STATE AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENTS TO CO- OPERATE IN HARD SURFACING OF STATE HIGHWAYS NUMBER 4 AND 117 THRU COUNTY

The voters of Ochiltree County will go to the polls next Tuesday, September 3 to vote on the most important issue that has ever come before the county. It is an election calling for the issuance of \$700,000 worth of bonds for the building and paving of a highway east and west and north and south through the county.

State and federal engineers have estimated that the county's part of the cost of paving these two highways will be \$700,000 and this is the amount called for in the election. But those that are interested in securing better roads for the Panhandle do not feel that there is a chance for it to ever cost the citizens of this county a cent in bonds.

Here is the proposition. There is now an action to secure a state highway bond issue for the state of Texas to be retarded by the payment of gasoline tax. This method of building state highways has already been adopted by almost thirty states in the union and most of the other states are now making preparations for state wide bond issues. This legislation failed to carry by only two votes at the last regular session of the legislature and it will be passed when the legislature convenes again in a regular session. Under the provisions of the state highway bond act, all counties who have voted bonds for the improvement of state highways, are reimbursed the amount of the bonds. That means that if Ochiltree votes this bond issue, we will be refunded our money as soon as the state wide act goes over.

Now some are saying that the thing to do is to wait until the state wide act is a reality. Well, we can tell you what will happen in the case of a county located so far from Austin as we are. The counties down state will get the roads first and then if there is anything left at the end of the ten year building program, we might get our roads paved up here. We are at the present paying a four cent gasoline tax, but where is the money going. It is going to pave highways in counties that are progressive enough to vote for the paving of their roads.

It takes a two-thirds majority to get this bond issue carried. That means that every vote for the bonds must go to the polls. Those that against will sure be there. For every vote against this issue, it will take two to offset, so make up your minds right now to work hard next Tuesday for the future of Ochiltree county by voting yourself and seeing that every eligible voter goes to the polls on that day. Vote for the bonds.

Many Citizens Favor Highway Bond Issue

Below are a few interviews secured by a Herald representative one afternoon this week. No special effort was made to cover the town or the country, just a few were run into up and down Main Street. Not one single person was encountered who did not favor the bond issue.

DAVE SHANKS—"Any way we consider the road bond, it is all to gain and nothing to lose. We will either get two paved highways or we lose them. Same price either way, or there will be no bonds issued."

J. L. DODSON—"I am for the bond issue because a paved road each way through our county will mean as much to us as another railroad."

FRED W. HOOD—"If we vote the bonds for a paved highway, it will mean that the state later will take them over and our paved highways will be paid for from gasoline tax rather than taxation on farming land. I am for it."

SAM HERBERT—"Some folks are against the bond issue because they say it will mean a re-location of Highway No. 4. These are separate issues. Highway No. 4 will be re-located whether the bond issue carries or not."

A. J. KELLY—"Why shouldn't we vote for the bonds? It means that the state and federal governments will take care of two-thirds of the

paving, and the state later will re-locate the other one-third. Isn't it getting paving for nothing?"

J. H. NEUFELD—"We will continue to help pay for paved highways whether we get them or not, even if this election fails to carry. Why shouldn't we have some paved roads in our county rather than help pay for the ones in Central and East Texas. Let us vote for the bonds."

P. DODSON—"If the state wide bond issue to take over paved highways and build new ones, does not carry, then the bonds we vote will never be issued. If we fail to vote the bonds, we will not have a chance to get the state to pay for paved roads through Ochiltree County for years to come. We can't make a mistake in putting this issue across."

M. R. COFFER—"It is my understanding that if all the people in Ochiltree County really understand this bond issue, it would go over with a bang. It means roads for the county, because the state will take over the bonds later. Is the state does not vote the state wide issue in 1931, then the bonds here will never be issued. There is no law to make us issue the bonds if the state wide issue fails."

L. S. HOBBS—"My faith in Ochiltree County will be even greater if they vote the bonds for paved roads than it has ever been. It's the greatest investment they can make."

