SIX STUDENTS, TWO TEACHERS KILLED IN BUS-TRUCK CRASH

Six Mount Vernon school students and two teachers were killed Tuesday night when a school bus loaded with jubilant school children on the way to a football game collided with a heavy truck at a highway intersection east of Cooper.

At least 20 other children were reported taken to hospitals in Cooper, Paris and Sulphur Springs, some of them badly injured.

The bus was on its way to Cooper from Mount Vernon for a football game.

Among the dead were Principal Jack Henry, driver of the bus, and his son, Billy Max Henry, 12. The others were identified as Mrs. Melba Meeks, a teacher; Kenneth Hightower, 14, and Rex Weatherford, 12, whose twin brother, Lex, remains in critical condition.

Zack Taylor, 11, died in Sulphur Springs Memorial Hospital following the accident.

Aubra Sue Turner, 11, died in a Paris hospital at 12:01 a. m. Wednesday.

Jacquitta Lou Raney, 12, died at 4:57 a. m. Wednesday in a

Paris hospital.

The collision occurred at the intersection of Highways 64 and 154 three miles east of Cooper.

Hal Chism, ambulance driver for McDonald Funeral Home in Cooper, was among the first at the scene. "Things were all smashed up. The bus looked like it had been smashed in from the side," he said.

Chism said the bus had been knocked to the side of the highway by the impact, but it had not overturned. He said there was no fire.

The truck-trailer was en route to Grand Saline after hauling a load of salt to Pryor, Ok. The driver, Warrington, said "the bus driver made a signal to turn left and then from some reason swerved. I just couldn't miss him. It was horrible."

The truck cab was smashed nearly flat. The interior of the bus looked like a gigantic corkscrew had reamed its inside.

First arrivals at the scene told of a nightmare of screaming, bleeding children were lying on the highway twisted in the wreckage of the school bus.

Some Production Red River County Coline Test

Oil is reported flowing by heads into storage from the General American Oil Company's No. 1 Coline, J. H. Puthuff survey, some four and one-half miles south and east of Cuthand, near Elbow Lake.

Production was from a 24-foot section of the Lewisville sand, which is a part of the Woodbine formation. Perforations were between 3,496-520 feet.

After the well had been shot, acid was applied and later sand-fracing with 8000 pounds of sand and 1600 barrels of oil was employed to loosen up the formation. First results from swabbing were negative.

Developments are of such a nature as to warrant the belief that another Red River County oil field may have been discovered. This well is about two miles northwest of the Trix-Liz field in Titus County, which is producing from the Lewisville sand.

GROUND BREAKING CEREMONIES ON SULPHUR THURSDAY, OCT. 8

Ground breaking ceremonies for the downstream levee and channel improvement of Sulphur River are scheduled to be held at 10 a. m. Thursday, Oct. 8, according to L. R. Matthias, Executive Vice-President, Red River Valley Association.

The ceremonies will be held off Highway 37, 3 miles north of Hagansport at the south end of the bridge crossing Sulphur River.

Congressman Wright Patman will be guest speaker and conduct the ground breaking ceremonies. Invitations to attend have also been extended to Senators Lyndon Johnson, Ralph Yarborough and Congressman Sam Rayburn, and County Judges of all counties participating in the project. Members of the Sulphur River Municipal Water District and members of the Levee Boards along the Sulphur River have also been invited. Mr. Matthias said that the public is urged to attend and to participate in the ground breaking ceremonies attendant to the project which means so much to this area.

The U. S. Army Engineer District, New Orleans, recently awarded a \$958,300,000 contract to the construction firm of Griffin and Dickinson of Kilgore, calling for channel and levee improvement downstream from the proposed Cooper reservoir.

Griffin advised that they will

proceed immediately with the work and expect to complete the job within the 600 days allotted by the contract. He added that they expect to employ approximately 40 local people on the work. It is anticipated, that as a part of the ground breaking ceremonies, Col. George M. Cookson, District Engineer, U. S. Army Engineer District, will present the official notice to proceed to representatives of the contractor.

This is the second phase of comprehensive plan for the full channel and levee improvement of the Sulphur river, which, when completed will extend from Commerce to the headwaters of the Texarkana dam and reservoir in Bowie County.

