DPS study: High-profile gangs have local presence

Twelve of the 14 gangs listed as having the greatest threat to the state of Texas have a presence in Midland County, according to the Texas Gang Threat Assessment, a state intelligence estimate produced by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The document released by DPS shows that the four "Tier 1" gangs — Tango Blast and Tango Cliques, Texas Mexican Mafia, Mara Salvatrucha (MS-13) and Barrio Azteca — are in Midland and Ector counties. Joining them are eight of the 10 "Tier 2" gangs. They are Bloods, Aryan Brotherhood of Texas, Texas Syndicate,

Sureños, Crips, Gangster Disciples, Aryan Circle and Bandidos Outlaw Motorcycle Gang.

A breakdown of the DPS West Texas region, which includes El Paso, Midland, Odessa and San Angelo, indicates that the most significant gangs in West Texas this year include Barrio Azteca, Bloods (multiple sets), Crips (mul-

tiples), Gangster Disciples, Sureños (multiple sets), Chuco Tango and West Texas Tangos. The majority of reported gang activity in West Texas occurs in El Paso and Midland counties, according to the report.

Barrio Azteca has a documented presence throughout the West Texas region, with a majority of documented members in El Paso and Midland counties. Other significant gangs active throughout the region include Latin Kings, Aryan Brotherhood of Texas and Aryan Circle.

The Aryan Brotherhood of Texas and Aryan Circle don't have a presence in El Paso but there is a "documented presence of members" in Ector, Midland, and Tom

Green counties, according to the report.

According to reported arrest data from fiscal year 2017 through calendar year 2017, the majority of gang arrests in West Texas were for drug and violent crimes. The data indicates that 85 percent of the arrests for violent crimes were assault, 8 percent were for robbery, 3 percent were for homicide, 2 percent were for kidnapping and 2 percent were for sexual assault.

Gang members with the most arrests for violent crimes in West Texas belong to Barrio Azteca, Gangster Disciples, Sureños (multiple sets), West Texas Tangos and Chuco Tangos. Sureños (multiple

Cornyn's pragmatic approach to border issues hits a wall

WASHINGTON — As Washington approached a possible partial government shutdown over the U.S.-Mexico border wall last week, Sen. John Cornyn was once again pitching more pragmatic solutions to ease the crisis at his state's border.

The Republican's ideas are now far from what the conservative base of his party wants.

While President Donald Trump is adamant about getting \$5 billion for a concrete wall along the southern border, Cornyn is pushing a more holistic approach.

"I've always believed (the solution) was a combination of physical barriers in hard to control areas, particularly urban areas where a quick dash across the border can mean success illegally reaching in the United States," Cornyn said. "But many of our challenges have to have a technology base, radar, ground sensors — you name it, then, of course, the personnel."

Republicans and Democrats at an impasse over how much money to spend on a wall meant to address the crisis of migrants and asylum seekers arriving at the border.

If they can't reach an agreement by Friday, some government agencies, including the Department of Homeland Security, will run out of money and have to at least partially shut down.

Cornyn, whose state includes more than 1,200 miles of the U.S. border with Mexico, last year introduced a border-wall plan that would rely on technology to monitor areas where a wall is less practical.

The proposal has not been widely embraced by lawmakers from either party, as both parties have retreated to their corners on the issue after Trump's election.

Cornyn, who presides over the Senate's corresponding committee, is seeking re-election in a state that's grown increasingly worrisome for Republicans in 2020. Though he faced a larger challenge from the right in his 2014 race, Cornyn went out of his way to draw a contrast with Trump's border policies (last) week, saying Texas Republicans need to move beyond "primary politics."

"While I have been generally supportive of the president and his policies, I would note my difference on a number of issues like trade, and some of the tactics used even in terms of border security," he said.

A pragmatist whose role as Republican vote-counter includes seeking an agreement on some of the party's stickiest issues, Cornyn has long been among his party's negotiators with Democrats on immigration

Democratic primary could be Texas shootout

■ O'Rourke, Julian Castro are testing presidential waters

The 2018 elections in Texas had a decidedly national flavor, led by the battle for the U.S. Senate between Ted Cruz and Beto O'Rourke. But the 2020 presidential race, which is already underway, has a decidedly Texas tang.

With one of their own in the White House, Texas Republicans are keeping their heads down. But two of the many, many Democrats flirting with the race are from Texas, adding an I-10 primary to the national one.

The presidential race could force Texas Democrats to choose between two of their brightest rising stars, in El Paso's O'Rourke, 46, and San Antonio's Julián Castro, 44.

Castro, like O'Rourke, has never won a statewide race in Texas.

He's never lost one, either.

Unlike O'Rourke, Castro has executive experience. He was San Antonio's mayor for five years, after serving for four years as a member of its city council. President Obama then selected him as Secretary of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, a post he held until January 2017. He was touted as a vice

presidential candidate for Hillary Clinton before she chose U.S. Sen. Tim Kaine of Virginia for that role.

Castro and his twin brother, Joaquin, a congressman from San Antonio, have been the subject of sometimes overheated election speculation in Texas for years. Both have turned back numerous entreaties to run for state office; their names were in the mix as recently as last year, when Democrats were shopping for candidates to challenge Republican Gov. Greg Abbott.

But Julián's presidential studies were already underway. He had a book in the works; that totem of nearly every presidential campaign is now in print, under the title "An Unlikely Journey: Waking Up from My American Dream."

And (last) week, he took another step in the presidential dance, saying — on letterhead that included the words "Julián Castro for President Exploratory Committee" — that he will be announcing his plans next month.

It's a presidential thing, announcing that you're exploring and that you'll announce the result of the exploration on a particular date a month away. As with any dance, there's a specific rhythm to this.

O'Rourke is cutting a different rug. The recent loser of that race with Cruz said

before the elections that he had no plans to seek any other office. He spurned presidential talk. But a couple of weeks after the election, he told an El Paso crowd that he and his wife had "made a decision not to rule anything out."

It's like the announcement gambol but sets up the tension about a future decision a little differently. Both are designed to test the waters and to generate news coverage.

Like Castro, O'Rourke has city council experience, but stayed on the legislative side of things, winning a spot in Congress, where he's finishing a third term.

They begin as friends, denizens of the two biggest Texas cities on Interstate 10, two years apart in age, bearers of the hopes of Democrats in a state where Democrats have been on the endangered species list — at least in statewide races — for a couple of decades. And as subjects of national political talk, they're upholding a long tradition for Texans from both parties.

It's early and nobody knows which candidates will turn out to be "real" and which ones won't. But this is clear: When America looks for national leaders, it always has Texas on the list of places to shop.

The state just buried the third of its four presidents (if you count Dwight Eisenhower, who was born in Texas).

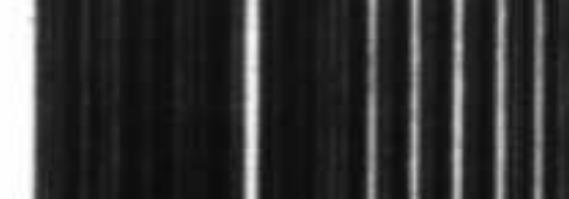

White House digs in on border wall demand, risking shutdown

WASHINGTON — The White House on Sunday pushed the federal government closer to the brink of a partial shutdown later this week, digging in on its demand for \$5 billion to build a border wall as congressional Democrats stood firm against it.

"We will do whatever is necessary to build the border wall to stop this ongoing crisis of immigration," said White House senior adviser Stephen Miller.

Asked if that meant having a government shutdown, he said: "If it comes to it, absolutely."

Trump said last week he would be "proud" to have a shutdown to get Congress to approve a \$5 billion down payment to fulfill his campaign promise to build a wall on the U.S.-Mexico border. But the president doesn't have the votes from the Republican-controlled Congress to support funding for the wall at that level.

Democratic congressional leaders, Sen. Chuck Schumer and Rep. Nancy Pelosi, have proposed no more than \$1.6 billion, as outlined in a bipartisan Senate bill. The money would not go for the wall but for fencing upgrades and other border security. Democrats also offered to simply keep funding at its current level, \$1.3 billion.