JACK ALLEN—"I am for the road bond issue to be voted on by the people of Ochiltree County next Tuesday, September 3, on account of our geographical situation and for the immense benefit it will be towards the proper development of the greatest stock farming district in the entire Southwest."

JACK O. LUSHER—"We are seeking to settle Ochiltree county, and I firmly believe paved highways through the county will do more to aid the development than anything we could do. It will bring thousands of tourists through here, who will tell the world of our resources. Many who drive through will come back and settle."

J. V. STUMP—"Paved highways are the equivalent of railroads. Many here want us to offer a bonus for another railroad. Why not get two paved highways without a bonus, and paid for by the State and Federal Governments. I am for it."

GEO. M. PERRY—"We can't afford to defeat this bond issue. If we do, we will not have a chance to get the state to help us pave for years to come. The plan of the State is to take over outstanding road bonds, before helping counties that have not voted them, if the State wide issue carries. Then why not be ready to unload our bonds on the gas tax fund? First come, first served."

J. C. BEEVER—"I am in favor

of the bond issue for the following reasons: it will keep us up with the rest of the country, and cause more development in Ochiltree County than we have ever seen before; from an economical standpoint there would be enough saving on cars to pay the interest on the bonds, which I don't think we will ever have to pay. We should all go to the polls and vote the bonds."

W. W. McLARTY—"People do not realize the great benefits that are derived from paved highways and the resultant tourist travel. Don E. Woodward, a former resident of Perryton, now located at Raton, N. M., says that their tourist travel alone means the difference between a prosperous city and a dead number. Paved highways will bring the stranger into our country and our city. A part of these will come back, buy land, establish homes and become citizens. Vote for the bond issue."

L. L. LANCE—"Texas has a state gasoline tax of four cents per gallon. If Ochiltree County votes the \$700,000.00 highway bond, we will be in a position to get back the 4c per gallon tax that we pay. If we do not vote the bonds, then our 4c tax will go to pave highways in other parts of the state."

R. T. SHINDLER—"I feel that if Ochiltree County fails to vote this bond issue, it will retard the paving of our state highways for at least five years. It looks like a cer-

tainty that the state highway bond issue will carry. The first returns from the state highway bond issue will go to reimburse the counties that have already voted bonds for hard surfacing all state highways will start. Ochiltree could not expect to get any roads for at least five years and probably ten. You know we are a long distance from Austin and we will get "ours" only after the "boys" down in the state have been taken care of. By all means go to the polls and vote for the bonds."

W. B. LaMASTER—"I am voting for the highway bond issue because I feel that it will be a great step forward for Ochiltree County, and I think that this wonderful improvement will never cost the tax-payers of this county one cent. The state wide highway bond issue will carry and we will be refunded every cent of our bond issue."

C. E. WOODS—"Too much significance is being stressed on the proposed change of State Highway No. 4. As I understand the situation, this highway is going to be changed regardless of the outcome of this election. The state and federal governments are paying two-thirds of the cost and they are going to select the shortest and most practical route between Perryton and Canadian. Don't fail to cast your vote for the bonds if you want to see Ochiltree County go forward."

Culling Time Is Here

Get the Non-layer Out of the Flock; Cut Out the Lazy "Star Boarders" Now

A red, large comb . . . prominent eyes . . . white thin shanks . . . a wide long back, these things indicate the layers in your flock and the ones that will make you money. In every flock there is the dead-beat, says the mid-summer number of the Poultryman in reminding the poultryman that, he should cull his flock during August and September.

"Separating the short time layers from the long time layers is easy if the flock has been properly fed," the magazine says in telling the poultryman of his obligation.

The low egg producer can be very easily detected by a few outward signs such as a pale, small shriveled comb; yellow, dry vent; dull sunken eyes; yellow, round shanks. Pelvic bones that are close together, hard and rigid also indicate the low egg producer. The hen's body that is shallow and tight from the pelvic bone to the breast bone and that has a narrow short back in most cases is not a heavy layer.

