

## Truman May Sign Bills, But Doesn't Like Them

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9. (AP)—The White House remained silent today on President Truman's strategy for his next attack on the 80th Congress.

While most presidential advisors say Mr. Truman will sign the Republican housing and anti-inflation bills, he is expected to criticize them sharply as inadequate.

White House Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters only that anyone can draw his own inference from the President's "known attitude."

The housing bill, less than the President asked of the special ses-

sion of Congress, has reached the President. Ross said it will go through the usual routine of submission to departments concerned for their comments. The anti-inflation bill, also short of the President's demands, should reach him shortly.

Some of Mr. Truman's best friends in Congress urged him to sign the measures.

They were passed by the special session which quit Saturday night after 13 days of political in-fighting in Capitol Hill.

Sen. Hatch of New Mexico, chair-

men of the Democratic Campaign Speakers Committee, told a reporter:

"In adequate as these measures are, I still think they represent some advance over what we have now and I hope the President signs them."

Sen. Lucas of Illinois, the assistant Democratic leader, said he feels the President will be "compelled" to sign them.

"But I am sure that when he does, he will be able to tell the country just how inadequate and how meager they are," Lucas declared.

## Western Envoys Confer Again With Molotov

### Third Parley On Various Berlin Issues

MOSCOW, Aug. 9. (AP)—Diplomats of the United States, Britain and France conferred in the Kremlin with Foreign Minister Molotov more than three hours today.

It was the third such conference in a week and was believed concerned with the Berlin blockade and other problems in the range of differences between the West and East.

The envoys left the Kremlin at 7:45 p. m. (10:45 a. m. CST) and went to the British embassy for another conference. Advisory staffs of all three missions were at the embassy awaiting their arrival.

U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith led the procession into the Russian seat of government at 7:30 a. m. CST. He was followed by Frank Roberts, special British envoy and private secretary to Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, and by French Ambassador Yves Chateigneau.

They were to see Foreign Minister Molotov, with whom they conferred Friday evening, presumably about the Berlin blockade, the German problem and perhaps other differences dividing the West and East. They talked last Monday night with Molotov and Premier Stalin.

Smith conferred with Roberts more than an hour before going to the Kremlin.

An informed source said the Kremlin session is expected to be one of the most important meetings so far and may well determine the course of the entire series of talks.

## Cotton Estimate Up Sharply From 1947

### Market Breaks Over \$2 A Bale After Report

NEW YORK, Aug. 9. (AP)—Cotton futures on the New York Exchange dropped today more than \$2 a bale below Friday's close after the government forecast a bumper 1948 crop.

Most traders had not anticipated a crop as large as the 15,169,000 bales predicted by the Agriculture Department. Private forecasts had averaged some 1,300,000 below this figure.

Following the customary suspension of trading for the government announcement, there was a rush to sell contracts for future delivery, and prices dropped swiftly.

Around noon, futures were fluctuating near their lows, off \$1.45 to \$2.40 a bale.

At New Orleans prices broke \$1.50 to \$1.90 a bale, with the widest drop in October deliveries.

### Court Term Will Open On Sept. 7

It has been the custom on years past here to call the grand jury and petit jury into session on Labor Day.

Collings, a candidate for the office of associate justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, is at the present time campaigning in the eastern portion of his district.

## Truman Will Invade South

WAKEFIELD, R. I., Aug. 9. (AP)—U. S. Sen. J. Howard McGrath, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, says President Truman will "positively go into the south" during his re-election campaign beginning about Sept. 1.

Asked in an interview if the President would campaign in Mississippi and Alabama, McGrath replied yesterday:

"I can't say exactly where he will go, but he intends to carry his fight to the people. That means the people who gather on courthouse steps, in public squares and at railroad stations."

Asserting that "Congress has utterly failed in its responsibility to the people," the Democratic party leader said high prices will be a major campaign issue.

## 15,000,000 Bale Forecast Is For Seventh Largest Crop On Record

WASHINGTON, August 9. (AP)—A 1948 bumper cotton crop of 15,169,000 bales was forecast by the Agriculture Department today.

Such a crop would be the seventh largest on record. The top yield was 18,946,000 produced in 1937.

The 1948 indicated crop is 3,318,000 bales more than last year's crop and 3,155,000 bales more than the 10-year 1937-46 average.

The indicated yield of 313.5 pounds per acre is the highest on record—14.6 pounds above the previous record of 298.9 pounds in 1944.

The department said the unusually high yields in prospect are due not only to exceptionally favorable growing conditions, but also to increased use of fertilizer, and a larger proportion of the cotton acreage being planted in heavy-yielding areas.

This is the first official forecast of the year. It is 3,318,000 bales more than last year's crop of 11,851,000 bales. Production for the 1937-46 period averaged 12,014,000 bales.

In a companion report, the Census Bureau said 258,928 running bales of this year's cotton crop had been ginned prior to Aug. 1. This compares with 193,638 ginned to the same date last year and 171,641 to the same date two years ago.

