A COUPLE OF THINGS were evident by virtue of Ronald Reagan's landslide victory over President Jimmy Carter in Tuesday's General Election.

The first is that the American people, from the Redwood Forest to the New York Island, and from North Dakota to Texas, were disenchanted with Carter's administration, and were ready for a change of the guard, in hopes that Reagan can in some way stave off such things as the spiraling inflation which threatens to undermine the country's very foundation.

The second is that the country's major media, in particular the three major television networks, cannot be relied upon to fairly and truthfully reflect the mood of the American people.

Whether it is by accident or design, the truth of the matter is that the media "specialists" tried in vain to "talk us into" a toss-up election. "It's too close to call," the television boys have been saying for weeks.

Only longtime pollster Lou Harris finally dared to break with the opinion-shapers and came out on election eve with the forecast that Reagan might, in fact, unseat the president.

The fact of the matter was that he whipped the pants completely off the incumbent (Carter had a word for that, but we'll omit it in deference to his gracious concession speech). There was nothing what-so-ever "too close to call" about the election, and it is difficult to see how all of the networks could miss the national feeling so badly.

Could it be that they are too close to the national leaders, and completely turned off to the thoughts of the average voter? We would hope that this was the case, rather than the underlying suspicion that they were trying to make the race close for an unpopular president.

At any rate, perhaps the average television viewer will begin taking statements made by the national media with more of a grain of salt, rather than accepting them as "The Gospel."

This goes along with some things we have been saying about the networks for years. We think it's about time that these people stand back and take a good look at themselves, and figure out for whom they are giving the news, and strive to tell it a little more like it is.

Voters Hard On Changes

Parmer County voters favored only three of the nine proposed constitutional amendments on the General Election ballot Tuesday.

Voters okayed numbers six (removal of certain appointed officials), 1671-1238; seven (county road work on private roads), 1856-1064, and nine (conversion of marital community property to separate property), 1604-1311.

Other totals included: No. 1 (unmanned bank teller machines) 1426 for, 1569 against; No. 2 (state's right of appeal) 923 for, 1902 against; No. 3 (centralized equalization board) 1123 for, 1724 against; No. 4 (legalized bingo) 1378 for, 1649 against; No. 5 (budget execution) 758 for, 2115 against and No. 8 (change names of appeal courts) 956 for, 1777 against.

Two Contestants Tie For Top Grid Prize

Seven contestants turned in entries with eleven correct predictions from a slate of 14 games in the Bovina Businesses Football Contest.

Two contestants, Joyce Read and Patti Sherrill, tied for first and second place money and will split \$12.50. This is the second consecutive week for a first and second place tie.

Mrs. Read missed Texas-Texas Tech, Buffalo-Atlanta, and Cincinnati-San Diego games and predicted Dallas 24-St. Louis 18, missing the tie-breaker by 9 points. Miss Sherrill missed the Texas-Texas Tech, West Texas-Indiana State and Washington-Minnesota games and predicted Dallas over St. Louis 30-18 also missing by nine points.

Steve Cockerham took third place money by picking eleven right also but was squeezed out of first or

second place on the basis of missing the tie-breaker by eleven points. He predicted Dallas over St. Louis 35-21. Cockerham also missed the Coronado-Hereford, Texas-Texas Tech, and Buffalo-Atlanta games.

Others picking eleven were Ricky Shepherd 13 points away with a prediction of 24-14; A.L. Kerby, Jr., 15 points off the tie-breaker with a prediction of 31-13; Joe Dan Tarter of Lazbuddie predicted Dallas over St. Louis 21-12, off by 18 points and Terry Schilling missed the tie-breaker by 23 points by predicting a tie, Dallas 14 and St. Louis 14.

Mary Jane Wilson and Ricky Shepherd are the leaders in the overall standings with a score of 92 going into the tenth week.

The most missed games this week were Hereford-Coronado, Texas-Texas Tech, and Buffalo-Atlanta.

Reagan Wins Votes In County, Precinct

Parmer County voters went to the polls in record numbers Tuesday, and gave an overwhelming majority of their votes to the next president of the United States, Ronald Reagan.