Getting rid of those non-layers will be one of the biggest steps you ever took toward getting more money from chickens. Your County agent will be glad to help you with your culling. Your local Purina dealer also will be glad to help you. August and September are the ideal months for culling the flock, the Poultryman concludes.

RECORD MAKING COW MILKED BY MACHINE

A four-year-old Holstein cow owned by Charles Hughes and Son of Neenah, Wisconsin, has set a new national record in milk production. Although milked but twice daily, says the research department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers, she produced 682.48 pounds of butterfat (853 pounds butter) in 365 days and 20,114 pounds of milk. This is an average production of two and one-third pounds of butter a day and nearly seven gallons of milk per day throughout the year.

This cow was milked with a milking machine during the entire test period. The research department points out that machine milking is often more regular and uniform than hand milking and that uniformity and regularity in milking is favorable toward a constantly high production.

HOME VS. CUSTOM GRINDING OF FEED

Both home and custom grinding of feed among dairymen, poultrymen and livestock men seems to be on the increase, observes the research department of the National Association of Farm Equipment

Manufacturers. Under average conditions, custom grinding is generally considered cheaper for the farmer who needs less than 200 bushels of ground feed per year. On farms using more than 400 bushels of ground feed in the course of a year, grinding can be done at home with individual equipment at a considerable saving. If as much as 700 bushels of grain are to be ground annually, an individual grinder on the farm will do the job at about half the cost of the custom grinding.

CULLS

Farming, like any other business, is a continuous process of culling the good from the inferior. Good ideas must be separated from bad ideas and good methods from poor methods. Other things being equal the farming business which harbors the fewest culls should be most successful.

Because of changing conditions in agriculture, a type of animal, a crop variety or a method of farming which was the best available yesterday may be out of date tomorrow, and inferior to more recent types varieties or methods. That which was sound and progressive a few years ago may be obsolete and unprofitable today because of the progress of agriculture.

The need for constant culling applies to every phase of farming. Despite the efforts and progress of dairymen, it is generally estimated that approximately one-third of the dairy cows on farms today are unprofitable. Many farm poultry flocks are made up of a high percentage of culls. In 56 counties of one state, more than 115,000 unprofitable hens were culled and sold last year, saving the flock owners an estimated sum of \$92,000 for feed alone. Something like 42,000,000 acres of oats are grown in the United States every year, although no one ever included oats in the list of paying crops, and such crops as barley and soybeans have been demonstrated as more profitable.

The feeling has grown more prevalent in recent years that inefficient methods and practices in farming are as wasteful and unprofitable as undesirable livestock or crops. A worn out - of date machine or piece of equipment is just as much a cull as a boarder cow. The poor cow can be replaced with a higher producer and the worn-out, inefficient machine can be replaced by equipment which does the work quicker, cheaper and better.

Fred flavors and odors in milk are most frequently caused by succulent feeds. When fed to dairy cows one hour before milking, silage made from corn, alfalfa, sweet clover, or soy beans; and green alfalfa, cabbage, turnips, rape, and kale seriously affect the flavor and odor of milk. Milk is affected only slightly by green rye, green cowpeas.

BROOMCORN MARKET REVIEW

Broomcorn marketing during July and August to date was moderate and confined principally to rather limited stocks stored at country points and at terminal markets. Manufacturers, for the most part, operated on prior purchases. Shipments from the several producing sections during June and July totaled 80 carloads. Of these, Colorado shipped 14 carloads, Kansas 15, Oklahoma 32, Illinois 17, and Texas 2. These shipments were old-crop broomcorn and largely storage stocks. Movement from farms during the above period was negligible.

