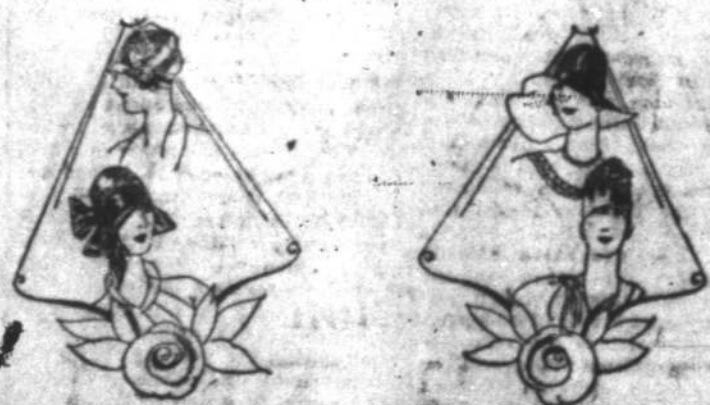

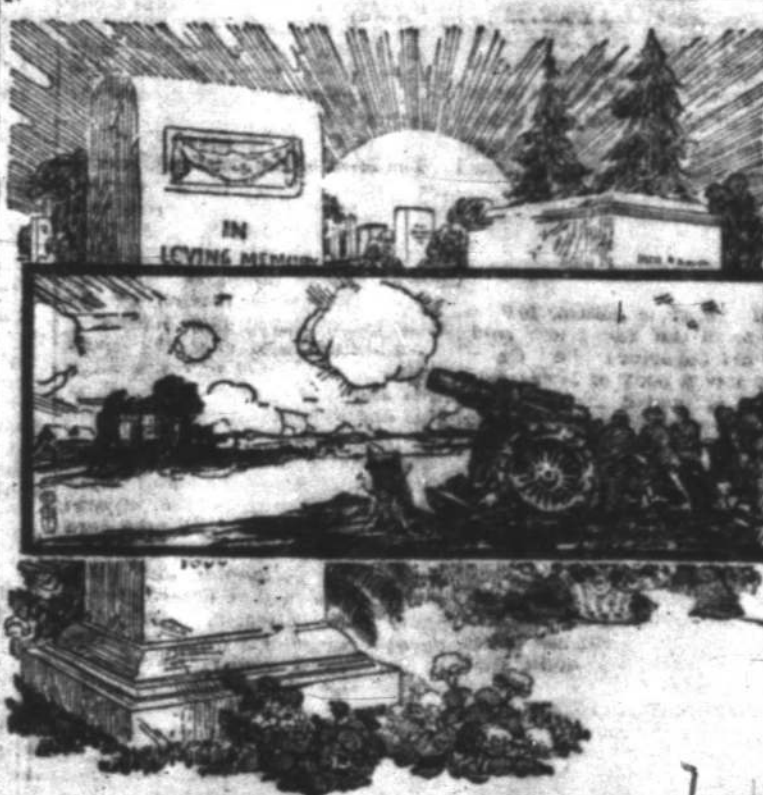

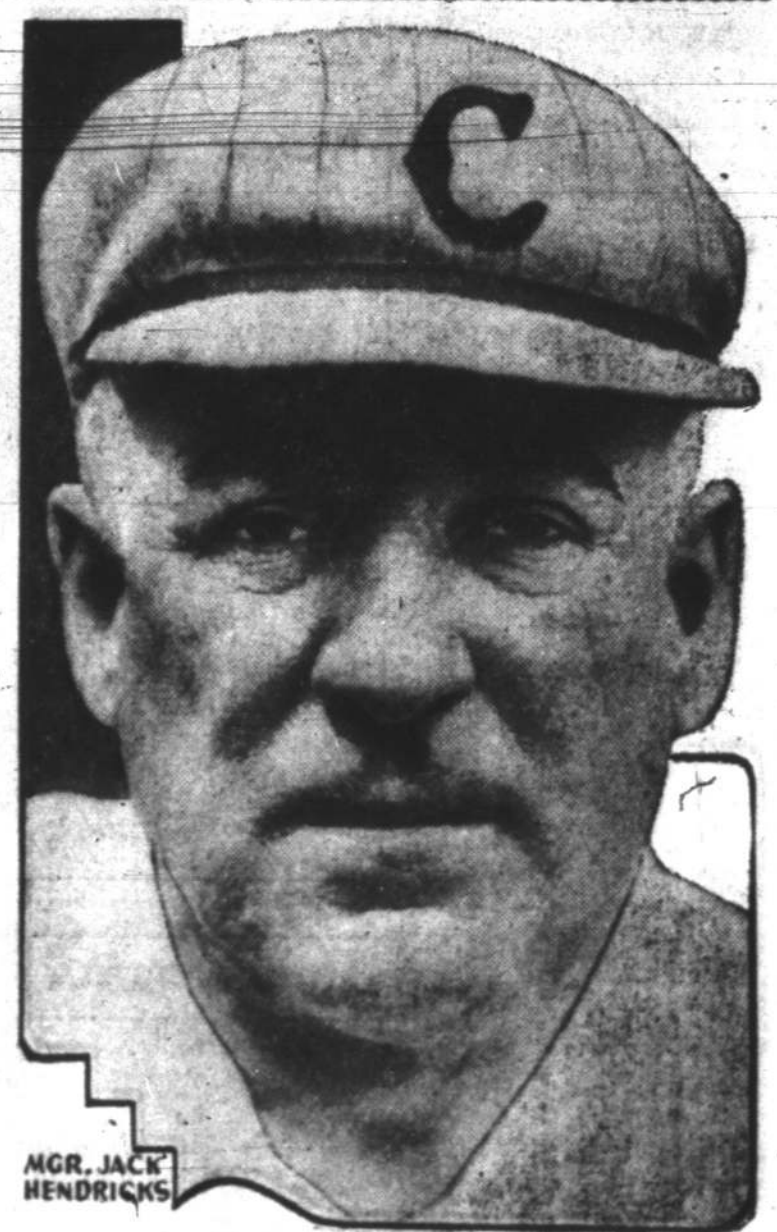

DAYS OF PREPARATION

Wise business men in times of depression realize that that is the time in which to build for future operations. If a manufacturer needs additional equipment or a larger plant, if he is at all wise, he buys equipment or builds the plant during periods of depression when men who lack wisdom are sitting down bemoaning their inability to sell their goods. Wise investors sell when everybody else is trying to buy and buy when everybody else is trying to sell. There are thousands of people in the South abundantly able financially to carry out building operations or improvements to their homes or grounds which they have had in mind to do but who are unwisely sitting down awaiting a revival of activity. If all the people of the South who are financially able to do so would build now when material is low and when wages are less than they were a year ago, there would come a very quick and permanent revival of business activity throughout that section. Indeed, the same thing is true as to the whole country. Every man who has a piece of ground that he hopes some day to improve, a house that needs painting or plumbing or carpentering; every man who intends to build a house or a store and who is financially able to do some of these various things and yet is hesitating to spend the money merely because things are less active than they were, is proving that he is not a wise business man nor a wise investor. There is no justification for sitting down supinely and sucking one's thumb and bemoaning one's sad fate merely because a man is less prosperous than he would like to be. There is probably not a single man in America who has not had his trials and tribulations in finance and probably his "downs" have been more severe than his "ups." It is only by taking fresh courage, or as the old saying goes, "spitting on his hands and taking a fresh hold," that the successful business men of the country have made their misfortunes their stepping stones to higher things. The people of the South might well study the fearful conditions which prevailed throughout their section after the Civil War, when poverty ruled the whole South and held it in a deadly grip. With devastated farms, with burned dwellings and destroyed fences, with livestock practically all gone to feed the famishing armies of the Confederacy, with gaunt woe-ruling where great wealth had existed, the leaders of the South, with a courage as great as that which carried them to the front on the battlefield, began the rebuilding of the South. Miracles were worked by them. These achievements are the marvel of the age. They wrought the greatest epic in material affairs that the world has known.