Showing no signs of budging, Schumer said Sunday that it was up to Trump to decide whether parts of the federal government shut down at midnight Friday over his border wall, sending thousands of federal employees home without pay during the holidays.

About one-quarter of the government would be affected, including the departments of Homeland Security, Transportation, Agriculture, State and Justice, as well as national parks.

"He is not going to get the wall in any form," Schumer said.

Both parties in Congress have suggested that Trump would likely need to make the next move to resolve the impasse. The House is taking an extended weekend break, returning Wednesday night. The Senate returns Monday after a three-day absence.

Trump had neither accepted nor rejected the Democrats' proposal as of Friday, according to the Democrats, telling them he would take a look. Trump will need Democratic votes either way, now or in the new year, for passage.

Wyoming Sen. John Barrasso, the No. 3 Republican in the Senate, said Republicans remain hopeful they can come up with a proposal that can be acceptable to Trump and pass both chambers. He suggested that could take the form of a stopgap bill that extends funding until January, or a longer-term bill that includes money for border security.

"There are a lot of things you need to do with border security," he said. "One is a physical barrier but also the technology, the manpower, the enforcement, all of those things, and our current laws are in some ways an incentive for people to come to this country illegally, and they go through great risk and possibly great harm."

Sen. Susan Collins, R-Maine, urged senators to revisit a bill she helped push earlier this year that would provide \$2.5 billion for border security, including physical barriers as well as technology and border patrol agents.

Schumer declined to say whether Democrats would be willing to consider proposals other than the two options that he and Pelosi offered.

Republicans "should join us in one of these two proposals, which would get more than enough votes passed and avoid a shutdown," Schumer said. "Then, if the president wants to debate the wall next year, he can. I don't think he'll get it. But he shouldn't use innocent workers as hostage for his temper tantrum."

Miller and Barrasso spoke on CBS' "Face the Nation." Schumer appeared on NBC's "Meet the Press," and Collins was on ABC's "This Week."

Child's death highlights communication barriers on border

Shortly before a 7-year-old Guatemalan girl died in U.S. custody, her father signed a form stating that his daughter was in good health. But it's unclear how much the man understood on the form, which was written in English and read to him in Spanish by Border Patrol agents.

The death of Jakelin Caa highlights the communication challenges along the U.S.-Mexico border as agents come in contact with an increasing number of migrants who speak neither English nor Spanish.

Her father's native language is the Mayan tongue known as Q'eqchi'. His second language is Spanish. It's unclear whether something was lost in translation or whether it would have made a difference in saving Jakelin after the two were detained and underwent a health screening along a remote stretch of U.S.-Mexico border. But the case raises questions about the Border Patrol's use of English-only forms.

All agents are required to speak Spanish, and they receive formal Spanish training. Reading forms in Spanish is often enough to pose basic questions. But some other Spanish-speaking migrants reported signing paperwork that they later said they did not understand.

Scores of immigrant parents who were separated from their children after crossing the border in the spring said they signed forms agreeing to be deported with the understanding that their kids would be returning with them, only to find themselves deported without them. Many had to

wait months before being reunited with them in their homelands.

WASHINGTON Trump says he'll review murder case against ex-Army commando

President Donald Trump said Sunday that he will be "reviewing" the case of a former U.S. Army commando being charged with murder, raising questions about the possibility he could jeopardize the ongoing military legal proceedings.

Trump tweeted that "at the request of many" he will examine allegations that Mathew Golsteyn hunted down and killed a suspected bomb-maker in Afghanistan. The president tweeted that Golsteyn is a "U.S. Military hero" who could face the death penalty "from our own government."

Any review or intervention by Trump could constitute unlawful command influence and could threaten the case against the former Green Beret.

In a statement Sunday, Army Col. Rob Manning, a Pentagon spokesman, said that "the allegations against Major Matt Golsteyn are a law enforcement matter. The Department of Defense will respect the integrity of this process and provide updates when appropriate."

sets) and Tangos (Chuco and West Texas) had the highest number of arrests for homicide.

Tangos (Chuco and West Texas) also had the highest number of arrests for kidnapping (aggravated), robbery (aggravated) and sexual assaults (aggravated).

The report also mentioned law enforcement work having to do with gang activity and the high auto theft rates in the Midland and Odessa area. The case focused primarily on people who were members and associates of the Aryan Circle and the Aryan Brotherhood of Texas. Members of these gangs, according to the report, collaborated to steal vehicles. The vehicles were altered and either re-sold or used to commit other crimes, including drug and weapons trafficking, robbery, burglary, prostitution, mail theft, identity theft, forgery of bank checks and credit card fraud. The investigation resulted in 115 total seizures — 34 seizures of drugs valued at \$58,644, 26 seizures of firearms valued at \$17,548, 55 recoveries of vehicles valued at \$719,817 and six seizures of stolen property.

Special agents filed 147 charges that resulted in 21 indictments, 93 arrests and 20 convictions on individuals. Agencies that worked with DPS on this 18-month investigation include the Midland and Odessa police departments, Ector County Sheriff's Office, U.S. Attorney's Office, Drug Enforcement Administration and the Midland County and Ector County district attorney's offices.

The following Tier 1 and Tier 2 gangs have a presence in Midland County, according to the assessment.

Gangs with the highest scores are deemed the most significant and are classified as Tier 1, with other significant gangs classified as Tier 2 and Tier 3. Listed in the report are descriptions of the Tier 1 and 2 gangs.

Tier 1: Tango Blast and Tango Cliques

Tango Blast and its associated cliques are located in most metropolitan areas and many rural counties across Texas. Tango Blast first established as a self-protection group against traditionally structured prison gangs, such as the Texas Mexican Mafia and Texas Syndicate. The Tangos continue growing at a fast rate, and maintain the highest membership numbers among all Texas-based gangs. With their lack of organizational structure and no strict commitment rules, Tango's unique "hybrid" gang status allows for widespread recruitment and increasingly dangerous appeal to younger generations. In their rapid criminal evolution, the Tangos established a robust résumé of violence and illicit activities, while building business relationships with various Mexican cartels.

Tier 1: Texas Mexican Mafia

The Texas Mexican Mafia (TMM) formed within the Texas prison system in 1984 as a means for inmates to protect themselves from the Texas Syndicate. Though TMM members continue to uphold commitment to the gang, unceasing law enforcement targeting efforts have affected membership growth and structure. The new generation of TMM is causing internal strife, dismantling the organization from within, and increasing the level of separation between older and younger members. Despite these struggles, the TMM will likely continue to be organizationally effective,

changing their structure to best fit their available resources and engage in criminal activity, and remain a significant threat to the Texas.

Tier 1: Mara Salvatrucha

Mara Salvatrucha (MS-13) has attracted national attention over the past year, highlighting the violent nature of the gang and leading to increased scrutiny of the gang by law enforcement. MS-13 leadership may be attempting to capitalize on this attention and allegedly has made efforts to extend their control of cliques and programs in the United States. MS-13 members historically used Texas as a transitional area or as a location to hide from criminal charges in other states or countries. Recent intelligence, however, suggests MS-13 now uses Houston as a hub of criminal activity. This trend is likely the cause of increased membership in Texas, though actual gang presence is fluid due to the transient nature of gang members and gang activities. MS-13 continues to refine and change techniques in evading law enforcement detection by changing their long-standing rules regarding clothing and tattoos.

Given the gang's propensity for violence, relationship with cartels, increased control over numerous cliques, rising numbers and juvenile recruiting practices, MS-13 remains a Tier 1 threat.

Tier 1: Barrio Azteca

Barrio Azteca continues to be a significant threat to Texas because of its propensity for violence, level of criminal activity, relationships with cartels and other gangs, control of the Valle de Juarez in Mexico and the drug corridor in El Paso, their involvement in sex trafficking, and a high level of transnational criminal activity. While in recent years there have been ebbs and flows in the amount of reporting on Barrio Azteca, and though their hub of activity remains in Juarez and El Paso, the level at which they are operating earns them a high threat ranking for Texas as a whole. This is partly because members' reach extends far outside the city limits of El Paso, as they distribute high amounts of drugs from their operations further into Texas and throughout the United States. It is likely that Barrio Azteca will continue to ensure its dominance in West Texas and across the border, directly affecting the citizens of Texas.

