Austin. — Half a dozen new amendments have been added to the Texas Constitution, including one authorizing sale of liquor-by-the-drink.

Passage of Amendment 2, however, does not mean automatic mixed-drink dispensing. Amendment merely repeals the ban on open saloons and empowers the legislature to pass a law regulating liquor-by-the-drink.

Starting next January, lawmakers must first act to establish procedures, licensing requirements and regulations. Then, local option elections must be held to determine where mixed drink sales are wanted by voters.

Many observers feel there actually will be no legal sales of booze over the bar in public establishments before the end of 1971. Others think preliminary will be disposed of in some areas by mid-year, but that would mean passage of the bill by a two-thirds majority to place it in immediate effect. More likely effective date of legislation is next September, with elections to follow.

Other constitutional changes would provide for:

- Disciplinary action, including censure, of all judges.
- Appointed (by governor) three-man State Building Commission.
- County issue of road bonds up to one-fourth of assessed value of all local real property, on majority vote of property taxpayers.

• Increase from \$5,000 to \$10,000 in value of homestead which is exempt from forced sale.

• Laws permitting all counties to consolidate certain services and offices.

Amendment to permit farm land assessment on the basis of crop yield was defeated.

GOP'S ECONOMIZING — Texas Republican party began off-year cutting back on its operation 24 hours after the general election.

Headquarters staff here shrank suddenly from 23 to eight, and further reduction is expected.

Slash in staff and a move to smaller offices were described as the "collective decision" of top party leaders including Sen. John Tower, State Chairman William Steger of Tyler and National Committeeman Peter O'Donnell Jr. of Dallas.

Party spokesmen said GOP, following the elective defeat, has serious debt problems and has no choice but to retrench.

Democratic leaders — Gov. Preston Smith, Senator-elect Lloyd Bentsen and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes — meanwhile, began sizing up Tower for attack in 1972 election. Barnes said he is thinking about running against Tower himself, although he has not firmly ruled out the governor's race.

BRINE HEARING ON — Railroad Commission conducted a hearing here on Parks and Wildlife Department complaints that oil companies are polluting bay waters with oilfield brine.

PWO contends that discharges are harmful to environment necessary to support marine life. Companies countered with witnesses that insufficient evidence of pollution and danger to salt water creatures was shown at the two-day hearing.

ATTORNEY GEN. RULES — Texas Water Development fund loans may be used to build sewage treatment plants, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held. He cent.

said the state also may own such plants.

In other recent topinions, Martin concluded that:

• Federal technicians employed by the Texas National Guard have the right to belong to a labor union, but state-paid Guard technicians have no such right.

• County clerk does not have authority to issue a marriage license to those presently legally married to each other under common law unless they meet age and/or parental consent requirements and waiver of "I am not presently married" oath is obtained from county judge.

• Texas Water Quality Board can make a lump sum payment to Gulf Coast Waste Disposal Authority of the remaining portion of \$100,000 appropriated to the Board for the current fiscal year.

• Parks and Wildlife Department has authority to contract with Texas Highway Department for construction of a bridge over the proposed water exchange pass through Mustang Island.

• A County Commissioner does not vacate his office automatically when he moves to another part of the county.

TAX BURDEN LOWER — Texans may be tax-shy after reading what is going to happen to them in the next legislative session, but they are better off than most industrial state residents, according to a new study.

Only Ohio among 10 most industrial states has a lower state and local tax burden, Texas Research League reports. Texans' 1969 burden amounted to 8.5 per cent of personal income. Ohio's was 8.2 per cent, study showed.

Louisiana and Oklahoma had 10.7 and 9.4 per cent, respectively.

League's study found that a Houston family of four with gross income of \$10,000 would have paid \$510 in 1968, excluding city sales tax. Same family would have paid \$545 in Cleveland and \$891 in Boston.

In the \$3,500 income class, Texas ranks 10th among the 12 states in tax burden, while in the \$50,000 class, Texas is 12th.

Rich or poor, said the League, Texas' burden is relatively low.

BOUNDARY DISPUTE STUDIED — Attorney General Martin met with city officials in Orange and Port Arthur to view the area in boundary dispute between Texas and Louisiana.

More than 30,000 acres in Sabine Lake are involved in the lawsuit. This includes 3,000 acres of reclaimed land, plus submerged lands in the western half of Sabine River. Louisiana claims ownership of water boundary to the western shore, while Texas claims to the middle of the Sabine. Texas has taxes submerged lands and has given leases on lands, as well as jointly financing bridges across the river with Louisiana.

EMPLOYMENT DOWN — For the first time in more than 20 years, September unemployment figure for Texas exceeded joblessness for August. Texas Employment Commission reported a tenth of one per cent hike in the jobless rate.

Just three times since 1947 has the September rate ever been as high as August. Last September's total climbed 3,000 to 179,500; but overall the state average was just 3.8 per cent. High was in Laredo with 8.5 per cent unemployed, and low in Houston and Austin — with just 2.7 per

Attend Crime Lab At Mt. Pleasant

The 61st Legislature passed a bill, which became effective on September 1, 1970, for the creation of a Crime and Narcotic Advisory Commission and directed that the Public Schools of Texas teach the dangers of crime and narcotics. Specifically, House Bill 467 calls for a plan for a program on crime prevention and misuse of drugs and narcotics for grades 5 through 12 in all Texas Public Schools.

The 1960-71 school year will be a development period with the personnel of the Texas Education Agency and the Educational Service Centers working together with representatives from the local school districts. The model programs developed this year will be implemented during the 1971-72 school year and will serve as lighthouses reflecting teaching strategies that will, it is hoped, have a positive, significant impact upon the behavior of the students in grades 5 thru 12 in the Public Schools of Texas.