Some people have a habit of standing still and waiting for something to happen. The best plan is to try to make something happen. Some people who have been thinking about building and who are hesitating to go ahead are waiting, like Micawber, for something to turn up, but the only thing that can turn up under standing conditions is the higher cost of doing in the future when everybody is busy, labor scarce and materials in great demand, when they can be done now at much less cost. If your dwelling needs painting or repairing, now is the time to do it. If carpenter work is needed put a carpenter on the job. He needs the work and you need the work done. If you live on the farm and are thinking of doing some improving, why not go ahead with it now while you are waiting for the rain to plant your crop. It's a good time to do these odd jobs when the farm work does not have to be done. If you are going to build a home this fall better build it now, while material is cheap and labor plentiful. The creation of employment for idle workmen is a religious duty that every man owes to humanity and to God himself to the utmost extent of his ability. No man

has a right to be a loafer, it matters not how great his wealth may be. Men of great wealth and ability owe to their country the responsibility of doing things in a big way, which will add to its prosperity and thus prove that they are not simply drones upon society. The same responsibility to a lesser degree rests upon the man of more moderate means. We once read the story of Napoleon who in one of his battles felt that he had lost and ordered the drummer boy to beat retreat. The youngster timidly stated that he did not know how to beat a retreat, that he never had learned to do that, but he beat a march that would make the deal soldiers fight. He was given permission to rattle the march, and the forces rallied to his wonderful efforts, and the battle was won. What this country needs to day is a march and not a retreat. Lubbock can go forward, and she will. There is not a Lubbock man who knows how to retreat. There is not a citizen here that knows what it is for Lubbock to stand still. There is not a one that ever saw Lubbock fail to make good progress, and she has never stopped. Look at the business going on in Lubbock today. People sometimes get discouraged but there is something for people to be encouraged over even in the most trying times. There is so much for this country to rejoice over, that it seems queer that anyone would even think of complaining.

We heard a new definition the other day of a pessimist. It is said that it was an animal that was blind wandering around in a black, dark cellar, looking for a black cat that was not there. We do not see any occasion for pessimists in this country. To begin with we do not have the dark cellars nor the black cats. The thing for Lubbock to do is to beat a march, and the responsibility of beating the march rests upon the shoulders of the citizens of Lubbock. Let's go!

PROBLEMS

Indeed some of the biggest problems will have to be solved in repairing the losses sustained by the floods that are still raging in some of the eastern States. Untold damages have been wrought. The imagination of the human mind has been smashed by the mere opening of the floodgates and the work of human hands and minds has proven futile when called upon to cope with the floods of the past weeks.

The movement to hold a meeting of United States Senators and Representatives at Memphis in the near future for the purpose of viewing the Mississippi flood situation is wise and opportune. Now is the time to weigh the matter, to lay plans to prevent future recurrences of the present disaster.

There is no necessity to impress the fact that this is the nation's problem. That long has been accepted. Though local levee boards have spent probably \$2 for every dollar expended by the Government flood control in this river basin of almost continental scope is the task of the Nation.

Nor is the question, what to do, to be decided. This is a matter for experts. It is the duty of Congress to make such appropriations as are necessary to put into effect the most feasible plans of curbing the turbulent stream which in times like the present menaces hundreds of thousands of lives and threatens to engulf thousands of square miles of rich farmland. It is the duty of Congress to call for estimates of this tremendous undertaking and prepare to meet them.

Such estimates are likely to be large. Writing in the New York Times, Lieut. Col. J. R. Slatery, formerly District Engineer in the Third Mississippi River District, declares: "The construction of the Panama Canal, which offered engineering difficulties no more formidable than those that confront the Mississippi River Commission, cost about \$360,000,000. When we add up the losses incurred in the Mississippi Valley over the last century even this huge sum is dwarfed by the total. And when we consider the advantages that would accrue to the country's greatest waterway and valley if a levee system were built that would withstand an onslaught as terrific as that of 1927, even half a million dollars would not be too large a sum to pay for protection."

