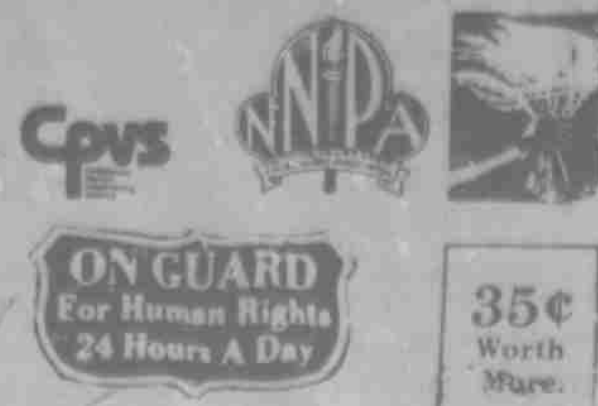

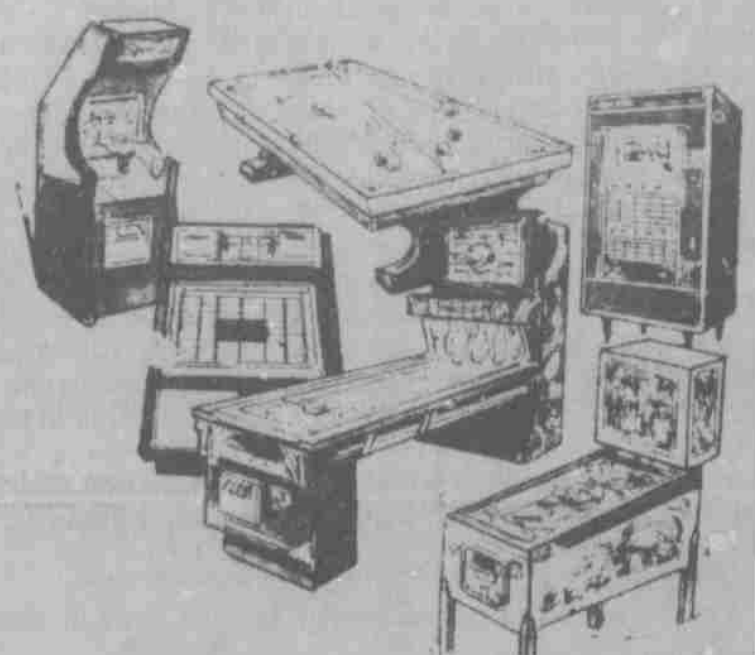

A few years back I became involved in the legal representation of the local Iranian students groups seeking freedom from the Shah. I tried to help them the best I could. You might remember their march around the city and at Texas Tech. I wrote the two law suits, testified in both, and acted as a legal observer in the march around Lubbock.

Shortly thereafter my house was broken into, phone began to act funny, and early one morning around 3-4 o'clock I watched three maybe four police cars behind my house shining their lights on the garbage dumpster while several uniformed folks poked around in the garbage as my dog barked his head off. It was as if they, the mysterious they, wanted me to see what was happening.

A few months back I was appointed to the Texas Young Lawyers Association Committee on Central American Refugees. The co-chair of the committee is a young lawyer named Mark Sessions. His daddy is the head of the FBI. Locally, I have tried to do a few things to help out in Central America.

A few months ago a white hand was placed on both sides of the garbage dumpster behind our house. I guess an artist lives in my alley.

One third of the population of Mexico lives in absolute poverty.

The price of tortillas, the main diet of the poor has risen 1000% between 1986 and 1989. Bread went up 1800% and meat and milk are luxury items. It is estimated that rich