The program will utilize an interdisciplinary approach, calling upon the adult resource people of the community as well as the educators, parents, and students. The community-wide interdisciplinary approach is essential to the attainment of the overall objective of the program: the minimization of the incidence of crime and drug misuse among the youth of the community.

Rebels Blank N. Lamar, 43 - 0

The Rivercrest Rebels at North Lamar Panthers met in gridiron battle Friday night in North Lamar stadium, and the Rebels emerged with their first victory in the last eight games, while the Panthers settled for last place.

Rivercrest made it look easy as their offense rolled up 42 points while the Rebel defense repeatedly held off North Lamar's offense, making the final score 43-0.

Rivercrest quarterback Troy Brown guided the Rebel offensive eleven through an almost perfect game marred only by two pass interceptions by the Panther defense. The Rebels totaled an impressive 340 yards for the game with 317 of those yards being picked up on the ground.

North Lamar managed only 66 yards rushing for the game and seven yards in the air.

Brown was the leading scorer of the rout as he made three TDs and kicked an extra point. Halfback Willie Simpson reached paydirt twice while halfback Stanley Jones scored once.

The Rebels took the opening kickoff and moved 72 yards in 14 plays with Brown covering the last yard to paydirt on a plunge over center. His extra point kick gave the Rebels a 7-0 lead.

Jones highlighted the next scoring drive covering the last two yards for the six points. Brown passed to Jones for the two-point conversion.

Brown went 60 yards for the next TD, and Simpson got his first touchdown as he sped 17 yards to the end zone. Senior end Lawrence Norman pulled in Browns two-point conversion pass.

North Lamar saw its only scoring opportunity blacked out as a 50-yard touchdown run by Richard Ausmus was erased by a penalty.

Simpson scored again for the Rebels and Bruce Case kicked the extra point making it 36-0 as the half came to a close.

The second half belonged to the Rebel defense for the most part as they held the Panthers to two first down. The third quarter went scoreless. Brown scored the final touchdown on a one-yard dive over center. Johnny Swarts kicked the extra point.

A pass interception by Case stopped the Panthers final scoring attempt and gave the Rebels possession as time ran out.

Sights On Safety

Make Safety Part of Your Purchase

How often have you taken an electrical product's safety for granted? How many times have you purchased a product and were unaware of any external points which you, as the buyer, could easily look for to further insure that product's safety. All too often, no doubt.

Actually, most products have salient points which can be detected prior to purchasing to assure you that the product is or is not safe. However, as stated, you must take it upon yourself to search for those points.

For example, let us consider a portable hair dryer. Though no staggering figures are available, injuries can and do occur as a result of improper hair dryer constructions. Such injuries can be traced to poor design features which omit that one essential factor: safety.

What do you look for in a dryer purchase? The following points are the most easily detectable, and they are all there for your safety.

1. STABILITY:

Though often considered a point of minor consequence, a dryer should be designed so that it cannot be easily toppled. Specifically, this point is inherent to the base's design and will vary from model to model, and can best be determined by your own judgment.

2. PROTECTIVE SCREENING:

The motor and heating element should be enclosed by a protective screen to prevent contact of fingers or metallic objects with moving or live parts.

3. ADEQUATE CORD LENGTH:

The cord should be a minimum of six feet in length, which will generally eliminate the necessity for an extension cord.

4. VENTILATION:

Adequate ventilation of the motor should be provided, with vents of sufficient size to furnish such ventilation and also offer protection to both the motor and the user.

5. MOLDED CORD/PLUG CONSTRUCTION:

Cord and plug should be one-piece molded construction to prevent accidental disassembly of the two.

6. STRAIN RELIEF:

At the point where the cord enters the dryer housing, a suitable strain relief should be provided in the form of a rubber or plastic grommet.

And there is one final, familiar "safety feature" to look for: the UL label. This will be your final assurance that the above safety points are designed into the hair dryer—that it meets many other stringent testing requirements—that it is reasonably safe to all possible degrees. 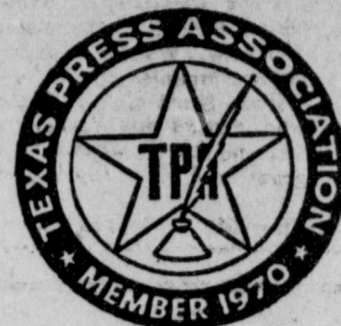

They find the 4-4-3-2 formula an easy way to learn and practice good eating habits. Using the nutritionists' daily food guide, the formula suggests: four servings from the fruit and vegetable group; four from the bread and cereal group; three from the milk group and two servings from the meat group.

The 4-4-3-2 approach to well-nourished young people is featured in a series of manuals developed by the Cooperative Extension Service with the assistance of General Foods Corporation and the National 4-H Service Committee.

Starting with the magic approach in the unit, *Tricks for Treats*, the young people move into *All American Foods, Meals for Today the Easy Way* and *Foods with an International Flavor*. A guide for volunteer leaders supports each unit.

Planning, preparing and serving meals and snacks are covered in the attractive books. 4-H members enrolled in food-nutrition also learn about buyman-ship, nutrition, foods and customs of America and other countries.

Adding another dimension to the national 4-H food-nutrition program for the 10th year is General Foods Corporation's support through incentive and recognition awards. The company provides \$600 scholarships to six national winners and an expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress to a winner from each state. General Foods also will host the group at the national 4-H event in Chicago, Nov. 29-Dec. 3. Four medals of honor are offered in each county.

Boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19 are eligible to participate in 4-H including the food-nutrition program.