As a student of the river, Colonel Slatery clings to the levee system as the best means of protection. Reforestation in time would help, he holds, but it would take 50 years to effect. In the interim there would be the constant menace of floods. Reservoirs to hold the excess waters of rising tributaries, he declares, would be both expensive and impractical. Outlets, cutoffs and diversion proposals he dismisses as visionary. At the time of writing this article there had been five breaks in the main levee. This fact he contrasts with fourteen crevasses in 1912, 10 in 1913, and 712 in the three years, 1882, 1883, 1884, to emphasize the point that the system's effectiveness had greatly improved and that it was possible to hope for a more effective curb on the turbulent river by means of levees.

Whatever the answer to the problem, the Nation must face its obligation.

One great man has said, "When there is so much to be done, why should anyone be idle." That's a mighty good slogan. There is much to be done in Lubbock and we should all be up and at it.

SO THINK WE

The legion convention that is scheduled for Lubbock soon is to be one of the biggest gatherings that has been held here, and it is composed of men that we once thought were the greatest fellows in the world, and they were during the world war, and they are now. Let's do them every honor possible.

Lubbock must have a large assembly hall. It is impossible to go forward as we should without a place to meet and hold conventions.

While business is not rushing business men have a good opportunity to get these places of business in epic and open condition for the rush of business that is sure to follow. The same is true of the home. It can be put in order while there is not a rush of business to require all of the time of the members of the family. Paint up, clean up, repair the yard fences and the house, and get ready for big business that is sure to come.

When the oil operators open for business again, there will in all probability be one of the greatest demands for office space ever known in Lubbock. There will be demands for good dwelling houses, too, and those who have some building now should put them in order for there will be need for them in the near future.

Scarceness leaves down more towns than anything else. Where the people are selfish and narrow the town cannot amount to a great deal. Divided citizenship cannot build towns. It takes cooperation, and all pulling together. Lubbock has been very free from this kind of people in the past, and it should continue to put things over as a unit. Cooperation has paved streets, built hotels and railroads, and now let's keep on building.

We do not know whether we are interpreted the short editorial in the Amarillo paper recently to mean that that city is about to fail in securing the necessary amount of money for the removal of the city from the Amarillo, but it sounded very much like it. The trouble seems to be that several prominent men wanted it on their land or not at all. That's a tick-tack stuff, and we thought Amarillo had passed that stage long ago.

Amarillo fans were getting all blue the other day when one of their men put a homer over, and the time changed. Amarillo has always been good sports—when things went her way.

