

TRADE AT HOME IS
HEREFORD MOTTOLOOSE CREDIT CONDITIONS
RAPPED BY SPEAKER AT
LOYALTY PROGRAM

HEREFORD, June 29.—If local merchants will curtail loose credit and buy economically, they can compete with merchants in any of the cities where taxes and rents are much higher than in the smaller places. Henry Wilkinson told local business men at the luncheon Monday in a trade at home address. "If we gain the people's confidence and get our prices right, more of the people will patronize us," he said.

E. C. Barabanks spoke on the subject, "Why patronize home merchants," and said that they were the ones who helped to build the community, and were the ones who extended credit, when we are in financial straits.

The trade at home program was not even in a unique manner, with A. O. Thompson acting as chairman. While speakers were talking, J. A. Plamen and Quinn Guthrie made an inspection of hats, and announced that many of the best pieces were purchased out of town. Judge L. C. Henry, in a fitting address, pointed out the fact that the hats should be chopped to pieces to serve as an example for others of this place. J. O. Crosthwait, local butcher was appointed executioner and was ordered to proceed with the destructive work. With the hat committee building some fifteen business men's hats, four of five duplicates were handed out and chopped to pieces, while many of the folks thought their goods "sun protectors" were being destroyed. The meeting was suddenly dismissed, just before other hats reached the block.

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Alpine C. C. Head
Is Real Booster

ALPINE, Texas, June 29.—Shirley

Scates, president of the Brewster County Chamber of Commerce, is one of the "lives" of a bunch of unusually live "wires" in Alpine, Texas. He is successfully putting over one of the biggest development programs ever undertaken in this section, and under his administration Alpine is growing so fast that there is not a vacant room, house or apartment here and this year will see completed in Alpine more than a half million dollar development program. Alpine is installing a street-lighting system as good as those of any city. More than a hundred families have been thrown away from Alpine in the past few weeks, on account of a shortage of housing facilities, and each night, from twenty-five to fifty transient travelers are compelled to seek accommodations in the private homes and nearby towns—this unusual growth being the direct result of the constructive work of Mr. Scates and his co-workers, including the membership of the live commercial organization. He is the owner and proprietor of the Alpine Candy Kitchen, a partner in the Alpine Drug Company, and is a ranch owner. He was born in Indiana, and reared on an Indiana farm, is a 22nd degree Mason, having taken both routes to the Shrine in Masonry. He and Mrs. Scates came to Alpine September 16, 1911, and immediately decided that Alpine was the ideal place in which to live. He has built one of the most beautiful homes in Alpine, on College avenue, and says he expects to live here the rest of his life.

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SAYS ABANDONED CATS DESTROY BIRD LIFE.
WICHITA, Kan., June 28. (AP)—The turning loose upon the wide open spaces of Kansas of the many cat population of the state must stop or drastic measures must be taken to preserve the bird life of the state.

This is the ultimatum of J. H. Dorn, state fish and game warden. "Cat-hunted animals are being destroyed in the destruction of bird life when they drop the yearly litter of the family tabby cat by dropping the kittens in the country," he said. "It is a rapidly increasing evil in such surroundings. A full grown cat will destroy from 500 to 1,000 birds a year. Domestic cats are a scourge and a destructive."

DEAF SMITH MAN
PLANS IRRIGATION

FIVE HUNDRED GALLONS PER

HEREFORD, June 29.—Deaf Smith county farmers are to have a thorough demonstration of the small unit plan of irrigation. J. L. Rutherford has just signed a contract with the Russell Pump and Supply company of Roswell, N. M., for the immediate installation of a 500 gallon per minute capacity pump and a 25 horse power engine. This new irrigation project is to be located on Rutherford's ten acre tract just north of Hereford, and he plans to put out a small patch of alfalfa this year and then specialize on truck for the next season. Many farmers in the Hereford section water belt are intensely interested in an economical plan of irrigation, and many are of the opinion that the small unit system with trucks ranging from ten to forty acres will be the ideal way to develop this section.

All varieties of vegetables and small fruits thrive in the Hereford shallow water district under irrigation and with an economical plan for lifting the water, this section will develop into one of the garden spots of Texas. It is believed by many who have studied the situation.

