Dept. Of Health Will Recommend Immunization

Last summer the prediction of a wide spread outbreak of influenza would occur in winter was widely publicized. Immunization against influenza was recommended for all individuals with debilitating diseases, for all pregnant women, and for all over 45 years of age. For individuals in critical conditions and trades.

Outbreaks of influenza like these have not been reported in the District of Columbia in thirteen states, including North and South Carolina, Maryland, Virginia, Delaware, Maryland, Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Ohio, Illinois, and Kansas. It is unlikely that Texas will be affected. Health authorities are urged to report the presence of influenza like illness. Forty Students BHS to Take Qualifying Tests

About forty students at Burk Burnett High School plan to take the 1963 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, M. J. Greenwald, counselor, announced today.

The test will be administered at the High School at 7:45 a. m. on Saturday, March 9th. All students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1964 should take the test at that time.

The qualifying test is a three-hour examination of educational achievement. The test is the first step in the ninth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, associations, unions, and individuals.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends on the extent of sponsor participation. In 1962, 1041 Merit Scholarships were awarded; 632 are provided by 151 sponsors and 409 by the Merit Corporation. There are 3,400 Merit scholars attending 403 colleges in the current academic year.

The test scores of students are examined in March will be reported to their schools by May 15. The scores are used by class advisors in many schools to help students make decision about college attendance and field of study.

Students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

Some 13,000 Semifinalists, highest scorers in each state, will be named early next year. Names of the Semifinalists are published in a booklet which is distributed to all colleges and to other sources of financial aid for undergraduates. Further, their names and scores are sent to the colleges they express an interest in attending as their first choice. The order of preference is not shown.

VIRGINIA, MINN., DAILY NEWS: "Often these days we read that youngsters, and even some adults, have sought violent redress against those who have criticized their failures and shortcomings. Usually, the comment on these happenings stresses the fact that the persons involved have sought a violent solution. That is indeed a problem of major consequence in present day society. But it perhaps tends to be ignored that the problem has another facet: the evidently increasing inability of people of all ages to take criticism."

TEMPE, ARIZ., NEWS: "Without doubt, the men and women who founded our republic knew that freedom to speak and to publish would be abused. They also knew that their liberty would not be safe unless they had the right to talk and write as they chose, and that is why they demanded that there be added to the new Constitution a Bill of Rights that spelled out these freedoms in black and white. They were right."

MELROSE, MASS., FREE PRESS: "Congress could not do it. The President of the United States couldn't do it. Even the courts can't do it. The question still pops up. Is government anti-business?

Many in Washington along with thousands all through the land think that government is actually anti-business.

There are others who take a differing position.

Their contention is that government is not actually anti-business. Rather, it is business-ignorant.

Both schools of thought have found ample confirmation for their views in the hassle that led to new rulings on expense account deductions for income tax purposes.

And even despite fact a mighty roar caused bureaucrats to revise some of the more radical regulations, even in its present form, the regulations show either an enmity toward, or an ignorance of business.

Some bureaucrats seem to feel that if Mr. A. buys Mr. B. a lunch, then Mr. A. should immediately get an order from Mr. B. In a free competitive society this seldom happens.

Cultivation of contacts is a long process, and a never ending one. The major deals on business, whether it be the establishment of a new dealership or setting up a franchise arrangement are usually not hastily concluded.

Both parties in such arrangements usually talk to many

people, and it is usually most necessary to sustain talks and contacts over a long period.

Because after all, business is still largely done by people with other people, and for a successful relationship in business, it is necessary to ascertain if there is an adequate degree of compatibility. This is not learned in discussions over a desk top.

Thus, business spends some money in entertaining to gain information, data, new ideas.

And in entertaining, business provides a substantial amount of employment for restaurant workers, entertainers, musicians, transportation workers.

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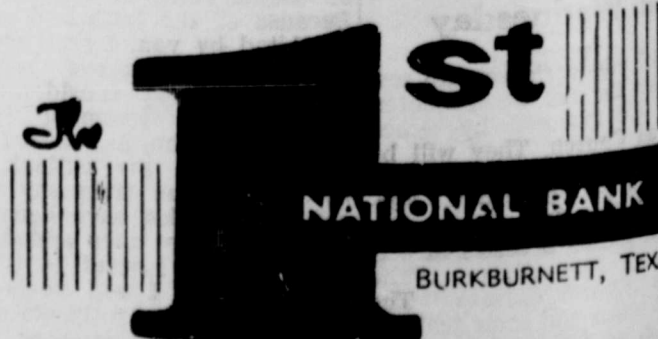

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The Law In Texas

WILLS? WHO INHERITS PROPERTY?

