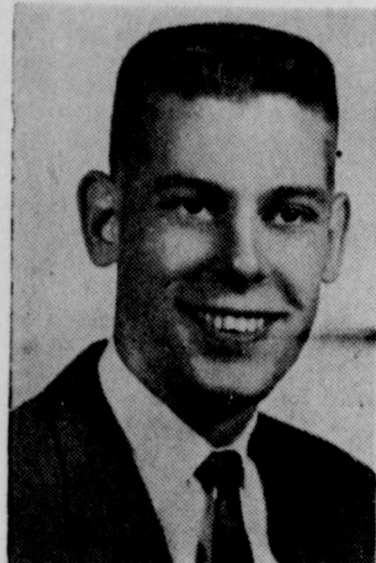


Rev. Kirby Is New Pastor Of Nazarene Church

ND Lions Win 40-0 Game; To Meet Lorenzo

The New Deal Lions grabbed their second victory of the young season against the Hart Longhorns in action last Friday night. The 40-0 shellacking was the first home contest for the Lions.

Senior Gary Winningham, a 162-pound quarterback, was top scorer of the night with three TD's on runs of 72, 3, and 60 yards.

Dewayne Agnew scored the first TD for the Lions in the first quarter on a 35-yard scamper. Winningham followed soon after with his 72-yard effort to make the score 12-0 at the end of the first stanza.

Winningham opened scoring in the second quarter with a 3-yard TD. Lawson Smith, a 135-pound senior halfback, added 60 more points to the cause from 38 yards out to make the half-time score 24-0.

The third period saw Winningham strike for his final TD on a 60-yard jaunt. Billy Mitchell, a 237-pound fullback added the extras. New Deal's final tally came on an 80-yard scramble by Agnew. Fullback Mike Heald added the points after to make the final score 40-0.

Mitchell was the standout for the Lions on defense with 13 tackles. Two brothers, Tommy and Dennis Haggard, also made strong defensive showings.

Antelopes Edge By HC Owls, 20-18; Go To Post Friday

The Abernathy Antelopes arose the victors in a "battle of the undefeated" against the Hale Center Owls in Antelope Stadium Friday, September 17. Frustrated throughout the night by penalties, the "Lopes" weathered long Hale Center drives engineered by Owl QB Don Townsen to win 20-18.

The Antelopes were called for 13 infractions and set back 80 yards compared to 45 yards for the Owls. Penalties cost the "Lopes" one touchdown and one extra point try that would have made a big difference in the game. In all other statistics the Owls were way ahead. The Owls led in first downs 19-8 and in total yards gained 281-187. Despite these impressive figures, they could not make the three yards needed for an extra point conversion.

Lane Wade was once again the big gun for the "Lopes," but Pat Hale handled the scoring chores this week as he crossed the goal line four times. (One was nullified by a penalty.) Wade added the winning margin, however, as he slid over for the extras after Hale's first TD.

The first score of the ball game came early in the first quarter when Hale intercepted a lateral from Don Townsen and raced by himself 45 yards to the goal. The conversion by Wade gave the "Lopes" an 8-0 margin.

With 0:29 left in the first stanza, Marvin Wilson of Hale Center bulled his way over the goal for their first tally. The 179-pound sophomore took the ball from the 2-yard line. The "Lopes" held on the extra point attempt and the score stood 8-6.

Wade set up the next "Lope" score with a 60-yard punt return that ended on the Owl ten-yard line. Pat Hale took the ball from the 9 for six points. The run for point after was stopped by the Owls. The Owls took over on the kickoff at their own 22-yard line. Led by Townsen, they marched down the field in 13 plays to score their second tally. Wilson carried the ball over from the five and the "Lopes" blocked the extra point try.

With time swiftly running out in the first half, the "Lopes" got the ball at their own 47. In five plays, the "Lopes" were over for their third TD as Wade ran 31 yards and completed two passes to Hale, one for 10 yards and the other for 29 and the score. The conversion was wiped out by a penalty and with 0:42 left in the half, the score was 20-12.

The third quarter was all Hale Center as halfback Ronnie Sherrod led the Owls 90 yards down the field in the longest sustained drive of the night. Townsen crossed the goal for the Owls from one yard out to bring the Owls within two points. The extra point attempt was a pass from Townsen to end Larry Well. Veteran Mike Tannehill got in the way however and the pass fell incomplete.