Reagan won Parmer County's majority in a runaway, gaining 2640 votes, a whopping 77.7 per cent of the votes cast in the presidential column. President Jimmy Carter received 707 votes or 20.8 per cent.

Third-party candidate John Anderson's vote was insignificant in Parmer County, as he polled only 30 votes, and Libertarian candidate Ed Clark managed only 21 votes.

Bill Sarpalius, who won election over incumbent Bob Price with amazing ease across the area, was given a 67.1 per cent sendoff by county voters, who had given him 90 per cent of their votes in his primary victory over Gerald McCathern. The vote this time was 2199 for Sarpalius to 1075 for Price.

County voters were also electing a sheriff, and they gave present Chief Deputy Bill Morgan a near 2-1 win, 2167 votes to 1128 for his opponent, Nick Hand. Morgan won every voting box in the county except at Bovina, where he had a 25-vote margin, 282-257.

Congressman Kent Hance, who only had taken opposition from J.D. Webster of the Libertarian party, lost only 61 votes to his opponent, although polling 409 votes less than the Reagan-Bush presidential ticket.

The Reagan ticket easily won every precinct box in the county. He scored 80 per cent margins or better in the five smallest boxes, including the absentee box. This included margins of 85.9 per cent at Lazbuddie, 286-36; 86 per cent at Lakeview, 43-7; 83.8 per cent at Rhea, 43-7; 83.2 per cent of the absentees, 198-38; and 80 per cent at Black, 44-9. Oklahoma Lane went 79.6 per cent in his favor, 144-30.

Helped by near-perfect weather for election day, which saw a sunny day with temperatures in the high 60s, a record number of voters marked ballots in Parmer County.

The total vote Tuesday was 3,519. This edged the former record of 3,482 set in 1976, and amounted to 77.96 per cent of the registered voters, considered excellent by voting officials.

The Bovina precinct missed its record by 38 votes, as the 574 turnout was below the 606 recorded in 1976, but figures showed 50 residents of the precinct had voted absentee, which would make 618 total voters, 77 per cent of the precinct's 799 registered.

The absentee vote had easily topped the former record by 60 per cent, with 259 early voters. This mark was helped by a special absentee

booth in Friona on two days, which produced a large percentage of the absentees.

Commissioner Ernest Anthony of Precinct 1 scored an easy win in his

bid for re-election with 1069 votes to 434 for his challenger, Raymond Euler.

The Friona precinct had a turnout of 1535, or 80.6 per cent, boosted somewhat by the commissioner's and sheriff's race. Both candidates for sheriff had Friona ties. Morgan is a former chief of police and deputy there, and Hand is presently a patrolman on the police force.

In Bovina, voters went overwhelmingly for Reagan, although his winning percentage was not as high as in some of the precincts.

Reagan-Bush won the Bovina precinct with 415 votes, to 147 for Carter, one for Clark and three for Anderson. This amounted to 73.8 per cent of the vote for the Reagan-Bush ticket.

The local precinct likewise gave a good margin of their votes to Bill Sarpalius in the race for the state senator's seat. Sarpalius received 359 votes to 182 in the Bovina precinct, a 66.4 per cent margin for the Boys Ranch native.

Histories Are Still Being Sought Locally

The Parmer County Historical Commission is urging residents to help them reach their goal of 1200 family histories, in order that the commission can publish a "first class" history book.

"We ask you to keep your family histories coming. If you have not written your family history, please do so, and if you have, contact your neighbors, relatives and friends and remind them to write theirs," says Otho Whitefield, chairman of the book project.

Whitefield said the commission has to earn their "extra pages," for general, community, church, clubs and other stories of special interest. We do this by the "paid pages" by businesses, memorial and tribute pages," Whitefield said.

"Do not forget the memorial to your deceased loved ones, or a tribute to your special living ones. Business histories are a vital part of our book, and we will be contacting each of you in the near future. Each of you have contributed a great deal to the development of our county. Some of you have been in business over fifty years, and others are relatively new. Won't you help us by recording your histories now?" the book chairman said.

This history book will be passed

down for generations to come, and will be a wonderful source for those to follow who want to trace their genealogy, Whitefield pointed out.