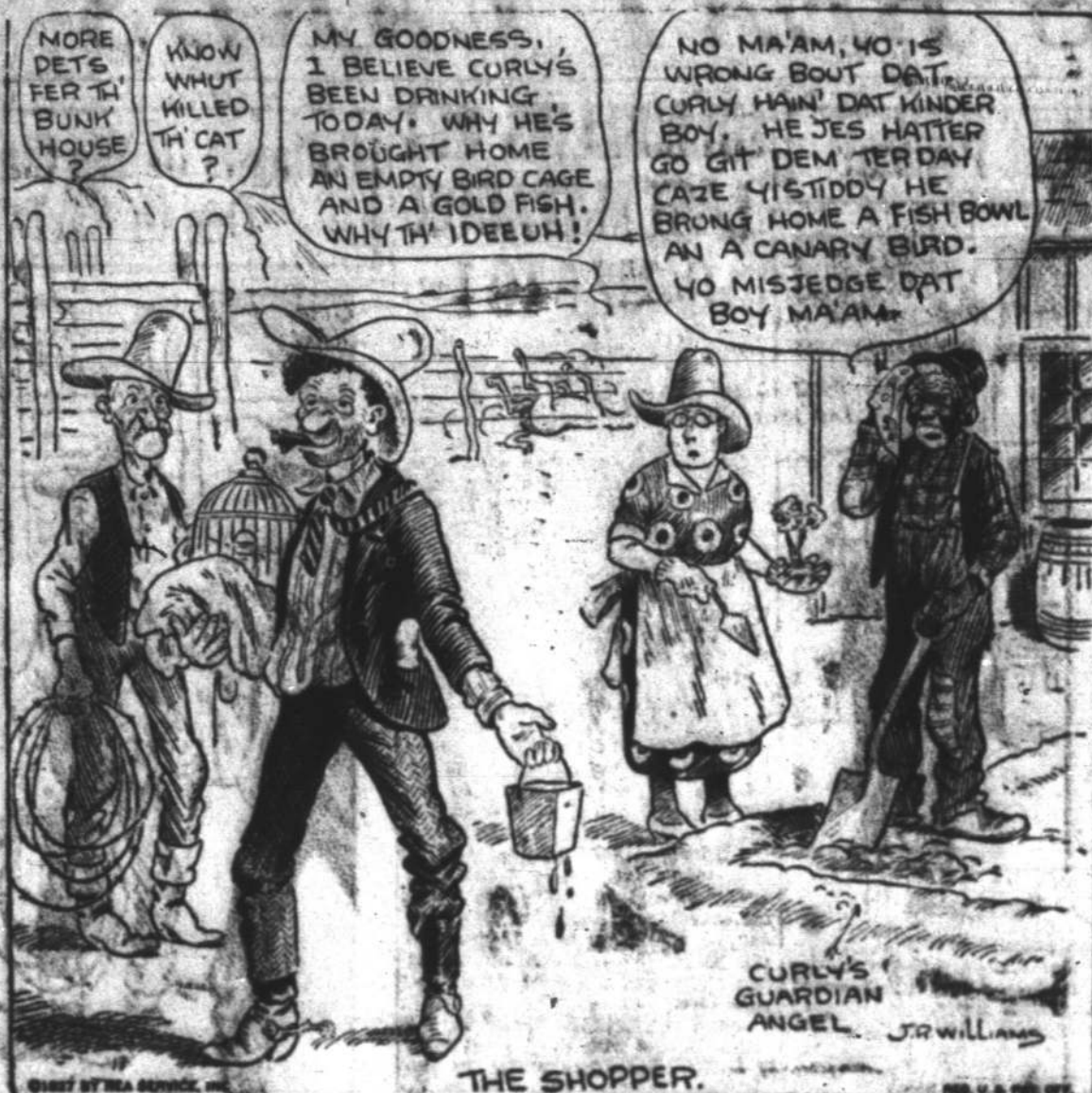

Avoid Disease

A bacterial organism known to the meningococcus is responsible for producing the disease called epidemic meningitis.

This germ is usually found in the discharges from the nose and mouth of infected persons and during epidemics is frequently found in the throats of persons who have recovered from the disease and who have been in contact with the sick or with other carriers.

The meningococcus probably reaches the body through the mucous membranes of the nose, which it reaches by direct contact with infected persons and carriers, or by indirect contact with articles freshly soiled by nasal and mouth discharges of sick persons. It has been established that indirect transmission is brought about by fingers, dishes, plates, handkerchiefs and toys or similar objects contaminated with fresh discharges given off by the sick.

During the World War the disease was quite frequent in army camps. In one instance 10 out of 14 room-mates of a soldier stricken with meningitis, were found to be carriers of the organism.

Because of the facts that are known relative to this disease, it would seem to be a simple matter to control its spread. Actually, however, the control is difficult.

The organism may be carried in the nose and throat from two to 10 days before a person comes down with this disease. During this time he is carrying it about and may spread it. He continues to be able to spread the disease while sick, and after he is cured, until his nose and throat discharges are free from the germs.

The antimeningitic serum, which has been found of great value in the treatment of the disease, is unfortunately not of special service in preventing it.

By means of X-rays, defects in steel three inches thick may be detected.

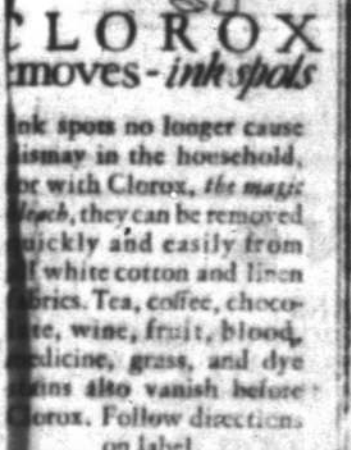

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Herford Selects Boy Scout Officers

The chairman for the training and leadership committee will be selected by Harrison at a later date.