As of August 1, farm holdings were at the minimum, sales stocks were seasonally reduced and the limited supplies comprising sale holdings were expected to exert little, if any, price influence on new crop offerings. As against this situation, however, broomcorn already marketed and in manufacturers' hands amounted to about four months' factory working stocks and was fairly distributed so the disposition of manufacturers generally to invest heavily in new crop this month doubtless will be largely governed by the year's prospective supply as measured against the expected demand for brooms. With a production forecast on July 1, of \$2,800 tons and a carryover estimated at 27,900 tons or some 80,700 tons the prospective supplies for the year to June 1, admittedly appeared amply adequate for requirements, a substantial carryover and a draggy opening market for August.

Since then, however, prospects in

Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico, collectively, have been reduced 4,700 tons and while Illinois and Missouri prospects increased 300 tons, the tonnage prospects toll have decreased 4,400 tons during July, reflecting a total production on August 1 of 48,400 tons. This is approximately 4,000 tons under last year's "cut up" and exports and about 6,000 tons under the past seven-year production average. High temperatures and lack of moisture in growing areas were largely responsible for the 8 per cent decline in the broomcorn production outlook during July.

Based on August 1 outlook, the production forecast, together with the carryover of 27,900 tons, is approximately 4,000 tons less broomcorn than was available last year when prices prevailed at steady to higher prices throughout the year. If this year's production, therefore, does not exceed present estimates and the broom business and exports continue at the reported rate of last year, the present tonnage forecast and carryover combined would supply consuming demand and provide a carryover on June 1, 1930 of about 24,000 tons compared to 27,900 tons last year as against the past several year average of approximately 20,500 tons.

Except in the extreme Northwest and parts of New Mexico, conditions since August 1 have continued distinctly unfavorable for new-crop broomcorn. High temperatures with no precipitation of consequence prevailed in the Lindsey district where approximately 40 per cent of Oklahoma's production is grown. Reports from this section indicate

that broomcorn, while holding up deterioration as a result of the intense heat, scant soil moisture and hot dry winds. In the Elk-Leedy-Fairview districts conditions are reported similar to those at Lindsay but in western Oklahoma conditions have been somewhat relieved by scattered showers, particularly at Alva and Beaver. Colorado and Kansas territory apparently has fared somewhat better than other sections with rains varying from one-half to one and one-half inches. New Mexico conditions are regarded as favorable in the southern sections but additional moisture is needed in the Tucumcari and San Jon sections. Good growing weather is reported generally in Illinois.

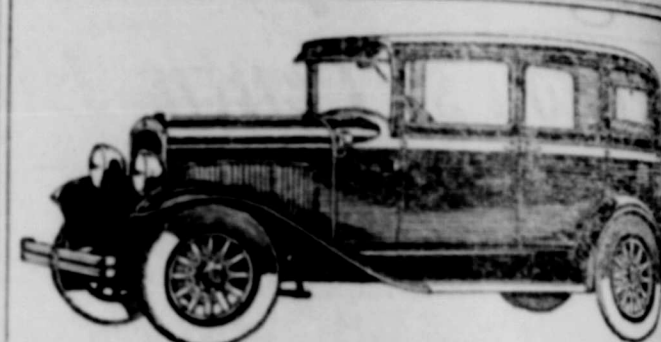
Reports from the producing section, has matured rapidly. Pulling is well under way at Lindsay and at Beaville, Texas; a few crops are being pulled in West-Central Oklahoma districts and the northwest is expected to have broomcorn harvested by September 1. Broomcorn now in the bale in the earlier

producing sections is reported in dry, sound merchantable condition and of somewhat better average quality than were the early crops last year.

New crop broomcorn is being marketed at Lindsay in a small way but the amount available to date is limited and few producers or dealers have made their position known in the matter of prices. Not enough broomcorn, in fact, has yet been marketed to establish definite market quotations. Old crop Lindsay at Wichita is being held from \$140 to \$160 per ton with Western Dwarf held principally from \$85 to \$130 per ton according to quality. Offers for new crop Lindsay ranged

from \$110.00 to \$160.00 with a purchase reported within this range.