The condition of the cotton crop on Aug. 1 was reported at 85 per cent of normal. This compares with 78 per cent a year ago and 76 per cent for the 10-year average.

The indicated yield of 313.5 pounds per acre was reported at 313.5 pounds, compared with 267.2 last year and 254.2 for the 10-year average.

## Ferguson Won't Push Impeachment

DETROIT, Aug. 9. (AP)—Sen. Ferguson (R-Mich.) won't undertake to have President Truman impeached.

He said here last night he had no intention of pressing impeachment proceedings against the President. Then he added:

"I think the American citizen will use his own method during the presidential election to remove President Truman."

Ferguson made his remarks in an interview. On the Senate floor in Washington Saturday night he had mentioned impeachment in charging that Mr. Truman pursued an "iron curtain" policy by refusing to turn over loyalty records in the congressional spy investigation.

The senator, chairman of an investigating subcommittee, flew to Detroit to deliver a speech in which he said "we have many false prophets and Judases in our country." He did not mention President Truman in his speech, however.

## Tobin Not Yet A Cinch For Labor Post

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9. (AP)—President Truman appears to be in the dark today over whether he actually has found a secretary of labor.

In a surprise move just before the special session adjourned Saturday night, Mr. Truman nominated former Gov. Maurice J. Tobin of Massachusetts.

But Tobin, who is seeking to regain the governorship, has refused so far to say whether he will accept.

Congress quit without Senate action on any of the more than 100 nominations submitted by Mr. Truman, including that of Tobin as a successor to Lewis B. Schwellenbach, who died June 10.

Tobin said at Gilbertville, Mass., yesterday:

"I am still a candidate for governor."

"I am going to visit the President in the course of the next few days and beyond that I have nothing to say."

Tobin, 47, said he agreed to let his name be submitted to the Senate. He added, however, that the question of actual acceptance still is "under consideration."

## Thurmond Will Be In Houston Tuesday

HOUSTON, Aug. 9. (AP)—Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina, States' Rights Democratic nominee for President, will arrive here at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon by plane.

Thurmond, along with his vice presidential running mate, Gov. Fielding Wright of Mississippi, is to make formal acceptance of his nomination at a states' rights rally at 8 Wednesday evening.

## 22 Persons Dead After British Storm

LONDON, Aug. 9. (AP)—Week end storms in Britain and France left at least 22 persons dead and considerable damage.

British crops were flattened, and wide areas were flooded.

Damage at the French Port of Breteuil was estimated at more than 100 million francs (330,000).

Severe storms struck in Kent and Sussex, and high water battered the southeast and east coasts of England today, although in places skies began to clear.

## On Rice Rations

MANILA, Aug. 9. (AP)—Manila's 1½ million residents this week will be put on rice rations as the government tries frantically to find surplus rice to help feed the nation.

## MARINES ON MIDWAY STAGED SHOW TO CONVINCE JAP OF 'STRENGTH'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9. (AP)—A high Japanese official got a good look at some of the defenses at Midway just before war broke out—with the enthusiastic help of the Marines guarding the island.

Saburo Kurosu, the "peace" envoy en route to Washington, saw rows of armed troops, and a squadron of planes. And he heard the steady pounding of anti-aircraft guns, all secretly designed to impress him with the military muscle of the U. S.

The little-known story of Kurosu's stop-over at Midway, refueling point for Commercial Trans-Pacific Airlines, is told in "Marines at Midway," the third in a series of

World War II booklets issued by the Marine Corps.

Midway was strong on paper only when Kurosu came through but the Marines did their best to fool a likely enemy.

The commanding officer put every available man, including cooks and messmen, marching down the road with fixed bayonets, lined up "all" the planes—one squadron of flying boats—and just about wore out the muzzles of the three-inch anti-aircraft guns, firing within earshot of Kurosu's hotel.

The envoy left no remarks for the Marines to judge their smoke screen. That came with the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor.

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Asked by J. Parnell Thomas (R-NJ) whether Perlo seemed "every enthusiastic" about providing information, Miss Bentley testified:

"I would say he was the most energetic one in that entire group."

The horse fell from the tandem when the side was torn off by the impact. It sustained cuts and bruises to the front leg and a fractured back leg. The broken bone was set here.

## Witness Refers To More Spy Groups

WASHINGTON, August 9. (AP)—Elizabeth T. Bentley testified today it is "extremely likely" there were many more than two groups of government officials which she said leaked wartime secrets to a Soviet spy ring.

She repeated testimony that two groups were headed by Victor Perlo and Nathan Gregory Silvermaster.

Perlo and Miss Bentley took turns on the witness stand of the House Un-American Activities Committee. The committee is investigating stories of Soviet intrigue and espionage in this country.

Perlo refused to say whether he ever was a Communist or whether he knows or ever before has seen Miss Bentley, who calls herself a former Communist and wartime courier for Soviet agents.

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## Ft. Worth Man Is Charged In Wife's Death

FORT WORTH, Aug. 9. (AP)—J. Bennett Morrow, 46, a choir leader, was charged today with murder in the death of his wife, Mrs. Wyema Morrow, 44, who was shot and killed instantly yesterday morning near the Morrow home two and one-half miles west of Newark.