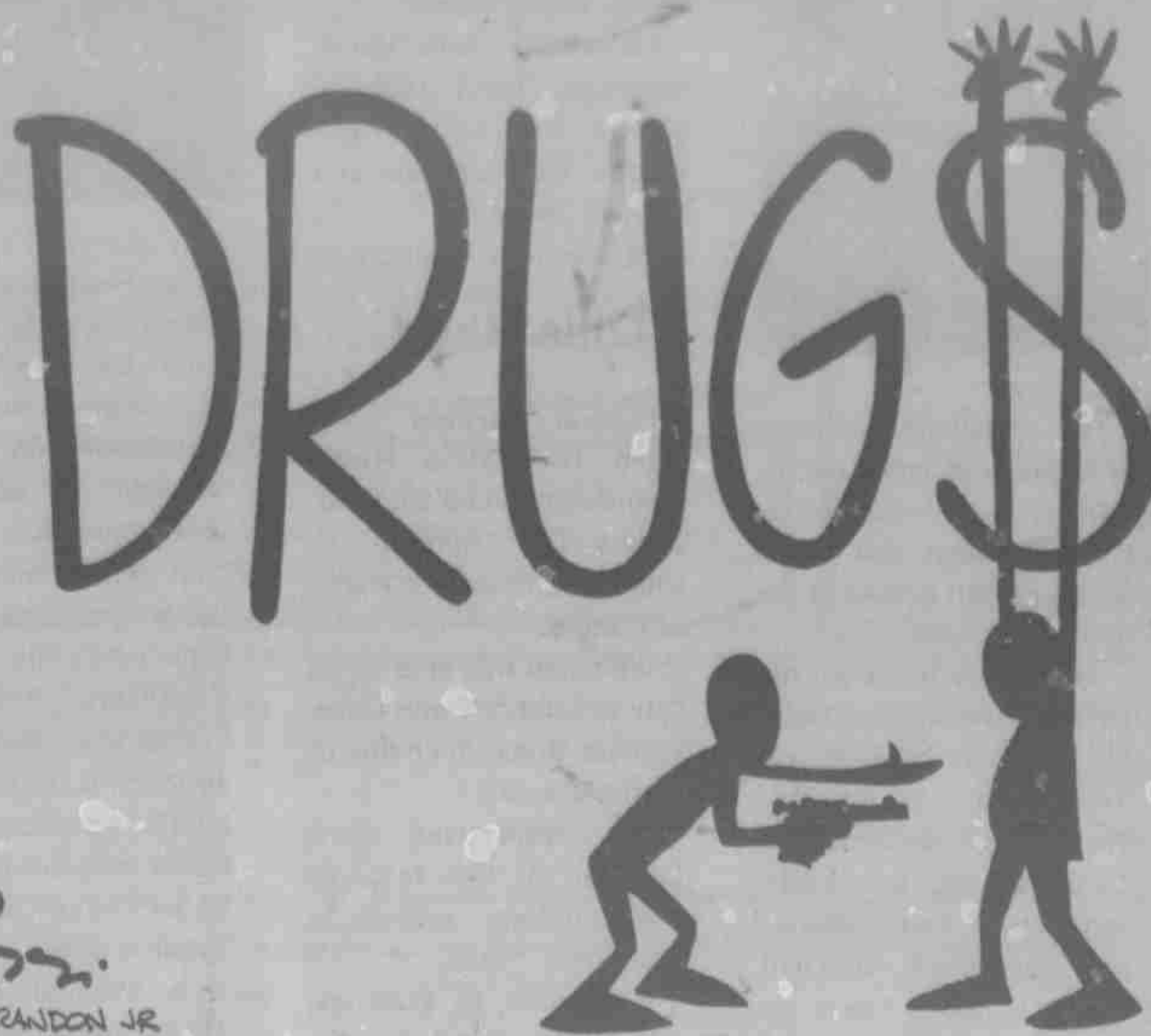

"Taxation In U. S."

To the Editor:

Taxation without representation arrived in the United States on April 18 when the Supreme Court ruled that Federal judges have the power to order higher taxes. These judges now can order tax hikes without the consent of the people, or even against their wishes. Judicial taxation should not go un-

challenged. I urge that the decision be reversed by constitutional amendment.

The fatal flaw in the Court's decision is this: If the people are sovereign, they must be sovereign with respect to taxation, because this is the most basic power of government. Judges who are elected by no one and who serve for life should not be able to direct new taxes in your community or state.

