When the coffee shop subject got around to no more cigarette ads on television, one area farmer allowed as how that was a bad deal.

"That Marlboro ad was about all the romance I've been able to see lately in the cattle business," he quipped.

The past several months have been semi-rough times for area cattle feeders, they tell us. They're caught in the age-old cost-price squeeze, whatever that is. The feeders cost too much going in for what they bring coming out is what it amounts to, though.

Nobody really knows, we guess, why the price of feeder cattle remains high compared to the fat cattle price except there's still enough optimism around among feeders to keep the price boosted on the feeder end.

The price situation is a good one for the man who has stockers and feeders to sell, the cowmen tell us, and the situation could improve for the feeder anytime. No one really wants the feeder cattle price to go down, they just want the fat cattle price to go up so there will be enough margin to make cattle feeding profitable. Feeders aren't nearly as worried about the price they pay or get as they are the margin involved. The situation is akin to trading cars in that the price of the trade-in or the new car isn't as important as the difference (margin) involved.

Farmers and cattlemen alike are noting that this year's wheat pasture isn't as good as it sometimes is. Some feel that this will cause cattle to be taken off pasture earlier than the normal March 1-15 time. For some reason or another, this winter just hasn't been ideal for the growing wheat.

Last week's cold spell didn't help the situation any, but it wasn't as good as it has been even before that. Dry weather is, no doubt, a contributing factor.

Farmers who had to start irrigation wells last week in the zero and below eather to water cattle, didn't think too highly of the wheat pasture business, anyway, they indicated. In the first place, the weather was too cold to work in and in the second place the low temperature made most motors hard to start.

The fellow who didn't have plenty of cattle water pumped before the spell struck was just in a bad predicament, that's all. But it made for more genuine appreciation for this week's warmer weather.

Friend Owen Patton says he ALWAYS reads Whittilin' until he comes to something about football. Then, he skips over that and goes on to something he's more interested in. Says he really doesn't have anything against football, he just doesn't read about it if he can help it.

Now it's time to skip, Owen. Our eldest son confided that he was disappointed in his Dear Old Dad about our prediction that Texas U would win over Notre Dame in the January 1 Cotton Bowl.

We were disappointed, too, of course, after we knew the outcome, but we didn't mean to embarrass anybody. However, that's the chance you have to take when you stick your neck out and have kinkfinks, too.

We'll try to do better on the outcome of the Super Bowl. We're guessing the Dallas Cowboys, after so many years of frustration and without a top-notch quarterback, will win all the marbles this year.

Damage Ceiling --

Water Pipes Flood Hall

A water pipe in the ceiling of St. Ann's parish hall burst sometime Tuesday night during last week's cold spell, flooding the building with about four inches of water.

Dan Koelzer made the discovery about 8:30 Wednesday morning when he noticed water

running down the gutter and decided to check on the source. Main damage was to the ceiling in the kitchen.

Holes were knocked in the ceiling to drain the water and this prevented further damage to the ceiling in other parts of the building. A pump was brought in Wednesday morning to remove water from heat ducts beneath the floor of the building. Cabinets in the kitchen and the walls of the kitchen also suffered extensive damage.

"As far as we can tell, most of the damage is to the ceiling in the kitchen and the cabinets, but it will probably be awhile before we can determine the exact amount of damage. There may be some damage to the outside walls that will not show up until this summer," a spokesman at the church reports.

Renews Superintendent's Contract --

School Board Hears Reports

The contract of Superintendent L. F. Jacobs was extended an additional year, making it run until July of 1974, at a meeting of board of trustees of Bovina Independent School District Monday night.

Jacobs had two years remaining on his previous contract.

The custom here is for contracts of the superintendent to be considered in January, contracts of principals and coaches are considered in February and those of teachers are renewed in March.

The board formally entered into a contract with an Amarillo attorney, Howard Perdue, to

continue work on collection of delinquent taxes for the school district. Perdue has been working during the past several months on tax collections here. Jacobs reported to the board that some 150 students are participating in the new federal and state program for free or reduced price lunches in the school cafeteria. This is from a total of some 675 students. The new program was initiated January 4. However, the school had its own free lunch program prior to that time. The board was also presented the following report concerning income from the 1970 football season:

HOME GAME RECEIPTS (after expenses and guarantees were paid) --- Boys Ranch, \$388.50; Happy, \$304; Springlake-Earth, \$298; Sudan (homecoming) \$727.50; and Vega \$390.