Morrow was free Monday on \$5,000 bond. The murder charge was filed in Justice of the Peace Gus Brown's court.

Morrow, in a written statement made to Asst. Dist. Atty. Foy Curry yesterday, said his wife was shot when his 38 cal. pistol was discharged during a scuffle in the Morrow's car outside their home.

The bullet entered Mrs. Morrow's left arm and penetrated her chest. She died instantly. Morrow took the body to a hospital and surrendered at Sheriff Sully Montgomery's office a few minutes later.

Morrow, choir leader at the Rose Heights Church of Christ, told Curry he married his wife last November and they began having domestic trouble a few months ago when she suffered "nervous spells."

"This morning about 7:30," Morrow told Curry Sunday, "she got up to make some coffee and I had started out to milk, when she flew into a rage. She turned over the table and threw a fruit jar in the sink and then a kerosene lamp at me."

"Then she ran out to the car and got the pistol. I got in the car on the other side in an effort to take it away from her and during the scuffle the gun was discharged. After the shot was fired she said, 'Oh, My God.'"

The Dixiecrats had called on them not to certify Truman and Barkley on the Texas ballot until after the party convention in September. The Dixiecrats also are demanding that the executive committee in its session today order a referendum in the August run-off primary on the Truman-Thurmond issue.

The Dixiecrats want Gov. J. Strom Thurmond and Gov. Fielding Wright's names to appear on the November ballot as the official democratic candidates for president and vice president in Texas.

The States' Rights Democrats came before the state executive committee meeting here in a fighting mood, conceding no points to the Dixiecrats.

"It is not a foregone conclusion that the committee will refuse our demand for a referendum on the Truman-Thurmond issue," said Lloyd Price of Fort Worth, a leader of the Dixiecrat faction.

## Calvert's Action Called 'Unlawful'

AUSTIN, Aug. 9. (AP)—Texas' loyalist Democrats today defied the Dixiecrats by certifying President Truman as the Texas party's nominee for president, and a states' rights leader called it an "unlawful act."

Party Chairman Robert W. Calvert and Secretary Vann M. Kennedy filed their formal certification of the Truman-Alben W. Barkley ticket with Secretary of State Paul H. Brown, for printing on the November election ballot.

Brown accepted it.

Lloyd Price of Fort Worth, a Dixiecrat spokesman, commented: "It was an unlawful act. We will appeal their action to the September convention."

That's where the final party showdown on the Truman-Dixiecrat fight will come, but court action may follow if the Dixiecrats are outvoted at the Fort Worth session in September.

Calvert and Kennedy made the certification a few minutes before the state executive committee went into session to canvass returns of the July primary and to consider a Dixiecrat demand for an Aug. 28 referendum on whether or not members of the party in Texas want their electoral votes cast for Truman or for the Thurmond-Wright Southern Democrat ticket.

Calvert's and Kennedy's action was the first legal blow in the electoral battle.

Their action was in compliance with a state statute providing that the chairman and secretary of the party certify the presidential and vice presidential candidates names with the secretary of state for printing on the ballot in the November general election.

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## Time Brings Vote Reforms

Perseverance triumphs, and nowhere is this more aptly demonstrated than at the ballot box.

The Crump machine in Memphis and all of Tennessee and a lesser one in Benton have been dealt stinging blows. Both had sailed through 30 years without defeat, piling up big majorities. Apparently it was a hopeless task to try to beat, let alone threaten, these vote-getting organizations.

But citizens, never willing to quit short of what they believed to be best for their state and county, kept coming back and hammering away. Now their wrath has overflowed.

Much the same thing has happened in other points, the Kelley machine in Chicago, the Hague domain in Jersey City, the Tammany clutch in New York, the Pendergast hold in Kansas City, the Penrose grip in Pennsylvania, and so on.

It may take time, but any people, determined on justice, can get it eventually at the ballot box if they want it keenly enough.

## Support For Hospital Plan

Governor Beauford Jester made some significant comments here Saturday which should give still more substance to hopes for expansion of the facilities of the Big Spring State hospital.

Previously, Sen. Sterling Parrish, who had worked with local groups to lay ground work for the next legislature after it was apparent that capital outlay appropriations were out of the question at the last session, had predicted that a minimum of \$2 million would be recommended by the board of control for new buildings. Saturday he took occasion to tell the governor he felt that needs warranted a figure nearer \$3 million.

The governor subsequently noted that the location of the power plant, in relation to the remainder of the buildings, was a tip-off as to planning for the Big Spring State hospital, which he characterized as the newest and best. It seemed only logical, he went on, that the state should invest in adequate, fire-proof buildings here rather than spreading out willy-nilly and at the same time increasing administrative costs needlessly. It was wiser, he thought, to expand the hospital here to serve the needs for West Texas.

Of course the legislature must first make the appropriations before the expansion will be realized, with the governor plumping for the program, it certainly is strategically in a favored spot. There is a good chance that the needs of this vast section of the state may be better supplied within the next two years, thanks to those who have worked to bring it about and to the governor's understanding of the problem.

