PREACHER IS REFUSED RIGHT TO FILL PULPIT

(By Associated Press)
TULSA Okla., Oct. 13.—The conviction of Rev. Thomas J. Irwin, on charges of conduct unbecoming a minister, was upheld early today by the judicial commission of the Presbyterian synod of Oklahoma. An indefinite suspension from the ministry was also upheld.

Counsel for Rev. Irwin gave notice of appeal and stated that the case would be carried to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Irwin was found guilty of bringing disrepute upon the church by marrying a couple, it was alleged dressed in bathing suits in a bathing pool.

HIGH SCHOOL CLASS RUSH NOISY AFFAIR

The Senior and Junior classes of the Ballinger High School put on a class rush Thursday night which aroused the "natives," and which developed into a hard fought battle between the students for possession of the flag pole on top of the high school building.

PASSENGERS OF BURNED SHIP TO ARRIVE SAT.

(By Associated Press)
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—Passengers on the steamship City of Honolulu which burned at sea yesterday, were transferred to the United States army transport Thomas, from the rescue ship West Farallon, today, according to wireless messages received here. The Thomas is due here tomorrow, but may be delayed.

The message said that the ship City of Honolulu burned beyond repair, the vessel being "gutted." The list of passengers and crew of the ill fated ship is given at 261, and all escaped, some of whom, however, suffered hardships.

FT. WORTH — The United States helium gas production plant here, the only plant in the world for the manufacture of the non-explosive and non-inflammable balloon gas of this country has a practical monopoly, resumed operations Oct. 1. The plant had been closed since November 30, 1921. Reopening furnished employment for 150 men, nearly all of them skilled mechanics. Congress has appropriated \$800,000 for the operation of the plant during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1922.

PAYS BIG FOR FOREIGN SHIPS

(By Associated Press)
THE HAGUE, Oct. 13.—The arbitration tribunal, with the American representative not sitting has awarded approximately twelve million dollars to the Norwegian government. The sum was awarded on behalf of the fifteen Norwegian corporations and individuals for claims arising from requisitions of ships by the American Emergency Fleet Corporation during the World War.

FRENCH OPPOSE GERMAN DELAY

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Oct. 14.—The French government has instructed Louis Barthou, its representative on the allied reparations commission, to oppose the latest proposition by England's representative that an immediate moratorium for five years be granted Germany on all cash payments. This was semi-officially announced this afternoon.

CHANAK, Oct. 12.—General retirement of the Turkish troops in the immediate vicinity of Chanak is in progress.

Chanak dispatches Thursday announced the advance of a Turkish force toward the British lines. The British commander protested against this as a violation of the armistice agreement. The Turkish commander said that he would order the retirement of his forces as soon as the official notice of armistice came.

FEEDING MANY CATTLE HERE

W. O. Shultz will place about one thousand head of cattle on feed in Ballinger this winter. Six hundred calves will be fattened here for market, and several hundred head of steers will go from the feed pens here to market. The cattle will be fed in the pens North of the city.

Mr. Shultz has contracted with the Ballinger Cotton Oil Mill Co. for feed, and in addition will feed maize which is in storage at the Vaughn mill. G. M. Vaughn purchased about three hundred and fifty tons of maize from the farmers during the harvest season and this will be converted into beef. Mr. Shultz will bring the cattle here from his Concho county ranch.

OPEN PORT LAW FIXED FOR TYLER

AUSTIN, Oct. 13.—Tyler will be placed under the open port law by Gov. Neff late today, it was stated this morning. Gov. Neff is preparing the order which action comes following an investigation of the strike situation in that city. Clayton Hudson, a former employee of the Cotton Belt, was killed during disorder there last week, and Mr. Neff ordered an investigation made. He stated that conditions justified placing the city under the open port law.

COURT CONSIDERS STILLMAN DECREE

Y., Oct. 13.—Supreme Court Justice Morschauer today took under advisement the form of judgment in the Stillman divorce case, which was submitted by counsel for Mrs. Anne Stillman, and will determine whether the judgment is in accord with the court's decree denying James A. Stillman a divorce a short time ago.

MALONE GIN AT BRADSHAW LOST

BRADSHAW, Tex., Oct. 13.—The R. C. Malone gin plant burned Thursday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. The fire started from a box of matches that went thru the suction from a wagon of cotton.

Evidently the matches were distributed all thru the stands and set fire to the entire plant, for the whole structure was in flames at once. The fire extinguishers, fire hose, fire buckets were all used to the limit, but amounted to almost nothing, and it was only thirty minutes from the time the fire started until the works were consumed.

The gin plant was valued at \$15,000.00 with \$7,200.00 of insurance, and \$6,000.00 of cotton seed with full coverage of insurance.

This being the only gin here, and at this season of the year, the loss is keenly felt by almost everybody.

Mr. Malone expresses his intention of rebuilding between now and next fall. In fact, he has asked all his old gin hands to be back for work next year.

COURT MUST SETTLE MUDDLE OF BALLOT

BRITISH FIGHT BOOZE RULING

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Oct. 13.—Unless an injunction is granted the Cunard Line as asked for by the steamship company operating this line, the British government will probably protest against the ruling of the American government prohibiting liquors on foreign ships in American waters. This statement was made in official quarters today.

British officials, however, who commented on the situation growing out of the American action to keep liquor laden ships out of American waters, express the opinion that the injunction will be granted in United States courts.

It is understood that the British government takes the attitude of remaining in the background and allowing private steamship lines to take the lead in the fight to permit foreign ships carrying intoxicants in American waters, but in the event the private ship owners fail, the British government will intervene and enter a formal protest through the foreign office.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—United States Shipping Board vessels will remain dry, regardless of the outcome of the injunction proceedings brought in New York on behalf of American privately owned ships, it was announced by Chairman Lasker of the shipping government owned ships are board today.