JUNIOR HIGH GAMES --- Vega, \$81; Kress, \$53.50; Farwell, \$76; and Hart, \$42.75. Game guarantees from other schools were Friona, \$672.70, which was half the gate after expenses; Lazbuddie, \$100; and Farwell, Kress and Hart, \$50 each.

The total income from football games was \$3284.15. This was an increase over the '69 total of \$2591.63.

Bovina's city council voted to re-zone a block of property east of First Street owned by Ben Finch to "H" zone at a regular monthly meeting Thursday night.

The action was taken after Finch presented a petition requesting such action. The petition was signed by some 80

per cent of the property owners within 200 feet of the property in question, Block 38.

The re-zoned block is now, and has been, used by Finch for an automobile wrecking yard. Finch requested the change in zoning for his property after an ordinance was passed last summer making it

illegal to have cars with no current license plates or current safety inspection stickers inside the city limits.

Finch agreed to assist the city in picking up "junk" cars and will allow the abandoned cars to be left on his property. The council asked the cooperation of Finch in keeping

the property "clean" and in not allowing it to become a public health or fire hazard.

Finch agreed to the request and expressed appreciation to the council for its cooperation. Some 25 different individuals own property within 200 feet of

Last Week --

Zero Temperatures Bring Major, Minor Problems

Temperatures were the main item of conversation in Bovina last week as the extreme cold affected most people in the area.

"Near zero" was the report for most of the week in the Bovina area. High winds during the day plunged the chill index to 46 degrees below zero, according to area weathermen.

Snow which fell Sunday morning continued to cover the ground in Bovina. Low temperatures turned the snow to icy snow, causing streets to remain hazardous throughout the week.

Livestock owners were kept busy during the week feeding and watering their animals. Some were hauling water due to the thick layers of ice in tanks and lakes.

Reports of frozen water lines and pipes bursting were frequent throughout the area.

One fire directly related to the freezing weather was reported when Bovina Volunteer Fire Department was called to extinguish a blaze at the Leonard Haney residence. Haney was attempting to thaw water pipes leading into the kitchen when the fire started.

The most serious incident related to the weather was water pipes bursting in the ceiling of the St. Ann's Catholic Church's parish hall Tuesday night. (See story elsewhere.)

Darrell Read, city water superintendent, and his crew were kept busy thawing out meters and water lines over the city. Directly related to the freezing temperatures was a city-wide power failure, also Tuesday night, that lasted about 30 minutes. A major power-distribution line snapped south of town causing the power failure.

Zero Weather Causes Short Power Failure

Near zero temperatures caused a wire on a main distribution line to contract and snap into at a point where it had been spliced Tuesday night, Jan. 5, about 8:45 p.m., creating a city-wide blackout that lasted approximately 30 minutes.

Lewis McDaniel, Southwestern Public Service representative in Bovina, located the break on the draw south of Bovina and had electrical power restored to Bovina shortly after 9 p.m.

A crew was called from Hereford to assist McDaniel in making more permanent repairs, which took about six hours to accomplish that night.

Minor Damage --

Firemen Extinguish Two Blazes Here

Bovina Volunteer Fire Department answered two calls Tuesday night, Jan. 5, in Bovina.

Firemen were called to the residence of Manuel Garza at the Bovina Gin about 7:30 p.m. to extinguish a fire in the bedroom of the house. A bedroom suite and mattress were destroyed in the fire, but damage to the house was minor according to Johnnie Horn, gin manager.

The fire department was called again shortly after 8 p.m. to the residence of Leonard

Haney. Haney had been thawing the water lines leading into his kitchen with an electric wire and apparently the wire overheated causing a fire in the wall of the house. Firemen cut a hole in the outside wall and extinguished the blaze. Only minor damage resulted from this fire also.