Tier 2: Bloods

The Bloods are a violent street gang that originated in Los Angeles in the early 1970s, with ties to People-Nation-affiliated gangs. Bloods' gang presence in Texas has been documented since the 1980s. Multiple cities in Texas have instituted gang injunctions against the Bloods and their rivals, the Crips. The Bloods' overall presence, the level of their criminal activity, and the violence perpetrated by their members qualify them as a serious threat in Texas. The Bloods continue to be a loosely organized, extremely violent street gang that is involved in a wide variety of crimes, ranging from petty theft to murder. Much like their traditional rival, the Crips, the Bloods' street gang presence is mainly in the major urban areas, but its members regularly form small groups that travel throughout the state and beyond to conduct criminal activity, such as robberies and burglaries.

Tier 2: Aryan Brotherhood of Texas

The Aryan Brotherhood of Texas (ABT) places its

racist ideology secondary to its everyday criminal activities. Although law enforcement continues to disrupt ABT operations and leadership structure around the state, the gang remains a significant threat because of its continued involvement in violent crimes, drug trafficking, firearms trafficking, frequent property crimes and the strength of their organizational structure inside of correctional facilities. Multiple incidents of involvement with Mexican cartels occurred during 2017, in which ABT acted as a courier. In 2017, threats to law enforcement from ABT increased in multiple states and one member engaged in sex trafficking. Recent law enforcement actions resulting in ABT members receiving federal sentences possibly facilitated the creation of a wider (though not necessarily larger) ABT network. Reports show ABT's interactions with gangs typically not active in Texas and an increase of communications and incidents involving ABT members and associates located outside of Texas.

Tier 2: Texas Syndicate

The Texas Syndicate prison gang formed in the California penal system in the 1960s and eventually moved into TDCJ prisons and onto the streets of Texas. Recent law enforcement targeting created setbacks for the Texas Syndicate, in particular to the gang's structure, as the lack of material benefit, power and security in the free world affected the gang's governance abilities. Despite the setbacks, the gang's level of violence and continued relationship with Mexican cartels makes the Texas Syndicate a resilient criminal threat to Texas.

Tier 2: Sureños

The Sureños is an "umbrella" organization of gangs paying homage to the California Mexican Mafia. Gang members unaffiliated with California Mexican Mafia also use "Sureños," which means "south," to symbolize that they are from Southern California. Sureños remain a threat to the state of Texas because of its relationship with cartels, propensity for violence, level of criminal activity, involvement in human smuggling and recruitment of minors. The trend of Sureños members moving from California to the El Paso area likely will continue, as well as their attempt to take over the El Paso area from Barrio Azteca.

Tier 2: Crips

The Crips criminal street gang remains loosely organized, with multiple cliques throughout the state. During this reporting period, Crips members participated in a wide variety of crimes, including homicides, assaults, robberies, burglaries, fraud and sex trafficking offenses. Members committed violent crimes against citizens and fellow offenders during

the commission of other crimes, such as robberies, burglaries, sex trafficking and drug deals. Members committed violent crimes against law enforcement while attempting to evade arrest. Internal conflict sometimes resulted in intra-gang violence. The Crips pose the greatest threat to the larger metropolitan areas of Texas, but its members sometimes form smaller groups that travel outside of their usual operational areas to commit crimes throughout the state and as far away as Arizona.

Tier 2: Gangster Disciples

The Gangster Disciples is a nationally recognized, historically black criminal street gang that was founded in Chicago and has spread throughout the United States, including Texas. It is highly organized, violent, and active in the major metropolitan areas of Texas and in the communities surrounding the major military installations in Texas. Its members are involved in a wide variety of criminal activities, including homicides, assaults, thefts, robberies, burglaries, sex trafficking, fraud and illegal drug sales. Although its numbers in Texas are significantly fewer than those of the Bloods and Crips, the Gangster Disciples' level of organization, level of criminal activity, proximity to military communities and reported relationship with Mexican cartels raise concerns.

Tier 2: Aryan Circle

The Aryan Circle's white supremacy ideologies come secondary to illicit business and profiting from criminal activities. Although the Aryan Circle is not a threat to the border areas of Texas, the gang presents a public safety threat to the state because of its involvement in violent crimes, drug distribution and firearms trafficking. Aryan Circle members commit many of their violent crimes against their own members or rivals because of rules dictated by gang culture, their constitution and leadership. Aryan Circle continues to derive its prevalence, effectiveness and strength to withstand law enforcement operations from its paramilitary structure.

Tier 2: Bandidos Outlaw Motorcycle Gang

Members of the Bandidos Outlaw Motorcycle Gang (OMG) continue to participate in illegal activities. The Bandidos OMG is currently involved in a violent feud with the newly formed Kinfolk Motorcycle Gang (MG). Formed in the 1960s, the Bandidos OMG conducts its illegal activities as covertly as possible and generally tries to avoid high-profile activities. However, members are not covert about making their presence known, frequently wearing their gang colors, insignia and riding in large groups. They seek to turn public sentiment in their favor by organizing frequent charity runs.