ALPINE COTTON CROP IS NOW IN FINE CONDITION.
ALPINE, Texas, June 29.—Cotton and other crops in Brewster county, and the rest of the Big Bend section, continue in splendid condition, with the prospect still bright for a normal yield. Cotton crops along the Rio Grande where they are irrigated, are clean and there is plenty of Mexican labor. Bolls are forming fast, and there are no insect pests up to date.

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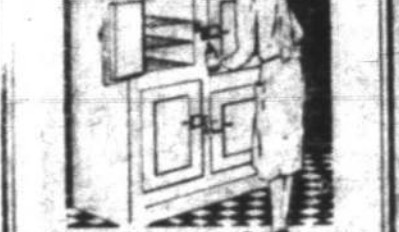

RAPID CITY, S. D. (AP)—A fireplace built of 90 kinds of rock, all native to the Black Hills, gives a distinctive touch to the breakfast room in the game lodge of the South Dakota state park where President Coolidge is vacationing. The fireplace contains every known mineral in the region, and probably could never be duplicated. Chunks of amethyst and staurolite rock from Wind Cave, pieces of rose and crystal quartz, peacock iron, mica, and copper, tin, silver and gold ore show prominently in its walls. There is a piece of schist from which lithia water is obtained.

"Tom, Dick And Harry," In Virginia The Byrd Boys Are "Some Pumpkins"

RICHMOND, Va., July 1.—The Old Dominion which is the oratorical name for the state of Virginia, has been extremely proud of a great many of its sons, with Washington, Lee, Jefferson and the rest, but it seldom regarded any of them more highly than it regards Tom, Dick and Harry.

Tom, Dick and Harry—in ordinary speech that expression means something like "everybody" or "the world and his brother," but in Virginia it refers very definitely to three men whom the state admires with whole-souled southern fervor.

These three are the brothers—Byrd—Richard Evelyn, Harry Flood and Thomas. Each has achieved distinction in a different way. Their joint efforts have made the family name one to conjure with here.

Richard, the Aviator

To begin with, there is Richard—the Dick of the triumvirate. Until a young man named Lindbergh came along Dick was pretty generally considered the country's leading aviator—and he apparently intends to retain that distinction in the near future, having a flight to the south pole in mind, as soon as this business of spanning the Atlantic is over.

Then there is Harry. To the nation at large he is less well known than Dick—but not to Virginia. In case you have forgotten, Harry Flood Byrd is the governor of the state—and is counted a very good one and a very popular one, too. In Virginia the name Byrd does not by any means mean simply the man who flew over the north pole.

Finally there is Tom. The country at large knows him not at all. Yet he must be well worth knowing. Virginia thinks so.

A World War Hero

Tom is of the introspective, contemplative type. Lacking the flare for direct action that motivates Dick and Harry, his career has been in the quiet, the quiet and the obscure. Yet in 1917, when the call to arms came, Tom was one of the first sons of the Old Dominion to volunteer. He served well in France, making a record for bravery and fidelity to duty under fire.

When the war ended he retired to the quiet of his country estate in the Shenandoah valley, tending his peach and pear orchards, enjoying life hugely and emerging from his retirement occasionally to congratulate one of his brothers.

Tom, Dick and Harry, come by their bravery and ability honestly. Their grandfathers—Capt. William Byrd was a man of mettle. So was his wife, their grandmother, Mrs. Jane Byrd, who is still living and who is prouder than she can say of her three grandsons.

An Adventurous Career

She and William Byrd had been married two years when the Civil War broke out. Byrd had brought her to Virginia from Texas, whither she and her family migrated when she was 2, via the covered wagon from Tennessee. She had known frontier life and her beauty and charm made her an ornament to the Byrd plantation at Winchester, Va. She saw her husband and her two boys enlist.

The two brothers were killed. William Byrd was killed in missing in action, and when months after came it was thought that he, too, had been slain, but the young wife refused to believe it.

At length the war ended. Still there was no word of Byrd. Then, one day, he came riding up to the plantation, dismounted, and asked gravely, "Does the Widow Byrd live here?"