## WHAT'S FINAL DEADLINE ON INFLATION?

NEW YORK, Aug. 7. (U)—Inflation can be reduced to a mathematical formula.

And some day the field of economics will come up with an Einstein who will write social history by figuring out that formula.

It will be a big help both to the politicians and the people.

Inflation can be measured in terms of sweat and fear, faith and production. Any rise in the cost of living is an "inflation." But when does it become dangerous?

Judging from recent inflations in Europe and China, they become dangerous when a drop of sweat buys and produces less and less, faith in the nation's economy falls and fear of its money rises.

By these standards the present inflation in the United States is mild. Mild indeed compared to the campaigning inflation which destroyed the currency of Hungary in 1946 and is now straining the printing presses that turn out the money for nationalist China.

Rising production, faith and a high value on sweat are the three anchors that keep the inflation balloon from skyrocketing.

Sure, prices have gone up steadily here. But so have production and the value of labor. Economists say that despite the high cost of living and the fall in the value of money a drop of sweat will buy more in the present market than it did 10 years ago.

And that is what really counts in any peacetime system—what sweat will buy. When sweat brings back less and less, when men work harder and harder to produce fewer and fewer goods, hope dies and panic is born—and the wild horse of inflation runs through the land.

When a country is saddled with true inflation you can read that fact in its people's faces. They mirror each other's fear of the present and the future. That was true in Hungary in May, 1946. The pengo, normally worth about 20 cents, fell to nothing. The government printed a 1,000,000,000-pengo note which it hoped was worth \$4.

I was in Shanghai in the fall of 1946 and one American dollar brought about 13,000 Chinese dollars. Three weeks ago a new Chinese 5,000,000-dollar note was worth 62 American cents in the black market. And when inflation reaches that point the black market is the only real market.

Today a souvenir continental or Confederate bill is worth more than the Chinese dollar.

## Meet Vets' 'Uncle Sam'

WASHINGTON (U)—The man in the street has never heard of Sam M. Moore, Jr., yet to almost half the nation's population he's literally an Uncle Sam.

Sam Moore is budget director for the Veterans Administration.

Moore estimates 47 or 48 per cent of the population currently has a direct interest in the sums he disburses. This includes some 20,000,000 war veterans and their families—say 60,000,000 persons, more or less.

In almost a quarter-century as budget director, Moore has seen the Veterans Administration's annual budget increase from a measly \$3,000,000 or \$4,000,000 to a staggering \$8,000,000,000.

For 1948-49 the estimated expenditure for pensions alone is \$1,888,000,000.

Pensioners increased from 856,513 just before World War II to 1,569,729 when Gen. Omar Bradley became administrator in 1945. There were 2,892,333 when Administrator Carl R. Gray, Jr., took over in Dec., 1947, and 2,889,091 at the end of May, 1948.

Moore, 65, white-haired and bespectacled, and the father of a son recently graduated from the Coast Guard academy, has been the nation's biggest spender since Sept. 1925. Three years before becoming budget director he left a job as a water company auditor at Miami, Fla., to become VA's assistant officer.

Moore says his job is like that of the comptroller of any large establishment.

"We study work loads, determine that requests for funds are reasonable and see that administrators receive funds for all work that is both necessary and desirable," he says.

"This means you have to be a no-man occasionally and you get jumped on now and then."

Born in a typical southern mansion, still standing in Sumter county, S. C.—Sam Moore never had to worry too much about matters financial as a youth. Even now, when it comes to personal affairs, he doesn't keep the books.

He just gives Mrs. Moore the money that comes in, and she takes care of the family budget.

### Berlin 'Profession'

BERLIN (U)—This is probably the only city in the world where one man could make more than \$500 a week stealing electric light bulbs. The bulb thief may not be "public enemy No. 1" in Berlin but he ranks pretty near the head of the list. ## Gov. Dewey Quoted As Siding With Truman Regarding Displaced Persons

WASHINGTON (U)—GOP Senators locked themselves inside the Senate caucus room for three hours the other day to work out a legislative formula that will let Congress go home early. Here is an inside account of what happened at the meeting:

Sharpest clash was over the displaced persons act which President Truman has called anti-semitic and anti-catholic. West Virginia's Chapman Revercomb, author of the act, defended it vigorously. He quoted some Catholic bishops as saying it was anti-Catholic, and excused the anti-Jewish features by claiming 65 per cent of the post-war immigrants have been Jews. They have been admitted to this country under the regular immigration quotas, he explained.

Revercomb's act will admit 200,000 non-quota refugees, but only those who fled to Germany before Dec. 22, 1945, will be eligible. This restriction automatically disqualifies 90 per cent of the Jews, most of whom fled into Germany to escape the Polish pogroms after December, 1945.

However, New Jersey's Alex Smith, scowling darkly, called upon the Republicans to clean up the act, and give no more comfort to Hitler's ghost. Senators John Cooper of Kentucky, Homer Ferguson of Michigan, and Leverett Saltonstall of Massachusetts joined him.