The last stanza was a fan-planning defensive struggle that kept the Owls bottled deep in their end of the field. The "Lopes" had one chance to score after Charlie Thomas deflected a Townsen pass and picked it off at the 3-yard line. The Owls regained the ball on the next play when QB Darrell Johnson bobbled a handoff to Tannehill. The "Lopes" regained possession just before the ball game ended but held on tight to insure their 2-point lead.

The Owls found little running room through the middle of the "Lope" line Friday night as middle guard Charlie Thomas and linebacker Terry Barton, both seniors, each accounted for 16 tackles. Hale and Tannehill stood out in the defensive secondary as Townsen completed only 6 of 16 passes thrown.

Top ground gainer for the night was Ronnie Sherrod of Hale Center with 94 yards. Wade was right behind with 72 on the ground and he also passed for 39. Tannehill accounted for 52 of the Antelope 148 yard rushing total.

Travel To Post

The Antelopes will put their undefeated record against a tough Antelope squad at Post in this week's football action. The "Lopes" barely defeated Post in a 3-0 contest on Antelope field here last year. This year's contest promises to be just as much a thriller as Post brings a 1-2 record into the game. Rain, Hail Hit In Area

M. O. Hood measured 2.78 inches of rain in Abernathy, from Sept. 17, to the morning of Sept. 20 (Monday). This report does not include the flash flood that dumped 1 1/2 inches of rain in town during a 20 to 30-minute period early Monday afternoon. The heavy rain was accompanied by jagged hail stones about the size of a Chuck Webster chew of tobacco. No heavy damage was reported in the area.

With tornado-scarred Hale Center still fresh on their minds, dozens of Abernathians hit the cellars Saturday night when the weather bureau included Abernathy and Lakeview in a possible tornado path. Twenty-one people were in one cellar, "and it sure was stuffy", commented a 7-year-old boy.

Rains last weekend and Monday brought in reports of up to six inches in parts of this area. Total rainfall for the year, to Monday morning (in town) was 10.12 inches, Mr. Hood said.

City Council Acts on Three Major Issues

Highlights of the City Council meeting held September 13, 1965 were: the adoption of a Non-Resident Water User Policy, the hiring of a Chief of Police, and the adoption of the Budget for the fiscal year 1965-1966.

The City Council passed an ordinance setting the policy on non-resident water users. This policy will necessitate every non-resident of the City of Abernathy who is using City Water to sign an agreement with the City of Abernathy. A copy of this agreement, which explains the policy adopted by the City Council, can be found in another portion of this publication.

After considering several applications for Chief of Police, Troy L. Coon, a native of Morton, Texas, was hired as Abernathy Chief of Police to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Frank Chapman. Chapman resigned to accept the job as Chief Deputy of Hale County. Coon, who is 35 years of age, has had approximately seven years of law enforcement experience. Mr. Coon was in the Military Police in the U. S. Army, patrolman and deputy for the Sheriff's Department in Morton, Patrolman in Littlefield and is presently Deputy Sheriff for Hockley County at Anton, Mr. Coon and his wife Ruby have four children; Ruby Lee 11, Ronnie Lee 9, Debra Kay 6 and Troy Lynn 15 months. The Coon's church affiliation is Baptist.

The adoption of the budget for the fiscal year 1965-1966 was another major topic discussed by the City Council. The budget as adopted contains \$78,855 appropriated disbursements, which does not include \$15,000 which has been set aside to be placed in a reserve fund for future capital expenditures. The breakdown of these expenditures are as follows: General Fund Operations \$52,450.00, Tax Bond & Service \$29,490.30, Water & Sewer Fund Operations \$74,000.00, Revenue Bond & Debt Service \$28,218.55, and Airport Fund Operations \$6,070.00.

The City tax rate was set at \$1.38 per hundred dollar valuation. This is the same rate that has been in effect for the City of Abernathy for the past four years. Other business considered by the City Council was of a routine nature.

City Gin Gets First '65 Bale

L. L. (Les) Duckett, manager, announced that City Gin turned out its first bale of 1965 cotton Thursday. Roy Matthews, who farms east of Abernathy, brought in 2,000 pounds of seed cotton, which turned out a 625-pound bale of lint and 980 pounds of seed. Turn-out percentage was 31.25, Duckett said. The bale was ginned free of charge and Matthews was paid the usual first-bale premium of 50¢ per pound for lint and a premium price for seed. The bale graded middling 31-32, and 4.8 mic.