Thos. H. Nelson and F. D. Craft, executives of the Panhandle council attended the meeting, and Mr. Nelson told of the plans for the Boy Scout encampment, which would start the first of June at Warner Camp in the Palo Duro Canyon southeast of Amarillo. "We are expecting a large enrollment for this encampment," he said.

No Boy Scout council in the Panhandle area has been more active during the past two years than the local one and leaders here are making plans to push the work during the coming months, and to seek for a larger enrollment in Boy Scout work than ever before. During the past two years four troops have been organized here with 130 scouts enrolled. Nine have become Eagle Scouts, and a number Life and Star Scouts, and at least 300 merit badges have been awarded.

Big Water Well Is Drilled At Borger

HERFORD, May 12.—D. L. McDonald, water expert of Herford has just completed a big well for the Phillips company fifteen miles south of Borger, that will pump 2,000 gallons of water per minute, or three million gallons per day. Not a better well is to be found in the famous Herford shallow water belt than this big one near Borger, and only a few months ago many thought that the supply in that territory was rather questionable.

The Phillips company is now furnishing water to the Panhandle Light & Power company, and this company retails it to Borger and a number of other oil field towns, and this new well will strengthen the supply.

Mr. McDonald is now drilling a big well for the Gulf Pipe Line company in the oil field.

Envoy's Son Is Held by U. S.



Sarsfield P. Smiddy, 21, who according to federal officials is a son of T. A. Smiddy, minister from the Irish Free State at Washington, is held in Detroit on charges of smuggling liquor into this country. Whiskey under the engine hood of his automobile exploded from the motor's heat, federal authorities say, leading to his arrest.

Work On Compress Begun At Lamesa

LOCKNEY, May 12.—The Texas Compress and Warehouse company of Houston, have unloaded in Lockney a car of lumber to be used in the construction of their new cotton compress. According to H. F. Underwood, the company will not start work on the main part of their compress until after the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains Railway is built through their property, however, there will be several minor buildings erected before the road is built. Mr. Underwood states that the compress will be in readiness for the handling of this year's crop.

The work on the Lockney Cotton Oil Mill is progressing very rapidly and a large number of men are being used on the construction job. These two items coupled with the work on the extensions of the city's water mains will use a goodly number of laborers thus creating a bigger payroll, a thing that is so badly needed at this time of the year in a farming community.

A combination match box and belt buckle is among the season's novelties.

Hereford Plans On Roads And Hotel

HERFORD, May 12.—Hereford has three big projects outlined, which should be put over within the next few months, according to speakers at the local Chamber of Commerce luncheon Monday. A first class hotel, a telephone line to Bellview, New Mexico, and a paved highway through Deaf Smith county, are the three major projects. I. D. Sole, of Amarillo, told of the needs here for a first class hotel, and said that tourists could give this city some real advertising if Lamesa had a hotel. E. W. Harrison told of the needs for a telephone line to Bellview, and a paved highway through the county.

Bobo McLean announced the opening Monday of Deaf Smith county's largest hatchery, a 47,000 egg machine, and he invited local business men and farmers to inspect this new plant.

E. C. Eubanks announced the annual meeting of the ABO highway association at Clovis, New Mexico for next Monday, and he urged local business men to attend this meeting. The local group decided to abandon the luncheon meeting for next Monday so that a large delegation from here could attend the Clovis meeting.

G. A. F. Parker spoke on the cotton situation, and said that farmers of Deaf Smith county should be urged to plant a variety of cotton that would be sure to mature early. He announced that the local chamber of Commerce had about 400 bushels of the Burnett, that would be distributed at half price to farmers, in order to encourage the cotton industry.

Mayor E. S. Ireland told of a hunting trip, which he and T. C. Seliger had made into the Taos mountains in New Mexico.