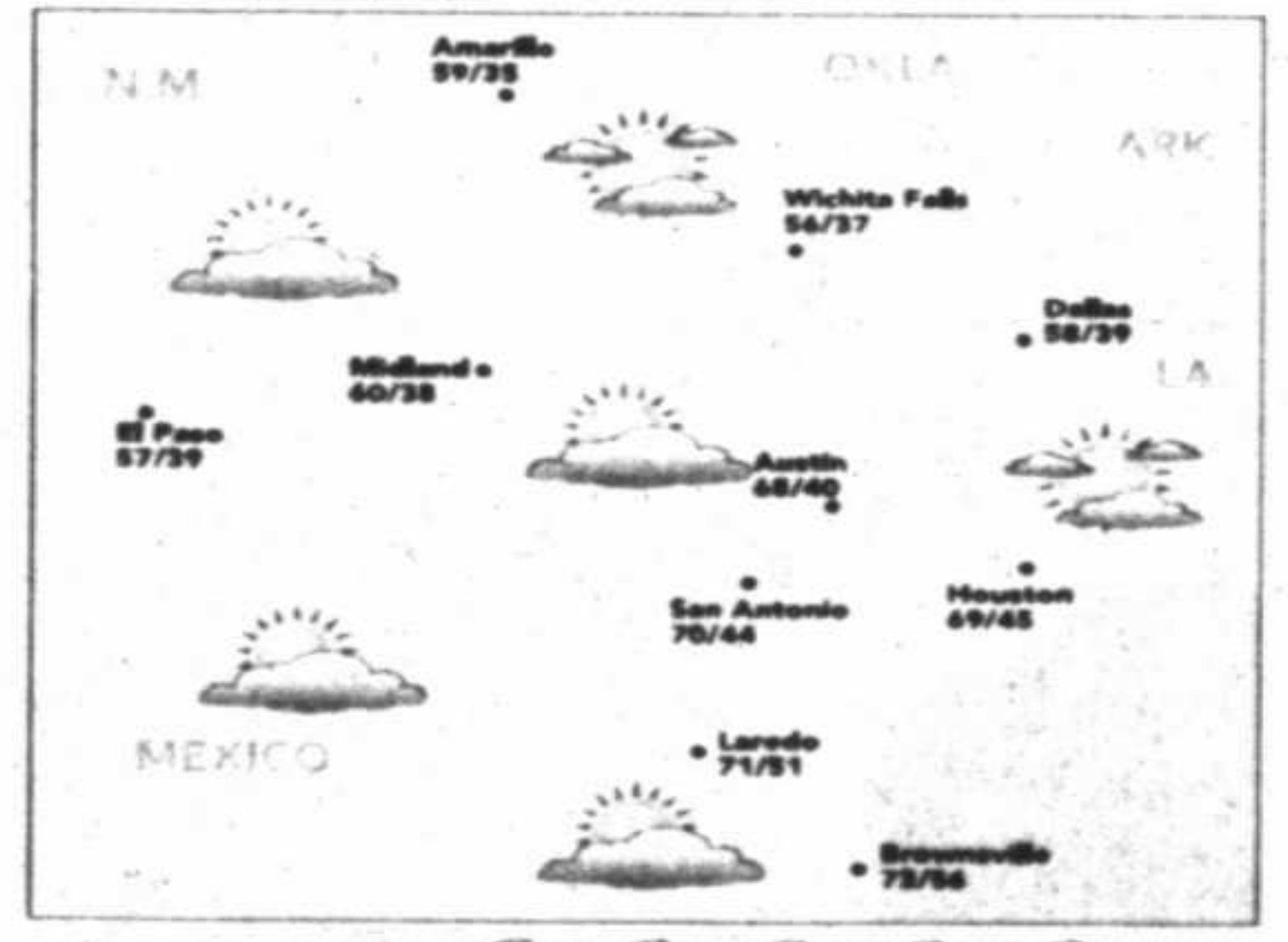

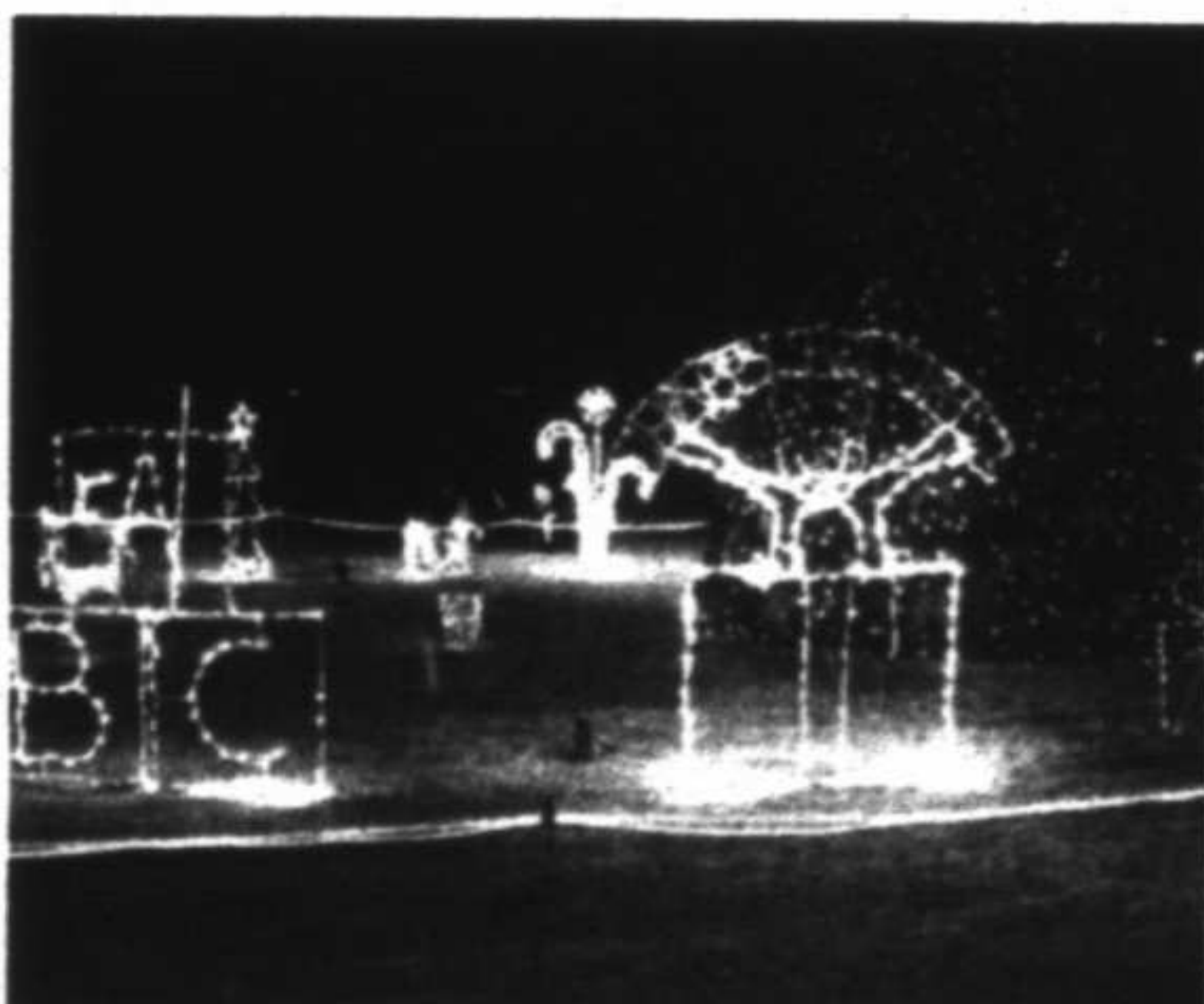

Texas names have been on the candidate lists in most presidential races of the last 60 years: Lyndon Johnson, John Connally, George H.W. Bush, Lloyd Bentsen, Ross Perot, George W. Bush, Ted Cruz, and now these two.

It could even put the state in play in two years. Presidential primaries in Texas usually don't draw big crowds. They're bigger than non-presidential primaries, but the national

races usually are decided before our primaries roll around. One of two recent exceptions was the Republican primary election in 2016, which occurred before Donald Trump secured the nomination. It drew 2.84 million voters, or about 10 percent of registered voters in Texas. Trump finished second, with 26.8 percent of the vote. Ted Cruz, the Texas candidate on the ballot, got 43.8 percent.

The Democrats pulled

the same trick a few years earlier, attracting 2.87 million voters in 2008, or 22.5 percent of the state's registered voters at the time. Hillary Clinton won that year, with 50.9 percent, over Barack Obama, who got 47.4 percent.

Those are the high points, and maybe a mark to hit if

two Texas candidates are on the same party's ballot by the time the March 2020 primaries roll around.

That's a long way off, and politics is a hard business. December 2018 could be the start of something big. Or it might turn out, for one or both, to be the best month of the whole cycle.

and border matters.

The day after Trump's televised dispute with Democratic leaders, Cornyn met at a barely noticed hearing on the Senate's border panel with Sen. Richard Durbin, D-Ill., who laid out Democrats' ideas for easing the crisis at the border.

"Based on what you're saying, I can see some common ground for investing in scanning devices, customs officers, dealing with the straw purchasers (of firearms) and the bulk cash transfers across the border," Cornyn said to his Democratic counterpart.

Nevertheless, he said, "I see some components of legislation we could

work on together, like we worked on with criminal justice reform," referring to a plan the two men helped craft to overhaul the nation's prison system.

The hearing sought comments from officials at the Department of Homeland Security, Drug Enforcement Administration and the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy to "look beyond our borders and examine the larger problems contributing to the crisis," Cornyn said.

'Spider-Verse' swings to the top; 'Mortal Engines' tanks

LOS ANGELES — "Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse" swung to the top of the domestic box office in its first weekend in theaters, proving that there is widespread audience interest in big screen animated versions of Marvel's marquee superheroes.

The film led a host of newcomers that debuted to varying success on this pre-Christmas holiday weekend, including Clint Eastwood's drug smuggling drama "The Mule" and the Peter Jackson-produced epic "Mortal Engines" which bombed in North American theaters.

"Into the Spider-Verse" earned an estimated \$35.4 million from 3,813 theaters against a \$90 million production budget according to Sony Pictures on Sunday, which is a record for animated movies in December (although the hybrid "Alvin and the Chipmunks" movies were higher). The film features an innovative animation style — both CGI and hand-drawn — and focuses on the Miles Morales character as he learns to become the famed web-slinger. It's another financial win for the studio's latest "expanded Spider-Man universe" strategy following "Venom" and "Spider-Man: Homecoming."

And "Spider-Verse" has been very well-received among critics, and audiences in exit surveys gave it a rare A+ CinemaScore — a first for a Spider-Man film. It's also been nominated for a Golden Globe award for best animated feature and picked up a few honors from critics' groups as well, including the New York Film Critics Circle.

"We are playing to both families and fanboys. We're an all-audience film," said Adrian Smith, Sony's president of domestic distribution.

They also have an eight-day runway until the big Christmas release start packing the multiplexes.