President Harding holds that American territory, and Mr. Lasker said that he also holds under the attorney general's ruling that they come under the terms of the Volstead act, regardless of whether American privately owned ships succeed in remaining wet or not.

AUSTIN, Oct. 13.—There is little opportunity for compromise in the election tangle which would permit both the names of Earle B. Mayfield and George E. B. Peddy going on the official election ballot as senatorial candidates, in view of the attorney general's ruling in the Peddy case. This was indicated in a statement by Secretary of State Staples today. The attorney general ruled that Peddy's name could not be legally certified and the secretary of state stated that he had to be governed by that ruling.

Peddy has been ruled off by this ruling and Mayfield's name is being held up from being put on the ballot by injunction proceedings. Both of the candidates have stated that they had no objections to both names going on the ballot, and Mayfield is contesting the injunction which has been set for hearing next Monday. Should the court refuse to perpetuate the injunction the secretary of state will notify all county clerks to put Mayfield's name on the ticket.

ELEPHANT BUTTE DAM PROVES ITS WORTH TO FARMS NEAR EL PASO

(By Associated Press)
EL PASO, Oct. 13.—For hundreds of miles, farmers in New Mexico and Texas, and some in Mexico, irrigate their farms from the Rio Grande, but if it were not for the Elephant Butte dam and reservoir in New Mexico, 124 miles from El Paso, the river would be too low to furnish water for any purpose. As it is, the giant reservoir accumulates millions of acre feet of water yearly from snow and rains and tributary streams. It is stored there and released as needed.

El Paso, with the Rio Grande, or Elephant Butte irrigation project, therefore, has the "makings" of a \$60,000,000 agricultural industry.

"The district served by the project," he said, "has the cheapest and most plentiful farm labor of any other irrigated district. It has the largest reservoir for irrigation in the world."

Work is continuous throughout the year on extending irrigation canals and drainage ditches.

A movement is on foot in El Paso now to utilize the power at the dam which is going to waste. Power worth millions of dollars from the water flow at Elephant Butte dam is wasted every year. An electric power plant to furnish light and heat to thousands of farmers in New Mexico and Texas is projected. Water power from the dam would provide the necessary friction, it is said.

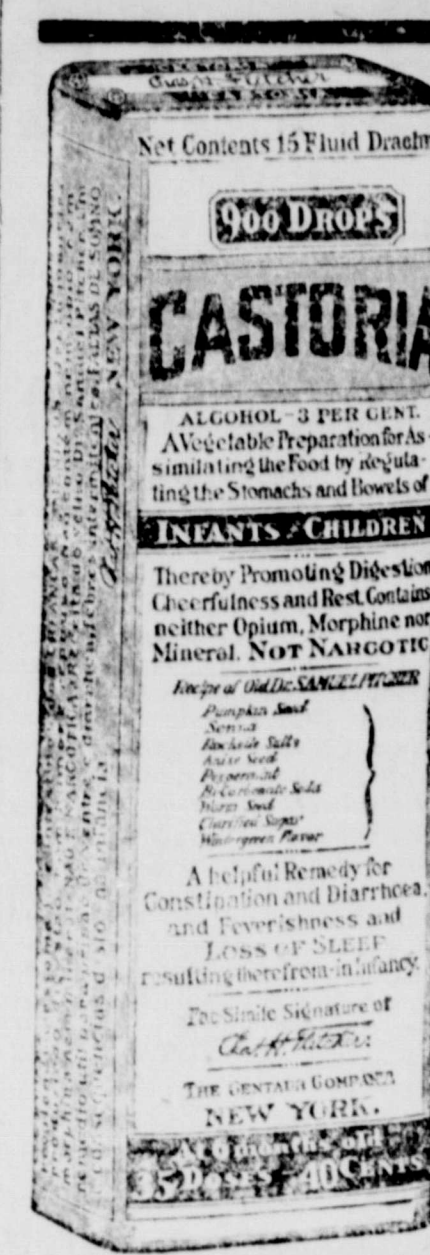

Issues Bulletin On Pecan Production

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Oct. 13.—The most extensive report ever prepared by the State Department of Agriculture on pecan growing in Texas is now being compiled by J. H. Burkett, nut specialist of the department, and will be published next month, according to Commissioner of Agriculture George B. Terrell.

The new bulletin will include a complete history of pecan growing in Texas, production statistics and information on growing nuts. Texas produces in ordinary years more than fifty per cent of the pecan crop of the entire nation, according to Burkett.

This year the Lone Star state is experiencing a set back in production, Burkett reports. Latest estimates received by the state department indicate the production this year will be only slightly more than five per cent normal, while the condition for the entire nation is approximately 35 per cent normal. Adverse weather conditions and work of insects on the nuts are attributed by Burkett as the chief cause for the poor crop.

BRADY SHERIFF HAS A GOOD RECORD

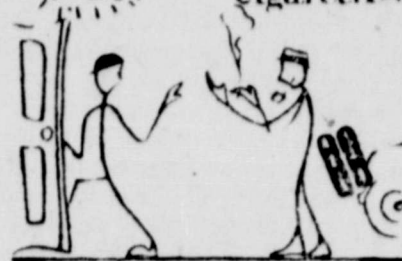

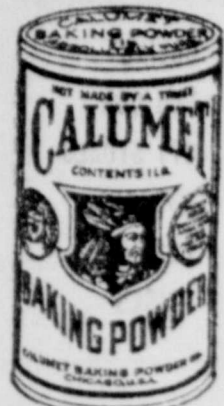