There is no "cure-all" for all of the worms that infest poultry, other animals. Sunday School Lesson

for September 1
EZRA'S RETURN TO JERUSALEM
Ezra 7:6-10; 8: 21-23, 31, 32

About 30 years after the first return to Jerusalem from Babylon, under Zerubbabel, Ezra led a second expedition of size. There was the constant urge upon the devout Jew to have part in the restoration in the land which had given him in perpetuity in Jehovah. This week of leadership had become a matter of conscience to Ezra as he meditated on the entire situation, for he "had set his heart to seek the law of Jehovah and to do it, and to teach the Israel statutes and ordinances."

Authorization had been obtained from King Artaxerxes and special royal favors were granted. There is a fine admixture of faith and prudence in Ezra. Though such treasure was carried, no armed escort was requested. Such a request could not be made in view of the way in which he declared concerning the keeping power of Jehovah. A survey ship was made at the river of Abar. When the census was taken it was discovered that not a Levite was in the company. From of old this tribe had furnished those who ministered in the worship of sacrifices and offerings, and these were very elaborate. At once chosen men were sent back to the brethren and thirty-nine descendants of Levi were found who had become emergency men to go with the expedition. They also secured

220 Nethenim, whose duties were less formal in the worship but highly essential.

Money and valuables to the extent of \$5,000,000 had been given by the king and fellow Hebrews. Ezra did not assume the responsibility for its care but appointed twelve priests and ten laymen as custodians.

Ezra took three days to size up the general situation and then reforms began, for base things had been established in the comparatively few years of residence by the earlier pilgrims. They had intermarried with the Canaanites and seven other nations (9: 1). Herein had been the basic cause of the former idolatries which made the captivity necessary. Ezra tore his garments, hair and beard and then "sat down conounded." Now the others could take in the situation and Ezra was joined by those "that trembled at the words of the God of Israel." He then wives were put away. The penalty for any return to such alliance was to be punished with national ostracism. Ezra made it clear that the Lord's favor could be reckoned on only when He was truly obeyed. His working principle is stated in the Golden Text "The hand of our God is upon all them for good that seek Him."

RAISE HERD RECORD 5,000 POUNDS PER COW

The average milk production of a herd of dairy cows in Toga county, New York was raised 5,000 pounds per year by the employment of modern methods. The herd, which is owned by K. Bradley and Giles Cartwright of Spencer, had an average production of 11,856 pounds of milk for the testing year 1928-29. The increase transferred the herd from the doubtful columns to a profitable basis.

Gordon Holley, Dairy Herd Improvement Association representative who tested the herd, comments on this exceptional record as follows: "This herd produced 5,000 pounds more milk per cow this year than a year ago. The in-

creased production can be accounted for by: (1) better feeding and general management, (2) water buckets (drinking cups), (3) better ventilation and more comfortable stalls."