The overall estimate of levee and channel work in connection with the Cooper dam and reservoir project approximates three million dollars. The channel, reservoir and levee improvements are planned to eliminate flooding of some 60,000 acres of land in the Sulphur river basin. A water supply feature is also an integral part of the project. The Sulphur River Municipal Water District is presently engaged in a study to determine the water supply needs of the area and the capabilities of the local municipalities of Cooper, Commerce and Sulphur Springs to finance such water supply.

Trojan football fans were treated to thrills and spills when the Trojans met the Leopards of Liberty-Eylau on muddy Trojan field Friday night.

The Leopards faced the Trojans with a No. 9 ranking in Class A for the state. Whether this ranking was changed remains to be seen, but in the three previous games Leopards scored over 30 points over their opponents. They scored 14 over the Trojans.

Cooler Weather Brings More Rain

Cooler weather moved across the state and with it came more rain. Wednesday afternoon 57 of an inch of moisture fell at Deport to move the measurement for September to 4.86 inches. An electrical disturbance accompanied the rain which fell within a few minutes.

The mercury shot upward, hitting the low 90's for high readings during the week end. Low registered was in the low 60's.

Cotton harvest was resumed the first of the week after a shower on Thursday and a big rain Friday. Official reading on Thursday was .38 of an inch and 2.16 inches recorded on Friday, according to A. C. Nixon of Deport.

Considerable amount of cotton still remained in fields to be gathered. Scarcity of hands has hampered the harvest.

Total rainfall measured at Cox Field this year is 31.81 inches, as compared to 44.16 inches in 1958.

Hunting Season Dates This Area

Squirrel season opens Thursday, October 1, in Lamar County. The same season goes for Red River, Titus, Fannin, Bowie, and other counties.

The season continues through December 31.

Observers predict only so-so hunting in some areas, but improved hunting in others. Game wardens say the squirrel supplies are "spotty."

The bag limit is eight per day, with not more than 16 in possession.

Dove season, which has sagged badly in recent days, will continue through October 20. The quail season begins December 1, duck season on November 13 and goose season on October 26.

Longer Deer Hunt Red River County Is Announced

Information of interest to
squirrel and deer hunters in Red
River County comes from Biolo-
gist John Carlisle of Paris and
Game Warden Charles Burnette
of Clarksville.

Concerning the squirrel sea-
son, they call attention to the
legal shooting season, which
opens October 1 and closes on
December 31.

The bag limit will be 10 per
day and 20 in possession.

Squirrels may be hunted with
shot gun, rifle or bow and ar-
row. Shot guns need no longer
be plugged to three-shot capa-
city.

The deer season opens in Red
River County November 16 and
will close on November 30. This
is a longer hunting period than
previously allowed.

A hunter may take one buck
deer with at least one pronged
antlers and one antlerless deer
if permits to hunt does are issued
this season in Red River County.
The possibility of an antlerless
deer harvest here will be deter-
mined after census work has
been completed late in October.

Der hunters may use rifles
other than .22 calibre, shot guns
or bows and arrows.

Shot guns need no longer be
plugged to three-shell capacity.

Regarding the outlook for
hunters here this fall, Burnett
said: "Squirrels are scarce, quail
will be plentiful and deer hunt-
ing should be good."