What will happen if you die without executing a will?

legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your right-ful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law

calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possi-

bilities cannot be covered by a general statement. There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the prop-

erty. For example, here is a general idea of how the COMMUNITY PROPERTY which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death. If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property. If, in addition, there are sur-

living children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half. Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive

only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants. An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

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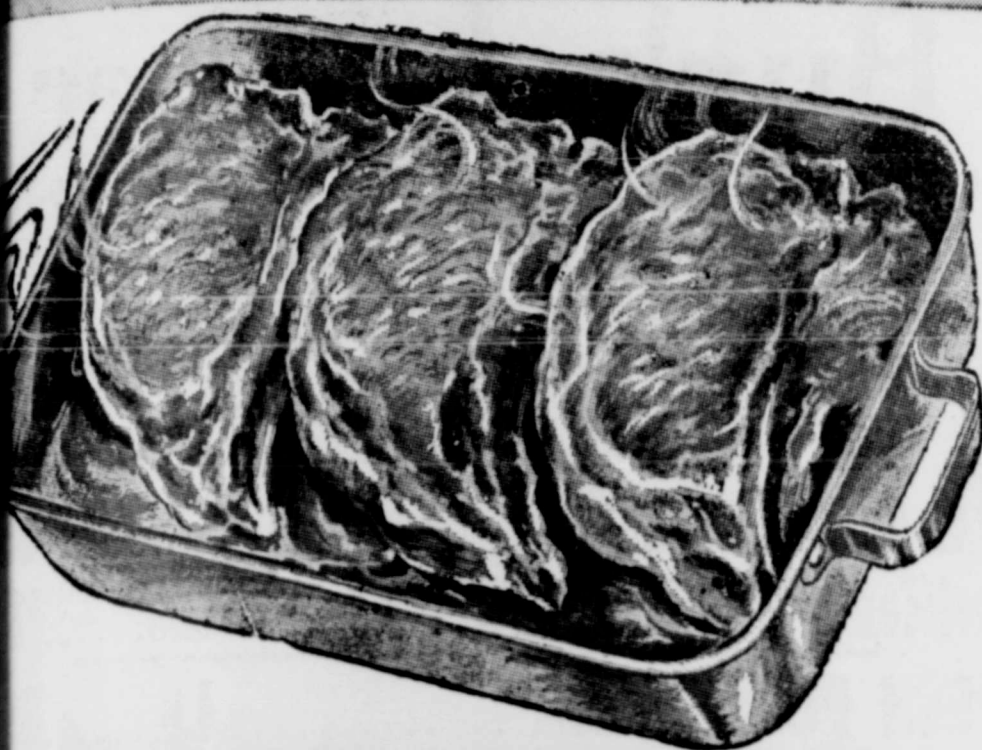

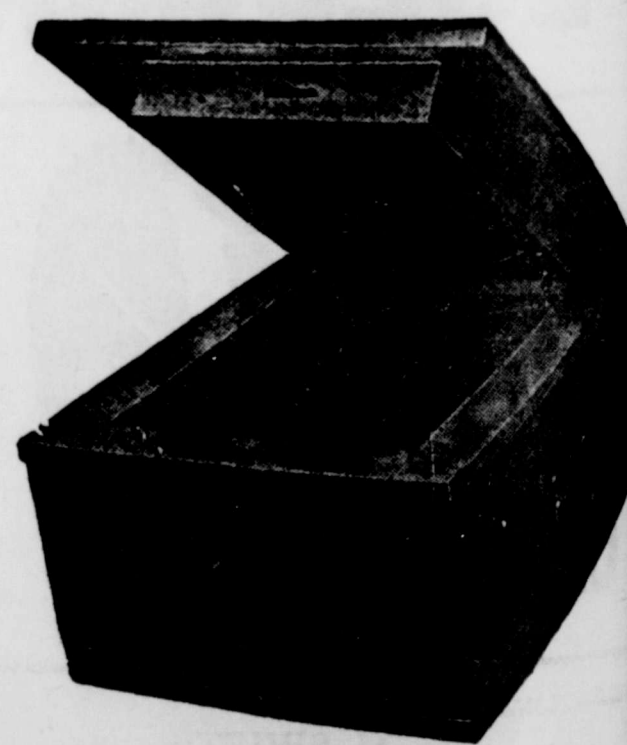

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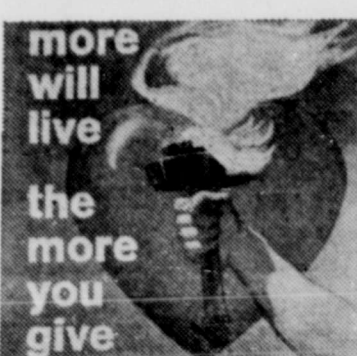

MUMPS VACCINE

Q. Is there a vaccine that will protect children from mumps?

A. A mumps vaccine prepared from killed virus has been available for the past few years. Unfortunately, it gives protection for only about a year. A live-virus vaccine is now being tested. If all goes well, the new vaccine, which is expected to give long-term protection, may be available within the next several years. The Russians claim to have perfected such a vaccine but it doesn't meet U.S. safety standards.

WHY OPERATIONS ARE EXPLAINED

Q. After an examination, our family doctor sent me to a surgeon who recommended that my thyroid be removed. I was willing until he began telling me all the things that could go wrong. Why do doctors try to scare people to death? Is all this necessary?

A. It is necessary and it isn't done to frighten patients. No one, not even a doctor, has the legal right to harm a person. But in all operations there is a certain amount of risk and this risk must be explained to, and accepted by, the patient. In the case of thyroid surgery, for example, the patient may lose his voice through no fault of the surgeon. This is an occasional aftermath of thyroid surgery and the patient must agree to accept this risk. The doctor can't assume responsibility for things over which he has no control. It is for such reasons that doctors explain what could happen. The patient can then weigh the risks against the hazards and agree to or refuse the treatment.
