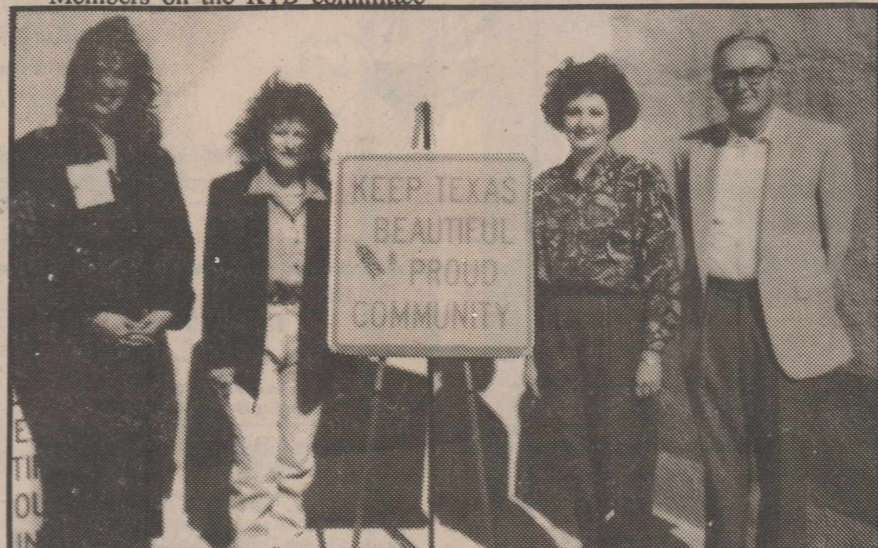

Rotan City Purchases New Loader

The members of the Rotan City Council, in an emergency session on Tuesday night, November 17th, voted to purchase a new Caterpillar 953 track loader at a net trade difference of \$89,000, according to Joe Dickson, Rotan City Manager.

The council owes \$132,917.00 on the loader. This is a result of adding the \$43,000 owed on the trade-in to the net difference on the new machine.

Dickson indicated that the trade-in, also a Caterpillar 953, had 5,000 hours on it and completely locked down last week.

The new machine will be equipped with a turbo dust ejector, under carriage guard and a radial air filter assembly.

The Caterpillar 953 is used exclusively to bury trash at the Rotan landfill.

\$76,969 Sent In 1991 On County Senior Citizen Center Programs

There was a total of \$76,969 spent in the area of Senior Citizens Program in the 1991 Fisher County Budget but only \$72,099 taken in in revenues and grants, leaving the area \$4,870 in the red for the year.

The income areas were: \$17,222 in Fisher County Food donations; \$4,662 in state grants and \$50,140 in federal grants.

The actual expenditures for the Fisher County Senior Citizen's program were: \$25,959 in salaries; \$1,986 for

social security; \$48 for travel; \$3,908 for utilities; \$414 for telephone expense; \$718 for propane; \$1,083 for building repair and supplies; \$2,911 for parts and supplies; \$760 for new equipment; \$18,158 for a delivery van; \$25 for other expenses; \$17,430 for food purchased and \$3,569 for delivery van expense.

The area of Fisher County Clerk had 1991 expenditures of \$71,900. It will be examined in detail next week.



State Capitol Highlights

AUSTIN — Speaker Gib Lewis says he might be eating Thanksgiving dinner on the Capitol grounds if the House can't muster 100 votes to pass a constitutional amendment on school finance reform. Lewis adjourned the House last Friday morning stating "We have some more work to do."

Seeking to comply with a court-imposed June 1 deadline, Gov. Ann Richards urged House members to stick with her "Fair Share Plan," which by week's end still needed 14 votes for approval.

Any constitutional amendment must be approved by two-thirds vote in both the House and Senate; the Senate easily approved the issue several days earlier.

But the plan, endorsed by Richards, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and Lewis, has stalled in the House where 58 Republicans control more than one-third of the votes and are joined by scattered conservative

Democrats.

Republican House members appear to be stalling until the regular session, when Republicans, for the first time in more than 100 years, will control over one-third of the Senate votes.