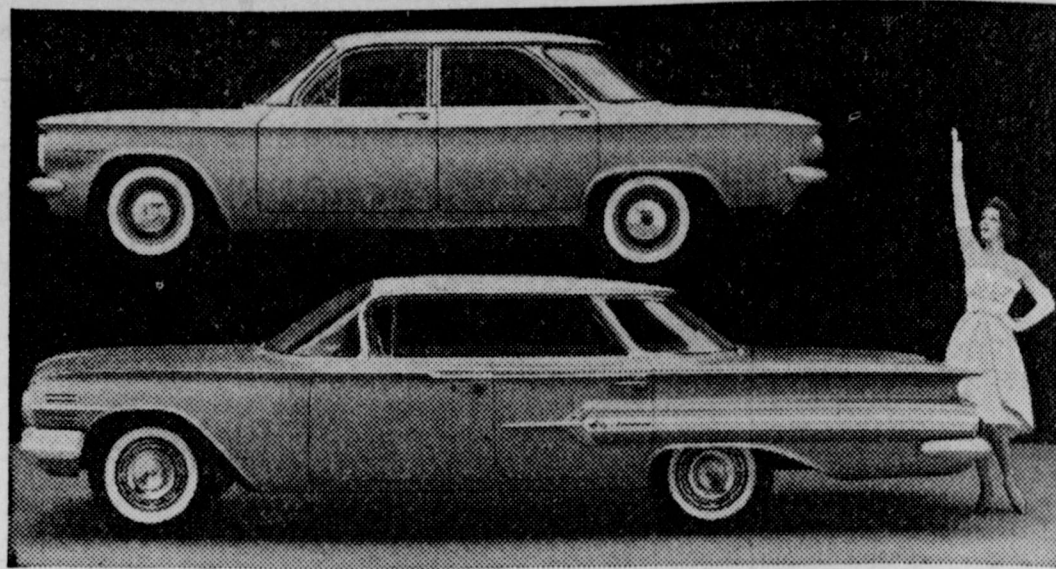

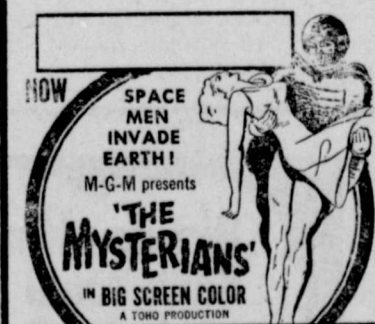

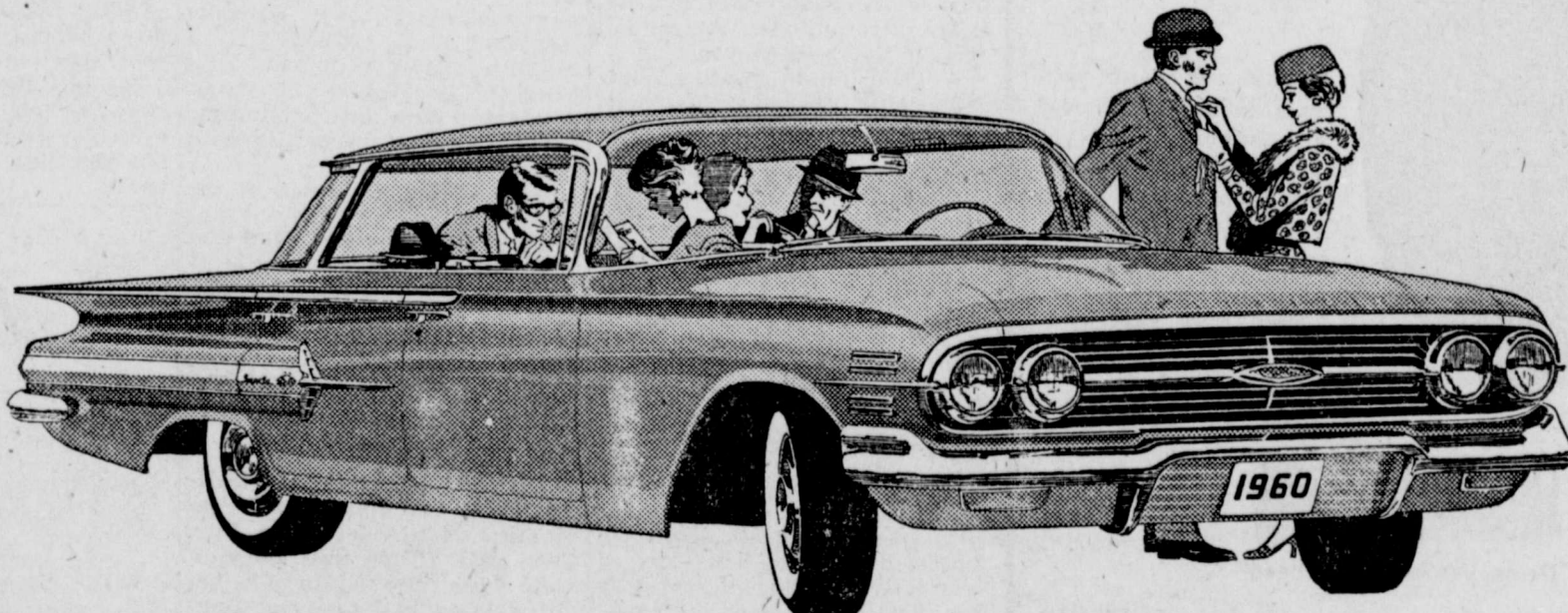

ALCORN WANTS TIME PAYMENTS STRETCHED OUT TO 100 YEARS

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, must have a bill he can't pay, his letter this week indicates.