The Clint Eastwood-directed drug smuggling drama "The Mule" debuted in second place with an estimated \$17.2 million. It's a solid debut for R-rated film that cost \$50 million to produce. The Warner Bros. film drew an audience that was mostly older (78

percent over 35-years-old) and male (54 percent).

"Clint Eastwood has such a big following as a director and a star," said Jeff Goldstein, Warner Bros. president of domestic distribution.

It's Eastwood's first major role in a film since 2012, and the studio is optimistic about the film's longevity into the holiday.

Not all the new films were so lucky, however. Coming in fifth behind holdovers "Dr. Seuss' The Grinch" and "Ralph Breaks the Internet," was the Peter Jackson-produced epic "Mortal Engines," which bombed in North American theaters, taking in only \$7.5 million in ticket sales against a reported \$100 million production budget. MRC and Universal Pictures produced the post-apocalyptic steampunk film based on the popular Philip Reeve book, which is the first of four in a series.

Neither critics nor audiences responded favorably to the Christian Rivers-directed film, however, which has a deathly 28 percent on Rotten Tomatoes.

This weekend also saw the release of the PG-13 rated version of "Deadpool 2," "Once Upon A Deadpool," in 1,566 locations. It earned an estimated \$2.6 million, which is being added to "Deadpool 2's" box office totals.

In limited release, Barry Jenkins' James Baldwin adaptation "If Beale Street Could Talk" opened in four theaters to a very strong \$219,173. Jenkins' follow-up to "Moonlight" is expected to be a big player throughout awards season and expands nationwide in the coming weeks.

Historically, this mid-December, pre-Christmas weekend has not been a big one for movie openings, save for the exception of last year when "Star Wars: The Last Jedi" opened to \$220 million, which is why the weekend overall is down some 61 percent from last year and why the year-to-date advantage has fallen slightly to 8.5 percent.

But the industry is still on track for a record year at the box office and has several late-game blockbusters on the way including "Aquaman," "Bumblebee" and "Mary Poppins Returns."

For sale: Restored home of Salem witch trials refugee

BOSTON — A once-run-down historic home that stands where a woman accused of witchcraft during the 1692 Salem witch trials settled after she was spared the noose is on the market after an extensive renovation project.

The home in Framingham, Massachusetts, known as the Peter and Sarah Claves House, hit the market Thursday with an asking price of \$975,000. An open house was planned Sunday.

Annie Murphy, executive director of the Framingham History Center and a member of the trust formed to save the structure that had fallen into disrepair, is confident someone who appreciates history will snap up the property.

"We've already done

tours, and I had people coming up to me practically in tears, they were so thrilled we had saved this house," she said.

Sarah Claves was jailed during the 1692 witch trials, which claimed the lives of 20 people, including her sisters, Rebecca Nurse and Mary Easty. She was freed in 1693 when the hysteria died down.

Sarah and her husband, Peter, along with other members of their extended family, resettled on land about 35 miles southwest of Salem that in 1700 became the town of Framingham.

Historians acknowledge that little, if any, of the original home built at the site in 1693 remains. The structure still standing dates to 1776.

After a foreclosure around 2000, the privately owned home was abandoned and became derelict.

It was vandalized and defaced with graffiti.

The trust was created to make renovations that turned out to be way more complicated than anticipated, said Murphy, who herself spent hours scraping paint and pulling weeds to help her contractor husband, Ned, complete the work.

The 4,253-square-foot, five-bedroom home on a little more than an acre of land has been updated with modern conveniences yet retains some old features, including much of the woodwork and floors, plaster stenciling in one room that dates to the 1820s, and restored claw-foot bathtubs.

The property includes a 150-year-old American elm, a brook and the ruins of an old mill.

"It's been a labor of love," Murphy said.

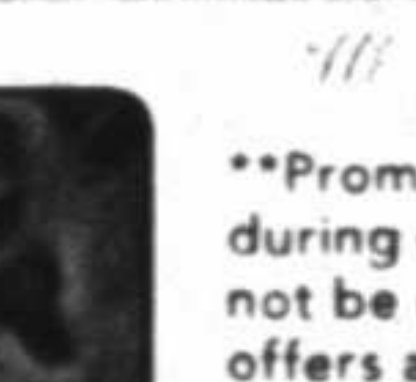

Cards could be stacked against Trump in 2020

■ President could convince voters to cast ballots against the Democrats rather than for the incumbent

Donald Trump probably can't win the 2020 presidential election, but the Democrats can lose it.

What I mean is, that in a contest between Trump and a generic Democrat, Trump would almost surely lose if the current political climate holds through 2020. According to a (recent) Fox News poll, 38 percent of respondents said they would "definitely" or "probably" vote for Trump, while 55 percent said they would "definitely" or "probably" vote for someone else.

Trump's boosters are often quick to dismiss the polls, claiming they were wrong in 2016, when everyone said he had no chance of winning. The problem with this defense is that the national polls were actually pretty accurate in 2016. If you average out the 13 final national polls of 2016, they showed Hillary Clinton ahead by 3.1 percentage points. She won the popular vote — the only thing national polls measure — by 2.1 percentage points.

Trump carried the Electoral College because he won Pennsylvania and Wisconsin

by 0.7 points each and Michigan by 0.2 points. A mere 78,000 votes carried the day.

Most presidents work assiduously to build on the coalition that brought them to power. President Trump has done almost the opposite, catering to his base while doing almost everything he can to alienate suburban Republicans and independents, which is why the GOP got shellacked in the midterms.

So if Trump runs — which is probably a bigger "if" than many people think — the cards are stacked against him. Fortunately for him, the Democrats will not nominate someone named Generic Democrat.

Instead, the Democrats are poised to recreate the same dynamic that got Trump the GOP nomination in the first place. While it's technically true that Trump beat

16 opponents, as he likes to say, the truth is a bit more complicated. Trump never won a majority of votes in the primaries. He benefited from a collective action problem in which various candidates defeated each other while a sticky plurality of voters stuck with Trump.

If the field had been narrower, with only two or three contenders other than Trump, his base of support might not have been enough. But with each additional player, the number of votes he needed to win shrank.

Right now, it's almost easier to list the number of prominent Democrats who aren't thinking of running. No one knows for sure but estimates on the number of potential Democratic candidates range from 20 to 40. In that kind of field, the ability to attract a small but passionate cadre of supporters will be more important than arguments about electability. Thus, there will be an enormous incentive to replicate the Trump model of taking unorthodox positions, stated as boldly as possible, in order to win over the most passionate ideologues and activists.

Moreover, the mood among Democrats is more than a little analogous to the mood among Republicans in 2016. Hillary

Clinton was a uniquely disliked and feared figure among conservatives. The argument that America would be "over" if she won found purchase among millions of Republican voters. One need only listen to a few minutes of discussion on CNN or MSNBC, or to read the op-ed pages on almost any given day, to see that a similar attitude is widespread among Democrats. If you can't imagine chants of "Lock him up!" at the Democratic convention in 2020, you haven't been paying attention.

Thus, the odds that the Democrats will elect their own Trump are very high. Of course, the one thing Trump fans and foes alike can agree on is that Trump is a unique political personality. But a Democratic candidate could substitute policy outlandishness for personal outlandishness quite easily. Many in the Democratic base could easily rally to someone promising to abolish ICE, deliver "Medicare for All," repeal the Second Amendment ... whatever. That would give Trump the ability to convince many otherwise hostile voters to cast ballots against the Democrats rather than for the incumbent.

He can't win, but they can still lose.

Ivanka Trump email controversy is rich in irony

If there is one action every member of the Trump administration, especially a family member, should avoid, it's using private email for government work.

The misuse of private email was a central tenet in Donald Trump's 2016 presidential campaign. Again and again, he blasted former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton for her misuse of private email in that role. Even now, crowds at Trump rallies break into the tiresome chant of "Lock her up!" in reference to the email scandal that plagued Clinton, the Democratic nominee for president.

We suspect there will be no such chants for Ivanka Trump, who used personal email to conduct public business last year.

Yes, there are differences in both volume and how the emails were handled. But the common thread remains central. Both cases involve rules dictating how email business should be conducted.