Smith added that the "Governor"—referring to presidential candidate Tom Dewey—wanted the act amended, and he quoted New York's Irving Ives as the source.

"I know I am suspected of speaking for Gov. Dewey in everything I do and say," replied Ives. "That is the reason you are not seeing me make any statements on the floor. I have not talked to Gov. Dewey about amending the displaced persons act, but I have talked to Herb Brownell (Dewey's campaign manager). He is very strictly in favor of it."

Ives also added his own hearty endorsement.

However, Missouri's Forrest Donnell backed up Revercomb and insisted that the subcommittee had been "open-minded" in writing the act.

TAFT'S FILIBUSTER  
Senate Boss Bob Taft was more concerned about breaking the Southern filibuster which he, himself, had brought on. It was Taft's idea to throw the Senate into a snarl over anti-poll-tax legislation to demonstrate the disunity in the Democratic Party. But at the caucus he wanted to clear the decks for the Senate wind-up.

The anti-poll-tax bill could be referred to the states for a constitutional amendment, Taft pointed out, or it could be withdrawn from the Senate floor.

The Southerners had indicated they would not filibuster the idea of a constitutional amendment, he said, but personally he was "inclined" to favor withdrawing the bill entirely.

Ives agreed that it was too late to propose a constitutional amendment. This had already been suggested by the Democrats, he argued, and "all we would be doing by changing tactics at this late date is to pull

their political chestnuts out of the fire."

The filibuster itself, he insisted, was more important an issue than anti-poll tax.

"Four people could tie up this whole country in the most dire emergency by keeping a filibuster going in the Senate," Ives thundered. "The whole civil-rights program shrinks into insignificance alongside this."

"CAKE" STEVENSON OF TEXAS

Ex-Governor Coke Stevenson of Texas, who now aspires to be a Senator, won a new name for himself. Around a capitol hill cloakrooms he is now called "Cake" Stevenson, because, when it comes to the Taft-Hartley act and other controversial issues, Coke wants to have his cake and eat it too.

At two press conferences which the Texas solon himself initiated on a recent trip to Washington, he evaded more issues and dodged more questions than any recent performer in a city noted for question-dodging.

Here is a stenographic report of part of "Cake" Stevenson's issue-evading press conference:

"You said this morning, Governor, that if we wanted to know your ideas on the Taft-Hartley act we should read the newspapers," queried one newsmen.

"I have searched the Texas files for every remark you made and I find no place where you committed yourself either for or against the Taft-Hartley act."

"I have already made a statement carried by the United Press," replied Mr. Stevenson.

"But why do you object to repeating your stand? Has it changed?"

## UNEXPECTEDLY, THE HOLY LAND MAY FIND PEACE

Even in the days of the great deluge the dove of peace found a resting place on Noah's Ark, and perhaps it isn't strange—though startling to find her circling hopefully in search of a landing spot in the strife-torn Holy Land.

If anyone had predicted a few weeks ago that both Arabs and Jews today would be guardedly offering refuge to the weary bearer of the olive branch, his rating as a prophet would have hit zero. Yet the impossible has happened—and it came about like this:

On Aug. 4, King Abdullah of Transjordan, key figure among the Arab nations at war with Israel and generalissimo of their armies in the field, declared that his country didn't "exclude any possible compromise that secures justice and prevents unnecessary bloodshed." This was the first public statement by any Arab leader indicating a willingness to compromise.

The next day the government of Israel made its first direct overture for peace negotiations with the Arab states. Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok placed the proposal before Count Bernadotte, United Nations mediator, who had to pass it on to the Arabs through the UN. The response remains to be seen.

Now of course it would be foolish to think that this necessarily means peace is just around the corner, for the bitterness between the combatants is too deep to be removed easily. However, it would be equally unwise to discard the possibilities of achieving a compromise.

The situation is complicated by the fact that the Arab nations are divided among themselves. Abdullah, who long has been a protégé of the British, stands to gain the most of all the Arab leaders in any compromise settlement with the Jews. This rankles with the rival Arab states of Egypt, Syria and Iraq, which don't want to give in to Israel.

However, Abdullah is a mighty man among the Arabs, not only because of his relations with England but because he has the most powerful army of all the Arab states.

## This Session A Queer One

WASHINGTON, (U)—The strangest special session of Congress came to a finish Saturday night. There never was a special session like that one, although it was the 26th in congressional history. The first was in 1797.

It started with name-calling. Everybody expected the arguments over inflation to be the big news. But the southerners edged in and put an almost week-long filibuster to kill an anti-poll tax bill.

And in no time at all the big news became—and remained—a Soviet spy hunt.

The members thought they were all done for 1948 when Congress adjourned late in June. Most of them wanted to begin campaigning for their own re-election.

It staggered them when President Truman suddenly announced in mid-July he was calling them back into special session, starting July 26.