Farm Meeting Interest Keen

The attendance was outstanding and the interest was keen at a meeting here Monday night of Parmer County farmers in regard to the new farm program for 1971.

Prentice Mills, executive director of Parmer County ASCs, led the discussion concerning details of the program, which is expected to see an increase in the number of acres in production and a reduction in the amount of government payments to farmers.

The consensus of those attending the meeting seemed to be that the program wasn't as good as last year's. Nonetheless, the farmers were interested in all details of the new program.

The meeting was sponsored by Parmer County Cotton Producers Association.

A. L. Hartzog, association president, said the Monday night crowd was the largest group of farmers assembled for an agriculture-related meeting since 1961.

Bank Reports High Deposits

First State Bank of Bovina reports a record high in deposits at the close of business for 1970.

Deposits at the bank totaled \$3,125,823.27 for the year just ended, the largest amount ever on deposit at the time of a report. Loans totaled \$2,126,094.85.

Deposits at the end of business in 1969 totaled \$2,736,672.29, and deposits December 31, 1968, totaled \$2,733,813.76.

Jerry Wright, cashier at First State Bank, attributes the increase in deposits to a better-than-average crop year, normal growth in the community and increased cattle business.

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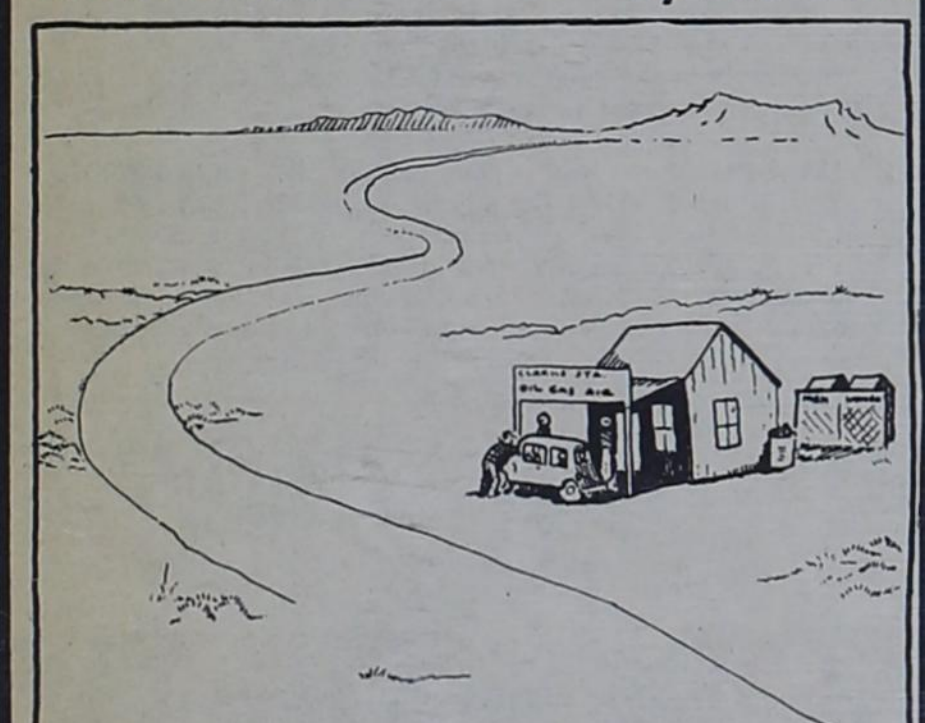

(Continued from Page 1) the property which was rezoned.

The "H" zone, which the property was changed to is for industrial and manufacturing businesses. These include wrecking yards, according to Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary.

The council voted to favor a request from three representatives of St. Ann's Catholic Church to close the designated alley on the block on Third Street owned by the church.

The representatives pointed out they were planning to build a new church building and would need to locate it on the alley. After determining no utility lines were involved in the property and since the church owns the rest of the entire block, the council agreed to proceed with details of deeding the property to the church.

Making the request for St. Ann's were Rev. Norman Boyde, the pastor, Gene Brito and Dan Koelzer.

The council members studied plans for the new city park and proposed improvements for it including a community center. The plans were presented by representatives of Ralph Douglas, city engineer.

