

Air Force Team Moves Burn Victim To San Antonio

A 12-year-old Colorado City girl clung to life Wednesday in the Institute of Surgical Research, Brooke Army Medical Center, San Antonio.

A military medical burns evacuation team carried her there Wednesday from Root Memorial Hospital.

She is Sundee Stewart, 12,

daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Stewart.

Burns, mostly third degree, covered approximately 90 per cent of her body when a gown ignited Monday night while she dried her hair in front of the fireplace in the Stewart home north of Colorado City.

The accident happened shortly before 9 o'clock Monday night, and Sundee was moved

from Root Memorial Hospital at 6:45 p.m. Tuesday.

A 6-member evacuation team, including two doctors and a nurse, came here to move the burns victim.

They brought special equipment, ambulance and station wagon for the transfer to Webb Air Force Base where an Air Force evacuation plane moved

the girl and her parents to Brooke Army Medical Center.

The team prepared here 3 hours before making the move and synchronizing time schedule with the airplane.

As the ambulance departed the hospital here, Sundee waved good bye as a military nurse lifted her elbow.

The accident happened after

the Stewart family prepared a log fire for one of their regular family get-togethers around the fire place when the father returned from a Jaycee meeting.

Friends of the family said that the father left the house a few minutes to check the anti-freeze in his Scout car.

After a few minutes, Mrs.

Stewart left the room to prepare for bed and read in a bedroom across the hall.

Sundee was in front of the fire place with her hair drying.

When the girl screamed, the mother ran into the room and discovered her gown in flames.

Quickly Sundee was rolled in the carpet, still marked by the

scorching flames, and rushed to Root Hospital at 8:50 p.m.

Air Force officers at Webb Air Force Base, Big Spring, and Dyess Air Force Base, Abilene, immediately began making arrangements for the girl to be admitted to the military center, when contacted by phone by Mrs. Don Powell and Joe Weaver, friends of the Stewarts, with the aid of the attending doctor here.

The center is for research and treatment of severe burns.

The Stewart daughter is in the sixth grade at Wallace.

Her parents, who made the trip with her, have been housed at the military hospital center and were met on their arrival there by a chaplain and other military personnel.

Richard Is Third Sheriff Candidate

A third candidate Wednesday entered the campaign for Mitchell County sheriff.

He is R. L. (Roy) Richard, Loraine business man, who formerly served as chief deputy on the staff of Sheriff Lewis Claxton.

Richard, who has more than 8 years of experience in Mitchell County law enforcement, joins two earlier announced sheriff candidates - Forrest Smith, now Claxton's chief deputy, and Deputy Sheriff W. R. (Bill) McGuire.

"I believe I can be of service to the citizens of Mitchell County," Richard said, "and, if elected, I will do my best to be the caliber of sheriff Mitchell County citizens want and deserve."

Richard served 8 years, 4 months on Sheriff Claxton's staff. He resigned 3 years ago to devote full time to his automotive parts supply business in Loraine.

The new candidate has lived in Mitchell County since 1920. He is a member of Crockett-Smiley Church of Christ in Loraine.

He is the father of Mrs. Maurice Coldewey, Mrs. Charles Pruitt and Mrs. Harvey Sherman, all of Midland, Donald Richard of Abilene, Mrs. Virgil Trout of Loraine and Roy Wayne, 11, at home with Mr. and Mrs. Richard.

"During my 8 years and 4 months as deputy and chief deputy sheriff," Richard said, "I truly enjoyed working with and for the citizens of Mitchell County."

"It is only because I can be of service to all the citizens that I offer my candidacy now

as Sheriff of Mitchell County.

"During all my years in law enforcement I worked for and obtained cooperation of other law agencies--locally, within the area and at the state level. If I am elected sheriff, this same policy of cooperation will be emphasized at all times.

"My pledge will be to be the best caliber of sheriff."

Like the other two sheriff candidates, Richard will enter the Democratic Primary.

With 3 candidates definitely announced, the sheriff's race has taken the spotlight in county politics for the '72 election year. So far, it is the only contested race.

Texas Electric Service Company, already with a higher rate approved in Loraine, goes to Westbrook Tuesday and Colorado City Monday with the request for 6 per cent increase.

The 6 per cent hike--first rate rise sought by TESCO in 10 years--is being sought across the board at all city councils in the area serviced by the utility company.

Don Benson, local TESCO manager, said he had later contacting Colorado City city councilmen over a period of days to explain his company's request and to emphasize that the proposed 6 per cent raise is reasonable in light of increased costs.

He emphasized that the new rate would increase electric bills approximately \$1 per month or 3 cents per day for

the average residential customers.

Loraine City Council voted approval for the raise Monday night when Benson formally presented the request.

The TESCO manager goes before Westbrook City Council Thursday night.

He will meet Monday night with Colorado City's council.

Snyder already has okayed the increase here, voting approval Monday night. Sweetwater receives the proposal official Tuesday night.

Fort Worth councilmen Monday indicated they will grant a higher rate for TESCO, but have referred the request to its city utilities supervisor before final decision.

TESCO is following the procedure outlined for rate increases by President Nixon's Price Board. The company puts the request before the local regulating body (city council in most locations). If an increase is granted, then the rate is submitted to the Price Board for action.

General level for all price increases under the federal control program has been announced at 5 1/2 per cent. But that is not a mandatory limit and has been exceeded after study by the Washington board.

"Our company, because of sharply increased costs that it can no longer absorb or offset, and facing its largest construction program in history, must request approval of a 6 per cent increase in its rates," Benson said.

"This increase, to be applied uniformly on all rates, is a minimum amount needed to continue to provide dependable electric service for the growing needs of our customers."

Benson pointed out that only twice before in its history has TESCO found it necessary to request rate increase.

"Our efforts have been to keep the cost of electricity as low as possible, a policy that has resulted in a number of voluntary rate reductions by our company.

"Our last increase was granted in 1961," Benson continued, "and this was offset by our own voluntary reductions in 1963 and 1965."

The manager said his company had "held the line" against rising costs through economics, installation of larger and more efficient generating units and taking advantage of automatic and other technological advances.

"But relentless inflation and resulting higher costs affecting every phase of our business have now made it necessary for this rate increase."

TESCO President Burl Hulsey at the company's annual Quarter Century banquet here last fall reported that TESCO would

have to vastly increase its plant capacity during the next 10 years.

And, Benson said that in the next 2 years alone, \$165 million will be spent on new construction within the TESCO system. About 100 million dollars of this amount must be raised in the competitive market, which also will require favorable rates to attract money investors.

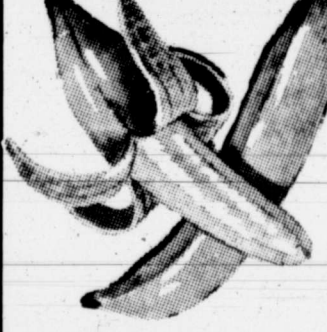