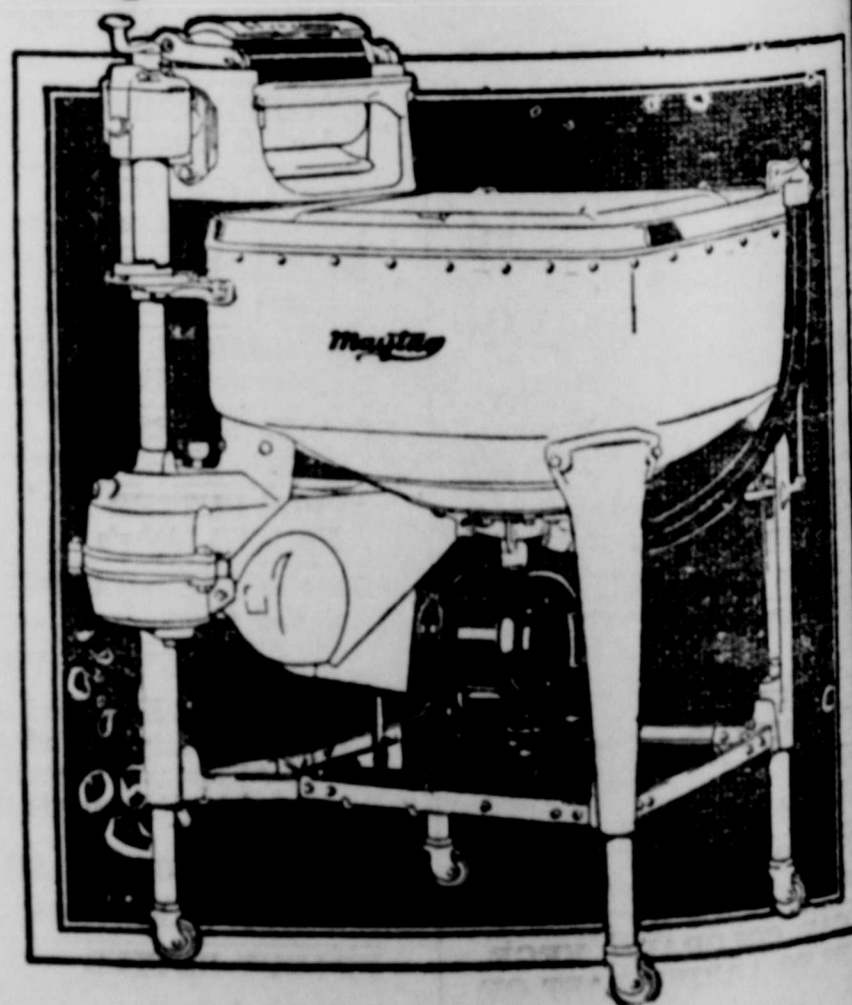

From May and June Chicks In November

May-June about it? Let's give them every chance to go ahead. Let them have the things they need to develop their egg-producing systems; body frames, tissues, muscles, feathers and vital organs. Watch them closely. See that they are kept free from contaminated or unclean soil. Keep them from running and mingling with the early hatched chicks. Make sure that their houses are well-aired at nights and that they have shade on the hot days.

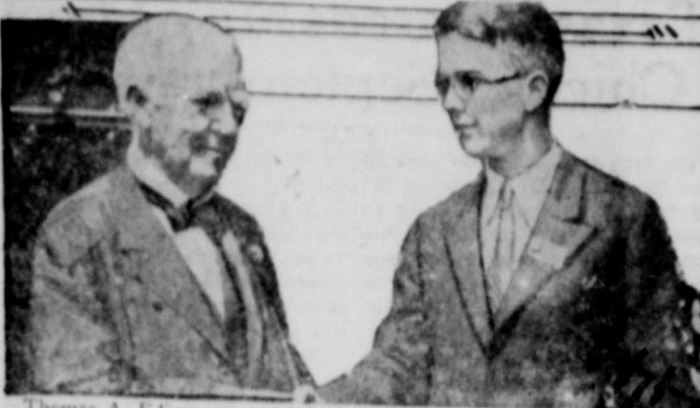
"Think about their feed," the article says. "A lot depends on how we feed. Still more on what we feed. By all means full-feed. Nothing delays late-hatched chicks more than stinting on the feed. Good feed and plenty of it hustles them along. Keep the mash hoppers filled with a growing mash that promotes a steady development. Keep plenty of cool clean water near the feed hoppers."

Follow this system out and late-hatched chicks will be well-developed, fully matured, and fit for the job of laying as early as November. We'll be gathering eggs at the time we can put real money into our pockets. This year, our late-May and early-June chicks instead of being profit takers will be profit makers."

OUR CHANGING WINDS

The claims of pioneers that present-day winds are feeble compared with stiff breezes that whipped about Plains 30 and 40 years ago have been substantiated by the weather man. H. T. Colman, observer at the Amarillo weather bureau, exhibits the official records in proof of the assertion that wind velocity in the Panhandle has decreased some 50 per cent in as many years, or less time.

Mr. Colman's explanation of the change is most interesting. Building of towns and cultivation of the soil are responsible. Cultivated areas absorb the heat from the sun's rays, causing a more even heating of the Plains country than prevailed during the era of the unbroken prairie. Unequal heating resulted in violent changes.