Clinton's use of private email was not criminal — despite Donald Trump's rhetoric — and we don't remotely suspect Ivanka Trump's use of private email was criminal, either. Careless, yes. Hypocritical given the campaign rhetoric, an even louder yes. These are self-inflicted wounds.

Already, U.S. Rep. Elijah Cummings, D-Md., who will oversee the House Oversight Committee next year, has signaled there will be an investigation into the use of private email by Ivanka Trump and her husband, Jared Kushner, whose use of private emails was reported last year.

To his credit, Cummings has said the investigation will be bipartisan and not a political sideshow. It remains to be seen if Cummings will adhere to that — but it's clear that the congressional hearings on Clinton's email use was not evenhanded and neither is the president's continuing demand for prosecution of Clinton. These demands come even as the special counsel's investigation into the president's conduct on other matters piles up the president's legal woes.

"My goal is to prevent this from happening again — not to turn this into a spectacle the way Republicans went after Hillary Clinton," Cummings said.

This is the right approach. The last thing this country needs is more grandstanding on emails.

About those key differences in these competing email escapades: A review by Ivanka Trump's private attorney found fewer than 100 emails were sent from her personal account to conduct government business. Fewer than 1,000 emails were also sent from her personal account regarding her travel plans and schedule.

Clinton maintained a private email server, and thousands of emails were deleted despite a congressional investigation. Clinton never sent or received messages marked as classified, but the FBI later found that 110 emails contained classified information.

These are important distinctions overlooked simply because the hypocrisy is so rich. Given the 2016 election, it strains credulity to think Ivanka Trump was unaware of the rules around private email and public work. Beyond this, when she formally joined the White House in 2017, she agreed to honor ethics rules, which would include not using private email for public work.

An investigation is warranted because it would ensure Kushner and Ivanka Trump have complied with open records requests in providing all relevant emails. And if an investigation helps ensure no one else in this White House, or future administrations, makes this mistake, the country will be better for it.

Anything more would be an unfortunate political distraction.

GOP ends quest to prove Clinton's guilt

■ If investigations are the mark of a 'small agenda' unbefitting 'great nation,' the Republican majority should have governed Liechtenstein

Republicans, in the waning hours of their eight-year reign in the House, are using this precious time to do what they love best: investigating Hillary Clinton's emails.

The House Oversight Committee had one last item on this year's calendar — a hearing Thursday on the Clinton Foundation. But it didn't stop there. Republicans and their witnesses used the hearing to reprise their greatest hits: her email server, Benghazi, George Soros, Sidney Blumenthal, Huma Abedin, Cheryl Mills, James Comey, Andrew McCabe, Peter Strzok, Lisa Page, IRS targeting the tea party, Uranium One and a QAnon conspiracy about the Justice Department swooping into Little Rock to seize Clinton documents.

Even the lock-her-up Trump administration had tired of these proceedings. The Justice Department — under the command of Trump loyalist and former hot-tub promoter Matthew Whitaker — refused to testify (leading one witness to suggest the administration had joined the cover up) and the IRS also sent regrets.

Instead, Republicans summoned conspiracy theorists, including "investigators" poised to make money as tipsters if the IRS brings a Clinton Foundation case. But even these witnesses refused to provide documents supporting their dubious claims.

"If you're not going to share the information with this committee ... my patience is running out," said Rep. Mark Meadows, R-N.C., recently on the short list to be President Trump's next chief of staff.

"Are you going to prosecute the Clintons?" one witness, John Moynihan, replied. "I don't think you are."

"Don't get cute with me!" Meadows said.

It was an ignominious end for a Republican majority that spent years in a vain quest to prove the guilt of Clinton and former president Barack Obama. But what they lack in evidence, they have in chutzpah. "It looks like what they're going to focus on is just more investigations," incoming House minority leader Kevin McCarthy, R-Calif., said last week. "I think America is too great of a nation to have such a small agenda."

If investigations are the mark of a "small agenda" unbefitting a "great nation," the Republican majority should have governed Liechtenstein.

On Dec. 7, Republicans on the House Judiciary Committee hauled in former FBI director James Comey to talk more about Hillary's emails. They plan to bring in former attorney general Loretta Lynch and bring back Comey for more private interviews about the same. This all follows scores of probes into the Benghazi attacks, Planned

Parenthood (each merited a select committee), IRS targeting, Operation Fast and Furious, Clinton's emails, Solyndra, Obamacare and more. In the first three years of GOP control, the oversight chairman issued more subpoenas (96) than had been issued in the previous eight years.

And now, this coda: On Thursday, unable to get the administration's cooperation, the oversight committee brought in Tom Fitton of Judicial Watch, whose investigations director was banned from Fox News after alleging the "Soros-occupied State Department" funded the migrant caravan. Later came Moynihan, who employs the man behind the false allegation in 2008 that a tape had Michelle Obama disparaging "whiteness," and who in 2013 used doctored audio to declare John Kerry a rapist.

Rep. Gerald E. Connolly of Virginia, top Democrat on the subcommittee conducting the oversight hearing, asked why the panel, instead of examining what landed Michael Cohen a prison sentence or New York's fraud prosecution of the Trump Foundation, was "regifting" its frustrated anti-Clinton efforts. Even the Trump administration, he surmised, has decided "there's no there there."

The Republicans couldn't get their own witnesses to document the allegations they made against the Clintons. "I feel like you're using us for your own benefit," Rep. Jody Hice, R-Ga., told Moynihan.

"Excuse me, sir, you invited us," Moynihan interjected.

"But you didn't turn over the documents," Hice protested.

"Then disinvite us," Moynihan proposed.

Behind the Republicans on the dais, in a painting, a young Abraham Lincoln looked concerned.

Without new evidence or allegations, Republicans encouraged Fitton to speculate about the Clintons' guilt. (Q: "Mr. Fitton, would you say that's a quid pro quo?" A: "It certainly seems that way.")

"Quid pro quo: Had to look it up," announced Rep. Rod Blum, R-Iowa. "It's Latin for 'something for something.'"

There was laughter in the gallery at the 63-year-old legislator's new discovery. But Blum did know this: "If it looks like a pig, if it sounds like a pig, and if it smells like a pig, it's probably a pig. And I think based on what I read today, something smells here."

Yes, it does. But a House cleaning is coming.

Texans look ahead to bigger goals after 10 wins

HOUSTON — The Houston Texans moved closer to clinching the AFC South by bouncing back from last week's loss with a win over the Jets.

Now they'll try to get banged-up players DeAndre Hopkins and Lamar Miller healthy before visiting the Super Bowl champion Eagles next week. A win could leave open the possibility of getting a first-round playoff bye.

The Texans (10-4) have won nine of their last 10 games after opening the season 0-3 to give coach Bill O'Brien 10 regular-season wins for the first time in his five years with the team. It's the first time the Texans have had 10 wins in the regular season since setting a franchise-record with 12 in 2012.

"It's great. I think 10 wins is hard to do in this league," O'Brien said. "I give our players and our coaching staff a ton of credit. Our players have worked very hard to get to this point in the season. There is a long way to go here."

The Texans led by 13 at halftime before the Jets rallied to take a 22-19 lead with 5:00 left in the fourth quarter. Deshaun Watson then connected with DeAndre Hopkins on a 14-yard touchdown to put the Texans on top, and they added a field goal after that to secure the 29-22 victory.

Hopkins injured his ankle in the fourth quarter and had to be helped off the field by teammates. But he returned after that and the injury doesn't appear serious.

Miller could be more of a concern after he hurt his ankle in the first

quarter and returned for a series in the second before sitting out for the rest of the game. O'Brien said he doesn't think the injury is "major," but that he'd know more next week.

With Miller out on Saturday, Houston's only other active running back was Alfred Blue. Blue, who has been used this season to spell Miller, was ineffective against the Jets, finishing with nine carries for 6 yards.

If Miller is limited next week, the Texans could look to D'Onta Foreman to pick up the slack. Foreman was put on the active roster from the physically unable to perform on Dec. 4, but has been inactive in the two games since.