It developed that he had been wounded, had been captured by Federal soldiers and had been con-

fining in a military prison at New Orleans, unable to communicate with his home.

Three Different Types

Mrs. Byrd loves to talk about her grandsons, Tom, Dick and Harry. The three were always of different types, she says: Harry was ever studious and grave, Dick venturesome and light-hearted, and Tom quiet and introspective. She is proud of Tom, proud of Harry—and oh, ever so proud of Dick.

"That boy is a case," she says. "I hope he writes a book some day, because he certainly has had a lot of fun and it would be a shame to keep it all to himself."

There, then, is the country's most famous Tom, Dick and Harry. It isn't so hard to understand why, in Virginia, that trio of names doesn't make just plain expression. It refers to three brothers of whom Virginia is justifiably proud.

that SOS-signals were still being received as late as 2:45 o'clock. But as no other stations reported signals, some fear was expressed that a wireless amateur was sending misleading reports for his own amusement regardless of the hope or agony they created in the hearts of those who heard them.

When this dispatch was filed at 3:35 a. m. Paris was ignorant of the fate of Byrd and his three companions.

First Report False

At Le Bourget field the announcement of the landing was made by Commandant Renouise and the perfect of police. Later they admitted that their information was erroneous and that the plane was still circling trying to find a landing place.

Just before four o'clock all the aviation fields in the vicinity of Paris and along the coast from Brest north were ordered to burn lights to guide the Americans.

The radio stations, with the exception of Harve had ceased all calls and were listening for any signals. There was none.

MESSAGES AS TO FLIERS AWAITED

PARIS, July 1. (AP)—Being of the opinion that the America has landed somewhere around Paris, H. A. Gibbons, representative of Rodman Wanamaker shortly before six o'clock this morning was waiting for the opening at seven o'clock of the telegraph stations to hear from Commander Byrd.

All the telephone and telegraph offices in the provinces close at 5 p. m., and do not open till 7 a. m.

WEATHER CONDITIONS VERY BAD

PARIS, July 1. (AP)—Five a. m.: At dawn the rain was pouring down with a stiff wind. It was no kind of flying weather even in broad daylight.

PLAN FOR PLANE SEARCH ABANDONED

PARIS, July 1. (AP)—A plan to send planes to search for Commander Byrd was abandoned as Commandant Renouise felt certain that with the coming of dawn the America would be seen and the news telephoned to Paris as soon as the country stations opened.

The fact that the reports of SOS signals received during the night were as to the position of the plane made it almost hopeless from that source to determine what direction to take in a search. The most persistent reports, however, were that the signals came from the south.

ACOSTA'S SONS ONLY MISSED RIDE

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., June 30. (AP)—Two persons who had more at stake in the flight of the "America" than almost any one else, looked on the air search chiefly as something that had cheated them out of an automobile ride to New York.

The two people are Bert Acosta, Jr., five years old, and Allyn Lee Acosta, three, the sons of flight pilot, Walter Acosta, who arrived at the hangar this afternoon. He was asked how her boys looked on the flight.

"Oh they don't know what it's all about of course," she said. "They were asleep when the decision to fly was reached and did not wake them. But they were disappointed when they did wake yesterday to find Bert gone, because he had promised to drive them into New York. He left a letter for them when he was reached and they were so glad when I took them up some when I went to it to them."

GENDARMES ORDERED TO SEARCH FOR PLANE

PARIS, July 1. (AP)—Messages received through different wireless stations supposedly from Commander Byrd between 12:16 and 12:36 o'clock this morning led the authorities to believe he was somewhere south of Paris during that time.

Consequently the ministry of interior ordered gendarmes with a radius of a number of miles of Versailles including the forest territory, to make a thorough search for the plane, but up to six o'clock

States with full acquiescence of the state all rights and powers for carrying out of the provisions of the reclamation act for the construction of irrigation works and for the reclamation of Arizona lands, to the same extent as if Arizona had remained a territory, and

4. That these provisions should be made a part of the state constitution in such terms as should preclude the making of any constitutional amendment of any change or abrogation thereof in whole or part without the consent of congress.