The weather man offers no support, however, to those who tell about the "hard winters" once common in the Panhandle but unknown to the present generation. Mr. Colman's records bear him out in the statement severe cold spells visit the Panhandle about every 10 years, and that there has been no gradual softening of the temperatures. In other words the cold spells of today, when they do hit, are just as cold as the worst blizzards of the '30's.

The same holds true in regard to rainfall, he also reminds us. We are having no more rainfall, on a yearly average, than has been recorded here since the opening of the weather station.

Weather always is of interest, and Mr. Colman's observations on precipitation, temperatures and wind are most interesting as well as enlightening—Amarillo News.

EDUCATING FOR TOMORROW

The opening of the school year will bring relief to the young people who find prolonged leisure burdensome and tedious. To others it will mean the added joy of the school atmosphere and environment.

To some parents it will bring relief from the distraction of keeping children occupied and entertained. To others it will mean heavy hearts when they see for the first time the school sharing with the home in the training of the child. To some young people it will mean a struggle to give up a remunerative position for what may seem to them less profitable work.

Others will have a consciousness that no matter how lucrative the position, it will be more profitable to resume schooling. These view education in terms of the future returns. Financial needs may dictate that others continue their earnings to permit resumption of the schooling later on. This training will be profitable, as a year of any work should produce, in addition to the disciplinary value, a more wholesome regard for the advantages of education. The danger to this group is the "cooling process"

that takes place during such intervals, with a resultant diminishing interest.

As a rule, parents are more concerned about adequate schooling than the child—this because of the fact that if they have been educated they appreciate its value, and if they have not, they are conscious of their loss.

Young people may argue that they have sufficient training to meet future requirements. It is difficult to foresee what these requirements may be. Because of rapidly changing standards, people are ever confronted with situations they could not have foreseen a decade ago. In farming, in industry and in business, as well as the professions, we find more exacting demands. It is reasonable to predict that requirements in all such lines will continue to be raised.

A like situation exists in adult life in that there are many who ten years ago decided they had sufficient training to meet future requirements. In later years they found it necessary to raise the standards to meet increasing opportunities. It has meant the passing of these opportunities or the resump-

tion of educational pursuits. Our colleges, universities, correspondence schools, part time schools and night schools bear testimony to this situation. In them we find many adults who have returned to build up the foundation neglected in youth.

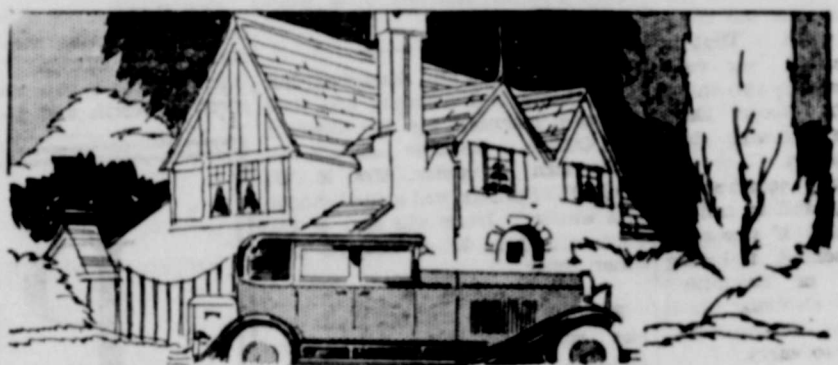
It is hard to say when a boy or girl has had sufficient training. Such training usually increases opportunities as well as incomes. It would seem a wise policy to be liberal in estimating the amount of educational training required rather than be forced to acquire it at an age when they are less susceptible to it. The fact that young people in increasing numbers are today taking this precaution makes the situation more emphatic and the demand more imperative. Boards of education and school officials, appreciating this situation, have made adequate provisions for every demand. It rests with the young people and their parents to do the rest. They should at least consult with school officials before deciding to terminate schooling.