The plans, which are just in the discussion stage at present, called for an estimated expenditure of approximately \$120,000. The city will seek financial help from the federal and state governments for the project. Included in the overall cost were a swimming pool and a community center building. Also, the plans call for landscaping the area, providing roads, a small dam and concrete spillway. Included in the design are 10 sites for overnight camper trailers.

The new city park is located on the west side of town adjacent to and south of Highway 86. It consists of some 20 acres and was purchased with funds donated by the former Panhandle Growers Labor Association.

The city board, at the suggestion of Mayor Chas. W. Flynn, agreed to pay a total of \$27.50 per month toward the rent of the building on Highway 60 formerly occupied by Warren Auto Supply for the use of Bovina Neighborhood Center of the Office of Economic Opportunity. Total rent on the building is \$110 per month. The two other cities in the county and the county were asked to pay a like amount to make the total.

Present at the meeting, in addition to those previously mentioned, were Councilmen V. C. Willard, Johnnie Horn, B. L. Marshall and Dolph Moten.

"One of the things I enjoy most is taking the recorder to shut-ins of our church," says Mrs. Ovid Lawlis, who occupies this week's Cook's Corner.

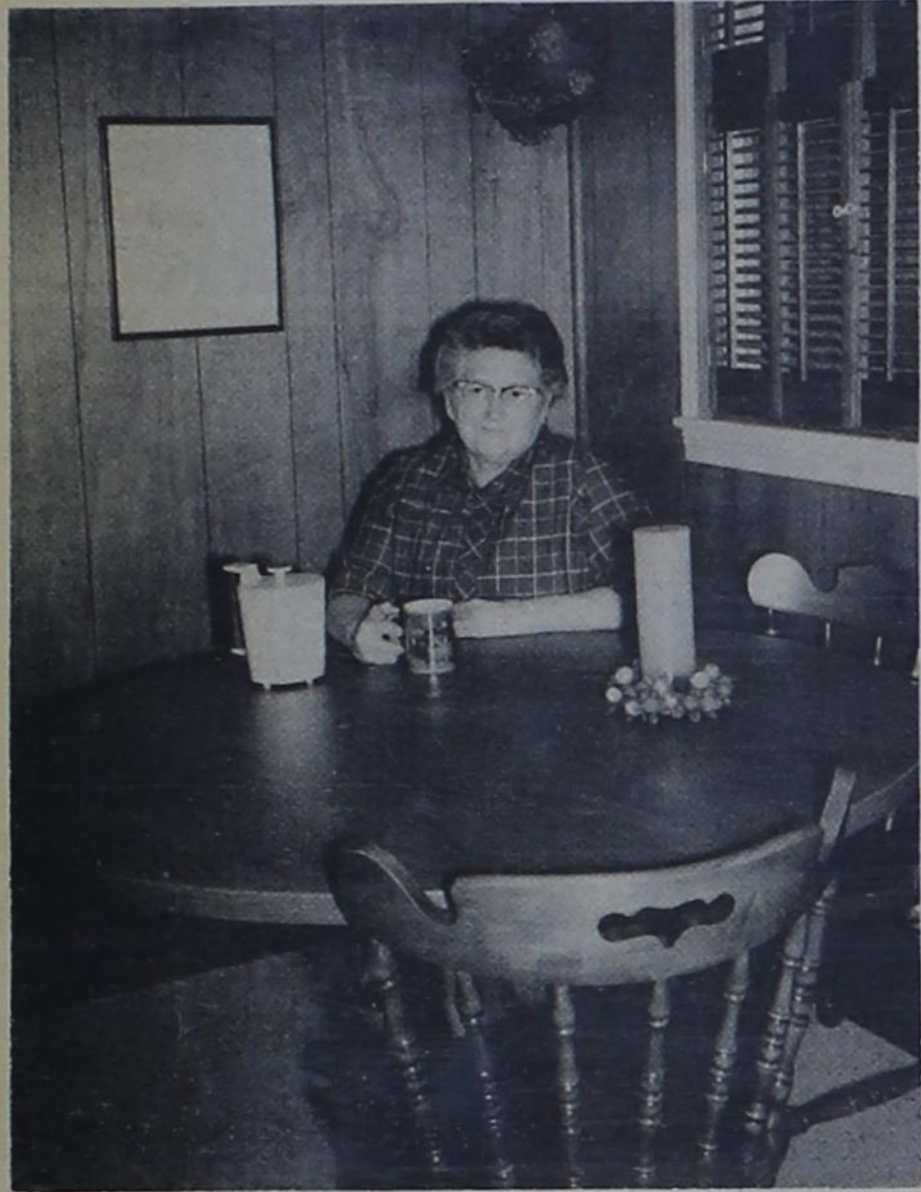
Mrs. Lawlis grew up in Hamlin and was graduated from Hamlin High School. She and Ovid were married in Hamlin in 1938.