This was done to fight inflation, he said. He blamed the inflation on the Republican-controlled Congress, a rather startling way to begin a campaign for the presidency. He had already labeled a quivering needle into the Republican by calling this Congress the worst in history. Fighting mad, the Republicans punched back with the assertion this was political humbug. The GOP couldn't shrug off the figures showing living costs to be at an all-time high. But they kicked the 11-point program of Mr. Truman out the window. Then came a southern filibuster on the anti-poll tax bill, a weak bill on housing, and something to battle inflation, far less than the President wanted. Then came the spy hunt that got the headlines.

Some of the Republican leaders said privately they were pretty happy that the spy hunt was taking the public's mind off the do-little Congress, at least for a while.

Mr. Truman chimed in and said the spy hunt was a "red-herring" to turn the public's attention away from what Congress wasn't doing. And that just about winds up the story.

### 27,000 Peddlers

ROME, (U)—There are over 27,000 peddlers in Rome, the peddlers union has announced. Of these, it said, 12,000 have regular licenses and sell vegetables, fruit and other food products in Rome's 27 markets. The rest tour the streets selling wares varying from antiques to brushes.

### Subway Stable

MOSCOW, (U)—A ride on the Moscow subway no matter from where to where costs seven and one-half cents. The fare was set some years ago and has remained without change for a considerable period. It comes to forty kopecks which is to say forty-one hundredths of one ruble. The ruble is pegged at 5.30 rubles per one American dollar.

## Puerto Rico Is Due Attention

A country whose people are among the most undernourished in the world, where sometimes feeling runs high against the American rather than the country from which he hails is Puerto Rico, our possession in the Caribbean sea.

Undoubtedly it is good politics to float a huge loan for the purpose of feeding hungry mouths in Germany, France and Italy. At the same time, it does not make sense that we should continue to neglect an island and its people we have ignored for nearly 50 years.

True, there is money on the island but it is controlled by some eight or ten families. And they control the economics of the country autocratically and without feeling for the hungry masses.

The island has more than 300 persons to the square mile, making it the second most thickly populated spot in the world. More than 2,000,000 persons live in an area 100 miles long and about 50 miles wide.

There is no middle class, only a few rich and a great many poor. The poor subsist on rice and beans and both commodities have to be imported in large quantities. The person who eats three meals a day is lucky. Many exist on one.

Many a Puerto Rican is born, lives his entire life within a few blocks of his birth place and dies without having strayed far from his habitat. Some who live in the mountains, a bare 25 miles from the sea, never get a glimpse of what the ocean looks like.

Malnutrition wrecks their bodies and robs a majority of them of their teeth at an early age. The island is among the most beautiful in the world but disease lurks everywhere. Plumbing facilities are wretched and are often ignored altogether.

The illiteracy rate is shockingly high. Few of the children attend school. Teachers come at a premium. The natives do not even speak pure Castilian. Much slang, including many an American term, has found its way into the language.

Most Puerto Ricans spend all their lives dreaming about coming to America but few ever make it. The Puerto Rican perhaps is a much more enthusiastic movie addict than the average American—a weekly picture provides the sole entertainment for many. Western stars are the most popular—the Puerto Rican likes the strong, virile type of man.

Because of the influence of the movies, many a Puerto Rican imagines that Texas is a land apart from the rest of the United States, a country where everyone wears boots and ten-gallon hats and goes about on horses. And every Texas male is gallant to his women folks, in the eyes of the islander.

The American soldier who swarmed into Puerto Rico during World War II discriminated in no small way against the Puerto Rican and much prejudice sprang up between the two. It did not make for any better relations when the Puerto Rican women showed a preference for Americans over their own race.

Some have advocated independence for the island but it is doubtful that it could exist on its own. Sooner or later, the country is going to demand attention from its parent. Perhaps it will call for some blood letting before Uncle Sam realizes he has a job on his hands.—TOMMY HART

## Bill O'Dwyer Is Doing All Right

NEW YORK (U)—Having known our Mayor Bill O'Dwyer, since his Brooklyn gaudy days when he put that gang of rodents called Murder, Inc., out of existence, I wondered a little how he's been weathering his later political phases. I checked with several of his assistants, most of them former newspaper guys with whom I once chased police calls, and they seem agreed that Bill has been able to speak softly, carry a big political stick and despite a bit of frightening overwork, to have a good time in his quietest corner.

Bill now has to move mostly in public. He eats lunch and dinner with his top executives, holds gabfests on public matters in his living room at Gracie Mansion, the mayor's residence, and rarely finds a moment for introspection. Bossing a city of eight million, and a city staff of 180,000 workers providing essential services, Bill feels a day seldom is long enough to encompass everything. Somehow things do get accomplished, and sometimes he steals a few moments, like the farmer leaning reflectively on his plow, to survey the glories around him.