Governor's Payroll Grows

Meanwhile, Gov. Richards drew criticism after reports that despite her frequent calls for government to tighten its belt, she has nearly doubled the size of her office staff.

The *Houston Post* looked at the governor's office and found that the number of staff members had grown from 185 when Gov. Bill Clements stepped down to 337, according to figures released by the state comptroller.

Responding to the *Post* article, Richards said she had instructed her staff to begin making cuts. She said some of the additional employees are justified because "this has been a far more activist

office than probably in a long time."

Richards also said the federal government and the Legislature have given the governor's office more responsibilities. "When they give you a job to do, you have got to have the people to do it," she said.

However, she said, she does not believe all the personnel growth is justified.

Republican Barbs

Rep. Tom Craddock, R-Midland, chairman of the House Republican Caucus, said the increase in Richards' staff was outrageous. "She's going to have to look at home before she talks about other people trying to cut. She needs to get rid of some of her staff and get down to where the rest of us are."

Clements' appointments secretary James Huffines said: "If her own bureaucracy has almost doubled in two years, what kind of message does it send to other state agencies?"

Other agency records: Attorney General Dan Morales' staff grew by 32 percent; State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison's by 16 percent; and Comptroller John Sharp's by

14 percent.

Making staff reductions were Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry, 10 percent; and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, four percent.

Phone Inquiry Dropped

Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle said he will not prosecute Mauro for allegedly making political calls with state telephones.

Earle, a Democrat, who heads the Public Integrity Unit which investigates wrongdoing by state officials, said, "It is the opinion of this office that the evidence does not warrant further investigation and criminal prosecution."

Mauro, who was President-elect Bill Clinton's state campaign manager, apologized publicly after an audit showed 1,440 calls were made to political offices by Mauro and his staff.

Earle said a review of records showed Mauro has consistently reimbursed the state at a minimum of \$25 per month since 1984 to cover any incidental phone use. Records failed to show a conscious pattern of misuse of state property for political or personal purposes.

Aggies, Black Lawmaker

State Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, a veteran black lawmaker who wants to ban an Aggie fraternity for throwing a party with a racist theme, found himself in a war of words with the Texas A&M student newspaper.

Wilson said an editorial cartoon satirizing him was racist; it depicts Wilson as a small black dog barking at an Aggie's senior boot with a caption: "State Rep. Ron Wilson throws his weight around at Texas A&M."

An accompanying editorial stated Wilson should tend to his district and leave university administration to administrators, and save his hot air for those who deserve it.

Wilson called the school president into the fight, and made public an anonymous letter connected to the cartoon: "If you want a war, we'll give you one you won't believe," the letter stated.

Other Highlights

A bill filed last week by Rep. Bill Carter, R-Richland Hills, would allow people 21 or older to carry concealed weapons once they passed a mandatory training pro-

gram and received a state license. Speaker Lewis said, "allowing Texans to carry guns for self-defense would probably decrease crime."

Attorney General Morales said his office's child support enforcement program set records in fiscal year 1992. The program collected \$301.7 million for the children of divorced parents, an increase of 28 percent over 1991.

Texas school districts, which now spend 23 percent on administration, should cut the figure to 20 percent and put the savings into instruction, said a study adopted by the Educational Economic Policy Center Committee.

End Arguing About School Funding

"When I was a boy on the Mississippi River, there was a proposition in a township to discontinue public schools because they were too expensive," Mark Twain once recalled. "An old farmer spoke up and said if they stopped the schools they would not save anything, because every time a school was closed a jail had to be built."

Mark Twain spoke about the old farmer to a turn-of-the-century meeting of the Public Education Association. Twain had been a youngster in the 1840s, which shows that people have been wrangling about how to pay for education for at least a century and a half -- and probably many centuries longer.

Public schools are expensive, but as Mark Twain well knew, closing them is even more costly. Here in Texas, that is the dire possibility we face. We face the real threat of public schools with front doors locked, classrooms dark and empty and youngsters on the streets because adults cannot agree on how public education ought to be funded.