Taxation by judicial decree cannot be reconciled with American history, the Constitution, or any principles of democratic self-government. Judicial taxation creates power for one person to define a problem, decree a solution, and raise taxes as needed to pay the bills. For 200 years, such a concentration of power has been unthinkable. Government by decree is abhorrent to American values because it is inherently undemocratic. When Americans lose the right to say yes or no to taxes, they lose the basic power of self-government.

It is argued by those who support the decision that courts must be able to remedy violations of constitutional rights. I agree. But American courts carried out this responsibility for 200 years without wielding the power of taxation. They ordered actions to correct violations. They ordered remedies that required the spending of money. They enforced orders with the power of contempt. Courts desegregated school systems for more than 30 years without judicial taxation. The issue isn't civil rights, nor the power of courts to right what is wrong. The issue is judicial taxation. If judges can tax, then I believe there is no meaningful limit to the power of the unelected branch of government. The April 18 decision (in Missouri versus Jenkins, the Kansas City, Missouri, school desegregation case) is an engraved invitation to every Federal judge in the country to make policy decisions about schools, hospitals, prisons and whatever a judge chooses -- and then to finance the decisions by ordering that taxes be increased. In this instance, the judge ordered hundreds of millions of dollars in school improvements, including a planetarium, a 25-acre farm and a model United Nations wired for simultaneous translations.

There are two ways to prohibit judicial taxation. One is by a constitutional amendment to bar Federal courts from ordering tax increases, while preserving all their historic powers to dispense justice. I have proposed an amendment to prohibit Federal courts from ordering tax increases by state or local governments (Senate Joint Resolution 295). Already, this proposal is cosponsored by 28 Senators, members of both political parties. Such an amendment would restore the constitutional order that existed from 1789 until 1990.

The other option for Congress is to pass a statute to strip the courts of their authority to issue orders of this kind. My principal concern about a statutory remedy is that it cannot decide where the power of taxation is located. The most a statute could do, if upheld by the courts, would be to smother judicial taxation under a procedural blanket. A law might impede a power created by the Supreme Court's reading of the Constitution, but it cannot abolish the power itself. I believe the power of taxation by unelected, life-tenured judges should be abolished. Nonetheless, Jenkins must not stand; in the absence of an amendment, or during its consideration, a statute might be a last resort.

A national debate on bedrock constitutional principles would be a wonderful civics lesson. Such a debate would hold up for all to see the truth that the people are in fact the source of government's legitimate powers. A constitutional debate would be democracy in action, a powerful statement that the basic powers of government are addressed by the American Constitution in plain language for all to know, and are not mysteries for a learned few.

The Senate Judiciary Committee on the Constitution set hearings on judicial taxation for June 19. It is my hope that the full Committee on the Judiciary will report a constitutional amendment for debate and a vote in the Senate. If the people's control of taxation is up for grabs, what isn't up for grab?

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE NATIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATION

Opening the Gates

I was at an elementary school a few months ago when a teacher pulled me aside. "Keith," she said, "there's a lot of concern about the amount of time students spend learning and the quality of instruction. I have a suggestion, and it won't cost a penny. If the mandatory, standardized tests I give my students were eliminated, I could teach an additional 15 days a year, and spend more time on thinking and problem-solving skills."

This incident came to mind as I read "From Gatekeeper to Gateway: Transforming Testing in America," the new study by the National Commission on Testing and Public Policy. The Commission—a prestigious group of educators, business leaders, attorneys, and assessment and measurement experts—writes: "There is too much educational testing. Mandatory testing consumes some 20 million school days and the equivalent of \$700 to \$900 million in direct and indirect expenditures annually."

The Commission agrees with my teacher friend: "We cannot test our way out of our educational problems. Too many tests, emphasizing lower-order thinking skills, are devouring valuable instruction and learning time at the expense of developing the transferable and flexible learning and problem-solving skills the nation wants for its graduates."

The Commission, supported by the Ford Foundation, spent two years analyzing the uses of standardized tests and other forms of assessment in schools, workplaces, and the military. At the heart of its recommendations is a call for America to use tests to help people

develop their talents—to transform testing "from a gatekeeper to a gateway of opportunity."