Mr. O'D. has to snatch these moments in and around City Hall. The charming old building, not nearly so functional as the surrounding piles of municipal brick, was completed in 1912. Its traditions go back to the Revolution. A romantic despite his tough public political brawls, Bill has remarked to friends how he often thinks, walking up the marble steps of City Hall, that it is the exact location where, in the presence of George Washington, the Declaration of Independence was read and published to the American Army on July 9, 1776. Then he walks inside and up the beautiful staircase to the spot where Abraham Lincoln lay in state. From his office window he often looks at the McMonnies statue of Nathan Hale. On the wall directly across from his desk is the Rembrandt Peale portrait of Chancellor James Kent. Through the corridors are 91 portraits by famous artists, one of the finest collections of Americana.

The mayor receives visitors from all over the world, many of them artists and architects who revel in the lovely, graceful lines of the building and the art treasures it contains.

## Early Cotton Harvest Brings Labor Demand

AUSTIN, Aug. 9. (UP)—Unusually early opening of cotton bolls in South and South Central Texas has stepped up demands for pickers in those areas, the Texas Employment Commission reported today.

Temporary shortages of labor are occurring in some areas, but they are rapidly being liquidated, the commission's weekly report on farm labor said.

There has been no extensive migration of workers from the Rio Grande Valley and the current estimate is that 90,000 persons are busy in the cotton harvest.

The report also said: Coastal bend farm labor supply is sufficient at the present peak of the cotton harvest. In both the Corpus Christi and Valley areas, cotton had been picked and moved to the gins so rapidly that new records in number of bales ginned were being set.

Corpus Christi gins last week ginned more bales than during any week in the last five years. At the same time gins in the Rio Grande Valley were reporting all-time high ginning records.

In general, cotton in the coastal bend area, Houston region, and

# County's Cash Balance Lower

Disbursements of \$18,780 against receipts of \$6,680 reduced Howard county's cash balance to \$179,050 at the end of July.

This was the report from County Auditor Chester O'Brien, approved by the county commissioners court Monday morning.

Heaviest expenditures occurred in the road and bridge and officers' salary fund as usual. The road and bridge total was \$8,456 against receipts of \$2,194; the officers' salary \$5,269 against receipts of \$2,964; the general fund \$2,901 against receipts of \$594.

Of the total balance, roughly \$101,000 was in operational funds, the remainder being either in interest and sinking accounts, or in funds pledged to lateral road construction.

Expenditures by funds and balances at the end of the month were: Jury \$103 and \$2,802; road and bridge \$8,456 and \$66,331; general \$2,901 and \$14,565; officers' salary \$5,269 and \$9,618; permanent improvement \$909 and \$2,635; special road bond fund none and \$3,098; road and bridge special none and \$3,062; viaduct warrant none and \$889; road bond 1945 series none and \$53,084; road bond 1945 series sinking fund none and \$5,602; lateral road none and \$4,830; library \$386 and \$5,242; road machinery warrants (in three series) none and \$7,266; total \$18,780 and \$179,050.

# New Producer Awaits Casing

Seaboard No. 2 Caldwell, east offset to the discovery well of the Vernal pool, was shut in Monday, waiting on cement to set around seven-inch string.

Casing was run to 7,842, top of the Pennsylvanian lime. The test was taken to 7,884 feet and a one-hour drillstem test from 7,842-80 through half inch bottom hole check and a one inch top check.

As reported previously, gas showed to surface in five minutes, mud in 12 minutes and oil in 14 minutes. The test flowed 40 barrels of oil in 46 minutes, and 11 barrels after the tool was closed, for a total of 51 barrels of pipeline oil in one hour. This gives a hypothetical rate of 1,214 barrels per day. Location is in the northeast corner of section 32-32-3N, T&P.

Seaboard No. 1 D. C. Zant, north offset to the No. 2 Caldwell and an east offset to the No. 1 Dora Campbell, the heaviest producer in the pool, was reported at 5,560 feet in line and shale. It is in section 29-32-3N, T&P.

ALHAMBRA, Calif., Aug. 9. (U. P.)—After a 20-mile foot chase in the best Hollywood tradition, Deputy Donald Doughty got his man—three men in fact.

The chase, which started at Ontario in San Bernardino County where Doughty is on the sheriff's staff, wound up here in Los Angeles County. It was conducted mostly on the top of a long, moving freight train.

# Wallace Wants Probers To Get Nazi Helpers

NEW YORK, Aug. 9. (U. P.)—Henry A. Wallace, assailing the current "spy" hearings, says the U. S. government has failed to uncover those who aided Nazi Germany during the war.

The Progressive Party presidential candidate said in a statement yesterday:

"The current unsupported allegations of giving information to an ally Russia during time of war should be examined in the light of the failure of the administration to seek the prosecution of those who aided Hitler Germany."

Wallace called the congressional investigation of alleged Russian agents part of a "pattern of terror and fear-making."

The House Un-American Activities Committee's current hearings, Wallace said, are setting a pattern which "is the same as that which developed in Germany in the 1930's."

Wallace said the way the hearings are conducted means "the deprivation of due process of law; the substitution of 'conviction by headlines' for judicial procedure; the destruction of the constitutional guarantees of a free people."

Such procedure "are the products of both old parties," Wallace added.

The FBI heard the current spy stories years ago, Wallace said, and the same stories were told to a federal grand jury without any substantiating evidence being brought to justify indictments.