Matthews gathered the cotton from a 3.5-acre dryland plot. It was Lankart 57, planted about May 16.

Duckett announced that Harvey Wheeler, formerly of Arizona, has been employed as superintendent of the City Gin plant. Wheeler, who had operated five gins in Arizona, has 32 years of ginning experience, Duckett said.

Engineer On Lions Program

Roy Thomas, Amarillo, mechanical engineer for Southwest Public Service, will be guest speaker on the Abernathy Lions Club luncheon program at Graham's Sept. 28. He will speak on electric power dispatching and loading.

Thomas will be introduced by Willis Florence, plant manager at Tuco.

The grandstands were filled to capacity and some spectators lined the fence with cars. Standing room only was the scene before the game got underway.

The Firemen batted first, with Bob Scott, team manager hitting in lead-off position, riding one of the smallest and roughest donkeys on the field. Scott finally scored after hitting the ground several times between bases, when Bonnie Smith, battling clean-up spot and riding "Ole Red", hit a double to left field.

Veteran player for the business men, H. L. Hunley, helmeted and well padded, batting after Joe Tom Brown and Charles Nelson, was handed a shovel to bat with after missing several good pitches. He hit a triple with the shovel.

"Home run king" Cliff Crabtree, known better as "Mickey", delayed the game by staking a "Homestead" at the plate. Power hitters for the business men were Harold Stillwell, Hoppy Toler, Joe Dean Smith and Wayne Smith, Ralph Wolf and Buddy Adams. 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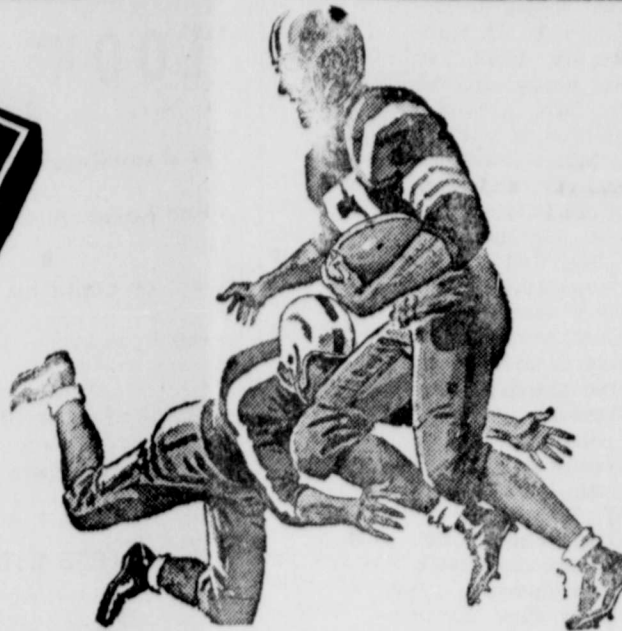
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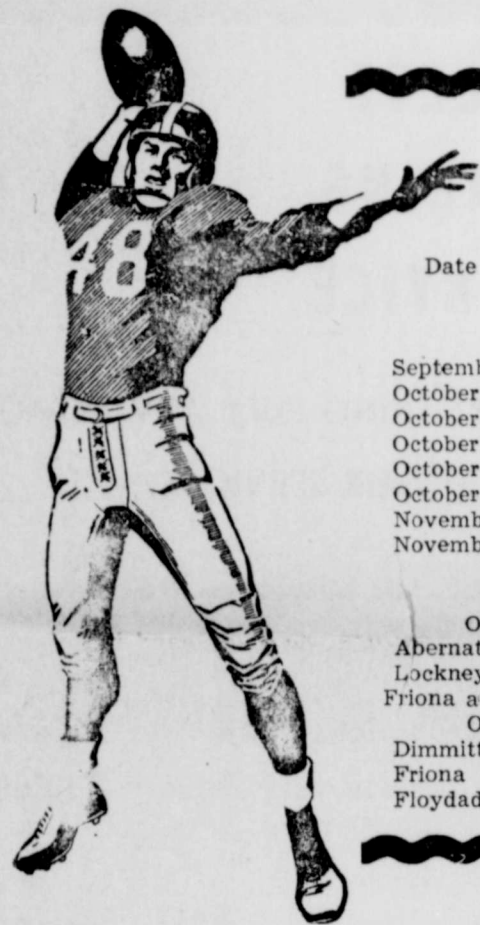