However, when the county commissioners of Hutchinson county met on Tuesday to officially canvass the returns, it was found that the bonds had lost by four votes. That is, the proposition lacked four votes of receiving the necessary two-thirds majority. Today's Borger Daily Herald carries the following story in regard to the election.

"Hutchinson county commissioners today were prepared to call an election immediately if necessary petitions are presented, following official tabulation of Saturday's \$150,000 road bond election, which lacked four votes of the necessary two-thirds majority to carry.

"The final vote as tabulated by the commissioners was 376 for and 195 against the proposition. A petition bearing 50 qualified voters names will suffice to call a second election, according to County Judge H. M. Hood.

"The county commissioners have either the alternative of calling another election or issuing road improvement warrants, to complete this project. Just which action they would take was not known today, although it is understood that the court is united on taking a policy that will insure quickest action on completing the paving of high-

way No. 117 from Stinnett to the north county line.

"It is understood that representatives of the Borger chamber of commerce have employed attorneys to contest the results of the election. It is thought that these attorneys will allege that over 100 illegal votes were cast, and that a majority of these illegal votes were cast in one box."—Spearman Reporter.

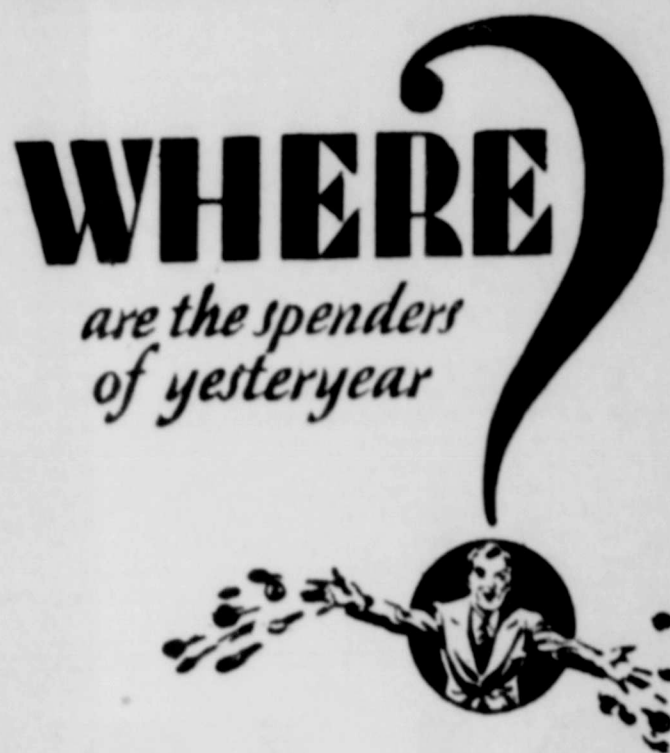

this year," said Jack Allen. "Ninety per cent of the land in the territory is tillable and at this time 65 per cent is in cultivation."

Wheat spraying heavy.

Mr. Allen stated that the average rainfall for the past six years was 23.4 inches with a minimum of 13 inches in 1925 and a maximum of 36.75 in 1928. More than 4,500,000 bushels of wheat have been shipped out of the trade territory this season.

Congressman Martin Jones praised the new spirit of co-operation evidenced by the luncheon of the Amarilloans and Perrytonites and cited examples of what such co-operation could accomplish.

"Building penitents in Perryton for this year total more than \$520.00," said B. B. Kent. "There have been 90 new residences erected this year and many others are going up. Sixteen and one-half blocks of paving have been put in, contract has been let for seven additional blocks and the city council now has petitions asking for thirty-seven blocks."

"Perryton's bank deposits were \$2,213,000 on July 22 more than double what they were on July 1."

Mr. Kent also told of the Perryton school system, which has \$224,000 invested in buildings with 1100 students and which maintains ten buses to bring out-of-town students to school.

These other cities want our business, but after all blood is thicker than water and we'd like to help you if you'd let us."