The book committee has a work room in the Congregational Church at Friona, and their working hours are 2-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Anyone needing assistance is asked to call 247-3815, 247-3856 or 265-3542, and someone will be happy to meet with you and help you with your story or other problems connected with the history book.

Around The House

"Summer" pears, from the Pacific coast, are in season from late August through November. So fall is the perfect time to try them. Teamed up with pork chops (another good buy right now) you have supper in a skillet, easy for you to fix and your family to enjoy.

Pears are a refreshing compliment to pork and other meat. Pork chops and sunny pears simmer in a ginger-flavored sauce in this recipe.

Pears and Pork

6 pork loin chops, 3/4 to 1 inch thick
salt and pepper
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
1/4 cup lemon juice
1/4 cup water
1/4 cup soy sauce
1/2 tsp. ground ginger
3 fresh pears, halved and cored

Trim excess fat from pork chops. Brown chops on both sides; drain excess fat. Sprinkle chops with salt and pepper. Combine brown sugar, lemon juice, water, soy sauce and ginger; pour over the chops. Cover and cook over low heat about 20 minutes. Arrange pears around chops and cook 20 minutes longer or until pork is tender; baste pears occasionally with sauce in pan. Makes 6 servings.

Tornado season is year-round problem in Texas

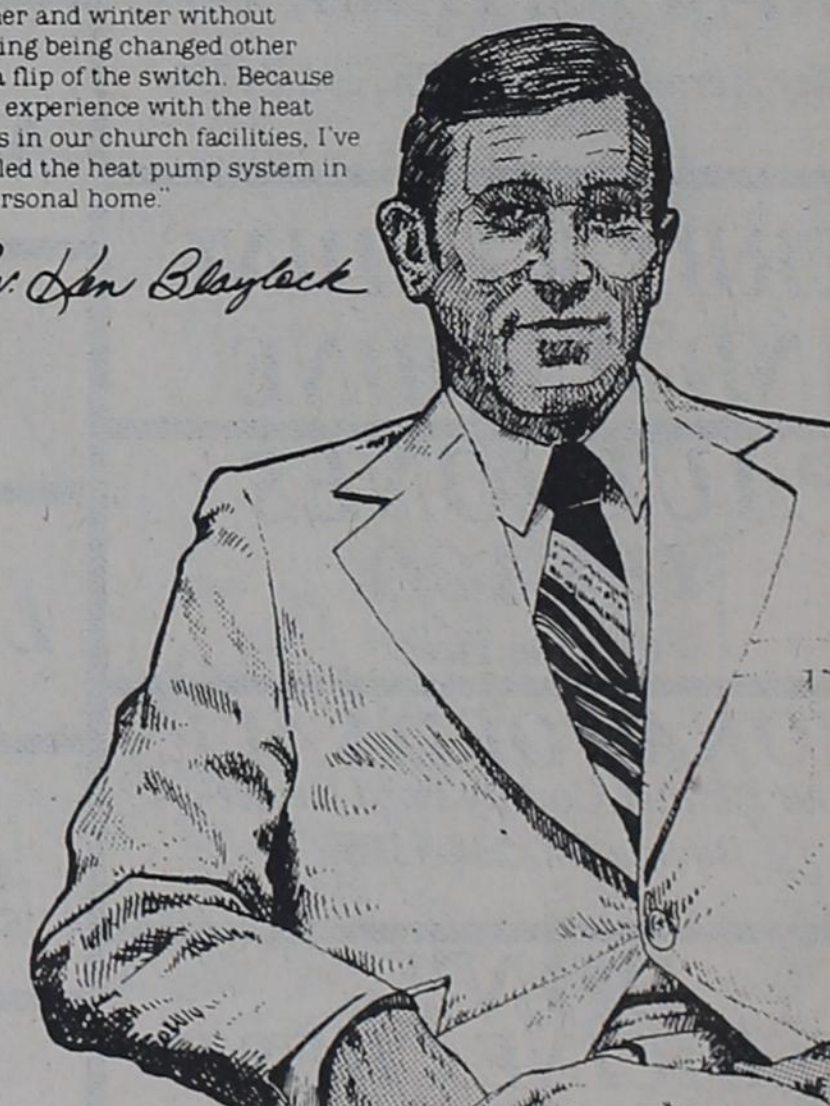