Foreman has been out since Nov. 19, 2017 when he tore his Achilles tendon

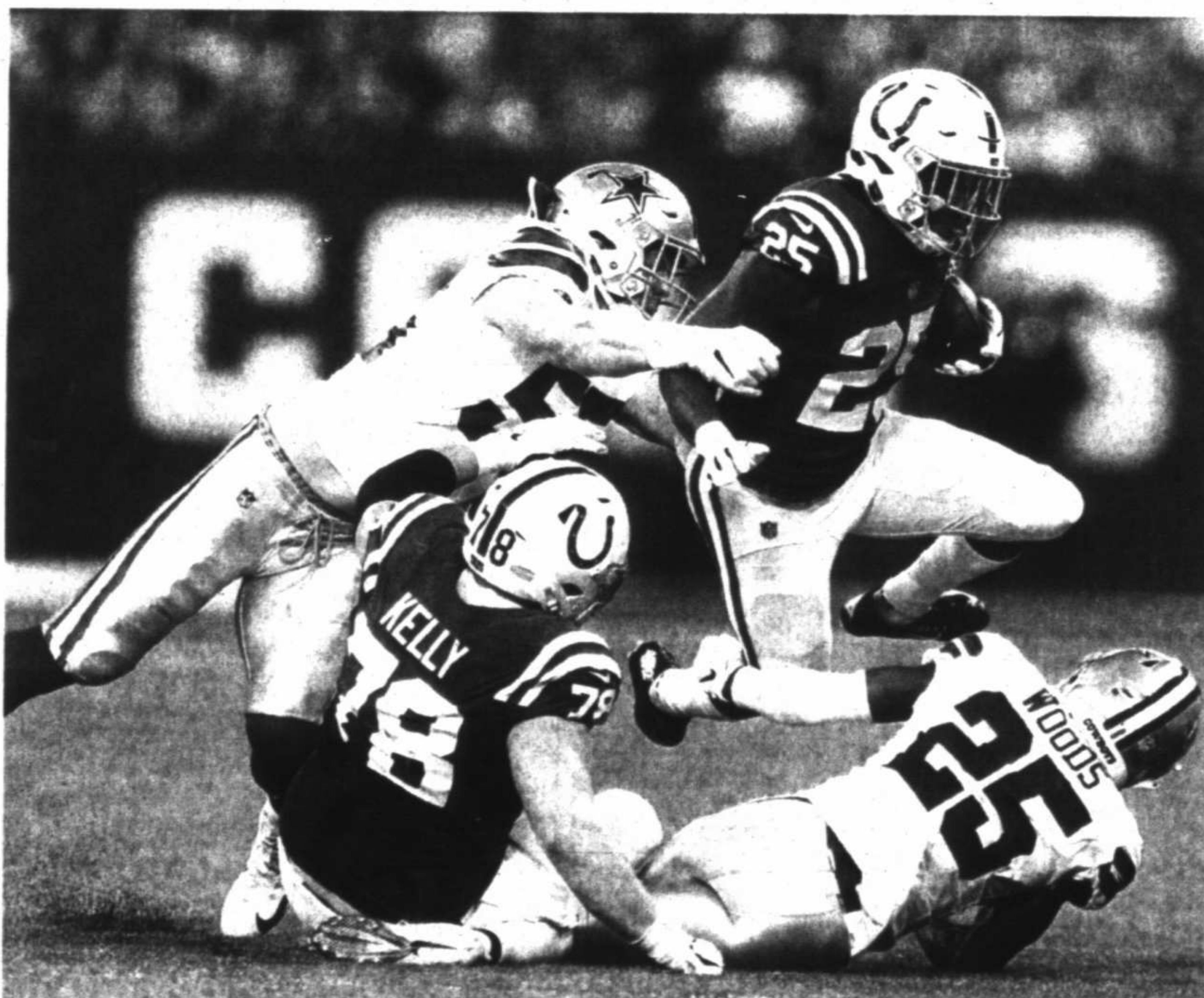

Colts use defense to defeat Cowboys

INDIANAPOLIS — Indianapolis Colts running back Marlon Mack kept his eyes down the field and his legs churning Sunday.

His teammates took the cue.

The offensive line created enough space for Mack to run for a career-high 139 yards and two scores, an improving defense smothered the league's hottest offense and the Colts rolled past Dallas 23-0 to stay in the AFC playoff hunt.

"When I saw those holes, I was like 'Yeah, it might be a good day,'" Mack said. "Holes like that don't come often."

If Mack continues to exploit the creases, there's no telling what the Colts (8-6) could do if they earn a postseason trip.

Since losing five of their first six, Indy has won seven of eight. Andrew Luck continues to play the best football of his career and Mack appears ready to thrive with starting center Ryan Kelly back in the lineup.

The Colts' vastly improved defense has allowed 27 points over the past three weeks including two games against division leaders, Houston and Dallas, and has its first shutout since a 27-0 victory over Cincinnati on Oct. 19, 2004.

"Against that team, with the guys they have, it's tough," coach Frank Reich said. "They have some of the best (offensive) guys in the NFL."

While the Colts (8-6) celebrated, Dallas was dismayed.

The Cowboys (8-6) came out flat on offense, wore down on defense and failed

to clinch the NFC East title as a five-game winning streak ended.

Ezekiel Elliott ran 18 times for 87 yards and caught seven passes for 41 yards. Amari Cooper had four catches for 32 yards and Dak Prescott was 24 of 39 for 206 yards with one interception.

But Mack set the tone with a physical 19-yard run on his first carry, ran 22 times and matched his career best for scoring runs — all against the league's No. 3 run defense.

The result: Dallas gave up its first 100-yard game since Week 9 and endured its first shutout since losing 12-0 to the Patriots on Nov. 16, 2003.

"Obviously, we didn't play well enough in any phase of our game to win," Cow-

UCF's Josh Heupel, Notre Dame's Brian Kelly and Alabama's Nick Saban are the finalists for The Associated Press national college football coach of the year after leading their teams to unbeaten regular seasons.

The winner will be announced Monday at noon EST.

Heupel guided No. 7 Central Florida (12-0) to a second consecutive unbeaten season. The American Athletic Conference champions will play No. 11 LSU in the Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1. Kelly led the third-ranked Fighting Irish (12-0) to its first College Football Playoff appearance. The Irish play No. 2 Clemson in the Cotton Bowl on Dec. 29. Saban has No. 1 Alabama (13-0) in the playoff for the fifth consecutive season. The Crimson Tide won the Southeastern Conference and face No. 4 Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl on Dec. 29.

The AP coach of the year was established in 1998. Saban is one of two coaches to win the award twice, along with Gary Patterson of TCU. Saban was coach of the year with LSU in 2003 and with Alabama in 2008.

Kelly won coach of the year in 2012, the last time he led Notre Dame to a 12-0 season.

Last year's winner was Scott Frost of UCF. No school has ever had different coaches win the award in consecutive seasons.

Hield, Fox help Kings end Mavs' home winning streak, 120-113

DALLAS — Buddy Hield and De'Aaron Fox each scored 28 points and the Sacramento Kings ended the Dallas Mavericks' 11-game home winning streak with a 120-113 victory on Sunday night.

The Kings also spoiled the return of Dirk Nowitzki to the American Airlines Center. The 21-year veteran played his first home game after missing the first 26 games of the season while recovering from ankle surgery. He played six minutes at Phoenix on Thursday and scored three points in eight minutes Sunday.

Sacramento led for the entire second half, closing the third quarter on an 11-4 run to lead

93-83.

Dallas had closed within 98-91 when Fox outjumped DeAndre Jordan, who is eight inches taller, for a defensive rebound, then coasted downcourt for a layup. Nemanja Bjelica then hit 3-pointers on back-to-back possessions for a 106-97 lead.

Wesley Matthews' 3 with 1:46 to play pulled the Mavs within 112-107, but Fox dribbled out nearly the entire shot clock and drove the lane for layup. After a Dallas turnover, Fox fed Willie Cauley-Stein for a dunk to ice the game with 51 seconds left.

Luka Doncic had 28 points and nine assists, but no other Dallas player scored more than 15. Jordan tied his season high with 23 rebounds but Dallas was hampered by poor 3-point shooting,

making only 9 of 35 (26 percent).