The district court, which consistently has the support of higher courts, has told us plainly and simply that we have until next June to come up with a system of school funding that doesn't rely so heavily on whether a student has the good fortune of living in a property-rich school district. Asked what would happen if the court wasn't satisfied, Chief Justice Scott McCown minced no words: "Why not just shut down the schools?"

I, for one, believe the judge means what he said.

We have to face reality -- and so do local school districts.

We have to get the courts out of our schools. And we do that by amending the state constitution so that we have a workable framework for funding our schools equitably.

The constitutional amendment that Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, House Speaker Gib Lewis and I have proposed offers the only politically feasible alternative available to us -- the funding mechanism known as "recapture."

The proposed amendment creates a constitutional standard of 95 percent equity. It abolishes the County Education Districts, and it helps all school districts by converting \$750 million in state bonds for the construction of new school facilities. It injects more accountability into the public schools by setting aside a fund to reward school districts that do well and to assist those that do not. The amendment does not set up the funding system; it simply gives constitutional sanction to a system that includes recapture.

The clock is ticking. We must move the constitutional amendment proposal on to the voters, so they have time to have their say without getting us into another nail-biting game of "Beat the Clock" with the courts. Once the voters approve the amendment, we can consider any number of plans for implementing the equity requirements.

Texans must recognize, once and for all, that education no longer is a purely local matter. As Lt. Gov. Bullock has reminded us, "a child reared and educated in the Rio Grande Valley is as likely to live and work in Dallas as he is to stay home. And one day, you are just as likely to see a high-school dropout from Lubbock make his way to Beaumont to commit a crime."

We are deluding ourselves if we believe the IBMs and the Apples and the Southwestern Bells of this world are going to continue coming to Texas if, because of our own folly, we allow the courts to close our schools.

Passage of a constitutional amendment is the vital first step away from this distracting, draining argument. It would allow us to finally close the door, not on our public schools, but on 25 long years of arguing about a mathematical representation of equity and quality in education. As I reminded our legislators on the opening day of the special session, we have the opportunity to lay the groundwork for ending that argument -- and moving on to what truly matters to our children and to this state's future.

I hope that Texans will write, phone or fax their legislators, urging them to do what needs to be done. I hope the people of Texas will insist that their elected officials take advantage of the opportunity now before them to begin building Texas schools worthy of the 21st century. It's our children who will benefit. It's their future on the line.



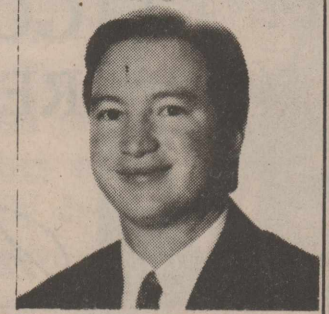

TAX PLANNING

TAX TIPS FOR THE ELEVENTH HOUR

Most of the steps you can take to cut your 1992 taxes must be taken by December 31st. Here are some suggestions for end-of-the-year tax cutting moves you might want to consider:

* If you'll be able to itemize deductions on your 1992 tax return, squeeze in more deductions before year-end. For example, pay outstanding property taxes. Accelerate planned charitable contributions by making them before December 31st.

* If you don't have the cash to pay for a tax deductible item, consider using your credit card. You'll get the deduction in 1992 even though you'll pay the credit card company in 1993.

* If you could itemize deductions and your adjusted gross income will exceed \$105,250, you may want to try deferring some income to 1993. That's because itemized deductions are cut by 3% of adjusted gross income over \$105,250.

* If you're planning a change in marital status, be aware that your marital status as of December 31st determines your tax status for the entire year. Postponing a wedding or a divorce might save taxes.

* Investors should check the tax consequences of sales made so far in 1992. If gains exceed losses, you may want to take some gains before year-end. Remember that after gains and losses have been netted, you can deduct up to \$3,000 of excess losses against other income such as your salary. Net losses in excess of \$3,000 must be carried forward to future years.

* If you're in business, consider making gifts before year-end to employees, customers, or clients. They're deductible up to \$25 each.