Our nation, the study warns, has been misusing standardized tests. They are too often employed as the sole basis for evaluating students' (and adults') achievement and potential—and their future opportunities. This is both unfair and a waste of precious human talent.

The National Education Association wholeheartedly agrees. Well-designed stand-

ardized tests, correctly used, can provide useful educational information. But they should never be the only form of student evaluation. Diverse forms of assessment—such as actual demonstrations of abilities and performance, observations by teachers and supervisors, and portfolios of work—must be used in making education (and employment) decisions.

As the Commission puts it: "no single form of assessment can shoulder the unbearable weight of being the sole measure of worth." Low test scores, it concludes, should "never stigmatize an individual as a 'failure' or permanently restrict the individual's life choices."

There is a compelling issue of social justice here. All tests—no matter how carefully constructed—have some cultural bias. Minorities and women, the Commission points out, regularly score below white males on standardized tests—but this test score gap is not borne out in actual performance, either in school or on the job. When standardized tests are used as gatekeepers—to deny some people access to educational or job opportunities—minorities are disproportionately weeded out.

"Gatekeeper to Gateway" comes at a crucial time. The six national education goals adopted by President Bush and the 50 state governors call for full development of America's human potential. We must develop both accurate ways of measuring our achievement of those goals and better methods of assessing how to help students learn. In the Commission's words, we must transform testing in America—and use it to open the gates of learning for all.

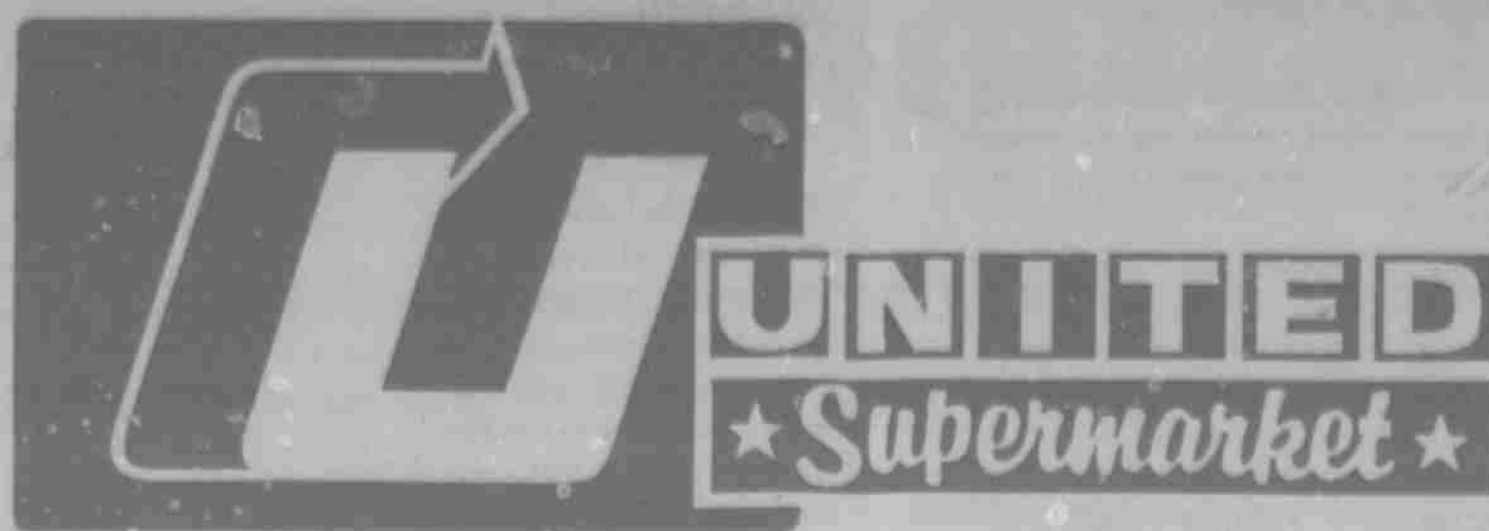