Both teams were missing key players. Starting point guard Dennis Smith (right wrist sprain) and primary backup J.J. Barea (left ankle sprain) were out for Dallas.

Marvin Bagley III, the No. 2 pick in the draft, was out with a bone bruise on his left knee, and Kings teammate Iman Shumpert was a late scratch with a hip contusion.

The Kings led 61-58 at the break. Hield had 17 points in the first half and Fox added 14 as the Mavericks, playing without Smith and Barea, struggled to stop the quickness of the Kings' guards.

With only rookie Jalen Brunson and veteran Devin Harris at the point guard spot, Doncic took over ball-handling responsibilities for long stretches of the game.

Alvarez stops Fielding in 3rd round for 3rd division title

NEW YORK — Canelo Alvarez threw a Garden party Saturday night. A short and powerful fiesta.

Alvarez landed dozens of body punches, knocking down Rocky Fielding four times and stopping him in the third round to earn his third weight class title, taking the WBA super middleweight belt.

Coming off his close decision against Gennady Golovkin three months ago to take the WBA and WBC middleweight titles, Alvarez could hear chants of "Canelo! Canelo!" long before he entered the Madison Square Garden ring for the first time. Throughout a lengthy undercard, it was clear who the sellout crowd of 20,112 came to see and cheer.

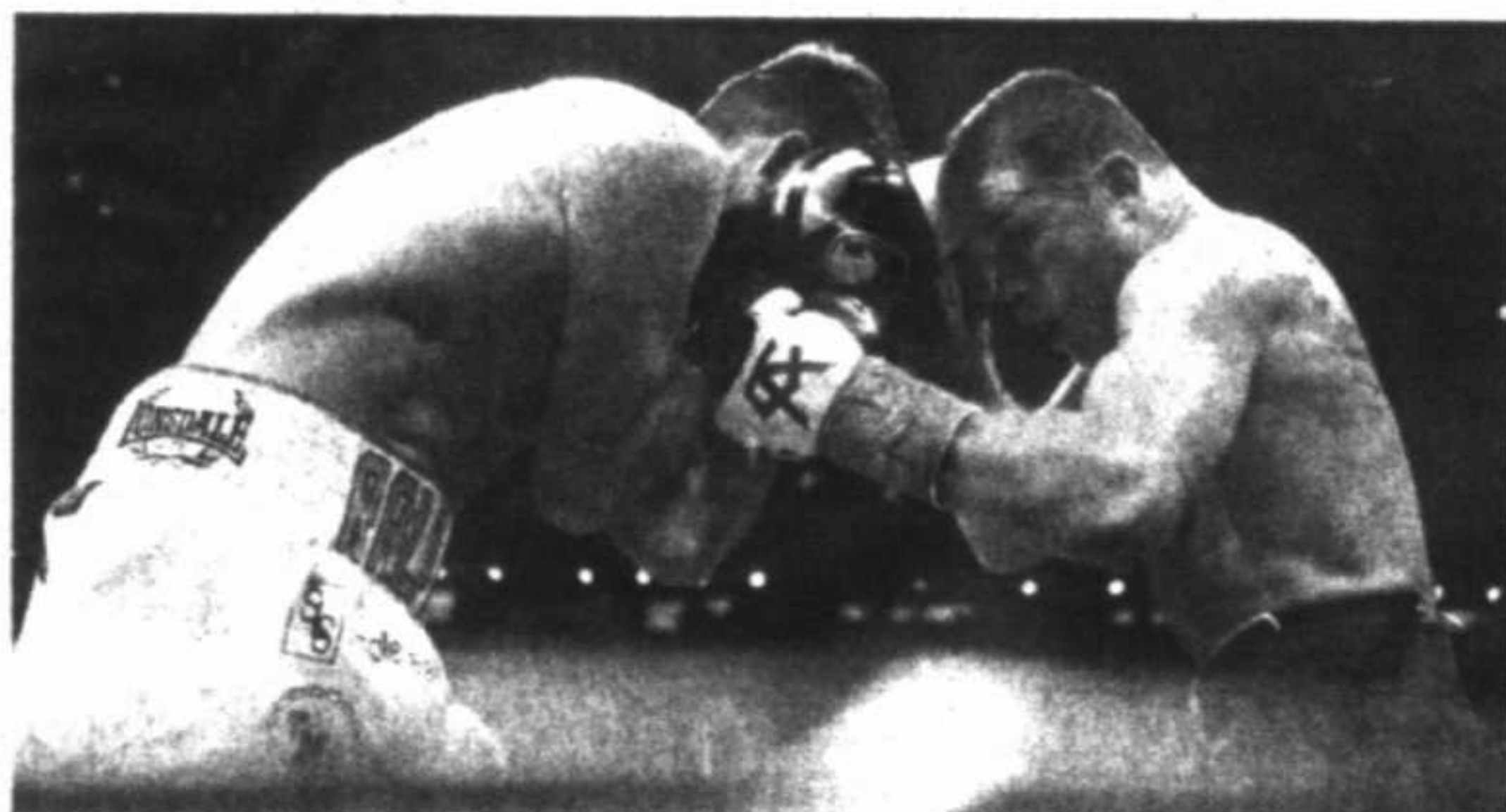
He delivered with power and precision, landing 73 punches, 35 to the body.

"That was the plan in the gym, to hit the body and then move up, and that's the result," Alvarez said through an interpreter. "You see the result here."

Only eight other Mexican fighters have held three division titles. And Alvarez, 28, says he is headed back to the 160-pound class he rules, with possibly a third go with Golovkin in 2019. The next fight, opponent unknown, is set for Las Vegas in early May.

"Canelo will fight whoever is the best, no doubt about it," said his promoter, Oscar De La Hoya.

If this was a one-off at 168 pounds, it was quite a show in his debut at Madison Square Garden.

"My goal is to make good fights for the people, for the public, and to make sure the name of Canelo Alvarez and of Mexico is held up high," Alvarez said.

Fielding, 31, won the WBA crown in July when he knocked out Tyrone Zeuge in Germany in the fifth round. But the Englishman had never faced anyone close to Canelo's class, and it showed.

"I never shied away from the challenge," Fielding said. "I lived the dream, I'll come back."

"He is strong and all that. It was the body shots, the wind he took away. He placed the shots well and he caught me. I stood too long to try to mix it with him when I shouldn't have."

"The better man won tonight."

The fight ended with 22 seconds remaining in the third after two knock-downs in the round.

Fielding came to fight, but was out-manned from the outset. He couldn't block the bevy of body punches launched by Alvarez, who floored Fielding with a left in the first round.

Alvarez did it again with a right to the head and a left to the body late in the second round, and that brought down Fielding's hands enough to expose the head.

So Alvarez used a huge right lead to knock down Fielding in the third round, and soon after finished it with a series of blows.

It really was no contest.

"What I always want to do is to make the best fight whether they're for world titles or not," Alvarez said, then turned his attention to the Garden scene.

"I'm happy and I'm grateful to be here. I hope this is the first of many."

Lipsky wins Alfred Dunhill Championship in South Africa

MALELANE, South Africa — David Lipsky won the Alfred Dunhill Championship in South Africa on his first attempt as his final-round 68 gave him a two-shot victory over David Drysdale.

Lipsky finished on 14-under 274 and kept his nerve at the end of his round to clinch a second career European Tour title. He made a double-bogey five on the 16th but a par on 17 and a birdie on the 18th made sure of the title for the American.

Scotland's Drysdale had already finished by that time, with his 67 setting the target at 12 under.

South Africa's Zander Lombard (69) and Scott Jamieson (72), another Scot, finished in a tie for third — a shot behind Drysdale.

English pair Oliver Wilson and Ben Evans were another three shots back on 8 under.

Lipsky ended the year with his first win on the tour since the European Masters in 2014.

"To come off this year where I haven't played that well and to finish it off like this, this win couldn't be

any better," he said.

Lipsky made seven birdies in all on Sunday and his lead was as much as six shots at one point. But he had problems with a bogey on the 12th and then the double with two holes to play before recovering his nerve on the final two.

Louis Oosthuizen followed up his victory at the South African Open last weekend with a tie for seventh at Leopard Creek.