Dear Editor: Since me and the Federal government are in about the same shape in connection with debts—we both need the money worse when the time comes to pay it back than we did when we borrowed it, I was very interested in a new idea put forward by a Congressman the other day.

Studying the national debt, which now comes to 285 billion dollars and gets bigger all the time, this Congressman figured out a way to wipe it out.

All you have to do, he said, is pass a law making it mandatory to pay off one per cent of the debt each year. Regardless of how much we spend, every year we'd have to pay off one per cent of the total debt, and thus in 100 years we'd be in the clear. This makes more sense than

it looks like, because at the rate we're going, the experts figure a hundred years from now we may owe more money than the country's worth.

But I always like to bring things down to the personal level, and it seems to me there's a valuable idea in this Congressman's suggestion for everybody, including me, and possibly you, or at least some of your readers.

Time payments on everything ought to be stretched out over 100 years. This old idea of having to pay for a new car for example in 36 months is one thing that's holding back the automobile industry. If you're going to sell a man a car and take it back if he hasn't paid for it in 36 months and then sell it to somebody else, all you're doing is knocking yourself out of the opportunity of producing one more new car. If I could go in and buy a new car and have 100 years to pay it off, at the rate of one per cent per year, which on say a \$3,000 car would come to \$30,

State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

Austin.—From now until January, Texas political skies will be crowded with trial balloons. Already, through polls, public and private, conferences and speeches, a host of ambitious politicians are trying to test the wind and fix their time tables accordingly.

In past decades, office holders all down the line arranged their schedules on the assumption that the governor would retire after two terms. When the governor moved out, others moved up, and a succession of vacancies was created.

But Gov. Allan Shivers served three terms and part of another. And Gov. Price Daniel seems in no hurry to leave at the end of his second term. Polls have shown strong support for Daniel for another term. Some observers say a "three-term governor" tradition may be taking hold.

A roadblock at the top would pose hard decisions for those who have been getting primed to move up. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson's firm plans to run for governor have been no secret. But he has not said he will run even if Gov. Daniel does.

If Daniel does run and Wilson decides to sit tight, a half-dozen attorney general hopefuls, including Speaker Carr, will be stalled or up against stiffer odds. In legislative races much of the same agonizing is going on. Wherever a senator is up for reelection, there are usually one or more House members itching to try for the post.

Some have already jumped in; some have definitely decided against it. Others are still "talking around." In many minds is the old saying that the time comes when a man must go "up or out."

Question is: "When is that time?"

DEMOS GUARD HARMONY—for the moment, at least, Texas Democratic Party leadership appears more united at the summit than it has been in years.

At their recent meeting, State Democratic Executive Committee members cheered both Gov. Daniel for a third term and U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson for president. Gov. Daniel, Committee Chairman Ed Connally and National Committeeman By-

ron Skelton all applauded Johnson.

In 1956 Sen. Johnson had to push Gov. Allan Shivers and his supporters out of party leadership in order to go to the national convention as the Texas nominee. Such upheaval apparently will not be necessary in 1960.

Not present for the harmony fest, however, was Mrs. R. D. Randolph, national committee-woman and leader of the liberals' Democrats of Texas faction. DOTers fell out with Johnson after the '56 convention. They've made it clear they won't push the Johnson bandwagon. Many of the same group are working in the Democrats for Stevenson movement. But whether they can or will launch a large-scale effort to undermine the senator in his home state is not yet known.

JUST NEED MONEY—Officials of Texas' bulging cities took a long look at their multiplying problems and decided they needed many things, but mainly money.

As the Texas Municipal League convention wound up, the incoming president, McAllen Mayor Phillip Boeye concluded, "Very few municipal problems can't be solved with money."

Earlier, TML speakers pointed especially to these angles of Texas urban dilemma.

1. Tax sources—With increasing demands for city services, city governments are limited on the ways they can get money, principally to the property tax. Cong. Jim Wright, formerly mayor of Weatherford, pointed out that half of all gasoline is consumed in the cities, but cities get no part of the gasoline tax money for city streets. Forty-four states, he said, split gas tax money with cities.