2 c. buttermilk (or enough to make thin batter)
Mix dry ingredients together well, then add buttermilk, salad oil and eggs and beat with mixer. Heat skillet hot enough for drop of cold water to bounce. Use about 1/4 cup of batter for each hot cake; cook until bubbles form on surface and edges dry. Turn and cook until underside is nicely browned.

FRIED-OVEN STEAK

1 1/2 lbs. round steak
1 c. flour
3/4 t. salt
1/8 t. pepper
1 egg
1/8 c. milk
1/2 c. salad oil
Salt and pepper steak. Cut into serving size pieces. Beat egg and add milk in medium size bowl. Put flour in another medium size bowl. Prepare steak pieces in egg mixture and then in flour. Pour oil in skillet and heat enough to bubble as you put in steak pieces. Brown on both sides as you like it. Remove from skillet and put in a foil lined dish and seal with foil. Cook in oven at 250 degrees for one hour.

QUICK DEVILED EGGS

12 eggs
1/2 t. salt
1/8 t. pepper
3 T. sweet relish
2 T. mayonnaise
Boil eggs and cool. Remove shells. Halve eggs lengthwise. Take out yolks and crumble with fingers in medium size bowl. Add salt, pepper, sweet relish and mayonnaise and mix well. Lightly mound egg yolks mixture in egg whites.
"I also tried Grave Ivy's chow chow that I bought at the WSCS bazaar as a substitute for the sweet relish and it was just as good."

SCRAMBLE-FRY EGGS

2 eggs
dash salt
dash pepper
3/4 T. butter or margarine
2 T. milk
Mix all ingredients together. Put one t. oil in skillet and heat. Pour egg mixture in - don't stir - wait until it is light brown on the underside and then turn over. Cook over medium heat.

A FAMINE IN A TIME OF PLENTY

Eight-hundred and ninety-two years before the birth of Christ, Benhadad, king of Syria rolled his mighty army down from the north across the plain of Esdraelon to Samaria, besieging the city. (II Kings 6:24-30). It is almost impossible for us to comprehend the tragic, heart rendering condition in which the inhabitants of this proud capitol city found themselves. The Bible says, "There was a great famine" and then describes the severity of starvation. The head of a donkey sold for \$20 dollars, and a pint of doves dung for 95¢. Two women had made a bargain. They would boil their sons and eat them. As cannibals they had eaten one child. But the other woman had hidden her son thus breaking the hideous bargain.

Our hearts are touched by the above story of hunger, however, Amos describes a worse blight about which we show little concern. Amos 8:1 -- "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord, that I will send a famine in the land, not a famine of bread, nor a thirst for water, but of hearing the words of the Lord."

This prophesy is applicable in our own time. We live in a time of spiritual famine. No longer do men respect the authority of God's revelation. We prefer what we think to what God and the Bible say. We have developed a breeding ground for liberalism, modernism, and apostasy. Isaiah says that we have become "An oak whose leaf fadeth, and as a garden that hath no water." (Isaiah 1:30). Men no longer endure sound doctrine and their faith is weak because of a lack of diligent study of word of God. Hosea gives the answer to this famine, "Sow to yourselves in righteousness, reap in mercy; break up your fallow ground: for it is time to seek the Lord, till he come and rain righteousness upon you." Hosea 10:12.