Wallace said "the bi-partisan unity in building fear has been and remains an integral part of the bankrupt foreign policy."

# Plans Reported For Invasion Of Costa Rica

PANAMA, Panama, Aug. 9. (U. P.)—High government sources said today former Overseas Minister Arnulfo Arias Madrid is organizing an armed invasion of Panama from Costa Rica.

Arias, who fled Panama last week after being declared the loser in the May presidential elections, is working with the general staff of the Costa Rican army, these informants asserted.

A force of "foreign mercenaries," they added, "is poised to invade the country along the border zone at Petro Armales."

Puerto Armales is in Panama, near the Costa Rican border, on the Pacific Ocean.

The informants said Arias, whose government-backed liberal party opponent, Domingo Diaz Arosemena, has been declared president-elect, went to San Jose by way of Colombia. Reports from Puerto Armales said "a large number" of Arias' followers have crossed into Costa Rica in the last few days, using banana plantation trails.

# Great Inventor Dies At English Home

SIDMOUTH, Eng., Aug. 9. (U. P.)—Sidney George Brown, 75, Chicago-born scientist and reputedly one of the most prolific modern inventors, died at his home here Saturday.

Brown, who started inventing at the age of 18, held nearly 1,000 patents on a wide variety of devices. He played a big part in the development of telegraphy, telephony and gyroscopic compass.

In 1899 he invented a wireless beam system and then devised a means of signalling through underwater cables. In 1908 came the invention which made him world famous—a new headpiece and radio telephony loudspeaker.

# Starvation Hits Besieged City

PEIPING, Aug. 9. (U. P.)—Five hundred persons a day are starving to death in Red besieged Changchun and its environs, the newspaper Shih Chieh Jih Pao said today.

Within the Manchurian city 200 are dying daily from hunger, the newspaper said, and in the no-man's land around 300 more are dying.

Dog meat, the paper added, is selling for 24,000 Chinese dollars a pound (\$240 U. S.), horse meat 50 million (\$5) and Kaoling, a Chinese variety of sorghum at 100 million (\$10) a pound.

The people, trapped between National and Red forces, are having a terrible time because neither side will admit making any through their lines. Some few get through the Red lines after paying. The current safe conduct cost for six persons through the Red lines is a pistol.

# Recruiters Will Keep Campaigning

The Army and Air Force recruiting campaigns to enlist three-year volunteers will continue without let-up although draft legislation has been passed, Capt. O. T. Ham of the local recruiting station said here this morning.

The two services will continue to rely on voluntary enlistments as the principal means of obtaining needed manpower. Capt. Ham explained. The Selective Service act will be used only to make up the difference between authorized strength and the number of volunteers.

"Volunteers are the backbone of our Regular Forces," Ham said. "They furnish the career men, and we cannot have an Army or an Air Force without career men."

Many enlistment choices still are open to three-year volunteers in either of the two services, the officer pointed out. Under the Army Technical School plan, they can choose training in one of more than 60 specialties before enlisting. Service in Japan and Korea is also available.

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## 'Make It Yourself-With Wool' Sewing Contest Entry Blanks, Rules Available

Texas girls, particularly those in the wool and mohair producing areas, are eligible to enter the "Make It Yourself - With Wool" home sewing contest. This contest is for girls 14 to 22 years of age and is being conducted by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association in cooperation with the American Wool Council and the Woman's Auxiliary of the National Wool Growers' Association.  
Mrs. John Will Vance of Coleman, state auxiliary president, is director of the contest; Mrs. Sayers Farmer of Junction is co-director, and nine other state auxiliary members are serving as area chairmen.  
The contest, which is directed toward promoting home sewing and designing with virgin wool material, is for two age groups: junior class—14 through 17 years of age; senior class—18 to 22 years of age. The age of the girl on January 15, 1949, will be the basis considered for classification.  
There will be three divisions in the contest: coats, suits and dresses. The dresses may be for street, sports and formal wear. Each contestant may enter only one garment in each division, but she may enter a garment in one, two, or all three divisions. Entries will be judged on workmanship, judgment in selection of fabric and trimmings, fit and becomingness to the contestant and tasteful choice of accessories.  
All garments entered in the contest must be made of virgin wool and must carry a label or tag disclosing the fiber content as required by the Wool Products Labeling Act. The entry garment may be made according to the contestants own design, or by any commercial pattern. Each garment entered must be accompanied by a typewritten letter of 200 words or less setting forth: the fabric from which the garment was made, the reason for its choice and its advantages for the use intended; the pattern used, or a statement that the garment was made according to the entrant's own design; and the total itemized cost of the garment, including fabrics, and all other component parts.  
Entry blanks and rules for the contest may be obtained in August and September through the state directors and area chairmen. Area contest style shows will be held the first two weeks in November in nine Texas towns and entries must reach area chairmen by Oct. 15. Mrs. H. C. Noelke, 404 S. Bishop Street, San Angelo, is an area chairman and that city's style show will be November 1st.  
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
