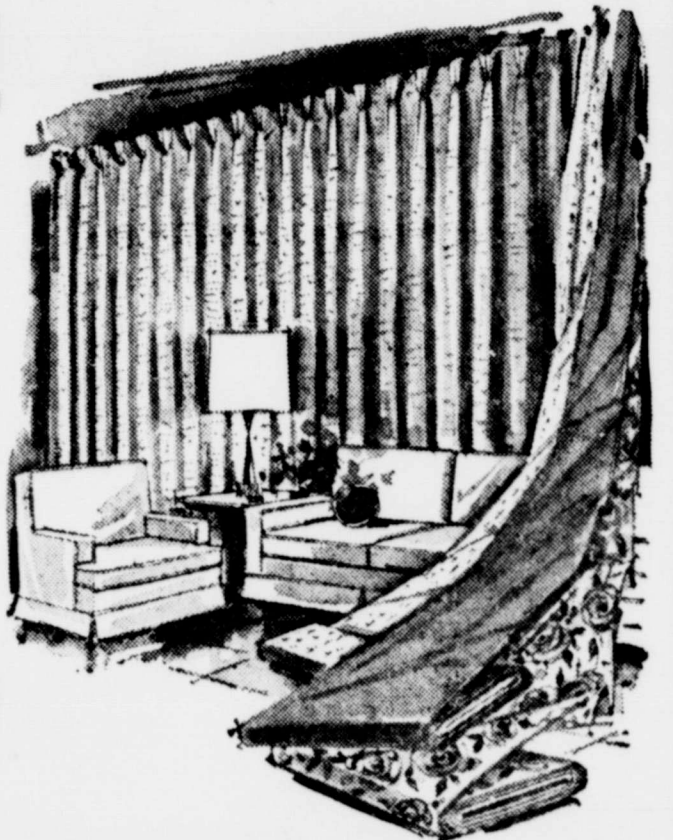