Lamesa Witnesses Cattle Shipment

LAMESA, May 12.—Old-time cattlemen were re-enacted when 2,270 head of two and three in the steer line were shipped out of Lamesa on an extra freight for Nebraska. The train of livestock consisted of 48 cars.

The cattle were recently purchased from the Goode ranch interest southeast of town and driven to the loading pens. The consignment brought \$42.50 a round, or approximately \$115,000. It was the largest single shipment out of Lamesa in many months. The scene about the loading pens was quite spectacular, drawing many old time ranchmen and cowboys.

Cattlemen are a deal more optimistic now than they were a few years ago when the "bottom dropped out of the market" and left many former ranchers paupers. But the cattle industry now seems to be getting on a better footing. While grass is regarded as pretty good for this season of the year, rain is now beginning to be badly needed.

Smoke Secret Is Wanted For Drills

LAMESA, May 12.—The secret of how to produce dense smoke to be used in giving alarm for fire drills in schools of the state is desired by the State Fire Marshal, G. W. Holton, from Wm. A. Wilson, secretary of the chamber of commerce.

When Wilson was the head of the Munday public schools before coming to Lamesa, he evolved a means from the combination of phosphorus and coal dust whereby he could cause "thick" smoke in a room. Then when the smoke was issuing from the rooms the fire signal was given and precipitate evacuation of school rooms ensued. The invention was so practical that the state fire department wants to adopt it for use in the school system of the state. This is the Lamesa chamber of commerce wizar die checking up another honor for this city.

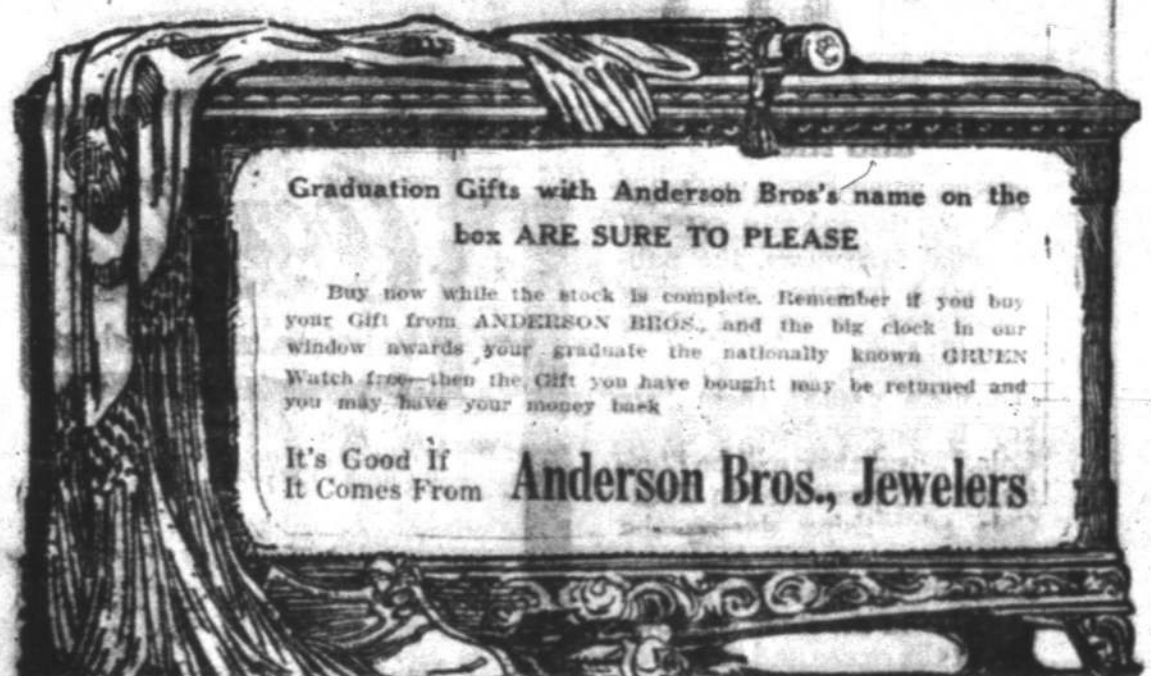