2. State domination—Although 70 per cent of Texas population is concentrated in urban areas, city government, said outgoing President Louie Welch, is a "child of state government." And since the Legislature is rural-dominated, cities invariably come out second best in battles with the farmers.

John McKee, chairman of the 1957-58 State Tax Study Commission, expressed the belief that Texas money problems would be worse before they're better. McKee said that although the budget was covered by the last legislative session, the state's long-term revenue problems, including state-local fiscal relations, is "far from solved."

COUNTIES' FUTURE CONSIDERED—Problems of Texas counties were reviewed by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson and Sec'y of State Zolzie Steakley in talks before the County Judges and Commissioners Association.

"What county government really needs," said Wilson, "is an executive. It must unify into a managerial function." He said county government must become stronger or become an arm of state government.

Steakley told the county officials that despite huge highway

building investments, they can still expect to have unmet road needs.

Texans, said Steakley, travel 102,000,000 vehicle miles a day. This means that, despite \$505,000,000 of construction under contract and another \$514,000,000 in planning, Texas is still \$3,000,000,000 short of the highways needed for its traffic.

NO PAY, NO TAX—If the guest skips out without paying his hotel bill, the hotel doesn't have to pay the state the new hotel room tax.

In interpreting this new law, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson also ruled that the 3 per cent tax applies to any room rented by a hotel, not just sleeping rooms. Under American plan hotel rates where rental charges include meals, the tax will apply only to the part of the charge covering room rent.

Also, the tax does not apply to air conditioners, televisions and radios when they are rented separately. It does not apply to rooms renting for \$2 a day or less nor to rooms rented under 30-day leases.

APPRECIATION WEEK—Texas' law enforcement team comes in for its share of public recognition during the week of Oct. 4-10. Gov. Price Daniel has proclaimed that period as Texas Law Enforcement Appreciation Week. Sponsor is the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation, a group of private citizens interested in more public support for the men in the front line against crime.

"In the face of ever-increasing crime," says a TLEF spokesman, "our law enforcement team must cope with almost insurmountable odds . . . still they continue to do a remarkable job." Purpose of the week is greater appreciation for the work done by police departments, sheriffs, highway patrols, game wardens, judges and all others working actively to help control crime in Texas.

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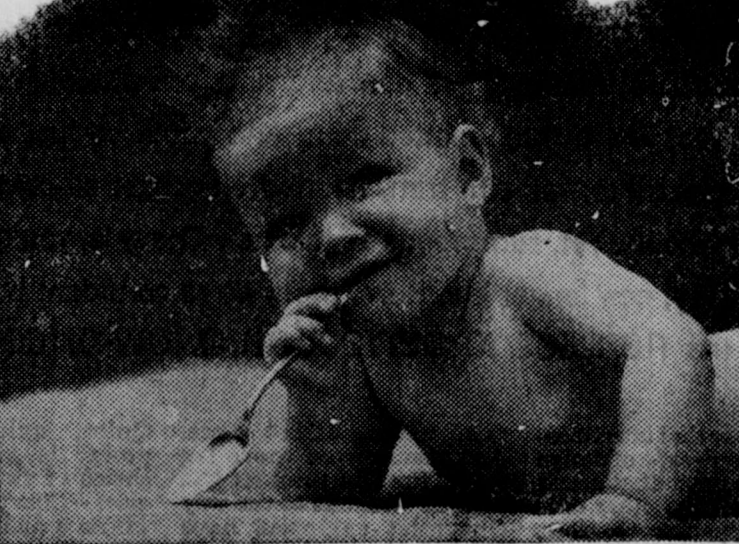

