Postal Receipts At Local Office Show Continued Gains

Information received from J. P. Rodgers, Jr., assistant postmaster at the local office, show that postage is better than for some time past, and increases in receipts over previous quarters were very noticeable for the quarter ending March 31st.

According to Mr. Rodgers, the office took in \$2,664.88 for the quarter just finished, compared with \$1,802.94 for the same period of 1933. Also the quarter ending March 31st, 1934 showed greater receipts than the last quarter of 1933, which usually reflects the added business during Christmas. The quarter ending December 31, 1933 showed receipts of \$2,235.50.

Employees at the office are enthusiastic over the gain in receipts, and are hopeful that they will continue. Citizens in general will be interested in knowing about this, for the post office receipts are a good index to business conditions, and any increase shown therein is sure to have come from better business in every line.

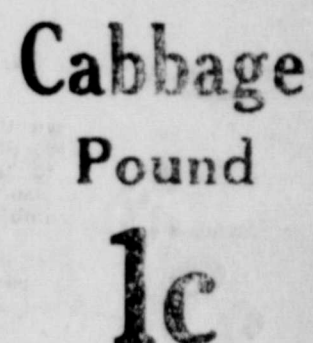

The Gulf Oil Producing and Pipe Line companies Wednesday announced an increase of from three to ten per cent in salaries of all field employees in Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas. He refused to talk but officers said they had a strong case against him. He has been indicted at Stephenville on car theft and robbery charges. He has not been brought to trial before because of indictments elsewhere. Officers said they planned to take him to some other jail for safe keeping.

West Texas peace officers and ranchmen are encountering an extensive outbreak of wool and mohair thievery. In some cases thieves have pulled the wool from the backs of live sheep and in others have shot sheep and later removed the wool. Ranchmen all over west Texas report that their places have been invaded by men hunting wool from the backs of sheep that have died. This type of wool, most often stolen, is worth 12 to 18 cents a pound and during the last year it is estimated that 700,000 pounds have been sold in San Angelo alone.

Goaded by two ruthless killings, a bank robbery and a kidnapping, state and federal officers waged an intensive hunt through every part of Texas late Monday for Clyde Barrow, Bonnie Parker and Raymond Hamilton. Countless reports are coming in daily on the whereabouts of the trio but none have materialized. Rewards of more than \$1500 for their capture caused law enforcement agencies to seek a "toe hold" from which to work, even on the most far-fetched bit of information.

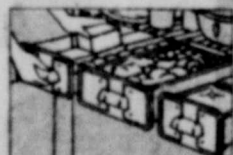