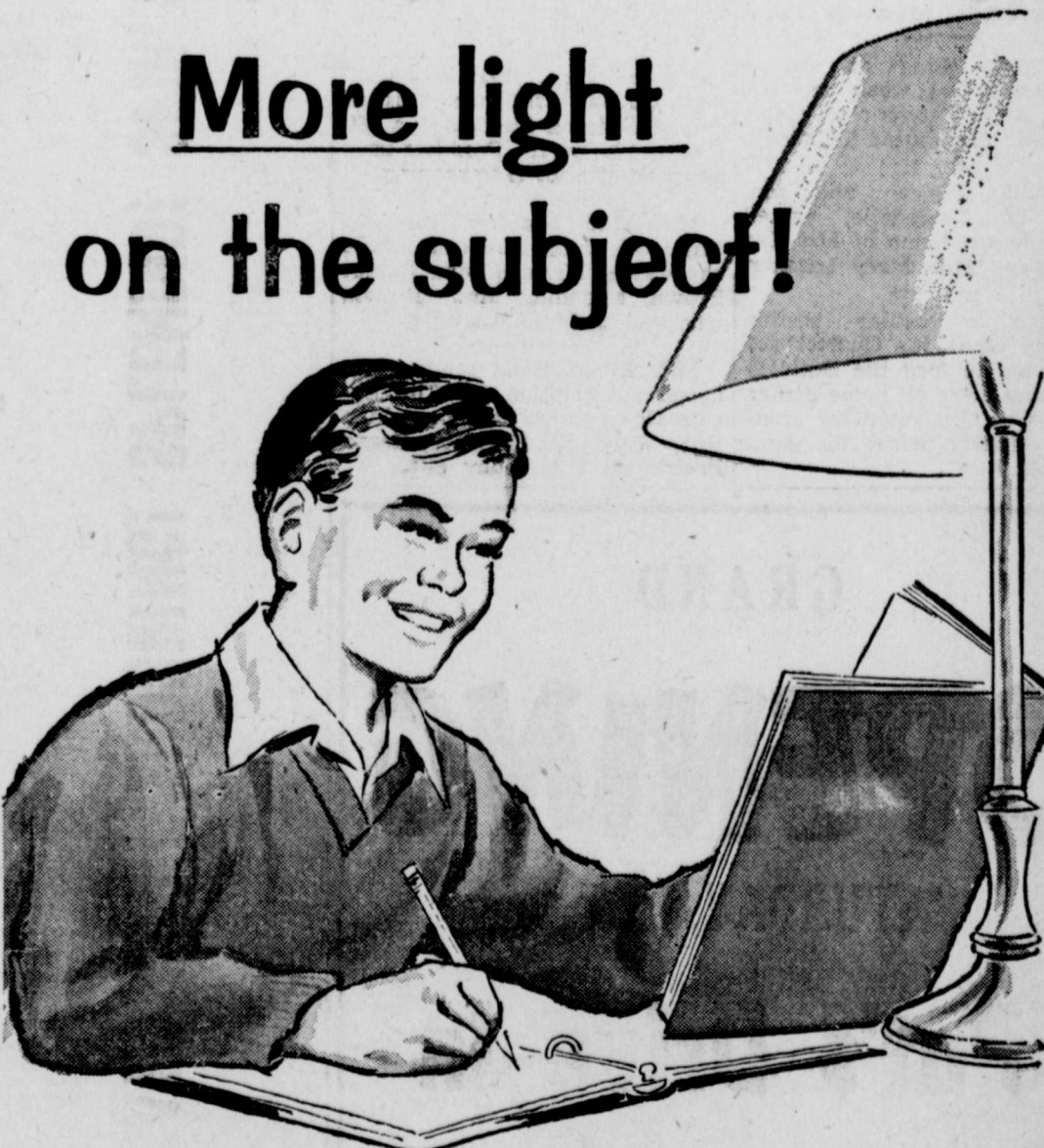

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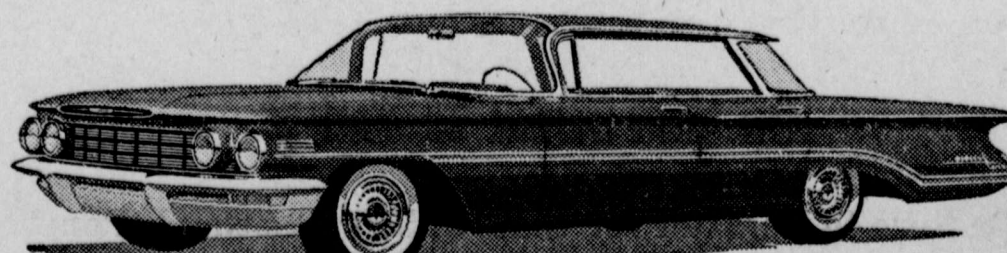
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
